An Amazing event

Have you every wondered what 'evangelisation' really means? Have you ever experienced 'evangelisation? For me, the answer to both questions is 'yes' - thanks to the 'Amazing Event' that took place over 2days at St Cuthbert Mayne School, Torquay.

The amazing event – a musical called 'Scripture Fulfilled' was one of the first collaborations between the schools since becoming Plymouth CAST (Catholic and Anglican Schools Trust). The musical was written by Edwin Fawcett and Elizabeth Swain with Edward directing proceedings on each day. Edwin is a young, dynamic and up and coming Catholic composer. He is known to many of us in the Diocese; it is a powerful, moving and challenging piece performed primarily by Year 4/5 children.

The first performance on the evening of Thursday 1st May was given by children from St Joseph's, (Exmouth), St Nicholas (Exeter), All Saints (Babbacombe), Sacred Heart (Paignton) and Priory School (St Marychurch) with Priory children taking the acting roles of Jesus and the disciples on the road to Emmaus, God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit and a host of characters from the Old and New Testaments.

The second performance the following evening was given by children from Queensway (Chelston), Hartop Road School (St Marychurch), St Joseph's (Newton Abbot), Our Lady's (Barnstaple) and St Margaret Clitherow (Brixham) who took the acting

Andrew Corriette sent the following message to everyone involved in the production and to the audience: "This piece of drama draws on three religious works. To begin with, it uses The Road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35) to set the scene. This particular Gospel, set on Easter Day, shows two disciples who are unable to understand the events of Good Friday. They are disheartened and feel abandoned, as we can all feel sometimes. As He does in the darkest moments of our own lives, Jesus appears but they do not recognise Him and, while on the road, Jesus helps them unpick what has

The readings and gospel from the Easter Saturday Vigil make up the bulk of the play. They tell the journey of salvation, as well as some of the prophecies which refer to the messiah: Jesus. From creation, all the way to the resurrection, they show that God is not above His creation, but in the very thick of it, taking care of us and providing comfort.

The third work is the Hebrew and Neocatechumenal song, Dayenu. Roughly translated, Dayenu means, "it would have been good enough" and is about being grateful to God for all he gave us. It is a song that shows that if God had only done the first good thing, dayenu: it would have been enough. However, God does much more and showers us with blessing. In the Neocatechumenal tradition, the song ends with the proclamation that the greatest blessing bestowed on us is Jesus. That Jesus is not just "good enough", but better than everything before, combined.

It is a play about giving thanks to God and seeing how many blessing He showers on us. Best of luck, God bless,

Sarah Adams, RE Adviser for Plymouth CAST, tells us: "our performance of this Easter musical, with original songs by Edwin Fawcett and Elizabeth Swain and script by Andrew Corriette, was written especially for our schools and includes primary school children from 10 schools across the newly formed Central Area Council of Plymouth CAST plus two local Torquay Church of England schools. On the 1st April 2014, 34 schools converted into Plymouth CAST to join St Nicholas', Exeter, and the full company began its formal operation. This event celebrates this occasion, while also allowing our schools to focus on their core vision, remembering that they carry pastoral and mission priorities that cannot always be seen in academic performance tables."

Editor: I was privileged to attend the dress rehearsal for the first performance and the also the 'live' performance on the second evening. I found both exhilarating and immensely enjoyable. Without a doubt the children and their audiences experienced evangelisation and will extend that evangelisation by talking to their extended families and wider groups friends about the story of creation and Jesus' death and Resurrection and their obvious enjoyment and involvement in 'Scripture Fulfilled.

I'm looking forward to hearing more about the amazing work that Plymouth CAST is doing in supporting the journey of faith of our children and, through them, of ours too. Thank you.





Eastertide away from home ®

Apostleship of the Sea (AoS) Port chaplains and ship visitors increased their efforts to support the lives of seafarers during Eastertide with practical help and also the chance to celebrate their faith at the height of the liturgical year. The port chaplains and volunteers of the AoS in Falmouth, Plymouth and Teignmouth are aware that for seafarers any festive period is much like any other working day – the only difference being that their separation from family and friends and from their faith can be even more difficult to bear than usual.

Over Easter AoS visited merchant ships and provided seafarers with a chance to celebrate their faith, attend the Easter liturgies in a local parish if they wish, providing faith resources such as scripture booklets like Bible Alive and prayer cards and also some Easter cheer in the form of Easter Eggs generously donated by the local community.

The local AoS has been particularly concerned in recent weeks for the crew of a cargo ship, the 'Sanko Mineral' which has been anchored off Teignmouth pretty much constantly since early November 2013. Whilst unable to visit the ship AoS has been sending out parcels of various necessities to let the crew know they are not forgotten.

Buckfast Abbey, the South West Chamber Choir performed a concert of choral music 'Salve Regina' in honour of the Virgin Mary and in aid of the Diocesan **Catholic Children's Society**

The programme was divided into five sections, each starting with a setting of the Ave Maria, ranging from the Abbess Hildegard of Bingen in the 12th century, Josquin Desprez and Robert Parsons in the Renaissance era, 19th century works by Grieg and Stanford and 20th century works by Britten, Stravinsky and Poulenc. The choir of 25 voices sang from a variety of positions within the Abbey making use of its wonderful acoustic, accompanied by the organist Dr Sean Sweeney of Tavistock Church and finishing with an exciting work from 2010 by James MacMillan. The audience was treated to a broad programme of choral music to celebrate the Annunciation, and particularly enjoyed the musical director Stephen Trahair's own setting of the Ave Maria and Francis Poulenc's 'Salve Regina'.

Golden Jubilee celebrations at Falmouth

The Parish of St Mary, Falmouth hosted a very special event on Thursday 24th April – a Mass of Thanksgiving to celebrate the Golden Jubilee of Sister Mary Rose Fallon of Les Filles de la Croix. Members of Sister's family from Los Angeles, New Jersey, London and Ireland joined her for the celebrations as did Sisters Perpetua, Damian and Benignus from the Les Filles de la Croix community in St Marychurch, Torquay.

Sister Rose entered the convent at Stoodley Knowle, Torquay after hearing about the Congregation of Les Filles de la Croix (The Daughters of the Cross) from a relative, Fr (later Canon) Michael Hanley, a priest of the Plymouth Diocese. Fr Michael recommended the Congregation to Sister Rose when she decided to follow the religious life. Sister Rose moved to Tremough Convent and School in the 1970s where her

ministry was to care for the boarders and day girls at the school; she also looked after and nursed the frail and ill Sisters. Following the closure of Tremough in 1999 the Sisters moved to Bethany House, Falmouth where Sister Rose is the community leader.

On the preceding Sunday – Easter Sunday – a new banner for the Lectern, made by Sister Maria for Sister Rose, was used for the first time. After Mass, parishioners joined Sister Rose in the Parish Hall where celebrations continued with a presentation of flowers and a rather splendid cake.

A Relic's Return

Some months ago, the Carmelite nuns at Sclerder Abbey decided that they could no longer maintain their Carmel. They are due to move on at the end of this summer and a new movement, the Chemin Neuf, has agreed to take on the buildings.

Meanwhile, the nuns are disposing of their amazing collection of relics including some clothes worn by the Compiègne Martyrs. These martyrs, sixteen Carmelite nuns, were expelled from their Carmel in 1792 and executed in Paris on 17th July 1794 when the resolutionary Terror was at its

when the revolutionary Terror was at its height. They would not renounce their faith and went to the guillotine singing the Salve Regina. They were beatified by Pope St. Pius X on 27th May 1906.

Compiègne is a small, historic town about sixty miles north-east of Paris. In 1991 the Carmelites relocated to the lovely village of Jonquières about six miles away. To this tranquil setting, Fr. David Annear and friend and navigator Richard Stead set out at the end of April with the ornate reliquary of the Compiègne Martyrs secured in the back of Fr. David's car.

The twelve nuns at Jonquières were overjoyed to receive the relic which was solemnly placed in front of the chapel's altar; next day a votive Mass was celebrated by Fr. David. The visitors were given a tour of Compiègne, generous hospitality at the Carmel, and an invitation to return whenever they wish. An Easter break with a difference!

Hungry for Change





Young CAFOD supporters have given politicians food for thought at a meeting in Parliament on the issue of global hunger.

34 students met MPs and peers at a national event in Parliament earlier this year at an event organised by CAFOD as part of their Hungry for Change campaign – calling on the Prime Minister to provide greater support to small-scale farmers, who are being hit first and worst by the effects of climate change.

The sixth-form students from across the country toured the Houses of Parliament, watched Prime Minister's Questions, and had a private audience with the Speaker of the House of Commons, the Rt Hon John Bercow MP.

Before visiting Parliament, the young people took part in workshops to learn about how campaigning can make a difference to the decisions taken in Parliament, as well as how they could use the trip as an opportunity to put their faith into action.

CAFOD's Hungry for Change campaign calls for major changes in the global food system so that it benefits everyone. We're

calling on the Prime Minister to champion empowering aid for small-scale farmers, especially women, and checks on the power of global food companies. An estimated 870 million people worldwide currently go without enough food, and the extreme and unpredictable weather associated with climate change is making the situation worse.

The Rt Hon Tom Clarke, MP for Coatbridge Chryston & Bellshill and Chair of the All-Party Parliamentary Friends of CAFOD, said: "In the aftermath of the international recession, the argument is 'how do we find the money for foreign aid?' But we have a responsibility to the poorest people in the poorest countries. We need to do a lot of persuading, but international development is the right thing to do. We live in a prosperous world. I'm glad that organisations such as CAFOD exist."

The theme of our pilgrimage this year was 'We are God's House'

Everyone was very busy in the build up to the pilgrimage with fundraising activities, packing and finally waving goodbye to friends and family for what was an amazing and life changing week.

Groups from HCPT Westcountry Region flew to Lourdes from Bristol Airport – a plane full of pilgrims clothed in a rainbow of colours: **Group 45** in green and yellow led by Catherine Fennell and joined by Fr Michael Cole; **Group 179** in yellow and blue led by Rebecca Bowden and joined by Canon Paul Cummins;

Group 706 in orange who were joined by Fr Robbie Lowe who brought a very special spiritual element to the pilgrimage and **Group 141** in purple led by Jenny Bentley. **Group 141** is the 'youngest group' in the region and were celebrating their 10th anniversary this year.

Soon, all the cafes, bars and restaurants in Lourdes were a sea of colour and song; each group bringing their own unique personality and singing along with Regional groups competing to be the loudest - even the workers in the town couldn't resist joining in!

The highlight of the week was the HCPT Trust Mass with groups from all over the world including Croatia, Jamaica, Ireland, Slovenia, America and many more coming together in the Underground Basilica. Pilgrims carrying banners flowed into the basilica followed by all the bishops and priests who had



accompanied the groups; over 5,000 people were present at the Mass which was led, this year, by the Deep Met South Region. The baton was handed to the West Indies Region who will be leading the 2015 Trust Mass when the theme will be 'Rejoice'.

The Westcountry Regional Mass was another special occasion – a time to share in songs, to offer the sign of peace and to pray for each other and all those at home who had helped to make the pilgrimage happen. We then went to a

concert in the Underground Basilica when everyone dressed up as animals of all shapes and sizes from chickens to tigers! After much singing and dancing everyone returned to their hotels with big smiles on their faces.

We were blessed with glorious sunshine for most of the week and the town was alive with laughter and singing. The only place that remained quiet was the Domaine and the Grotto where Our Lady appeared to St Bernadette and where we were all able to spend time praying and reflecting on the week that we had shared with so many other HCPT pilgrims.

Before we knew it the week was over and, although exhausted in body, we returned home renewed in faith and having made new friends and built up a store of wonderful memories.






Good Friday Walk of Witness



Great Feasts of the Church

This year the Feasts of the Ascension and Pentecost will be celebrated in June; the Ascension on the 1st of June and Pentecost on the 8th June.

The Acts of the Apostles (1:6-9) recounts the Apostles continuing questioning of Jesus before his ascension into heaven: So when they had come together, they

asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive the power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you; you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

When he had said this, as they were watching he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out their sight.

The Feast of Pentecost is one of the most ancient feasts of the Church, celebrated early enough to be mentioned in the Acts of the Apostles (20:16) and St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians (16:8). It is the 50th day after Easter (if we count both Easter and Pentecost), and it supplants the Jewish feast of Pentecost, which took place 50 days after the Passover and celebrated the sealing of the Old Covenant on Mount Sinai.

The Acts of the Apostles recounts the story of the original Pentecost; Jews from all over Palestine were gathered in Jerusalem to celebrate the Jewish feast. On that Sunday, ten days after the Ascension of Our Lord, the Apostles and the Blessed Virgin Mary were gathered in the Upper Room, where they had seen Christ after His Resurrection: "And suddenly there came a sound from heaven, as of a mighty wind coming, and it filled the whole house where they were sitting. And there appeared to them parted tongues as it were of fire, and it sat upon every one of them: And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and they began to speak with tongues. (Acts 2:2-4) Christ had promised his Apostles that he would sent his Holy Spirit, and, on Pentecost, they were granted the gifts of the Spirit. The Apostles began to preach the Gospel in all of the languages that the Jews who were gathered there spoke, and about 3,000 people were converted and baptized that day. Pentecost is often called "the birthday of the Church." On this day, with the descent of the Holy Spirit, Christ's mission is completed, and the New Covenant is inaugurated. It is interesting to note that St Peter, the first pope, was already the leader and spokesman for the Apostles on Pentecost Sunday (see Acts 2:14ff).

We have heard the Father expressing his love for Jesus and describing him as someone "in whom my soul delights". How often do we say to each other 'I really feel wonderful when I am with you'? Words and acts of affirmation are so important and they are the best way to tell our partner that we love them. Yet, so often we submit to a culture in



which there is a reluctance to give praise in case it leads to unwelcome expectations or unhealthy pride.

Sometimes, we just have the wrong focus. We can be acutely aware of the ways in which our spouse annoys us, and makes mistakes, without recognising the efforts they are making. Sometimes we are not aware of their accomplishments. It would be better at such times to look for good things and affirm them for who they are, their qualities and achievements, rather than taking them for granted or being critical.

It is good to work things out together instead of doing our own thing. When we feel critical we need to develop a sensitivity that will flag up danger signals in our heads so that we remember that 'this is my chosen one', and by affirming our husband or wife, let them know how much they mean to us.

PRAYER: Lord, when I feel critical of my beloved, please help me to be aware of the efforts they are making and, instead of just voicing my criticism, let me give praise for their achievements. Amen.


Extraordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops

Last October Pope Francis announced that, from 5th to 19th October 2014, there will be an Extraordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops to discuss the pastoral challenges of the family and related issues of sexuality. The Vatican then issued a preparatory document and questionnaire to be sent to all dioceses in the world, with the request that bishops circulate it as widely as possible so that local inputs can be gathered and incorporated into the working document for next October's Synod.


The bishops of England and Wales took an impressive lead by being the first conference to put the questionnaire online, prompting others to do likewise. This brought a huge response with over 16,500 people in England and Wales completing the questionnaire, despite its complexity and a very tight deadline. Of these, over 12,000 were lay people, encouraged by this new-found openness on the part of the bishops to hear their views. These responses have now been collated and incorporated into the bishops' report to the Vatican.

Vocations on the Rise in UK

Statistics for 2013 indicate a rise in entrants to Convents, Seminaries, and Religious Houses. Zenit.org

Vocations in England and Wales have been on the rise over the last decade, with nearly 100 men and women entering convents, seminaries and religious houses in 2013. "These figures highlight the generosity of Catholic women and men in responding to God's call," said Fr Christopher Jamison, Director of the Catholic Church's National Office for Vocation. "They also show that the emphasis on discernment before recruitment is working". These entry figures include 44 men to seminary, 22 men to religious life and 30 women to religious life.

This rise in numbers is attributed to various factors, such as the work of diocesan and religious vocations directors. There are also vocations groups which invite men and women to take part in various gatherings. Recently, two dioceses in England have set up residential communities to facilitate the discernment of priestly vocations.

Fr. Jamison adds that there is no room for complacency. "For Vocations Sunday on 11 May we've sent out posters and mini cards to parishes and schools up and down the country asking people to pray for vocations to the priesthood and religious life".

Extracts from a Homily given by Mgr Francesco Follo (Paris) for Good Shepherd Sunday 2014. Zenit.org

The Shepherd: the Lamb Who Saves the Sheep

"Today's liturgy invites us to contemplate Jesus as both the shepherd and the entry to the sheepfold while at Easter we have contemplated Him as the Lamb, the paschal victim who redeems the sheep conquering death forever.

Today in the developed western world, the image of the shepherd is not very present and when it is, it is done with a bit of contempt so much so that the expression "I am not a sheep" is used to define independent and courageous adults not in need of a shepherd. In the former days and in the Jewish civilization the figure of the shepherd was a well-known and familiar one: Abraham was a shepherd, Moses was the shepherd of his people and so was also King David. In fact, in the biblical civilization the image of the shepherd as the king who leads his people and of the God as The Shepherd who leads his people to freedom and to life was well known.

"Jesus, who bore within itself the truth and the fulfillment of all the prophecies, puts himself into this path and proves to be the truth, the Good Shepherd who knows his sheep and his sheep know Him, just as the Father knows Him and He knows the Father (cf. Jn 10:14-15). How wonderful is this knowledge that reaches up to the eternal Truth and Love, whose name is the "Father." It is from this source that comes the particular knowledge which gives rise to full and pure trust.

"The allegory of the shepherd, with which Jesus describes his identity "I AM the good shepherd" (Jn 10:11), moves on a background still very familiar to the life in the Holy Land. In the evening, the shepherds lead the flock in a pen for the night. A common fence serves generally for several flocks. In the morning each shepherd cries his call and the sheep - the sheep that know his voice - follow him. Recounting this familiar scene Jesus emphasizes first that HE is the true shepherd because - unlike the mercenary – he is not going to steal the sheep, but to give life. The characteristic of the true shepherd is the gift of self.
