During this year's pilgrimage two special events in the Churches' Liturgical calendar took place with the Feast of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary being celebrated on Tuesday 31st May and the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus on Friday 3rd June. During the week pilgrims young and not so young joined together to experience the joy that Lourdes brings; together with pilgrims from across the world they attended Masses took part in Blessed Sacrament and Torchlight processions and witnessed the Sacrament of the Sick being administered in the Cathedral of the Trees', the City of the Poor. At the invitation of Archbishop Kevin McDonald, Bishop Mark gave the homily during the Mass for the sick and elderly and chose as his theme 'A child is always a gift, not a problem.'

His words were moving and spoke to the need for us all to put our trust in Jesus and Mary. During his homily Bishop Mark told of an encounter he experienced in Lourdes when he was just 17, when he witnessed the extraordinary faith of a young severely disabled pilgrim. He said: "this young man knew what it was to trust, and in the face of his suffering to continue to be hopeful" Bishop Mark continued: "We offer to assist the sick, but we gain so much in return. Many of us come to help, but it is we who are helped. We see our young people, in their care of the sick and the elderly, in a new light. They take on a new dignity and stature. Here, we know that the sick take centre stage."

Bishop Mark concluded by saying: "Being here together, and experiencing the grace of this place, gives us the strength to continue on life's pilgrimage. We are touched and healed by the Lord, in the way that He knows we need. We must simply trust Him. Ask Our Lady and St Bernadette to help us live with childlike trust, knowing we are held by Him, precious to Him, loved by Him. And you, our dear sick and frail pilgrims who travel with us, thank you for the witness you give us, for the courage you show in the face of suffering. Continue to bless us with your presence and to show us the tender face of Jesus, Our Lord."

Diocesan Pilgrimage to the Shrine of St Boniface



After a very busy week in Lourdes, Bishop Mark returned home in time to set out on another pilgrimage, this time to the ancient town of Crediton, birthplace of St Boniface – processed to the statue of St Boniface in the local park where the Rector of Holy Cross Church, Prebendary Nigel Guthrie, led devotions to the saint. The pilgrimage concluded with refreshments at the National Shrine, hosted by Fr Michael Wheaton and his parishioners. Germany east of the Rhine. Subsequently Pope Gregory III made him an Archbishop and gave his the task of reorganizing the churches in Bavaria. When Boniface was over 70 he set out again for Frisia to convert the wild tribes of the Netherlands. He called together all his new converts ready for Confirmation on 5th June 755, but at

This year the feast of St Boniface, fell on Sunday; during the afternoon pilgrims were able to visit the Anglican parish church of the Holy Cross and view the beautiful flower festival and attend a superb and amusing presentation of the life of St Boniface (Winfrith¹) performed by three members of the local community. Later pilgrims gathered at the National Shrine to celebrate Solemn Vespers and Benediction led by Bishop Mark. Dom David Charlesworth OSB, Abbot of Buckfast, preached the Homily and the singing was led by the choir of Buckfast Abbey under the direction of Philip Arkwright. Benediction was followed by a visit to the shrine located in the narthex of the church with reliquary and new statue of St Boniface. Following the Banner of St Boniface pilgrims then

¹ Winfrith was born at Crediton in about 675. Early on in life he decided to devote his life to God's service and entered the Benedictine Monastery at Exeter under the authority of Abbot Wolfhard. He was ordained priest aged 30 and, declining an invitation to become Abbot of Nursling Monastery, instead took up missionary

work in Frisia in the Netherlands. When that mission met with opposition and failure he returned to England. The following year he went to Rome and spent time with Pope Gregory 11 who gave him the name Boniface – Bona Facere meaning 'good works' and sent him to Germany. After some years Pope Gregory II recalled him to Rome and appointed him Bishop for all dawn they were attacked by a band of warriors and killed. His body is buried in Fulda.

Editor: All the events of St Boniface' life are depicted in the west window of Plymouth Cathedral which was dedicated in 1880 to mark the silver jubilee of Bishop Vaughan, the second Bishop of our Diocese.

Hands on Altiplano

Eva grew up in Bolivia, on the Altiplano - a vast plain in the Andes Mountains, 3,800m above sea level. Life here is extremely tough. When Eva was young, life was a fight for survival. She is now the director of one of CAFOD's partners in the region and she can see that life is getting tougher for the hardworking people who live here. Growing food is incredibly difficult, the cracked, dry soil across the Altiplano is fit for very few things. The people rely on rainwater to feed their growing crops, but the rains have become more erratic and unpredictable. Eva has seen families leave this plateau because failed rains and sudden hail storms have destroyed entire harvests.

But Eva didn't survive the Altiplano by giving in. She has a plan to ensure people can grow enough crops to eat and get access to clean, safe water, so saving her community. Over the next two years, Eva and her small group of expert farmers and water specialists want to bring hope to thousands of people living in this harsh environment. She will work with the people, using her expertise as well as that of her colleagues, to transform the land so that life here is less a matter of survival, more a case of what they would call *vivir bien* or 'living well'.

seafarers were injured while carrying out their duties on board their vessels. One of the men, a seafarer from the Philippines, had broken his leg after he was tossed around the deck. I was able to offer phone cards so that he could make contact to home. After a week he was transferred to a hotel in Falmouth and I was able to visit him daily until he was repatriated back to the Philippines."

When the seafarer arrived back home, he sent a message to John to let him know he had arrived safely and he thanked AoS for all its support. He let John know he was still not able to go back to sea and he required discharge papers from the hospital so that he could continue to obtain financial support for himself and his family. John was able to organise this for him." AoS port chaplains are also there to try and meet the spiritual needs of seafarers, many of whom are Catholic, explained John. "Whenever possible I arrange to take seafarers to Mass when requested. However, due to work schedules it is not always possible for them to attend a church. "In this situation I liaise with my Parish priest at St Mary Immaculate in Falmouth, Fr Brian Kenwrick. We have, at times, had to provide an altar made from many different things; anything from a coffee table to a wooden crate carrying a dishwasher."

John never loses sight that the work he does is part of a much bigger picture. "Whatever challenge comes my way, I always remember that I am just a cog in this worldwide AoS mission and that colleagues all over the globe are carrying out the same tasks as I am carrying out here in Falmouth and Fowey."

However, the hospital was able to supply an interpreter and I discovered that, although he had cracked four ribs and punctured his lung, his biggest need was a lead for his laptop. When he was taken off his ship by helicopter his crew mates had grabbed his belongings but had forgotten the lead. I was able to locate a replacement lead, which allowed him the opportunity to Skype his wife and family. We could not talk directly, but his smile told me everything."

I am delighted that Jan Holton has agreed to have overall responsibility at St Boniface House. So please send all returns, etc. to her, not to me.

As editor, I liaise with the printers and continue to accept articles from the parishes. I am also generally responsible for the final product. Incidentally, I am aware that, for a number of reasons, the current edition contains some spectacular errors and omissions. Apologies for that. The buck stops with me. With clearer working arrangements, the 2017 edition should be up to standard.

Secondly, and very important, the Diocesan Year Book has been published almost every year since 1957 and so the next edition will celebrate the sixtieth anniversary. Quite a milestone. So let's have lots of news and articles from you, especially anything that reflects the last sixty years in your parish. **Deadline for articles: Saturday 10**th **September.**



This year's summer camps will take place between Sunday 24th July and Friday 5th August at Grangehurst, Buckfast Abbey. The camps, running for over 60 years, have provided an opportunity for young people of the diocese to meet and grow together in their faith and love of Our Lord Jesus, and beauty of liturgy and prayer. The emphasis this year will be on the Jubilee Year of Mercy and the need to build bridges in our relationship with each other and with Jesus Christ.

The Fatima centenary is a major moment for the Church in England and Wales



From May to October 2017, the Church will be celebrating the centenary of Our Lady's apparitions at Fatima. The World Apostolate of Fatima (WAF) in England and Wales, a Public International Association of the Faithful of Pontifical Right officially approved by the

Francisco for the veneration of the faithful. It is also hoped to arrange DVD and PowerPoint presentations around the country on the significance of the message for the Church today, especially regarding the recitation of the Rosary in the family, and the Five First Saturdays devotion of reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

It is providential that Pope Francis's Year of Mercy precedes the Fatima centenary year, because mercy is central to Our Lady's message, beginning with the announcement of the Angel in the summer of 1916, when he told the children that the Hearts of Jesus an Mary had designs of mercy on them. Likewise, in the July 1917 apparition, the Blessed Virgin told them to pray the Rosary decade prayer: 'O my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell, lead all souls to Heaven, especially those most in need of Thy mercy.' And, in the final vision of the Holy Trinity, on 13th June 1929, Lucia saw Christ on the cross with the words Grace and Mercy, as if formed of crystal clear water, falling from its left arm, and Our Lady beneath the cross with her Immaculate Heart in her hand, offering it to the Holy Trinity.

the statue of Our Lady that had been brought from Fatima. The Pope renewed the act of entrustment to Mary's Immaculate Heart, and received our national president, signifying his approval of the work of the World Apostolate of Fatima, an organisation that is spread throughout the world with up to one million members. By his devotion to Our Lady of Fatima, Pope Francis has shown the Church that the Fatima message remains just as relevant as ever.

Church, is planning various events to promote the Fatima message, which today is more relevant than ever.

In particular, the National Pilgrim Virgin Statue of Our Lady of Fatima, which was blessed by Pope Paul VI at Fatima in May 1967, and given to England by the Bishop of Fatima in 1968, will be visiting various Cathedrals and churches around the country. On 13th May 1971, this statue was crowned at Walsingham by Bishop Alan Clark, and it was also blessed by Pope John Paul II during his visit to Britain in 1982. On 13th May 2017, the 100th anniversary of Our Lady's first apparition at Fatima, Archbishop Peter Smith will receive, bless and crown the National Pilorim Virgin statue in St George's Cathedral, Southwark.

This beautiful statue will be accompanied by relics of Blessed Jacinta and

Timothy Tindall-Robertson, National President of the World Apostolate of Fatima in England and Wales writes: In October 2014 I received a letter from Bishop Mark in which he said: "I am particularly pleased to be able to affirm the work that you are doing to promote the regular saying of the Rosary, particularly in family life ... I will continue to pray for the success of the World Apostolate of Fatima in this country. Thank you for all that you do".

On 13th May 2013, the month after his election, the bishops of Portugal consecrated Pope Francis's pontificate to Our Lady at Fatima, in response to his request. Later that year, on 13th October he celebrated the Marian Day in the Year of Faith in St Peter's Square, in front of The National Pilgrimage to Fatima, which flies from Heathrow, and for which places are still available, takes place from 7th to 14th July 2017 with Fr Gerard Kelly as Spiritual Director, Timothy Tindal-Robertson as Leader, and Mike Daley as Pilgrimage organiser. WAF England and Wales also hopes that in 2017 the bishops will renew the Consecration of England and Wales to the Immaculate Heart of Mary which was made by Cardinal Griffin at Walsingham, on 16th July 1948. Please pray fervently for this important intention.

Fr Ciaran McGuinness MAfr, our Parish Priest, decided to run a marathon 21st May, to raise money for the World Youth Day in Krakow, Poland this coming July. Two parishioners from Bodmin Parish will be attending together with many others from the Plymouth Diocese. World Youth Day (WYD) is a worldwide encounter, open to young people who wish to take part in a festive encounter with their contemporaries, and celebrated every three years - the last WYD was in Brazil in 2013. Pope Francis will attend and it will be especially poignant as one of his predecessors, Pope Saint John Paul II, was Cardinal Archbishop of Krakow.

Fr Ciaran, is a keen runner, who jogs nearly every day and is veteran of many marathons, including Belfast. To keep away from the main roads Fr Ciaran decided to run on the Camel Trail from Bodmin to Wadebridge then to Padstow alongside the River Camel estuary which has the very best of scenic views. The distance from Bodmin to Padstow and back to Wadebridge for the finish is not quite the scheduled marathon distance so, to make up the official distance of a measured marathon of 26 miles and 385 yards, Fr Ciaran started at St Breward Parish Church which lies on the northern edge of Bodmin Moor.

Being an experienced runner knowing that he would need water on route but with no water stops (hydration stations) available as on official marathons, Fr Ciaran carried his own supply of water, with a reservoir rucksack on his back with a connecting mouthpiece. Whilst it wasn't exactly cold (60F/15.5C) conditions were wet hence Father's cagoule rather than a running vest. Parishioners were on hand to welcome him at Padstow after 20 miles, with encouragement and top-up supplies of water; they were also waiting at St Michael's Church, Wadebridge to welcome him at the finish where he arrived just after 1pm at having completed his marathon in 5 hrs 7 min. Having raised over £500 and after a short rest and in good shape, Fr Ciaran celebrated the 5.30pm Sunday Mass at St Michael's.

I'm hoping to gain my dolphins, the emblem of the Submarine Service, and go on to become a Commander in the logistics branch of the Fleet."

With the first phase of his training complete, Joseph will transfer back to Cornwall for his specialist training at the Defence Maritime Logistics School based at HMS Raleigh.

Celebrating the Feast of St Rita of Cascia

We had a wonderful celebration for our patron saint, St Rita of Cascia, on her feast day 22nd May. Mass was celebrated in the marquee especially put up in the grounds of St. Rita's Centre; the principal celebrant was Rev Gerardo Cortes Gonzalez OAR, a Mexican who works with the Hispanic Chaplaincy in London.

In his homily Fr. Gerardo said that St Rita was not only the saint of today, but the saint of everyone. It is to be hoped that the life of everyone devoted to her will be like the rose picked in the garden in Roccaporena the winter before the saint's death. That is, let it be a life sustained by passionate love for the lord Jesus; a life capable of responding to suffering and to thorns with

forgiveness and the total gift of self, in order to spread everywhere the good odour of Christ (cf. Co 2:15) through a consistently lived proclamation of the Gospel. St Rita offers her rose to each of you: in receiving it spiritually strive to live as witness to a hope that never disappoints and as missionaries of a life that conquers death'.



Over 350 people came from all over the country to the shrine of St Rita in Honiton, Devon to share in the feast day; each person was given a blessed rose at the end of Mass to take home for a sick friend or loved one.

When my husband and I were first married, we lived in a small terraced house. Although it was fairly sturdily built, we often felt as though the family who were living next door to us were sharing our lives and our space!

It will not surprise you to hear that their two little girls could make a remarkable amount of noise at times – which we could hardly ignore! But they were a delightful family and the young mum became one of my closest friends and confidantes, so I considered myself lucky to have such lovely people as my close neighbours

The Gospel reading for Sunday 10th July is taken from St Luke's Gospel and relates the well-known story of the Good Samaritan. In the parable Jesus is keen to emphasise the fact that the man who had been robbed and beaten by brigands is ignored and abandoned by both a priest and a Levite. However, his salvation comes from the most unlikely of sources - a Samaritan who is passing by. There can be little doubt that his listeners would have been amazed to have heard this, as the enmity between Jews and Samaritans was fierce and historic.

COMPASSION

Yet this is the point of the parable. Jesus wishes his listeners to understand that it is entirely possible to show love and compassion even to your worst enemy. In fact, this is precisely what he desires us to do - forgive our adversaries and treat them with the same love and care which we would give to our dearest friends. Jesus asks this question 'Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands
