# Day of Double Joy

At the end of the long path of discernment and formation, Jacek Kostuch from St Austell and Colin Groombridge from St Marychurch, Torquay were ordained by Bishop Mark as Priests for our Diocese on Friday 3rd July - the feast of St Thomas.

Priests from across the Diocese together with Mgr Canon Jeremy Garratt, Rector of St John's Seminary, Wonersh and Jacek and Colin's fellow seminarians, were joined by a large congregation of family and friends for the Ordination Mass.

For many present it was the first time that they had witnessed an Ordination and agreed that it was a truly memorable and moving occasion. It was a particular joy to have Jacek's mother and Colin's father in the Cathedral. After the Mass, the new priests spent more than an hour in the Cathedral to give their first blessing to the many who crowded around them, while the rest of the congregation retired to the Cathedral School Hall for sumptuous refreshments.

The following morning Fr Jacek and Fr Colin celebrated their own First Mass in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel at Buckfast Abbey – joined for each Mass by Mgr Canon Jeremy Garratt and a small group of family friends. Fr Jacek has been appointed as Assistant Priest at St Peter's & St Thomas More Parish, Crownhill (Plymouth) and Fr Colin as Assistant Priest to St Mary's Parish, Wimborne Road (Poole). Please keep them both in your prayers as they begin their priestly ministry.

#### Bishop Mark's Homily at the **Ordination Mass**

It is lovely for us to be together here today for the Ordination of Jacek and Colin. It is especially joyful for the Diocese to have two new priests. This ordination ceremony takes place on the feast of St Thomas the Apostle. We know him as a great disciple of The Lord, and a witness of the Resurrection. We know, too, that through the experience of doubt, he manifests great faith. The Risen Lord comes to us in our darkness and reveals Himself afresh as The Lord of life, as the One in whom we find our deepest happiness and peace. There are three key moments in the Gospels which particularly speak of St Thomas, and which give us, at the same time, some important insights into what is at the heart of our celebration today. The first scene concerns Thomas' exhortation to the other Apostles when Jesus, at a critical moment in his life, decided to go to Bethany to raise Lazarus. He thus comes dangerously close to Jerusalem (Mk 10:32). On that

occasion, Thomas says to his fellow disciples: "Let us also go, that we may die with him" (Jn 11:16). His desire to follow his Master is truly exemplary. He shows us that the important thing is to always stand by Jesus. In fact, the most important thing is never to distance oneself from Jesus. When the Gospels use the verb "to follow", we know that what it means is that where Jesus goes, his disciples must also go. This is the heart of priestly service in the Church. Jacek and Colin, you have already experienced this invitation to be close to Jesus in your professional lives, in parish and monastic community life, and through the network of rich relationships and friendships that you have made in these years. It is especially good to have your family and friends with us. To our Polish guests I say: VITAMI VAZ... GEN-QOO-YAY, ZA VA-SHOW VE-I-RAY

We thank God for the love and support that your family and friends have shown you. We give thanks, too, for the parishes and communities in which you have served, and those priests who have encouraged you in your vocation. I know that each of you has been inspired and deeply encouraged by so many good and holy people. Today, I want also to express our gratitude to Mgr Jeremy Garrett, and the staff and community of St John's Seminary, Wonersh; it is good to have them with us. We thank them for their accompaniment of you in these past years. Many people in this Cathedral today can testify to the fact that they see in each of you, Jacek and Colin, someone who seeks to follow The Lord, and who wants to remain close to Him. I hope that the encounter with Him will be the centre of your life.

A second moment for St Thomas comes at the Last Supper. On that occasion, predicting his own imminent departure, Jesus announced that he was going to prepare a place for his disciples so that they could be where He is. He says to them, "you know the way to the place where I am going." (Jn 14:4). It is then that Thomas intervenes, saying: "Lord, we do not know where you are going;



so how can we know the way?" (Jn 14:5)

These words show the limit of Thomas' understanding, but they elicit from Jesus, the great declaration, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life" (Jn 14:6). Thomas' question manifests his vulnerability. He teaches us that it is vital for us to remain vulnerable before The Lord, too. We often do not understand him, or what he wants of us. Like Thomas, we can find it difficult to remain strong in faith. Let us be brave enough to say: "I do not understand you, Lord; help me to understand". In such a way, with this frankness which is the heart of praying, of speaking to Jesus, we express our meagre capacity to understand and at the same time we place ourselves in the trusting attitude of someone who expects light and strength from the One who is able to provide them. Especially, I urge you to come to The Lord regularly in the Tabernacle and to question him, sing the song of your love for Him, and be willing to show Him your weakness and your vulnerability. He alone is the One who can restore you to yourself and reveal Himself afresh to you.

The most famous scene regarding St Thomas is, of course, the one we hear today. The Risen Lord manifests Himself to Thomas through the wounds of His Passion. He tells Thomas, "Put your

finger here, and see my hands; put your hand in my side; doubt no longer, but believe" (Jn 20:27). In the presence of these wounds of His Lord, Thomas makes the most succinct and personal proclamation of faith in the whole of the New Testament, "My Lord and my God". From this encounter we know that the Risen Jesus is recognised by his wounds rather than by His face. In the priestly life upon which you now embark, you will see this again and again. When you say the words of absolution, when you anoint the sick, when you give the Eucharist to those who hunger for God, when you bless those who struggle; in all these, you recognise the Risen Lord in the wounds of His Body, the Church. The wonder is that it is your faith which will be strengthened at these moments. Always, always be sensitive to this presence of The Lord who invites you, 'to bring Good news to the poor, to bind up hearts that are broken, to bring sight to the blind....(Isaiah....) Jacek and Colin, there is much joy in this Cathedral today to see you both ordained priests. Know that there is much joy in the heart of God, and much joy, too, in the heart of the one about now to ordain you.



## Jubilarians' Mass Plymouth Cathedral

A large congregation from the Plymouth parishes and from the Cornwall Deanery gathered at the Cathedral on Tuesday 9th June to celebrate the Silver Jubilee of the Ordination to the priesthood of Bishop Mark O'Toole, Fr Jonathan Bielawski and Fr Jaromir Wilczak. Bishop Mark was the chief Celebrant, Cardinal Cormac Murphy O'Connor was on the Sanctuary and the concelebrants were the Archbishop of Liverpool, the Most Rev Malcolm McMahon, the Archbishop of Cardiff, the Most Rev George Stack, the Auxiliary Bishop of Westminster, the Rt. Rev. John Sherrington, and the Abbot of Buckfast, the Rt Rev David Charlesworth. About 80 priests were on the Sanctuary, including visiting clergy from Westminster Diocese and Allen Hall Seminary where Bishop Mark was Rector.



Members of Bishop Mark's family were present at the Mass. The preacher was Fr Jonathan Bielawski and the choir, ably led by David Gridley from Penzance Parish, led the singing, including the beautiful St Anne's Mass by the well-known Catholic composer James Macmillan.





## Responding to Pope Francis' Encyclical call to action in Laudato Si'

Catholics across the Diocese of Plymouth have been preparing to respond to the Pope's call to protect Creation. Pope Francis in his Encyclical, Laudato Si': On the care of our common home, has called on "every person living on this planet" to take greater care of the world because of the impact of environmental damage such as climate change on our poorest and most vulnerable sisters and brothers.

The Holy Father says that we need to rethink the way we live our lives in order to experience the real beauty of God's Creation, as well as encourage people in power to show far greater leadership and long-term vision. CAFOD supporters in the Diocese of Plymouth have been putting the Pope's call into action and taking practical steps to tackle climate change whether by travelling to Westminster to speak to their MPs or by taking steps to reduce their carbon footprint. Simon Giarchi, CAFOD manager in the Diocese of Plymouth, said: "Pope Francis" message has already been taken up by lots of CAFOD supporters across Plymouth Diocese. In June, parishioners from across the Diocese of Plymouth travelled to London with thousands of other people to take part in the largest lobby of Parliament on Climate Change

in history, asking MPs for action. In the run-up to the general election, campaigners in every constituency in our diocese asked candidates standing for Parliament to make the changing climate a priority. We've also seen pupils at schools writing pledges of things they will change in their lives to make a difference. And so far we've had two parishes sign up to become CAFOD's 'liveSimply' parish award, showing their commitment to live simply, sustainable and in solidarity with the poor. We're looking forward to further parishes entering our competition to win an energy audit of their church buildings, helping them to cut their carbon footprint and save money.

Simon continued: "Our response to Pope Francis' inspiring encyclical Laudato Si' is vital, CAFOD is already seeing the impact of the changing climate in some of the poorest and most vulnerable communities, with lives and livelihoods being lost from more severe typhoons and cyclones destroying homes and more frequent droughts meaning that people are having to leave their homes, villages and countries. The Encyclical has attracted widespread attention, with the Holy Father considering in detail the ways we treat the environment,

animals, and human life, as well as providing ideas for new approaches to our economy, our politics, and our lives. Pope Francis is far from the first pope to speak about our responsibility to protect Creation; many of us will remember the inspirational interventions of Pope Benedict, Saint John Paul II and Blessed Paul VI – the Church has a long tradition of teaching about this. However, Pope Francis has published this Encyclical as a real rallying call for all of us to push for action on climate change at some really important upcoming moments. Pope Francis will be speaking at the United Nations in September, when all

UN member nations will be drawing up the new Sustainable Development Goals for tackling poverty in the next fifteen years, whilst in December the Pope hopes that his intervention will inspire world leaders to agree to cut the use of polluting fossil fuels and move towards sustainable energy. We're urging our supporters across the Diocese of Plymouth to continue to respond to Pope Francis' call. People can do this by signing CAFOD's petition calling upon the Prime Minster to show the leadership urged by the Pope, and to ensure that this year's global agreements are fair and ambitious."


#### HCPT Group 179 – Easter Pilgrimage 2016

On Saturday 4th July the Sisters of Les Filles de la Croix were joined in the Chapel at Stoodley by clergy from across the Diocese together with current and past pupils to give thanks for all the many graces and blessings bestowed over the past ninety years at Stoodley Knowle and the one hundred and twelve years in the Diocese. Bishop Mark gave the opening address and Canon Pat Costello, Dean of Torbay, was the Principal Celebrant.

The day had dawned bright and the sun shone as the many guests arrived at the Chapel to a warm welcome from the Sisters and staff. One of those strangely 'happy/sad' occasions when old friendships are renewed and farewells said.

The Sisters' presence in the Diocese since 1903 has graced all of the counties of the Diocese: Tremough at Penryn in Cornwall, St Genevieve's at Dorchester in Dorset together with Croft Lodge and



Stoodley Knowle in Torquay, Devon. Their mission to educate has been recognised and valued throughout the Diocese and beyond; in 1958 Mère Geneviève, the first Mother Superior of the Order at Stoodley Knowle and better known to the Congregation and pupils as Ma Mère, was awarded the 'La Croix de la Legion d'honneur' by the President of France for her services to education. The Diocese continues to be blessed by the presence of the Sisters who provide invaluable pastoral support at the Cathedral and in the parishes of St Mary's, Falmouth, Our Lady Help of Christians & St Denis, St Marychurch and, until recently, Our Lady of the Assumption, Torquay. Sr Perpetua concluded by saying: the Sisters would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for joining us today and we extend our gratitude to those who have sent their apologies, prayers and good wishes. It has been heart-warming to receive so many generous tributes to the Sisters, Staff and Clergy for their dedication and service at Stoodley Knowle. # Catholic Women of the Year

One of the four women to be elected as 'Catholic Women of the Year' comes from our Diocese, Mary-Jane Butler. Mary-Jane spent many years in Cornwall, working in nursing as a Macmillan Nurse, a Practice Nurse, and a Nurse Trainer. In 1997 she left to go to volunteer in the Diocese of Bungoma, Kenya, where for 40 years priests of our Diocese had worked to establish several new parishes. Mary-Jane worked as Administrator for Misikhu Mission Hospital which under her energetic leadership won an award for the most improved hospital in Kenya. The Bishop then asked her to become Medical Co-ordinator for the Diocese, supporting the hospitals, clinics and community health programmes under the care of the Kenyan Diocese. When Mary-Jane returned to live part-time in England, she founded a charity to support some of the many poor people she had encountered in Western Kenya – it is known as W.O.R.K. or Widows and Orphans in Rural Kenya.

HIV/Aids has killed many parents leaving behind orphans with no resources for education, and many grandparents (often widows) caring for an increasing number of young children. Thus the focus of W.O.R.K.'s efforts is to educate orphans so that they can become self-sufficient in adulthood, and to support various widows' groups so that they can survive and help look after their dependent children. As orphans need schools, and both groups access to health facilities, W.O.R.K. has funded a long list of projects in schools (e.g. classrooms, dormitories, kitchens, water catchment) and has built a health clinic and given much development support to another.

Mary-Jane now spends nearly four months each year in Kenya, checking up on all the projects and individuals we support, and working closely with two local groups whom we have formed to help in fulfilling the aims of the charity. One group in Nairobi acts as a channel for funds, the other in Bungoma keeps in contact with all the students and vets any applications we receive for support.



Currently, W.O.R.K. is supporting over 90 students in education. Some of these are in secondary school, others at University pursuing a variety of degree courses, and others in a Vocational Training College learning practical skills which will give them the chance of future employment. The charity has been going long enough now to have seen particular students through secondary and tertiary education, and are now working as engineers, accountants,

pharmacists, medical practitioners, electricians etc. When one reflects that these young people had no chance of any education beyond primary school – indeed many of them would be dead by now – we are extremely grateful to the generosity of our many sponsors who make these success stories possible.

Currently Kenya is experiencing grave problems because of a lack of tourists due to the problems with the terrorism coming from Somalia. The Luhya tribe of Western Kenya has been heavily employed in this sector, and so unemployment is causing greater poverty than ever. Our support of widows' groups is therefore very important – we have given animals (cows, sheep, goats), seed and fertilizer. But this is always on the basis that as animals reproduce and crops grow, the widows must share and support one another so that the groups become more self-sufficient as time goes on

When Mary-Jane is in England, she spends much time fund raising for W.O.R.K. She tries to increase the number of sponsors for orphans (we have at least 20 orphans on our waiting list at present), and collect funds for the capital projects we wish to undertake. This year we aim to build a dormitory for a Youth Vocational College, an extra ward and minor theatre for one of our clinics, and a hostel for some of our students to reside in during holidays - we have a number of orphans who literally have nowhere to go when schools close and they are told "to go home". ## Fr Jonathan Bielawski Silver Jubilee of Priestly Ordination 7th July 2015

Fr Jon Bielawski, Parish Priest, St Mary's, Falmouth and Episcopal Vicar for Evangelisation, Catechesis & Schools, celebrated his Silver Jubilee this year. On Tuesday 7th July he was joined by family members, parishioners from St Mary's Parish and from other parishes where he had served over the

The celebrations began with a very beautiful Mass at St Mary Immaculate. During his homily – a moving reflection on the power of God's love – he said: " My story starts in the same way as it does for every human being as proclaimed in our first reading from Jeremiah, "before I formed you in the womb, I knew you." These are powerful and personal words straight from God for you and me. Everyone on this planet has been given this gift of life with a purpose. In faith we know we are not just random acts of nature. Each of us is loved into existence with a purpose. From then on, the task for everyone is to grow and connect with the Lord of life, God himself, and to discover the depth and meaning of that purpose. "Each of us in a most fundamental way has been 'called'. Today, it is good for all of us to look back and reflect on this, but also to look forward, as it is ongoing. Fr Jon quoted from one of his favourite prayers (written by Cardinal Mercier): 'O Holy Spirit, soul of my soul, I adore you. Enlighten, guide, strengthen and console me. Tell me what to do and command me to do it. I promise to submit to all that you ask of me and accept all that you allow to happen to me, only show me your will'. When Fr Jon gives this prayer to people he warns them that it's 'dynamite' when said sincerely. He went on to say: "this leads me into a few quick reflections on what I have learned



over the past 25 years and what has been a consolidated experience. First and foremost 'Thy will be done' - once you know what you are called to do, DO IT- come hell or high water. It's a key line in the Our Father. The words are sharp and incisive. Scripture says: 'let your yes, be yes and your no be no'. When you give your word to God, don't look back. "When I went to college at 22 years old to do God's will, the word 'sacrifice' predominated. It was like 'withdrawing from the world' yet fully immersed in it. As a priest that tension between being in the world and not of it always continues but a slow yet certain 'sea change' has happened to me over the years. The word 'sacrifice' has been replaced by gratitude as the overriding sentiment. Gratitude for what God has called me to, I can even say that now I can often

get excited by God's will and what unfolds as the years go on. I have learnt as well a deep sense of 'fatherhood' That may sound odd at first because in accepting celibacy you give up fatherhood in a physical way. But there is a deeper fatherhood which is of a spiritual nature. I experienced this strongly when I was given my first parish in 1995, five years after ordination. As the only priest there, with neighbouring parishes 12 miles away, I had a strong sense predominately through the Eucharist, the Mass, of feeding my family, God's family, which I had been assigned to. Just like a man may work hard during the day to put food on the table to feed his children, a priest is there for his people to truly feed them in all the spiritual ways possible but primarily through the Eucharist. Fellow priests, draw deeply from that, we are not called father for nothing.

"Now looking at our gospel today we hear how the Lord appointed 72 others to go out into the rich harvest of mankind. I consider these days now as exciting times for laity, priests and bishops. We know 'cultural' Catholicism is all but dead and gone. Therefore, we have to be pioneers of new ways to connect to God's word to the people of the day. So, whether you regard our present day as 'good' times or 'bad' times, who cares?, they are 'our' times and we have a job to do." The celebration continued after Mass

with food and refreshments, including a Hog roast and a very special cake made by a parishioner. It was a joyful evening that even the rainfall partway through the festivities couldn't dampen. Fr Jon Gilbert from Helston presented Fr Jon with a generous cheque from parishioners. Hopefully, it will enable Fr



Jon to visit the Holy Land sometime in the future. The children of St Mary's school made beautiful individual cards for Fr Jon and these were displayed around the hall for everyone to see. We give thanks for Fr Jon's care and love of our parish and pray God will continue to bless him. Glory and praise to you Lord, Amen.





Wherever you are in the world a Corpus Christi Procession is a time when Our Lord, in the Blessed Sacrament, is taken out of the church building and presented to the whole **community**. This year at the Blessed Sacrament Parish in Exeter we decided to leave the comfort zone of the church grounds and go out into the streets of Heavitree for the first time.

A Eucharistic Procession is a very powerful expression of our love of the Lord Jesus. In the weeks leading up to the Feast the Gospel readings have spoken to us of Jesus' repeated calls to his followers to 'go out and proclaim the Good News'. I think that this is one of our responses - we followed him in the procession proclaiming his presence among us.

There were nearly 250 people, mainly from Blessed Sacrament and Sacred Heart parishes in Exeter, but also from Topsham and Crediton, several priests, a deacon, the Sisters of the Presentations of Mary and the children from St Nicholas' School. Our parish is a wonderfully diverse community, so it was a very beautiful and very colourful celebration with different groups

carrying their own banners, First Communicants waving flags and children scattering rose petals in front of the Blessed Sacrament.

As the parish photographer I was able to view the procession from many different angles. When I was outside one of the houses waiting for the procession to pass I heard the very gentle and curious conversation of a few young men in their thirties. They were clearly wondering what was going on and one of them said that it was something about Jesus; I turned around to them and said: "You're almost right but it's more than something about Jesus – it is Jesus." Then they asked why it was so quiet - and it was amazingly quiet considering the number of people and young children in the procession – and wondered why we weren't singing. I explained that people were praying but that we would be singing when we stopped on the green up the road, and sort of invited them to join us. Although I too wanted my 'moment of stillness' I needed to keep on taking pictures so that our Catholic Community would have a permanent record of our witness, our presence outside the church



building and our work of Evangelisation. But, when we got to the final station in the presbytery garden, I couldn't resist any longer – I dropped to me knees and had a little time quietly before the Lord in the Blessed Sacrament.

# Catenians' Awards for Excellence


Axminster Catenians continue to support local Catholic schools, with their Awards for Excellence.

## Sarah Adams - walking for the Children of Anjara and Syria



In July 2013 I gave up my car for a week to raise money for much needed funds for the Parish Community of Anjara, a small, predominantly Muslim town north of Jordan and twinned with my own parish of St Mary & St George. That year I walked 150km up and down hilly roads and across fields, through woods and along streams. The weather was kind and people were generous - I raised £1,800, far more than hoped for and the money was sent, as promised, to Anjara where it is being used to support the community with its efforts to help the local school, build a medical centre and a boy's home. Two years on, I decided to do it again! This time it was a longer trip in distance and days as I now live on a farm in the middle of nowhere. The nearest shop is 3 miles away. There are no buses, so I cannot cheat! And, I think it's unlikely that there'll be two full weeks without any rain! I walked for 2-weeks from Monday 20th July to Monday 3rd August, covered just over 200 miles and - thanks to the generosity of my sponsors, raised £2,100! Half of the money raised will go directly to the Parish Priest in Anjara and will again be used to support the local community, particularly the Children's Home and the on-going work to build a fully functional school. The other half of the money will go to CAFOD with a request that the money goes to their partner agencies working to help children orphaned by the war in Syria.


