

The Sisters renew their vows

Wednesday 30th March was a glorious day in the parish of Our Lady Help of Christians & St Denis, St Marychurch. Glorious not just because the sun was shining at last but because we were privileged to be present for the jubilee celebrations of Sister Perpetua, Sister Martin and Sister Thomas of the Congregation of the Daughters of the Cross. The Congregation has been present in our diocese since 1903 and over the years their work has been recognised by Presidents and Popes.

In his homily Canon Michael Lock spoke about the sisters' presence in our diocese; he said: "I don't normally offer a homily on a weekday – but this is no ordinary weekday because firstly, we are within days of celebrating the Resurrection of Jesus from the dead and today's readings speak of that event. Peter and John, in the first reading bring new life to a lame man at the 'Beautiful Gate' to the Temple and in the Gospel two of the disciples come to recognise the risen Jesus on their journey to Emmaus in the 'breaking of bread' after which they return to Jerusalem to spread the Good News. AND it is no ordinary weekday because we give thanks for 50 years of dedicated service by Sister Perpetua and Sister Martin and 60 years by Sister Thomas. For THAT long, they have travelled with, walked with and witnessed to the risen Lord and shown his presence in his church and in our Diocese. They, like the first apostles have spread that Good News in both word and action through their lives. All those years ago they made a

commitment to the Lord in the Congregation of the Daughters of the Cross and have faithfully continued in that commitment and that discipleship.

They have brought Jesus of Nazareth, the risen Lord, to countless others over all those years. Their lives of commitment and discipleship are an example to us all. Just as the two disciples in today's Gospel

recognised Jesus in the 'breaking of bread' so we now gather at the Lord's table, to meet the Lord and to be strengthened on our journey of faith and in our discipleship, wherever that call may lead us. The two men in the Gospel left Jerusalem confused and uncertain, not knowing what the future held for them; they returned to Jerusalem full of joy, enthusiasm and confidence. I'm sure that 50 and 60 years ago the Sisters could not, with any certainty, know where they would be in 2016 but they followed the Lord's call. As we begin this Easter season we, today's disciples, try to live the Gospel message each day, nourished and strengthened by Christ in the eucharist.

"Best Day" – "Best Trip" – "Best Friends" continued from front page



The March edition of CSW included the story of Parishes for Peace. Della Shenton now writes about her visit at the end of February when our linked families and their priests were able to have time out from the daily stresses of their lives as refugees, she tells supporters: "over a hundred of us went together for the day to Mount Nebo and the Baptism site of Jesus at the River Jordan. At the invitation of Parishes for Peace, two coaches of families of Iragi Christian refugees celebrated Mass at the River Jordan and renewed our Baptismal promises. Baby Sophia was Baptised at the Jordan and then we had a wonderful lunch and danced. For a whole day we forgot the sadness of what had been lost, and shared the joy of the day together that the generosity of Weybridge parish (Surrey) had made possible.

The next day, in an area on the other side of Amman, it was Behnam's 4th birthday - with a big chocolate cake and huge sparkler. We all sang Happy Birthday in Arabic and English. We talked about the importance of English to communicate with the many people in English parishes who want to help them and be directly in touch. They want to learn, and it spurred us on with the Parishes for Peace project to set up an English course

for them with TEFL teachers from the UK.

A few days later, Fr Gilmour McDermott (Liskeard & Sclerder) arrived with pilgrims from England for a two-week pilgrimage in Jordan, Palestine and Israel. They welcomed with open arms Azhar and Ghazwan, a young couple alone in Jordan without their families. They came with us to Petra for three days. One of which we spent riding donkeys up the mountain 1500 metres to Aaron's tomb where we celebrated Mass followed by lunch prepared for us by the Bedouin.

Those same pilgrims took two young families out for the day to Mount Nebo and for lunch - the "happiest day of our life" said Halah afterwards.

Parishes for Peace - Mercy for Migrants is a new Charity in formation, set up for the Iraqi Christian refugees in Jordan being cared for by the Church. We hope to make life a little more bearable for them while they wait for visas to move on to set up a new life. Our particular mission is to engage parishes directly as far as possible to establish friendship and support.

The oils used are brought by Della Shenton, of St Marychurch Parish, and are produced by a Women's Cooperative of Christians and Muslims in Palestine, just north of Jerusalem. The perfume used in Chrism is nard, an oil used from antiquity again from Palestine.



A day of peace and stillness at Sclerder Abbey

The Chemin-Neuf Community is an apostolic Roman Catholic Community with an ecumenical vocation. The Abbey was passed to the community in 2014 by the Carmelite Sisters, an enclosed Order; it is a place steeped in prayer and compassion and located in stunningly beautiful surroundings.

The quiet day on 24th February more than lived up to expectation: 35 people from different denominations arrived, travelling from Penzance and Exeter with several nearer neighbours. After a welcoming cup of tea, we were given a thought-provoking introduction to the way of Ignatian spirituality by Sister Jacqueline,

a member of the Community, to help us become empowered to make the most of this amazing opportunity to deepen our faith. The theme of the day was 'The Transfiguration'; we all think we know it well but I, for one, learnt something new which has significantly enhanced my understanding of our Salvation story.

Following this, we were given personal time in which we could choose between different activities: a time of guided prayer, a time of spiritual accompaniment about our spiritual journey, or time to walk or sit quietly in the garden. At noon, we went to the beautiful Chapel, to pray for the Unity of Christians, what a privilege to sit in the space previously only used by the Carmelite Sisters. There we heard a moving testimony of the work of the Giving Shop in Penzance.

the Wednesday of Holy Week is con-celebrated by the Bishop and his priests and is the largest gathering of priests each year, at which they renew their commitment to priestly service. At this Mass, the Bishop blesses the oils that will be used in our parishes during the coming year for the celebration of the sacraments. The word "Chrism" comes from one of the oils, which is mixed with aromatic

After a light lunch of delicious soup and cheese, we enjoyed a DVD produced by 'NET FOR GOD', a network of people around the world building a spirituality for peace a (netforgod@chemin-neuf.org). The DVD told another profound story, that of Fr Michael Lapsley in the South Africa of apartheid, a story of immense courage, love and witness to the Faith. After another short period of quiet there was time to review the day and give thanks. What a day of stories, our own as well as the Lord's, in brilliant sunshine with the sea glistening nearby.

Columban Mission project to the USA/ Mexican border



A small group of Columban contacts in Britain spent Holy Week 2016 on a Columban Exposure Visit to the USA-Mexico border, visiting and living with the people both in El Paso, Texas and Ciudad Juárez, Mexico. These cities occupy positions geographically only 200 metres apart; however for those living there, and particularly for those living on the Mexican side of the border, the presence of the 18 foot high fence that runs some 1,954 miles between the two countries, separating these communities, dominates their lives.

During their visit the group met many inspiring people and shared their Easter liturgies; the most memorable being witnessing the Good Friday Via Crucis in the town of Rancho Anapra. For this community, the poorest of the poor and on the edge of the city only recently dubbed the 'deadliest city on earth,' daily life is a struggle. You might expect a fear of strangers and a lack of willingness to be seen in large numbers; instead thousands took part in the procession up Mount Anapra, greeted their visitors as friends and showing a real understanding of Christ's suffering and the meaning of resurrection - something the group had never before experienced. Using the Stations of the Cross to reflect on the people they met and the community's experience of living on both sides of this man-made divide Mark Brown continues the story:

Jesus is condemned to death the

'undocumented', the 'voiceless': Contrary to the very vocal statements of some candidates in the American election and some sections of the press, statistics show that those who migrate across borders to find sanctuary and a new home are hardworking and far less likely to commit a crime than those born in a country. Am I prepared to speak out against false accusations and put

cost of the food I eat? How do I choose what I buy?

Jesus falls the first time Taylor Levi, Las Americas Immigrant Advocacy Centre. With her colleagues Taylor gives free or very cheap legal services for low-income immigrants and acts as an advocate for human rights. Am I prepared to help those who fall under the weight of persecution?

Jesus meets his sorrowful mother Sister Betty Campbell has lived amongst the community of Juarez throughout the recent troubles. Now in her mid-eighties she makes it her work to remember the sons and daughters who have disappeared without trace, or whose bodies have been found on the streets, killed by the drug cartels because their mothers couldn't pay the protection money demanded. Alongside Father Peter Hindes, her colleague for over 40 years, she campaigns for a change in US policy which has allowed drug lords to prosper in the region as they supply the growing US drug trade, whilst giving many impoverished young people little alternative to a life of crime. Is my heart pierced by the injustice done to others?

Simon of Cyrene Helps Jesus Carry the

Cross Father Kevin Mullins, pastor of Corpus Christi Church, Anapra has walked alongside his parishioners for the last 14 years. This Australian born priest, who on three separate occasions thought he was about to die, has built up his church community from a congregation of little more than 30 all those years ago to a regular congregation of many hundreds greeting each person before Mass with a hug or a wink. Father Kevin has recently completed the building of a youth centre on waste land behind his church in an attempt to prevent his young parishioners being attracted to the lure of the cartels. This is the land where two of his former confirmation class were stoned to death - just 2 of the many parishioners he has buried during the violence. How do I walk alongside the poor and marginalised?



Jesus falls a second time the 'criminalised' In the Federal Immigration Court we saw a judge dealing with fifty cases a day. Each case was simply a number. Whilst the judge tried his best to make things clear many defendants didn't understand what was going on, couldn't afford an attorney, or had an attorney who was so over worked that their papers couldn't be found. The judgement was usually for 'removal'. There was little time to hear an individual's story. Do I take the time to get to know those who have come to this country? Do I know their story?

Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem Ruben Garcia founder of Annunciation House, El Paso motto 'Voice of Voiceless' - runs border awareness experiences for groups from across the world, as well as accompanying migrants, homeless and economically vulnerable peoples of the border since 1978. Ruben reminds groups that the poor do not ask for our sympathy, they ask us to change our behaviour because their suffering is a direct result of economic policies in the West. Am I prepared to question my own behaviour which supports policies and behaviour that continue to make the world unfair for so many?

Jesus falls the third time Women's Cooperative of Hope and Faith the economic system in

Mexico has little or no room for unskilled workers, especially those aged over 50. These workers, mostly women, make hand-designed textile products and the money they raise augments the salary received from working family members and allows families to live with dignity. Do I do enough to help my family?

Jesus is stripped of his garments the workers of the maguiladoras, or factories across Juarez, who are denied basic rights, refused union representation and live on a wage 10% of that paid just a few miles away across the border. Their wage will only buy a quarter of the basic necessities that are essential for a typical worker's family. The employers only recruit young women since they are capable of working much longer hours than those who are older. Their work is to make products demanded cheaply by the 'West', whilst the hazardous waste from the production process is left in Mexico. Do I consider where and how the things I buy were made? Do I buy fair Trade products whenever possible?



at the hands of the cartel; their son's life was threatened because he saw who did it. How many have fled across the border for safety but live in constant fear of arrest as 'undocumented' people, and suffer abuse and violence in their new homeland.

Do I welcome the stranger?

Jesus dies on the cross Molly Molloy, research librarian and border specialist at New Mexico State University has, since 2008 has provided detailed documentation of the 11,000 people murdered in Juarez from 2008 onwards. Molly continues to question the effectiveness of governments in solving these murders, the vast majority of which go uninvestigated. Do I speak out in defence of others?

Jesus is taken down from the cross the Young Adult Ministry of El Paso. This wonderful group of young men and women, who have studied hard to ensure they can help support their families, live and work on both sides of the border. They meet each week to support one another, improve the community, pray together and destroy the myth that migrants are a burden on the community. Their friendship and generosity to the visiting group from England was a clear sign of those working for a better future. Do I label people?

Jesus is laid in the tomb those in detention centres. Many of those who are seeking safety and sanctuary find themselves treated as criminals and held in detention centres, separated from their wives and children. The detention centres are usually away from the major cities, and visiting them is strongly discouraged.

Do I want the issue of migrants to just go away? Am I frightened to speak out against injustice, but would rather go along with what most people say.

people right when they speak inaccurately about migrants and those seeking asylum?

Jesus takes up his cross Carlos Marentes is the director of the border farm workers' centre in El Paso. It is a little known fact that thousands of workers cross the border legally to work on the farms on the USA side of the border each year. For these men and women life is immensely hard; their annual wage is less than \$6,000 (£4,250) which is far below US federal poverty income guidelines. They rise each morning just after midnight, after only 3 hours sleep, to search for work to feed their family whom they rarely see. It is back breaking work. Carlos supports these people by providing them with a simple place to sleep, a meal each night and by educating groups about the human cost of the demands of the West for cheap food. Do I know the human

Veronica Wipes the Face of Jesus Shalini Thomas works for the Diocesan Migrant and Refugee Services. She spends her days supporting those who are beginning the long journey to apply for residency, citizenship or asylum in the USA. A complicated world of legal documentation and endless rules which are the first steps in a long and difficult journey for many who are fleeing death threats and poverty in Latin America. Am I prepared to

Jesus is nailed to the cross Rosa (not her real name) and her family, who fled their homeland after the death of her brother and sister in Mexico Like Joseph of Arimathea do I hide my faith?

The Resurrection Pope Francis. Whilst traveling back to Rome from Mexico, where he had said Mass in Juarez beside the border fence, was asked if the border fence between the USA and Mexico should be replaced by a 30 foot wall, he said: "A person who thinks only about building walls, wherever they may be, and not building bridges, is not Christian". We witnessed so many people this Easter who work tirelessly to build such bridges. Do I allow my Christian faith to influence the decisions I make? Do I build bridges or walls



Myra Rich 1920 - 2016



It was with great sadness that we learnt of the death of Myra Rich aged 96, a vital member of our parish community. Myra was a prominent member of St Augustine's Catholic Women's League (CWL) Section, Weymouth, for many years. Back in 1974 she was appointed Dorset Area International Liaison Officer. She attended the World Union of Catholic Women's Organisations (WUCWO) study weekends and every year she organised the WUCWO Service for her Section. The concept that Catholic women had the opportunity of a global voice through WUCWO was so important to her.

Myra took an active part in CWL events attending National AGMs and in the South West was a regular at the Lulworth Mass and Picnic, the annual Buckfast Abbey Pilgrimage. She also visited other Sections in Dorset on many occasions to catch up with other members that she knew well. Myra was an avid fundraiser and not only for CWL; she was instrumental in setting up the Parish Group at St Augustine's which initially supported welfare work in Peru, and then became the Third World Group, then the One World Group.

Myra was always there for Jumble Sales, Coffee Mornings, Seaside Stalls and other fund raising events. For many years she ran a jewellery stall to raise funds for Sao Paulo street children in the care of Father Eddy, a St Patrick's Missionary. She was a keen member of the parish sewing group that made liturgical banners for the church. A patchwork quilt made by the group was raffled and made £1,300 for our local hospice. Myra was also involved in the beginnings of the Family Fast Days for CAFOD. She showed continuing interest in the work of CAFOD attending seminars and Deanery CAFOD Days whenever possible.

With the closure of St Augustine's Church in 2012 the St

On the night of Tuesday 8 March 2016 Catholics from the Exeter Deanery and fellow Christians from local Anglican, Methodist and Baptist churches, were transported to a house somewhere in Jerusalem just hours after the crucifixion of Jesus by the Riding Lights Theatre Company. Crosslight Passion Play was a communal experience of theatre and worship: "Caught in the light of the flickering candles of the last supper, the torches of Gethsemane, the firelight in the courtyard and by the searching gaze of his Lord, Simon 'the rock' is shattered. The one chosen to lead is in pieces. As he hangs from the cross, Jesus is surrounded by a jeering crowd, laughing at his claim to be the Son of God. A small group of close family and friends stands by until the agony ends. But the great friend who more than any other has stood by Jesus through the story is conspicuous by his absence. One man is missing one who knows the truth."

After the performance, Fr Jonathan Stewart, Parish Priest at Blessed Sacrament, Heavitree, Exeter said: "This was a deeply moving and passionate drama. Through the characters of Peter "the rock", Mary "the Mother" and John "the beloved disciple" we relived the extraordinary events of Jesus's arrest and torture right up to the time of his resurrection and his appearing to the disciples. Riding Lights has been in existence for 30 years and this was the first time they have performed a Passion Play in a Catholic Church. May the Lord strengthen them in their ministry (and us in ours)."







Exeter Martyr Honoured

St Richard Reynolds feast day will be celebrated on Thursday, 5th May. There will be a memorial Mass at the Church of the Blessed Sacrament, Heavitree, Exeter at 9.30am followed by refreshments in the Richard Reynolds Centre.

St Richard was a Bridgettine monk of Syon Abbey who, in 1535, was the first man to refuse to take the Oath of Supremacy making King Henry VIII the supreme head of the Church in England. He was executed at Tyburn on 4th May 1535 by being hung, drawn and quartered. The quarters of his body were chopped to pieces and hung in different parts of London including upon the

gateway of Syon Abbey itself at Twickenham. The ornate section of gateway was preserved by the monastic community of Syon now rests in the Martyrs' Chapel at Blessed Sacrament Church, Heavitree, Exeter alongside a terracotta memorial wall plaque by sculptor, Geoffrey Preston. St Richard, one of the Forty Martyrs of England & Wales, was canonised by Pope Paul VI in 1970.

In the Richard Reynolds Centre there will also be a display of the new English edition of the Syon Breviary which was recently published to celebrate the 600th anniversary of the foundation of Syon Abbey in 1415 by King Henry V. The display will also be in the Martyrs' Chapel at all Masses the following weekend and copies of this lovely prayer book, the 'Daily Office of Our Lady', will be available to buy with any profit going to the parish. Parish priest, Fr Jonathan Stewart said: "We commemorate the martyrdom of St Richard Reynolds not only for his fidelity to the Church but also because we believe he was a member of the Reynolds family who lived nearby at Pinhoe, where he was born in 1492." He added: "Any proceeds from the sale of the Syon Breviary will go towards restoring the Reynolds plaque by Geoffrey Preston, which is in need of a little repair."


