Usually, May is a month full of celebrations - First Holy Communions, Confirmations, and it's the beginning of the "Wedding Season". On May 11, Francis Sutcliffe will be ordained to the priesthood. Most of Francis' adult life has been spent in ministering in the Anglican Church. However, he felt called to join the Catholic Church and Pope Francis has given permission for him to be ordained into the priesthood in the Catholic Church. I am sure you will keep him and his wife Barbara in your prayers as he approaches this wonderful event, which will take place in his home parish of St John of Beverlev.

Of course, May, Spring Bank Holiday, is also the time of our annual Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes. St Bernadette was born on January 7 1844 and was baptised on January 9. So this year we are celebrating the 175th Anniversary of her birth and on April 16 we celebrate the 140th anniversary of her death.

The theme for this year in Lourdes is from the Beatitudes in St Luke's Gospel: Blessed are the poor, for the Kingdom of God is theirs. In choosing this theme, we are not being asked to say that poverty is a good thing in itself. That would be so wrong and also very demeaning and insulting to those who, despite their best efforts, find themselves the victims of misfortune.

Rather, we are being encouraged to follow the path offered to Bernadette by Our Lady. We have to die to self in order to find true life in Christ. Here in Lourdes, we have the time to take a good long look at the way we live our lives. We have the opportunity to get

### Celebrating The Church's Mission In The World

Catholics around the world will celebrate the Church's missionary and evangelical work in a special way later this year.

Pope Francis has initiated Extraordinary Mission Month October 2019 to mark the 100th anniversary of Pope Benedict XV's apostolic letter Maximum Illud, which identified the principles and priorities of the

The theme of the month is "Baptised and Sent: The Church of Christ on Mission in the World."

In 1622, the Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith was created by Pope Gregory XV to promote and direct the work of evangelisation and of the missionary efforts of the Church.

Pope St Paul VI emphasised the importance of its work in 1967 and gave the dicastery a new name, the Congregation for the Evangelisation of Peoples (CEP).

All baptised Catholics are responsible for the mission of the Church, supporting the Holy Father in his role as Universal Shepherd.

The Pontifical Mission Societies (PMS) are committed to promoting and supporting the missionary efforts of the Church through prayer, selfsacrifice and missionary vocations. They were born from a deep concern for the missions of both laity and clergy in the 19th and 20th centuries. Extraordinary Mission Month October 2019 will be marked in our diocese when Bishop Terry celebrates Mass in St Mary's Cathedral on Thursday

October 17 at 7pm. Our diocesan director Canon Michael Loughlin will be telling us more about the work of the PMS and Extraordinary Missionary Month October

#### **How To Live The Extraordinary Missionary Month** Pope Francis has specified four dimensions to help us live the Extraordinary Missionary Month October 2019.

- 1. A personal encounter with Jesus Christ alive in His Church through the Eucharist, the Word of God, personal and communal prayer.
- 2. Testimony: Missionary saints, martyrs and confessors of the faith, as an expression of the Church scattered throughout the world.
- 3. Missionary formation: Biblical, catechetical, spiritual and theological.
- 4. Missionary charity.

### Francis Is Ordained As Deacon



Bishop Terry told the congregation to reflect on the love and guidance we receive from God in the sacraments during the Ordination to the Diaconate of Francis Sutcliffe.

The ordination took place during the 10.45 Mass at his home parish of St John of Beverley Church, Beverley, on Sunday March 17. Francis, who is 71, is a former Anglican vicar and is married to Barbara. He will be ordained to the priesthood at the same church on Saturday May 11.

Deacon Peter Taylor, from Ingleby Barwick, is nearing the end of his studies at the Venerable English College in Rome and will be ordained to the priesthood at St Mary's Cathedral on Saturday September 7.

# Young People Share St Vincent's Vision



In the latest of our series focusing on some of the groups that form Caritas Middlesbrough and are engaged in social outreach, we look at how young people are transforming the world by following the example of St Vincent de

While some SVP conferences find it challenging to recruit new members, young people are responding enthusiastically to the call to put faith into action.

Every Catholic primary school in Hull and district has a Mini Vinnies group and the city's St Mary's College has a flourishing youth SVP.

St Mary's activities have included visits to Holy Name Care Home, singing Christmas carols to children in Hull Royal Infirmary, helping at St Stephen's housebound group and raising funds to feed children at a nursery run by Daughters

of Charity in Ethiopia.

Last year they sent hundreds of knitted scarves to keep refugees in Calais warm and they have now committed to supporting an SVP conference in Kerala, India, by raising £400 to house a poor family.

They recently helped provide a formation day for Mini Vinnies, with Nicky Coyle and the team of chaplains translating their ideas into a programme and resources. Around 50 children from the seven primary schools in St Cuthbert's Catholic Academy Trust and St John of Beverley School gathered at the Marist Church Hall.

The children learned how Blessed Frédéric Ozanam and his friends started the SVP with the guidance of Sister Rosalie Rendu, how we encounter God in service of the poor and that kindness is the key to hearts.

St John of Beverley parish SVP members joined forces with the primary school's Mini Vinnies and their families to knit scarves for those who are homeless and blankets for dementia

Deputy head and Mini Vinnies' coordinator Rebecca Monkman said: "We are so proud of the children in our school and how much desire they have to help others.

"This year they have raised funds for CAFOD, held a fair trade stall, made prayer cards for those who are sick, purchased world gifts and organised a collection of goods for the homeless in Hull."

SVP member and school governor Maureen

Mulligan was instrumental in liaising with the Mini Vinnies.

In Richmond, St Francis Xavier SVP Youth and St Mary's Mini Vinnies are also thriving. The SVP group at SFX of about 15 pupils meets weekly. Many members are also members of the school worship band and have planned the end of term Easter Service.

Students also attended Flame at Wembley Arena, shared a weekend chaplaincy retreat together at Osmotherley Youth Hostel and enjoyed outdoor activities as part of a forest church programme, as well as visiting St Mary's Primary School to meet up with the Minnie Vinnies there.

### Bishop's Blessing For New Chaplaincy Team


Bishop Terry gave his blessing to what is thought to be the first NHS chaplaincy leadership team of its kind during a visit to James Cook University Hospital in Middlesbrough.

Deacon Len Collings, from Blessed Nicholas Postgate Parish, Redcar, has been appointed as one of two joint lead chaplains for the South Tees Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, alongside Baptist minister Rodney Breckon.

Deacon Len has been the Roman Catholic chaplain at James Cook for the last seven years, while Reverend Rodney has been a member of the chaplaincy team at both James Cook and the Friarage Hospital Northallerton for more than 20 years.

As well as these two hospitals, the new team will be responsible for chaplaincy provision at the trust's hospitals in Redcar, Guisborough, Brotton and Richmond. Deacon Len said he was humbled and honoured to be appointed to such a rewarding role and is excited at the prospect of taking the team forward alongside Reverend

During his visit, Bishop Terry enjoyed chatting to patients and staff on several wards, before the short blessing ceremony in the hospital chapel.



# St Alphonsus' Recognised As School Of Sanctuary

Pupils and staff from St Alphonsus' Catholic Primary School enjoyed a very special visit to Middlesbrough Town Hall to be recognised as a School of Sanctuary.

The title confirms the school is committed to offering a safe and welcoming place for all, especially those whose lives are in danger in their own country, have troubles at home or are just looking for a space of safety.

"Receiving the School of Sanctuary Award is a fantastic achievement for the pupils, staff and governors," said headteacher Angela McCann. "We pride ourselves in providing a place where all pupils feel welcomed, valued and, above all, safe."

A School of Sanctuary helps its students, staff and the wider community understand what it means to be seeking sanctuary and to extend a welcome to everyone as equal, valued members of the school community.

Teesside is recognised for its groundbreaking Schools of Sanctuary stream, with many other areas using its assessment framework.

According to their section 48 inspection report last year, "St Alphonsus' Catholic Primary School is a beacon in the community and embraces, nurtures and cares for all pupils of different backgrounds and abilities. It offers high levels of pastoral care to all concerned within the school family."

The school's engagement includes a young interpreters' group, bilingual and multilingual children who represent a number of the different cultures and languages. Through their supportive network, and using their skills and experiences, the children work hard to ensure newly arrived children and their families settle into our school, often acting as interpreters.

"Receiving this award is a great honour, which

recognises the continuous hard work of dedicated staff and pupils who all play a vital part in ensuring new arrivals to our school are happy, settle quickly and are given the tools to help them to access their learning," added Miss McCann.

St Alphonsus' recently joined the newly formed Nicholas Postgate Catholic Academy Trust (NPCAT), a family of 25 schools, a sixth form and teaching school. With more than 9,000 students and 1,200 staff, NPCAT is now the North-East's largest Catholic trust and the second largest Catholic multi-academy trust in the UK.

"We are thrilled one of our schools has received this accolade," said NPCAT's primary standards officer, Nicky Jamalizadeh.

"This is an inclusive trust and as such we also acknowledge and celebrate the many different backgrounds and cultures of the pupils in our schools. Displays, focus weeks and regular events enable students to both share their own culture and to also learn about others, including our own Catholic faith, while all the time promoting tolerance."

### **Workshops Promote Teamwork And Confidence**

More than 175 pupils from five Nicholas Postgate Catholic Academy Trust (NPCAT) schools took part in workshops designed to promote self-confidence, self-esteem, teamwork and respect for others through music, dance and performance.

In addition, 35 children from the local community joined NPCAT pupils, with their places subsidised by an Aviva Community Fund grant.

The workshops were run by the Young Americans International Music Outreach Tour, which began in 1992 and aims to bring music back into schools and discover musical talents.

Children from St Bede's Catholic Primary in Marske-by-the-Sea, St Gabriel's Catholic Primary, Ormesby, St Joseph's Catholic Primary, Loftus, St Paulinus Catholic Primary, Guisborough, and the Sacred Heart Catholic Secondary School, Redcar, attended two three-day programmes at St Gabriel's, St Paulinus and the Sacred Heart.

Pupils aged from six to 17 years attended a twoday workshop with the programmes culminating in a finale presentation to parents and the local community on day three for the children to showcase their newly discovered abilities.

"Thank you for teaching me and inspiring me to be confident in myself," said one St Gabriel's pupil afterwards. "You are so helpful and caring towards me and others.'

"Thank you all for being such amazing teachers, performers and friends," said another pupil.

One St Gabriel's mum said her daughter was a little anxious at first but then loved it, adding: "I think she needed it to boost her confidence. Thank you for giving her the opportunity.

And a mum from St Paulinus added: "My girls have had an absolute ball and have made so

many new friends and amazing memories."

Hugh Hegarty, NPCAT's chief executive officer, said: "We were delighted to work again with the Young Americans initiative. The programme is inspiring and something truly valuable.

"Music brings people together and serves so many purposes, including teamwork, respect, accomplishment, caring, self-discipline and a sense of self-worth. The youth programmes have touched lives across the world and been praised by









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
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



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

inspired by the papal visit in 2010 and aims to reignite and encourage young people to live out their faith. I don't think there was one person who left the arena that day who was not reignited!

This year, the theme was "Significance" and we were steeped with the message that we are beloved, we are worthy and that our life has meaning. Perhaps this can seem cliché but who of us does not need to be reminded of this over and over again? Who does not desire this truth to permeate our being to its very core? Who of us truly lives out of this reality?

The day was interspersed with speakers, moments of praise and worship, rap beats from Guvna B and a dramatic presentation. Speakers included Archbishop Eamon Martin, who spoke about his experience at last year's Synod on Young People, about the need for us to be the ones to reach those on the outside of the Church, offering hope and truth.

There was also a recorded interview with Jean Vanier, founder of the L'Arche community. He was asked how we can become happy and said that often we are unhappy because of the tension we experience between what we dream and the crushing of that dream because of our pursuit of other things, such as popularity and success.

His answer really made me examine my own heart — do I live in pursuit of my deepest desire, which is union with God? Or do I allow myself to be pulled into the pursuit of other things, which leave me feeling dissatisfied and empty?

A favourite of mine was a speaker from Texas, Robert Madu, who had us all laughing to tears. His emphasis was on, "Staying in your own lane and keeping your eyes on Jesus."

He reminded us that God has given us all that we need to accomplish our mission in life and that we begin to fall when we start comparing ourselves to those around us. God created us and knows us, we need to look to him to know where we are going.

As a runner in a race needs to stay in his own lane and keep his focus ahead on the finish, we need to stay in our "own lane" and keep our focus on Jesus.

As we were encouraged again and again to seek our worth in how God sees us and to believe that each of us has a unique and beautiful mission to fulfil, we were led to the source, himself, in Eucharistic Adoration.

This was the highlight for me, being gathered in these moments of silence with the very one who loves us and gives meaning to our lives. In my own life I have experienced the power of being in the Presence of Jesus in Adoration. He truly changes things.

What can I say after this day, except that there is hope in the Church? People often lament, "There are no young people" — well, there are! Pray for and encourage them. It's a challenging world to make your way in, but there is definitely hope.

#### Pupils were presented with sprigs of shamrock flown over from Ireland during St Patrick's Day celebrations in Thornaby.

Children from all three of the town's Catholic schools – St Patrick's College, St Patrick's Primary School and Christ the King Primary School – gathered for a special Mass at St Patrick's Church on Friday morning.

Parish priest Father Patrick O'Neill, a native of County Tipperary, told the children they were honouring a tradition that stretches back for many generations.

"Your parents, your grandparents and maybe even your great-grandparents went to St Patrick's School and were part of this faith family," he said.

"Be proud of your green blazers and jumpers and let everybody know you're proud because this wonderful tradition is a huge part of Thornaby life."

Shamrock is traditionally worn on St Patrick's Day in honour of the saint, who used its three leaves to explain the doctrine of the Holy Trinity – God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit.

Derry-born Hugh Hegarty, chief executive of

Nicholas Postgate Catholic Academy Trust, said: "This is a time when we reflect on all those Irish men and women who travelled right across the world, and especially here to Thornaby and all over Teesside, and were made welcome and had a positive impact on establishing strong Catholic communities.

"St Patrick's Day is an opportunity to reflect upon your faith journey, but it's also a time for fun and enjoyment and to celebrate who we are."

St Patrick's College deputy head Damian McCann, who is from Dublin, added: "As an Irishman, you take the message of St Patrick everywhere you go. It's a story of people who had to leave their own homeland in many cases and took with them the eternal message of Christ with us. That deep faith is central to what St Patrick represents."

### New Campaign Focus Is Our Common Home

Climate change is the single biggest threat to reducing poverty, whether it's flooding destroying homes or unpredictable seasons leading to failed harvests.

It's undoing years of our work together to improve people's lives and affects our health, our homes, our heritage and our beautiful landscapes. It ruins the work we do to fight poverty and to lead better lives. We have made huge progress on climate change, but the situation is urgent now.

### Playful Hippos Delay Journey Home

Francis Hannaway, from St Gabriel's Parish, Middlesbrough, lives and works in Basankusu Diocese, in the Democratic Republic of Congo. Today, two hippos bid farewell to Father John.

Father John Kirwan was granted a month's visit back to Basankusu ahead of his retirement.

"I've lived and worked here for many years and with these few weeks I can make my farewells to people I've got to know," he said.

Our malnutrition centre had just stocked up on milk powder, beans and so on, and all the volunteers had attended our latest training sessions. Numbers were thankfully down during April

"Perhaps I could take a holiday," I thought. "I could travel back to England with Father John before the malnutrition centre fills up again in June, July and August."

Our team of visiting eye-doctors was due to arrive soon from Belgium. Their 16-seater plane would be travelling back to Kinshasa empty, so it would great to take advantage of it.

Father John spent his last few weeks visiting the villages where he'd worked. With plenty of goodbye meals at various places, his celebrations culminated the Sunday before his departure with a Mass in Basankusu's cathedral, followed by an evening at the bishop's house.

The eye doctors said hello as we passed at the airstrip.

"They're expecting us to treat more than 3,000 patients in two weeks this year," explained Yann, the doctors' organiser.


"I'm sure you'll do your best!" I replied.

And with that, Father John and I climbed the steps of the plane and we were on our way to kinchaga.

We took three hours to pass over the hundreds of miles of tropical forest, eventually landing on the decaying surface of Kinshasa's city airport at Ndolo.

From there we passed the marine engineers, Chanimetal, on the River Congo and ran into a huge traffic jam. The traffic was at a complete standstill

"What do you think the problem could be?" I asked Father John.



I could see that he'd already spotted the problem, as people were already getting out of their cars and holding up their phones to photograph something.

The marine engineers' compound has a large area of land leading to the river's edge.

"Look down there," said Father John. "Something's splashing around!"

And there they were – two hippos, running up onto the riverbank and then racing back into

the water

They disappeared underwater and then suddenly reappeared, snorting and splashing about and generally having a good time.

It's an unusual sight in Kinshasa. The passing motorists had certainly never seen such a thing before and neither had we!

"Perhaps they'd heard that you're leaving and they've come to say goodbye," I said.

### Varied Programme For Catholic History Day

This year's York Catholic History Day will take place at the Bar Convent on Saturday June 1.

Registration is from 10am and the programme begins at 10.30am with a paper by Dr Wilfred Hammond, who has researched the political engagement of the Lancashire gentry in the reign of Elizabeth I.

His lecture, entitled "Rethinking the Rebellion of the Northern Earls, 1569", provides the opportunity to reconsider the rebellion 450

years ago, in which many northern Catholics were involved.

Dr Emilie Murphy, lecturer in Early Modern History at the University of York, will give the second paper, on Catholic music and memory in post-Reformation England.

After lunch, Dr Peter Doyle, whose history of Upholland College was published last year, will give a paper on "Keeping the world at bay – Seminary training in England and Wales, 1850-

1950".

The brief final session of the day is an opportunity for participants to comment, make suggestions for the future, advertise recent and forthcoming publications and future events of interest, as well as asking for help and information with current research. The day will end with Mass in the Bar Convent chapel.

### Changing Chapels - A Lasting Legacy Of Faith

A recent press article on the restoration of a weekend ferry service across the River Ouse between Beningbrough and Nun Monkton reminded me of the history of the chapels that served Catholics in the area during the last four centuries.

That history begins with a chapel in the manor house of the Appleby family at Linton-on-Ouse, the Applebys being listed as

"recusants" (refusing to conform to the Church of England) from at least the 1630s and providing from their ranks Mother Mary Appleby, one of the earliest superiors of the Bar Convent in York.

The family ceased to be Lords of the Manor at Linton in 1706, but the Will of Hugh Appleby, made in 1701, left £1,500 for the maintenance of a priest there and further sums were added, including £200 bequeathed by Rev John Johnson in 1739.

Nine families attended fortnightly or threeweekly Masses in 1743, the priest usually travelling out from the chapel at Little Blake Street in York (today's St Wilfrid's). In 1791, when Catholic chapels could be legally registered, Rev William Croskell described that at Linton as "a certain part of my dwelling house."

Croskell, we know, was as often resident in York as in Linton because he had responsibility for the finances of the secular clergy in Yorkshire at the time, but clearly there was a building at Linton. In fact, we know that the lease on a dwelling house expired in 1856, after which date the chaplain of the Bar Convent travelled out occasionally to celebrate Mass in a private house.

However, no site for a new chapel could be found in Linton. Instead, in 1862, land was purchased at Nun Monkton, on the opposite side of the Ouse but linked by ferry. Anciently, Nun Monkton had been the site of a hermit's cell and then of a priory of Benedictine Nuns, whose chapel remains as St Mary's Anglican Church (hence the name "Nun Monkton").

Two grainy photographs of the chapel built in 1862 or thereabouts and dedicated to St Joseph survive in the archives of Ushaw College. From the outside it appears very much like a house but the interior photograph shows a narrow chapel with pews, a tar rails, a reredos behind the altar and a circular window above containing coloured or stained glass.

It survived until 1951 and its demise may have followed the establishment of an RAF chaplaincy at Linton during the Second World War and maintained thereafter. When it closed

it was sold to Mr R Wray, great-grandson of the man who originally sold the land, and was converted into a house. The baptism register for Nun Monkton begins as the Linton register in 1851 and contains baptisms up to 1956.

Those registered after 1951 took place at Green Hammerton, further out from York on the Harrogate road and not far from Allerton Park, once home to the Catholic Stourton family, which had its own priest and registers into the mid-2oth century. Mass was celebrated in the Village Reading Room at Green Hammerton from the closure of Nun Monkton and the dedication to St Joseph, plus the parish funds and endowments, were transferred there.

A letter from 1960 indicates that 110 parishioners lived in the parish, scattered through 11 villages, and that £325 was to be spent on purchasing a disused Congregational church. That building today is St Joseph's, Green Hammerton, a chapel-of-ease to Our Lady's, York, and the heir of a long tradition of faith in this small area close to the confluence of the Ouse and the Nidd.

### Lay a foundation of faith

I bequeath my chalice, paten and vestments to whichever Nephew of mine has been ordained for the longest period at the date of my death and if none of my Nephews has been ordained at that date I bequeath my said chalice paten and vestments to the said Middlesbrough Diocese.

### 100 Years Ago

(From The Hull Catholic Magazine)

We regret to announce the death which took place at Fort William, Ontario, Canada, of Private Michael Walsh, only son of Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Walsh, 116 Lambert Street. Private Walsh was educated at Pryme Street School and afterwards at Mount St Mary's College, Chesterfield. He went to Canada in 1912 and later to America. After the outbreak of hostilities he being so desirous of serving his King and Country, returned to Fort Francis, Ontario, where he joined up, coming to England in 1916 and afterwards going to France. He was wounded in the battle of the Somme, and on April 9th 1917 at Vimy Ridge received serious wounds from the effects of which he never recovered. He returned to Canada for discharge in May last but developed pneumonia and died earlier this year.

### **Ebor Lecture Series Underway**

The thirteenth series of Ebor Lectures has got underway at York St John University with the theme of "Science: Wonder, Gift and Challenge".

The lectures promote a conversation between theology and public issues and contribute to the creation of personal and collective decision-making in economic, political and social

Lecturers come from a wide array of fields and will explore the extraordinary possibilities offered by science to examine the beauty, fragility and complexity of the world and consider what it means to be human in a rapidly changing technological society.

The first lecture, by the former registrar and secretary at Gresham College. London, Dr Valerie Shrimplin, discussed how the beginning and end of the universe have been portrayed visually.

She considered examples of art from ancient times through to Michelangelo's depiction of the Creation and Last Judgment in the Sistine Chapel and up to the present day.

Before the lecture, the two winners of the Ebor Lectures Essay Competition were presented with their prizes by the chair of the lectures committee, Canon Dr Christopher Collingwood.

The prize is given to students who submit essays on any aspect of "Theology and Public Life".

Isobel Hedley-Jones, from York, was one of the winners for her essay on environmental issues and climate

Forthcoming lecturers in the series include two prominent Catholic scientists, Dame Ottoline Leyser, of the University of Cambridge, on Wednesday July 3, and Brother Guy Consolmagno, director of the Vatican Observatory, who will give both a lecture and presentation for families on Wednesday

The next lecture is on Wednesday June 5 when physicist, natural philosopher and Anglican lay reader Professor Tom McLeish speaks on "Science as Gift not Threat: An Essential Culture-Change for the Church".





A spokesman said: "Christus Vivit is a watershed moment in the Church's ministry to young people.


"It will become a handbook for all priests,



### **Baby Hospice Appeals For Vital Funds**



Middlesbrough's only dedicated baby hospice has made a desperate appeal for support to prevent it from having to close its doors for two days a week.

Zoë's Place Baby Hospice issued a rallying call to the public to ensure this service remains in the heart of the town after increasing demand and changes in respite care funding.

Situated in the historic Crossbeck House, a former convent in Normanby, Zoë's Place provides palliative, respite and bereavement care for families of babies and children with life-limiting or life-threatening illnesses. Since opening its doors in 2004 it has cared for more than 350 children.

The hospice today has more than 30 babies and young children receiving regular nursing

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While the majority of the families are local, it has cared for children from as far afield as Scarborough. But general manager Mark Guidery says it now faces having to close for one or two nights each week, leaving families without this precious provision.

"We hope everyone in Middlesbrough will get behind us by giving regularly," he said. "We have to find £1.5m a year to keep our doors open. If supporters give just £10 a month each via direct debit or call by the hospice to make a one-off donation it will help our children and their families to get the care and support they




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
