A GOLDEN DAY

The Irish Dean of Plymouth Cathedral has just celebrated his Golden Jubilee. **'A priest ... loved and cherished by his people...**'

MONSIGNOR Canon Bartholomew Nannery, the Dean of Plymouth's Catholic Cathedral of St Mary and St Boniface, celebrated the golden jubilee of his priesthood at a special concelebrated Mass on 16th June. It was fifty years to the day since he was ordained a priest at All Hallows in Dublin in 1968. Monsignor 'Bart' is from Granard in the north of County Longford in Ireland, where many of his family live.

Mgr Nannery has served the cathedral and its parishioners faithfully for the last 28 years. He was appointed Administrator in 1990 and has been instrumental in overseeing many changes and improvements to the building and its surroundings. His pastoral care of the people has been exemplary.

The Rt. Rev. Mark O'Toole is the bishop of the Diocese of Plymouth which covers the South-west of England. He paid tribute to Monsignor Bart: "I want to express my thanks to him for the outstanding service and commitment that he has shown, both in the cathedral and in the parish, over the many years. Many have cause to be grateful for his generosity, warm welcome and faithful dedication."

Plymouth Cathedral was packed for the Jubilee Mass. Among the 700 guests and parishioners was the new Lord Mayor of Plymouth, Councillor Sam Davey. He presented Bart with an illustrated scroll bearing the armorial crest of the Corporation of Plymouth which expressed their gratitude for all the monsignor had done for the city over the years. It was accompanied by a personal gift of a beautiful Dartington Crystal carafe, engraved with the city's crest. At the end of Mass, Monsignor Nannery expressed his 'deepest gratitude and affection' to all as well as thanking those who had put together such a wonderful ceremony with lovely music from the choir led by the cathedral's director of music, Christopher Fletcher.

After the 11 a.m. Mass, all the guests were invited to lunch in a huge marquee in the bishop's garden. There was a hog roast and a wide variety of dishes served by all the different ethnic communities who make up the cathedral's diverse congregation.

Monsignor Nannery was interviewed on BBC TV News and the next day on BBC Radio Devon, saying how fortunate he was to have come to work as a priest in Devon immediately after his ordination: "I believe that our English Catholic parish structure is probably the best in the world," he said. "In some Catholic countries, parishes can be too big but here they are small enough for us to have a close and intimate relationship with all the people and their families."

Bart's P.A. is Kasia Misztowt who was also interviewed by the BBC for last Sunday's religious programme. "He cares about this place a lot." she told the listeners, "it's his life. He loves the people here and he's loved and cherished by them in return."

Monsignor Bart is one of five priests in the Diocese of Plymouth who are celebrating their golden

jubilee this year. They include one of the most senior clergymen, Monsignor Harry Doyle, who actually went to the same Irish boarding school as Bart – St Patrick's College in Cavan. In fact, the present Bishop of Kilmore, the Rt. Rev. Leo O'Reilly was one of their classmates!

"I'm very glad that I chose the Diocese of Plymouth in which to minister as a priest," said Monsignor Doyle. "I have been very happy in each of the parishes I have served. My thanks go especially to my parents as well as all my family and friends at home in Ireland who encouraged me to become a priest."

Kieran Kirby and the parish evangelisation team, the healing evening commenced. Singing and praise, prayer, testimony and of course laying-on of hands prayer for healing made the start of the mission truly memorable. They also invited those present to stay behind after both Masses so that there was an opportunity for all to receive laying-on of hands prayer. I can safely say that it was a truly awesome sight to see the parishioners queuing all the way down the central aisle as they waited to come up for healing and prayer. Some members of the parish evangelisation team were also involved in praying for others, and this made the event an even more special one for them.

Parishioners of Our Lady Queen of Martyrs and St Joseph, Wool, Wareham and Lulworth, are celebrating having become the second parish in the diocese of Plymouth to gain a livesimply award. The award is an opportunity for Catholic parishes, and other communities, to respond to Pope Francis' invitation in Laudato Si' to "work with generosity and tenderness in protecting this world which God has entrusted to us".

Parishioners had to demonstrate how, over the past three years, they had been living

- simply;
- · sustainably with creation; and
- · in solidarity with people in poverty.

Living simply

Living simply can be a difficult concept to grasp, but Pope Francis explained it in Laudato Si like this:

"It is the conviction that "less is more"..... It is a return to that simplicity which allows us to stop and appreciate the small things, to be grateful for the opportunities which life affords us, to be spiritually detached from what we possess, and not to succumb to sadness for what we lack.... It is not a lesser life or one lived with less intensity. On the contrary, it is a way of living life to the full.... Happiness means knowing how to limit some needs which only diminish us and being open to the many different possibilities which life can offer."

To express their undertaking to live simply, parishioners chose to take part in parish pilgrimages or walks to help them to appreciate God's creation personally. These walks have included a beautiful afternoon at Blue Pool, near Wareham, followed by a delicious cream tea and cakes; a walk around the lake on the Lulworth estate; and walking lovely gardens and along the river Frome near Bindon Abbey.



prevent global temperatures reaching dangerous levels and to help communities overseas who are already suffering from more adverse and life-threatening weather conditions.

Specifically, parishioners were provided with periodic tips and advice how to reduce the amounts of energy they used in their homes and generally in their everyday lives. They also looked at the amount of car sharing between themselves, for example to and from mass in order to reduce costs and reduce harmful emissions.

Another idea which was adopted was to enable parishioners to find a new life for clothes no longer worn but still in good condition. This was conceived as a "swap shop" where parishioners and the public could exchange items between themselves, or purchase items from the "racks". The latter quickly became the normal method of operation, with clothes being donated under the "Nearly New" banner. In addition, each of the three churches in the parish are continuing to donate a substantial amount of goods to the Foodbank in Wareham.

The parishes have supported CAFOD's social justice campaigns very well, for example "Power to Be" which seeks more government funding for renewable energy installations in countries where poorest people live, Share the Journey in relation to refugees and migrants, Climate Change campaign and others.

They are also giving their ongoing support for the "Connect 2" scheme under which the parish has connected with a community, Puentecitos, in EL Salvador, representing three or four communities there which are supported by CAFOD through its local partner. Parishioners have raised more than \pounds 2,000 sent to the communities to help with various needs there including materials and goods for the locally run shop and small businesses, such as basket making, farming support of various kinds and contributing to the new church in Puentecitos. Parishioners also sold some baskets at the annual fete in Wool bought from Puentecitos.



Cash raised has, to date, been given to Harlequin Care which supports Carers throughout Dorset who are looking after a relative, friend or neighbour with a life limiting or restrictive illness.

In light of the huge reduction in the world's forests and its significant effect on the environment, a large number of parishioners signed a paper recycling pledge:

In addition to raising funds, there is a two-way exchange of letters, with pictures. The people of Puentecitos let parishioners know what has been happening there in the community and about individuals. For example, in March 2018, we learned that:

Parishioners are continuing to invite fellow parishioners and people from the surrounding area to a weekly coffee morning at St Joseph's church in Wool. They have also made additional cushions for the concrete pews in the church and are now restoring the old cushions originally made more than 20 years ago.

Living sustainably with creation

Parishioners enthusiastically supported CAFOD's Climate Change campaigns seeking to reduce harmful greenhouse gas emissions to

In addition, all parish paper, including the weekly newsletters, is now recycled.

Living in solidarity with people in poverty

The parish has sold Fairtrade goods after mass in Wool once a month for some time and this is continuing. Similarly, parishioners in Wareham regularly sell Fairtrade goods there and also in the community. Wareham is a Fairtrade Town and St Joseph's is a Fairtrade Parish. Edelmira lives in Puentecitos with her husband Martir. She loves cultivating her fruit and vegetables, and being part of the savings group committee. Martir is learning how to preserve soil quality and conserve water by planting living barriers of trees to protect against wind and rain. "The farmers were all so impressed with this barrier technique," says CAFOD's Sophie. "It has really prevented the land drying out and keeps nutrients in the soil.""

Summary

The parish has greatly benefitted from working for a Livesimply award. We might have done some of the things we undertook to obtain the award but, probably, not all of them. In addition, we quickly found that doing the various activities took on a meaning and life of its own. Having the award in our church serves mainly to remind us why we did them and encourages us to do more.

Become a *livesimply* award community



The livesimply award is an opportunity for Catholic communities - parishes, schools, religious orders and chaplaincies - to respond to Pope Francis' invitation in Laudato Si' to "work with generosity and tenderness in protecting this world which God has entrusted to us".

Why livesimply? So others can simply live! We have heard that phrase no doubt many times. And it is likely that at some point in our lives, we do consider what life is like for the poorest in the developing world.

One of our motivations for the livesimply award scheme has been the reality of the state of the world for the poorest one billion people on earth.

What is the *livesimply* award?

It is awarded to communities who can show how they have been living **simply**, **in solidarity** with people in poverty and **sustainably** with creation.

There are many reasons to undertake the livesimply award:

- To take up Pope Francis' challenge to work
- for justice, peace and caring for creation
- To recognise all the work our communities are doing
- To bring the parish or school community together
- To achieve more by working together and showing leadership in the Catholic community

Some livesimply award communities have encouraged people to walk or cycle to church or school, install solar panels, start recycling schemes, join a climate change campaign, support Fairtrade stalls or donate to a local food bank. The award celebrates what you have already done and inspires you to do more. It helps your community to live, not just more simply, but also more fully. visit your community, find out what you've been doing and help you celebrate and share your achievements.

Working together on the livesimply award can bring parishes and school communities together.

It can nurture our spiritual lives, strengthen the bonds of friendship, support those taking practical steps towards sustainability and help us to play our part in tackling the big issues while making connections with the wider community.

You need the backing of your parish priest, and a small enthusiastic group to encourage people to get started.

It should be possible for any active community who has taken on board the three key principles to achieve the award within a year.

Because of the weather the windows and doors were literally wide open and perhaps one of the most wonderful of remarks by visitors was quite simply "I have walked passed this church for years but never been inside. It is a beautiful church and everyone is so warm and friendly." This might be the beginning of another journey of a saint.

1226 In Richard Earl of Cornwall instituted, by Royal Charter, a three day favre to be held on "the eve, the day, & the morrow" of the feast of the assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary in Liskeard in Cornwall.






