

#### **EDITORIAL**

We no sooner hit New Years Day and the talk is all about packing Christmas away for another year and the chatter of 'isn't it nice to get back to normal' and 'I must go on a diet' or go 'dry' for January. # Faith in Action Awards

ust before Christmas, on 21st December, we gathered at St Wilfrid's church, Preston, to celebrate the achievements of a group of our young people. Bishop Paul presented ten young people with Faith in Action awards.

Faith in Action awards were set up by CYMFed a couple of years ago to celebrate the faith journeys of young people. Many young people are already doing a lot in our communities. Faith in Action Awards are a way to recognise this, and to encourage them to relate what they are doing to their faith. Taking time to prayerfully reflect on their actions, young people are challenged to see the relevance of faith in different parts of their lives, developing their relationships with God and the Church.

In our diocese, Metanoia Project have been offering Faith in Action Awards as part of their young leaders' "Yoke" programme. Young people have gained credits for their work with youth groups, retreats, service in their parishes, support for the homeless, and much more.

The award is offered at four levels: Pin for year 6 groups, Bronze, Silver and Gold for high school or college ages. The scheme works to strengthen relationships between young people and their parishes, schools and youth groups, with young people expected to undertake service in these different contexts, and as they progress to take initiative in taking forward their own ideas.

Scheme I enjoyed strengthening my relationships, both with God and those around

me. I have developed the way I pray to include scripture and music, and take more time out each day to pray and reflect on the gifts and challenges He has set for me. This has continued into my life at university and has helped me have a more open mind towards worship. It also taught me how to pray and read scripture by myself, so my faith life doesn't suffer although I am away from my family and home parish.

As part of the programme I volunteered on a trip with the youth group to the Celebrate conference in Macclesfield. Seeing how the young people were open about their faith and couldn't wait to share their experiences really inspired me. The highlight of being a young leader for me was watching the young people in the youth groups grow in their relationships with God and one another, and Celebrate was the time this stood out to me most. These moments have stuck with me and made me more confident in talking to others about my faith since then.

Being a young leader taught me how



have completed the silver award whilst taking part in the Yoke programme with Metanoia Project, and am working towards my Gold

award, and I'm currently in my first year at Cardinal Newman College.

In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus says 'Shoulder my yoke and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. Yes, my yoke is easy and my burden light.' As Christian disciples we all aim to hear and learn from Jesus. We want to be yoked to Him to learn how to follow Him and His teachings more closely. The

to manage my time effectively which has really helped me schedule time at university and made me more confident in making friends once I moved away from home. At the start of this scheme I was settled into a routine that never changed and so I feel like at that point my faith was not developing. By helping lead the youth group sessions I have become more organized and have learnt to follow my instincts as well as learning from both other leaders and the youth more about God and the way He works in our lives.

Throughout this scheme my knowledge of the Church and community grew and developed. I realised that to be good Christians we need to be part of the community because we are stronger together. This provides a support network so that we can practise our faith to greater effect and bring the joy of God to the lives of those surrounding us.

I also learnt that it is this community that makes the Church. Although our beautiful buildings of worship are called churches it is the people that are important. This has made pieces of scripture such as "for where two or three gather in my name, I am there with them" (Mathew; 18:20) stand out more to me as my understanding and appreciation of their meaning has changed.

Being a young leader gave me more confidence in taking the presidency for my university's catholic society and has encouraged me to help to try to set up an initiative called 'upper room' which is faith related activities such as praise and worship and prayer ministry to give people more opportunity to enhance their faith and experience life differently while at university.

I used to have my future all planned out, I was going to go to university, do a masters, do a PhD and get an amazing job but I didn't make any room for God in my plans. Now I don't have specific plans for my future, but I do know I want to keep God at the centre of my life and deepen my relationship with Him.

I don't think I could have achieved these things without the Yoke programme and am so thankful to have had this opportunity.

## Faith in Action Richa – Silver Award

Yoke program aims to encourage and nurture the contribution of young people in the church. It allows us to deepen our relationship with God and support each other.

I volunteer with the younger children at Metanoia youth groups supporting them to grow in faith, as well as regularly attending the Sent youth group to grow in my own faith with young people my own age. We also volunteer with the homeless drop in, lead sessions in schools, and helped preparing and delivering live stations of the cross. Playing an active role in our parish is also important; we serve on the altar, read, or welcome parishioners.

We take time to reflect in our journals, and in planning and training meetings. These meetings allow us to plan our own sessions and activities. A group of us are currently planning a session for students in our college in the new year and we led a

session about advent for our youth group.

In the October half term we went to Castlerigg along with other young people from Annointed and Sent youth groups which truly was a beautiful experience. It was an emotional rollercoaster for everyone involved but it was incredible seeing all of us grow closer and supporting each other whilst praising and adoring Jesus and his wonderful works and never-ending love for all of us. We prayed together and for each other as some of us shared our own personal testimonies about strengthening our relationship with God.

At the end of the year we had to complete a project reflecting on how we had changed as people and what we had gained during the program. It was incredible to see how much I had grown over the year due to the programme as well as how much my peers had grown and changed too.

By volunteering, I feel like I have helped the children strengthen their relationship with God by this I also feel like my faith in God has increased... I feel like I have changed as a person but also my views of the church has also changed. Now I see the Church like a compass directing me to become how God wants me to become — Megha

I have gained so much from being a young leader. If I had to choose one thing, it's the fact that I have made some amazing catholic friends with whom I can discuss anything about my faith – *Prabhu* 

My self-confidence was greatly increased by the faith in action programme, especially in talking to people I don't know very well – *Rachel* 

Yoke has strengthened my ability to step forward and take the initiative when it comes to leading and guiding people and not shy away from great responsibilities – *Navin* 

I had always heard stories of people having relationships with God but wasn't truly able to experience it for myself. The trip to Castlerigg was a fun way in which I was able to discover God and myself. For the first time I felt God's presence and the feeling gave me pure joy. It's an experience that can't be described but felt — Maria

My highlight as a young leader so far has definitely been working with the younger kids and seeing them grow in faith. It has definitely made me realise the impact I can make and working with them has strengthened my faith immensely because they've forced me to think deeper into my own faith – *Richa* 

During adoration I felt as though I could speak and listen to God more openly. When I opened my heart to God I felt as though he was answering questions and doubts that I had during the time – *Alfi* 

My highlight as a young leader was the retreat, especially the adoration, because it gave me the opportunity to reflect on my faith and my relationship with God. It was also great fun spending time with everybody and learning more about one another – *Anjali* 

This programme hasn't changed my plans for the future but has strengthened them, persuading me that helping with programmes in the church and helping others in society is what I am called to do – *Rachael* 

I would definitely recommend the Yoke Programme to anyone considering it as I joined in September and I instantly felt welcomed and at home with Joe and Ruth and all the young leaders and the young people. Everyone genuinely is happy to be there and they all enjoy being there. We all have lots of fun but also we all explore and delve into our relationship with God further together

Following on from the young leader programme, I had to do something to be involved at my church at uni. This is through being a vital member of the local RC church Catholic Society. I am the committee member representing the first year pupils at uni and help plan and run our CathSoc weekly meet-ups – *Tushar* 

I think my ability of talking to a larger group of people has been strengthened through not only giving a talk, but also from leading groups – *Anto*



n early December Women Together in the Diocese of Lancaster held an Advent day of Prayer in the Xaverian Mission Spirituality Centre (formerly Tabor) Preston. It was led by Father Nyagasaza Bideri who runs the Centre. It was a grey, wet and dreary looking day, but we received a very warm, hospitable welcome. Fr Bideri told us that it was to be a day of joy!

The greatest reality in our lives is our relationship with God. So, first, to help us allow God to heal our hearts from all that hinders His love embracing us, Father Bideri led us in an unusual reflection on the elder brother of the prodigal son and his troubled relationship with the father. In an interactive session, together we identified all the troubling elements that the elder son refused to let go of in himself. In naming these we could let go of all the same elements we recognised in ourselves. So we were ready then to open up to the love of God at work in the lives of Mary and Joseph before the birth of Jesus, tracing their spiritual journey through scripture

We celebrated Mass together at midday and after lunch shared a very joyful session with carols and seasonal hymns illustrated on the computer as we enjoyed singing along. A half hour of silent prayer before the Blessed Sacrament followed and we drew the day to a close with song and prayer and blessing, grateful to Father Bideri for this lovely introduction to the Advent Season.

Women Together has a long history in the Diocese of Lancaster since it was first established by Bishop Brewer to give women a voice and opportunities to deepen and develop their faith and encourage the service that flows from that. So on the same day the organising committee took the opportunity for a "grass roots" consultation with all who came. In the spirit of Pope Francis we know that we need to listen and learn from women themselves what kind of topics and days they want to share. We asked permission to use their contact details for future publicity as we will see what suggestions were made and what can then be planned ahead.



#### Please join us on the 2019 Pilgrimage

We have over the last couple of years celebrated Lourdes anniversaries. In 2017 it was the 90th anniversary of our first official Diocesan Pilgrimage. In 2018 we celebrated the 160th anniversary of the first apparitions in Lourdes. 2019 sees more anniversaries. The 7th January will be the 175th anniversary of St Bernadette's birth and on April 16th we will celebrate the 140th anniversary of her death.

But we will also be remembering another saint in Lourdes, Benedict Joseph Labre, the beggar Saint, patron saint of pilgrims, the homeless, and the Hospitality of Our Lady of Lourdes. These two great saints give rise to the theme for the 2019 Lourdes Pilgrimages.

"Blessed are the poor, for the Kingdom of God is theirs." (Luke 6:20)

"Being poor is not appealing, all those who are poor share that opinion. It is understandable; nobody likes to be poor. What is appealing, however, is to possess the Kingdom of Heaven. But only the poor may enjoy that privilege" - Madeleine Delbrel, "The Joy of Believing".

Poverty is born from the discovery that I am a child of Father God. I exist because I am loved in an individual way by God. My being is totally relative to Him, though not without the mystery of my free will.

given to me by Him.

To be poor, then, is to use each thing according to its ultimate end, placing the expectation of one's good not in the possession of things, but in the realisation of the Kingdom of God. When we do that, we use, appreciate, and love each thing without turning them into a "god". When they become gods, persons and things cease to be ours.

In a correct relationship with things and other people, we must not refuse them the esteem that is their due, for example we do not deny the value of a person if we are friends with them. At the same time, however, one does not expect the fulfilment of our own life. It is in the Kingdom of God that things and persons find their proper place.

When we live in poverty, we discover that we are lacking nothing since everything is given to us. Poverty is the recovery of the truth in our relationship with things, the truth in which God placed humankind at the dawn of creation and at the dawn of the new creation - the Resurrection of Jesus.

I look forward to being with you all on pilgrimage God Bless you.

We are blessed in this Diocese with a wonderful group of pilgrims who travel each year to Lourdes, however new faces, new life, and new targets are essential each year if the pilgrimage is to continue and grow in the longer term, and if it is to be representative of the Diocese as a whole. ### May they all be One in Preston and beyond

Sitting in our usual pew on a Sunday morning, we could easily think that we know what being a Roman Catholic is all about. We've received our Sacraments, we understand how the liturgy and worship takes place, and we follow the seasons of the Church. But what if that is not the full picture? What if you can be authentically Catholic, fully in communion with the Holy See, and yet celebrate in a very different way? What if your calendar is not the same, your way of worshipping, practicing and even the language in which you worship is different to what we have come to accept as the norm?

Throughout the autumn term, we have been celebrating the breadth of our Catholic faith through a series called 'One Body' which took place at St Wilfrid's, Preston. Described by Jim as 'an illuminating course that challenged judgementalism and celebrated the diverse expression of our shared faith', each evening of the series was led by a different Religious Order, New Movement or Rite that is based in the local area. All of the evenings have been, as Sean relates, 'interesting, informative, a good variety and well presented' and the attendance has reflected this with several evenings reaching 70 or more people. Preston has been blessed by the ministry of many Religious orders over the centuries including Franciscans,

Benedictines, Carmelites, Xaverians, Little Sisters of the Poor and of course Jesuits and more recently has also welcomed the Syro-Malabar Rite as well as newer expressions such as the Institute of Christ the King Sovereign Priest, the Neocatechumenal Way and ourselves, Metanoia Project. Each group is authentically Catholic but has a particular Charism, vision and focus of how best to express, celebrate and share that faith. This series has not been able to include every different expression but we made a good start!

It has been, as Mike shares, 'a wonderful insight into the variety of charisms in the church today' and this has enabled us all to compare our similarities and differences and to meet other Catholics who we may never come across in our usual routine. Each evening has been unique but there has been a wonderful atmosphere of acceptance and love for one another. Hilary sums it up well: 1 have so enjoyed all the Thursday evenings that I attended. It was refreshing to see and hear how diverse yet similar we all are in our faith. May there be many more opportunities to chat.' Most importantly, each evening has been an opportunity to pray together. However we might choose to express ourselves, ultimately we are all children of the King of Kings, created to Praise Him and to live forever with Him what an awesome privilege!

Although this wonderful series is now over, we will continue to meet each week as we have done for the past eight years to explore our rich faith in a variety of ways. Over those years, we have covered many topics including the Creed, the Documents of Vatican II, the Our Father and Bible Basics. We have had a School of Mission including outreach on the streets and followed DVD series' by Bishop Robert Baron. We have had several Advent and Lent courses with lots of guest speakers who have inspired and challenged us in many ways. We have spent many weeks reflecting on the Sunday Gospels too.

Looking ahead to Lent, we will be exploring and discussing the book 'Rediscover Jesus' which has a short reflection for each of the forty days. Written by best-selling author Matthew Kelly of DynamicCatholic.com, this book 'encourages us in our weariness, challenges us in our comfort, and invites us to rediscover the beautiful possibilities God places before us daily'. We are so excited to make this book our Lenten focus having shared it with some smaller groups last year with excellent results. So why not make your own ongoing faith formation a New Year's resolution for 2019? People from all over the Preston area (and beyond) are very welcome so we would be delighted if you could join us!



Collowing the National Eucharistic Congress, held in Liverpool in September 2018, schools of the Diocese of Lancaster have been invited by Bishop Paul to observe a 'Diocesan Year of the Eucharist'.

The aim of this year is to help children develop a deeper understanding of the Eucharist as the 'source and summit' of the Christian life and to encourage and foster regular devotion to the Blessed Sacrament within our schools.



# Philip takes another Step in his Formation to the Priesthood

n the Feast of Christ the King The Right Reverend Patrick McKinney Bishop of the Diocese of Nottingham conferred the Ministry of Acolyte on Seminarian Philip Wrigley saying "This ministry of Acolyte, you should strive to live more fully by the Lord's sacrifice and to be moulded more perfectly in its likeness. You should seek to understand the deep spiritual meaning of what you do, so that you may offer yourself daily to God as spiritual sacrifices acceptable to him through Jesus Christ."

"All nations shall come to adore you and glorify your name, O Lord" -Psalm 85:9

#### What is the Ministry of the Acolyte?

Those men seeking ordination in the Catholic Church are now installed during their formation into the ministries of lector and acolyte before being ordained deacon, at which time one enters the clerical state. Lector and acolyte are "lay ministries."

The acolyte is appointed in order to aid the deacon and to minister to the priest. It is his duty therefore to attend to the service of the altar and to assist the deacon and the priest in liturgical celebrations, especially in the celebration of Mass; In other words, the things you would typically see an altar server doing.

He is also to distribute communion as a special minister when the ministers spoken of in the Codex Iuris Canonici can. 845 are not available or are prevented by ill health, age, or another pastoral ministry from performing this function, or when the number of communicants is so great that the celebration of Mass would be unduly prolonged.

What this is saying is that an acolyte is an extraordinary minister of Holy Communion. However, as an installed minister, he takes precedence over other extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion in distributing the Eucharist.

In the same extraordinary circumstances an acolyte may be entrusted with publicly exposing the Blessed Sacrament for adoration by the faithful and afterward replacing it, but not with blessing the people.

Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament is something that a lay person ordinarily may not do. Therefore the ability of an acolyte to do so is truly a special privilege of that ministry. As a non-ordained minister, however, he may not offer Benediction.


He may also, to the extent needed, take care of instructing other faithful who on a temporary basis are appointed to assist the priest or deacon in liturgical celebrations by carrying the missal, cross, candles, etc., or by performing other such duties.

In other words, the acolyte should train the other servers who will be assisting at

This is a first for me since I have never run a marathon before, nor, indeed, done much running. I am hoping to raise a minimum of £2,000.

#### Why am I running the **London Marathon?**

I have asked myself the same question quite a lot recently. I did consider running the London Marathon last year when the Jesuit Missions team were looking for volunteers from the 9 UK Jesuit Parishes - looking back it was good advice that a friend gave me to perhaps wait a year and actually start running! At the time, I was not doing some exercise but nothing like I am now and I was certainly not running. I started running probably about autumn 2017 and by January 2018 I had signed up for Park Runs and at the moment have a Personal Best for 5KM of 29mins 49 seconds - very happy with this for my age group and level of fitness.

I received an email back in June 2018 from one of the Jesuit Missions volunteering team inviting me to apply for one of their charity places. Faster than the speed of sound, I submitted my application and as usual due to a certain OCD I have spent a number of months frantically worrying that my "raison d'être" was not good enough and I would not be selected.

Then in September, actually earlier than I had been advised in October I received the email confirming a place to run the London Marathon as part of the Jesuit Missions Team – well I think even the wallabies down under could have heard my screaming and there was certainly a couple of strange looks from the staff and students in the Library at UCLAN where at the time I was giving student appointments as part of my job working in the Study Abroad Team at UCLAN.

set up my Virgin Fundraising Page and starting publicising my participation and seeking donations.

#### Why the Jesuit Missions?

Jesuit Missions exists to support Jesuit works with poor and marginalised people around the world. They do this by promoting social justice, building bridges between communities and accompanying those working on the missions.

Well I have been a parishioner at St Wilfrid's Preston for a number of years and have followed the various campaigns for different projects that the Missions team run in keyparts of the World such as Africa, Asia and Latin America and the Caribbean – and simply thought I would like to help out and give something back to the Jesuits for such a worthy cause.

I am really looking forward to running the Marathon and being part of the Jesuit Missions' Team – particularly meeting the Womble of Wimbledon, since a group of litter pickers at St Wilfrid's have taken on the pseudonym of Prombles of Preston as part of their Live Simply Campaign.

Training is not easy particularly during these dark, cold days but this is part of the mental and physical challenge. I have completed a 10 mile race in November and my next big step will be a half marathon on the 6th January and then a 20 mile race in Lancaster on the 17th March.

I would like to thank all those wonderful people who have supported my challenge by either donating prizes, money or just simply keeping me in their prayers without them I could not carry on.


