Step into the GAP: Why partnership is the key to building change in rural communities in Cambodia

James Ronan from Our Lady of the Assumption Parish, Tavistock and who took part in CAFOD's Step into the Gap, reports about his time in Cambodia earlier this year. He tells us why partnership is the key driver for change and how this CAFOD value is put into practice in rural communities in Cambodia. James continues the story: "CAFOD has seven values that inspires the work that they carry out across the world these are compassion, hope, dignity, solidarity, partnership, sustainability and stewardship. During our two and half weeks in Cambodia one of the things that particularly struck me was the sense of community and partnership in every village community we spent time with.

For me partnership was a key CAFOD value that we all saw in practice over the few weeks we spent in Cambodia. Partnership comes from the call of our Christian faith to work together building the links between the communities CAFOD works with across the world, with the Catholic community here in England and Wales working together to help build God's kingdom here on earth.

In our first week of our visit we spent time with CAFOD partner Village Support Group (VSG) working in the village of Ou Breus in Battambang. We saw the community linkages and partnerships that had already been established and took part in a committee meeting listening to the community who were putting the support of CAFOD into practice.

We heard how the community committee was very thankful for CAFOD's support in their three year project "Water Saves Lives" helping to support in providing access to clean water and education in hygiene to avoid disease. Tuc Nang the community leader said to us: "I am happy and hopeful for the future livelihoods of people in the village, and the community was very happy to have learnt water management skills and water resource management." He ended our time spent with the committee by saying: "the community liked CAFOD's grass roots local level approach of partnership in supporting the community over the next three years." It was such a thankful statement, a testament about the way CAFOD works as an organisation and all the committees we met during our visit in Cambodia all said the same thing.

In the second week we witnessed the community partnerships between CAFOD's partner Srer Khmer and village communities. The project in these communities is socio-economic empowerment enabling women, men and children to make changes in their villages. We saw a woman's cooking demonstration in Tipadey village supported by CAFOD, these

demonstrations occur once a month in the community. The sharing of advice on using more vegetables in meals (in Cambodia many rural families do not eat the daily recommended amount of fruit and vegetables) have really helped families eat healthier. Alongside this there was also a focus on hygiene education the washing of hands before and after meals.

In Tipadey village I also had the privilege of meeting one of the members of CAFOD's partnership programme Connect 2, Dos Ia and his family. Connect 2 in Cambodia is a fairly recent expansion of CAFOD's parish partnership programme. This programme is about sharing. Sharing the monumental fundraising work conducted by parishioners in England and Wales with village communities in Cambodia and Cambodian communities sharing their stories and the impact of CAFOD's work back with those in the UK.

The programme of Connect 2 for me encompasses all of CAFOD's values. Compassion (through wanting to help our global brothers and sisters), hope (sharing hope for

Catholic Children's Society Grants

When children live in poverty it affects them deeply; they are often bullied for being poor and as a consequence can dread going to school, struggle to make friends and fall back in their education. In the last two months, sixteen families have received assistance from the Catholic Children's Society: beds, cookers and school uniform were just some of the items funded, items that parents and carers couldn't otherwise afford for their children. Some families were refugees, or fleeing abuse; some had health issues and some were working families struggling unable to survive on a low income. Each case was different but each involved a child suffering through no fault of their own.

The Society aims to alleviate some of the hardships families are experiencing to enable parents to provide their children with security, warmth and a hot meal everyday so that their children can thrive, develop at school and have a better start in life. AoS supports crew of holed ship



Apostleship of the Sea (AoS) visited the crew of a ship after the vessel sustained a hole in its side. The incident occurred on March 25 while the ship was leaving its berth in Southampton port in Hampshire. Fortunately no one was injured.

AoS Southampton assistant port chaplain Peter Morgan had visited the ship's crew several times while the vessel was working in port. He went on board the ship again to find out how the crew were after hearing about the incident, he said: "*The crew are upbeat and I am in regular contact with a few of them via Facebook. We are ensuring that the crew can communicate with their families while they wait for repair work to be completed.*" Peter added that AoS will continue to visit the ship whilst it is still in port to support the crew.

Last year AoS port chaplains in the South Coast of England visited 1,211 ships and provided seafarers with faith, pastoral and practical support. This included celebrating Mass on board 13 ships and providing seafarers with faith needs on 540 ships.

A Summer Pilgrimage to Lourdes with HCPT

HCPT is a charity offering pilgrimage holidays to Lourdes in the south of France, for helpers and disabled and disadvantaged people from around the UK and further afield. The trust was formed in 1956 after a young doctor, Michael Strode, first took four disabled children on a pilgrimage holiday to Lourdes where the Virgin Mary appeared to a young peasant girl, Bernadette Soubirous, on a total of eighteen occasions in 1858. Subsequently Lourdes has become a major place of Roman Catholic pilgrimage and miraculous healings. Now every year, over 2,000 special needs children enjoy the Trust's Easter pilgrimage staying in hotels with their volunteer helpers. Each summer over 1,500 adults, many of whom are disabled or with health problems, enjoy a week at HCPT's Hosanna House, which is in a stunning location overlooking the foothills of the beautiful Pyrenees, close to the village of Bartrès just outside Lourdes

In the Westcountry Region, which coincides with the diocese of Plymouth, there are 2 Summer HCPT Lourdes Groups known as Group 539 based in Torbay and 579 in the South Hams. Group 539 was founded by the late Dr Michael Everitt in 1980 and has over a period of 37 years taken approximately 1,500 Summer Pilgrims to Lourdes. Next September, Liz Bettesworth, for the 7th year running, will be leading the 539 Group of about 40 on their Annual Pilgrimage. The members will include Fr Louis Rieunier, as Spiritual Leader, together with a Doctor, a nurse and an array of young (18 upwards) and not so young Helpers and Guests. The trip, labelled "a holiday with Our Lady," will be a balance of spirituality and fun. Visits to the Grotto, attending the International Mass and the Torchlight Processions are always favourite events as is the Blessed Sacrament Procession. There are other trips too into town and the day excursion to Gavarnie high in the Pyrenean

Mountains is awe inspiring.

During the week of the pilgrimage Hosanna House becomes a home away from home with intimate Masses and prayers in the lovely chapel. The House has been adapted for those with special needs; the accommodation is excellent and the food delicious. There is plenty of time to relax and enjoy the company and the scenery. The themed party on the final night is always great fun with some superb fancy dress costumes on show as well as some talented entertainers. PARISHES FOR PEACE

Enabling UK parishes to support Christian refugees in Jordan CIO registered charity 1166739

This Holy Week, a young man about to enter Wonersh seminary in September, flew out to Jordan carrying £10,000 in dinars and sterling for the Iraqi Christian refugees. He was travelling for Parishes for Peace to distribute the Easter donations directly to the parishes in Jordan where they are being supported and cared for.

Gustavo Campanello, Gus, will train for the priesthood for the Diocese of Arundel and Brighton. He is an experienced Teacher of English as a Second Language (TESOL) and when he heard what Parishes for Peace are doing to link parishes in the UK with those in Jordan he asked if he could Gus was particularly interested in the help. 'English for Life' programme Parishes for Peace has set up in Jordan and he will spend the next three months consolidating the programme.

The refugees supported by Parishes for Peace are in four main parishes - two in Amman, one in Madaba and one in Zarqa. Altogether we sent money from Plymouth Diocese and Arundel & Brighton for 224 persons in 66 families. Everything was in named envelopes including an Easter card from the linked English parishes. In addition to money for food, money was given separately for the Beautiful Woman scheme (for women for their

personal needs), money for the priests for their own funds to help the refugees, for transport, for help towards an operation, the English teacher's salary and a printer for the English school.

At the English end parishes choose to support refugees in different areas, so they can build a relationship with them and make it as personal as possible. After Gus' visit in Holy Week Fr Hanna Kildani wrote to us, he said: "I got many envelopes, to me, Sister Sara and Iraqis in Ashrafieeh, and more I came to know this wonderful man Gustavo... Sure in these envelopes there are donations, gift, money, thank you, but there is more; faith, love and Christian families and Parishes for Peace engaged to help needy people who are our brothers and sisters from Iraq. Thank you on behalf of them... I started a new project to let Iraqi families make rosaries (using a part of your

donation and other donations), and I buy the rosaries to generate income for these families... Iraqis are happy to do these rosaries, they feel useful and partners with my parish ...

This time from Plymouth Diocese, the money raised by private donations and concerts given by the Cornwall Choir in Camborne and St Austell, supported the refugees in Amman at Marj al Hamam. The funds raised by Sclerder, Liskeard and private donations looked after the refugees in Ashrafiyeh. From Arundel & Brighton Diocese, Weybridge parish supported Zarqa, and Caterham parish supported Madaba.

About 15% of families each year in the last two years have been granted visas for Australia. More Iraqis are however still arriving because the conditions in Erbil in Iraq are so terrible. They have hope that one day they too will get to Australia.

Those who remain in Jordan have been there for up to two and a half years - living in uncertainty, not knowing when and if Australia will take them. These are the ones we are helping to care for and keep up their morale.

Parishes for Peace tries to send someone every month or two to see the refugees and keep up the contact and friendship. There is a constant stream of messages flowing back and forth via Messenger and WhatsApp as well as emails with the priests. Some background information: A decade ago 35,000 Christians lived in Mosul in Iraq, opposite the ruins of Nineveh beside the river Tigris. In 2013 there were 3,000. The day ISIL took over in August 2014 all were either killed or fled.



'Beautiful Women'

Less is known internationally of the 50,000 Iraqi refugees in Jordan who fled in recent years many of whom are Christian. The targeted persecution of the Christians in 2014 by ISIS was primarily against the Latin Catholic and Chaldean community - the oldest, earliest churches in Christendom.

Chemin Neuf Community, Sclerder Abbey

Since August 2014, the Chemin Neuf Community has established itself within Sclerder Abbey which was steeped in prayers for more than a century by Poor Clare and Carmelite Sisters. The Chemin Neuf Community, born in France in 1973 and founded by Father Laurent Fabre SJ, was called to Cornwall by the former Bishop of Plymouth, the Rt Rev Christopher Budd, Bishop Emeritus. Chemin Neuf is a Catholic Community composed of members from many different walks of life including couples, singles, priests, consecrated brothers and sisters of different Christian denominations Catholics, Protestants, Orthodoxes.

Nowadays, whilst respecting the vocation of this 'Thin place', Chemin Neuf has undertaken improvements to the buildings in order to welcome guests for an authentic Christian experience of prayer and Community life. The grounds and gardens of the Abbey provide a peaceful atmosphere where everybody feels safe and at home. The simplicity and natural way of life brings a sense of belonging to the universal family under one God, Our Father. This year, for the first time, Chemin Neuf will welcome a **FAMILY FESTIVAL** on the theme of 'Home - Home is a place where the heart is' on **Saturday the 19th of August from 10am to 10pm**. This day is organised in collaboration with the Catholic Diocese of Plymouth, The Anglican Diocese of Truro and Churches Together Cornwall. All of this will be possible with the help of volunteers coming from different



Churches, who are already working together for this day.

The Adjudicators, headed by Dame Annette Brooke DBE, Garry Hill and David Cawdery, had a very difficult task in selecting the winners. Dame Annette paid tribute to the speakers and their teachers. Drawing from her own academic experience she said she was very impressed by both the scope and depth of the speech content; she also offered some tips and hints about the importance of presentation. And, paid tribute to the Catenian Association as event organisers complimenting them on recognising that public speaking is a vital life skill.

Wouldn't it be great if saints were on Facebook? Just a bit tricky though when they're no longer alive ... But Saint Bridget of Sweden, who died on 23rd July 1373, is about to join this popular social medium. Members of a new group - St Bridget's Friends - will be able to offer prayers for those who have died and invite others to do so as well

St Bridget founded her religious Order of The Most Holy Saviour - the Bridgettines - in the fourteenth century. Yet she remains a model of sanctity and an example for men and women to follow even today.

The original English community of Bridgettines was founded by King Henry V at Syon Abbey, near London in 1415. A principal task of the Sisters of Syon - as set out in King Henry's original Charter was to pray in perpetuity for the Holy Souls in

Appropriately, on 5th May, the feast of Saint Richard Reynolds - a Bridgettine martyr - the new, closed Facebook group will be launched.

This is not just for those in religious communities but for Christians of any tradition, world-wide, men and women alike, to become the living friends of the poor souls who have died. The Facebook group, which is free to use and join, will also serve the growing international interest in Saint Bridget and encourage the use of the beautiful Syon Breviary. It is hoped that this group will become an online international Bridgettine community in the manner of a lay apostolate.

And for their daily prayers there is now The Syon Breviary - the Daily Office of Our Lady - which has been translated from the original Latin and commemorates 600 years of the English Bridgettine community of Syon Abbey.

Saint Richard Reynolds, a Bridgettine monk of Syon Abbey, is believed to have been from Pinhoe, near Exeter. His feast day will be celebrated on Friday, 5th May, 2017 at Blessed Sacrament Church, Heavitree, Exeter with Mass at 9:30am followed by refreshments in the Richard Reynolds Centre next to the church. Fatima Centenary Celebrations -Pilgrim Virgin statue coming to Plymouth Cathedral from 24-25 June 2017



there was a palpable sense of joy The National Pilgrim Virgin statue and relics of Blessed Jacinta and Francisco Marto, will be visiting Plymouth Cathedral from 24-25 June 2017. Please note those dates in your diary.

This is the Centenary year of the Fatima apparitions which took place between May and October 1917, when Our Lady appeared to Jacinta and Francisco Marto, who were beatified in May 2000, and Lucia dos Santos, who died in 2005. For more details see: www.worldfatimaenglandwales.org.uk

At Westminster, the Cardinal said Mass, and consecrated England and Wales to the Immaculate Heart of Mary in an act which included these words: "To you and your Immaculate Heart, in this centenary year of the apparitions at Fatima, we reconsecrate ourselves in union not only with the Church, the Mystical Body of your Son, but also with the entire world."

In his excellent homily, primarily on the importance of devotion to Mary's Immaculate Heart and the Rosary, Cardinal Nichols said: "Devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary is a way for us to say ... 'yes' from the depths of our hearts ... That is why today we consecrate afresh ourselves, our lives, our country, to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, so that we can always be saying 'Yes' to the Lord, with all our heart, with all our will, from the centre of our being. And only Mary can teach us how to do this."

He also said: "I pray that the pilgrimage of this statue of Our Lady of Fatima, on its journey round

the cathedrals of England and Wales, will be a time of grace for many, as they honour Our Lady of Fatima in

this centenary year."

The Cardinal emphasised, too, the importance of the Rosary and praying it in the family, which he recalled doing as a child.

After Mass, crowds of people waited to venerate the relics of Blessed Jacinta and Francisco Marto and pray before the Statue of Our Lady, where she received over 2500 petitions that will be placed under her statue in the Capelinha at Fatima.

Then from 4 pm onwards there was a Symposium in Westminster Cathedral Hall covering various topics that was videoed by EWTN UK. Speakers included Nuno Prazeres, the Director of the WAF International Secretariat, and Jorge Leitao, the Portuguese jeweller who created the beautiful new silver gilt Centenary crown with which the statue will be crowned in their cathedrals by our bishops.

Plymouth Diocese Catechetical Camps 2017

As a year 1952 stands out for many things: Princess Elizabeth had just ascended to the throne, after the death of her father: Britain was continuing to rebuild after the end of the Second World War, and in the Roman Catholic Diocese of Plymouth the Catholic Women's League (CWL) across the diocese came together organize their first year of Catechetical Summer Camps. The CWL was conscious that the Plymouth Diocese, being such a very rural area, had many children of catholic families unable to attend Catholic Schools. Their solution was to offer a range of 'Camps' during the summer, to bring together young people of school age to live and share their faith, allowing sound catholic instruction for those young people who may be lacking in Catholic instruction in a state school environment.

The first camps were 'under canvas' and as the years went on, they became centred on Catholic schools around the diocese, with the groups sleeping in classrooms or dormitories. There were Junior Camps for children of primary age and Senior Camps for those of secondary age. Adults and children came together with catechists to share their faith through living and growing together.

Although the CWL relinquished the organisation of the camps to a Diocesan Committee, members of the local CWL groups still help with the camps by assisting the camp chefs in preparing the lunchtime sandwiches and baguettes to feed the hungry young people. The CWL have also offered financial support which has allowed the camp committee to purchase a large marquee – used as a prayer tent during the camps, and, more recently help to provide solid flooring in the marquee.

In 2002, Bishop-emeritus Christopher, celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the Camps with a 'mass' celebration Mass at Plymouth Cathedral. All the Summer Camps took place during the same week across the diocese and, on the Wednesday, all the campers and helpers came together at Plymouth Cathedral, attending Mass, enjoying lunch,

followed by an afternoon of activities, before return to continue the camps.

Ten years later the organisation of the camps passed from the CWL to the diocese and, thanks to the generosity of Buckfast Abbey, the location of the camps is now centred on Grangehurst House. In 2012 the 60^{th} anniversary was celebrated with partying at each of the camps.

Applications are now open for this year's Summer Camps, all held at Grangehurst House at Buckfast Abbey. The **Senior Camp** (for Years 6 – 10) and the **St Petroc's Camp** (Years 11-12) take place from **Sunday 30th July to Friday 4th August** and the **Junior Camp** from **Sunday 6th to Friday, 11th August**. To celebrate the 65th Year of Camps this summer, the team have decided to have an open-house 'afternoon tea' at each event. This is to give everyone who has been involved with the camps in the past the opportunity to experience what today's camps are like and to share memories. The 'afternoon teas' will take place from 3pm to 5pm on Tuesday 1st August (Seniors and St Petroc's) and Tuesday 8th August (Juniors).
