

Tavistock 'gap year' volunteer embarks on a journey of a lifetime

A young Tavistock volunteer is preparing to travel thousands of miles with aid agency CAFOD to meet some of the people the agency is working with in Cambodia. James Ronan, 23, who grew up in Tavistock and studied at Plymouth University, will go to Cambodia for nearly three weeks at the end of January. Whilst there, he will meet local communities who have been helped by the fundraising and campaigning of CAFOD's supporters in England and Wales.

James, who is currently participating in the CAFOD gap year scheme, has been volunteering in St Mary's Academy, Blackpool, since September. Through working with the chaplaincy team, he has been supporting students, sharing CAFOD's work and helping with fundraising activities. He will now travel with other gap year volunteers to meet some of the local organisations that CAFOD works within the country to deliver its development, conservation, and education projects. James tells us: "I am eager to experience Cambodian culture, meet different people, taste traditional Cambodian

food, and see amazing landscapes and wildlife. Most of all I am excited to be visiting CAFOD partners and witness the impact they have made in the country. I will be visiting a variety of projects, including water and sanitation projects, and Sre Khmer, a Cambodian agricultural NGO, as well as a Village Support Group. This trip has also inspired me to learn Khmer, a dialect spoken in the areas of Cambodia that I will be visiting. I have started watching YouTube videos to try and learn phrases, to connect with the people I will be visiting, which I think is important."

CAFOD has been working in Cambodia since 1980 and continues to support vulnerable groups by enabling indigenous people to access land titles, protect their forests and to increase their food supply and income through organic farming. The charity also works with local organisations to support women to influence, and become involved in, local government.

James will visit various projects in the country,



before returning to the UK to finish his placement, where he will be able to share his experience with his local communities in England and Wales. CAFOD representative in Plymouth, Simon Giarchi, said: "It's great that James will get to experience first-hand CAFOD partner's work and learn so much about communities so far away. When he returns to the UK, he will have the opportunity to continue to support the people he has met in Cambodia through volunteering with CAFOD and sharing his experiences."

CAFOD Lent Fast Day 2017

CAFOD is the official aid agency of the Catholic Church in England and Wales and works in countries and communities around the world – wherever the need is greatest. As part of our preparation for Lent Fast Day 2017 we are encouraged to reflect on this story about something truly amazing... Something huge... a fish the size of your thumb...yet to Florence in Zambia, Southern Africa, it might be the biggest fish in the world.

Florence, 41, is a hard-working mother who is devoted to her family. She wants to make sure there is food on the table and to send her younger children to school. A few years ago, she was only just making enough to feed her family. She told CAFOD: "I had challenges. I couldn't get enough money to buy farming equipment. I wanted to grow corn, but struggled and I grew just enough to survive." Each day, Florence would wake at around six to plant, sow, water and care for her crops. And late at night, when her children had a simple meal and were in bed, she would go to sleep with sore hands and an aching back.

Change came in the form of the Sisters of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary, a partner supported by CAFOD, and their brilliant plan involving tiny fish. The Sisters have been working in the community for over 20-years and they recognised how determined Florence was to stand on her own two feet and so they gave her 500 tiny fish as well as the tools and training to build a pond to farm them. With continued love and support from the sisters, as well as Florence's commitment and determination, the fish grew and grew... By selling some of the fish at the market, Florence was able to give her children a future – she was able to send them to school. And Florence is already giving back, sharing what she has with the most vulnerable in her community; ensuring the impact of those few small fish continues to spread.

In the first reading on Sunday 5th March we hear an account of how all human beings are created by God, giving each person an inherent dignity. When Florence was trained by the Sisters and given just a few small fish, her life was transformed. Thanks to your support, her Godgiven dignity was respected as she was able to provide for her family. And, a week later, in the Gospel on Sunday 12 March we hear how Jesus, in front of Peter, James and John, is transfigured: he is transformed. The disciples catch a glimpse of who Jesus really is, and their understanding of their friend changes. Lent is a time for us to have our eyes opened to who we are called to be as children of God, and to be open to our own transformation. It is also a time when we can help others, like Florence, to change their own lives. A few small fish do not sound like much, but through her fish farming, and the stability it gives, Florence is able to provide for her family and plan for the future. So something as small as a pond of tiny fish has had a big impact on Florence's and her children's lives.

Friday 10th March is Lent Fast Day when we come together to make sacrifices - such as eating a simple lunch or supper - so that our poorest sisters and brothers can live lives free of poverty. So - on Lent Fast Day 2017 please consider your sacrifice and make a donation to support other families so they too can change their lives. Just £4 will buy 100 tiny fish, while £20 will provide the materials to build a pond.

Without your generosity and prayers, the work that CAFOD does to change the lives of thousands of people worldwide, would not be possible.

Apostleship of the Sea (AoS) Felixstowe port chaplain Sister Marian Davey has spoken about her admiration for the faith and dignity of a group of seafarers who lost their colleague after an explosion on board their ship. The Manhattan Bridge ship was berthing at Felixstowe port one Thursday night when the incident occurred, killing a crew member and injuring the second engineer. Sister Marian continues the story: "They're a crew who have a strong bond of relationship and respect for each other. Strong leadership on board was very evident from the captain and his officers - all the crew were trying to help each other to come to terms with all that's happened."


Sister Marian was informed of the incident in the early hours of the morning by the Harbour Master and Port Health and Safety Manager. On hearing the news she travelled immediately from her short break in Manchester to offer assistance to the Filipino crew. She tells us: "They wanted to make sure that the remaining crew got as much support as possible as they all had to cope with a very lengthy process of investigation procedures by both the police and the Marine Accident Investigation Branch throughout the 48 hours the ship was berthed. This meant that I had to snatch slots of time in between to give both one-to-one and collective moments of support. The faith and dignity of the crew was inspirational. I provided moments where they could openly express their grief and shock through tears and words and prayer and silence."

Sister Marian also arranged for Fr John Barnes, Parish Priest of nearby St Felix Church to celebrate Mass on board; it was a great help to the crew who were able to attend and was followed by a blessing of various parts of the ship, including the cabin of the deceased seafarer. "The captain was extremely grateful for the support offered by AoS and to Fr John for celebrating Mass," said Sister Marian, who is still in touch with the crew of the Manhattan Bridge on social media; she added: "I am now focusing the energies of the AoS chaplaincy team on supporting the injured seafarer who is in the Burns Unit at Chelmsford Hospital. He is making good progress and we will continue visiting and supporting him until his repatriation."

On arrival in Hamburg AoS port chaplain Ute Grosse-Harmann and seamen's priest Fr Martin Löwenstein supported the crew. Fr Martin celebrated Mass with them and once again blessed the ship and said a prayer at the spot where the seafarer had died. Counseling was also available to crew members who wanted it.

HCPT Easter Pilgrimage

The 2017 HCPT pilgrimage theme is being coordinated by HCPT's Westcountry Region and is "Come to the Water". From the beginning of the Creation story, throughout the Bible and particularly in the Gospels, the theme of water is very strong; it is no surprise, as water is essential to life on Earth. There are hundreds of references to water in the bible: water in Creation; water in the Flood; water, or lack of it, in the desert Exodus, and the parting of the Red Sea; the restful waters of the psalms; the waters of the Sea of Galilee calmed by Jesus; and the 'water of life' revealed to the Samaritan woman by Christ at Jacob's well. Christ, the 'water of life', the 'living water', is essential for our earthly life, and the heavenly life to come.

The story of the Apparitions of the Blessed Virgin Mary to St Bernadette is strongly influenced by the theme of water and this continues to our days of Pilgrimage in Lourdes where we will taste and feel the waters that still gush forth from the spring revealed to Bernadette by Our Lady on 25th February 1858. Our Lady asked Bernadette to tell people 'to come to the water to drink and wash'. We come to Lourdes 'to drink and wash'.

Great miracles of healing have been attributed to the waters of Lourdes but the greatest miracle is for everyone to experience – the love of God found in pilgrimage at this holy place. Once again in 2017 the HCPT pilgrimage offers the opportunity to celebrate the joy of 'the Risen Lord' as we come together on Easter Day; once again we have the opportunity to encounter God through the life, prayer and liturgies of our days in Lourdes; once again we shall experience the love and joy of God in our fellowship in the presence of the Lord.

The prophet Isaiah tells us: 'Everyone who is thirsty, come to the water' (Isaiah 55:1). We come to Lourdes in answer to that call. The theme of water also plays a huge part in

the life of the Westcountry.

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CribFest across the Diocese -**Epiphany 2017**



Catholic Children's Society (Plymouth) Putting All Children First

A number of parishes held CribFests to celebrate the feast of the Epiphany including St Joseph's Poole; Holy Trinity, Dorchester; The Assumption of Our Lady, Torquay; Holy Angels, Torquay and All Saints Teignmouth. Nativity scenes representing many different communities throughout the world were displayed to help people celebrate the Epiphany.





In Poole, 64 cribs from 13 different countries were displayed and, at The Assumption of Our Lady, (pictured above) Torquay a large number of cribs were also on display (picture right). It was amazing to see the diversity of the cribs, old and new, made from a variety of materials plaster, wood, wool and paper, there were even cribs made from clothes pegs, paper clips and buttons!

The Diocesan CribFest captured the imagination of the parishioners with many parishes saying they want to hold another in 2018. Fr Chris Findlay described the display at Poole as 'inspirational' and in Dorchester one person claimed it to be 'the best Epiphany ever'! Such lovely comments to hear for a feast that is so often 'lost' in the return to work and school after the Christmas holidays. Anita Finnigan from Dorchester added: "We celebrated the Epiphany this year joining in with the Children's Society CribFest. A group of us took our cribs into the church - sixteen in all - and they were all so different: there was a colourful porcelain one; a beautiful home-made one, the Kings particularly looked splendid with their crowns and gifts (picture below); another 'joyful' set of

When children live in poverty it affects them deeply; they are often bullied for being poor and as a consequence can dread going to school, struggle to make friends and fall back in their education. 

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Plymouth Evangelisation Team present work in capital



team member Michele Thompson were recently invited to London to present an outline of the work they have been doing in setting up Parish Evangelisation Teams using a particular method which has borne much fruit. Hosted by The Guild of Our Lady and St Joseph, the seminars entitled 'An Apprenticeship in Discipleship from Programme to Proclamation' were held over two days and took place at St Patrick's Church in Soho and at Ealing Abbey. The seminars were a follow up to a recent visit and presentations by Sherry Weddell author of the book 'Forming Intentional Disciples' which has been used in the Plymouth Diocese. The diocesan team have, for the past 16 months, been using the book as a launch pad in an ongoing process of forming parish evangelisation teams and it seemed to be a natural follow on as Fr Jon and Michele were able to offer a way of narrowing the gap between theory and practice which is a sticking

More than 100 people attended from all over the country and included a mix of Clergy, Religious, Diocesan representatives and lay people. Fr Jon and Michele were delighted to share the comprehensive programme that has evolved through their experience over the past 16 months of encouraging people to grow in a sense of discipleship and be part of practical and proactive evangelisation teamwork. In that short time 38 teams have been formed and more than 470 people have gone through the disciple making programme.

The aims of the initiative are to encourage every person to a personal encounter with Jesus so that discipleship and witnessing to the faith becomes a natural way of life. Whilst this initiative is still very much in its infancy, parishioners who have been involved are, with growing confidence, witnessing to their faith as a normal part of their daily lives; as part of an evangelisation team they are inspired and motivated to maximise opportunities within the parish as well as proactively reaching out to the lapsed and unchurched.

The seminars were broken down into seven 30 minute sections and Fr Jon and Michele were keen to provide a simple and concise format that others would find easy to pick up and follow within their own parish settings: they produced a 40 page manual entitled 'Programme to Proclamation' which delegates were able to take away with them and which offers:

- · Detailed set up and training advice including prayer preparation
- A clear model of how to form and sustain a Parish Evangelisation Team.
- A practical process to enable people to grow in
- · A whole host of ideas that can be implemented with little resource or preparation other than prayer.

"We spent a lot of time in prayer for these events as we knew we needed the power of the Holy Spirit to help us to convey our message in an inspiring and relatable way." said Michele "We wanted the delegates to leave feeling empowered to get started and entirely confident that this work can begin without delay. Being invited to present the

journey that, with the right level of openness and engagement leads to a new found or rediscovered path of discipleship.

"Just like the original disciples, the natural uncomplicated fruits are the desire to evangelise in a way that feels entirely right for each individual and a new or renewed hunger to know more about Jesus through scripture, and our Catholic teachings through catechists and church leaders. We particularly wanted to convey that our work has been borne out of prayer and action and that prayer must saturate our lives and parishes if this work in spreading the Catholic faith is to take root and become natural and accepted for the generations to come. Once we hand over to God and through prayer ask and allow Him, He shows us the way and provides a living apprenticeship where we learn and grow by recognising and responding to the opportunities He puts our way. Through prayer we learn to trust, and in the asking is our commitment to act."

Feedback from the two days has been very encouraging and a number of parishes have already confirmed that they are beginning the programme immediately. Margaret Wickware, President of the Guild of Our Lady and St Joseph, recently remarked: "We were truly delighted to have Fr Jon and Michele with us in London to present the work they have been doing in Plymouth diocese. Over 100 people are now benefitting from their experience and ground work and I am sure that it will be multiples of that number in the weeks and months ahead as evangelisation teams are put in place in parishes in the dioceses Westminster, Southwark, Brentwood, Northampton, Fast Anglia and even further afield in Salford and Leeds. As well, we have received a request for a similar presentation from a Guild member in Shrewsbury Diocese. It was a great blessing, indeed."

FUTURE PLANS

Michele tells us: "In our own diocese the work continues. We still have parishes that for one reason or another have not yet engaged in the programme and we continue to pray that in future months more will take up the opportunity as parish leaders recognise the value of this work. We want to expand and consolidate existing teams and to begin to link parishes through team leaders so that they can share ideas and inspirations, pray together and work through some of the challenges. As our teams grow more confident and become more and more innovative we are receiving requests for training in more practical ways and we are working 1:1 with individuals who request it, to develop the interpersonal and relationship building skills that are so vital to engaging others

RUN TO THE SON

The team are also currently organising a weekend retreat of inspiration and prayer for Mission at Buckfast Abbey. Hosted by the Brothers of the Franciscan of Renewal, 'Run to the Son' will be held over the weekend of 23rd to 25th June. Fr Jon said: "I am delighted that Brother John Bosco

has agreed to lead the input on the weekend as he is completely given to mission and his energy and passion for evangelisation is truly inspiring." He continued: "The weekend will culminate in an allnight vigil of prayer from sunset to sunrise in the Blessed Sacrament chapel, during which there will be a procession of the Blessed Sacrament through the woodlands of the Abbey grounds and Benediction in the especially erected marquee. People will be able to share the experience of watching the iconic stained glass window of Jesus at the last supper come alive as the dawn breaks and the sun begins to rise. Bishop Mark will conclude the weekend with a dawn Mass on Sunday morning. We hope that everyone with a heart for mission from across our diocese and

beyond will come together at this event and through prayer and fellowship, enkindle in each other a fire and zeal that will inspire them to step out confidently in Jesus' name.'

More information and booking details for 'Run to the Son' will be available in parishes and newsletters very soon. The event will be advertised nationwide and numbers are limited so please make your booking early.

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News from around the diocese ...

Cornwall Deanery

Parish of St Mary, Falmouth (with Helston, Mullion and Mawnan Smith)

Ben Davis RIP

Ben Davis died in January 2017 aged 87; he was a wellknown and much loved and respected



parishioner of St Mary's, Falmouth and will be greatly missed. Ben was the brother of Canon A Bede Davis, former Parish Priest at Falmouth, who died in June 2006. Ben and his family moved from London to Falmouth in the 1950s and entered the building trade. He was a very devout man and his life revolved around his family, his church and music - he was well known in the Cornwall Deanery for his musical skills. Every year Ben attended the music school of the Society of St Gregory of which his father was a founder member. Both Canon Bede and Ben were members of the Putney Boys' Choir and, when his father

died, Ben took over as Choirmaster at St Mary's with his wife Jenny as organist accompanying the choir and the congregation for many years.

He was also involved in a number of societies within the parish. Simon Giarchi, CAFOD representative for Plymouth Diocese said of Ben: "he was a truly inspirational man who made a difference in his parish community and to people in many parts of the world; CAFOD is grateful for his contribution to and involvement with our organisation. Ben was also active in the Society of St Vincent de Paul including supervising the distribution of food from the 'Lord's Pantry' every Sunday to the local food bank; working with: the Men's Hostel; the project for those with mental health difficulties; and with St Petroc's. His faith was the cornerstone of his life and one of the ways he shared his faith with

others was by meticulously keeping the CTS Display up-to-date.

Being in the building trade meant that he was knowledgeable about any problems with the fabric of the church and, if anything went wrong, the immediate solution was to ask him for advice.

In the last months of his illness Ben was cared for most lovingly by his wife Jenny and by the local NHS. He would say to the NHS staff: "I give you 100% for your care - and 110% to Jenny for her care!!"

Our sympathy and love are extended to his wife Jenny, their children and grandchildren and to his sister Barbara.

May he rest in peace.

The Religious Heritage of **North and East Cornwall** Author: Rev Fr David Annear

Fr David writes: "This latest slim volume of mine is rather more general in scope than my previous efforts. In just over seventy pages it describes the religious landscape and heritage of North and East Cornwall, from quoits and menhirs to converted Methodist chapels. There are brief background



descriptions among other things, the Celtic Church, the Reformation Cornwall and the various Christian revivals which have left their visible presence today. The text is illustrated with more than a hundred photos and drawings.

My main aim is to explain our religious heritage to my parishioners, but anyone who loves Cornwall will, I hope, find this little book a helpful guide."

Holy Trinity, Dorchester The Reredos, Holy Trinity



Fr Barry Hallett gave an interesting talk to parishioners recently on the beautiful Reredos, a dominant feature at the front of our church. It was something he remembered, together with the onyx marble altar, from his time as a deacon many years ago. The parish inherited the Reredos when the building was acquired from the Church of England in May The Reredos was carved at Oberammergau and installed in the church in 1897. Depicted in the centre panel is the Crucifixion. On the left is a panel showing the appearance of Christ to Mary Magdalene in the garden, Our Lord holding the flag as the symbol of his triumph over death. In the right-hand panel is the appearance of the risen Lord at Emmaus as he reveals his identity in the breaking of bread.

Figures of St Peter and St Paul stand on either side of the Reredos, Peter bearing the keys of the Kingdom and Paul the sword of his martyrdom and the scroll of his Epistles. Below are painted representations of nine saints many of them local saints.

VOCES Concert



In the Christian calendar, March sees the beginning of Lent - and the first concert of 2017 by the choir VOCES and its Director Martyn Warren, specialists in early choral music. The concert, which takes place at Buckfast Abbey on the evening of Saturday 11th March, will focus on settings of the seven so-called 'penitential psalms', which inspired some of the most beautiful and soulful music of the 16th and 17th centuries. In each, the psalmist laments his own sins of thought, word and deed, before expressing hope in God's help and forgiveness. This makes the psalms particularly appropriate for personal meditation during times of penitence, and for centuries they have been strongly identified with the season of Lent.

The centrepiece of the evening is a superb setting for five voices by Orlando Lassus of the seventh psalm, Domine Exaudi Orationem Meam (Hear my prayer, O Lord). The concert will also include the first part of a Miserere (Have mercy on me, O God) by the Flemish master Josquin des Pres, a version of Domine, ne in furore tuo (O Lord, rebuke me not in thine anger) by Monteverdi, and other works by Byrd, Grandi and Giovanni Gabrieli. From the 20th century, but complementary to the earlier works, is a setting for seven voices of De profundis (Out of the depths I have called to you, O Lord) by the Italian composer Pizzetti.

Domenico Gioffré, Deputy Master of the Music at the Abbey, will play organ works based on the penitential psalms.

The concert starts at 7.30pm; entry is free, with a retiring collection. The Grange Restaurant at Buckfast Abbey will be open from 6pm, and a pre-concert two-course fine-dining menu can be booked for $\mathfrak{L}19.75$, including a glass of wine. 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

Foundations in the Faith for the New Evangelisation

The programme will take place at St Cuthbert's Conference Centre and began on Saturday 25th February 2017.



A Call to Action (ACTA) Misericordia et misera or Mercy and misery

The title of Pope Francis' latest apostolic letter is taken from St Augustine's account of Jesus' meeting with the woman taken in adultery. The letter is a confirmation that, following on from the Holy Year, mercy, 'must continue to be celebrated and lived in our communities.'

The letter contains several practical suggestions for parish action over the next few months, including devoting a Sunday 'given over entirely to the word of God' - a repeat of the Holy Year initiative to give '24 hours to the Lord' and a celebration to be held in proximity to the 4th Sunday of Lent. There is also a new proposal that: 'the entire Church might celebrate on 19th November 2017 - the 33rd Sunday of Ordinary Time - a World Day of the Poor.'

The over-riding theme though, the BIG idea, is one of continuing to demonstrate God's love and follow the example of Jesus, this is clearly at the heart of the Pope's ministry, and can be seen throughout the letter, for example: "God's love must take primacy over all else." "None of us has the right to make forgiveness conditional;" "God places no roadblocks in the way of those who seek him with a contrite heart;" "It is time to look to the future and to understand how best to

continue with joy, fidelity and enthusiasm, experiencing the richness of God's mercy."

The full text is available on the Vatican website. It is a call to each one of us to continue to grow in our understanding of what it means to be a follower of Christ.

Formation for the New Evangelisation

In forming adult catholics for the third millennium, the last three Popes have made it clear that the context is now the New Evangelisation, a context markedly different from the previous century and needing new methods and new vigour to deliver the Good News of Jesus Christ, Son of God and Saviour, a message 'forever ancient and forever new'.

This formation is for all adult catholics, especially those who support parish life in its richness and sacredness, its fellowship, prayer and charity. It is for parents, grandparents and catechists, for readers and those involved in Children's liturgy, for anyone keen to know and appreciate the faith of the Church more deeply and be better equipped to defend it and pass it on.

The School of the Annunciation, a centre for the New Evangelisation, is situated at Buckfast Abbey, Devon, with satellite centres at Ealing Abbey, Nelson in Lancashire, Southwark and other centres being developed around the UK. The context of the two Benedictine monastic communities has prompted the development of the programme within the Benedictine Tradition as a spiritual home that is already nourishing the new evangelisation by its hospitality and daily rhythm of prayer in the liturgy of the hours.

This programme is developed and lead by a strong catechetical team, steeped in the Church's catechetical documents especially the Catechism of the Catholic Church, and many priests will also be involved in lecturing.

Centenary Celebrations for Our Lady of Fatima

One hundred years ago, from May to October 1917, Our Lady appeared to three young shepherd children, Jacinta and Francisco Marto, and Lucia dos Santos, at Fatima in Portugal. In the centenary year the World Apostolate of Fatima (WAF) in England and Wales will be promoting the Centenary of the Fatima apparitions through a programme of visitations to Cathedrals by the National Pilgrim Virgin Statue of Our Lady of Fatima, and Relics of Blessed Jacinta and Francisco. The programme began with a visitation of the statue and relics to Westminster Cathedral on Saturday 18th February 2017, when Cardinal Vincent Nichols crowned the statue, presided at Mass and re-consecrated England to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The programme continues through to October with visits to 18 of the Cathedrals in England and Wales, including Plymouth Cathedral from 24th to 25th June.

The work of the WAF involves promoting the message that Our Lady gave at Fatima, when she spoke of the necessity of personal conversion, penance, and prayer, and particularly the importance of praying the Rosary for peace. She also asked for the Five First Saturdays devotion of reparation and the consecration of Russia, and promised that in the end her Immaculate Heart would triumph and a period of peace would be given to the world. The international WAF was officially approved by the Church as a 'Public Association of the Faithful of Pontifical Right' in October 2010

The Fatima message is more relevant than ever today, especially for the family. Pope St John Paul II said that the Church accepted the message of Fatima because it repeats Our Lord's call: "Repent and believe in the Gospel" (Mk 1: 15); and, after the beatification of Francisco and Jacinta on 13 May 2000, he said: "it is a message of conversion and hope which is the true Gospel of Christ".

In 2006, Pope Benedict XVI expressed the hope: "that the message of Fatima will be increasingly accepted, understood and lived in every community." And Pope Francis too, has been very supportive of Fatima, and is due to visit the Shrine in May 2017.

A special Centenary Crown is being made in Portugal for the National Pilgrim Virgin Statue of Our Lady of Fatima and will accompany the statue as it journeys around England and Wales being used to crown it during the visitations.

Pope Francis has granted a special Fatima Centenary Plenary Indulgence, under the usual conditions, from 27 November 2016 to 26 November 2017, for those who go on Pilgrimage to the Sanctuary of Fatima, or visit an image of Our Lady of Fatima which is being publicly venerated on the 13th of each month from May to October 2017. Those who cannot travel can fulfil the conditions in front of a small image of Our Lady of Fatima.

The Pope's initiative prompts the question: do I know what Our Lady asked of me at Fatima, and am I complying with her requests? The new CTS booklet, Message and Prayers of Fatima and also Sister Lucia's Memoirs: Fatima in Lucia's own words, vol. 1 (also

available from the CTS) will help us to respond to these questions.

The centenary year is important since it offers the Church a chance to look again at the message of Fatima, which is really a compendium of the Gospel for our times, and realise that the Fatima message and the Rosary are powerful weapons against secularism. modern The most important thing is not to let the centenary go by without doing something to deepen one's knowledge Fatima More information about the World Apostolate of Fatima and the Message of Fatima can be found on the website of the WAF International Secretariat. www.worldfatima.com. Joan comes from Lancashire and was a nurse in her early days. She has been a proud member of the Catholic Women's League for 40 years, it is part of her faith and she values the comradery and friendships.

Fundraising, trips and retreats keep her active and involved. Ron and Joan moved to Devon for Ron's job with a silicon chip company but he is a



Cornishman, and proud of it. From their apartment they can see the River Tamar as it enters Plymouth Sound - the best of both worlds, living in Devon and looking at Cornwall!


freedom our new life gives us and enjoy the support which makes our life easier. It's also lovely just to sit in the lounge or conservatory where the staff will bring you a cup of tea."
