Bishop's Column

Jesus said: *May they all be one. Father, may they be one in us, as you are in me and I am in you, so that the world may believe that it was you who sent me.* (John 17:20-21)

The call to pray for unity goes back to Jesus' very own words spoken at the last supper. His words show us the unity and love between Jesus and his Father. They help us to share Jesus' life with his Father. They also tell us that without unity we cannot share the Gospel in the world.

During the last 50 years much has been achieved thus we must celebrate the unity that we already share in Christ, give thanks for it and pray that it may be continually deepened. Yes, we have travelled a long way down the road together, in the last couple of generations. But, there is a long history of division, arrogance, ignorance, apathy and sin going before, and progress will only be made with openness to the Spirit of Jesus, patience and perseverance.

The end of the first millennium brought with it the painful split between the Eastern and Western Churches. During the course of the second millennium the Reformation fragmented the Church in Europe and then beyond and the rise of colonialism has impacted the divisions. As we move into the third millennium there is a feeling that there has been little progress made in any of these difficulties.

However, we must remember that the road back to unity will be long and difficult and we have hardly begun the journey. Still the divided Churches are not agreed on how unity is going to come about. Hence it is important to set down the various ways in which the different Churches understand visible unity, to set out where their views converge and diverge. As Churches we are also challenged to seek renewal from God, for unity cannot come without renewal.

If the Churches are to be more faithful and effective ambassadors of reconciliation, we cannot ignore our inherited divisions, but must face them, so that renewed together, we may present a common witness to the world united to Jesus who prayed, and is praying that all may be one so that the world may believe.

Attend with favour to the prayers of your people, we ask, O Lord, and grant that the hearts of believers may be united in your praise and in repentance together, so that with divisions among Christians overcome, we may hasten with joy to your eternal kingdom in the perfect communion of the Church. Through Christ our Lord. Amen. (Roman Missal)

The Big Tees Sleep Out

There are many initiatives that help to support the needy and poor around Christmas and as a Catholic Community, we are very generous but something about the Big Tees Sleep Out grabbed the attention of the MYMission Team. At the end of November, we joined around 90 other people who all met together for the night and slept rough on the street, just outside Middlesbrough College. Together, we all raised around £17,000. The generosity of the local Catholic family meant that the Mission Team raised around £3,500 of that total sum. However, the night ended up being about so much more than the money.


The first thing to highlight is that the night was organised at pretty short notice in response to many requests from homeless shelters and foodbanks in the Teesside area who were concerned that they did not have enough resources to meet the demands the Christmas period would place upon them. What kind of communities are we growing that we need these places? And if that's not worrying enough, how is it that they themselves are having to make emergency appeals?

Secondly, the sleep out was undertaken by a group of people so diverse, the only thing we had in common was that we were all sleeping outside for the night. Young and old, male and female, there was a real sense of community and levelling. We were all in the same boat together for the same reason. We wanted to try to help. The third point we would make is that our experience was not an experience of homelessness. We all had many layers and good sleeping bags. We all had some food and access to a hot drink and a toilet. We all knew that once we got through the night, we could all head home for a hot bath and a couple of hours sleep to catch up on what was lost the night before.

But what we did get was a bit of an insight. It was cold, really cold, and once we were there and had unrolled our mats, that was it. Of course we could talk to each other, but there was no TV, no books, no place to charge our phones and not a lot to do. It may sound silly, but it really mattered. All of a sudden, all of the things that surround us on a daily basis were gone. Either left at home, run out of charge, or not essential



enough for us to have during a night on the streets. That was the real impact of the night for us - realising that when you do not know where you are going to sleep from night to night then so many other things that are part of daily life are lost too. As we all pulled ourselves together very early in the morning once we had done the sleep out, the only word everyone had in common was "humbling". And the experience was certainly that.

Pope Francis has constantly been asking for a poor Church for the poor. We only spent one night in a sleeping bag but it has got us reflecting upon the level of our outreach work. As a local Church, perhaps we need to think about how comfortable we are and how uncomfortable we are prepared to become in aid of our brothers and sisters in need. There is another sleep out planned for the first weekend in April. Bishops' Statement on Poverty

During their Autumn Meeting, the Bishops of England and Wales issued a 'Statement on Poverty' which we are reproducing below. By coincidence, this January edition of Catholic Voice contains a much larger section on the work of 'Christian Discipleship' in our Diocese than the other areas of life, worship and work usually featured. Christian Discipleship is the heading under which in the Diocese of Middlesbrough we gather our Catholic Social Action or Caritas activities and what this means in practice is illustrated by the wide range of social action articles in this edition of our Diocesan paper. During 2014 it is hoped that we will begin to develop a 'Caritas Network', which is referred to in the Bishops' Statement, for the Diocese of Middlesbrough to enable us to be more effective in the 'Witness to Charity' that we give. Again by happy coincidence, January sees the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity and the Diocese will be welcoming Archbishop John Sentamu of York to our Cathedral. Social action for the relief of poverty and its consequences is an area where Christians of all denominations already work effectively together for the Common Good and more is developing all the time

The Statement:

Many families and individuals in our society face a continuing struggle with real poverty and the challenge this brings of living with human dignity. Pope Francis has consistently emphasised that the care of the poor, and serving those in need are fundamental to the life of the Church, and that "among our tasks as witnesses to the love of Christ is that of giving a voice to the cry of the poor". He challenges the whole of society to remember the poor; to recognise the dignity and gifts of each person; to resist stigmatising the poor; to persevere in creating the common good by actively engaging in our local communities to alleviate poverty and address social injustices. Jesus tells us in St Matthew's Gospel that in serving the poor we are serving Him: "Insofar as you did this to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me". (Matt 25:40)

The divisive nature of poverty threatens the fabric of our society. Widening economic inequality corrodes the common good and further steps are needed both to curb unjustifiably high pay, and to promote a living wage for all in work.

Inspired by the love of Christ, we reaffirm our commitment to find ways appropriate to local situations whereby dioceses can give greater support and coherence to Catholic social action through the establishment of diocesan 'Caritas' networks or structures.

The Work and Role of Credit Unions

The Archbishop of Canterbury has expressed serious concerns about the practice of payday lending. In doing so, he has given voice to a growing belief, within the Church and wider society, that there is a need for a more ethical and just financial system, and that more should be done to develop alternatives to high-interest lending. Credit Unions represent a more ethical, community-based approach and for that reason, there is a call for churches and church members to support credit unions in their local area.

What are Credit Unions?

Credit Unions are not-for-profit financial cooperatives that are owned and controlled by their members. They are regulated by the Financial Conduct Authority and all savings are protected up to a total of £85,000 per member. All members are required to share a 'common bond', for example, the Pioneer Credit Union in Middlesbrough has a live/work common bond. This means that membership is available to anyone who lives or works within the boundary of Middlesbrough. These common bonds help to ensure that Credit Unions take a relational approach, since their members have an interest in pursuing practices that are good for the community as a whole.

Credit Unions offer a range of services all designed to support local people in good money management.

- **Saving.** You can save as little or as much as you like. Money worries are one of the biggest causes of stress, depression and anxiety and often this can be the result of an unexpected change in your circumstances or an unforeseen event. Savings can help to protect you and your family from some of the worry, if your situation takes a turn for the worst.
- **Low cost loans.** Credit Unions expect their members to save regularly for approximately 13 weeks before applying for a loan. The amount you will be able to get depends on how much you need, what you can afford to pay back, and the Credit Union's loan policies.
- Christmas Saving Clubs. Members can put money into a Christmas account at any time throughout the year but you are not able to withdraw your savings until November, so everything you have saved will be ready for your Christmas shopping.
- **Special offers and deals** eg Credit Unions in Middlesbrough and Redcar & Cleveland are working closely with Co-op Electrical, to allow Credit Union members to buy electrical goods of all descriptions at the lowest possible prices.

The story of a young mum

A lady contacted the Redcar & Cleveland Credit Union, she had small children

and her washer had broken down. We had a small pot of money and were able to get a washer for her from our Co-op Electrical goods scheme through a loan. She has paid this back, saved at the same time and is now obtaining loyalty loans through the Credit Union. She knew nothing about us before she got the goods, but is now telling everyone that she knows that the Credit Union is the 'best thing that could have happened to her'. She has just been in for her Christmas loan and was surprised at the amount that she could obtain and her words were to her partner "We will have the best Christmas ever, be able to buy ourselves presents as well as the kids, but more importantly, be able to afford to pay it back!!"

How can you get involved?

Here are some suggestions of how you and/or your church can support Credit Unions.

• Find your local Credit Union. Over 90% of the British population is able to join a Credit Union because of where they live. Credit Unions in the Middlesbrough Diocese include:

- Join your local Credit Union. Why not start a savings or Christmas account? Everyone can benefit from Credit Union membership. For those on middle or higher incomes, the local and ethical focus makes sense for at least part of your savings.
- **Spread the word.** Play your part in spreading the word about Credit Unions in your church and local community.
- Offer your time and skills. Credit Unions need local people with a variety
 of experience and skills to help; you can volunteer from as little as two
 hours per week.

York Youth Hungry for Change

CAFOD's Hungry for Change campaign opens our eyes to a harrowing truth: "We live in a world where 870 million people go hungry yet we actually produce enough to feed everyone. The way we share food just isn't working". On the



evening of 27th November 2013 at St George's Church, York, a team of young people from local churches came together to produce what was a truly inspiring Advent Service and added their voices to the campaign against the state of the worldwide food system.

Running up to the CAFOD Advent Service, the youth from St Aelred's, St George's and English Martyrs churches had been learning about the way food is produced, distributed and wasted across the world. As many others have found, when discovering the way in which we live in comparison to others, something is not right, something needs to be done and something **can** be done. The team of young people set out to tell others what they had learnt, and encouraged the congregation to pass on the message given that evening. People had come from parishes all across the city and after hearing the story of the feeding of the 5,000, each of these people was given the opportunity to sign campaign cards - to encourage the support and influence of the Prime Minister for a fairer food system worldwide.

Not only did the young manage to inspire many hearts that evening but nearly £200.00 was raised for CAFOD. Thank you to all who were involved, as you discovered, we really do have the power to make a difference.

the excellent work of Catholic charities and parishes, many of whom are members of the Caritas Social Action Network, who are at the forefront of the practical response to domestic poverty. Their work includes running community day centres, breakfast programmes in schools, emergency accommodation through night shelters, and professional welfare advice services. Many charities are expanding and diversifying their services in response to the increased need, with several launching new initiatives such as support to those affected by restrictions to their benefits, provision of household essentials through foodbanks, and access to ICT and skills training.

What are Mini Vinnies?

Unluckiest Prophets

Fresh from the 2013 Edinburgh Fringe, F Mary Callan brought 'Blazing Grannies', her 'inside reports' of familiar Bible stories, to St Aelred's UCM on 19th November 2013. Mary writes and presents as one-woman performances, her dramatizations of stories from both the Old and New Testaments. These dramatizations fill out the familiar characters with human emotions and perspectives, which allows greater insight and understanding of these characters which we normally encounter in more formal settings. They put the story into the language of real people and introduce God's input.

The performance we were treated to was entitled 'Unluckiest Prophets' which began with dramatizations of excerpts from the Old Testament, Genesis to Jeremiah and finished with excerpts from the New Testament, Matthew and the Acts of the Apostles. To set the scene, Mary donned a different length of fabric from an array set out behind her, which was sufficient to bring the character to life. Mary also performs inside stories from St John's Gospel, 'Hands-On Messiah', and a wide range set of stories which illustrate aspects of families in crisis which are found in both Old and New Testaments.

Mary told us that the more she reads the Bible, the more she finds within its pages, concerning the developing relationship between God and Man in the bringing about God's plan. While we cannot say that this is what was said at the time, through our common humanity and understanding there appears to be a truth about the stories she tells which enriches the familiar and humanises the characters, bringing them closer to us. Mary has a premiere of her new show entitled 'King David's Wives' at St Paul's Church, Holgate Road, York on 11th March at 7.00 pm.

Union of Catholic Mothers Diocesan Study Day

St Aelred's, York Foundation hosted the Diocesan Study Day on Saturday 23rd November 2013 with the theme 'Who Cares for the Carers?' At a time when the benefits regime is becoming ever more stringent and the population as a whole is ageing, it is very important that the voluntary sector promotes awareness of the roles of unpaid carers and the stresses they undergo. Our Study Day opened with a welcome from our Diocesan President, Hilda Carney. Addresses were given by Edna Hunneysett and Kath Stubbs (UCM Diocesan Media Officer) on their roles as carers. Edna made a most eloquent plea for more understanding and support for those caring for people with mental illness and Kath gave a wonderfully measured account of living with an Alzheimer's sufferer. No one could fail to be moved by their experiences. Catherine McGlinchey then chaired a discussion session before we broke for lunch. During the discussion, many issues were raised about caring in a variety of settings, including our Catholic schools, care homes and hospitals as well as in the domestic setting and useful information was exchanged.

After lunch, we were addressed by Sarah Fitsell of York Carers' Centre. This is a voluntary organisation working in partnership with the City of York Council and the Clinical Commissioning Group. Although specific to York, Sarah reminded us that all local authorities at present have a similar arrangement. The York Carers' Centre can supply information on a host of carer related questions and their emphasis is on the carer, not on the person/people being cared for. They can provide free legal advice, help with the benefit system, support for young carers, and act as an umbrella organisation for many other agencies. They also run a programme of leisure activities for carers. Sarah gave a good, clear talk on what they do and an excellent question and answer session ensued.

The afternoon finished with tea and cake and a chance to chat to old friends and we were able to thank all our speakers for a most stimulating day. If there were any regrets, they were that the nature of caring is such that it can be very difficult for carers to get out to a day of this sort, and we resolved to take what we had learned out into our community and to spread the word. We were delighted that our parish priest, Father Bill Serplus, was able to attend for most of the sessions.

UCM members are at the heart of many parish activities and can be a very important pressure group on social issues. We also play an important role in providing a happy and stimulating environment for our members and friends. If you are not a member already, think about joining your local Foundation. For example, if you are recently retired or have a little time to spare, you could find a whole new group of friends and fresh ways of using your talents!

The Legacy of Doctor John O'Neill

Benjamin Franklin famously said on creating a legacy that one needed to "either write something worth reading or do something worth writing". Now, I'm not sure John O'Neill would have described himself as a literary great; however, his actions certainly merit writing about. Doctor John O'Neill with the help of the Ethiopian Medical Fund (EMF) played a crucial role in establishing and providing a steady stream of support to two Ethiopian medical clinics, the facilities have since provided critical support to those in desperate need. As reported in the December Voice, sadly John died in October 2013. He gave so much to the Diocese and beyond. However, given that he did so much to warrant writing about, it would seem only natural then, to do all we can to ensure a unique legacy continues and thrives. It was with this in mind that when a request for both medical and material help for the over 80,000 Eritrean refugees currently in Ethiopia was received, we took the initiative to organise a meeting with the Ethiopian Ambassador to the UK, His Excellency Ambassador Berhanu Kebede.

The two of us attended the meeting which took place on Thursday 28th November 2013 at the Ethiopian Embassy in London. Bini Araia is known to many in the Diocese for his outstanding work for the North of England Refugee Service. In general terms, the purpose of the meeting was to discover how the Ethiopian authorities could provide some concrete help if the EMF, with additional support, agreed to open its door for Eritrean refugees with serious medical need.

Patrick made a presentation to the Ambassador and Hirut

communities in Ethiopia. Bini then followed the discussion by providing some detail on the sufferings of the Eritrean refugees and presenting a proposal for some long term collaboration. The Ambassador reassured us despite the political tensions with the Eritrean authorities, it is his country's desire and strategic plan to form people to people relationships between the communities of both countries and thus was keen to support any initiative that would alleviate the sufferings of Eritrean refugees in the country.

John has provided the roots for us to nourish and develop. National Conference for Rural Catholics

"Over the last ten years flooding has been a problem in many parishes. I am glad that the 2014 Conference for Rural Catholics is grasping the issue and looking at a pastoral response. I encourage Catholics from parishes across the country to attend the conference" says The Bishop of Hexham and Newcastle, who speaks on Rural Issues for the Bishops' Conference.

Who can forget the stirring pictures of flooding at Boscastle in Devon, of Tewkesbury Abbey surrounded by flood water, or a dozen other places over the last decade? Flooding has touched many parishes throughout the country and seems to be threatening many more. The Bishop of East Anglia, together with clergy and laity from parishes in several dioceses, have already booked to hear the current picture when Phil Rothwell, Head of Flood and Coastal Risk at the Department of the Environment, speaks about the situation nationally. A further session will look at 'Responding Pastorally to Flooding'.

Other issues on the conference programme include a Church presence at the local show, and the increasing number of village pub closures. There will also be a visit to the company which handles most of East Anglia's grain. By contrast, the hustle and bustle of St Edward's was also great fun and we were delighted to return there. Indeed, we seem hardly to be able to stay away with a return visit already in the pipeline. The Team is a more dynamic group this year. We are comfortable

CCRS

It's always good to celebrate achievement, especially when it brightens up a dark November evening! It was a real pleasure, therefore, to host a gathering for those members of our Diocesan family who recently completed the Catholic Certificate in Religious Studies (CCRS). We met at Our Lady's, Acomb, hoping that this would be a convenient mid-point for the groups who have been studying in Hull and Middlesbrough for the past two years. We were given a warm welcome by members of the parish and by Canon John Lumley, Episcopal Vicar for Evangelisation and newly appointed parish priest. Canon John offered Mass for us and we were then treated to a buffet prepared by some of his new parishioners.

The CCRS was re-launched in two Diocesan centres in the autumn of 2011 as a way to give everyone an opportunity to learn more about the teachings of the Church. In the past, most CCRS students were teachers in our Catholic schools but now the course is available for anyone who wishes to study at some depth. Our recent 'graduates' are quite evenly divided between teachers, parish catechists and those pursuing the course for their own interest. The CCRS programme is divided into eight separate 'modules' that can be studied over a minimum of two years and a maximum of five. Anyone is welcome to take individual modules without the need to study for the full qualification - some enrol to learn more about Scripture, for instance, or about The Church and The Sacraments.

If you would like to know more about the CCRS and what it might lead on to, you would be very welcome to contact the Adult Formation Department. In a couple of years, it might be your achievement that we're celebrating!

Indulgences and Martin Luther

Indulgences and Martin Luther was the challenging title of November's talk to the Cleveland Newman Circle - their last of this calendar year. The speaker was a Circle member, Mr Kevin Ryan, whose interests include the history of indulgences and their practice in modern Christian life.

Since earliest times there has been agreement about the value of offering one's sufferings - alongside those of the Lord - for the good of others. There has also been a tradition of praying for the souls of the dead in purgatory. In the sixth century Celtic Church specific 'tariff penances' were allocated for serious sins in confession: for example the penance for fornication with a married woman should last four years, theft carried a seven year penance, homosexual acts a ten year penance and a repentant heretic a twelve year penance. The aim was that *all* penances should be completed before the person died but, if not, then *the living could undertake the penances for the dead*.

From about 1000AD, the Church started to relax the burdens of penances by allowing 'indulgences' which remitted the physical punishments due to sin. Instead the penitent, having been forgiven in confession, offered prayers or good works or gave money to charity. Someone whose 'good work' was to go on a crusade gained an indulgence, as did someone who paid for another person to go on a crusade, or who gave property to a monastery, or donated money towards building St Peter's in Rome. This system became very open to abuse, as Martin Luther proclaimed in his '95 Theses' in 1517. Luther was openly critical about many church matters and in 1520 he was excommunicated. However we note that, just fifty years later, Pope St Pius V abolished all indulgences involving financial transactions.

Kevin Ryan quoted modern popes, particularly John Paul II, as urging us to value indulgences, by which God allows graces from 'the treasure chest of the church' to be applied to remit punishments due to (forgiven) sins. (Modern practice for gaining indulgences for one's self or for the dead involves *sacramental confession, Holy Communion, completing the 'action' designated and praying for the Pope's intention.*) Many in Kevin's audience felt uncomfortable with strict 'rules' being applied to circumstances which focus on Divine retribution rather than Divine Mercy. However all agreed that, being members of Christ's Body, we would wish to apply prayers and actions for the salvation of others.

The next Newman talk will be on 19th February when Reverend Vince Purcell will talk on *'Lumen Gentium', a great grace and a sure compass.* Talks are held in the Nevers Room at St Bernadette's, Nunthorpe, TS7 oEB and start at 7.45 pm (coffee from 7.30 pm). I truly mean it when I say that without these, we as a family would not be where we are now. They have helped me maintain the emotional, physical and spiritual strength that has allowed me, thus far, to make the progress that I have done and will continue to do so with your help. It has been equally important to the internal healing of me, my Grandma and all of the family and carried by this help, we are determined to continue on the road to recovery. Truly we bear witness to a series of mini miracles that are acted through you. The many who have made up the one body of our own personal Jesus. God's miracles are most effective when they are the whispered words of support when you feel completely alone and at breaking point.

There are many parties, without naming anyone (exceptions may apply) individually lest I invariably miss anyone out, which I will; that I on behalf of the family would like to express thanks to. To the Lourdes family; sometimes used as a throw away phrase but it truly is a family as we have discovered. The nurses, the brancardiers, the handmaids, priests and MYMission. All of which, unknowingly, became our adopted brothers, sisters, aunts, uncles, nieces and nephews when I first donned the blue jacket for the first time. The Knights of St Columba (Council 29), my brothers in Christ who again I reiterate have been brothers, not just to me but to my family. The Middlesbrough Catholic Fellowship for their continued care and support for us, in and out of hospital. All who helped at the funeral. Canon Gerard Robinson, the ladies of the Cathedral parish who provided such a wonderful spread; the flowers; a notable mention to the Lourdes Music Group and to everyone in attendance who brought the reverence and love to the service that was so appreciated by all the family. To all staff at the hospital, a special mention to the staff of wards 35 and 37, who cared for me so well. To all the strangers, the 'good Samaritans', who came to the aid of my family along this harrowing path. The kindness of the local Turkish people who when I had nothing to eat or drink, fed me and translated for me. To everyone who has come up to the family and asked how we have been, not a single one of these were wasted on us. Last, but not least, the family friends and extended family for being there no matter what. You know who you are and will be treasured by us always. Some say that tragedy makes or breaks our faith. I would beg to differ and say that it is faith, or lack of it, that makes or breaks us in times of tragedy. Thank you all for sharing your faith with us, to in turn allow us to let our faith help us make it through this time.
