Bishop's Youth Congress a Success!! Around 200 people gathered together from all over the Diocese Saturday 29th March. Priests and people, young and not so young, joined together at







to celebrate youth ministry of all kinds in the Catholic Church on

Trinity Catholic College to examine what is currently happening and how the terrain upon which youth ministry takes place is changing under the feet of those engaged in this vital work of the Church. Canon John Loughlin said "It was the best Diocesan day I can remember. The atmosphere was great and everyone seemed focused on the theme together."

Amy Glanville of St Peter's Catholic College said "Speaking as an RE teacher, the day was the best professional development we have been offered in a really long time. It was the perfect balance of inspirational material and practical advice. My friend and I were both in tears during the keynote speech and liturgies (for all the right reasons) and we both loved the workshops.'

Father Dermott Donnelly, Chair of CYMFed, the Catholic Youth Ministry Federation, spoke powerfully about 'Called to a Noble Adventure', a national document which outlines these goals for youth ministry. He reminded us of the words of Einstein, "Logic will get us from A to B. Imagination will get you everywhere.' And challenged us all in the Church to be people who dream dreams and think big. To be people of outrageous hope and ridiculous optimism.

Bishop Terry, who also joined us for the day, said "The noble adventure is our life in Christ. The Church has always placed great importance on nurturing the future. We call it youth ministry. Even before the Catholic Church in this country built places of worship, it built schools and colleges. It is now up to us to provide places where young people can encounter Christ and learn about their faith." The day saw a great deal of network building and the chance to explore new resources. Doctor Anthony Towey, Dean of Theology at St Mary's University, Twickenham spoke on the Holy Spirit and Andy Preston introduced the work of the Middlesbrough & Teesside Philanthropic Foundation.

Father Paul Farrer, Diocesan Youth Chaplain, said "We are genuinely delighted with the day. Many people engaged in youth ministry feel isolated and unsure or even if anyone notices what they do. We are lucky in Middlesbrough Diocese, we know young people are one of Bishop Terry's key priorities. Today we have been surrounded with people who share his vision and passion and actively want to drive it forward. I sincerely believe it will be a day which bears much fruit."

Called to a Noble Adventure looking to the future with hope

"There is so much going on here - it's incredible!"

This was the conclusion of Clare Oliver from Liverpool, who was visiting the first Diocesan Youth Congress led by Father Paul Farrer, Diocesan Youth Chaplain and leader of MYMission. It was certainly a day to showcase the variety of activities taking place in the Diocese. Set in the splendid surroundings of Trinity College, Middlesbrough, at the heart of the day were people active in a variety of ministries for the young. Father Paul expressed his delight at the fact that the day was oversubscribed. The keynote speaker was Father Dermott Donnelly, Director of Youth Ministry in the Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle and Chair of CYMFed, the federation created to form and serve youth ministry in England and Wales. Father Dermott was joined by Bishop Terry, who welcomed delegates and prayed for the success of the day, which served to underline the importance of youth ministry on a Diocesan level.

Father Dermott exhorted the faithful gathered to recognise the importance of developing an effective, engaging and relevant programme in youth ministry. His starting point was the call of Matthew, as interpreted by Caravaggio in his painting The Calling of St Matthew. As the Christ figure is seen to markedly point towards a startled Matthew, so Father Dermott noted that all those gathered have been specifically chosen by Jesus to minister to young people. Expertly unpacking the 2012 document Called to a Noble Adventure: A Vision for Catholic Youth Ministry in England and Wales, using references as diverse as Father Ted, Caravaggio, Daniel O'Leary, George Bernard Shaw and Pope Francis, Father Dermott encouraged those gathered to cherish the young people they serve, and to be open and blessed by their "outrageous hope" and "ridiculous optimism". Father Dermott's message was powerful and engaging, offering a clear framework for those engaged in youth ministry. He pinpointed four goals of the document, and highlighted the notion of "encounter" as an essential aspect of youth

ministry, pointing to the encounter between Jesus and the adulterous woman in John's Gospel, in which Jesus lifts the broken woman out of the dust.

The day contained gatherings and smaller workshops. Annie Whistow from Sacred Heart Parish, Redcar noted that "I hope that this day will give me some fresh new ideas" and there was much information on offer, both through the workshops and the market place stalls set out in the foyer. Thrive, the Teesside group for Church Action on Poverty were represented, as was the Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes. Various helpful resources were distributed, including copies of Called to a Noble Adventure. Anthony Towey from St Mary's University, London gave a fresh input on the significance of Jesus' temptations in the desert, revealing him to be a servant-leader, as well as offering an inspirational and practical workshop on a new resource for young people, Life in Christ. This new resource enables them to reflect and share on the scriptures in small groups. Doctor Towey also stressed the importance of "transformative experiences" in Lourdes Pilgrimages, World Youth Days and personal faith encounters as keys to helping young people grow in faith. Amongst the other workshops on offer, Mary Hughes from the Youth Ministry Team in Hexham and Newcastle spoke eloquently of the links between schools and parishes, whilst Father Gerard Walsh from York University shared passionately about the Samuel project and its dramatic impact on several university students as a discernment tool (more information at

http://www.ukvocation.org/samuel).

One pleasing aspect of the day was the number of visitors from beyond the Diocese, with visitors from Liverpool, Sheffield and Newcastle coming to discover good practice and share ideas on youth ministry. Clearly the Diocese of Middlesbrough is fast becoming one of the forerunners in Catholic youth ministry in England. Louise Williams, 25, from the MYMission Team was certainly encouraged: "It's great that so many young people have gathered here", she said, "to be united, to share ideas and to know that

Throughout the day, delegates were given a "tour" of the places where Jesus is at home and working throughout the Diocese of Middlesbrough and beyond, such as the Faith Movement, Godly Play and MYMission Team. Heather Black, National Trainer in Godly Play UK (www.godlyplay.org.uk), based in North Ormesby, spoke of how Godly Play is an effective way of relating the Gospel stories to our own lives in creative and imaginative ways and how it leads young people on a "journey of discovering God's place in their lives". This is a real sign of hope, an example of the process of transformation spoken of by Father Dermott in his keynote speech.

So what next for youth ministry in the Diocese? The "Come and see" invitation issued by Bishop Terry seems to be pointing towards sharing faith with those in need. Andy Preston of Middlesbrough & Teesside Philanthropic Foundation shared passionately how he is putting his faith into action through sponsored sleep outs in the cold in the fight against poverty and homelessness across local towns to improve conditions for people in Teesside. York Catholic History Day

The York Catholic History Day will take place at the Bar Convent on Saturday 7th June.

This excellent conference venue is the ideal backdrop for the day, which will include talks on a wide range of subjects relating to the Catholic history of the North of England. Last year, Tony Lawton's talk, *From Treason to Toleration*, explored the relationship between Catholics and the state, Jonathan Bush described *English-Irish tension in Stockton and Hartlepool, 1850 to 1870* and Caroline Bowden and James Kelly introduced us to the work of the 'Who were the Nuns?' project with a talk on *English Convents in Exile, 1600 to 1800*. This wideranging programme attracted a record attendance of 60 people and the organisers hope that many will return, and bring their friends, to this year's equally varied and topical programme. World War One studies, specialising in war and religion, will speak on Religion as a Motivational Force and Aspects of Yorkshire Catholicism in the Great War. Roger will draw together several strands of local and national history and bring our reflections up-to-date as we commemorate the outbreak of the First World War. The final open session is an opportunity for participants to advertise forthcoming events, ask for information concerning their own research and offer suggestions of speakers and themes for future History Days. A lot of topics have been covered since the first History Day in 1996 and we are looking for ideas to celebrate the 20th York Catholic History Day in 2015. The day will be of interest to anyone who is involved in local, Catholic or family history, or any combination of those topics and everyone is very welcome.

One Head better than two!

Parents asking to see the Head at two Ryedale primary schools in different towns could be forgiven for doing a double take.

David Harrison has been appointed Executive Head of St Joseph's RC Primary School, Pickering on top of his existing role, which he has had for some time, in charge of St Mary's RC Primary School, Malton, which has 107 children. He became Acting Head of the Pickering school, which has 108 children, last year.

Discussions took place involving the Diocese, North Yorkshire County Council and the Governors of both schools. "I was Acting Head at St Joseph's while various leadership models were looked at in consultation with the different parties" said Mr Harrison. "It was decided that the Executive Headship role for both schools was the preferred route and we are now in the process of appointing a Deputy Head at each of the schools. It works extremely well because we can link with the children at both schools doing various activities together and the staff can also support each other."

As local Catholic schools, they have had close links but the new arrangement means they can work together even more. "It not only gives us an opportunity to work even more closely together but also to share training" said Mr Harrison. But, he stressed "Each school wants to keep its own identity and we are determined to do that. I am loving it and it is an exciting challenge." As with all schools, budgets are having to be tighter than they were but, as Mr Harrison explained "This situation gives us the opportunity to look at ways of spending our resources in different ways and it also helps to develop the leadership structure."

A Northern Beacon for English Catholics

'A Northern Beacon for English Catholics' is how Professor Paul Murray describes the Centre for Catholic Studies at Durham University. Speaking to the Cleveland Newman Circle, Professor Murray, now Dean of the Centre, reminded his audience of some of the challenges of our age. Many people see only decline and closure, but he believes that faith cannot be communicated using "ever dwindling scraps from previous feasts". In his lively talk, he proposed that the Church should be spotting opportunities to plant fresh institutions to carry Catholic tradition forwards: we should be following the same approach as Aidan, Cuthbert, Hilda, Benedict Biscop and Bede. Part of this response is the setting up of the Centre: the first permanent centre, in a mainstream UK university, for research and teaching in Catholic theology.

Professor Murray explained that ideas about setting up universitybased, lay-led centres for Catholic theology go back to a 1964 Downside Symposium. In the following years, Catholic Studies within universities were championed by such individuals as Hugh Swanson, Herbert McCabe, Edward Yarnold, Nicholas Lash, Ursula King, Fergus Kerr and Eamon Duffy. At the start of this century, there was a lay initiative within Durham's strong Department of Theology and Religion to create the Centre for Catholic Studies. Founded in 2007, the Centre is generously supported by the University, by Hexham and Newcastle Diocese, and by certain religious orders and organisations (including the Newman Association). Its prime objectives are research and teaching in a Catholic context, but there are many ecumenical opportunities and also interactions with historians, social scientists, etc. The Centre plays a significant role in adult formation (the recent Study Day on Prayer, held at Ushaw College, attracted more than 60 participants).

Professor Murray also discussed ongoing issues concerning Ushaw College. The last seminarians moved out in 2011, but the Centre is a key player in proposals to preserve a Catholic presence at Ushaw. When Douai College returned to England and finally settled at Ushaw (in 1808), it amassed an extremely fine library (the equal of any Oxbridge college library); it now seems to make sense to bring this library under the management of Durham University. Explorations are in their final stages to see if a partnership will work: the University to establish and directly manage a full College of the University at Ushaw, while the College and its holdings are retained permanently in Catholic ownership and trusteeship. The 'heritage' of Ushaw including the wonderful chapel - will remain Catholic.

Caritas Diocese of Middlesbrough

A year ago this month, the Diocese of Middlesbrough hosted a CSAN (Caritas Social Action Network) Roadshow in All Saints School, York. The Roadshow was one in an ongoing series being held in the dioceses of England and Wales as part of a long term project to raise the profile of Catholic Social Teaching and Catholic Social Action and encourage the development of a network of individuals, parishes, dioceses, and charities small and large. That network will contribute to greater co-operation and increased effectiveness on the part of Catholics in responding to people at the margins of society and in the deepest poverty.

The article below is a reflection by Deacon David Cross of what has been taking place quietly in the Diocese during the last year towards the creation of a 'Caritas Middlesbrough' network.

Dave and Carol Cross are Diocesan CAFOD managers and so Dave's piece reflects in part on how Caritas and CAFOD relate to one another. Following Dave's article you will find reproduced the CSAN Annual Review for 2013 which will provide you with a detailed snap shot of the work of CSAN which the Diocese of Middlesbrough as 'Caritas Diocese of Middlesbrough' has now formally been signed up to by Bishop Terry.

Following on from the CSAN Review, you will find many reports that are typical of the 'Christian Discipleship' section of the paper and all of which in a variety of ways relate to the work that can be included under the heading of 'Caritas Diocese of Middlesbrough'.

Breathing with both lungs

For around 12 months, CAFOD Middlesbrough has been playing its part, exploring ways in which the Diocese might develop a Caritas Middlesbrough Network. You may recall that this began with the Caritas Roadshow at All Saints School, York last May.

Why has CAFOD got involved? Many of you will know that CAFOD is a member of Caritas Internationalis (the Catholic Church's global network of Catholic international aid and development agencies). CAFOD is its overseas arm. Whilst our work is focused overseas and you will be aware that CAFOD works in over 30 developing countries in Africa, Asia and Latin America, Caritas Social Action Network (CSAN) is the England and Wales branch of the Bishops' Conference here at home. It focuses on issues relating to poverty and injustice in our own backyard. The establishment of a Caritas network in our Diocese at long last provides us with the opportunity to work in a more concerted way on poverty issues here at home. One of the reasons that CAFOD has become involved is that very often the causes of poverty overseas and at home are the same, particularly when it is rooted in unjust and unfair economic and political structures, it is largely by degree that the impacts differ. With this in mind, it seemed that the obvious thing to do was to try to find ways of supporting together, responses to poverty at home and overseas. Now that we have CAFOD and Caritas, the Catholic Church's response to poverty is breathing with both lungs!

Establishing a Caritas network is not an attempt to "muscle in" on the work of groups such as Justice and Peace, SVP or the many other groups and organisations that work so hard to help our sisters and brothers in our Diocese whose lives are blighted by poverty and exclusion but by seeking to develop a network of agencies, we may be able to support each other and engage with decisionmakers and power holders in a more effective way, so that the voice and needs of those affected by poverty can be heard and action was

- Equality between little and larger organisations or groups.
- To be a catalyst for social action.
- To be a listening group.
- A bridge between the rich and poor.
- To build a community for social action and social justice.
- To make a difference in the long term.
- To raise awareness in our communities of the reality of poverty.
- To facilitate dialogue.
- To be a resource of information and knowledge mapping, recording and disseminating information.
- Never do alone what we can do together work in partnership across faiths.
- To introduce people to Catholic Social Teaching.
- To be a vehicle for enabling hopeful change through practical action.

We are not seeking to set up a bureaucratic structure that interferes with what is already going on around the Diocese but something which seeks to enable groups and agencies to work effectively together, sharing good practice and information. We are open to other suggestions as to how Caritas can take shape, so if you have any ideas, please do get in touch. If you would like to become involved in the development of Caritas Diocese of Middlesbrough, we would also like to hear from you.

At this early stage, we are also investigating a few avenues that could help those in difficulties in our Diocese:

- We are exploring with credit unions the possibility of them being able to help those in dire financial need.
- We are supporting a conference by the Women's Commission on Trafficking.

- We are planning to hold a Poverty Hearing (an event which gives people experiencing poverty the opportunity to speak to us and those in power) in Middlesbrough in collaboration with Middlesbrough Together and Thrive (Teesside).
- We will try to establish CAFOD/Caritas volunteers throughout the Diocese.

CAFOD is seeking people to become parish volunteers to help us with our Lent/Harvest Fast Days, Emergencies and work in schools but we're also looking for people to help us promote Caritas Middlesbrough. There are many Justice and Peace or Third World groups around the Diocese doing the work of Caritas and CAFOD has around 40 parish volunteers. If you haven't got a parish volunteer or group, perhaps you could contact us and offer some time.

This might all seem confusing and people may be asking questions like "Why do we need such a network?" Maybe the answer lays somewhere in Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation, *Evangelii Gaudium*, when he says:

"Today and always, the poor are the privileged recipients of the Gospel and the fact that it is freely preached to them is a sign of the kingdom that Jesus came to establish. We have to state, without mincing our words, that there is an inseparable bond between our faith and the poor. May we never abandon them... I prefer a Church that is bruised, hurt and dirty because it has been on the streets, rather than a Church which is unhealthy from being confined and from clinging to its own security." (Para 48 and 49)

Caritas Middlesbrough can help us set out on a wonderful journey - bringing the hope of Christ to our sisters and brothers through our concern and action. We don't have all the answers but we've got a starting point.

We have also undertaken significant work around the Immigration Bill, highlighting the potential harm that new restrictions on housing and NHS healthcare may cause to some of the most vulnerable people including those who have been victims of violence, trafficking or Female Genital Mutilation. All of our advocacy in this area includes close co-operation with the Bishop for Migration and the Catholic Bishops' Conference Office of Migration Policy as well as our member charities working in the field.

Looking ahead to 2014 we have begun laying the groundwork for the Church's input into the Modern Slavery Bill, to strengthen provisions for tackling

human trafficking.

A strong Catholic voice on criminal justice Alongside the development of CSAN's new Criminal Justice Forum we have carried out extensive advocacy around the rights of victims, prisoners, ex-offenders, and their families.

Our submission to the Justice Select Committee inquiry into arrangements for women offenders tocussed on the unsuitability of the custodial estate for mothers and was widely referenced in the committee's final report. Other work on prisons involved a public campaign opposing restrictions to legal aid for treatment cases and panel debates on the issue of prisoner voting involving the Shadow Minister of State for Justice and the former Minister of State for Prisons.

We have also supported amendments to the Crime and Courts Bill -concerning the impact of fines on struggling families, and the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Bill-concerning

identification and support for dependents of people sent to prison.

CSAN's Communication and Media Strategy in 2013 has been focused on building the profile of Catholic Charities and giving a voice to the people that they work with. Through securing a weekly column in the Catholic Press, CSAN hope to raise greater awareness of the scale and diversity of the work that is being undertaken by Catholic charities, dioceses and communities across England

CSAN has led on a number of joint press initiatives with our member charities including a letter signed by 20 Catholic Charities on the Anti-Social Behaviour Bill, a letter signed by 15 Catholic Charities on the economic impact of rising levels of poverty to the Public Accounts Committee and a letter signed by 4 charities to the Secretary of State for Justice on legal aid reform.

2013 was a busy year for CSAN with over eight events including CSAN's biennial conference, three social action readshows, a parliamentary reception, two party conference fringe debates and the launch of our new Criminal Justice Forum.

CSAN Conference

CSAN held its biennial conference: The Catholic Response to the Poverty Crisis' on 12 and 13 June 2013 at St Mary's University, Twickenham, Over 120 people attended the conference, which was a thoughtful and informed discussion about rising levels of domestic poverty in the UK and sought to

develop and shape the Church's response.

A Date for your Diary: Anti-Trafficking Event in Middlesbrough (North Ormesby) Tuesday 30th September, 7.00 pm -9.00 pm

As this edition of the Catholic Voice was being prepared, the second international conference on human trafficking was taking place in Rome from Wednesday 9th -Thursday 10th April. Titled 'Church and Law Enforcement in Partnership', the conference had four aims: Prevention, Pastoral Care, Re-integration and Developing an International Network of Bishops' **Conferences and Law Enforcement** agencies. The conference was chaired by the Cardinal Archbishop of Westminister and joining him from the UK were the Home Secretary, Theresa May and Metropolitan Police Commissioner, Sir Bernard Hogan-Howe.

One of the most horrendous stories in the history of mankind is the story of slavery. Those of you who have seen 12 Years a Slave will have been appalled at how one human being could treat another. But slavery is not just part of history, it is happening now. Pope Francis in Evangelii Gaudium wrote: "Where is your brother or sister who is enslaved? Where is the brother and sister whom you are killing each day in clandestine warehouses, in rings of prostitution, in children used for begging, in exploiting undocumented labour? Let us not look the other way." The Bishops' Conference of England and Wales has made raising awareness of trafficking one of its priorities since 2011. Accordingly, Bishop Terry asked the Women's Commission in the Diocese to consider ways that this issue could be brought to the attention not only of the Catholic community but to the wider community.

On Tuesday 30th September from 7.00 pm to 9.00 pm, the Women's Commission, working with the Diocese, Cleveland Police and Middlesbrough Council, will be holding an event at The Trinity Centre, North Ormesby. Bishop Terry will open the event. Please put the date in your diary. We will show three short films from Unchosen - see www.unchosen.org.uk - and hold a question and answer panel. Panellists will include Andy McDonald MP, some-one from Cleveland Police, and others who work in this field.

Solidarity with the Poor

On Saturday 22nd March, at the Church of Our Lady of Lourdes and St Peter Chanel in Hull, a day organised by the Social Responsibility Committee of the National Board of Catholic Women was held which explored the issues around the growing poverty in this country, particularly as it affects women. It involved national and local speakers. The group was joined for the morning by one of the local MPs, Diana Johnson.

The meeting, chaired by Yogi Sutton, a previous President of the National Board of Catholic Women, gave an overview of the Board and invited all women to be part of its aims. Celia Capstick, Chair of the Social Responsibility Committee, with Freda Lambert began with a presentation of Catholic Social Teaching and the Church's response to people living in poverty, in relation to the Gospels. She quoted Pope Francis' speech in Rio de Janeiro in 2013 urging those with greater resources to work for a more just world.

Phoebe Jackson from CSAN gave an excellent explanation of the benefits system, of the people it will affect and its impact on those already in poverty. Harrowing examples were given of the effects of the 'Bedroom Tax' on single people without accommodation. Alison Gelder from Housing Justice spoke about homelessness, soup kitchens and foodbanks and her work visiting these places nationally. Fathers O'Gara and Gallagher shared part of the day with the event.

These national speakers were joined after lunch by local people who lead the field in Hull in caring for the poor and vulnerable in the area. They included Patrick Doyle who spoke about how his faith influences his work in the city which involves working in the soup kitchen, with homeless people and the introduction of 'Emmaus' shortly into Hull. Bashir Siraj who together with his wife spoke about his responsibility for 'Open Doors', and his dealings with Asylum Seekers. Jim Norton, Chair of the SVP in Hull, explained the different types of poverty experienced in Hull and even included the Junior SVP from St Mary's College who help out in the soup kitchen. Anne Dannerolle continued the theme with her input from the 'Lighthouse Project' with which she has worked for the last 18 years, looking after vulnerable young women and their exploitation locally by men. Andy Dorton spoke of the housing situation in Hull and how it affects single people, the problem of homelessness and the housing policies at the moment. This was followed by an open discussion on faith and poverty. An open prayer session at the end was led by Alison Gelder for all who are victims of government policies and exploitation. The day was a huge success and very productive among those sharing not only lunch but also in exchanging information and faith.

The West African country emerged from a decade of brutal civil war in 2002, leaving 2.6 million people homeless - the equivalent of the entire population of the North East of England. Extreme poverty remains a major issue in Sierra Leone, especially during the annual 'hungry season'. With CAFOD's support, families are transforming the former diamond mines, which fuelled the conflict, into fertile land so they can grow crops all year round.

Mrs Bellwood explained how other year groups got involved in the fundraising, which was linked to World Book Day. Some of our Year 9 pupils acted as peace keepers in the penny wars and scavenger hunts. Miss Devlin, our Technology Technician, and Mrs Rees, our Chaplain, also organised a hunger soup lunch, inviting members of the local community, and raising £150.00. All of the pupils had a fantastic time."

CAFOD's Officer for the Diocese of Middlesbrough, Carol Cross, said "Lent is a time when we stop and reflect on our lives and relationships. Even though the world produces enough food for everyone, one in eight people worldwide go hungry each day - whether because of climate, conflict, or lack of training on effective farming techniques. By digging deep, the pupils from St Patrick's are making a difference. The money raised from their Hunger Games Day will help transform the lives of people living in poverty. CAFOD would like to thank them for all their support."

Tees Valley Ministry: Past, Present and Future

In the beginning

For more than 50 years there has been an industrial chaplaincy on Teesside. You might remember Bill Wright who helped to set up Teesside Industrial Mission (TIM) in 1961, targeting the traditional steel and chemical manufacturing industries. The approach relied on ordained clergy being accepted by management and unions alike. They provided solace when accidents at work caused fatalities. At other times they operated as trusted go-betweens during industrial disputes. Their remit was broad and they were there to respond flexibly to the needs that presented themselves day by day; and on special occasions such as Workers' Memorial Day - marked this year on Monday 28th April.

Constant Change

Of course, the business environment has changed enormously since then. Also, church resources have been focused more in parishes and in developing lay people to be active in their locality, rather than funding dedicated industrial chaplains. To address the impact of unemployment and loss of industry, the churches in the area set up Respond! in 1984 to work with government agencies and communities in developing local projects. In 2002 TIM and Respond! combined to form Tees Valley Ministry (TVM); and a new approach emerged, for the ordained and experienced chaplains to train lay volunteers as chaplains.

TVM today

Perhaps things have been a little quiet recently on the workplace chaplaincy front but Tees Valley Ministry is still alive and well and seeking to re-invigorate this important area of outreach activity. We have an active management group and, last year, appointed a part-time Chaplains' Coordinator. This has allowed us to take stock, get some of the basics back in place and start to plan for the future - a future that we hope people like you might get involved in as voluntary chaplains. Newton Aycliffe town centre chaplain Pam Lovelass is one of the lay people who responded in this way to serve the community where she has lived for 50 years. She started by visiting an industrial estate with an experienced TVM chaplain to test her calling to the work. This was followed by training as a retail chaplain at the Metro Centre combined with part-time study. Following completion of her training, Pam set up the pioneering town centre ministry in Newton Aycliffe and, with the support of Churches Together Great Aycliffe, she maintains links with churches in the town. She has had a busy year with her weekly visits among over 70 town centre businesses. She comments "Most are very welcoming, and I look forward weekly to

meeting and chatting to them in their joys and also their sorrows." In her five years as a chaplain, Pam has built up strong relationships, providing a listening ear and a helping hand during the regeneration of the shopping centre.

Looking to the Future

To enable Tees Valley Ministry to continue this work, we need people who are prepared to serve as voluntary workplace chaplains. Often, when the Lord is calling us to service, we are guite reluctant because we feel we don't have the necessary skills and experience. So, what skills are required and what does a typical chaplain look like? Well, vou'd be pleased to know that there is no such thing as a typical chaplain. Many of them do have the sort of skills that you might already possess: the ability to listen to people; the capacity to show genuine concern for others; many of them have experience of the workplace; and, something of an understanding of life's ups and downs. Some may have experienced these ups and downs themselves and so can



empathise well with others. TVM still has connections with the traditional Teesside industries but chaplains also work with the service industries, the retail sector and voluntary organisations that play a significant part in today's economy. TVM offers training and support to ensure that volunteers feel comfortable in their developing role. The St Hilda Chair in Catholic Social Thought and Practice has been established at Durham University

The Centre for Catholic Studies (CCS) within Durham University's Department of Theology and Religion, in conjunction with the recently established UK Centre for Catholic Social Thought and Practice (CSTP) and Durham University Business School, is pleased to announce the establishment of the St Hilda Chair in Catholic Social Thought and Practice. Outstanding candidates are being sought for this endowed post - unique in the international secular academy and a fitting complement to the existing Bede Chair of Catholic Theology already within the CCS. The post has been founded in partnership with a group of committed, major benefactors from the UK, Europe and the US.

This enabling group includes major foundations, women's religious congregations and business executives who are each passionate about providing world-leading critical academic resource to contribute to the constructive development and imaginative practical application of the Catholic Social Teaching tradition and so aid its wider critical engagement and dissemination amongst both scholars and professionals alike. The timely dual aim is to create a first-rate academic hub for the production of vital fresh research and understanding and to help to put "the Church's best-kept secret" to work with effective impact in the public square.

Within the past year, as the world continues to seek to

developing international discourse and associated professional, charitable and academic communities, by providing world-recognised academic leadership and strategic thinking. The St Hilda Chair in Catholic Social Thought and Practice - named in honour of the great North East saint (614-680) and abbess of the joint monastery at Whitby, host to the Synod of Whitby that determined how the date of Easter would be calculated throughout the Western Church - builds upon significant existing expertise within both the Department of Theology and Religion and the Business School at Durham University. The establishment of the post also coincides with the anticipated arrival of Doctor Anna Rowlands, Inaugural Chair of the UK Centre for Catholic Social Thought and Practice, as the incoming Deputy Director of the CCS (from September 2014).

Professor Paul D Murray, Dean and Director of the CCS, said "The CCS within the Department of Theology and Religion at Durham is delighted to be host to this significant new post dedicated to leading research and practical implementation in relation to Catholic Social Thought and Practice. This is a unique step for a secular university to take and one which opens great potential for the academic and Catholic communities alike." Doctor Anna Rowlands, Chair of the UK Centre for Catholic Social Thought and Practice, said "The establishment of the St Hilda Chair in Catholic Social Thought and Practice is a superb example of what Pope Francis has been calling for in indicating the need for Catholic Social Teaching traditions to be developed in relation to specific geographical, cultural, and political contexts. The member organisations of the UK Centre for Catholic Social Thought and Practice are enthused about this development and look forward to working closely with the first post-holder." His Eminence Cardinal Vincent Nichols, Archbishop of Westminster and President of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales, said "This development comes at a time of widespread interest in exploring what can be gained from Catholic Social Teaching in response to challenges facing our society. This clearly demonstrates the vital contribution we can make to the flourishing of society in pursuit of the common good." His Eminence Cardinal Peter Turkson, President of the Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace, said "Indeed the time has urgently come to educate and form men and women in Catholic Social

Thought and Practice. Their challenge is to integrate this discipline into their faith life, and through greater dialogue and principled leadership, to implement it in social and charitable efforts, in economic and commercial enterprises, and in communications, politics and culture. This challenge the new St Hilda Chair established at Durham University is amply endowed to help them take up."



navigate a way through the pressing challenges to the global economic system, leading voices from politics, civil society and from amongst leading executives of companies such as Unilever, Vodafone and McKinsey, have each been advocating the significant potential benefits that would flow from an engagement of Catholic Social Teaching with commercial, economic and political life. Similarly, Church leaders such as newly-elevated Cardinal Vincent Nichols, Archbishop Justin Welby and Cardinal Peter Turkson (President of the Pontifical Council for the Justice and Peace) - each of whom wrote letters of support for this post's establishment - have joined Pope Francis in wanting to move the riches of Catholic Social Teaching beyond the Church and into society.

The response of Durham University's Department of Theology and Religion to this global re-awakening, through its Centre for Catholic Studies and in conjunction with partners, has been to seek the endowment necessary to create a stable, long-term platform, capable of serving this

Help for the Cystic Fibrosis Trust

On Wednesday 19th March, Redcar and Cleveland Catenian Circle President Bill Moloney presented a £850.00 cheque to Andrew Millward for the Cystic Fibrosis Trust (CFT) which is celebrating its half centenary and aims to find a cure for this debilitating condition. The impressive size of the sum was due in no small part to sponsorship money raised by Vice President Mark Fleming through the running of the Middlesbrough 10K on Sunday 8th September last year.

Following the presentation of the cheque, Andrew, himself a sufferer of cystic fibrosis and accompanied on the night by his mother Janice and father Terry, explained that he, along with all other sufferers, possesses one faulty gene which stops the body's cleaning system from operating efficiently, occasioning a build-up of mucus. It is the most commonly inherited disease in this country and he is one of 9,000 sufferers in the UK and 100,000 worldwide. He has to take up to 50 tablets a day and it can be most challenging keeping on top of such heavy dosages.

The ultimate goal of the CFT is to eliminate cystic fibrosis. All fundraising goes into research in order to achieve this. In addition, it is particularly hoped that younger sufferers will benefit from new advances and treatments. However, already thanks to regular check-ups, medication and current research, more and more sufferers like Andrew are living increasingly fulfilled lives. Andrew concluded his short but inspirational talk by warmly thanking the Circle for its donation. He left all in attendance in no doubt that he along with his most supportive parents are fine and worthy ambassadors for the CFT.

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The Merry May Bluebell Walk

(Riccal Dale from Pockley)

To find the start (OS Grid Ref SE 637 861), leave Helmsley along the A170 road heading towards Kirkbymoorside, after a mile turn left along a lane signposted Pockley 1 mile.

Pockley is a peaceful pretty village with a church and just a couple dozen cottages, many of which are thatched. The walk starts along a quiet lane where the landscape is of rolling fields and distant hills before dropping into the wooded dale where, in the month of May, the bluebells bloom in abundance. The ramble continues along tracks and paths by the meandering River Riccal before ascending to return to the village.

- Start from Pockley Church by heading north along Northfield Lane passing Manor Farm B&B at the village end. Continue for a mile to pass Oxclose Farm. After another 300 yards, take a waysigned track left along the field edge to a gate in the left corner.
- 2. Turn through this gate and follow the path 100 yards to turn right (signed Hasty Bank Farm 1/2 mile) and head down a track through the first gate to bear left for 50 metres to another farm gate where an arrow sign guides you off the track by the side of the farmhouse to follow an indistinct path down and over a footbridge.
- 3. Turn immediate left along the path for 200 yards then using a walkers' gate follow the yellow arrow straight ahead. After passing through a scout camping area, a wide fenced path leads up to a forest track, turn right along the track soon to bear left with it keeping the pheasant pens to the left.
- 4. Continue up a steady ascent for about a 1/2 mile keeping left at track junction then ignore two tracks that ford the river to the left. The route then takes a short rise and 200 yards beyond the tip, take a very rough stepped (complete with dodgy handrail) track left that loops down to cross a footbridge and turn right along a green track now keeping the river to your right. Carry on along this track following a yellow arrow sign straight ahead past a small pheasant pen to another arrow post in a clearing, from here trek up a green track half left (ignoring the footbridge to the right).
- 5. Go through a farm gate near the bank top and continue straight ahead at the signpost along a wide grassy track then along a field edge soon to meet a lane where a left turn will lead through the village of thatched cottages and back to Pockley Church.
