Plymouth Diocese Fundraising for CAFOD reaches new heights

Elouise Hobbs, CAFOD Regional Communications Co-ordinator, caught up with Brian Bailey from Torquay to see how his 15,000ft skydive for his seventieth birthday is going to help people from across the world to gain access to clean and safe water. On April 9, Brian is planning to celebrate his seventieth birthday with a charity skydive to raise money for CAFOD's Lent Appeal. In an added boost, his fundraising efforts will be doubled by the UK Government's Department for International Development up until May.

Brian has been volunteering for CAFOD for many years and alongside his wife Teresa, they help to lead their parish CAFOD group in Abbey Road, Torquay. Brian spoke to me about his birthday skydive, fundraising and volunteering, he said: "It was now or never; I wanted to celebrate my birthday by doing something I have never tried before and I also wanted to celebrate the work that CAFOD is doing for people across the world so I

thought I would combine the two. I have been volunteering for CAFOD for six or seven years but I wanted to try something different and step up to the plate and do something myself. We own a caravan and on a sunny day, you can look up in the sky and see parachutes. One clear day, I saw where they were coming from and I thought, why not do that for CAFOD? The money raised for Brian's adrenaline fueled birthday will give children, particularly girls, around the world, a better chance of being able to go to school – girls such as 15-year-old Guti from Uganda. Guti nearly dropped out of school because there was no clean, safe water and had to walk to the river for water to drink or to wash. CAFOD partners were able to repair the water pump near Guti's school, provided a portable sink and soap for handwashing, and trained teachers to help pupils learn good hygiene routines. This has meant fewer pupils miss school due to illness and some girls are taking high-school exams that only boys took before.

People like Brian, and hundreds of others in the Plymouth community, are all determined to help 'Turn on the Taps' for communities around the world currently without access to clean and safe water. Right now, 650 million people are living without access to clean water. 2.5 billion people lack something as basic as a toilet and sewage system to flush away their waste. It is also estimated that women and girls spend 125 million hours a day collecting water, which means time away

from work, school or playing with friends.

The money raised will enable the taps to be turned on in villages across the world by repairing or providing water pumps and training in order to maintain them. It will also fund hygiene programmes, education in sanitation and the building of latrines. Matched funds from the UK Government will enable access to clean water, sanitation and hygiene programmes to over 300,000 people in Uganda, Zimbabwe and the Democratic Republic of Congo.

To mark the beginning of Lent, seafarers' charity Apostleship of the Sea (AoS) held Ash Wednesday Deacon Joseph O'Donnell met seafarers from the Burgia and the Endeavour where he held services and imposed ashes.

During Eastertide AoS port chaplains and ship visitors will increase their efforts to bring some Easter joy to seafarers by handing out Easter Eggs, as well as offering practical and pastoral support to those who need them.

Due to the nature of their work, seafarers can spend up to nine months away at sea, separated from their family and loved ones and sometimes working in harsh conditions. In the Plymouth Diocese, AoS' chaplains and ship visitors provide spiritual, pastoral and welfare support to seafarers who arrive at ports in the South West. This includes organising Mass and prayers on board ships as well as helping seafarers contact their families back home.

Towards a Culture of Safeguarding

The Church has a responsibility to ensure all those who undertake work in the name of the Church are adequately trained in safeguarding matters. The Catholic Church is dependent on Clergy, Religious and Lay people using their skills and talents to nurture and support the Catholic community. Some will be paid employees, but the majority undertake their work on a voluntary basis. Whilst some will recognise their role as a volunteer, many rightly see their caring and support contribution as part of their Christian responsibility and ministry. But we all have a role to play in safeguarding the young or adults who may be at risk and it is for this reason that the Catholic Church in England and Wales has worked with EduCare to bring you an e-learning package that will raise awareness throughout the Catholic Community in our countries. The e-learning package is part of the Church's commitment to safeguarding, and is available to all members of the Catholic community free of charge. The programme was launched on 30th July 2015.

What do I need to do to access this training resource?

1. Email safeguarding@prcdtr.org.uk to register your interest.

2. Your email should contain your name, email address, the name of your parish/order/congregation, and your role. For example: Priest, Member of the Religious, Safeguarding Representative, Youth Worker, Teacher, SVP or Other Volunteers, Parent/Grandparent/Guardian, or Other.

3. On receipt of your email the safeguarding administrator will register your email address with EduCare.

4. You will receive a Welcome Email from EduCare where you will set your password.

At the end of November 2015 our parish church in Bridport closed for 7-months for a programme of extension and refurbishment that will last until the summer of 2016. Grainge Architects of Exeter have drawn-up plans that will see the church extended at the front to provide more room for the growing congregation, and also include new entrances, a meeting room, offices and toilets. The interior will be refurbished making the 1970s building lighter and brighter and new seating provided; in addition new lighting and heating systems will be installed. In February 250 chairs for the refurbished church were ordered and Fr Richard has now moved back into the presbytery at Bridport.

Whilst the programme of work takes place, Masses on weekdays and Saturday evenings are being celebrated either at St John's, Beaminster or Our Lady Queen of Martyrs & St Ignatius, Chideock. And, thanks to the generosity of Canon Andrew Evans, Rector of Bridport Church of England Parish, the main Sunday Mass takes place at St Swithuns, Allington at 11.30am.

Pupils give up lunch hour to help in Lent

Year 6 pupils from Our Lady and St Patrick's RC Primary School are giving up their lunch hour on a Friday to help out at the Teignmouth Lent Lunches. The children are carrying trays, taking tea and coffee orders, replenishing bread baskets, clearing tables and offering a friendly smile and company to those attending the lunches.

The Lent Lunches are hosted by the different churches in Teignmouth to raise money for Christian Aid. They take place in the Methodist Church Hall between 12 and 1.30pm every Friday in the run up to Easter. Our Lady & St Patrick's Head Teacher Sarah Barreto says: "We have asked our year 6 children to think about how helping at the Lent Lunches might have changed their understanding about Lent; thinking especially about how we look at our lives and prepare ourselves for Easter. This means we try to pray more and share more and we think less about ourselves and more about other people. The children have been quite overwhelmed by the welcome they have received."

This year, Pope Francis has called for a Year of Mercy, to reflect on God's mercy to us and to share it with others: "As the Father loves, so do his children. Just as he is merciful, so we are called to be merciful to each other." Mrs Barreto adds: "We are encouraging our young people and the whole school community to pray for each other this Lent, while growing in understanding of the concerns of our neighbours, both near and far, and inspiring us to reach out with mercy to all those in need. What better way to do this than here at the very heart of our own Teignmouth community? One gentleman who was enjoying his soup and a roll alongside three of our lovely young people told me 'I am 80 years old and I have never experienced such a fulfilling interaction with young people. They are absolutely marvellous and we had a wonderful conversation. Thank you so much for the idea and for bringing them. It's made my day.'

One of the children helping at the Lent Lunch said: "It's really making my heart feel good and everyone seems so pleased to see us here. I'd like to do it again next year."

Adrian Maurice Fryer Dove RIP 31st March 1926 – 29th February 2016









Adrian was a well-known figure in the Torbay Deanery. Even as he grew older and became less mobile he attended Mass every day – and sometimes twice at the weekends - in one or another of his 'home' parishes. And, in the last few weeks of his life whilst being cared for at home by Linda, his absence from our parish lives was of poignant significance.

Adrian spent most of his working life as a gardener and, we are confident, he is now at peace in the garden of heaven with his beloved wife Peggy.

A Pilgrim's Story: A Journey with a Difference



At 6am on the morning of Friday 5th February 8 pilgrims from Callington took the road to Launceston and St Cuthbert Mayne church, where Fr David Annear, our Parish Priest, was waiting for us. The church was all lit up and Fr David invited us in for a blessing and veneration of the relic of St Cuthbert Mayne before we left for Gatwick Airport to join 23 other pilgrims from Plymouth, East Anglia and Nottingham Dioceses.

On our arrival in Rome we were taken to the Villa Palazzola for our 4-day stay in Rome; a beautiful, restful and prayerful place which enhanced our pilgrimage. Saturday was the highlight of our pilgrimage; 60,000 plus devotees from St Pio of Pietrelcina prayer groups from all over the world descended on the Vatican for a very special audience with Pope Francis. It was no easy task finding a place; security was intense and we queued for over two hours before we found a good spot to settle. At 11am Pope Francis arrived in his Pope-mobile and did two laps around St Peter's Square to great applause before addressing the prayer groups which St Pio called 'nurseries of the faith, the fertile soil of love.' He said: "This is what prayer groups are! Prayer, in fact, is a true and proper mission which brings the fire of love to the whole of humanity. Padre Pio used to say that prayer is 'a force that moves the world'. Prayer groups are 'centres of mercy'; centres that are always open and active. Padre Pio, who called himself 'a poor brother who prays', wrote that prayer is 'the highest apostolate that souls can exercise in the Church of God'. May you always be joyful apostles of prayer. Prayer works miracles".

After a very active morning full of joy and happiness we headed to Rome's Marian Shrine 'Divino Amore' where Monsignor Bart Nannery, our Spiritual Director celebrated Mass. The following day we left Rome for Assisi where we visited both the St Clare's Basilica and St Francis' Basilica where Mgr Bart said Mass in the Crypt where St Francis' remains lie. A great privilege! On the penultimate day of our pilgrimage we made our way to the Vatican to pass through the Holy Door and pay homage to St Pio and then Mgr Bart celebrated Mass at Spirito Santo church dedicated to the 'Divine Mercy' by St John Paul II. After another long day we returned to Palazzola for a Holy Hour in the beautiful Chapel during which we all lit a red lamp and placed it on the Altar before the Blessed Sacrament. Each of us brought our lamp back home. On our last day, after an early Mass and breakfast we left for our journey home; sadness at parting but happy in the knowledge that we would meet again at a reunion in Callington in May. Catholic Women's League, Devon Branch Retreat

This always enjoyable and well attended annual event took place between Tuesday 2nd and Thursday 4th February. The Retreat leader was Sister Benignus, Filles de La Croix and the Diocesan Archivist, who spoke on the Psalms, Prayer and The Year of Mercy. Fr Gerald welcomed the group with kindness and his inimitable humour, which was much enjoyed.

Tuesday 2nd February: after supper Sister Benignus gave her first talk about the psalms and the place of them in our prayer life; she stressed that they were poems set to music which therefore should be sung but, if that was not possible, should be spoken or chanted in a group with a 'cantor' or split into 2 groups. The psalms fulfil several purposes, praise, intercession, or adoration and also perhaps the purest form of prayer just talking to God. She gave us many examples of psalms that have been absorbed into the fabric of our religious

practice and also the life of Christ: Psalm 23 'The Lord is my Shepherd' illustrates the former and, with his dying breath, Jesus quoted Psalm 31:5 from the cross saying "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit." (Luke 23:46, NIV). We ended our first day with Evening Prayer and recited the psalms in two groups.

Wednesday 3rd February: the day's three talks focused our minds on prayer, all the more so as it involved a little art work. Sister acknowledged that prayer can be difficult if not understood properly, but should not be so, as it is a basic activity of all Christians, part of our lives, and fundamentally just communicating with God. Communication is essential in maintaining any relationship, and our relationship with God is no different. This communication strengthens our recognition of God, and in practice is really just talking to God in our own words, in formal prayers or in thought. Scripture illustrates how to pray: don't babble; let your words be few; never give up; ask and it shall be given to you, were given as examples. We were advised to look upon the Scriptures as 'Love Letters from God' and to read them lovingly trying to understand their meaning as they relate to us. Putting this advice into practice Sister offered passages of scripture to each member to read, meditate upon and finally draw what the passage meant to us. Somewhat taken aback, and after protesting artistic illiteracy, the members set to and produced drawings of great meaning and personal significance which were discussed later discussed.

Mass, celebrated by Fr Gerald, was one of the highlights of the day after which the third session concentrated on types of prayer. These included thanksgiving, of which the greatest was the Eucharist; petitions, requesting prayers for ourselves; intercessions, requesting prayers for others; persevering prayer, (the need to keep up our commitment in prayer) and meditative prayer were all explained. We were reminded that worship is given only to God, and that worshippers are led by the Spirit. Pilgrimages and visits to shrines are also forms of prayer. Prayer includes so many ways of communicating with God, to maintain our relationship with Him, that it is possible to spend virtually all of our time in prayer of one sort or another, not forgetting just keeping God in our thoughts.

The final session was dedicated to individual explanations of our drawings of what the Scripture passages meant to us. These were many and moving with numerous insights into meanings which were both impressive and illuminating. One member felt unable to draw, so composed a poem instead which was of equal intensity and interest as the most artistic drawing. Sister ended the session by reminding us to enjoy our Love Letters from God.

Thursday 4th February: we spent a lot of time in prayer including Morning Prayer and Mass and final talk on the kinds of prayer we say as individuals and together in communal worship. All of them are important to God and for us. The main groups not in any particular order are: thanksgiving; petition (which is the most common) and intercession (different from petition in that it is for the good of others and is often public) and meditative prayer (which, in its most perfect form it is just being in he presence of God) and worship (where we concentrate on who God is and is often linked with thanksgiving). Finally we were told about all the events being organised as part of the Year of Mercy

After another delicious and convivial lunch we departed for home physically and spiritually refreshed.

Ottery St Mary in Devon recently mourned the death of one of its more colourful members who died in January this year at the age of ninety two. Betty Johnson moved to Ottery with her husband after they both retired; she was a staunch and active member of the Catholic Women's League giving help whenever it was needed both to the section and in the parish.

Betty was born Elizabeth Erica Marie Lukk in Tallinn, Estonia on 14th June 1924, she was the third child of five born to Gerhard and Erica Lukk. Her father was a great anglophile and a ther died when Elizabeth was 5 years old and her Mether's early death inspired Elizabeth to

very successful industrialist. Her Mother died when Elizabeth was 5 years old and her Mother's early death inspired Elizabeth to seek out a career in medicine - but World War Two intervened.

Elizabeth's Father insisted that all his children should be taught to speak English, French, German and Russian and thus by the age of seven she was fluent in all these languages. It was a wise decision and was to save Elizabeth's life a number of times in the future. With the outbreak of World War 11, Russia invaded the Baltic States; her home was commandeered, her Father taken away to die in a prison camp and her Grandfather thrown from a cattle truck to die by the side of the railway track. The tide of war moved on and, when the German Forces pushed the Russians out of Estonia, Elizabeth – then aged 17 - escaped to Austria and, because she could speak German, was able to join her older Brother in Vienna where she studied medicine for the next 2 years until the University was closed. As the Russian and Allied Forces advanced she managed to escape into the American zone where her skills as an interpreter ensured that she was able to staff the new National Health Service. She was helped in this by a kind lady who gave her two pieces of advice for her future success - firstly always listen to the BBC One O'clock News and secondly never marry a Catholic!





Sister Mary Bridget was born Hilary Joy Cotton on 7th October 1938 in Newton Abbot. She dedicated the greater part of her life to serving our Lord Jesus Christ as an enclosed Bridgettine Sister

and made her profession at Syon Abbey, South Brent in Devon on 12th February 1962.

Her Requiem Mass was on 16th October at St Paul's Church in St Budeaux, Plymouth. The celebrant was Fr Tim Lewis, who had got to know her in the last two years of her life since she moved to Waypoints Nursing Home in his parish, after St Peter's Convent Nursing Home in Plympton closed early in 2013. In his eulogy Fr Tim said: "In her religious life as a Bridgettine Sister was devoted in love to the Most Holy Saviour, and his blessed Passion, suffered for us: a suffering in which she has shared particularly in more recent years with the onset of dementia, and her own gradual decline. We don't know the meaning of this suffering in God's eternal purposes, but we trust that

our sister is with the Lord and, freed from the constraints of human frailty, worships him now with full knowledge and understanding."

At Syon Abbey, Sr Mary Bridget was a great asset to the community where for some years she held the

offices of Novice Mistress and Prioress. Sr Anne also a talented artist, illuminator, wood carver and gardener and was - for 26 years - the community's desired to serve him ever more perfectly, may now cook. She was also the perceptive author of quite a number of published articles on Bridgettine life and Syon's history. Sr Anne tells us: "For many years she follow him. May this kept sheep, including a breeding flock of 25 ewes. In blessed hope strengthen our resolve to follow him later years she kept a few old sheep as 'mowers' in our field until she moved from Syon in 2011 to be cared for by the Augustinian Sisters at St Peter's Nursing Home."

Sr Mary Bridget's cousins, David and Christopher attended the Requiem Mass. We will keep them in our prayers together with her step-sister Hilary and husband David as well as her Aunt Irene and cousins Rosie and Marion who couldn't get to the Mass. Her body was laid to rest in the peaceful cemetery at Buckfast Abbey not far from the grave of Fr Jack Pack, another of her cousins.

"So it is our prayer," Fr Tim concluded, "that Sr Smyth, the former Abbess of Syon, says that she was Mary Bridget, who, through her consecration to Christ in the religious life professed her belief in him and receive from him the abundant rewards which he promised to all who give up everything to

Most women who arrive at the start of a Rachel's Vineyard retreat have already judged themselves as unworthy of love - from either God or themselves

Over the weekend that follows, the job of the volunteer team members is to ease their crippling burden of grief and guilt by helping them see that God's mercy is a gift for each and every one of

Rachel's Vineyard was started in America in 1995 by Doctor Theresa Burke. As a young Catholic woman training to be a psychologist, she carried out some research involving troubled young women and discovered that many had undergone an abortion in the past.

She gradually identified a devastating set of symptoms that can include depression, anxiety

"Women - and men - can become isolated and locked in a downward spiral, feeling so far from God and themselves that they can't find any forgiveness, peace or reconciliation," she says.

"Their true feelings are usually suppressed because it's taboo to talk about, their fear being that they would meet the same condemnation from others that they already experience inwardly.

"In this country alone, tens of thousands of pregnancies each year are ended by abortion.

"Women are often coerced into abortion or choose it because they are frightened by the reality of the pregnancy and they don't often consider adoption, for instance, as an alternative way forward

"If they come to the point where they realise they need help, they might search on the internet and find Rachel's Vineyard. And if they then find the courage to come on the weekend, that's a huge step forward, because so much of the work is actually getting them there. Once there, God's grace can flow by entering into the shared group process, which will allow them to experience their grief with Christ in a safe emotional space."

gently introduced and participants are invited to place themselves in the story. After that, they each share their experience of what the events depicted mean to them. Simple props and music are used in conjunction with the scripture meditations to help reveal the truth about their experience

Theresa Burke says: "Jesus will encounter the wounded soul through the process of the retreat, according to his perfect will and timing. Everyone is invited to trust this process, as it is a gift from the Holy Spirit.'

During the weekend, the women have the opportunity to tell their own story - often the first time they have ever done so.

"Some people have never even said the word 'abortion', it's so painful and raw," says Susan. we lead them towards discovering that their truth is full of painful emotions, such as anger, and these are part of the grieving process. It is then that they can move into a time of grace."

them to live without that burden dominating their lives.

"The job of the team is to be completely nonjudgmental, compassionate and nurturing, and to offer ourselves wholeheartedly, day or night, giving unconditional love.

By being alongside them in this way, they began to realise they're not unlovable and that it's not the unforgivable sin because God's mercy is bigger than we can possibly imagine.

"We're facilitating a very personal, face-to-face encounter with Jesus, and that usually happens for everyone at some point on the weekend. Occasionally it doesn't - God sometimes works in other ways and at other times.

"But we've had so many letters saying, 'I can't believe how much my life has changed'. Others have told us Rachel's Vineyard literally saved their lives, because if they couldn't find God or forgiveness, they were going to end it.

panic attacks, suicidal thoughts, guilt, flashbacks, substance abuse, unresolved grief, low selfesteem, emotional numbness, disassociation, self-hatred, fear and an inability to maintain healthy intimate relationships.

These have come to be known as post-abortion syndrome (PAS) and can be indicators that someone is suffering after the trauma of abortion.

Inspired by her faith, Theresa developed a programme to help people, based on the living words of Jesus Christ in the scriptures. Twenty years on, Rachel's Vineyard now offers more than 750 retreats each year in more than 25 countries.

Part-time teacher Susan Walsh, a parishioner of Ampleforth and a volunteer team member and developer, has seen for herself the devastating impact abortion can have.

The team is made up of a facilitator, a counsellor, a priest and other volunteers who work very closely, praying for participants before, during and after the weekend.

"The welfare of each person is treated with the utmost care and confidentiality," says Susan. "The team are also supported in prayer by the extended family of our faith communities." Although the programme is about acknowledging the truth, it isn't a talk therapy. A number of carefully chosen "Living Scripture" passages are

The weekend includes time in front of the Blessed Sacrament and there's always a priest available for the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

"It's a bit like the Easter story – the first 24 hours is entering the tomb and acknowledging the reality and darkness of where they are, naming the emotions they are feeling and discovering that the other participants are feeling them same as them.


"They move through powerful emotions and, after lots of tears, are gradually led into the time of resurrection on Sunday morning.

"By then, they're usually able to begin to see there is hope for their future and that it's possible for

"It's about healing and bringing people who feel so unworthy back into a place where they can lead a fuller life, and perhaps have their faith rekindled, or ignited. It's about restoring relationships, with God, and self. That's why we volunteer to do this."
