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THE ANNUAL DIOCESAN PILGRIMAGE 2014

On Sunday 5th October it was Launceston's turn to host this important event in the Diocesan calendar. It was an opportunity to thank God for our Catholic Faith, to witness publicly to it, and to pray for an end to the persecution of religious

There were significant changes too; we decided to omit the usual pilgrimage Mass as most people present would have already been to Mass. And,

quite frankly, organising an open-air Mass on the other side of the town presents logistical challenges. For the first time ever, we were able to hold an ecumenical Service of the Word in the Town Square, near the spot where St Cuthbert Mayne was executed in 1577.

We assembled in the newly decorated Town Hall and processed to the Town Square led by the magnificent Launceston Town Band. The Mayor of Launceston, Councilor David Gordon attended, and the service was led by Bishop Mark O'Toole, accompanied by his Private Secretary Canon Provost Keith Mitchell, and Deacon Peter Skoyles. In his homily Bishop Mark referred to a conversation he had in Rome with another newly appointed Bishop from war-torn Iraq who encouraged him to fight against our twin enemies: secularism and apathy.

The short service was followed by a

prayer walk from the Town Square to St Cuthbert Mayne Church. Pilgrims were invited to pray for these intentions at the various 'stops' on the walk: at the Anglican Church of St Mary Magdalene for the unity of all Christians; at the Central Methodist Church for peace in our world; at the Castle Green and dungeon where St Cuthbert Mayne was imprisoned for the revival of our faith; at the ruins of Launceston Priory for vocations to the Priesthood and religious life. This form of witness enabled pilgrims to go at their own pace. And we were lucky with the weather! Meanwhile, back at the church hall a team of parishioners supplied tea and biscuits for those unable to manage the

prayer walk. The afternoon concluded with Solemn Benediction and veneration of the major relic of St Cuthbert Mayne which now reside in Launceston. I was delighted that the church was full to bursting.

Editor: Cuthbert was born in 1544 to a shepherd tenant and his wife in Youlston, near Barnstaple. After an education funded by his uncle Cuthbert became an Anglican minister when he was eighteen or nineteen; unaware of the existence of other Christian religions, he continued his studies at St Alban's Hall, Oxford, where



he met notable Catholic converts Edmund Campion, Gregory Martin and Henry Shaw.

In 1567 he assumed the role of College Chaplain until correspondence form Edmund Campion and Gregory Martin persuaded him to join them at Douai Seminary in France. His defection came to the attention of the Bishop of London, who dispatched guards to Oxford to seize him. However, Cuthbert was warned of his imminent capture and fled to Douai secretly by boat. He arrived at the Seminary in 1573 and began his priestly training culminating in Ordination in 1575. Fired by a determination to save souls, Cuthbert returned to England the following year and went to live with Francis Tregian, a Catholic landowner living near Truro. Disguised as Tregian's Bailiff he enjoyed relative freedom in the secluded depths of the Cornish countryside, ministering to the sick, attending the dying and receiving lapsed Catholics back into the Church. However, his liberty ended when, in June 1577 Richard Grenville Sheriff of Cornwall, directed a search of Tregian's house and Cuthbert was arrested. He was imprisoned in Launceston until his trial at which the judge directed the staunchly Protestant jury to find him guilty, and he was duly sentenced to be hanged, drawn and quartered. Following his execution his head was impaled upon a pike above the castle gateway at Launceston.

Cuthbert was beatified by Pope Leo XIII on 29th November 1886 and canonised as one of the Forty Martyrs of England and Wales on 25th October 1970 by Pope Paul VI. His Feast Day is 29th November.

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

Apostleship of the Sea (AoS)

Bishop Mark O'Toole has paid tribute to AoS' work, in particular that of its port chaplains and ship visiting volunteers.

In his homily during the Stella Maris Mass at the Cathedral of St Mary and St Boniface, Plymouth on Thursday 25th September, Bishop Mark said: "The ministry of Catholic seafarers' charity Apostleship of the Sea (AoS) is a visible sign of the Church's concern for those who are cut off from their usual parishes and families. AoS presence in ports throughout the world, daily visits to

ships docked in these ports and the fraternal welcome AoS gives to the crews whilst in port are a visible sign of the Church's concern for those who are far from home and who cannot receive ordinary pastoral care through a parish." Bishop Mark added: "These days the world of seafaring, with its continual movement of people, has to take account of the complex effects of globalisation. Unfortunately there are situations of injustice, especially when crews are subject to restrictions on disembarkation, abandoned along with the vessels on





which they work, face the threat of piracy at sea or suffer as a result of exploitation and abuse. The vulnerability of seafarers must encourage even greater concern on the part of the Church. Their plight stimulates the maternal care of the Church and this is shown, through AoS, to those you meet in ports and on board ships."

AoS has port chaplains in Plymouth, Falmouth and Fowey as well as in other main ports across Great Britain and worldwide. In June, AoS' Plymouth port chaplain and ship visitors provided phone top-up cards, toiletries and newspapers to a group of seafarers stranded on board their vessel which was detained and anchored off Plymouth because of safety-related issues.

Last year, AoS visited 9,968 ships and assisted 199,360 seafarers across Great Britain.

AoS Chaplains in our Diocese are: John Pinhay (Falmouth and Fowey), Ann Donnelly (Plymouth and Teignmouth) and Rev Roger Stone (Weymouth and Portland).

Dire conditions in Syria and Iraq



As fighting between Kurdish forces and the group known as Islamic State intensifies, CAFOD is providing aid to thousands of refugees who have fled into Turkey.

The United Nations estimates that more than 168,000 refugees have crossed from Syria into Turkey since 19 September. As fighting continues around the town of Kobane, they warn that a total of 400,000 people could seek refuge in Turkey over the coming days.

CAFOD has committed £50,000 to work with our Church partners to provide emergency food packs to nearly 10,000 newly arrived refugees. Alan Thomlinson, CAFOD's Emergency Programme Manager for the Syria Crisis, says: "Turkey was already hosting almost a million Syrian refugees, and the rapid influx of so many more has put overwhelming pressure on towns near the border. "Many of those who have fled are women, children or older people, and a lot of them arrived with little more than the clothes they were wearing. According to one assessment, most people only had enough food to last them a single day. Our partners are on the ground, doing everything they can to ensure that food reaches those who need it most."

CAFOD continues to support thousands



of families who have fled from fighting in Iraq. In total, 1.8 million people have been forced from their homes in the country since the beginning of the year. Many are living in dire conditions, sleeping in car parks or by the side of the road, often wearing the same clothes they have worn for days, in temperatures up to 45°C.

Across the governorates of Erbil and Dohuk in the Kurdish region of Iraq, our church partners plan to provide food, shelter and emergency supplies to more than 115,000 people over the coming months. Nabil Nissan, Executive Director of CAFOD partner Caritas Iraq, said: "This huge humanitarian crisis in Iraq has forced many families to leave without their possessions or the basic necessities to survive. They are desperate and

frustrated. They lack hope that the world will move fast enough to end this humanitarian tragedy. The moral and financial support and encouragement has been simply great. This is one of the few positive results of the crisis. We felt that we aren't alone and this has given us new strength to support the displaced people despite all the difficulties."

Catholics in England and Wales have donated more than £2.7 million to our Syria Crisis appeal, as well as more than £115,000 towards our work in Iraq.

I have recently returned from my first pilgrimage to Lourdes and I'm still marveling at how quickly our group bonded and worked wonderfully well together under the kind and gentle supervision of our group leader, Liz Bettesworth.

This year was Group 539's 34th Pilgrimage and we staved at Hosanna House, situated just outside Bartres, which proved a restful haven for us, with stunning views of the Pyrenees.

Hosanna House has a beautiful chapel, shared by the two groups accommodated in two wings of the building. This intimate chapel, with its vibrant stained glass windows and fantastic, panoramic mountain views provided the location for some of our most moving liturgies; including an emotional Taize service and a beautiful Healing Mass, when many pilgrims received the Sacrament of the Sick. During these liturgies we lit a candle provided for us by HCPT Group 179, the Easter Children's Pilgrimage; by sharing the candle, their prayers continued and were united with ours in Group 539 in a very special way. A group from Newcastle joined us for a very special mass. They had tea with us on the terrace first and very kindly provided generous quantities of delicious cakes from a French patisserie.

Highlights for us included the International Mass in the underground basilica, with five bishops and about a

hundred priests and prayers and readings being spoken in many different languages and the evening torch-lit procession, with the sick being pulled in the procession was illuminated by a truly amazing sight. We also made many visits to the grotto, a particularly moving experience at night when the candles are glowing and the faithful still praying in great numbers.

to the 12th Century Church of Saint Savin for Mass then travelled through majestic mountain landscapes to the picturesque Lac d'Estaing where we enjoyed a fine picnic and walks around the lake. We also visited Comunita Cenacolo, founded in 1983 by Mother Elvira, an Italian nun; she was inspired to create a series of homes across the world for young men and women to escape from drug addiction by prayer, physical work and community life. The young people have to commit to a three-year stay and must learn Italian – a challenge but the success rate is an impressive 80% if they can persevere. Cenacolo receives no state funding and is totally reliant on 'providence'; to support their ongoing work we were able to buy tee-shirts, beads, rosaries, DVDs of their music and carved goods.

Throughout our pilgrimage we were





privileged to have Fr Louis Rieunier as our Chaplain. Before studying for the priesthood in Rome, Fr Louis was a pilgrim helper with Group 539, so he was uniquely equipped to be a most sensitive and gentle padre to us. As in previous years, Dr Ivor Nazareth joined the group from Palm Springs, USA, and we had the capable Remole Tomy as our Group Nurse, so we were well looked after medically, as well as spiritually.

It took a few days to adjust back to "normal" life after my time in Lourdes and I was eager to share my experiences with whoever would listen! It was a great joy for me when I 'just happened' to bump into fellow pilgrims out and about and we could hug and exchange stories. Undoubtedly a special bond exists between those who have shared the wonders of Lourdes together.

New HCPT Group in Dorset

Every Easter 'HCPT The Pilgrimage Trust' organises a pilgrimage to Lourdes especially for children. Groups known as 'Family Groups' include eight or ten children cared for on at least a one to one ratio, more if needed. The Family Groups are accompanied by a Chaplain, a Nurse, a Leader and a Deputy-Leader; all helpers are fully Disclosure & Barring Service (DBS) checked for safeguarding.

The groups join over two hundred groups from all parts of the UK, Ireland and other countries. At present groups from Plymouth, Torquay and Ottery St. Mary, together with a Youth Support Group of young people from various parts of the Diocese join the Easter Children's Pilgrimage.

For a long time, those of us privileged enough to be part of this wonderful experience have wished to share it with others in the Plymouth Diocese. A lot of work has been taking place to promote HCPT in Cornwall, North Devon and Dorset and, although slow, progress has been made. So, at last, Easter 2015 will see the first fruits of this work and a new group from Dorset will be joining the Pilgrimage. Diocesan Justice & Peace Who do you think you are?

Migrants and Migration was our focus as part of the On Earth as it is in Heaven event in Dorchester earlier this year. Stories of love, of hope, of courage: it soon became obvious in a recent workshop that most of us come from families who have experienced migration first hand in the past few generations.

Many of our parents and grandparents made the journey to this country desperate to find work to feed their families, or had been displaced by war or religious persecution. Part of my own family left Ireland in the nineteenth century during the first potato famine, evicted because they could not pay the rent. My great Grandma, aged four, buried her peg doll in the garden, promising to come back soon and fetch her. She never

Her family emigrated to Manchester, where the women and girls went to work in the cotton mills and the men on the railways. In fleeing hunger and injustice in their own country, however, they were forced to become 'blacklegs'. There were strikes in the mills against the increasing practice of firing the men and employing women and children at much cheaper rates. Hungry Irish women and girls were convenient strike breakers.

Not much has changed. The reasons for migration remain constant: poverty, persecution, environmental degradation, war. Just as my family were blamed as blacklegs, migrants are easily made into scapegoats for societies' troubles.

Pope Francis reflects in his last message for World Day for Migrants and Refugees: 'Towards a Better World'. Not infrequently, the arrival of migrants, displaced persons, asylum-seekers and refugees gives rise to suspicion and hostility. There is a fear that society will become less secure, that identity and culture will be lost, that competition for jobs will become stiffer and even that criminal activity will increase. The communications media have a role of great responsibility in this regard: it is up to them, in fact, to break down stereotypes and to offer correct information in reporting the errors of a few as well as the honesty, rectitude and goodness of the majority. A change of attitude towards migrants and



refugees is needed on the part of everyone, moving away from attitudes of defensiveness and fear, indifference and marginalization – all typical of a throwaway culture – towards attitudes based on a culture of encounter, the only culture capable of building a better, more just and fraternal world. www.vatican.va

As faith communities we could educate ourselves to offer an alternative to distorted reporting on immigration - see 'Truth, Lies and Migrants' www.tuc.org.uk (hard copy from the Justice and Peace Office.)

Pope Francis also asks us to help create 'a culture of encounter'. Let us turn to Jesus' familiar story of an encounter: the 'Good Samaritan' (Luke 10). I used to identify with the Samaritan – it seems like a clear parable about social action! Of course we must not pass by on the other side when we encounter someone in such need. But - Jesus deliberately makes 'the saving one' a Samaritan. Am I really that feared, hated and despised person? Well, no. I am white, educated, living in a free society with a comfortable share of the world's goods. So if not the Samaritan, might I be the person lying in the gutter in need of saving? Could it be that I am disfigured by unreflectingly benefiting from a global trade system that keeps the majority of the world's population in poverty? By keeping in my comfort love zone of family and friends and closing my eyes to the suffering around me? Only God in Jesus can save me from such inhumanity. And in the parable we see Jesus



coming down the road to save us in the person of one who is hated and despised. Let us eagerly seek out that encounter.



Plymouth Diocese Catechetical Summer Camps

27th July to 15th August 2014



Eighty-three young people came from across the Plymouth Diocese to share and explore the love of Jesus through our theme Evangelii Gaudium – The Joy of the Gospels by Pope Francis.

Sarah Williams, who was awarded the Fr Tony Cornish Spirit of Camp award on this year's Senior Camp, writes: "I love going to camp every year, making new friends and reacquainting with old friends, learning about our faith in an exciting and unique way. Not only is there a brilliant vibe at camp but it is different every year, not one camp is the same. I love sharing my thoughts and feelings about the passages we read in groups. It's just such a lovely experience that broadens your awareness of the gospel and your faith."

Ryan Williams' thoughts on Junior Camp 2: "Everyone on camp was really happy and we enjoyed plenty of games and fun especially the awesome bouncy castle and campfire. The leaders were considerate and very caring and always helped us. I learnt about true joy and that it's not something that is good at that moment but that it lasts for a long time. We also learnt some sign language and I still remember our message 'Jesus Christ loves you, he gave his life to save you and now he is living at your side every day' in sign language!"

The Education Centre at Buckfast provided two workshops for the junior camps this year, including one where the children were set a challenge to spot items hidden in a part of the garden. They were all allowed two attempts to spot the items and which was a challenge for everyone and really embodied just how much we take our sight for granted. The children were able to appreciate the journey of listening, looking, learning, following and proclaiming the Joy of the Gospels even more.

Children on Junior Camp 1 visited the



Abbey every day for quiet reflection and on the final night, the older children were taken to Compline. These visits to the Abbey complimented our usual morning and night prayers, Reconciliation service and Mass on our final day.

The St. Petroc camp met for the first time this year with 13 young people on the cusp of adult life. The style of this camp was very different from what they had all experienced on the senior and junior camps, as one camper put it "camp this year was very grown up and free. We had new and nice experiences. Compared to the other camp we were given more responsibility."

Their week was so powerful; it can only be summed up by the young people themselves: "A place to renew friendships, further and strengthen your faith being surrounded by young people who will end up being lifelong friends."

"This camp is enriching and great for your confidence in God. All of the people at camp here are all in the same position. This therefore means that you can be yourself without worries of judgement."

"Camp is not only a place to grow in your faith and enhance your relationship with God but also a place to develop in yourself whilst creating friendships and memories at the same time."

"I love St. Petroc's camp because we have the freedom with just as much spiritual guidance and reflection as the younger camps. It's an amazing way to grow closer to God at a time of great change in life. And finally, some well deserved thanks: to everyone who gave time, energy and enthusiasm to camps 2014, in whatever capacity, especially Frs Jonathan Stewart, Kieran Kirby, Harry Heijveld, Darline Joseph Marianathan and Sr Damian Cunningham for their unfailing support; to the volunteers from local Catholic Women's League sections who come in to butter and fill baquettes for us were appreciated by everyone and lastly to the Abbot of Buckfast and the Benedictine Community, for the hospitality, prayer and support that they give year on year for the Diocesan Summer Camps.

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



Pope Francis visits Albania

In 1989 when I walked up the Blvd Dichromate ë Komai towards Tirana University main building, there were no private cars and only a few sleepy eyed soldiers guarding the main public buildings.

In Mother Teresa Square groups of schoolchildren were rehearsing for a May Day parade. Later this main artery became clogged with traffic not of whose drivers obeyed the new lights.

On September 21st 2014 an estimated 250,000 people lined the route to watch the Papal cavalcade drive slowly towards a huge reredos in front of the University where the Mass would be celebrated. They waved and shouted with national and papal flags beneath forty huge

photographs of Catholic Martyrs (mostly clergy) strung across the roadway. The Pope standing in his pope mobile waved and smiled in return with surprising energy for a man of his age. Security was tight and even included a large group of substantial joggers in dark suits, white shirts and ties pounding along round the Papal entourage.

In his initial message to the people of Albania, their government, clergy and laity the Pope praised the country for the peaceful coexistence and collaboration that exists among the followers of different religions. He said: "The climate of respected mutual trust between Catholics, Orthodox, Sunni and Bektashi Muslims is a

precious gift to the country."

At Mass he denounced the perversion of religion for violence saying that no religion can be used to promote violence and that there must be respect for differences of theological opinion. He paid tribute to those who had suffered for their religious beliefs during the Communist Regime, the harshest in Europe. Later at a meeting with the Clergy and Religious he praised them for their dedication and work but agreed that many more young people need to join their ranks.

Queen's Award for Voluntary Service for Taunton Street Pastors

Lady Gass, Lord-Lieutenant of Somerset, presented the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service to the Taunton Street Pastors at County Hall on 6th October 2014.

Adrian Prior-Sankey, the Coordinator of the 60-strong team of volunteers drawn from 20 of the town's churches, spoke on behalf of the group saying: "We are delighted that Taunton Street Pastors team has been honoured in

this way. This prestigious award has an equivalent status for voluntary groups as the MBE does for individuals. While we don't do the work for praise it is very much appreciated when the hard work and dedication of our team of volunteers is recognised by others. To be one of very few groups across the country to receive this award is simply awesome. We are grateful to all those who have been on the journey with us over the last six years."

Taunton Street Pastors was launched in 2008 by local Christians unhappy at reports of late-night anti-social behaviour in the town centre and the way night time-related antisocial behaviour in their community was being portrayed in the media. Volunteers whose ages range from 21 to 80 patrol the town in teams every Saturday night and on other significant occasions such as the annual carnival, Olympic Torch visit and the vigil for the M5 tragedy, offering a listening ear, care and practical help.

The Street Pastors have provided support for more than 25,000 people since their formation. Contrary to public perception it is not just young revellers who appreciate the help of the blue-uniformed modern day Samaritans; help is also provided to elderly people, the homeless



and children. They also provided a 'Safe Space' service at the Flood Distribution centre near Bridgwater to support people affected by the severe weather at the start of 2014. The citation on the certificate records that the award is made to Taunton Street Pastors for 'dealing with the issues of vulnerable people and helping to diffuse aggressive situations'.

The Taunton team has also been recognised by the Street Pastors' parent body, the Ascension Trust, as a pioneering scheme which has developed 'Safe Space', a street café on the driveway of North Street Church; the initiative, copied by other groups around the country, offers a warm welcome, free hot drinks and biscuits under a canopy where people

can wait for friends to meet them or rest until their lift home arrives.
