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Celebrating the Sacrament of Confirmation

On 5th April, during the wonderful season of Eastertide, Bishop Christopher Budd made the first of his visits to parishes across the Diocese to celebrate the sacrament of Confirmation. In the parish of Our Lady Help of Christians & St Denis he confirmed seven of the young people who, since October 2012, had been preparing to receive the sacrament.

Confirmation is one of the seven sacraments which, together with Baptism and the Holy Eucharist, is one of the sacraments of initiation. According to Catholic doctrine, in this sacrament they receive the Holy Spirit and become adult members of the Catholic Church.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church states "in Confirmation we receive the spiritual seal, the Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of right judgment and courage, the spirit of knowledge and reverence, the Spirit of holy fear in God's presence. Guard what you have received. God the Father has marked you with his sign; Christ the Lord has confirmed you and has placed his pledge, the Spirit, in your heart (Wikipedia)."

The following extract from the Acts of the Apostles (8:14-17) describes how Peter and John confirmed the Samarians: "Now when the apostles in Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent them Peter and John, who went down and prayed for them, that they might receive the Holy Spirit, for it had not yet fallen upon any of them; they had only been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. Then they laid hands on them and they received the Holy Spirit."

Easter 2013




Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ

One of our most popular psalms is "The Lord's my Shepherd". It is often chosen for weddings, funerals and other important events in the lives of families and parishes.

The image of the Shepherd has a lovely warm feel to it. It is an image conjuring up the caring and concerned attitude of the Shepherd. In the Christian tradition, this image comes from the heart of God. God is often presented as Shepherd of his people in the Hebrew Scriptures.

Above all, God's concern for us is shown in the Incarnation. Christ becomes the Shepherd of his people by becoming one of us. He is not only among us to put us back on track for our final and true home which is Heaven. He also undertakes a journey for us through death into resurrection, providing us with a new life that is truly beyond all expectation!

The Church picks up the image of the Shepherd as a part of her celebration of Easter. Our Lord shows himself our Shepherd as he is established as the Lord of Life. Our sinfulness had become an enormous barrier to the life to which we are called. Jesus through his death and resurrection has rescued us from disaster and he has brought his Church into existence to enable us to stay on the road for eternal life. He chooses Shepherds (Bishops and Priests) to guide his people and entrusts to them the task of feeding his people and leading them in life-giving ways. He has recently called forth a new



chief Shepherd, Pope Francis, to continue his work and to strengthen and encourage all his Bishops and Priests and people, as have the Popes before him.

It is appropriate that, in the context of our celebration of Easter, we ask the Chief Shepherd of our souls to raise up in his Church men who will continue his work among his people. When we pray for vocations to priesthood, we are doing an Easter thing: we are asking the Lord to call men to enable his Easter people to be a community that lives, talks and thinks in

a way that will make the message of eternal life attractive and available to our contemporaries.

Such prayer for vocations is a natural part of our following of Christ. It is a way of taking responsibility for the wellbeing of Christ's Church. Those currently in ministry must move on through death and leave the community in the hands of others. Others are needed as priests to make available to their generation the riches of the Gospel message, the grace of the sacraments and the loving and life-

giving touch of a community being led in ways of love and kindness. That sort of prayer is our responsibility and our gift too to those who come after us.

The death and resurrection of Jesus makes us an Easter people. It is our task to pray for Christ our Shepherd to call forth priests for the future.

Although I have written mainly about a calling to priestly ministry there is no-one reading or listening to these words who has not received a calling from the Lord to do something as a disciple of the Lord, that only he or she is called to do. All special callings are important and, like priesthood, diaconate, consecrated life, marriage etc., should be the focus of our prayer. However, every baptised person is called by God to do something for Christ, no matter how humble, lowly or private. All of us, without exception, are called to give witness to what we believe about Jesus. If we fail to respond there is something of that collective witness missing.

Remember Christ's good name is in our hands, individually and collectively, and that is both a privilege and a responsibility.

May God bless you all as you seek to discern God's will, and to pray for the wellbeing of his Church.

Reflection on the Holy Land

\In November 2012 Margaret and Maurice Magee, from the parish of the Sacred Heart and St Teresa in Paignton, with two other couples and their old friend Fr Michael Cooke from the Salford Diocese, joined a pilgrimage to the Holy Land.

Tiberius in Galilee was their first stop from where they set sail to visit the village of Magdala, home of Mary Magdalen. Half-way through the journey a storm blew up and they were unable to stop at Magdala, instead sailing to the far side of the lake. Fr Michael's reading of the gospel story of Jesus calming waves made real for them the fears of Peter and the other Disciples as they experienced the stormy Galilean sea.

Whilst in the Galilee the pilgrims visited Capernaum, the Mount of the Beatitudes, Cana, Nazareth and, on their last day in the north, the traditional site of Jesus baptism in the river Jordan. As Fr Michael led them in the renewal of their baptismal promises they realised, to their joy, that nearby a young woman in a white gown was about to enter the water for her own baptism.

From the Galilee the pilgrims travelled to Jerusalem

where they stayed in the convent of the Bridgettine Sisters located on the Mount of Olives. From their home for the next four days they were able to look out across the Kedron Valley to Jerusalem. Their pilgrimage took them to the 'Old City' where they walked the Way of the Cross – the Via Dolorosa – finishing at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre which, although now within the city walls, was at the time of Jesus' crucifixion outside the city walls. Whilst with the Bridgettines the pilgrims prayed at the Western Wall and visited the Church of the Ascension at the top of the Mount of Olives. They also visited the Church of All Nations in the Garden of Gethsemane at the foot of the Mount of Olives where Fr Michael celebrated Mass.

The pilgrims' next stop in Bethlehem, now enclosed by a high concrete wall, was heartrending. To reach the Church of the Nativity it is necessary to pass through a checkpoint guarded by armed Israeli soldiers and, whilst their visits to the site of Jesus' birth and the Shepherd's Fields were inspiring, they were reminded that 2,000 years later Palestine is still a troubled land.



One of the last places that the pilgrims visited was the town of Ayn Karem, the hill-top village where Mary visited Elizabeth and where John the Baptist was born. Their own journey from Tiberius in the north to Jerusalem was in stark contrast to that of Mary; they reflected on how difficult her journey must have been across the Judean desert, a stony and barren land where, even to this day, Bedouins maintain their old way

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This is a British Religious Order of nurse-nuns, now better known overseas than in the UK, since the closure of their hospital in Nottingham, and the average age of the British sisters. But, on 9th April 2013 they will have celebrated the death centenary of their founder, Mary Potter. She was a remarkable woman particularly in the light of her background. Mary was the youngest of five children from the marriage of William Potter and Mary Anne Martin in 1838 and as the only girl very much the pet of the family. Sadly the marriage failed so Mrs Potter, a Catholic was left to bring up the children but not in particularly reduced circumstances. One son became a priest, two went abroad and the fourth one remained as 'head of the household' after the family moved from London to Portsmouth.

Mary became extremely devout, but suffered from a lifetime of ill health; against her Mother's wishes, she first joined the Sisters of Mercy but this did not work out. After a period of sickness and much initial opposition from the Catholic hierarchy, up to Cardinal level, she founded the 'Little Company of Mary' (LCM) to care for the sick and dying. The Order was first established in Rome and later in the U.K. and elsewhere overseas.

Her work flourished despite the hardships she encountered and by the time of her death in 1913 was recognised as a leading Order of its kind. The story has been told in several books about her life,

and also in a semi-comic style publication entitled 'The Journey' published for the Order a few years ago; it was rather remarkable for its glamorisation of the Catholic clergy!

The LCM Sisters now work in Australia, UK, Albania, Ireland, Italy, South Korea, New Zealand, South Africa, Tonga, the USA and Zimbabwe. Mary Potter herself was declared Venerable in 1998 after her bones had been brought from Rome and re-interred in Nottingham. Although the Order was thrown out of Malta by a left-wing government there are still Maltese sisters in other countries.

During the 1990s the Order became established in Albania to provide palliative care for cancer sufferers. A family health clinic was built and officially opened in October 1996, but sadly trashed six months later during a time of civil unrest. However, the Sisters returned and it was restored and handed over to Albanian management under initial supervision and continuing financial support. Friends of Albania and SoS Albania-Malta were two organisations which were proud to help and contribute to the work in Albania at that time.

I have maintained contacts with several of the British LCM sisters and their London provincial office, who continue to contribute used postage stamps to a small fund-raising scheme for Catholic work in Albania.



Exeter Parishes get a glimpse of a Polish Easter

In Poland it is the custom that some of the food that is to be eaten on Easter Sunday must be blessed; in some parts of Poland priests come to the house on the Sunday and bless the food but, for the most part, on Holy Saturday families prepare and bring to the church, a decorated basket containing symbolic food. Eggs are boiled and then painted or etched and placed in the baskets together with bread, yeast cake, sweetmeats, some sort of meat usually ham or sausage and cheese; salt is also included. The baskets may be traditional, lined and covered with a white cloth or they may often be taken home by children.

After a short reading the priest invites the congregation to bring the food to the altar to be blessed whilst everyone stands in a circle around the sanctuary. The priest blesses the food as Jesus did at the Last Supper, when the Holy Eucharist was handed down to us; last of all the salt, seen as a protector from evil and immorality, is blessed. This rich symbolism reminds us that Jesus ate with the Apostles after the resurrection and asks us to acknowledge God amongst us when we eat our Easter meal. After the ceremony people retrieve their baskets and take them home ready for their celebrations on Easter Sunday.

There were ceremonies at both the Sacred Heart Church Exeter and the Blessed Sacrament Church Heavitree this Holy Saturday which were well attended by Polish families and other members of the parish. Canon John Deeny, Parish Priest at Blessed Sacrament, would like to extend this practice to the whole parish community as part of an increase in awareness of our spiritual and social unity.

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
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

Pope appoints group of Cardinals to advise on Church Governance and will also study plan for revising the Apostolic Constitution on Roman Curia

In a communiqué released by the Vatican Secretariat of State, Pope Francis has established a group of 8 cardinals from around the world to advise him in the government of the Universal Church, as well as "to study a plan for revising the Apostolic Constitution on the Roman Curia, "Pastor Bonus".

The establishment of the group follows a suggestion that was made during the General Congregations prior to the conclave that elected Pope Francis as Supreme Pontiff. The group of Cardinals consists of Cardinal Giuseppe Bertello, President of the Governorate of Vatican City State; Cardinal Francisco Javier Errázuriz Ossa, Archbishop emeritus of Santiago de Chile, Chile; Cardinal Oswald Gracias, Archbishop of Bombay, India; Cardinal Reinhard Marx, Archbishop of Munich and Freising, Germany; Cardinal

Laurent Monsengwo Pasinya, Archbishop of Kinshasa, Democratic Republic of Congo; Cardinal Sean Patrick O'Malley OFM Cap., Archbishop of Boston, USA; Cardinal George Pell, Archbishop of Sydney, Australia; Cardinal Oscar Andrés Rodríguez Maradiaga, SDB, Archbishop of Tegucigalpa, Honduras, who will serve as coordinator; and Bishop Marcello Semeraro of Albano, Italy, who will serve as secretary.

Following the communiqué, the Holy See Press Office stated that the announcement shows Holy Father's attentiveness to the suggestions made by the College of Cardinals, "his closest collaborators."

"It is a group, not a commission, committee, or council. The Group has no legislative power and its main function is to advise the Pope. The Group will not in any way interfere in the normal functions of the Roman Curia, which helps the Pope in the daily governance of the Church," the statement by the Holy See Press Office said.

The Holy See Press Office also stated that although the group will also assist in revisions to the Apostolic Constitution, "Pastor Bonus", which relates to the Roman Curia, the Holy Father showed and expressed his "deep gratitude for their hard work, especially over the past two months."

According to the Secretariat of State's communiqué, the group's first meeting has been scheduled for 1-3 October 2013. "His Holiness is, however, currently in contact with the aforementioned cardinals," the communiqué concluded.

Why Bother Praying?

Fr Richard Leonard, SJ, is a Jesuit of the Australian Province. He is the director of the Australian Catholic Film Office, a consultant to the Australian Catholic Bishops' Media Committee, and a film critic whose reviews appear in all the major Catholic newspapers in Australia. Author of Where the Hell is God? he lectures all over the world.

This accessible volume is less about how to pray, and more about why we pray and what it does for us, for God and for the world. The author explores the context within which we pray, what is distinctive about Christian prayer, praying to Jesus, what communal prayers do, how Mary and the saints help us pray, and finally, what the point of prayer is sending us out with Christ to witness to the reign of God in our world.

Fr Richard says: "In this book I have suggested that one of the reasons some of us give up on prayer is because we may not have been introduced to its riches. Prayer is making space for God to love us, for us to hear that, and then

through the community of faith, to have the courage to return the compliment. It changes lives. The best of prayer engages our vivid imaginations and a vast array of biblical images to develop a set of ideas that reflect various personal theologies for God that will suit every season under the sun. One size does not fit all. This enables us to enter deeply into a relationship with God who accompanies us through the events of our lives."

Fr Frank Harris RIP





Come to London and End Global Hunger

Catholics across the South West are set to support CAFOD on June 8 at an unmissable Hyde Park event, challenging world leaders to secure a fairer global food system.


