

Enter into your Inner Room: A Lenten Invitation from Bishop Mark

In the passage of St Matthew's Gospel that we hear at the beginning of Lent, Jesus invites us "to go into your inner room" and in that place to carry out the tasks of prayer, almsgiving and fasting. It is St Ambrose, the great Bishop of Milan, who gives us the insight into what the Lord means by this 'inner room', when he says: "Do not imagine that this is a room in your house made of brick and wood, but rather that room which is

within you, and is with you at all times." I suppose nowadays, we might call that room, our heart, or the seat of our personality, the place where our dreams, hopes, wounds and hurts are stored up.

During Lent, Jesus invites us to visit our inner heart regularly. All that we do externally in fasting, in being good to those in need and in deepening our prayer life, has as its origin and goal, the reality of the God who abides in this inner room within us. The journey of Lent is to make our way there and to discover anew the Lord who has made his home within us.

I hope that this Lent, all of us will become increasingly aware of this 'interior' life, so that we can assist others in coming to know Jesus within their own hearts, too. I pray that your journey to your own heart is richly blessed and bears much



fruit in your own life, and in the service of those around you. Throughout Lent, let us continue to pray for one another on this journey 'within'.

This formation is for all adult catholics, especially those who support parish life in its richness and sacredness, its fellowship, prayer and charity. It is for parents, grandparents and catechists, for readers and those involved in Children's liturgy, for anyone keen to know and appreciate the faith of the Church more deeply and be better equipped to defend it and pass

The School of the Annunciation, a centre for the New Evangelisation, is situated at Buckfast Abbey, Devon, with satellite centres at Ealing Abbey, Nelson in Lancashire, Southwark and other centres being developed around the UK. The context of the two Benedictine monastic communities has prompted the development of the programme within the Benedictine Tradition as a spiritual home that is already nourishing the new evangelisation by its hospitality and daily rhythm of prayer in the liturgy of the hours.

This programme is developed and lead by a strong catechetical team, steeped in the

Church's catechetical documents especially the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, and many priests will also be involved in lecturing.

Our Bristol port chaplain Fr Noel Mullin was recently alerted to the presence of an injured seafarer in hospital in Bristol by AoS in Plymouth. An accident had occurred on board a general cargo ship off Plymouth, leaving a crew member injured. After being brought ashore, the seafarer was transferred to Bristol for treatment.

AoS Bristol was able to visit the seafarer in hospital and offer support before the man was discharged and repatriated. They brought him small gifts of fruit, cake and toothpaste and also contact information. He was discharged from hospital to be taken directly to the airport for a flight home not long afterwards. Well done Fr Noel and our AoS Bristol and AoS Plymouth teams!

Send a Seafarer a card this Easter

Martin Foley, AoS GB national director, explains how you can get involved in a new scheme to support isolated seafarers at sea. One of the hardest things seafarers face when they go to sea is having to cope with long periods of isolation and loneliness. Spending months at sea on a ship with few colleagues to talk to, and being in the middle of the ocean, hundreds or thousands of miles from land, can be a very isolating and stressful experience. Most of us get to see our family and close friends regularly.

But for seafarers, with nine-month contracts common on many ships, this isn't the case. They accept this sacrifice stoically, as going to sea is often the only way to earn enough money to support their families, who are often in poorer parts of the world, such as the Philippines, India, or Ukraine.

Few ships have internet access, despite ongoing improvements, and using a satellite phone is very expensive. That's why when AoS port chaplains go on board a ship they always carry a supply of mobile phone Sim cards and portable mi fi units to provide free access to the internet on board.

And nowadays ships go to sea with a very small crew. For example, the largest British-registered ship, the CMA GCM Kerguelen, which can carry 17,000 containers and is the length of four football pitches, only has 26 crew members.

Rev Roger Stone, AoS port chaplain in Southampton, said many seafarers talk to him about feeling lonely on long voyages: "Seafarers work closely with the same people for a long time, eat in the same place, sit opposite the same person every meal time." A small crew has serious implications for seafarers, he explained: "The smaller the crew, the less variety seafarers have in their workplace. All it takes is for one awkward or difficult character and the atmosphere changes for the worse. The fact that a crew is usually made up of seafarers from different



countries can also affect conditions on board. Sometimes there are culture clashes which can lead to isolation for seafarers. This applies as much to senior officers as it does to junior seafarers. Smaller crews mean it's even more difficult to go ashore and 'be normal' if only for an hour or two."

This is why AoS has launched a scheme to support seafarers who are isolated and feel lonely. Would you, our supporters send Mass cards or Easter cards with this simple message: You are in our prayers. All you have to do is send the card to us at our office in London (Apostleship of the Sea, 39 Eccleston Square, London, SW1V 1BX. Then, through our Port Chaplains, we will arrange for the card to be sent to a particular seafarer. We believe such a simple gesture can go a towards making seafarers feel they are not forgotten and, just as importantly, give them encouragement in doing one of the most difficult and important jobs in the world.

We have so much to thank seafarers for and a simple card can be a source of great strength and consolation.

HCPT The Pilgrimage Trust

The 2017 HCPT pilgrimage theme is being coordinated by HCPT's Westcountry Region and is "Come to the Water". From the beginning of the Creation story, throughout the Bible and particularly in the Gospels, the theme of water is very strong; it is no surprise, as water is essential to life on Earth. There are hundreds of references to water in the bible: water in Creation; water in the Flood; water, or lack of it, in the desert Exodus, and the parting of the Red Sea; the restful waters of the psalms; the waters of the Sea of Galilee calmed by Jesus; and the 'water of life' revealed to the Samaritan woman by Christ at Jacob's well. Christ, the 'water of life', the 'living water', is essential for our earthly life, and the heavenly life to come.

The story of the Apparitions of the Blessed Virgin Mary to St Bernadette is strongly influenced by the theme of water and this continues to our days of Pilgrimage in Lourdes where we will taste and feel the waters that still gush forth from the spring revealed to Bernadette by Our Lady on 25th February 1858. Our Lady asked Bernadette to tell people 'to come to the water to drink and wash'. We come to Lourdes 'to drink and wash'.

Great miracles of healing have been attributed to the waters of Lourdes but the greatest miracle is for everyone to experience – the love of God found in pilgrimage at this holy place. Once again in 2017 the HCPT pilgrimage offers the opportunity to celebrate the joy of 'the Risen Lord' as we come together on Easter Day; once again we have the opportunity to encounter God through the life, prayer and liturgies of our days in Lourdes; once again we shall experience the love and joy of God in our fellowship in the presence of the Lord.

A Summer Pilgrimage to Lourdes with HCPT

HCPT is a charity offering pilgrimage holidays to Lourdes in the south of France, for helpers and disabled and disadvantaged people from around the UK and further afield. The trust was formed in 1956 after a young doctor, Michael Strode, first took four disabled children on a pilgrimage holiday to Lourdes where the Virgin Mary appeared to a young peasant girl, Bernadette Soubirous, on a total of eighteen occasions in 1858. Subsequently Lourdes has become a major place of Roman Catholic pilgrimage and miraculous healings. Now every year, over 2,000 special needs children enjoy the Trust's Easter pilgrimage staying in hotels with their volunteer helpers. Each summer over 1,500 adults, many of whom are disabled or with health problems, enjoy a week at HCPT's Hosanna House, which is in a stunning location overlooking the foothills of the beautiful Pyrenees, close to the village of Bartrès just outside Lourdes

In the Westcountry Region, which coincides with the diocese of Plymouth, there are 2 Summer HCPT Lourdes Groups known as Group 539 based in Torbay and 579 in the South Hams. Group 539 was founded by the late Dr Michael Everitt in 1980 and has over a period of 37 years taken approximately 1,500 Summer Pilgrims to Lourdes. Next September, Liz Bettesworth, for the 7th year running, will be leading the 539 Group of about 40 on their Rieunier, as Spiritual Leader, together with a Doctor, a nurse and an array of young (18 upwards) and not so young Helpers and Guests. The trip, labelled "a holiday with Our Lady," will be a balance of spirituality and fun. Visits to the Grotto, attending the International Mass and the Torchlight Processions are always favourite events as is the Blessed Sacrament Procession. There are other trips too into town and the day excursion to Gavarnie high in the Pyrenean Mountains is awe inspiring.

During the week of the pilgrimage Hosanna House becomes a home away from home with intimate Masses and prayers in the lovely chapel. The House has been adapted for those with special needs; the accommodation is excellent and the food delicious. There is plenty of time to relax and enjoy the company and the scenery. The themed party on the final night is always great fun with some superb fancy dress costumes on show as well as some talented entertainers. 
Cornish writings


My main aim is to explain

The inspection, which was carried out on 7th and 8th February 2017, found that teaching, learning and assessment in the school is good with pupils making good progress overall in English and

Inspectors praised the school leadership team stating that the headteacher, senior leaders and governors have a clear view of the school's strengths and areas for development. This latest Ofsted report states: "In the early years, leadership 'is good and teachers have high expectations and a thorough knowledge of each child's individual needs and interests, as a result, children make good progress."

We are so grateful, as always, for this kind support and are delighted all the hard work has been recognised and named in this report. All at OLSP truly believe our school can now build on the areas for improvement within this report, move from strength to strength; Living, Loving and Learning Together in God's Way."

Chair of the governors Pat Anzani adds: "I am delighted that the hard work, dedication and care shown by all who are involved in the life of the school is recognised in the report. We will continue to grow as a community, building on the strengths, continually improving and providing children with an education within a Christian learning environment."

This is the first Ofsted inspection of Our Lady & St Patrick's RC Primary School since it became part of the Plymouth Catholic Anglican Schools Trust (CAST) and became an academy on 1st April 2014. When OLSP was previously inspected, before becoming an academy, it was judged to be inadequate overall.


RUN TO THE SUN



Folklore Egg-stravaganza! ...

I'm often surprised by the ways in which children interpret what we say to them, often taking things quite literally. To give a quick example: on a rural Welsh farmhouse holiday many years ago, I happened to mention to my four-year-old son that the cows in the fields adjoining the farmhouse, would get soaked in the torrential rain we were experiencing, (sounds familiar?) To my great amusement, he appeared five minutes later with a bath towel "...to dry the poor cows with," he said.

PURE FANTASY

And we rarely hesitate in passing on some child-friendly folklore to our offspring either. The most obvious of these is, of course, the tradition of Santa Claus. While 'Santa' derived from Saint Nicholas, a fourth century Greek bishop, the notion of bringing gifts to every child in the world – provided they have been 'good' throughout the year – remains pure fantasy. And we don't just stop there. There's also the Tooth Fairy – a mythical creature who replaces lost baby teeth with a small payment. And finally the Easter Bunny – a folklore figure who provides children with Easter Eggs, depending upon how well behaved they have been at the beginning of Eastertide! In fact, one of my young nephews was so enraptured by the Easter Bunny that his enthusiasm knew no bounds. Having been promised by his parents that this generous creature would impart gifts of yummy chocolate eggs the next day, he crept downstairs after his parents were tucked up in bed and left a dish of carrots by the front door as a token if his appreciation!

SALVATION


Of course, a little fantasy in our often dark world can be enlivening and humorous. However, as we approach Easter this year, we know that there is a far more important person and event to be both recalled and conveyed to our children – and to our brothers and sisters in Christ. Jesus died on the Cross to atone for our sins and continues to be with each and every one of us until the end of time. Christ's resurrection from the dead banished death for ever, giving mankind hope for the future in life everlasting. In short, Christ is our salvation.

THE SWEETNESS OF CHRIST

Both Santa Claus and the Easter Bunny offer gifts on the condition that children have been 'good' and both remain fictitious. Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the other hand, loves each one of us unconditionally, awards us our own God-given gifts and welcomes us with open arms even when, as fallible humans, we find it hard to be 'good'. Unlike such fictional characters, documentary evidence provides veracity for the historical Jesus. Yet more importantly, our hearts and souls clearly reveal God's eternal presence to us, as we instinctively yearn to become ever closer to him. Easter is a wonderful time of the year for adults and children alike. May your children celebrate with chocolate eggs and the sweetness of Christ. One is a 'quick fix' – the other will last forever.



Fatima Centenary Celebrations

This is the Centenary year of the Fatima apparitions which took place between May and October 1917, when Our Lady appeared to Jacinta and Francisco Marto, who were beatified in May 2000, and Lucia dos Santos, who died in 2005. The National Pilgrim Virgin statue and relics of Blessed Jacinta and Francisco Marto, will be visiting Plymouth Cathedral from 24-25 June 2017.

The programme for the World Apostolate of Fatima (WAF) National Pilgrim Virgin statue's Visitations to the Cathedrals of England and Wales began on Saturday 18th February, when Cardinal Nichols received, blessed and crowned the Statue in Westminster Cathedral. It was a wonderful day, and although the Cathedral was filled to capacity with many people left outside in the plaza, everyone was kind and gracious, and there was a palpable sense of joy.

At Westminster, the Cardinal said Mass, and consecrated England and Wales to the Immaculate Heart of Mary in an act which included these words: "To you and your Immaculate Heart, in this centenary year of the apparitions at Fatima, we re-consecrate ourselves in union not only with the Church, the Mystical Body of your Son, but also with the entire world."

In his homily Cardinal Nichols said: "I pray that the pilgrimage of this statue of Our Lady of Fatima, on its journey round the cathedrals of Wales, will be a time of grace for many, as they honour Our Lady of Fatima in this year." He also emphasised the importance of

the Rosary and praying it in the family, which he recalled doing as a child. After Mass, crowds of people waited venerate the relics Blessed Jacinta

and Francisco Marto and pray before the Statue of Our Lady, where she received over 2500 petitions that will be placed under her statue in the Capelinha at


