CORNWALL CATHOLIC CHOIR

Early on the morning of Saturday 10th January I left a wet and windy Torquay to drive to St Austell to meet the members of the Cornwall Catholic Choir who were celebrating the first anniversary of their formation. As I crossed the River Tamar and drove into Duchy the rain stopped and the sun began to shine a good portent for the remainder of the day!

The choir meets for rehearsals on the second Saturday of each month at the Church of St Augustine of Hippo, St Austell. They are a delightful and vibrant group drawn from the St Austell Group of the Personal Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walsingham and the Parishes of Truro, Newquay, St Austell and Bodmin.

Peter John Paul Bray is the Director and Paul Mileham the Musical Director. Peter continues the story behind the formation of the choir and their plans for the future: "Fr John Greatbach, who leads the St Austell Ordinariate Group, says Mass at 5.30pm every Sunday at St Augustine of Hippo; it is a sung Mass with, initially, four members of the congregation singing as a choir and, once a month, Paul Mileham attending to play the organ.

"Late in 2013 the St Austell Ordinariate

group was visited by Monsignor Andrew Burnham and, wanting to sing an anthem for the occasion, I together with Pat, another member of the group, gathered together a few more singers – an additional 4 from St Austell and 4 from Bodmin. Paul agreed to teach the 12 of us the Ave Maria! It went down very well and made me think that we could support the 28 Catholic churches in Cornwall by forming a choir which could be booked by them for special

"My research found that there are very few Parish choirs and that they rarely sing in any but their home church. So I printed an invitation form and sent it to the parishes of Truro, Newquay St Austell and Bodmin together with a date for the first choir practice and set-out plans for future rehearsals. Within two months we had 23 registered singers!

"The Cornwall Catholic Choir has sung mostly for Fr Peter at St Austell, who kindly lets us use the church for our rehearsals, for Deanery services and for other Masses when we sing Latin Chant. We were asked to sing at a wedding in Tintagel at short notice, and although I could only gather 3 members within the time available, the couple were fulsome in their praise for the choir and made a



generous donation for choir funds. We hope to prepare a concert for next Christmas comprising Cornish carols and Cornish readings - should be fun and an enjoyable way for churches to raise

"Paul is very knowledgeable in Church music both ancient and modern, and finds us a wide variety of music to sing, some well known and some that have

been lost or not previously published.

"The relationship between the Ordinariate and the parishes is close and the formation of the Cornwall Catholic Choir has brought us closer."

beautiful altar.

As its front images remind us, every altar is a symbol of Jesus Christ. At the altar we experience his incarnation, His becoming flesh in our midst, we participate in his offering to the Father on the Cross, and we are drawn to offer our lives with Him in the Eucharistic sacrifice. Christ is present in the midst of his Church as priest, altar and victim (Preface of Easter V). Crucified, buried and raised from the dead, given life in the Spirit and seated at the right hand of the Father, Christ has become our great high priest, eternally making intercession for us. In the Church's liturgy, and above all in the sacrifice of the Mass, the members of his Body come to share in his self-offering. He calls us, as the priestly people of the new and eternal covenant, to offer, in union with him, our own daily sacrifices for the salvation of the world. This is what it means to offer true worship: not what we do. but what God does in His Son and how we are invited to participate in that.


As the prayers of this liturgy remind us the altar is both a stone of sacrifice and a table at which we gather and are fed. Sacrifice and Banquet are both celebrated at every Eucharist. The words and deeds of the Lord are brought to life for us, as in every celebration of the sacraments in every Catholic Church.

Jesus spoke to the Samaritan woman, in that Gospel (John 4), of this true worship. He spoke of the true worshipers who worship the Father in spirit and in truth. It is Jesus who reveals to us what it means to worship in spirit and truth, for he made himself a total self-gift to the Father. He loved the Father with an eternal love, a divine love, but also with a human love from the depths of his human, Sacred Heart. He experienced human struggle, the confrontation with evil and sin, and knew the limits of human death. That death, on the Cross at Calvary, is His greatest act of love.

We know, as the letter to the Hebrews reminds us, that this took place "outside the camp.....for here we do not have an enduring city, but we are looking for the city that is to come." (Hebrews: 13:13-14).

So altar, tabernacle – in which we experience the abiding presence of His love in the Church – and crucifix are at the centre of our Church, as they are at the centre of our lives.

In today's celebration, the Church reminds us that, like this altar, we too have been consecrated, set "apart" for the service of God and the building up of his Kingdom. All too often we find ourselves immersed in a world that would set God "aside". In the name of human autonomy or freedom, God's name is passed over in silence, religion is reduced to private devotion, and faith is shunned in public discourse. At times this mentality can even cloud our own understanding of the Church and her call to share the Joy of the Gospel with those who do not know Jesus. We, too, can be tempted to make the life of faith a matter of sentiment. We sometimes lack the confidence to speak of our love for Jesus with others. This blunts the power



of the Gospel to inspire a consistent vision of the world and a rigorous dialogue with the many other visions competing for the minds and hearts of our contemporaries.

Yet history, including the history of our own time, shows that the question of God will never be silenced, and that indifference to the religious dimension of existence is not the whole story. Faith teaches us that in Jesus Christ, the incarnate Word, we come to understand the grandeur of our own humanity, the mystery of our life on this earth, and the ultimate destiny which awaits us in heaven. This is the mystery of faith which is proclaimed from this altar at every celebration of the Eucharist.

As we gather here we come to be drawn into the mystery of the Cross, where we discover the full depth of our human story. The Cross reveals that we find ourselves only by giving our lives away, receiving God's love as an unmerited gift and working to draw all men and women into the beauty of that love which alone brings salvation to the world.

Today's liturgy offers an eloquent reminder of that progressive spiritual transformation to which each of us is called. From the sprinkling of water, the proclamation of God's Word and the invocation of all the saints, to the prayer of consecration, the anointing of the altar, its being clothed in white and adorned with light – all these rites invite us to re-live our own consecration in Baptism, as they re-capture for us the symbols of our own baptism. We are each to drink ever more deeply from the life-giving springs of God's love, and to share that with others.

It is in this truth – this mystery of faith – that we have been "consecrated", set apart, and it is in this truth that we are called to grow, with the help of God's grace. We do so in daily fidelity to His Word, within the life-giving communion of the Church.

As I dedicate this beautiful altar, I implore the Lord of our lives that, from this altar, there may indeed be a flood of grace upon the whole parish.

Flores de Mayo and Santacruzan

This year's Flores de Mayo and Santacruzan Procession, organised by members of the Filipino community from across the diocese, will take place in Exeter on Sunday 3rd May (see Diary Dates).

Flores de Mayo (Spanish for "Flowers of May") is a Catholic and Aglipayan festival held in the Philippines in the month of May. It is one of the May devotions to the Blessed Virgin Mary and lasts for the entire month.

The Santacruzan is the pageant on the last day of Flores de Mayo, held in honour of Helena of Constantinople (known as Reyna Elena) and Constantine the Great finding the True Cross in Jerusalem.

Apostleship of the Sea (AoS)

(AoS) has launched a revised version of its global port chaplains' directory which helps crew get access to help and advice wherever they are in the world.

The directory contains the phone numbers and e-mail addresses of the Catholic maritime agency's chaplains in 207 ports across 38 countries. It lists AoS' chaplains working in some of the world's trouble spots in 2014 such as Ukraine and Congo, and parts of the Philippines devastated by typhoons. And, it also covers both the shipping and fishing sectors and includes AoS' port-based and cruise chaplains.

AoS national director Martin Foley said: "As seen in previous years, the directory is a fantastic resource for seafarers, chaplains and others in the maritime sector and shows the extensive nature of our ministry across the globe." AoS has printed 10,000 copies of the directory to give out to seafarers at ports; it is available both online and in hard copy and port authorities or shipping companies wanting copies for their crews should get in contact with the charity. Martin Foley added: "Providing up to date and accurate details of all our chaplains will be a valuable resource both for seafarers and those working in the maritime industry. It enables our chaplains to provide holistic care for seafarers in port after port worldwide and gives seafarers a tool to get quick and easy access to assistance and advice, including getting to Mass."



Former CAFOD partner Archbishop Romero Declared a Martyr

CAFOD is delighted to hear the news that Pope Francis has declared Archbishop Oscar Romero a martyr, paving the way for his beatification.

The proclamation by the Pope, confirming that Archbishop Romero died as a martyr, follows a vote by theologians at the Vatican's Congregation for the Causes of Saints in January that Romero was killed in "hatred of the faith". The Pope's declaration means that the announcement of his beatification could happen shortly.

CAFOD worked closely with Archbishop Romero during the 1970s, supporting his famous radio broadcasts, which – at a time of heavy press censorship – were often the only means by which people in El Salvador knew the truth about the atrocities occurring in their country. A vocal critic of the country's military

government, Archbishop Romero was assassinated on 24 March 1980, while celebrating Mass in San Salvador. In the years since, he has been an inspirational figure for staff, partners and supporters at CAFOD, and for millions of Catholics around the world.

CAFOD Director Chris Bain said: "The reason that people continue to hold Romero in such high regard is obvious. He didn't simply talk about the need to love your neighbour, but courageously denounced the violence and named the injustices that plagued his country. He reminded us that Christ is found in people living in poverty, and that we cannot ignore the suffering of our brothers and sisters in need."

Funded by Catholic communities in England and Wales, our partners in El Salvador continue to work helping farmers to improve their crops, assisting communities in reducing the risk of disasters, supporting people living with HIV, building peace, defending human rights and trying to create a more just society.

All our Diocesan Bishops have issued an invitation for us all to reflect on our experience of marriage and family life in the contemporary world. They have provided a clear skeleton of six questions to think and pray over and to discuss with others, they are:

- What are your joys and hope of marriage and family life today?
- What are your struggles and fears of marriage and family life today?
- How can we better understand marriage as a vocation?
- How does your marriage enrich you?
- How does your family life enrich those around you?
- In what way, through the presence of God, is your family 'salt of the earth and light to the world' and a place for handing on our faith?

They ask us to reflect on the different stages of marriage and family life: falling in love, engagement, the celebration of marriage, the early years, children, joys and sorrows, teenage children, alone as a couple, the elderly years. It may help to read and reflect on these scripture stories:

- The faith of Abraham and Sarah (Gen 12:1-9)
- The prayer of Tobias and Sarah (Tobit 8:4-8)
- Mary the annunciation and Visitation (Luke 1:26-56)
- The presentation of Jesus in the temple (Luke 2:22-40)
- The wedding feast of Cana (John 2:1-2)
- Mary and John at the foot of the cross (John 19:24-27)
- The disciples on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-32)

Bishop Mark has invited all of us in the Plymouth diocese to share our reflections by writing to him at Bishop's House as he prepares a diocesan submission for Cardinal Vincent Nicholls and Bishop Peter Doyle, who will be our representatives at the second 'Synod on family' this coming October.

In reflecting on these questions we would encourage all to consider Pope Francis' stance, frequently reported in the media, of "who am I to judge?" as well as the often quoted dictum: "Liberty in what is doubtful, unity in what is essential, and charity in everything."

A Call to Action (ACTA) exists to encourage open, honest and respectful dialogue within the church, based upon the inspiration of the Second Vatican Council and the recent document "The Joy of the Gospel" written by Pope Francis. Flame2 is the largest National Catholic Youth event of 2015, taking place in the SSE Wembley Arena on Saturday 7th March 2015.

Mass in the Extraordinary Form




Sister Jossy came to Holy Trinity in 2011 and Fr John expressed





A time for remembering and reflecting

Editor: Having visited Auschwitz in the summer of 2014 it seemed only right to make every effort to attend one of the many memorial services taking place in my home town to mark the 70th anniversary of its liberation on 27th January 1945.

The service at Torbay Hospital Chapel opened with an Ashkenazi funeral lament, sung in Hebrew, which had been adapted to remember the victims of the holocaust:

God, filled with mercy, dwelling in the heaven's heights,

bring proper rest beneath the wings of your Shehinah,

amid the ranks of the holy and the pure,

illuminating like the brilliance of the skies

the souls of our beloved and our blameless


who went to their eternal place of rest

May you who are the source of mercy

Shelter them beneath your wings eternally, And bind their souls among the living,

That they may rest in peace. And let us say: Amen

After a period of silent reflection candles were lit for the victims of the Holocaust and more recent atrocities in Cambodia, Rwanda, Darfur, Bosnia, Syria, Nigeria and South Sudan – all places where people have been persecuted for their faith, their race or their disability. In the words of Safet Vukalić, a survivor if the Bosnian: "we learnt about the concentration camps during the Holocaust and could not understand how people could do such things. And then came the Bosnian war."

The Cup That Cheers



Much as I love the season of Lent, it can be quite a relief to reach Easter at last.

"Why," you may ask, "when we try to make time for extra prayer and reflection, fasting and almsgiving? Surely it's the time, when we try to get our own spiritual house in order." Well, of course this is all true. But I now regard Lent with a little more caution; I used to find the whole idea of 'giving something up for Lent' an exciting and encouraging prospect. I had conversations with my daughters about what we thought we might be able to do without. Of course, chocolate is always a popular one: "I'm giving that up, not you," my daughters would argue in true Christian spirit. I thankfully don't

smoke, so that was never a contender and I had already given up alcohol, cakes and chocolate in previous years. I could of course repeat one of these but I rather fancied the idea of a new challenge.

ADDICT

Other people's comments on the subject aren't always exactly helpful either. They have varied from, "Why bother to give up anything at all?" to "Give up talking! That's a better idea!" But such comments didn't solve my problem. So a couple of years ago, after much brain-racking, I thought, "I've got it! I'll give up coffee for Lent." I ran the idea past my nearest and dearest, whose expressions varied from sceptical to puzzled. "But you're a coffee addict," I was told. "Are you sure this is a good idea?" Yet I was determined to do it. Never had six weeks seemed so long to me in all my life! I couldn't believe how difficult it was to manage without that lifesaving cup – or in my case, mug – throughout the day. And tea just didn't cut it either. Apparently I became ever grumpier, bad-tempered and frazzled as Lent progressed. "For heaven's sake, have a coffee!" I was told, but I stubbornly refused.

TEMPTATION

I fought my way through Lent that year without those longed-for coffee breaks of my dreams and I didn't give in to temptation once. However, I snapped, snarled and growled my way towards the celebration of our Lord's Passion and Resurrection.

The giving up of coffee was not prayerful or reflective and I was too preoccupied to think about giving the money I had saved to a worthy cause. I felt fed-up and made everyone around me fed-up too. So now, in hindsight, I don't give up anything for Lent any more — I try to do something extra instead, something that will spill over into the Easter period, if at all possible. And I enjoy my coffee, for all it's worth.



Women's World Day of Prayer 6th March 2015 - The Bahamas

WWDP is an international, interchurch, organisation which enables us to hear the voices of women, from a different part of the world each year, expressing their hopes and concerns and bringing them before the rest of the world in prayer.

On Friday 6th March and estimated 3 million people in over 170 countries, will gather to observe the day of prayer, using an order of service written by Christian women from the Bahamas and translated into over 1,000 different languages and dialects. In the British Isles alone over 5,000 services will be held. The day will begin when the sun rises over the island of Samoa and continue until it sets off the coast of American Samoa some 35 hours later.

The theme of the service is taken from St John's Gospel, chapter 13, verses 1 to 17: 'Jesus said to them: "do you know what I have done to you?" and it challenges us to demonstrate the same radical, unconditional love for others that Jesus showed when

he washed the feet of his disciples.

The Bahamas consists of over 700 islands, scattered over 100,000 square miles in the Atlantic Ocean, only a small proportion of which are inhabited. It refers to itself as a 'family of islands' and in the service the needs of the smallest islands are given as much prominence as those of the larger ones.

The first WWDP service was held in 1950 in Nassau and was organised by the wife of the Presbyterian minister. Most of the Presbyterian ministers serving in The Bahamas came from Scotland and so it is presumed that they used the order of service produced by the Scottish national committee.
