The Apostolic Nuncio to Great Britain, His Excellency Archbishop Edward Adams, spent four days during May touring around the Diocese of East Anglia after accepting an invitation from Bishop Alan Hopes. Keith Morris reports.



Ordinations set for Cathedral

■ Eight men will be ordained as either priests or deacons in the Diocese of East Anglia at St John's Cathedral in Norwich this summer.

On Saturday June 22, Bishop Alan ordained three men to serve as Permanent Deacons. They were: Brett Gladden (from Bury St Edmunds), James Hurst (from Newmarket) and Martin L'Estrange (from King's Lynn).

Seminarian Peter Wygnanski will also be ordained a transitory Deacon by Bishop Alan in Rome (Palazzola) on July 14.

On Saturday July 6 at 11:30am, five men will be ordained as priests for the Diocese; the highest number ordained at one time in nearly 20 years, and a real blessing for our Diocese.

Those to be ordained to the sacred priesthood are: Rev Jude Belnas (from St Philip Howard, Cambridge), Rev Michael Brookes (from Sacred Heart, Dereham), Rev Simon Davies (from St Neots), Rev Alan Hodgson (from St Edmund's, Bury) and Rev Paul Spellman (from Our Lady and St Joseph, Sheringham).

Bishop Alan said: This is a grace filled moment for our Diocese – a great blessing from God – and I hope that every parish will be represented in the cathedral on this day both to pray for our new priests and to welcome them amongst us as they prepare to minister to the people of God in East Anglia. I ask everyone to pray fervently that more men will answer God's call to serve Him and his church as priests."

■ The Papal Nuncio is the Pope's personal representative in GB and he began his visit on Sunday May 19 with a visit to the Jewish Synagogue in Norwich and then celebrated Mass at St John the Baptist Cathedral in Norwich, before meeting parishioners over coffee.

He went on to visit Norwich Anglican Cathedral where he was shown around by Cathedral Dean the Very Rev Jane Hedges and took part in Compline.

On the Monday, Archbishop Adams visited St John Fisher Catholic High School in Peterborough where a meeting took place with local faith leaders, including the Peterborough Inter Faith Council and Anglican, Buddhist and Islamic representatives.

Archbishop Adams brought them greetings from Pope Francis: "Pope Francis is very much interested in what you do and in this type of inter faith dialogue. Dialogue comes from the respect we have for each other and the love of what is true and what is good. Shortly after his election, Pope Francis called for more inter-religious dialogue as a way of building bridges," he said.

"He encourages every effort between people of different faiths for positive relations and constructive inter-action. Talk on terrorist threat to church

■ Norfolk counter terrorism police have spoken to parishioners from St Mary's, Thetford, about what to do in a security incident reports Paul Gilbert.

The police were invited to attend the meeting in the church hall on May 13 after concerns were raised due to events around the world of religious communities being attacked by extremists.

Parishioners listened attentively on what John Dolan, Counter Terrorism Advisor, had to say regarding what to look out for, and how to report any suspicious behaviour or activities in or around the church by people unknown to the parish community.

It was highlighted by the counter terrorism officer that there is no specific threat against any faith communities, but all should be vigilant in the course of everyday worship.

"This presentation is about making people aware of how to prevent an incident occurring, what to during and in the aftermath of an attack. It is not to alarm people in anyway, but to ensure that everyone is kept safe," said John.

Throughout the presentation, people were able to raise questions regarding fears and concerns. John soon put those fears and concerns to rest by giving reassurance and acknowledged that security is a key concern in light of terror attacks across the world. John also mentioned that the police are working with the Catholic National Shrine at Walsingham regarding pilgrimages.

The message was clear, during an incident - get out if able, hide, call the police on 999. If people suspect anything untoward, report it. John could not stress enough how important it is to report and challenge unusual behaviour, for it could ultimately save lives.

The police are offering this presentation free to all community groups across the diocese. If your church wishes to have a presentation, please do get in contact with your local police.

The Nuncio then celebrated Mass with students and staff members of the chaplaincy team at St John Fisher in the small school chapel and spoke to them of how God wants to be close to us and love us.

"When God loves us it changes us, we can't be the same afterwards. We respond to his love and show our love for him, which can be seen in the way we respond to God and love each other."

The Archbishop then shared lunch with senior school staff, led by head-

teacher Kate Pereira and school governors, followed by a question and answer session with a group of sixth formers who asked him about his role as Papal Nuncio.

The Nuncio's party then moved to the next door St Thomas More Primary School where headteacher Anne-Marie McElhinney was leading an assembly for the school's 420 pupils.

Archbishop Adams was introduced to the children who asked him a series of entertaining and searching questions about his role, what he enjoyed and found most challenging about it, how old he was and how often he went to the Vatican.

On Tuesday, the Nuncio's party headed to the Catholic National Shrine at Walsingham where Archbishop Adams celebrated Mass in the Slipper Chapel, the first Papal Nuncio to do so for 20 years. He also had the opportunity to meet some of the growing number of Religious Brothers and Sisters now living in Walsingham.

He went on to visit Sheringham and performed a blessing on a house which has just been bought by the St Vincent de Paul Society to house up to ten

homeless people.

"This is just one of many social action initiatives which take place across the diocese, promoting the Gospel of Jesus Christ and his love," Bishop Alan told a gathering of SVP and Caritas members who engage in social action across the diocese.

The final visit of the day was to the Carmelite Monastery at Quidenham where the Archbishop joined the sisters for Vespers.

The final day of the Nuncio's visit included a meeting with the Filipino and Syro-Malabar Communities at St Philip Howard Parish in Cambridge and lunch at Our Lady and the English Martyrs.

At St Philip Howard, the Apostolic Nuncio and Bishop Alan first prayed before the Blessed Sacrament in the Parish Church then had the meeting with the two communities.

Representing the Syro-Malabar community were Fr Philip John, Fr Thomas Parakandathil, Santos Mathen and Joseph Cherian.

Representing the Filipino community were Rev Alfonso-Jude Belnas, Bienn Carlo, Expedita Amper and Phoebe Vargas. Then the Papal Nuncio visited the Parish Church of Our Lady and the English Martyrs before leaving for London after a successful four days around the Diocese.

Speaking about his visit to the diocese, Archbishop Adams said: "I want to thank Bishop Alan for giving me the opportunity to come to the diocese and see the reality of the church and the people and to be able give the Pope an idea of the life of the Christian community in this part of the world."

First as church services go online

■ Saint Laurence's in Cambridge has started to stream its services live online and is believed to be the first parish church in the Diocese to do so. report Sean Martin and Ronald Haynes.

Live streaming of the sanctuary allows people unable to be physically present to participate at Mass or other activities held in the church. Housebound, sick, or parishioners in care homes can continue to be engaged in parish life, even though they are not able to travel to the church. It will also be of benefit for relatives and friends unable to travel greater distances to baptisms, weddings and funerals.

A camera has been installed by the recently formed parish "tech" group, and the camera streams live video and audio through to YouTube, and is accessible anywhere via the internet.

There are three views of the sanctuary: a regular view, a wider view also covering the font, and a silent meditative view. The tech group is working in conjunction with the SVP who are in touch with many in the parish likely to benefit, and can loan out laptops.

St Laurence's regularly has Masses and celebrations in several languages other than English, and streaming provides access to remote and scattered community members of these traditions. We are now able to publicise and stream parish talks from the pulpit, and so extend sharing and outreach more widely. We are considering the possibility of recording special events, such as weddings, or other occasions, for family members.

We took a DIY approach to the installation and service and therefore the project is well within the initial budget of £2000 and streaming to YouTube incurs no additional monthly cost beyond the cost of the broadband connection.

Rebecca Bretherton, said: "We know Jesus Christ asks each one of us to tell people about God's Good News. This training will give some practical ideas about how to really do so. "



■ Among those present (and pictured above) were Filip and Ina Baillien who are celebrating their first anniversary and will soon welcome their first child. The Bailliens were married in their native Italy but returned to begin their married lives in Swaffham.

Also pictured above (on the left) are Alec and June Motts who have lived their

whole lives in the Diocese. The Motts were married 55 years ago at Hoveton before settling in Cambridge. Most of their children went on to be baptised and married in the Diocese. When asked for their advice to those starting out in married life, the Motts' said that "honesty and trustworthiness are paramount and that the Church is a rock of faith and something which encompasses the family".

Peter and Alice Hughes (pictured on the right) were this year celebrating their 65th anniversary. The congregation applauded their long lives together as they walked the aisle to receive their certificate from the Bishop.

In his homily, Bishop Alan reminded those present that the family is a school of love, in which children learn the truth of the Gospels through the examples of mothers and fathers. Married people also, he said, reveal the truth of God to the world. The Bishop spoke about the beauty of the Church's two doctrinal truths for married people: faithfulness and fruitfulness.

These two divine truths are central to East Anglian marriage preparation, a course that runs throughout the year in all areas of the Diocese, and through which some 300 couples were this year prepared for marriage. These couples are taught that just as God is faithful to us, and fruitful through us, so married couples reflect God's love in their faithfulness to each other and their openness to life.

At this year's Marriage Mass, Bishop Alan called all those present to "Continue to love one another! For by doing so you will learn who God is and you will show him to our world – for God is the spouse who is faithful unto death and whose crucified love bears fruit in every generation."

Catenian annual conference held








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Joyous children's

Over 550 children and families attended the annual East Anglia Children's Pilgrimage to Walsingham on May 28, taking part in a walk, attending Mass and then enjoying a picnic and fun on Wells beach. Keith Morris reports.

■ Groups from across the diocese including Cambridge, Huntingdon, Peterborough, Wisbech, Norwich, Wymondham, Great Yarmouth, Gorleston, Sawston, Cambourne, King's Lynn, Mildenhall, Brandon, Beccles, Bungay, Costessey, Sheringham took part.

Organiser Chris Storman said: "Our theme for the day was 'This is Your Mother' – remembering that Jesus gave us all into the keeping of His mother – and so we honour Our Lady at her Shrine for her care and intercession."

Children and families gathered in the Friday Market Place in Little Walsingham outside the Church of the Annunciation and from there set off in procession behind an image of Our Lady of Walsingham and the baby Jesus to the Catholic National Shrine along the old railway track.

Flowers and petals were strewn before the mile-long procession and hymns and prayers to Mary featured throughout.

Once at the Shrine and inside a packed Chapel of Reconciliation, everyone was welcomed to the 12 noon Mass by Bishop Alan, who said: "You have come to a very special place at a very special time as May is the month of Mary, the Mother of God and the mother of the Church."

In his homily, Fr Pat Cleary said that the pilgrimage had started 34 years ago with just a couple of parishes, Thetford and Great Yarmouth, getting together.

"It is now a wonderful tradition which has grown and grown and now fills the Chapel of Reconciliation."

Fr Pat spoke about us all as babies: "When we were born we were all just little bundles of needs and the bond especially between the mother and child is a strong one," he said. "As babies we keep close to our mother who will meet all of our needs.

"God chose Mary to be the mother of the baby Jesus who, just like us, had lots of needs. At the end of his life Mary was there again for Jesus. Mary is also our mother in heaven and points us to Jesus his son and asks us 'to do what he tells us'," said Fr Pat.

In his monthly series of reflections, Deacon Peter Coates from Woodbridge asks are you

reflection

honest when you pray?

Are you honest when you pray? It is easy to be honest when you are asking for something or praying for someone else but what happens when you are hoping to come closer to the Lord?

I find the most difficult time to be at Reconciliation. Is it true to say that we are really sorry? Is it true that we really don't want to do it again? How close can we come to Jesus?

When my mother was attending instruction to become Catholic and marry my father, she commented that some protestants were "too familiar when they talked to God". The nun quickly corrected her saying "No one is more familiar with the Lord than a Catholic".

Of course, they were both wrong. When our Lord taught His disciples to pray, He said they should say "our daddy" but down the years our inhibitions have grown and "we dare to say: 'Our Father..." I don't find it too difficult to say that and the liturgy would sound very strange if it were littered with "daddy". Jesus invites us to be intimate with God, to be truly close to Him. This implies openness and honesty. That is what makes it difficult for me. I want to be on good terms with the Lord but He knows what I am really like!

Are you honest in prayer?

I want to pray – "I love you, Jesus, my love above all things. I repent with my whole heart for having offended you. Never permit me to separate myself from you again. Grant that I may love you always and then do with me what you will."

But those phrases are so demanding. Can I really mean it when I say them? The most intimate thing we can say to anyone is "I love you".

The implications are immense and the final clause makes it clear. If the love we offer is true, the beloved is trusted totally. This is too much. I cannot rise to such heights.

It is so difficult to find words to express our adoration of the most Holy God and to worship and to love Him. Words just do not do it! I want to worship my Lord. I want to open my life to Him so that I live His Way. "Love so amazing, so divine, Demands my soul, my life, my all." I want to love the Lord. It is enough.

■ Peter spent 15 years as a Methodist minister before European Education and Training projects in Portugal (where he converted), Hungary, Azerbaijan, Kyrgyzstan and Moldova where he lived for six years. He was the first permanent deacon ordained in the former Soviet Union in the Diocese of Chisinau, Moldova.

Mosquito Club

A group of students from the Mosquito Club at St Benedict's Catholic School, Bury St Edmunds, visited the Imperial War Museum at Duxford recently

The lunchtime history club has a loyal group of 15 students who all have interests in the area of historic military aviation and its heritage.

It meets once a month and is named after a famous aircraft of World War II, the De Havilland DH.98, the 'Mosquito'. The Club supports charity, The People's Mosquito, which is involved in the restoration of a Mosquito aircraft to fly again in the UK, the charity's motto being "To Fly-To Educate-To Remember".

Through its links to The People's Mosquito, on Saturday April 6, the Club were invited to visit the Historic Aircraft Collection (HAC) at IWM Duxford.

They currently have five historic aircraft restored to flight at Duxford: a Supermarine Spitfire, a Hawker Hurricane, a Hawker Fury, a Hawker Nimrod and their most recent restoration, a De Havilland DH.9 First World War biplane.

Teacher Jon Gregory said: "What made this trip so special was that we were allowed access 'beyond the ropes' and could actually walk around and even underneath the individual aircraft and be given expert tuition by HAC's experienced ground crew.

"The highlight of the visit was being allowed to actually climb up the port wings of the Spitfire and Hurricane, just as wartime RAF pilots would have done, and be able to see into the cockpits to see all the equipment inside."



Historic treat for New primary school plan given approval

The Government has announced its approval for a bid from the Diocese of East Anglia for a new Catholic voluntary-aided (VA) primary school for the Hampton East housing development in Peterborough.

■ The school will help to meet demand for more school places in the city as well as providing more Catholic school places.

Helen Bates, Assistant Director for Schools, said: "This is fantastic news. It will provide the first brand-new, purposebuilt Catholic school in this Diocese for decades. We would like to thank everyone

who helped us make this bid a success by providing their support earlier this year.

"We will now need to go through a statutory consultation to make our case to the local education authority (Peterborough City Council), to approve the opening of the new school.

"We will be asking for people's support once again when we do this. When this consultation starts there will be further information available on the Diocesan website at www.rcdea.org.uk/vaschools."

It is expected that when the new school is full it could have up to 90 places or three classes in each year group. It is also expected to have a nursery.

"We will work closely with Peterborough City Council to make sure that the

right number of school places are available at the right time," said Helen.

The Diocese submitted bids for three new VA schools, with the others being in Northstowe in Cambridgeshire and Great Haddon in Peterborough.

"We were not successful with these two bids," said Helen, "and are waiting to find out the reasons behind this from the Government. But to be successful with one is great news."

Voluntary-aided schools are state funded and unlike free schools, have no limit on faith admissions.

"We expect that this school, like most schools in the Diocese, will have a wide mix of children of all faiths and none. On average, about a third of pupils in our schools are not Catholic," said Helen.

Pupils wins prizes for their paintings

Pupils at St Mary's Catholic Primary School in Lowestoft have received prizes after submitting winning entries for two painting competitions run by the Knights of St Columba.




The Marriage and Family Life Commission has appointed a new Fertility Awareness Methods (FAM) co-ordinator to work with Natural Family Planning (NFP) teachers and couples across the Diocese of East Anglia.

■ The new FAM co-ordinator is Vicky Black who read Natural Sciences at the University of Cambridge, and stayed on for a PhD and post-doc, studying ancient changes in climate and ocean chemistry.

She is now an editor for a large scientific journal, and lives in Cambridge with her two small children and husband.

Vicky said: "I found NFP to be a very practical way of deepening our understanding of the Church's beautiful teaching on the nature of marriage. I also loved learning the science behind NFP, and feel very empowered having a tool that helps me understand so much about how my body functions. I'm always going to be addicted to graphs: I love collecting and interpreting data, and helping other people to do it well!

Vicky's role is to co-ordinate all the NFP teacher in



the Diocese and to ensure that used for family planning – in Catholics (those preparing for marriage and those already married) can access all of the available FAM methods: Billings, Sympto-Thermal and Creighton.

So what are Fertility Awareness Methods?

Fertility Awareness Methods are the practice of observing a woman's signs of fertility and interpreting them to determine her fertile and infertile days.

This information can be

each cycle, spouses can make a joint decision about conceiving or avoiding pregnancy.

Fertility awareness methare modern and ods science-based. They rely on observing external signs which reflect exactly what is going on inside woman's body. They are 99% effective in avoiding pregnancy when used correctly. In addition, they can help achieve pregnancy since they enable couples to identify their

fertile window. It has been reported that amongst those using those methods and trying to conceive 80% will achieve pregnancy within six months.

Woman can use fertility awareness methods throughout their reproductive years. Those methods do not depend on cycle length and do not require woman to have regular cycles; they can also be used when breastfeeding or nearing menopause.

Moreover, fertility awareness methods help monitor reproductive health and can help detect cycle abnormalities (eg short luteal phase).

Fertility awareness methods are different to contraception as marital intimacy always remains open to life. Respecting naturally occurring cycles, couples adjust their behaviour and cooperate with God's given gift of fertility.

The methods are natural and have no side effects. They do not alter the natural functioning of the reproductive system but respect the natural fertility cycle.

Tribute to Fr Liam Crowley

■ Fr Liam Crowley, formerly of the Diocese of East Anglia, died peacefully on Thursday May 23 at the age of 91, in the nursing home in Ireland where he had lived for the last six vears.

Fr Liam was born in Ballinadee, Bandon, in County Cork. He was ordained priest by the Bishop of Clogher in June 1965 for the Sacred Heart Community. He first served in the parish of Rochester, New York, and for seven years in the Missions in the Bahamas, stationed on Abaco Island.

On returning to England he served as an Assistant in West Acton in Westminster before his appointment as an Assistant in the parish of St Michael Huntingdon. As Parish Priest he served the people of God in the parishes of St Felix, Haverhill, St Jude's Whittlesey and St Joseph's, Sheringham.

He was incardinated into the Diocese of East Anglia in February 1991 and was then appointed to St Dominic's Downham Market. He retired in 2003 and went to live in the family home in Ireland.

The funeral Mass took place on May 25 in Ballinadee.

Caritas is a Latin word meaning 'charity', otherwise described as 'love in action.' With that in mind, you will have a clue as to why an international Catholic organisation calling itself Caritas may have some relevance to our faith and to our mission in the world.

We are all called, as Christians, to offer charity - or love - to our neighbours. Jesus commands us to 'love our neighbour as ourselves'. Indeed, Jesus does on to tell us that on these two commandments - 'Love God' and 'love your neighbour as yourself' - hang the whole Law! (Mt 22:37-40) So this 'caritas' - this 'charity' - this 'love in action' - seems to be central to what we Christians are about. This is why Caritas was set up as an international Catholic organisation - to serve (love) God by serving (loving) our sisters and brothers in need. In England and Wales, Caritas is part of the Bishops Conference and many dioceses are members of the organisation, as are many charities. My role as the Caritas Development Worker is to oversee all of this social
