# Gather 2014 - The Joy of the Gospel

It was with eager anticipation that clergy, catechists and others involved passing on the faith, arrived at the Toorak Hotel, Torquay, for the Diocesan annual Gather 2014 weekend.

The event was advertised as 'An opportunity – open to all – to consider Pope Francis' first Apolostic Exhortation 'The Joy of the Gospel' in which he encourages us to embark on a new chapter of evangelisation marked by joy and points out to us new paths for the church's journey in the years to come. So many people had applied for a place that we filled the entire hotel and, whilst outside the weather outside was dreadful with heavy rain and storm force winds, inside the 'Joy of the Gospel' was in evidence from the start.


Gather 2013 focused on the 2nd Vatican council but this year building on the outcomes of the November 2013 New Evangelisation Symposium 'Go and Announce the Gospel of the Lord', we were much more in the territory of the heart. Pope Francis asks us to look at and refresh our relationship with Christ ("I encourage all Christians to a renewed personal

encounter" EG3), so diocesan priests Frs Keith Mitchell (Bodmin), Mark Skelton (Poole) and Jonathan Stewart (Teignmouth) were asked if they would share something of their own personal faith stories. Each of them mentioned how it was a challenge to put the book down and speak from the heart. But they rose to the task and the honesty and feeling of their talks touched all who were there and encouraged the delegates to share their own experiences with one another. One delegate summed up the weekend in their feedback with the words "powerfully encouraging".

Gather 2015 will take place from 6th to 8th February so, if you'd like to attend put the dates in your diary now and keep a watchful eye out for the booking forms.

### Apostleship of the Sea (AoS) April update

### The wilderness of the sea reflects the immensity of God's love for us



Paul Atkinson, port chaplain to Blyth and Tyne tells us: "All AoS chaplains carry copies of Bible Alive and Bibles in various languages. During Lent we encourage seafarers to focus on the appropriate scriptures and see Lent as a journey home, like the ship they are sailing on, to their families. Because of modern shipping and fast turn around times we have very limited time with the seafarers we serve, so we need to catch a few minutes here and there.

We encourage them to read the book of Exodus, which tells of the journey and struggle of the Israelites to the Promised Land, which was their journey home. We also encourage them to read about Jesus' 40 days and nights in the wilderness that the gospels describe."

Father Colum Kelly, port chaplain to Immingham, Grimsby and the River Trent, explained that the liturgical season for a seafarer doesn't always coincide with that in parishes. "For example, I will start to celebrate Christmas Masses way before December 25, simply because ships may be leaving our port on long voyages with little chance to celebrate the feast on the particular day. It's the same with Lent. Another difficulty in focusing on a liturgical season for a seafarer is the lack of signs. For us we associate Lent with the beginning of the new life of spring, a renewal of the earth. On land we see buds, we see colour changes, the white of the crocus changing to the yellow of the daffodil, to the blue of the bluebell, all shaking off the sleep of winter, awakening to a new hope, a different smell in the air. It's a spiritual reawakening in us, casting off the clothing of winter.

"The seafarer doesn't see any of this. Their voyages take them through many different climates in different hemispheres. Hot and cold, rough and calm; these are the elements that engage the senses of the seaman. So it is left to the power of imagination and recall of the beauty of spring in their own lands. The beauty of new possibilities."

Father Colum drew a parallel between a seafarer being at sea, which is a kind of wilderness, and Lent. "The oceans are vast. But I always stress that the wilderness of the sea is not emptiness. Some of the most powerful messages from the Lord were delivered in the wilderness, for example, the Ten Commandments and the exile in Babylon.

"The wilderness of the sea and its vastness can be seen as the immensity of God's love for us. How far can you see? As far as the horizon, they say. That's how much God loves you. And as for the horizon, that is just a limitation of our sight, there are no horizons in God's love for us."



Fr Colum often celebrates the Ash Wednesday liturgy on board a ship. One particular celebration he remembers was on a ship which had spent six weeks in Immingham undergoing repairs after being battered in a force 10 gale in the Bay of Biscay. "The ship was due to leave on Ash Wednesday and the crew were happy and relieved and wearing the new clothes we had provided for them. When I sat down after Communion I looked at the faces of the lads, marked with the sign of the cross, and thought of them not as the crosses of the sinner in Lent but as seals of God's delight in them. They had endured their Lent in the weeks of uncertainty prior to this Ash Wednesday, and now they were truly marked with the sign of redemption.

## South West Filipinos cultural fundraiser for typhoon survivors

Three months on from the devastating effects of Typhoon Haiyan the people of Devon and Cornwall enjoyed a special cultural fundraising event to support the survivors.

Merlyn McGuire, from Callington, who knows many of the affected families, organised the event at Launceston Town Hall on 8th February, the day the typhoon struck. Merlyn and members of the Devon and Cornwall Filipino Community treated supporters to a Dinner Dance with traditional Filipino food and a Fashion Show. All proceeds will go to CAFOD's Philippines Typhoon Haiyan Appeal.

Merlyn said: "We wanted to thank people who have already made a difference to peoples' lives through their donations by sharing some of the spirit and colour of the Philippines and also ask for their continued support to help them rebuild their lives. I'm going to the Philippines next month with my niece, my daughter and my husband to visit some relief operations provided by the Catholic Church. I will let the people there know of the wonderful support of the people in Devon and Cornwall and bring back news of how the money is being used."

Typhoon Haiyan struck the Philippines on the 8th November and has affected over 13 million people by severely damaging power, transport and water systems as well as destroying thousands of families' homes and livelihoods.

People in the South West have already raised over £115,000. Thanks to this support CAFOD's church partners were able to start responding within hours of the typhoon's impact. So far, they have provided emergency food, shelter, water and hygiene kits to tens of thousands of people. They also have set up "cash-forwork" programmes to clear debris, paying volunteers for the work so that they have money to cover their basic needs. In the longer term, CAFOD will help people to construct more permanent homes and make a living once again.

Simon Giarchi said: "This was a fun and inspiring event led by our fantastic friends from the Filipino Community in Devon and Cornwall, many of whom have family and friends whose lives have been devastated by Typhoon Haiyan. This was a great opportunity for people across the South West to join the Filipino community to show support and solidarity with them and find out more about the cultures and foods of the Philippines whilst raising vital funds for CAFOD's emergency response."



## **Clear Voices** 2014 27th - 29th June

Clear Voices is a three day 'build your own' festival of Catholic religious thought and expression. The festival sets out to engage the heart and mind. Over 40 speakers will address us on matters as diverse as 'The Theology of Hope', 'The Book of Revelation', 'How to Read a Graveyard' and 'Forgiveness.'

Dana Scanlon, known for a string of hits in the late sixties/early seventies, including 'All kinds of Everything' which won the Eurovision Song Contest for Ireland in 1969, will be appearing at Clear Voices. It was Dana's Catholic faith that motivated her to campaign on a range of "family" issues and she was elected as an MEP in 1997.

Nowadays Dana writes spiritual music. In 1987 she sang Totus Tuus before Pope John Paul II and 80,000 people in the Superdome, New Orleans and in 1993 she performed her song "We are One Body" at World Youth Day in Colorado. Since then she has performed at World Youth Day celebrations in Paris, Toronto and Sydney. At Clear Voices she will be talking about her life, her music and performing some of her songs.

You will see that Clear Voices 2014 has much to offer - participants will have the opportunity to learn, for example, about Pope Francis and what he wants from us; the mystical experiences of Julian of Norwich; the spiritual exercises of St Ignatius and the theological investigations of Karl Rahner; to explore the writings of C S Lewis and to understand how to be with someone when they are dying or how to help children

Most of all we hope that through the event you will draw closer to Christ by committing these few days to prayer, reflection and learning in the beautiful and sacred site of Buckfast Abbey – a place of prayer for almost 1000 years.

## **Churches Together in Falmouth and Penryn**

I was indeed saddened on reading Lee Bray's article in CSW February 2014 regarding the difficulties faced by Churches Together in Torquay, as there seemed little support from Ministers or lay folk. What particularly struck me was the lack of Clergy initiatives and of involvement in any outreach practical project. Often a little seed grows and grows when people come together to work on a practical project for the local community.

Falmouth and Penryn Churches Together (FPCT) now consists of 18 different Christian Groups. It was started way back in the 80s by Canon Bede Davis (RIP) and there is no official constitution. Evangelical churches participate with much enthusiasm as do Quakers, Roman Catholics, Baptists, Methodists, Free Churches, Church of England and the Salvation Army. Each church may be represented by the Minister and two others. Forum meetings are held every two months, usually with

a special focus, and with feedback from the outreach groups. There is a chairperson (currently a laywoman), secretary, treasurer and missioner for outreach. The ministers meet regularly for a lunch together. The activities of FPCT have snowballed over the last ten years and currently include: Kidz Klub; Footsteps Coffee Shop; Men's Breakfasts; Foodbank; Women's "Be Beautiful" meetings; Street Pastors; Services monthly in local care homes; Prayer Group for Justice, Peace and Persecuted Christians; A Prayer Tent on our Piazza; School Chaplaincies and Representation on the Town Forum Events in the last year: A week of Individual Guided Prayer (30 people participated); The Walk Cornwall 2 Mission; Pulpit Exchanges in Church Unity Week; Live Nativity through our streets at Christmas and Good Friday Walk of Witness.

Future events: Now that Lent has begun we are planning a slightly different focus for our Walk of Witness, with Jesus carrying His cross through the town's main street. We hope to have a Chaplaincy Team of 3 Ministers for the 3 days of the Tall Ships' Race and to distribute New Testaments to all the 35 ships' crews. And, we are meeting to plan a completion of Walk Cornwall 2 in our town so that every street will have been visited.

New initiatives: A quarterly Sunday evening United Service – our most recent one being hosted by the Harbour Church with 130 people present – and a monthly afternoon celebration for people with learning disabilities.

We thank God for the ways in which he has led us and continues to guide our endeavours. I hope that Churches Together in Torquay may have a little seed sown that will grow, as indeed ours has.

## Friends of Launceston Priory



On 24th February 1539 over four hundred years of local monastic life came to a sudden end with the Dissolution of Launceston Priory, once the largest Priory in Cornwall, and now just a heap of ruins behind St. Thomas' church. The service was led by Parish Priest Fr David Annear, disguised as a medieval monk, and the Anglican Team Vicar of Launceston Rev Mary Williamson. Despite the wet winter evening there was a good congregation and the singing was led by St. Mary Magdalene church choir (including Byrd's "Ave verum corpus"). Afterwards the local Girl Guides kindly served refreshments in St Thomas' Hall.

## Fair Trade Day in Truro Cathedral

Saturday 22nd February, which for Scouts and Guides is known as 'Thinking Day' in honour of the joint birthdays of their founders, stimulated another kind of 'thinking' in Truro Cathedral - Fair Trade Thinking.

Stalls were set out at the back of the centre aisle and a display from St Ives

School occupied the centre space. The Cathedral's two shops displayed a range of very highly coloured mirrors – sort of punky style - and other more standard stock including children's toys. Truro City Council provided details of their own support as an organisation, and information regarding outlets: Weleda provides toiletries and skin care products using the same visit formula as Tupperware used to; Mum 123 is new outlet in Truro offering baby and toddler supplies from Fair Trade sources.

The Diocesan Fair Trade Hub was there in force, offering tastings of chocolate and rice plus a large display of foods available on a sale or return basis to churches and other stallholders. The Cathedral Stall is open after the morning service on the 3rd Sunday of each month. There were leaflets from Camborne, now a Fair Trade town spearheaded by the Council with church and organisational support. Nomads catalogues of clothing for younger women were displayed information leaflets from Gerrans Church Roseland Hub states they will take their stall supporting Tradecraft to other sites. Other local events during the next two weeks include a visit from a banana producer from St Lucia who will be the speaker at a luncheon organised at St George's Church, Truro on 26th February. There will also be stalls in the Farmer's Market, 1st March and at Kenwyn Church 2pm 7th March.

## The Sewing Up Stamps Project

Details have now been received regarding the four young women recipients of the first Sewing Machines funded from Cornwall by Albania Community Assist. Following a successful training course these women are now factory outworkers, repair neighbours clothing and make small garments to sell in markets: Bukurije is a young widow with an eightmonth-old baby. Her parents both died in 2012 and her husband in 2013. She lives in a North Albanian town where the National Hero, Skanderbeg is buried. Velentina and Dashuri and their children, who live in a town in Southern Albania, now have police protection from former violent husbands. They worked as cleaners for about 50p an hour and incurred debts. Alferdita has two young children, a husband in a wheelchair, a live-in mother-in-law and no benefits; she and her family live in a run-down oil town in Central Albania. Alferdita gathered food from dustbins, cans from the town tip or street begged.

The next contribution to ACA will be sent just before Easter; money for two machines has been donated already and suitable items from the large stamp collection are going to an Auction House shortly.



## Women's World Day of Prayer

This global ecumenical organisation was founded in the U.S.A. circa 1887 and is now celebrated on the first Friday of March in over one hundred countries.

The British headquarters is in Tunbridge Wells and registered as a charity and nineteen Christian denominations in Britain have appointed



representatives. The charity also makes grants, in some cases substantial ones, to a long list of world-wide applicants.

On 6th March 2014 the Cornish branch met in St. Kenwyn Church Truro for the annual prescribed service, followed by tea. The format of the service, which aims not only to provide a focus for worship but information about the country selected, varies slightly. The theme for 2014 was Streams in the Desert and the presentation, prepared by Egyptian women, included hymns, prayers, mime and Bible readings.


The speaker was Fr. Polycarpus, a monk from the Coptic Orthodox Church, who now lives in Buckfast Abbey (he has also written an overview of that church in book form). The Coptic Orthodox leader is also known as a Pope, Shenouda 111 died recently and his elected successor is Pope Tawadros, the 118th Pope of Alexandria – one of the four original Christian Sees. Fr. Polycarpus explained the origins of his church and then spoke about the life and activities of a monk, which involves much prayer and fasting.

During the service the ladies of St Kenwyn Church processed with flowers and other artefacts and poured water into a bowl on a table laid with cloths and candles. Some wore costumes to represent various groups of Egyptian women - a student, a farm worker, an office worker and the ancient Egyptian Isis.

## Virtual Booklet marks Pope Francis' first year

The Vatican has released a virtual book to mark the first anniversary of Pope Francis' election. Called 'Do We Want to Become Holy? Yes or No?' the 36-page book includes some of the most striking of Francis' messages since he became the Successor of St. Peter on 13th March 2013. Each of the quotes is linked to the full text of the address from which it comes. The accompanying photos show the Holy Father living out the words he's expressed, giving glimpses of his joy, recollection, seriousness and humour. #### Angelus address on the First Sunday of Lent

The readings for the First Sunday of Lent told us of the temptation in the Garden of Eden, of sin and redemption, and of Jesus' temptation of in the wilderness. The theme of Pope Francis' address to pilgrims gathered for the Angelus in St Peter's Square was 'Temptation.' He said: Dear brothers and sisters, hello! The Gospel of the first Sunday of Lent presents us every year with an episode about the temptations of Jesus, when the Holy Spirit descended upon him and, after the baptism in the Jordan, drove him to confront Satan openly in the desert for 40 days before beginning his public mission.

The tempter tries to lead Jesus away from the Father's plan, that is, from the path of sacrifice, of the love that offers itself in expiation. He wants to lead Jesus down an easy road, a road of success and power. In their duel Jesus and Satan fire rounds of Scripture at each other. In fact, Satan, to steer Jesus away from the cross, presents him with false messianic hopes: economic well-being, indicated by the possibility of transforming bread into stones; the spectacular and miraclistic ("miracolistico") style, with the idea of throwing himself down from the highest



point of the temple of Jerusalem and being saved by the angels; and finally the shortcut of power and dominion in exchange for worshipping Satan.

These are the 3 groups of temptations. We too know them well! Jesus decisively rejects all of these temptations and reaffirms his unwavering will to follow the path set by the Father, without any compromise with sin or the world's logic. Note well how Jesus replies. He does not dialogue with Satan, as Eve did in the earthly paradise. Jesus knows well that you cannot dialogue with Satan. Satan is quite astute. For this reason Jesus, instead of dialoguing with Satan like Eve did, chooses to take refuge in the Word of God and answers with the force of this Word. Let us remember this: in the moment of temptation, in our temptations, we should not argue with Satan, but always defend ourselves with the Word of God! And this will save us. In his replies to Satan, the Lord, using the Word of God, reminds us

above all that "not by bread alone does man live but by every word that comes from the mouth of God" (Matthew 4:4; cf. Deuteronomy 8:3); and this gives us strength, it sustains us in the struggle against the worldly mentality that lowers man to the level of basic needs, causing him to lose the hunger for what is true, good and beautiful, the hunger for God and his love.

Furthermore, Jesus reminds us that "it is also written: 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test'" (Matthew 4:7), because the road of faith also passes through darkness and is helped by patience and persevering expectation. Jesus finally points out that "it is written: 'The Lord your God you will adore: him alone will you pay worship'" (4:10). In other words, we must detach ourselves from idols, from vain things, and build our life on what is essential.

These words of Jesus will then be concretely validated by his actions. His absolute fidelity to the Father's plan of love will lead him after 3 years to the final settling of accounts with the "prince of this world" (John 16:11), in the hour of the passion of the cross, and there Jesus will win his definitive victory, the victory of love!

Dear brothers and sisters, the time of Lent is the propitious occasion for all of us to take the journey of conversion, taking this page of the Gospel seriously. Let us renew our baptismal promises: let us renounce Satan and all of his works and seductions – because he himself is a seducer – to walk the paths of the Lord and "arrive at Easter in the joy of the Spirit" (Collect of the first Sunday of Lent, Year A).

During this Lent, let us remember the invitation of Caritas International in its campaign against hunger in the world. I wish everyone that the Lenten journey that has just started bear an abundance of fruits; and I ask you to remember me and my co-workers in the Roman Curia in prayer as we begin a week of retreat. Thank you.

Have a good Sunday and a good lunch! Goodbye!







## The Francis factor – A New Departure **Edited by John Littlejohn and Eamon Maher**

The extraordinary impact of Pope Francis' election has been phenomenal by any standards, and particularly the way in which he has completely revitalised the Catholic Church in the public imagination. This volume of essays assesses the first year of the new papacy and seeks to elucidate what constitutes the 'Francis Factor'.

What is it about this man that makes people reconsider their attitude to Catholicism and to religion in general? Will he be able to effect change within an institution not renowned for its malleability? Is he all that different from his immediate predecessors or will he, like them, ultimately succumb to the tried and tested?

Among the contributors to this book are theologians, historians, journalists, clergy, sociologists and commentators of the highest calibre. Their assessments of Francis are based on his Jesuit formation, life experience, writings, interviews, spiritual witness and human interactions. The result is a highly thoughtprovoking and readable account of Francis the public and private


