# **Clear Voices** a festival of theology

Editor: The inclement weather of late June did nothing to dampen the spirits of delegates during Clear Voices 2014. I missed the first Clear Voices in 2012 so was delighted to be able to attend this year's festival. I attended a number of seminars but the two that stood out for me were those given by Bill Huebsch 'What does Pope Francis want from us? Learning to be the Church in the modern world' and 'Raising spiritual awareness in healthcare' by Dr Karen Groves.

Bill Huebsch used humour, anecdote and story to help us understand this moment in our history and how to respond to it with great faith; visit

Dr Karen Groves talked to us about those responsible for addressing the spiritual health of patients and their families in healthcare settings, why that matters and how we can develop appropriate skills. Jonathan Henderson, a member of the Department for Formation team and advisor for Adult Formation and New Technologies said: "In the evaluations we received from delegates one person described the event as "just wonderful, faith filled, joyous and happy amidst lovely friendly people! Very well organised! And definitely 'food for the



soul'." Another delegate simply wrote: "the best thing I have been to in years." Jonathan continued: "The festival was enjoyed not just by delegates but by our speakers as well, with Fr Christopher Jamison describing it as a "wonderful event" that "is now building a great reputation", John Burland describing the liturgies as "some of the best I have ever participated in", and the Vatican astronomer Br Guy Consolmagno saying how "delighted" he will be to return again for the next Clear Voices."

The theme of the closing Liturgy on our first day was 'Peace and reconciliation for the world'. After hymns, readings and silent prayer we were asked to hold in our hands a ribbon that we had been given on arrival at the Abbey Church and

encouraged to reflect on our nonpeaceful behaviours and actions; did we want to walk away with the ribbon in our pocket or did we want to stay with Jesus, facing him with our pain, our fear and our anger and seek from him the strength to grow and be reconciled? If we chose to stay we were invited to walk forward and place our ribbon on the cross – a powerful and moving end to our first day.

I am grateful to the Vicariate for Formation team for giving me the opportunity to attend Clear Voices and for the hospitality of the amazing volunteers from the sixth-form colleges of Notre Dame (Plymouth), St Edward's (Poole), St Cuthbert Mayne and Stoodley Knowle (Torquay).

# Diocesan News The World Apostolate of Fatima pilgrimage

The Diocese of Plymouth was well represented on this year's national pilgrimage of the World Apostolate of Fatima (WAF) which took place in July. The Vigil Mass on the Saturday 12th July began with the recitation of the rosary in the Capelinha, at the exact spot where Our Lady appeared, and on Sunday 13th was followed by a great procession to the altar in front of the Basilica by representatives

carrying their national flags, behind those of the Pope and Portugal. Then came a multitude of banners from parishes and organisations including our own WAF banner, followed by the bishops, priests and deacons, all carrying candles at the vigil mass, and at the end was a litter covered in flowers bearing the statue of Our Lady of Fatima. The whole route was lined by pilgrims singing and, at the vigil mass, carrying candles – an awe-inspiring manifestation of faith and devotion. As the statue was processed back the pilgrims sang a beautiful hymn to our Lady and waved white handkerchiefs in farewell.



Our pilgrimage included praying the Rosary every morning and evening, the Stations of the Cross, a Holy Hour at the Dominican Convent and a Mass of reconciliation with individual confession; there were conferences on the First Five Saturdays, the Brown Scapular and the Fatima message, and we visited the seers' village and parish

church, as well as Coimbra Carmel (where Lucia had been a nun), Batalha Abbey and Nazare.

If you have never been to Fatima – you really must go sometime soon! The most wonderful combination of the two days of great celebration with thousands of other Catholics and then the opportunity for quiet prayer and contemplation in Our Lady's company will send you back to your parish with spiritual batteries re-charged and ready to face the daily struggles of our secularised world.

# ORDINATIONS Ordination of Fr. Anthony Cockram

Fr. Tony, as he likes to be called, was ordained priest on a lovely warm day in June at the Church of Christ the King in Plymouth by Rt. Rev. Mark O'Toole, our Bishop. He was supported by seven priests from the Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walsingham, and some diocesan priests and parishioners from Sidmouth, Torquay and the Cathedral parish. The Ordinary of the Ordinariate, Mgr. Keith Newton, was unable to be present owing to a family bereavement.

Fr. Tony has offered this brief account of his journey in faith.

# "You are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church"

Quite a few years ago I was ordained as a priest in the Church of England; however a long time passed before the significance of the words of Jesus to Peter at Caesarea Philippi began to trouble me. I loved the Church in which I had been formed, and I believed that my ministry was full and complete; but of course, it wasn't. I came to see the tremendous importance of Apostolic Succession and I glimpsed the grace which full communion with the See of Peter would provide.

The Anglican Communion is hampered by synodical government, but for all that, she contains much that is good. She has a wonderful musical heritage and a willingness to minister widely. Parts of the Church use beautiful liturgy and her priests are expected to root their homilies in a strong biblical tradition. I believed that full communion with Rome would mean leaving all of this behind, but Pope Benedict came to the rescue. The Apostolic Constitution Anglicanorum Coetibus enabled Anglicans to enter into full communion with the Pope, and in September 2013 Archbishop, now Cardinal, Vincent Nichols explained that through the Canonical Structures of the Ordinariate "Anglicans could enter the full communion of the Catholic Church, bringing with them some of the traditions and beauty of the Anglican heritage in which they were nurtured."

I was received, with my wife, into full communion with Rome on Holy Cross Day 2012. I came with hope of Ordination not expectation, but I was asked if I wanted to have my vocation to priesthood tested by the Catholic Church. Pope Frances granted me dispensation from the vow of celibacy, and two years of part time formation at Allen Hall started, during which time Bishop Mark ordained me as Deacon on 2nd March and Priest on 21st June 2014.

My incardination was through the Ordinariate of Our lady of Walsingham, but my nearest Ordinariate Community is in Torquay. Geography therefore limits my work for the Ordinariate to two or three days a week, but as a catholic priest my Faculties allow me to work within the Diocese with the appropriate permissions. Fr Michael Koppel has been generous in this respect and I have been able to work as a priest within the parish of Seaton. Seaton knows me reasonably well now, and my hope is that I will soon be able to serve in Lyme and Axminster too. Please pray for me.

**Update** 



The Islamic State (IS) – formerly the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant – has made sweeping advances across Iraq, targeting civilians.

According to the UN Assistance Mission in Iraq (UNAMI) by mid-August an estimated 200,000 people had fled the advance of IS, and at least 180,000 had crossed into the Dohuk district of the Kurdistan Region.

CAFOD supports the recent statement by Cardinal Vincent Nichols calling for the "protection of all communities", "long-term security", and prayers for peace:

"It is imperative that the international community ensure the physical protection of all communities in Iraq, their human rights, including the right to religious freedom. I urge Her Majesty's Government to lead the efforts in the face of such a human calamity to help restore these shattered communities, provide them with urgent humanitarian aid and work with others to ensure their long-term security in the land of their birth.

"I encourage our own Catholic community to continue to give generously to our agencies working to support the people of Iraq. Above all, I invite all people of faith to turn to God in prayer this weekend and seek for our world the change of heart and the gift of grace that alone can bring us peace."

Over the last few months CAFOD has worked to support Syrian refugees in northern Iraq. CAFOD's Church partners in Lebanon are doing everything they can do to support Iraqi Christians as they flee the country and will continue to stay in close contact with their partners in Iraq and across the region, assessing the changing situation and taking their advice on where they can best provide support.

The solidarity of prayers and donations of Catholics across England and Wales are a source of genuine hope for our brothers and sisters in need.

# **Penzance Festival of Art & Music**

The church at Penzance has a long tradition of supporting music for the liturgy and since 1998 has also hosted a week long celebration of music and the arts, held in the merry month of May. Originally an annual event the Festival is now biennial and in recent years has worked with students and staff at Humphry Davy Music College. Festival Week starts with Mass and closes with Choral Evening Prayer & Benediction, followed by wine and cheese.

The church has been beautifully restored in recent years and the organ gallery is particularly splendid, as is the magnificent stained glass east window including 2 of the Cornish Saints. The interior was resplendent with magnificent flower displays as well as art and craft works by local artists, St. Mary's RC School and Humphry Davy Music College students.

The concert programme featured national, international and local performers including organist William Whitehead, pianist Stella Pendrous and the Mousehole Male Voice Choir. The latter impressed with an entirely new repertoire and all performed entirely from memory. Our Parish is especially fortunate in its Director of Music, David Gridley, whose vision and drive created and maintains this biennial festival and who has also guided much of the art and design in the renovation of the church interior. Along with improvements to the acoustic, mainly by removing most of the carpets, this has created a wonderful space in which to hear concerts and fine church music.

# Launceston Pilgrimage 2014

I have recently produced a short, lavishly illustrated History of the Launceston Pilgrimage (copies available from

office@stcuthbertmayne.org.uk). Begun in 1921, the pilgrimage drew thousands of Catholics from all over the Diocese to honour and remember St Cuthbert Mayne, priest and martyr, who was executed in Launceston Town Square on 30th November 1577. The glory days from the 1950s to the 1970s have vanished, but the pilgrimage, now every three years, survives.

Cuthbert Mayne's canonisation has been achieved, but at a time when it is becoming increasingly difficult to be a true disciple of the risen Jesus, the pilgrimage still offers a chance to witness peacefully and gently to what we believe. The next pilgrimage will be on Sunday 5th October at 3pm; more details will follow in the next edition of Catholic South West.



# The Major Relic of St. Cuthbert Mayne returns to the **National Shrine at Launceston**

Cuthbert Mayne was executed at Launceston in November 1577 for being a Catholic priest. Canonised in 1970, he is our Diocese's Secondary Patron. His head was exhibited on a pike over the Castle gateway;

retrieved by a Catholic, it was taken first to Lanherne and then to Trevithick to avoid

detection. In 1807 the crown of the martyr's skull, all that remains except for a

few small pieces of bone, was given to some Carmelite nuns who had fled from the terrors of the French Revolution and founded a Carmel at Lanherne in 1794. When the Carmel closed in 2001, the Franciscan Sisters of the Immaculate moved into the historic buildings, and continued to foster devotion to the Saint.

In October 2013 Bishop Christopher asked me whether I should like to have the major relic at Launceston. Just imagine my astonishment! Then months of negotiations ensued, including permissions from Rome and from the former Carmelite prioress at Lanherne. On 31st July 2014 I drove over to Lanherne and brought the major relic to the

National Shrine after its stop-over of 207 years at Lanherne. I am grateful to Bishop Christopher for beginning this process and to Bishop Mark, Fr. Kristian Paver JV, Richard King and Sr. Margaret Mary ODC for their vital support.

# Diocesan News Apostleship of the Sea (AoS)

"Each day on board the ship not sailing anywhere sapped their spirits". When the crew of the FB Glory set sail for southwest England in early June, they would probably never have predicted what was to about happen to them and their ship. When their vessel docked at Fowey, two of their number, the cook and a cadet apparently left the ship, claiming that they had not been paid their wages. Down to just six men, the vessel made its way to Plymouth but was subsequently detained by the authorities because of safetyrelated issues on board that had become a cause for concern.

A week later, the ship was still stranded, anchored off the Plymouth coast, and the crew left to fend for themselves with whatever food and drink there was on

board. AoS was able to provide some comfort and practical help to the crew, who were from Turkey, Syria and India. Ann Donnelly, AoS port chaplain in Plymouth said: "Whilst in port on June 4, our ship visitor Jayne O'Connor went on board to talk with the crew; they appeared relaxed but were worried about what would happen to the vessel. Jayne gave them some newspapers and phone top up cards so they could contact their families back home." Working with the International Transport Workers Federation, AoS continued to monitor the situation, keeping a close eye on the men's welfare. "This was a stressful time for the crew and each day on board the vessel that was not sailing anywhere sapped their spirits," said Ann. The ship finally sailed at the end of June. In 2013, across Britain, AoS assisted more than 200,000 seafarers visiting more than

10,000 ships. Pope Francis affirms AoS ministry: In his Angelus address on

July 13 in St Peter's Square the Holy Father said: "Today we celebrate Sea Sunday. I turn my thoughts to seafarers, fishermen and their families. I urge Christian communities, particularly the coastal ones, to be attentive and sensitive towards them. I call on the chaplains and volunteers of the Apostleship of the Sea to continue with their commitment to the pastoral care of these brothers and sisters. I entrust all, especially those who are in trouble and away from home, to the maternal protection of Mary, Star of the Sea." 25th September 2014, Feast of Our Lady Star of the Sea: AoS will be marking World Maritime Day with the celebration



of Mass in London, Glasgow and, for the first time, at our own Cathedral of St Mary and St Boniface, Plymouth. Bishop Mark will preside at the Mass which begins at 5pm and will be attended by port chaplains, volunteer ship visitors and supporters from across the diocese. # Our Lady & St Ignatius, Chideock

On Thursday 3rd July a special Mass was held in the Church of Our Lady & St Ignatius, Chideock, to celebrate the completion of the project to reinstate a replica of the original Victorian dome that had been replaced in the early 1960s with a mansard roof.

We were delighted to welcome Bishop Mark who officiated with Fr Richard Meyer, our parish priest. The church was full, and the congregation was able to see the newly restored dome interior, painted with gold-leaf stars on a blue background by Adrian Everitt. Also on display were the Martyrs' Relics and the 15th Century brass thurible which is usually on loan to the V & A in London. A reception was held afterwards in the Manor gardens by kind permission of Howard and Deirdre Coates, from where the view of the new dome was spectacularly lit up by the setting sun.

The next day an 'Open Afternoon' was held in the church with tea and cakes served by the Friends Committee, and featured a fascinating talk by the dome's architect Andrew Stone who explained the intricacies of the work and how it was achieved. Also present was Nigel Jaggard of Magenta Building Repair who had done the work, and Nigel Dyer of Sandtoft Tiles who had come all the way from Doncaster to see the results of his special tile manufacture. A display of photographs of the original dome, the 1960's mansard roof, and the progress of



the work with details of the special tiles was set up in the porch, along with pictures of the Duomo in Florence, which had inspired the church's creator, Charles Weld, in 1874, exactly 140 years ago.

# Saint Maximilian Maria Kolbe, OFM Conv.

Maximilian Kolbe was a Polish Conventual Franciscan friar, who volunteered to die in place of a stranger in the Nazi German death camp of Auschwitz, located in German-occupied Poland during World War II.

He was Canonised on 10 October 1982 by Pope John Paul II, and declared a martyr of charity. He is the patron saint of drug addicts, political prisoners, families, journalists, prisoners, and the pro-life movement. John Paul II declared him "The Patron Saint of Our Difficult Century"

Born 'Raymund Kolbe' on 8 January 1894 in Zdúnska Wola, in the Kingdom of Poland, which was a part of the Russian Empire, he was the second son of Julius Kolbe and Maria Dabrowska. His father was an ethnic German and his mother was Polish. He had four brothers, Francis, Joseph, Walenty and Andrew. Raymund and his family moved to Pabianice, where his parents initially worked as

basket weavers. Later, his mother worked as a midwife (often donating her services), and operated a shop in part of their rented house, where she sold groceries and household goods. Julius Kolbe worked at the Krushe and Ender Mill and also worked on a parcel of rented land where he grew vegetables. In 1914, Julius joined Jozef Pilsudski's Polish Legions and was captured by the Russians and hanged for fighting for the independence of a partitioned Poland.

Kolbe's life was strongly influenced by a childhood vision of the Virgin Mary that he later described: "That night, I asked the Mother of God what was to become of me, a Child of Faith. Then she came to me holding two crowns, one white, the other red. She asked me if I was willing to accept either of these crowns. The white one meant that I should persevere in purity and the red that I should become a martyr. I said that I would accept them both."

# JAN MEYER - Sept 14th 1947 - Feb 25th 2014

.. daughter, sister, wife and mother, grandmother, aunt and friend, nurse, teacher, keeper of horses, sheep and dogs, gardener, spinner and knitter, lover of moors and mountains, with a passion for the Bloomsbury Group and folk music and LIFE!

On Friday 7th March, 2014, a large group of us travelled by coach, and many others by car, from Bridport Parish to the Anglican church of St John the Evangelist in Millborne Port, Somerset. We were a quiet, preoccupied group of people for this was not a parish outing when everyone is in high spirits anticipating a day out. We were travelling to be with our priest, Fr Richard Meyer, because this was the day of Jan's funeral, his beloved wife of forty eight years. Some weeks earlier, on the day of our Parish Christmas lunch, Fr Richard was called to the hospital. We heard later that it was Jan who was unexpectedly and seriously ill.

Fr Richard has been our priest here in Bridport since 2010. He has achieved wonderful things for our parish, drawing us all together so that we have become a large, happy family under his guidance. Formerly, an Anglican minister who became a Catholic Priest, Fr Richard came to us having a wife and family - a son and daughter and several grandchildren. This was a wonderful thing to happen to our community. Jan, an Anglican was often present in his homilies and many little anecdotes would slip in here and there about his family, it was clear to all that he had a very happy marriage and family life. Jan sometimes came along to parish functions and joined in with us all. She was always generous in her support of him as a Catholic Priest. She was warm, friendly, talented, great fun and a pleasure to have known. And so this devastating, life changing blow hit Fr Richard and we all united in his support, enquiring and hoping for good news which was not to come. Her illness lasted just ten weeks.

The church of St John the Evangelist is large but even so, it was packed full with family, friends, parishioners, and clergy from different denominations - everyone who knew and loved Jan and Fr Richard. It was a wonderful, heartwarming ecumenical gathering. I reflected, how we, in the church, are more Christian these days, sharing in each other's services - a real loving, coming-together of us all. Jan's gift to us.

Jan had planned her funeral with Fr Richard and everyone was bidden to come dressed in bright colours, there would be no flowers, but a cardboard coffin on which we were all invited to write our last messages to her - more lasting than flowers. Their good friend of many years, Fr Peter Clarke (now also a Catholic Priest but formally an Anglican one) conducted the service and there were beautiful tributes to Jan. Fr Richard's which was read out by a friend, told us that they had met when she was seventeen and that the photograph of her on the Order of Service showed her on that day. True to Jan's wishes, he came dressed in a white shirt, red tie and the jazziest, most colourful waistcoat imaginable.

# **Dorset Deanery Cycling across Costa Rica**

Having prepared for the fundraising trip for ten months or so and training for it seriously since January it was wonderful moment when I and my eight cycling companions met up in San Jose the night before the trip began.

We cycled from the Pacific coast to the Caribbean along well tarmaced roads as well as off-road surfaces that resembled vicious building sites. The terrain meant that you couldn't always stand on the pedals as you usually would to go up steep hills so you ended up having to sit and strain your way up in low gears up and up and up ...oh and up again! But the views along the way were wonderful.

We crossed a number of bridges in varying states of repair; we were rowed across small streams, motored across a wide, deep river and we found ourselves carrying our bikes on our shoulders as we waded through a number of others.

As a nature lover, it was paradise: birds of many hues, butterflies of ridiculous gorgeousness, sloths, large lizards and one small snake. But, and for this I praise the Good Lord, he very kindly ensured that not once, in the whole eight days, was I aware of encountering a single spider! My travelling companions took keen delight in pointing out to me (thankfully after the event) that I had often shared the always freezing showers with various arachnids. I never saw them, I was happy.

The whole experience was extraordinary; we were visiting right at the end of their dry season so the eastern part verged on the desert but, as we crossed the spine of Costa Rica, having camped at the foot of the Volcano Arenal we descended - I use the term loosely - into the lush tropics of the Caribbean. It was here that we encountered the beginnings of what would be their rainy season, amazing cloud bursts which disappeared almost as soon as they came on a couple of occasions.

The generosity of my own parish here in Poole and of so many people across the Diocese was incredible. The three of us raising money for Poole Hospital's Dignity in Dementia programme have just had the joy of crossing the £20,000 barrier; thank you. I genuinely cannot express how blown away I have been by people's kindness; our generous welcome in the wonderful country of Costa Rica was amazing and the generosity of people here in UK has matched that, so thank you so much. God bless you.
