

The Way the Truth and the Life Diocese of Plymouth 2018 Pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela

Fr. Philip Austen writes: The May 2018 pilgrimage has attracted pilgrims from across our wide diocese and we are delighted to announce that it is now full. A total of 52 parishioners from across the Diocese will be joined by Bishop Mark and his Private Secretary, Canon Keith Mitchell, in Santiago de Compostela.

The first (of several) 'official get-togethers' of the group will be taking place on Saturday October 14th, when we will celebrate Mass at 11.00.a.m. in Holy Ghost Church, Exmouth before coffee and a pilgrimage presentation, questions & answers session and chatting together over lunch. These social occasions will enable pilgrims to get to know each other before the long pilgrimage along the Camino Frances.

Our first two nights will be spent in a monastery in Santo Domingo de Calzada with the Cistercian Sisters, before moving westwards along the ancient pilgrim route towards Santiago, staying in hotels en route, and walking some of the way. We will visit Sahagun; León; Rabanal; Cruz de Ferro; Acebo, Molinaseca; Ponferrada; O'Cebreiro; Melide and Ribadiso before arriving in Santiago de Compostela itself. On the return journey we will be staying in Oviedo before transferring to the north coast at Comillas. From there we will visit the monastery of San Turibio in the Picos Mountains; it has a relic of the True Cross. We will also enjoy excursions to the Picos mountains and to the ancient village of Santiana del Mar.





I am looking forward to meeting the group of pilgrims from across the diocese and being with them on pilgrimage to Santiago. There is a waiting list and places will be offered if they become available.

Bishop Mark takes the Salute

The Bishop of Plymouth paid his first visit to Britannia Royal Naval College (BRNC) at the end of July, to celebrate mass with Officer Cadets and gain an insight into training. During two days at the College, Bishop Mark O'Toole met with the Commanding Officer, Capt Jol Woodard, and was given a brief into the role the College plays in preparing young men and women for their future role as Naval officers. He was also able to see at first hand some of the training taking place.

The Bishop was joined for Mass in the Chapel of St Philip Howard by Father Michael Sharkey, Roman Catholic Chaplain for the College, along with Father Sunny Paul, from Brixham, and retired priest Father P J Kelly. His second day began at 0730, when he addressed the Officer Cadets during parade practice.

"Bishop Mark impressed both staff and officer cadets with his "Thought for the Day" on Divisions," Father Sharkey observed. "His message was both relevant and thought provoking, drawing a parallel with the track "Save Yourself" from Sheeran's "Divide" album."

Bishop Mark reminded the Officer Cadets that: "To be an effective leader is to accept who I am and loving that. It is only when you really love yourself, can you actually contemplate giving yourself to others." He then took an exhilarating trip on one of the Navy's RIB boats to witness the new entry Cadets taking part in their final leadership exercise on the River Dart. He was also shown the state-of-

Classic Cinema: Ten Ten at 10!

Ten Ten, the Catholic theatre, film and education company, celebrated its 10th anniversary with a special event at the Curzon cinema in London's West End on Saturday 24 June.

Founded by Martin O'Brien and his sister Clare, the company has seen its work grow exponentially over the last 10 years. At the event, Martin announced that, during its first decade, over 850,000 children, young people, young offenders, teachers, parents and members of the public have been in the audiences of plays and workshops. Highlights include the theatre productions of "Kolbe's Gift" and "This Is My Body", their award-winning play on human trafficking.

The event included a screening of two new short films recently made by Ten Ten as part of their new cinema-in-education venture. "Babies" is a 30-minute film based on the original Ten Ten play of the same name about pregnancy and abortion; "Love, Honour, Cherish" explores teenage relationships including sexting, chastity and marriage. Both films are currently available to secondary schools as part of Ten Ten's Relationship and Sex Education programme.

Guest speaker Fr Christopher Jamison OSB praised Ten Ten saying that their success is due to the fact that they combine "high-quality writing, performances and production with good management skills - all at the service of the Gospel." He highlighted how the combined skills of siblings Clare and Martin in arts management and creative production have been at the heart of the success of Ten Ten.

Anna O'Brien, Clare and Martin's mother, was given a special commendation at the end of the evening for over 10 years of full-time voluntary service to Ten Ten. Fr Christopher presented her with a papal blessing for "supporting the spiritual, moral and cultural development of children and young people."

Ten Ten has exciting plans for development in the future, including: a significant programme of online resources for Catholic primary schools; the development of a new workshop on human trafficking for secondary schools: and a commitment to develop new film and theatre productions for mainstream audiences. Gosnell Movie set to launch soon?

The makers of the Gosnell Movie say that they are intending to launch this Autumn - distributors willing. Apparently, they are finding it very difficult to get distribution through the 'normal channels' of cinemas and theatres across the USA.

The Gosnell Movie is a very important film. It documents and describes the activities of Kermit Gosnell, who has been described as one of the 'most prolific serial killers the USA has ever seen'. What did he do? He practised as an abortionist in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, for nearly 40 years. He was known for providing late-term abortions, to those able to pay. He was arrested in January 2011 but not for abortion offences; the charges initially related to the illegal prescription of drugs. After investigations and searches of his 'clinic' revealed it as little more than a charnel-house, seven murder charges relating to babies born alive were added

assist with sick and elderly pilgrims who require support throughout the week - either physical, by helping to push those who require a wheelchair, or simply those who just need a friend




Global Survey of Young People ahead of 2018 Synod: early Feedback

Over 16,500 young people recently completed the "Mega Youth Poll", responding to the Catholic Bishops' invitation to share their thoughts and feelings about faith and church. A report on the findings is likely to go to the Bishops around Youth Sunday this November, after which more feedback will be available. The associated survey for parents, teachers, clergy etc resulted in a poorer volume of responses but, it is understood, contains valuable input too.

Pope Francis has expressed his clear hope to obtain as much information as possible from young people before next year's Synod and the global Vatican online Survey for 16-29 year olds is now available. It is very user friendly, and should not take more than a few minutes to complete, if you are within the age range, please access it and complete it. Whether or not you are eligible yourself, encourage those you know who are to participate!

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FATIMA: 100 YEARS ON

Timothy Tindal-Robertson, National President, World Apostolate of Fatima, England & Wales has written a very full report of the its pilgrimage to Fatima, 10-17 July 2017. We expect that it will be published on its website - www.worldfatima-englandwales.org.uk - in due course. "On our pilgrimage we offer the pilgrims a range of different experiences, but attendance at any of the events is voluntary, and there is plenty of time when they are free to enjoy the sights, and make their own devotions in the various holy places around the shrine."



What a great privilege has been ours to be in Fatima in these days. You will know that when the Holy Father was here in May he canonised our two young saints, St Jacinta and St Francesco. So, now, we have two new saints to intercede for us. Of course they are best known to us because of the visits made to them by Our Lady a century ago. But their sanctity, their heroic virtue, does not rest in this fact, but rather in the fact that, in their lives, they sought to put into practise the lessons they had learnt from Our Lady. These were lessons about prayer, particularly for others, and about sacrifices or penances - to put your own will aside in order to seek to do God's will more fully. To put the other person first as a sign of love and of service, so that they might know the love of Jesus and Mary more.

These lessons they lived in the personal circumstances of daily life, at home, in their village, among their friends and neighbours. St Jacinta and St Francesco are a reminder that sanctity, holiness of life, can be lived in the home, even among the youngest members in a family. And in recalling the struggles and sufferings of daily existence. We know that in their deaths especially Francisco and Jacinta showed enormous courage. Jacinta had a premonition and asked for the Sacrament. The priest said he would bring it the following day and she shouldn't be too dramatic. She died before he came that day, and alone. She was only nine but clear she knew she was going to heavenly mother. We should never assume that someone is too young to hear about God, to be taught about Our Lady, to begin a path of following Jesus. Many of you here are parents or grandparents. Do we have any great grandparents? Particularly nowadays, parents and grandparents have a sacred task to help their children and grandchildren receive our Catholic faith, in simple ways. Please pray with them, teach them the Our Father and the Hail Mary, pray and teach them the Rosary, and continue to teach them about Jesus and Mary.

When I was a child, we often prayed the Rosary at home, usually in the evening. It was always with a particular style, on our knees, with each of us facing into a chair, with head down. We knelt in a circle but turned outwards, not facing one another. There were five of us altogether: my parents, my two older brothers and me, and my mother insisted






that each of us led a decade of the Rosary. I think it was so that we didn't fall asleep. Yet these simple things taught me that I had to find my own voice in prayer and that prayer wasn't talking to one another but turning in another direction, to talk to God.

When we visited my Grandmother's house during the summer holidays, she would often have a Rosary in her hands and seemed to use it most of the day. She lived in a simple house in the West of Ireland and the back door was left constantly opened and her chickens would often wonder in looking for specks of food on the stone floor. The

words of her Hail Mary's would be interspersed with her shooing the chickens away and swearing at them in Irish. I'm afraid they were some of the first Irish words I learnt! But I learned, too, that the language of prayer and the language of life is intertwined, and in prayer nothing that comes is a distraction, but something merely to be taken up, and offered to God along with everything else.

When we pray with our young ones, when we teach them to pray, we give them a very precious gift. A gift that only Jesus can give. It is the gift of His inner life. None of us are Spiritual orphans. We



You know the story of someone who was praying to Mary at the shrine in Fatima and it was the 13th of the month, and there were tens of thousands of people there, and this person became a little despondent. They started to think to themselves, 'But how can she know and see me, how can she divide up her love between all these thousands of people". And then the thought came to him as though the voice of Mary were whispering gently to him in the depths of his heart, "But I don't divide it up, I multiply it." And this is what our heavenly mother does. She sees us, she looks us and she loves us. She does not abandon us. She mirrors the fidelity of her Son. This is why we call the Church our Mother. Indeed, my favourite title of Mary is Mother. As St Therese of the Child Jesus used to often say, Mary is so much more mother, than Queen. People go to Mary and they say "Show us Jesus....

We know that Mary had unsettling and dark moments in her life. Yet she continued to trust and to hope. At the beginning, at the Annunciation, her witness is one of courage in accepting her vocation and the new life entrusted to her. The Gospels speak of a kind of "eclipse" of Mary during the public ministry of Jesus. Following the miracle of Cana she is silent and she follows her Son's ministry in silence. Yet in His passion, when the disciples flee, Mary remains with Him to the end. The image of Mary receiving her dead Son - the pieta - has inspired artists for centuries. It is often the image to which people offer their deepest devotion when they come across it in a Church.

It is a reminder to us that the Peace which only Jesus can give us, is a peace which we find in Our mother, the Church. She is with us, with her Son, in our suffering. So let us be like Mary, open to receiving Jesus when he comes to us. Like her, willing to be faithful and courageous in the dark or difficult moments of life, knowing that Jesus is with us and does not abandon us. Let us place our young people and all children under her protection, and help them step by step to discover Jesus and Mary. To find in Jesus and Mary, the source of our peace.

Mary, mother of Jesus pray for us and for our young people. Help us to show them the way to you so that you can bring them to Jesus. Amen.

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THE PERSECUTED CHURCH EVER-PRESENT

Christianity in general and the Catholic Church in particular is suffering persecution on an unprecedented scale. Aid to the Church in Need makes it its business to provide desperate help wherever it is required.

While much of what we hold dear is under attack in the UK and the West, from marriage to the right to uphold and practice our religion in the public square, the trials faced by our brothers and sisters in other parts of the world put our upsets into perspective.

Aid to the Church in Need (ACN) does what its name says: it provides help and relief to the Church Suffering, here on Earth.

Nigeria – a catalogue of violence

Vital assistance is to be provided for Nigerian widows and orphans who lost loved ones. ACN has agreed a £63,000 (€70,000) package of food parcels and schooling for 1,000 orphans, and counselling for 500 widows, many of whom saw their husbands killed in violence perpetrated by Islamist militants Boko Haram.

The aid is going to the Diocese of Maiduguri, in north-east Nigeria, the area worst affected by Boko Haram, which is intent on ridding the area of Christians. Most families have more than six Bp Oliver Dashe Doeme

Doeme of Maiduguri has established St Judith's Widow Association, which will provide each widow with training with business skills, such as farming and tailoring, and adult education. The bishop stressed the importance of ACN's grant for orphans' schooling. Boko Haram has destroyed 25 schools in the diocese since 2009.

An ACN fact-finding and project-assessment trip to north-east Nigeria in March was told that extremists had killed more than 20,000 people across the region.

*On Sunday 6 August, a group of armed men entered the Church of Saint Philip in Ozubulu in the Diocese of Nnewi, SE Nigeria, and opened fire on worshippers attending 6.00am Mass, killing 13 and wounding 26. Bishop Hilary Paul Odili Okeke said "I don't think it was an attack against the Church but simply an attack that took place inside a church."

Iraq – return to devastation

ACN (UK) is giving £400,000 to provide shelter as part of a programme of aid for displaced people, forced out of their homes in the Nineveh Plains by ıvading forces. The displaced communities in Kurdish northern Iraq, have been totally dependent on emergency aid for three years. Neville Kyrke-Smith, UK Director of Aid to the Church in Need. said:

"Having visited the displaced families sharing homes in northern Iraq, I know how much this vital help means to them. It has put them on the road to recovery." At least 46% of the emergency help provided by Erbil archdiocese has come through ACN, which started giving aid within days of the families' arrival in Kurdish northern Iraq. Initially, the families slept out in the open or under bridges. Ongoing aid provided tents, then portable homes, and finally purpose-built flats, mostly in the Ankawa district of the Kurdish capital, Erbil. The latest grant covers three months' rent for the families living in the flats.

Daesh forces have also driven out of been Qaraqosh/Baghdeda, in the Nineveh Plains. There has been a surge of young families wanting to return in time for the newly-repaired school buildings to reopen for the new academic year. ACN Middle East projects coordinator Father Andrzej Halemba said that up to 10,000 school places could soon be available. At least 400 families (about 2,000 people) have returned to the town after three years living in nearby Kurdish northern

Iraq. Father George Jahola, who is tasked with rebuilding Qaraqosh under the aegis of the Nineveh Reconstruction Committee (NRC), said that water and electricity supplies were slowly returning and that the Iraq government had repaired old generators in the town and installed 15 new ones.

Syria: coming back to life

ACN has announced 32 projects to support thousands of Christian families continuing to suffer in Syria, after six years of devastating civil war. The projects, in towns and cities across the country, include supply of food packages, shelter, basic help for war widows and other forms of vital assistance. Almost two thirds of families in Aleppo are surviving on less than £1.60 a day; the other third are living in extreme poverty.

The charity is giving more than €987,460 (£875,000) to help those Homs, Aleppo, Damascus and other towns with projects aiming to strengthening the remaining Christian communities. These include: food aid for 2,200 displaced families in Hassake and Aleppo provided by the Sisters of Jesus and Mary led by Sister Annie Demerijan: support for two schools

though, the CCSP is able to help these challenged families. Similarly, children progressing from primary school to secondary school are moving up the ladder. Most are excited and looking forward to the change but for some it is very worrying; they are anxious about making new friends and coping with their new environment. It is a very vulnerable time of their lives and stresses children and parents alike. 



FIRST MEETING OF "ST BRIDGET'S FRIENDS"

Sunday 23 July was a special day for Saint Bridget of Sweden; her feast day fell on the Sunday, and that won't happen again for six years. It was an opportunity for St Bridget's Friends to mark the day in style, which they did, with a special celebration in the afternoon at Buckfast Abbey. St Bridget's Friends is an international, ecumenical membersonly Facebook group and this was the first chance for some of them to be together in prayer.

Sister Anne Smyth, O.Ss. S. gave an illustrated talk about St Bridget and the origins of The Syon Breviary. She is the last of the original English Bridgettine community of Syon Abbey, which was founded more than 600 years ago by King Henry V. Sister Anne was the last Lady Abbess of Syon Abbey, in office from 1976 - 2011. St Bridget (1303 - 1373) founded the Bridgettine Order of the Most

Holy Saviour and was the only woman to be canonised in the 14th Century. She is perhaps best remembered for vigorously urged the popes in Avignon to return to Rome.

Pilgrimage

Joy Hanson had been a gardener at Syon Abbey and is one of the founders of St Bridget's Friends, which exists to link those around the world who use the latest edition of The Syon Breviary (The Daily Office of Our Lady) for their daily prayer. It has now published in English for the very first time. Joy had a collection of photographs on display and presented a slide show of her recent pilgrimage to St Bridget's first monastery, at Vadstena in Sweden. She was accompanied on the trip by her husband Robin.

Historian Father Thomas Regan, O.S.B., a Benedictine monk from Wales, compared St Bridget to other canonised women of distinction, including St Catherine of Siena who, with St

Bridget, was made a Patroness of Europe by Pope St John Paul II in 1999. He pointed out that those like Bridget, who have had visions and encounters with Our Lady, always came under the strict scrutiny of the Church. Even the three children who saw the Virgin Mary 100 years ago at Fatima were not believed at first and were actually thrown in jail! Nevertheless their legacy lives on, just like St Bridget, in the thousands who are brought to Christ by his holy mother Mary.

Father Regan's entertaining and informative talk was the highlight of a united service of celebration attended by people of different Christian traditions, including the unique River Dart Wild Church and its pastor, the Rev. Samantha (Sam) Wernham. During the service a Hymn to St Bridget was sung for the first time in English outside the chapel of Syon Abbey. The singing was led by Paul Evans, a choir member of the Schola of Buckfast Abbey.

The organisers wish to thank the Abbot and monastic community of Buckfast for their kind and generous support of this event and for the loan of Syon Abbey's historic and beautiful vestments which were on display. 
