

Experience Lourdes 2014



On Friday 30th May twenty-one young people from parishes across the Diocese travelled to Lourdes with other parishioners from across the Diocese on pilgrimage to the beautiful Pyrenean shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes. This year the pilgrimage was led by Bishop Mark O'Toole and Fr Kieran Kirby the newly appointed Pilgrimage Director.

The Torchlight Procession at Lourdes is always a very moving occasion; at its conclusion pilgrims from all over the world join in one voice to praise the Queen of Heaven singing the Salve Regina. With thousands of fellow pilgrims assembled in front of the Rosary Basilica in the pouring rain six of our young people held flaming torches at the top of the steps leading to the main entrance of the basilica for the final blessing.

Amongst the many opportunities for prayer, spiritual refreshment and growth in faith our young people take time out for some light-hearted activities including a trip to Gavarnie high in the Pyrenees and entertaining fellow pilgrims with a very entertaining concert.

This is unique week in the lives of the young people from parishes across the Diocese; they chose to come perhaps because they've heard about it from others who have been before or because they've seen it mentioned in articles in the Diocesan Year Book, Catholic South West or parish newsletters. But, whatever it is that brings them to Lourdes they return home enriched by their experiences and with new friends in their lives. They are, without exception, a credit to their families and to the Diocese.

A Banner for Bridport



Bishop Mark's homily at the Chapter Mass on Thursday 5th June 2014, the Feast of St Boniface



to say that to you and so good to be here this morning with you and to celebrate this great man who grew up in our diocese and who received his Christian formation here. I am particularly pleased to see the Chapter here and it is good not to be greeting you behind a grill! You will all know St Boniface well but I hope you will not mind if I share some simple thoughts on him. It's just that I find myself encountering this great Missionary monk in a new way since living here.

Today he speaks to us across the centuries. He does so by helping us to discover what it means to be pastors who evangelise, pastors who remain united with the Apostolic See, and pastors who recognise the unity between a fully human culture and our faith.

You will know that Boniface - known as Wilibrod at that time - was first evangelised as a boy by holy missionaries

who were entertained in his home. The faith is these islands was less than one hundred years old when various priests came to this part of the country. Boniface was struck by their humility and their goodness. Their witness became the source of his conversion. We should never doubt what our witness can bring to those around us, even when this witness seems not to bear immediate fruit

Boniface knew the effect of silent witness. He also knew the reality of failure in his own proclamation of the Gospel for his first mission to Friesland went nowhere. He returned to England after two years seemingly with his dreams of being a missionary in tatters. But he did not stop.

After a number of years and comforted and sustained by a visit to Pope Gregory II, and with the Pope's support, Boniface embarked on the preaching of the Gospel in Germany. He fought against pagan worship and reinforced the foundations of human and Christian morality. With a deep sense of his call, and ours, he wrote in one of his letters: "We are united in the fight on the Lord's Day, because days of affliction and wretchedness have come.... We are not mute dogs or silent observers or mercenaries fleeing from wolves! On the contrary, we are diligent Pastors who watch over Christ's flock, who proclaim God's will to leaders and ordinary folk, to the rich and the poor... in season and out of season..." (cf. Epistulae, 3,352.354: mgh). Here is a Shepherd after the heart of the Lord. In many ways I think St Boniface could be declared the Patron Saint of the New Evangelisation in our diocese as he encourages us never to doubt that we are called to evangelise nor to underestimate the power of our witness in the faithful offering of our lives. We do so, 'in season and out of season'.

The second most important element that emerges from the life of Boniface is his faithful communion with the Apostolic See. The Successors of Pope Gregory II also held him in the highest esteem. Gregory III appointed him Archbishop of all the Germanic tribes - the Bishop of the whole of Germany! He sent him the pallium and granted him the faculties to organize the ecclesiastical hierarchy in those regions (cf. Epist. 28: S. Bonifatii Epistulae, ed. Tangl, Berolini 1916). Pope Zacchary confirmed him in his office and praised his dedication (cf. Epist. 51, 57, 58, 60, 68, 77, 80, 86, 87, 89: op. cit.). In a letter to this Pope, Boniface writes, "I never cease to invite and to submit to obedience to the Apostolic See those who desire to remain in the Catholic faith and in the unity of the Roman Church and all those whom God grants to me as listeners and disciples in my mission" (Epist. 50: in ibid., p. 81).

One result of this commitment was the steadfast spirit of cohesion around the Successor of Peter which Boniface transmitted to the Church in his mission territory. uniting England, Germany and France with Rome. These Christian roots of Europe were to produce abundant fruit in the centuries that followed.

We live in a time when Europe has in many ways become tired of its Christian roots. We also live in an Ecumenical age. Now, more than ever, we must hold true to the centrality of our esteem and love for the Holy Father as successor of St Peter. How vital is this office for the unity of the whole Church and the coherence of our witness. I believe that the Chapter of Canons and I can encourage one another to remain faithful to this deep Catholic instinct and truth.

Happy Feast of St Boniface! It is really good to be able the world of information technology and the internet highway. For all of its problems and challenges we must use it as a vehicle to continue to engage with the culture especially of our young people. They need to be helped to develop fully in their own humanity and in their appreciation and love of Christ and His Church, and we must use the tools and methods which they inhabit and which can reach them.

Boniface's courageous witness is an invitation to us all to welcome God's word into our lives, to love the Church passionately, to feel a common responsibility for her future, to seek her unity around the Successor of Peter. At the same time, he reminds us that Christianity, by encouraging the dissemination of culture, furthers human progress. It is now up to us to respond to such a wonderful heritage and to make our witness fruitful for the benefit of this generation and those to come.

There is one last thought which moves me very deeply. Boniface's ardent zeal for the Gospel stayed with him his whole life long; it never fails to impress whatever our age. At the age of 41 he left a beautiful and fruitful monastic life, the life of a teacher and man of prayer, in order to proclaim the Gospel to the stranger and the simple. Yet again, almost at the age of 80, he went to a region in which he foresaw his martyrdom, and indeed it happened. The Good Shepherd lays down His life for his sheep, not once, but continually.

By comparing his ardent faith with our own often lukewarm faith, we see what we must do. We see how we are to renew our faith by drawing close to Christ. We must do so in order to give the precious pearl of the Gospel as a gift in our time.

Boniface also deserves our attention for a third intuition. He encouraged the encounter between Christian culture and the local cultures in which he lived, even if they seemed at first to be far from the Gospel. Indeed, he knew that humanizing and evangelizing culture was an integral part of his mission. For example he composed a treatise on the Ars grammatica in which he explained the declinations, verbs and syntax of the Latin language. Please don't fall asleep! But this was for him not some heady exercise, but a means of reaching more people, of providing education so that all encountered a deeply Christian spirit and sensibility which helped them live in a more human way. In passing on the ancient Tradition of Christian values, he grafted on to the Germanic populations a new, more human life. As a true son of St Benedict, he was able to combine prayer and work, the pen and the plough. We must ask ourselves what would be the Ars grammatica of our day? I do not have any easy answers to that question. But surely part of it must be an engagement with

HCPT 507 Joint Services Group 20th Anniversary Pilgrimage

HCPT Group 507 takes disabled exservice personnel and their dependents on pilgrimage to Lourdes each year. The group joins with the International Military Pilgrimage which, this year, saw more than 20,000 representatives from across the world come together on a pilgrimage of peace.

It was a year for anniversaries; Group 507 held a mess dinner at Hosanna House to commemorate 100 years since the start of the Great War when pilgrims were encouraged to bring photos and recall stories of their ancestors' involvement in the war. Pilgrims we reminded about Jack Traynor who was paralysed as a result of war injuries and of the miracle that he experienced at Lourdes. We also laid a wreath at the Lourdes Cenotaph, where Laurence Binyon's ode of remembrance 'For the Fallen' was read.

We also celebrated the Golden Jubilee of

Priestly Ordination of Mgr. Ronnie Brown OBE, Group 507 Chaplain and the 30th Anniversary of his first pilgrimage to Lourdes. Thirty-years ago he was Chaplain of the Plymouth Royal Naval Children's Group which later became HCPT Group 150. 



The 'not so beautiful' aspect of the Football World Cup: Victory for Mauá but the struggle goes on



The fight by 237 São Paulo families to secure permanent housing has ended in victory after the municipal government signed over more than £3 million to purchase the Mauá building which has been their home for the last seven years.

The Mauá community was due to be evicted on the eve of the World Cup, unless the city authorities pushed through a purchase order to convert the abandoned hotel into social housing. News of the victory was greeted with jubilation by the families, and they were quick to thank the thousands of CAFOD supporters in England and Wales who backed their campaign.

Community leader, Nete Araujo, said: "I did not believe the news until we received the electronic confirmation of the deposit. We organised a community assembly to inform the families. I was on my knees. I would like to thank, after God, all of you who helped and supported us in CAFOD, and who were alongside us during this struggle - and now also beside us during this great hour of victory. It is your victory too! And I hope you know too that the commitment and responsibilities do not end here with this gain. We want to see each of the families with a key to their homes in their hands.

It is important that the support and solidarity of all of you continues; that you continue to help us as you have. Sometimes I have felt quite desperate, and then I stop and think I am not alone, and that is good. I want to thank all of you for this victory, for being together with us, for that connection with us, for this link and rope to transform itself into a big knot that never unties and continues for great victories."

CAFOD Director Chris Bain said: "Over recent years, the Mauá community's fight for fair housing has been our fight too, and while today we can all celebrate a hard-won victory with Nete and all the Mauá families, we must continue to stand by them, and we must carry on that fight on behalf of all the hundreds of thousands of other families in São Paulo in need of decent and secure housing.

The Mauá building was once a luxury hotel but was abandoned and left empty for 17 years until the families occupied and renovated it in 2007. Through our Connect2 Brazil project, parishes in England and Wales have been following and supporting the Mauá community since 2010, and hundreds of campaigners signed a petition in summer 2012 which helped to fight off a previous eviction order."



Wales Ordinariate Group in new Cathedral home



A small piece of history was made on the evening of 15th May in Cardiff when the Wales (South East) Group of the Personal Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walsingham had its first Mass in a chapel which has been provided for the Ordinariate by Archbishop George Stack in the mother church of the Archdiocese, the Metropolitan Cathedral of St. David, Cardiff (pictured).

The Mass was celebrated by Fr Peter Clarke of the Bristol Ordinariate Group, who was assisted by Bernard Sixths, of the Wales (South East) Ordinariate Group, who also preached. The new chapel comes as Deacon Sixths is preparing to be ordained as a Catholic priest of the Ordinariate in St David's Cathedral, Cardiff, in July. The Mass was followed by a reception in the Cathedral's Cornerstone Centre. Among those present was the Cathedral Dean, Canon Peter Collins. Deacon Sixths said: "The Mass and reception were both well attended and it was excellent to be able to make some new contacts and refresh others at the reception".

The chapel for the Ordinariate has been created out of a recess to the right of the

Cathedral sanctuary, with an altar and reredos provided by the Cathedral. Canon Collins, who was responsible for setting up the chapel, said that the Archdiocese was keen to see the Ordinariate group in Wales flourish: "It is small as yet, but it makes a great contribution to the life of the Catholic Church and it also has a valuable contribution to make in supporting the decision-making of a number of Anglicans in the area who are contemplating their future at present."

Where is God in dementia?

Many fear dementia more than they fear cancer. We fear that we lose ourselves; that all our memories, thoughts, stories that make us who we are, will be gone, leaving us in a boundless sea of meaningless experiences.

Yet the writer to the Hebrews is clear about Jesus' promise: 'I will never leave you or forsake you.' (Hebrews 13:5-6). In Matthew 28:20, Jesus is in the lives of all people, including those with dementia: 'Behold, I am with you always, even to the end of time.' When we forget everything, Jesus is there.

Perhaps our real fear is not that we will forget, but that we will be forgotten. Maybe people will begin to talk about me as if I am not really present. Perhaps they will lock me away in a place where I am surrounded by strangers. Perhaps people will say, 'he's not the person he used to be.' Or worse, 'she's just a shell.' If I am not the person I used to be; if I am just a shell, then why would anyone care for me and who would they be caring for? Maybe we fear this kind of lostness more than the lostness of our personal forgetting.

We should lament the things that have been lost, but the task of the Church is to accompany people with dementia in faith, hope and love; trusting that God has not abandoned them and that his disciples should not do so either. When we approach one another like this, the binding power of the Holy Spirit will enable us to be with one another in ways that may be inexpressible, but which are always true, faithful and healing. Having dementia is not the end of our stories.





Diocese mourns two dedicated Priests





He lived at the Presbytery in Shaldon next to the little Church of St Ignatius of Loyola and continued to minister in parishes across the Torbay Deanery providing 'supply' when his brother Priests were on holiday or unwell. He is remembered with particular affection by parishioners at Our Lady Help of Christians and & St Denis in nearby St Marychurch where he, together with Mgr George Hay and Mgr David Silk provided invaluable pastoral support during

two periods of interregnum in 2011 and again in 2012. He would arrive at St Marychurch on the number 11 bus from Teignmouth and, after saying Mass, liked to stroll through the precinct before returning home to Shaldon. Canon Michael was taken ill towards the end of March and went to his eternal reward just three weeks later on 14th April – at the beginning of Holy Week.

Fr George Gerry was born in Glasgow in October 1920 and, after a career in the navy that spanned World War 2, he decided to test his vocation and went All Hallows Seminary in Ireland in 1948. He was ordained Priest for the Diocese of Plymouth in 1954 and is pictured on the day of his Ordination.

It was at All Hallows Seminary that he studied with Fr Patrick Kilgarriff who was also ordained for the Diocese and the two became lifelong friends. It was Fr Patrick who was invited to give the panegyric at Fr George's Requiem.

Canon Michael and Fr George will be greatly missed by their families, their brother priests and by the parishioners to whom they ministered over many years. May God grant them eternal rest.
