A Message from Bishop Mark


Dear Parishioners, we have all been deeply moved by the scenes of refugees, from Syria, Iraq and North Africa, fleeing their war-torn countries and trying to make their way into Europe. Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, has encouraged Catholic communities and parishes to be generous in receiving these refugees. Thankfully, the Prime Minister has now indicated that the UK will receive 20,000 more refugees over these next years. The Bishops conference will be coordinating efforts with the Government on behalf of the Catholic community. At present we have been asked to identify in each diocese a point of local contact, who will also assist in

liaising with local government agencies. I have asked Mary Conway, our Diocesan Justice and Peace Coordinator, to be this local point of contact for our diocese. She will be working with me and our diocesan officers to see what assistance we can give in diocesan terms. It would be good, too, if parishes and any private individuals could let Mary Conway know of any local help that is available; her email is Mary.Conway@prcdtr.org.uk.

Let us keep all those seeking a safe home for their families very much in our thoughts and prayers at this time. Thank you for your cooperation and your generosity.

Devastating Drought

Pictured below is Hamani Fodi, 74, who three years ago had to compromise. Having spent his life working hard to feed his family and rightly proud of his achievements a devastating drought brought his small, remote village in Niger to the brink of starvation. He was forced to ask for food and, thanks to the Catholic community in England and Wales, CAFOD's local partners were able to support Hamani, his family and their neighbours. But, as Michael Mondengele, CAFOD's head of region says: "taking a handout is a very difficult thing. I have seen myself how, despite being hungry, people in a remote village will not want to rely on a food donation." Now CAFOD is aiming for a more permanent solution. In Doutchi, a small community in south-west Niger, our Hands On project, which will benefit from this year's Fast Day donations, will help people to discover new farming skills. The plan is to ensure that the community will learn how to care for chickens that will provide families with eggs, goats to supply milk and training to learn how to anticipate and prepare for extreme weather. 

Each year the Devon Branch of the CWL celebrates the feast day of their patron Saint St Margaret Clitherow on 30th August. This year the feast fell on the Sunday of the August Bank holiday weekend, but in spite of all the other calls on their time, over 40 members some with spouses and other family members, together with guest clergy joined the celebrations which took place at Buckfast Abbey in the afternoon.

Members gathered for coffee in the Violet Evelyn Hall and were then treated to an inspiring talk by Julia Beacroft, a local catechist and author, on how she has been moved to write a book $\ensuremath{^{\prime\prime}}$ Sanctifying the Spirit $\ensuremath{^{\prime\prime}}$ which deals with how everyday situations can be used to deepen our spirituality and so enhance our relationship with God. Julia hopes to publish her book in the New Year and more details about publication can be obtained from Adrian Wardle (ref. STS) Cathedral House Plymouth Cathedral 45 Cecil Street Plymouth PL1 5HW.

We then joined members of the Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walsingham for Mass in the Sacred Heart Chapel. We were made very welcome, with two CWL members taking part in the Offertory Procession. The liturgy brought back memories of our youth as the Mass was sung in Latin using the plainchant of our childhood. The Gospel of the day dealt with one of Jesus' encounters with the Pharisees, the one when they complained that Jesus' disciples had not washed and were



therefore defiled. The sermon preached by Fr Ian Hellyer emphasised the importance of inner cleanliness and sanctity which echoed the theme of Julia's talk.

After Mass we returned to the Violet Evelyn Hall for a traditional cream tea and more happy conversation and

encounters including two members who met for the first since being at teacher training college fifty years before! St Margaret Clitherow, who was a very sociable hostess, would have approved of our celebrations.

Fr Denis Caddle OAR 1930 – 2015

Fr Denis died on the 7th July in the last stage of Parkinsons at the age of 85. For nearly sixty years Fr Denis served the Church as a parish priest, most of it in the Diocese of

Plymouth. He was 5 times elected Vicar Provincial for England of the Augustinian Recollects.

Of all his priestly jobs the one he loved most was working in a parish. He practiced his priesthood as parish priest and confessor and minister of the sacraments all his life with great compassion, kindness and understanding.

Fr Denis loved people; he liked nothing

His greatest joy was sacred music and the Sunday hymns were selected and sung with great care and beauty. In 2009 he was informed that he was suffering from Parkinsonism but it would progress so slowly that it might never affect him. After his retirement as parish priest of Honiton he suffered his first . 'Parkinson's Freeze' and that severely restricted his movement. His ailments became such that he was moved into Honiton Hospital on 16th March this year. On the 5th June he was moved to 'The Old Rectory' in Exeter where he was visited by the newly elected Provincial; later on the 24th June he was moved to Nazareth House in Plymouth, run by the Sisters of Nazareth. He was cared for there with great compassion and comfort. He was anointed on the morning of 6th July and died early in the morning the next day. On Monday 13th, Bishop Christopher led the reception of the remains into the church of the Holy Family, Honiton, in the evening. The service was beautiful and packed. On the next day Fr John Docherty OAR led the funeral Mass with 22 concelebrating priests. The church was overflowing and many of his family come over from Ireland for the occasion. His coffin was then taken to lybridge where Fr Sean Flannery OAR performed



better than to stand chatting with people, anyone. He listened to people's stories, their life or their problems no matter how difficult. He was always interested and his face was a mirror of people's joy or suffering it was as if he could read your soul. He made time for people and whatever he was doing he would stop and make you feel you were the most important person in his life. His prayer life was intense and every Mass he said is as if it were the first. He faithfully said his prayers in community with his brothers and never missed one day or even one prayer unless through serious illness. He loved to sing Salve Regina every Saturday at morning office.



the burial ceremony and he was buried in the Recollect plot. One week later Fr Gerald Wilson OAR said a memorial mass in Ireland at Mount Argus church, Dublin. About 150 of his family and old friends attended. There were about 15 'Old Boys' former students to the priest hood at St Rita's Seminary who loved him when he was their prefect in the 60's.

He is deeply missed by his community and his many friends and parishioners. May he rest in peace.

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

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Book Review THE SYON BREVIARY



Daily Office of Our Lady REJOICE WITH MARY! Rare medieval prayer book now in English

For 600 years, the rare and unique daily prayers of the English community of the Bridgettine Sisters of Syon were heard only in the church or chapel of Syon Abbey. Their 'Daily Office of Our Lady' has been translated from Latin and is now published for the first time in English. This Office – which is known as The Syon Breviary – is taken from the original 'Breviarium Sacrarum Virginum' of the Order of the Most Holy Saviour, the Bridgettines; named after their founder Saint Bridget.

Individuals will now be able to use the 'Daily Office of Our Lady' for their own private prayers. They will be reciting in English a form of Divine Office instituted by Saint Bridget herself in the mid-1300s. To celebrate the community's 600th anniversary this year, the beautiful hardback edition of The Syon Breviary – with illustrations and 100 pages of plainchant music – was be released around the time of Saint Bridget's feast day, 23rd July.

The English community of Bridgettines was founded in 1415 by King Henry V in the same year as the Battle of Agincourt. It is the only English religious community to have survived the Reformation and the dissolution of the monasteries.

The Sisters never surrendered their abbey to the Crown although they spent many years in exile on the continent before returning to a new Syon Abbey in Devon in the Diocese of Plymouth. The site of their pre-Reformation abbey, on the banks of the Thames at Isleworth, is occupied by Syon House which is now the London home of the Duke of Northumberland.

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Diocesan News National Catholic Safeguarding Commission (NCSC)



The NCSC published its annual report on 30th July. Highlights of the report include: 1. The working party on pastoral support for survivors is proposing a model of support for victims and survivors, based on the Hallam Project which could be implemented gradually across all Dioceses and Religious Communities. 2. The Commission has approved the setting up of a Survivors Advisory Panel which will help inform the work of the NCSC and the safeguarding policies and practices within the Catholic Church in England and Wales. 3. Over 95% of Catholic parishes in England and Wales have at least one safeguarding representative. 4. This is the 11th year we have collected and published

safeguarding data. The NCSC is overseeing the introduction of a national electronic recording system of data. Acting Chair of the National Catholic Safeguarding Commission, Chris Pearson said: "This report highlights in full the work of the Commission and this announcement is just a snapshot of some of that work and findings over the last year. We are moving towards a much more consistent and sensitive approach in response to the victims and survivors of abuse." A copy of the annual report can be downloaded from: www.catholicsafeguarding.org.uk. 5. The Commission has also launched its E-learning programme. The NCSC has worked with EduCare to develop a bespoke e-learning package available to all members of the Catholic Community in England and Wales. The launch of the E-learning programme is part of the Church's ongoing commitment to safeguarding. The NCSC wants every member of the Catholic Community in England and Wales to have the opportunity to access safeguarding learning with a view to raising awareness, increasing understanding and promoting best practice. The Catholic Church in England and Wales is possibly the first Church in the UK, to offer safeguarding e-learning to every parishioner free of charge.



Offering Hope to People in Prison

Many prisoners (as many as one in four) in a Youth Offenders Institution are held in conditions bordering on solitary confinement spending 23 hours out of 24 confined to their cells according to the Howard League for Prison Reform . HM Inspector of Prisons reports that: "One in four boys in Feltham Prison is spending 23 hours a day locked up in his cell in conditions which amount to solitary confinement". This is also reported as taking place in Rochester Young Offender's Institution and, in the Prison Reform Trust Report 'Strangeways 25 years on which states: "A prisoner who is unemployed because there is no activity available for him might spend 22 hours a day, and eat all his meals, with another prisoner in a small cell designed for one, perhaps eight foot by six foot, with an unscreened toilet." Against this background, prayer groups become very difficult to organise, and prisoners struggle on their own. Roman Catholic Prison Chaplains are begging for Catholic Bibles and other catechetical resources to support the prisoners in their care in their journey of faith, a faith re awakened by their time inside and away from home.



Jesus is alive – go and tell my brothers

Stories to reflect on to help you prepare for Proclaim '15; Eric's story.....

For years I'd walked past Our Lady's Church on the way to work. I wasn't a church-goer and neither were my family, so what did it mean to me? Until one day I was walking past and I saw a sign next to the door. I wasn't in a good place that day. I'd got involved with some people and situations that I wasn't very proud of. I felt really low and I didn't think anyone could help. As I walked past the church that day the new sign struck me - it just said: "For sinners only". I felt as though someone had put it out there for me. I didn't do anything that day, I just carried on to work as usual, but something had changed in me. The next day the sign was still there so I tried the door and it was open. I went in. There was no one else in the church so I just sat down in the quiet – a few candles were flickering and I kept looking at them. After a while I left. The next day, and the day after, I did the

same. On the fourth day, after I had sat for a while, the priest came over and said: "I've noticed you popping in - can I help?" I told him my story and felt a bit better, but that was it. I didn't go back and in fact my life got worse until one morning I decided not to get up. As I lay in bed I found myself saying to God: "I need to sort my life out." Within minutes the postman came and put a letter through the letter box. 

Leweston School, Sherborne Another Year of Exceptional Results

Leweston School, Sherborne, is celebrating excellent A Level results. Sixth Form girls achieved a 100% pass rate with 92% of the exams passed at grade A* to C or Pre-U equivalent and 77% at A* to B or Pre-U equivalent. 63% of the results were passed at A* or A grades or Pre-U equivalent, more than double the national average of 26%. Average UCAS points per candidate were 372, the equivalent of over three A grades per candidate.

These results have enabled almost all Leweston's leavers to win places at their chosen universities or specialist colleges. The outstanding achiever was Alina P with 3 A* and 3 A grades who will read Natural Sciences at University College London. Many girls are going on to the more selective institutions including Bristol, Cambridge, Cardiff, Edinburgh, Exeter, St Andrews and University College London to study degrees such as Accounting, Architecture, Economics, English, Modern Languages, Mathematics, Medicine, Natural Sciences, Nursing, Philosophy and Politics, Psychology and Theology.

The school is also delighted to be celebrating an excellent set of GCSE results. 34% of examinations were passed at A* with 59% of all entries passed at A* or A. 84% of examinations were passed at A*, A or B. Our visit wasn't rushed and a prayer was said as our time drew to a close and we moved silently into the bright sunshine to make way for the next group of pilgrims.


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
