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

Laurence's Spinach Spaghetti, Laura's Spicy Chick Pea Dish and Carys' Custard Cream Biscuit were winners all round as the children had to cook up something they would like to see on the school menu. Laurence won first prize in the competition. "I was shocked to be the overall winner" said Laurence. "When I told my dad, he was ecstatic. My mum uses the recipe a lot, we really like it." Carys was equally delighted to win a prize and said "I was surprised to win. My grandma was very surprised too; it is her recipe and one of my favourites."

The competition was organised by Mrs Caroline Roberts, who runs the after school Let's Get Cooking Club. "The remit for the children to enter the competition was to be able to make something they would like to see on the

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# Singing for success

One of the choirs from St Martin's Ampleforth, the Preparatory School to Ampleforth College, has won a place in the semi-finals of the 'BBC Songs of Praise Junior Choir of the Year' competition. This will be filmed at the ICC in Birmingham on Saturday 15th March and will feature choirs from six schools. Three choirs will then be selected to go through to the Final, which is filmed on the same day.

Head of Music at St Martin's Ampleforth, Vincent Conyngham, described his pleasure on hearing the news of the Choir's success: "The children work hard and for many hours at the huge repertoire of vocal music which we cover. To be featured on national television is both exciting and rewarding." Judges Myleene Klass, Suzi Digby and Ralph Allwood will have the task of deciding which three of the six choirs go through to the Final and then who is to be the overall

"The choice of music is very important" said Vincent Conyngham. "When we last entered the competition, I chose Howard Goodall's setting of Psalm 23, known to many as the theme tune to the TV sitcom 'The Vicar of Dibley'. This proved to be the wrong choice as it did not showcase the choir's talents as



fully as a more "upbeat" item. So our second prepared item, a wonderfully lively setting of 'Oh when the saints go marching in', was never heard, which was a disappointment to the children and to many associated with the school. This time I have chosen 'I the Lord of Sea and Sky' and arranged it in such a way as to show the choir's versatility. I hope that it will be what the judges are looking for, but

you never really know until it is all over. If that gets us through to the Final, then we will sing 'With Joyful Heart and Voice': this is a Canon for three-part Chorus with keyboard accompaniment by Luigi Cherubini (1760-1842) and English words by Henry Kihlken. I chose this as it includes unison, two-part and three-part singing, requires good breath control and needs a good range of dynamics.

It also requires great energy and commitment."

The semi-finals and the Final itself will be broadcast on BBC1 on two Sundays in April. The choristers at St Martin's Ampleforth sing weekly services in Ampleforth Abbey and at the end of this term, they will sing in the St Matthew Passion before embarking on a choral tour to Lisbon.



# Outstanding School

St Hedda's RC Primary School recently became the first school in the Diocese to be judged as outstanding under the new OFSTED framework used for inspecting schools. The school was judged outstanding overall with individual judgements of outstanding for achievement, teaching and learning, behaviour and leadership and management. # Evangelii Gaudium - The Joy of the Gospel

In the February edition of Catholic Voice, Deacon Vince Purcell began his reflections on the first Encyclical of Pope Francis. In this edition, Vince takes us through Chapter One.

Chapter One - The Church's Missionary Transformation

Pope Francis begins this chapter of his Apostolic Exhortation by reminding us of the missionary mandate given to us by Jesus himself: "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations..." The new translation of the Mass helps us to understand that this commandment is meant for each and every one of us for now the Deacon regularly tells us to "Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord". In other words, our Christian duty is not fulfilled simply by "hearing" Mass - when we ourselves have been nourished by word and by sacrament, we are charged with the obligation to bring the Good News of Jesus Christ to every person that we meet.

Pope Francis places each one of us in a long line of God's messengers, from Abraham to Moses, to Jeremiah and the other prophets and on to Jesus himself. Each of us, writes the Holy Father, will have to discern the individual path pointed out for us by the Lord but what we all share in common is the summons to "go forth from our own comfort zone in order to reach all the peripheries in need of the light of the Gospel". Pope Francis has a vision that calls for the Universal Church, each Diocese and indeed each individual parish to become "an evangelising community". Such a community is one that "gets involved by word and by deed in people's daily lives; it bridges long distances, it is willing to abase itself if necessary, and it embraces human life, touching the suffering flesh of Christ in others".

In words that he has made his own in the short time that he has been our Pope, Francis says yet again that "evangelisers take on the smell of the sheep". Evangelising communities, of course, can only be built up by individual men, women and children committed to the ministry of evangelisation in the circumstances of their everyday lives. This is how the Church reaches into every corner of the world - at no point does Pope Francis suggest that lay people should be involved in evangelisation simply because we have fewer priests and

religious these days. The way we live out our obligation to be involved in the evangelising mission of the Church will vary from person to person but none of us can refuse such an involvement because it is part of our Baptismal vocation.

What the Holy Father goes on to say in the second part of this chapter demands our fullest attention. He acknowledges that many documents of this kind can be quickly forgotten but then he says "Nevertheless, I want to emphasize that what I am trying to express here has a programmatic significance and important consequences". In other words, Pope Francis says, we cannot keep on doing things the way we always have while continuing to hope for a different result. Rather, we need to look for new ways of reaching out to others in order to remain true to Jesus' command to carry the Good News to all nations. In fact, he goes on to repeat this, urging us to abandon any temptation to say "We have always done it this way". Instead, Pope Francis writes "I invite everyone to be bold and creative in this task of rethinking the goals, structures, style and methods of evangelization in their respective communities".

One aspect of the creativity that he would like to encourage in the Church is for all of us to be permanently in a state of mission. "Mere administration," he tells us, "can never be enough". This echoes a theme that pre-occupied Pope Francis when he was the Cardinal Archbishop in Buenos Aires. In an interview at the time, he is reported to have said that "A church that limits itself to just carrying out administrative duties, caring for its tiny flock, is a church that in the long run will get sick. The pastor who isolates himself is not a true pastor of sheep, but a 'hairdresser' for sheep who spends his time putting curlers on them instead of going to look for others". He is also quoted as having compared the situation we find ourselves in today with the parable of the shepherd who leaves his 99 sheep to find the one that is lost. "Today we have one in the pen and 99 we need to go looking for"

There is no doubt, then, that Pope Francis sees evangelisation as the key task of the Church. "Before all else," he writes, "the Gospel invites us to respond to the God of love who

saves us, to see God in others and to go forth from ourselves to seek the good of others." In order to achieve this, the Church must see herself as a "missionary disciple" growing in the understanding of truth. The Church can be helped in this quest by being attentive to what the Holy Father calls "different currents of thought in philosophy, theology and pastoral practice". He acknowledges that the idea of "different currents" might be a troublesome one for "those who long for a monolithic body of doctrine, guarded by all and leaving no room for nuance". He goes on to stress, though, that "such variety serves to bring out and develop different facets of the inexhaustible riches of the Gospel".

Time and again in Evangelii Gaudium, Pope Francis reminds us that we need to leave our "comfort zones" behind. He recalls the words of Pope John Paul II who said that "All renewal in the Church must have mission as its goal if it is not to fall prey to a kind of ecclesial introversion". This, of course, is scarcely a new message for Christians - Jesus himself urged us to "put out into the deep". Christian life is risky but as the Scriptures so often tell us, there is no need to be afraid.

Pope Francis ends this Chapter of his Apostolic Exhortation by saying "let us go forth, then, to offer everyone the life of Jesus Christ... If anything should rightly disturb us and trouble our consciences, it is the fact that so many of our brothers and sisters are living without the strength, light and consolation born of friendship with Jesus Christ... More than by fear of going astray, my hope is that we will be moved by the fear of remaining shut up within structures which give us a false sense of security, within rules which make us harsh judges, within habits which make us feel safe, while at our door people are starving..."

In the next issue of the Voice, we will reflect further upon what Pope Francis sees as the most urgent problems that beset us today and how we are all called to collaborate in overcoming them. 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

# **Father Paul Sacco RIP**

Paul Sacco, Marist Father, was born in Port Said, Egypt and soon travelled with his family to Teesside where his father worked as a doctor in Eaglescliffe. Eventually, the family moved to Middlesbrough where they lived in the Holy Name Parish, Linthorpe. Due to the Second World War - where Paul spent part of it in India - and the death of his father, Paul's training for the priesthood was interrupted and he was eventually ordained as a Marist Priest on 28th June 1951.

After an early life marked by so much travelling it was almost inevitable in a way, that during his Marist priestly ministry this trait would continue. He taught biology in the Marist schools in Exeter and Blackburn and later served in most of our parishes, including the Holy Name of Mary in Middlesbrough and also, Our Lady of Lourdes and St Peter Chanel in Hull. In his later years, his late 8os and early 9os, Paul was involved in the Parish of St Stephen's in East Hull while at the same time completing the



compilation of a book, recently published, of the letters and photographs of his brother Albert's time on the Marist Mission in Vanua Tu, New Hebrides.

Paul was a man of faith, whose great devotion to daily Mass was one of the features of his life and preaching. Paul's life as a Marist priest affected many people in many parts of the country and it was fitting that he came back to Middlesbrough for the last few weeks of his life before dying in the parish which influenced him so much in his early life. Our thanks, as Marists, go to Father Tom O'Neill and the parishioners of the Holy Name for the pastoral care given to Paul during his last days.

This one year course serves to provide a solid spiritual foundation to our seminary formation. We learn a lot about the Carmelite spirituality which is prevalent in the area due to the influence of two Carmelite saints, Teresa of Avila and John of the Cross. Our visit to where we saw the poverty in which St Teresa lived helped to instil in us her quote of "God alone suffices". Part of the college calendar is a month's pastoral placement in England and my work is here in Middlesbrough with the Youth Mission Team, a fabulous group of people. The work I have taken part in has been the preparation for the Christian Unity Service with Archbishop Sentamu in the Cathedral and the secondary school mission at St Mary's College in Hull. After this month, I will be back in Spain for the remainder of the academic year. I ask you dear reader, to keep me and my fellow seminarians in your prayers, that the good God may help us in our process of discerning his Divine will.

# Portrait of a Martyr

For many years, Whitby Museum has had in its possession a portrait of Blessed Father

Nicholas Postgate, the 'Ugthorpe Martyr'. Its origin, though as uncertain as its age or artist, has long been assumed by local tradition to be a true likeness, maybe even painted during his lifetime, and recent conservation has helped us better understand the painting's age.

In July, I delivered the portrait to art conservators in London where a dendrochronologist inspected the piece. Although there were too few tree-rings on either the image or the frame to take


samples, he noted that they appeared to be from coppiced oak, adding that the frame shows a number of embedded rusty nails, which indicate it may come from either an old piece of furniture or a floor-board. It is impossible to say for certain if the wood is local, or where it had been used, but it's tempting to suggest buildings of significance in Postgate's life as likely candidates, perhaps the Hermitage at Ugthorpe where he lived, or the Mass House at Egton, where a hidden chapel was discovered in 1830.

The image itself, measures just 146 by 134 millimetres (roughly 6 by 5 inches) and 6mm (3/10th of an inch) deep, and has now been cleaned of an accumulation of wax and surface dirt, a light intervention in keeping with the Museum's instruction. Areas of cracking on the image, most visibly on the cloak, have not been retouched. Samples of the paint were taken and a comprehensive illustrated report arrived just before Christmas, a few days after I collected the picture from London.

The preparation layer under the image is predominately white, with an upper layer with a pale blue tint. This is composed of a complex mixture, with silica, barates, calcites

and some ochres; these can all be found in paint from the sixteenth century onwards

and today. There are no modern white pigments in the painting, and this absence of nineteenth century zinc white, or early twentieth century titanium white, strongly suggests eighteenth century work. Lead white, or flake white had been used in both the ground and image. The image is painted in oils, and the heavy wrinkling of the flesh colour suggests this had been mixed with an excess of an oil medium. The cloak is painted in ochres, warm earthy pigments which were widely used in oil



In conclusion, it is fair to say that, from our conversations before and during the process, the conservators found the picture a bit of a conundrum. The presence of earth pigments and flake white makes it difficult to date by colour alone, but the Prussian blue gives an indicative earliest possible date of about 1710, some thirty years after Postgate's execution. This would indicate that, rather than being painted from life as was once thought, the picture was painted by someone who knew, or on the instruction and from the memory of someone who had known the 'Priest of the Moors'.

Whitby Museum is located in Whitby's Pannett Park. It was founded in 1823 and is run entirely by volunteers. It is open 9.30 am to 4.30 pm daily except Mondays.

**Every seat in the Cathedral was taken when the highlight** of the Diocesan celebration for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity was a service celebrated by the Bishop on Sunday 19th January with Doctor John Sentamu, Archbishop of York, as a special guest speaker. Although the service itself started at 3.00 pm, young people from across the Diocese, including contingents from Scarborough and York as well as Teesside, led by the Diocesan Youth Ministry Team, had gathered much sooner to make their contribution to the service which was titled 'Is Christ divided?' They brought food of all descriptions and put it around the altar and, like the parable of the five loaves and two fishes, there were sufficient food to make a substantial contribution to the Middlesbrough Foodbank.


The hymn 'The Church's One Foundation' gave the service a roaring send off. Bishop Terry was joined in the sanctuary by Archbishop Sentamu and his chaplain, together with Monsignor Dasey, Vicar General, Canon Gerard Robinson, Vicar General/Dean of the Cathedral, Monsignor Hogan, Dean of Middlesbrough and Canon Bayldon, Provost of the Cathedral Chapter. The Bishop welcomed everybody to the service, commenting on the excellent 'turnout'. The first reading - a 'Call to Unity' was read by Monsignor Hogan and this was followed by a wide ranging sermon by Doctor Sentamu on divisions in the Church of Christ and its consequences, during which he asked for a volunteer from the young people

present to help him express clearly and visually his message of the consequences of this division. It was one of the pupils from Christ the King, Thornaby, Holly, who proved an excellent foil for the Archbishop and she was suitably applauded for her efforts.

After the sermon and the Creed, the Cathedral Boys and Girls Choirs sang the beautiful 'Song of Unity' and the Archbishop led the Sign of Peace. Two pupils from Trinity College brought more gifts forward for the Bishop and Archbishop to receive followed by the intercessory prayers, which followed the themes of the United Nation's 'Eight Millennium Goals' with prayers led by pupils from St Francis Xavier School, Richmond, which is a joint Catholic/Church of England School and has been visited by Archbishop Sentamu in the past. Bishop Terry led some commitment to unity prayers, gave the blessing and sent forth the congregation to proclaim the Word of God to all they meet.

The retiring collection was shared between the street homeless of the Diocese and Acts 435 (website: Acts435.org.uk). Acts 435 recognises that people want to give, often a little, sometimes more, to people with genuine need. Acts 435 puts people who can give in touch with people who are in need, with the Church as the physical, face-to-face forum to enable online giving. One hundred per cent of what is received is given out.

# Is Christ divided?

Bishop Terry reflects on the sermon preached by Archbishop John Sentamu, Archbishop of York at the Christian Unity celebration in St Mary's Cathedral.

The theme for the Archbishop's sermon was 'Is Christ divided', the main theme of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. This year, the theme and the materials had been provided by Churches of French Canada. They took as their inspiration the Biblical text of St Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, chapter 1 verses 1 to 17. The Archbishop explained that the original Greek text of the phrase "Is Christ divided, has Christ been parcelled out" used the word schismata ( $\sigma \chi i \sigma \mu \alpha \tau \alpha$ ), which really meant has Christ been torn apart. He then asked the congregation to repeat the word so that they would understand it and not forget it. He did this several times during the sermon, just to make sure we had taken it in!

The highlight of the sermon was when the Archbishop asked for volunteers from among the young people and immediately there was a sea of hands. However, the first hand up was of a young lady named Holly who bravely came out to the front. The Archbishop said that if he pretended to have a big pair of scissors, could he cut Holly's arm off, or her foot, or her head, even. She, of course, said no and when asked why not, she answered that it would hurt her. Whereupon the Archbishop said that was exactly what we did when we tried to tear Christ apart by our disunity, we hurt Christ.

The Archbishop's final remark, and, indeed, his prayer, came from a quote of Blessed John Paul II, at an Ecumenical Meeting in Bari, Italy in February 1984. Describing the way the Churches of the East and West form one Universal Church, the Pope said "Unity is neither absorption nor fusion. Unity is a meeting in truth and love, granted to us by the Spirit."



# Families gather for Feast of **Baptism of The Lord**



Twenty-two couples who wish to have their children baptised into the Catholic Faith gathered at St Andrew's Church, Teesville on Sunday 12th January, the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord.

During the 9.30 am Mass, the families were presented to the community by Mrs Barbara Conway, the Parish Coordinator for Baptism, before being anointed with holy oil by the Parish Deacon, Pat Thomas. 

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# **Congratulations!**

The St Vincent de Paul Society has been given the Prime Minister's Big Society Award. # **Volunteers at Sea**

When we think of volunteering, helping out in a day centre, a homeless project or a charity shop might spring to mind. But we might not think about helping seafarers visiting British ports. In the port of Hull, Apostleship of the Sea (AoS) Chaplain Anne McLaren has established a team of volunteer ship visitors who help her in trying to meet the spiritual and social needs of seafarers.

Keith Rodgers, former Assistant Chief Constable of Humberside Police, became a ship visitor because he wanted to give some of his time to a worthwhile charity. "I have acquaintances who were seafarers and have been aware of the significance of maritime trade to the UK for many years. I was involved in policing industrial disputes concerning dockers, trawlermen, power workers and miners, all of which affected the availability and movement of goods and

services" he said. When ship visitors go on board a ship they are never certain what kind of situation they will find. Keith adopts a smile and a handshake when he meets seafarers, but admits his 35 years policing experience also kicks in. "It is helpful to be able to assess the mood and conditions on board a ship as quickly as possible. There may be unsavoury issues not immediately apparent and frightened or reluctant witnesses. But to suppress one's latent inquisitiveness is vital. AoS volunteers are neither agents nor snoops for anyone or any other body with responsibility for maritime affairs. That said, there are protocols and obligations to ensure that volunteers can pass on information and concerns to the right authorities if that is what is required." Joseph Fernandes, a marine port pilot for Associated British Ports, who spent 27 years as a seafarer, said he became a ship visitor because he understands the loneliness and isolation many seafarers experience. "I wanted to give back what I had received from the many volunteers, ships visitors and chaplains that gave up their time and came to visit the ships when I was sailing. They arranged to take me and the other seafarers to an AoS centre from where I could get in touch with my family, and even arranged for a priest to say Mass on board" he explained. It was a talk in his local parish that triggered the idea of becoming a ship visitor for Phil Nolan, a retired civil servant, who now works part-time in property. He said a key part of the role is to listen to seafarers. "It's about seafarers, not us. Being outgoing helps, as does a smile when greeting people and on departure, not to take rebuttal personally, for example, when crew too busy to see you." Since becoming a ship visitor nine years ago, there have been many times when he has felt he has made a difference, he said. "One example is last November, following Typhoon



Haiyan in the Philippines. I was able to support a young Filipino seafarer who was absolutely in distress, as he was unaware of his family's whereabouts in the disaster."

# Gratitude at St Stephen's Centre

Saturday 18th January saw a celebration at St Stephen's Parish and Community Centre in Hull. Many of the parishioners and many of their friends gathered to mark the retirement of Sister Anna Hawke and Sister Josephine Bulger of the Congregation of Jesus from the service they had given to the people of Greatfield in Hull.

Bishop Terry presided at the Mass said in their honour and in his homily to the packed church paid tribute to the sterling work they had done in effectively rescuing a fading parish and building it into a thriving community, a centre of Catholic life reaching out to all the people in their neighbourhood in a true ecumenical spirit. The long list of services, functions and facilities they provided needed the full co-operation of the people they worked among and clearly that co-operation was given generously.

The message could be clearly drawn that this was a pointer to the future style of Parish

Life if the shortage of priests continues. In St Stephen's Parish and Community Centre, Sisters Anna and Josie not only showed us how but leave us a working model.

different to anything they had known previously. Asking around what was the first thing people noticed after their arrival, the response was "the house acquired a feminine touch".

Josie and Anna have done many things as previous speakers have stated and I would like to mention the following. Josie had a leading role in the development of Hull East of the River Credit Union and is also involved in the Acts 435 charity promoted by the Archbishop of York. And there's recycling; Josie recycles as much as she can, as Sister Frances said earlier "sisters are recycled in new roles", well if anyone can recycle sisters then it's Josie.

Anna's vision has led to where St Stephen's is today, especially her work with local Churches Together, and it's good for their support here today. The Passover suppers are brilliant events, but not so good for slimmers; the Vincentian Volunteer programme and it's lovely for Veronique to come from France to join us today. The hall was seldom used before Anna and Josie arrived; before you leave, have a look at the photographs on display and see what goes on now.


# Being a Catholic Grandmother

# **Changing Lives**

CAFOD Middlesbrough invited supporters to meet with the agency's Sierra Leone partner last month at Christ the King Church in Thornaby to hear how they are changing lives. Patrick Jamiru, Director of Caritas Kenema - CAFOD's partner organisation - spoke about the agencies' work in Sierra Leone. Caritas Kenema is one of 160 organisations in the Caritas Internationalis family, of which CAFOD is a member.

Patrick explained how the support of people in the Diocese of Middlesbrough is helping those in Sierra Leone fight against poverty and hunger, through changes to farming methods and by improving access to loans within their communities. He also explained what more can be achieved through this year's Lent Fast Day 'Dig Deep' campaign, which is focused on the West African nation.

Carol Cross from CAFOD Middlesbrough said "Access to food is such a basic human right, but all kinds of factors and issues can mean people go hungry - whether it's the climate, conflict, or lack of training on the most effective farming techniques. Sierra Leone is recovering from a brutal civil war in which 2.6 million people were left homeless - the equivalent of the entire population of North East England. Though the situation is improving, people still suffer from the annual Hungry Season - a six-month rainy period in which food is grown but not ready to harvest. CAFOD is helping people to feed their own families by training them in alternative farming methods to help secure food during the

Hungry Season. This Lent Fast Day, we are asking people in the Diocese of Middlesbrough to stand side-by-side with people in Sierra Leone by digging deep, ensuring that more children in the poorest countries grow up healthy and free from hunger." Mohammed is one of the people who have benefited from the generosity of people in our Diocese. He is 14 years old and lives with his mum, dad, brothers and sisters. Mohammed was born during the country's 11 year civil war. His mother kept him alive while running from the rebels by feeding him with rice pap given to her by strangers. When peace came, Mohammed started going to school, but the family couldn't afford books or fees, so he had to drop out. Mohammed says "I like school and learning just for the pleasure of learning. School is very important to me because I can get a job and money and bring benefits to my parents. At present, I don't go to school. My father has told me to wait... I hope I can go next year." Carol added "The kindness, compassion, and generosity of people in our dioceses have enabled CAFOD to train families such as Mohammed's to grow rice on swampland. This land, formerly used for diamond mining, has now been transformed into fertile farmland - feeding children and enabling them to go to school." # Thank You to the Diocese of Middlesbrough

People affected by the Philippines typhoon have sent their thanks to Catholics in the Diocese of Middlesbrough - after donations of more than £77,000 to CAFOD's appeal.

CAFOD supporters in the Diocese raised a total of £77,991 between November and February following Typhoon Haiyan, one of the strongest storms to ever make landfall. The typhoon caused devastation in the Philippines last November, killing thousands, affecting more than 14 million people, and leaving over 4 million homeless. Father Edwin Gariguez, from Caritas Philippines, highlighted the desperate situation: "It's the first time the Philippines has experienced a disaster of this magnitude... this was beyond all expectations. We really need all the help we can get." The money donated by people in the Diocese of Middlesbrough is helping CAFOD to support its partners - Caritas Philippines and Catholic Relief Services - who know the local people and work alongside them to meet their needs.

CAFOD is helping to provide food, shelter, and household goods such as blankets and cooking equipment. More than 1 billion litres of drinking water has been supplied to those who lost their water supplies, as well as hygiene kits to prevent serious outbreaks of disease. Local people's donations have also allowed CAFOD to organise "cash-for-work" programmes to clear debris, paying volunteers for the work so that they have money to cover their basic needs. Jasper, a 17 year old volunteer helping the relief effort, told CAFOD "In the Bible it says 'When you give something, it will be given back a hundredfold by God.' I am very thankful for those international people that have been helping the Philippines so much. One thing I'm sure - that we will all rise with the help of everybody." CAFOD has been working in the Philippines since 1969. The continued generosity of people in the Diocese of Middlesbrough will

allow it to remain working in solidarity with the people of the

Philippines to rebuild lives long after the television cameras leave.



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
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
