Bishop's Column

Twice a year the Bishops of England and Wales meet in conference. As you can imagine, there is never a shortage of topics to be aired and discussed. I picked out two topics which should be of interest. What follows are two sections from the statement which is released to the press at the end of the meeting.

Assisted Suicide

Proposals to legalise assisted suicide for terminally ill people raise serious questions about how we care for elderly and vulnerable people. In his statement in February 2014 to the Pontifical Academy for Life, Pope Francis said this:

"The fullness toward which all human life is oriented is not in contradiction with any condition of illness and suffering. Hence, the lack of health or the fact of one's disability are never valid reasons for exclusion or, and what is worse, the elimination of persons. The gravest deprivation experienced by the aged is not the weakening of one's physical body, or the disability that may result from this. Rather, it is the abandonment, exclusion and deprivation of love."

Everyone, not least Christians, must have a particular concern for the weakest and most vulnerable members of our society, including the elderly, the sick, the dying, the lonely, and those who do not have the loving support of family and friends. We commend the devoted work of carers, doctors, nurses, chaplains, social workers and organisations who care for them and strive to give them protection and to affirm their dignity as human beings. We remain opposed to any form of assisted suicide and we reaffirm our support for high quality end-of-life care, whether in hospices, hospitals or the community.

Commemorations for World War I

To mark the centenary of the First World War and remember all those who lost their lives in the conflict, the bishops of England and Wales encourage the Catholic community to participate in local civic or ecumenical celebrations.

The bishops will celebrate Requiem Masses in their Cathedrals or other Principal Churches on or near the six key dates which have been identified as part of the anniversary celebrations.

- 4th August 2014 the centenary of entry of the British Empire to the War
- 25th April 2015 the Gallipoli campaign

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

Norman Harper is organist at St George's Metropolitan Cathedral, Southwark in South London, where he directs the Cathedral choirs of girls, boys and professional lay clerks. In recent years, the choirs of St George's have broadcast on BBC radio and TV, and their regular musical repertoires range from the 12th century Hildegard von Bingen to the 21st century Timothy Craig Harrison! Norman is also musical director of two London-based chamber choirs: the Alleyn Singers and the Friends' Musick. Norman has performed widely as conductor and organist, beginning his career in the North West of England and working in London since the 1980s. He

has conducted choirs and orchestras in the Fairfield Hall, Croydon, Cadogan Hall and St John's Smith Square, and has given organ recitals in many prominent church and cathedral venues, including St Paul's Cathedral, Westminster Abbey, Westminster Cathedral, King's College Cambridge and the National Cathedral, Washington DC; also in Germany, France, the Czech Republic, Estonia and Australia.

Norman has a particular fondness for French music of the Baroque and Romantic eras, and Fauré's well-loved 'Messe de Requiem' is among his firm favourites, whether in a concert setting with orchestra or as part of the sacred liturgy. He is delighted to be invited to direct Fauré's 'Requiem' at the summer choral workshop, and looks forward to meeting you all then

Tribute to a musical pilgrim

Are you among the many thousands of pilgrims from the Diocese of Middlesbrough who have travelled to Lourdes over the past 15 years? Then you might well be familiar with the music of Mike Stanley, especially at the Podium Mass, opposite the Grotto, which Middlesbrough and Birmingham dioceses traditionally share. Or, perhaps in more recent years the midweek evening concert by Jo Boyce and Mike Stanley; which has drawn many pilgrims, young and old, from Middlesbrough and beyond.

Mike Stanley died in June 2013, at the age of 48, just after the end of the 2013 pilgrimage to Lourdes. Mike had dedicated the final year and months of his life writing and recording music that would sustain his family, friends and those drawn to prayer through music: during the celebration of the Eucharist, in private in our cars or homes.

Mike had many 'families' of faith around the country, through his work with CJM and with Jo Boyce. One such family was the family that united in Lourdes. Whilst we were privileged to understand the language in which he sang, the music transcended language barriers; especially on evenings when the English pilgrims led the Marian torchlight procession, drawing many people to stand and listen, to be taken to that special place of prayer through words and the gift of music.

Cardinal Vincent Nichols (as the then Archbishop of Birmingham) once said, in a homily, that Lourdes is a special place where the veil between heaven and earth is very thin; bringing us in close proximity to those we hold dear in our hearts, to the Saints and to Mary in our prayers and deeds. Mike shared his last days, with his family and especially his wife, Yvonne, following the Birmingham Diocesan Masses and processions on the Lourdes website; listening to his old and new music being shared with the English pilgrims. His lasting legacy to us, to enable us to join in prayer through song. Early summer 2014 sees the launch of *Grace*, the third album, alongside *Faith* and *Dewfall*. The CDs and music resource packs are available through the CJM website www.cjmmusic.com and through St Pauls Bookshop in York.

Some music no longer permitted!

When the current translation of the Roman Missal became available, it was recognised that one of the best ways for parishes to become familiar with the texts was through singing them. Permission to sing the texts was therefore granted from Easter 2011 in advance of the full introduction of the translation in September 2011. Time flies! That was three years ago, during which time publishers have filled our shelves with volumes of both new settings and revised older settings. As well as books, a number of free online resources have been made available so that by now most of our parishes and schools have found settings of the parts of the Mass which suit their local situation and resources. I was not surprised, therefore, when shortly before Easter, the following communication appeared in my inbox: "The Bishops' Conference has decided that from Pentecost Sunday, 8th June 2014 only settings of the Ordinary of the Mass using the new translation are permitted to be sung at Mass. From this date settings using the previous translation or paraphrased texts may no longer be used in parishes, schools and communities." DIOCESAN CENTRAL SERVICES REVENUE BUDGET 2014

INTRODUCTION


The Diocese is obliged under both Canon and Civil Law to produce an annual estimate of its expenditure and projected income for its central functions and this is known as the Central Services Revenue Budget. Central Services comprise those duties and responsibilities which follow from the pursuit of the Church's mission in the Diocese of Middlesbrough but also, as a charity, it must comply with the many burdens placed upon it by Civil Law. This article is intended to explain the ways in which the Diocese addresses these challenges and the consequent costs.


Good financial management dictates the Revenue Budget identifies the probable costs of its services and functions together with an assessment as to how these activities are to be funded. Once the Diocesan Board of Trustees has approved the budget total, budget holders, ie those priests or lay staff who have a responsibility for managing a particular service, will be advised of their available funds. Each then has a responsibility to manage their spending within that allocation.

Diocesan central services expects to spend about £1,891,540 in the current year and Table 1 (right) shows how it intends to raise the funds necessary to meet these costs. The diagram shows that the largest contribution, just under half, will come from the parishes of the Diocese (£899,590) and this figure has remained unchanged for the last four years. The Diocese also collects an amount to cover the annual pension premiums for its active priests (£75,000). The personal pension premiums are, subsequently, paid over to the Diocesan pension provider.


In recent years annual yields from the Diocese's investment portfolio have been poor and resources have been redirected into the property rental market and these assets – land and buildings – are expected to generate £342,050 (now the second largest contributor) during the course of the year. As the economy recovers so too does the investment market and the Diocese expects to receive £219,000 from its ethical investment portfolio – a significant reversal and improvement on recent years.

The last major contribution comes from the 56 primary and secondary schools of the Diocese which together will contribute, through a formula based on pupils' ages and numbers, an estimated £223,730 to the cost of providing the Schools' Service. The Priests' Training Fund (£35,000) and Youth Ministry (£32,680) figures reflect the anticipated levels of second collections; fundraising, donations and legacies expected during the year. These sums are 'ring fenced' for the exclusive use of these services.






Following an internal governance review the central functions and services of the Diocese have been grouped into five areas of vicariate responsibility. These Episcopal Vicariates comprise Christian Discipleship; Clergy; Evangelisation; Spirituality and Worship and Stewardship and Administration, each being headed by an Episcopal Vicar responsible directly to the Bishop. The sixth category is a composite of various financial costs which do not fall readily into any particular vicariate. An analysis of each is shown in the 'pie' charts on these two pages.



The Episcopal Vicariate for Christian Discipleship is the smallest of the vicariates. The principal area of cost is in the Communications budget (£25,020) which covers all aspects of the media and communication needs of the Diocese, including liaison with local radio services, the construction and maintenance of the Diocesan website, the production of the Diocesan Year Book and the publication and distribution of the Catholic Voice.


Episcopal Vicariate for the Cleroy - £341.420



The Episcopal Vicariate for the Clergy comprises those areas which are, essentially, costs incurred in sustaining the Bishop, priests and deacons of the Diocese in their work. At the present time there are four student seminarians away at colleges at home and abroad and the £121,890 reflects the annual costs of college fees, grants, books, travel etc. This compares with anticipated income for the Priests' Training Fund for 2014 of £35,000 (see Table 1 above) — a shortfall of almost £87,000 for the year.


There is a heading of Support to Priests (£65,000) which provides a general maintenance and underpinning service for the active priests of the Diocese and covers such things as health care costs, travel and accommodation, particularly for those priests who are not directly supported by a parish.

The Diaconate budget (£10,000) reflects the annual cost of training new deacons whilst the Vocations Director is anticipated to incur £17,000 in his work encouraging and facilitating vocations to the priesthood. The Priests' Pension total of £75,000 comprises the priests' personal pension premiums paid over by the Diocese to the Diocesan pensions' provider, together with an element which forms a separate contribution to a pension reserve fund.



In the Episcopal Vicariate for Evangelisation, a significant proportion of available funds are targeted at the youth of the Diocese primarily through the Schools' Service itself (£279,660) which provides a strategic overview and support service to the Diocese's 48 primary and eight secondary schools ensuring a Catholic education for over 17,000 children and young people but also through the work of the Youth Ministry team (£121,870) which takes its mission work directly into the schools on Mission Days which have proved both highly popular and successful. In addition, support continues to undergraduates through the work of the University Chaplaincies (£31,000) at York and Hull.


For the adult faithful there is the Adult Formation Service (£53,120) which not only promotes and supports those seeking admission to the church through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) but also provides a range of opportunities and courses for those who seek a deeper understanding of their faith.



The diagram above summarises the work of the Episcopal Vicariate for Spirituality and Worship. The underlying theme of this service is to promote and sustain the spiritual life of the Diocese which the diagram shows in its diversity. The Diocesan Director of Music (£36,050) has his work base at St Mary's Cathedral and is responsible for developing and propagating liturgical music throughout the parishes and schools of the Diocese; he also leads the music for daily liturgies as well as for larger Diocesan and special events.

The Bishop's Council for Liturgy (£34,670) is the umbrella body which advises the Bishop on all liturgical matters including the development of ministry, art and architecture and music as well as being the link between parishes and the Diocese on matters of sacramental celebrations.

The Historic Churches Committee (£8,000) acts as the guardian of the Diocese's listed buildings. Any works to these buildings will require a faculty from the committee; it also supervises quinquennial inspections of all listed churches and also of churches in conservation areas.




The Episcopal Vicar for Stewardship and Administration oversees the varied work of the central services departments, most of which are based in the Curial Offices in Middlesbrough. Administration and Finance (£173,490) provides reception, secretarial, cleaning and financial management support to these services, together with the essential telephone, printing, photocopying, stationery and other administrative requirements. The Gift Aid Section (£42,650) oversees and administers the process of claiming refunds on behalf of the parishes from the tax authorities which successfully recover for the Diocese refunds of approximately £410,000pa (financial year end 2014). The Gift Aid Section is largely self-funding through its commission re-charges (see Table 1).

The Safeguarding Section (£75,810) is the administrative arm of the Diocesan Safeguarding Commission which ensures that the Diocese complies with relevant legislation and the Church's own standards and good practice. The section is supported by over 100 volunteers in the parishes.

The Diocese has over 340 properties to maintain including churches, presbyteries, parish halls and other buildings: the total includes 56 schools, primary and secondary. The task of looking after these buildings, which includes complying with the many aspects of civil legislation, is undertaken by the Buildings Section (£113,470). The Upkeep of Properties Budget of £105,000 is the sum set aside to meet the annual buildings maintenance costs of the Diocese's non parish properties such as the Curial Offices, Bishop's House, The John Paul Centre and other land and buildings which form part of its property portfolio.

The Diocese is governed by laws, both Canon Law – the law of the Church – and the ever burgeoning Civil Law. To comply with the demands and requirements of these two the Diocese employs the services of its Judicial Vicar (£13,780) and Diocesan Solicitor (£34,630), respectively.

Bishop's Household costs (£114,140) cover all those expenses which must be incurred in enabling the Bishop to fulfil the spectrum of his duties (local, national and international) including subsistence and accommodation, administrative and secretarial services, travel, conference and hospitality expenses etc.



The above chart shows those costs which do not fit easily within the remit of any of the Episcopal Vicariates. In the main, they reflect the type of financial costs which most large organisations must provide for. Bank Charges (£20,500) – the Diocese operates over 150 bank accounts – and accountancy fees (£53,000) are self-explanatory. The Diocese must also buy in certain professional skills such as pension advice, investment brokerage and valuation services; these costs are met from the Professional Fees budget (£42,000).

To facilitate and support the provision of Catholic secondary education in Middlesbrough, and in the absence of any alternative sources of funding, the Diocese undertook to meet the costs of providing an access road to the new Trinity College campus. The cost of the new road is anticipated to be in the order of £1.4m and the Loan Interest figure of £40,950 is the consequent cost of financing this debt in 2014.


The 'Housekeeper's' sum of £2,550 is a provision from which the Bishop makes small, ex gratia, payments to a number of now elderly ladies as an acknowledgement of the dedicated and devoted services they gave, over many years, to the priests of the Diocese. The Bishops' Conference total of £29,940 is the contribution the Diocese makes to the National Conference Fund which supports the work of the Catholic Bishops of England and Wales.

SUMMARY

During the course of the year the various income and expenditure budgets, as outlined above, will be closely monitored to ensure that costs and revenue follow expectations. The figures shown in this article are budget estimates and, by definition, are therefore projections of anticipated costs and revenues. Experience has shown, however, that they tend to be remarkably consistent with expectations. In the course of the year budget holders will be asked to report on spending progress to members of the Trustee Board. At year end, the Diocesan Trustees will request a formal summary - which is known as the 'Outturn Report' - to satisfy themselves that their finances remain disciplined and have been directed efficiently and effectively towards their goals.

In the space permitted, this article can give only an overview as to how the Trustee Board, through its range of central services, spends the money entrusted to it by the parishioners of the Diocese in pursuing the mission of the Church in the Diocese of Middlesbrough. Hopefully, it has served as a general introduction and has prompted some interest into the inner workings of Diocesan finance.

Apostleship of the Sea

Sea Sunday will be celebrated on 13th July in 2014 when a collection is taken for the Apostleship of the Sea. The article below provides a snapshot of what your donations are used to support.

When you are an Apostleship of the Sea (AoS) port chaplain or ship visitor, you never know what to expect, says Tony McAvoy, Chaplain to Hartlepool and Tees. In February, Tony and his team provided help to the crew of a gas tanker that had been anchored off North Tees since early December.

The Gammagas had arrived at the Tees on Tuesday 3rd December but with no cargo to load, and was ordered to drop anchor in Tees Bay. Unfortunately, the ship's stay became extremely protracted and the crew subsequently spent Christmas on board. The crew had to improvise with whatever provisions they had, explains Tony. "Whilst all the time being in sight of land, the crew were unable to come ashore and we of course could not visit them."

The vessel docks regularly at the petrochemical berths at North Tees, and the AoS ship visitor Jimmy Ross was well-known to

the crew because of the support he had previously provided to them. Jimmy kept in touch by phone, by text and by e-mail and was able to provide the numbers for phone top ups so the crew could call home during the festive period. On Wednesday 8th January, Jimmy was advised that the ship was to come alongside for a very short period, probably about four hours, to load fresh water and provisions. However, this would not be at North Tees but up the coast at the Port of Sunderland, about 30 miles away.

Contact was made with AoS ship visitor Sister Mary Scholastica and the AoS volunteer team at Sunderland and arrangements made for Jimmy to travel to Sunderland to complete his mission and deliver items to the crew. Sister Scholastica was on board within a short time after the ship berthed, providing the crew with woolly hats, socks and toiletries. The crew was delighted with the belated Christmas presents.

This story illustrates the important role the AoS plays in supporting seafarers visiting ports in Britain. And Sea Sunday, 13th July, is

when the Church asks us to pray for seafarers and support AoS. When Tony gives talks to parishes, he asks everyone to pray for seafarers, for their families back home and for the work of the Apostleship of the Sea. "It's important for us all to appreciate

how important seafarers are in our daily lives and to support them in whatever way we can" he says.

A Summer Walk

This being the third of six walks planned for this summer, I think it is time to pay our magnificent coastline a visit. So where better then Kettleness, a small coastal community of just a farm and a few cottages, found signposted off A174 five miles north of Whitby. Kettleness is a lovely place to visit even if just to sit and enjoy the sea views. The sights of the jagged headland and maritime hamlets are magnificent. Some time ago, it was a thriving industrial area mining and processing Alum; some evidence of mining can still be seen along the way but it takes nothing away from the vista.

- From Kettleness Green start by heading north (left when looking out to sea) along the coastal path which first squeezes between the farm and cliffs to continue along the way, twisting, dipping and rising for about a mile presenting the wonderful views across Runswick Bay.
- 2. Ignore all other paths until reaching a stile after having enjoyed a couple of hundred yds of steady descent alongside a barbed topped wire fence, cross the stile and follow a green path up half left (almost a U turn) to a stone bridge almost hidden by Gorse bushes. Cross this bridge over the now redundant coastal rail line, navigate two stiles and continue along one field edge, pass through a gate to promptly cross a stile left.
- 3. From here a well waymarked path using gates and stiles will guide you along three field edges to take a right turn along one field then left followed by a half right to meet a green track leading to a road.
- 4. Turn right onto the road and head straight through Goldsborough (ignoring right turn at the road junction) to pass the small Fox and Hounds Hotel. Continue along this road for 400 yds, when the lane turns ninety degrees right we take the farm track sharp left which leads back to the coast.
- 5. From here we have splendid views of Whitby and Lythe. Upon reaching the coastal path turn left to finally stroll the last mile back to Kettleness Green once more in awe of the superb sea views.

Thank you from the Philippines

Imagine the strongest storm you've ever known and then multiply it many times over. Imagine winds so powerful that they knock down concrete houses. Imagine shouting prayers at the top of your voice, but not being able to hear what's coming out of your mouth over the howling wind.

When Typhoon Haiyan hit the Philippines in November, ten year old Honeyrea was taking shelter in a gymnasium on Leyte island, along with her family and other members of the community. It was an experience she will never forget. "Many people were there, and it was nearly full" she told me in her quiet voice. "We said a lot of prayers. We said Our Father and prayed the rosary." The noise of the storm was terrifying, but worse was to follow when water started pouring into the building. "There were big waves" Honeyrea remembered. "The water came up to my waist. It happened in less than a minute and it was rising fast. We had to run upstairs. I couldn't stop crying, because my mother was left downstairs. Then, the roof of the gym fell through. I was blank for three minutes. My father was talking to me, but I couldn't understand what he was saying." Honeyrea and her father stayed upstairs in the gymnasium for the entire day, exposed to the pouring rain and howling wind, while waiting for the waters below them to recede. When it was finally safe to come out, they found their home destroyed and most of their possessions washed away. But the overriding emotion of that moment was joy: Honeyrea's mother had survived. Many others were not so fortunate. About 200 metres from the tent where Honeyrea's family now lives, there is a mass grave where more than 1,000 people are buried.

Saving lives after the storm

Typhoon Haiyan was one of the strongest storms ever to hit land, with winds of up to 171 miles per hour. But much of the damage on Leyte island was caused by the 'storm surge': huge debris-filled waves of water speeding inland washing away houses, roads and water-supply systems.

Thanks to your donations to our Philippines Typhoon Haiyan appeal, our Church partners were able to start delivering food, water and emergency supplies within hours of the typhoon striking. In a country where 80 per cent of the population is Catholic, the Church played a vital role, providing aid quickly in some areas that the Filipino government couldn't reach for days. A disaster like Typhoon Haiyan is bad enough in itself, but if survivors don't have access to clean water and sanitation, diseases like cholera and typhoid can spread extremely quickly - and you can have two disasters in one. That's why, shortly after the disaster, we worked with our partner Catholic Relief Services (CRS) to install a 'water bladder' - an inflatable plastic tank, filled with water - near where Honeyrea and her family were staying.



Thanks to the water bladder, Honevrea has clean water to drink. "It's important to drink clean water so you don't get sick" she told me. "I am very thankful for the water. It tastes delicious.'

Thanks to the quick work of CAFOD and other agencies, there have been no serious outbreaks of disease since the typhoon. It will take the people of the Philippines years to recover completely from one of the strongest storms in history, but your compassion is helping thousands of families like Honeyrea's not only to survive, but to start again.

Thanks to your remarkable generosity, our Philippines Typhoon Haiyan Appeal has raised more than £5 million. With your support we have:

- Supported local Church volunteers in providing food shelter and emergency kits to thousands of people immediately after the typhoon.
- Set up and regularly filled 17 water bladders, providing safe drinking water to thousands of families.

Hope on the streets of Middlesbrough

Friday 25th April, the night of the most recent Big Teesside Sleep Out was cold, wet and miserable. The night saw the MYMission Team joined by 20 friends become a part of around 130 volunteers who slept rough outside Middlesbrough College from 8.00 pm to 6.00 am.

As we arrived, we set up camp, placing cardboard on the floor as a mattress and wrapped our sleeping bags in survival bags to help keep them dry. We were then taken inside to be briefed on what we were about to endure, we all felt quite nervous as we were unsure of how the night was going to pan out. At first the weather seemed quite promising and we all talked and had the opportunity to listen to Cattle & Cane play some songs. The start of the night was great but unfortunately as we tried to get some sleep, there was a massive downpour. It was awful being so cold and wet and not being able to do anything about it.

We can whinge about this novelty of a one night Sleep Out being cold and wet, but ultimately we had more supplies than the homeless do. We had toilet facilities, hot drinks available from sunset to sunrise, along with the lucky offer from Pizza Hut bringing us a delivery and donating a generous £200.00! Some might think one night is hardly anything but it really gave us a glimpse into what some people suffer daily. There was an amazing sense of achievement afterwards, especially as the night had dragged on whilst we lay uncomfortable, unable to sleep. However, we all became one big family which gave us the chance to talk to people we wouldn't normally; become closer to those we already knew and share stories, particularly about Lourdes.

In the future, we will understand what it feels like to those that live on the streets. We will definitely be eager to give food, money, supplies and keen to participate in more charity events. Afterwards, we were all able to return home to hot shower, food and a bed with clean pyjamas; however, the homeless are unable to do this which is why they rely on charities to provide them with these opportunities. Overall, the MYMission Team and friends raised around £3,000 and some of the group are still managing to collect donations from friends and relatives. St Bede and the **Northumbrian Saints**



Living in North Yorkshire, Lucy Beckett is a well-known author and speaker, an expert in many aspects of English Catholic history. So a large and eager audience gathered for her talk to the Cleveland Newman Circle which focused on the origins of Christianity in our region.

The hero of Lucy's talk was St Bede. Born in 673 AD, he was known as 'the Venerable' even in his lifetime, because people so respected him; he was canonised in 1899. Without his work as a scholar, teacher and writer, we would know very little about Christianity in England during the Dark Ages St Bede was a monk of Jarrow, at the far end of the Roman world: having entered the monastery as a schoolboy aged seven, he stayed there throughout his 62 years, never travelling beyond York. Nevertheless, he wrote 42 books including scripture commentaries and history. St Bede valued books and scholarship: he obtained 'primary sources' for his writings (being the first to reference quotations explicitly), he introduced 'AD' and 'BC' for dates - and he wrote a spelling dictionary for his students!

St Bede's major work, 'The Ecclesiastical History of the English People', tells us how the Northumbrian people - from the Humber to the Firth of Forth - became Christian and how

Christian mission developed across the country. He described two initiatives to convert England. Firstly, St Gregory the Great in Rome sent St Augustine to start a mission in Kent (597 AD), from which St Paulinus was sent to York in 632 AD to baptise King Edwin. However, Edwin and all his family except Hilda, a great niece, were killed. Later, from Iona (the monastery founded by St Columba), monks led by St Aidan came to settle on Lindisfarne (635 AD). There St Aidan taught many who subsequently had immense influence in our region, including St Wilfrid, St Chad, St Cedd and St Hilda.

Lucy spoke with enthusiasm: about the Synod of Whitby, why some Celtic practices differed from the Roman, and about St Benet Biscop making six return trips from Jarrow to Rome! Her delightful talk was enlivened and illuminated by mentions of many other saints in Britain, including: St Cuthbert, St John of Beverley, St Patrick, St Hadrian (an African) and St Theodore (a Syrian). St Bede, her focus, was important for the whole Western Church; when he died, St Boniface (a southerner) called him 'the candle of the Church, who was enlightened by the Holy Spirit'.



Hope on the streets of Scarborough





'SPES' is Latin for 'HOPE'. It also stands for 'St Patrick's Evangelisation School, Soho' which has been running for about 15 years. Every year, a group of young volunteers assembles from all over the world at St Patrick's Parish, Soho in central London to be a community of prayer centred on Christ in the Eucharist, to study the Catholic faith from the Catechism, to be formed in spirituality and to go out and announce the Good News of Jesus Christ to all who will talk to them. For the last eight years, they have headed north each March for a week in Hull and more recently Scarborough to bring their own special style of evangelisation to Yorkshire.

This year, the team included members from Canada, Texas in the US, Germany, Ireland, Scotland and Leeds. They are a group of diverse personalities from diverse backgrounds but have clearly been formed and moulded over the months, above all by the Holy Spirit to witness to the presence of the love of Jesus Christ in the world.

What did SPES do in Scarborough this year? Daily assemblies to all years in St Augustine's Secondary School included moving testimonies from each of the members. Standing in the assembly hall, one could detect the sometimes reluctant but keen attention given to the voices of the team members, some of them only a few years older than the pupils. They spoke honestly about the pressures and temptations that had at times led them down wrong paths only for the Lord to come and search for them, through friends inviting them to youth retreats, World Youth Days. And then their joy

The team also visited the two Scarborough Catholic primary schools and headed out into the town streets armed with phrases of scripture carefully folded and 'miraculous medals' of Our Lady. The old style street evangelisation approach surprised many - "I never thought Catholics did this sort of thing". We have in the past but we don't do too much of it nowadays. Perhaps we should.

And in the evening there were Holy Hours for the Confirmation candidates, for the children of the First Holy Communion parents and finally a Youth Night with games, pizza and workshops on methods of prayer - Adoration, the Rosary, praying with music, intercession. The method of Don Bosco was always, first make them your friends, then teach them about Jesus - and it still works. On one evening, two members were sent over to Hull to speak at the Hull Faith Forum at St Joseph's, Boothferry Road. They spoke to a large group of young people about their London life: about Nightfever, SOS Prayerline, Open House, their Advent Mission and Friday Night Street Evangelisation. The Hull youth were told it's all about planting the seeds and letting them grow. Even if we don't see the harvest we know that the Holy Spirit will be working within each person encountered to bring them to God. We just have to be brave and speak to people about Jesus, to bring them to the work of the Holy Spirit within them. To join SPES, you have to be at least 18 and commit for a nine month period. Perhaps in time some young people from Scarborough and Hull will be joining up.

Vocations

The 'Priests' Training Fund' - If You Build It...

I don't know whether you have seen the 1989 film 'Field of Dreams' starring Kevin Costner? Costner plays a young lowa farmer, Ray Kinsella, who is struggling to make his farm pay. One day he is working in his corn field, when he hears a mysterious voice saying: "If you build it, they will come." His wife, Annie, obviously thinks he is imagining things. Her efforts to be sympathetic to whatever it is that is happening are stretched to breaking point when her husband decides that what he is being asked to build is a baseball field right there on their farm and in order to do that he will have to destroy a considerable portion of his crop even though it may cost him his farm.

To cut a long (but very enjoyable) story short, when he builds the field two teams of long-dead baseball players appear out of the surrounding corn each day to play a game, but the thing is that only those with a real love for baseball are able to see them. Initially, Ray thinks that what he has done is



what the voice meant when it said: "If you build it, they will come" and, basically, that is true although there are all sorts of other implications - you'll have to watch the film for the full story. But there is also a classic Hollywood ending in praise of baseball in that true baseball lovers who have heard about Ray's field begin to arrive in droves from all over the country to watch their baseball heroes from the past: "If you build it, they will come" - he did and so they do. You may remember the 'Walk for Vocations' that Bishop John first organised back in 2006 and which was followed by other such walks since then. These walks aimed to promote vocations throughout the Diocese not only by hopefully drawing the attention of our young people to the possibility of a vocation to priesthood or religious life, but also of encouraging the people of the Diocese to make prayer for vocations a priority. In a twist on the theme of "If you build it, they will come", it became a case of "If you pray for it, it will happen" because, as a result, there certainly seemed to be an encouraging increase in the number of those coming forward. Isn't it strange, though, how prayer being answered can take us slightly by surprise? It left us, as a Diocese, struggling to meet the financial implications of that modest, though very welcome, increase in vocations. We await the fruits of more recent

vocations walks instigated by Bishop Terry.

and Spain. In recent years, the amount collected through the Priests' Training Fund has barely been enough to finance just one student for one year, which means that money has had to be taken from elsewhere because, obviously, we can't take students out of the seminary just because not enough money has come in through the PTF to pay for their training. And while we continue to call it the *Priests'* Training Fund, we shouldn't forget, also, the cost of training our deacons.

While the Fund remains an important factor in that effort, it clearly needs to be supplemented to a considerable degree. Collection boxes to which people can contribute money throughout the year have been produced and distributed to the parishes and schools of our Diocese. This source of support throughout the year, in addition to the annual PTF collection, will hopefully swell available funding to a much more realistic level but in a way that is relatively "painless" precisely because it is year-round and gradual.

Made more aware of our financial needs in this way, some might prefer to contribute through a monthly direct debit rather than via the boxes. Either form of giving might then also be gift aided in the case of those who normally pay income tax - adding 25 pence in the Pound to their donation at no extra cost to them. There is also the possibility of including a bequest to the PTF in one's will. Yet another possibility is for those parishes that can afford it to sponsor a student either for a year or for the entire course of his studies.

When people give to the Sunday collection, primarily they are giving in support of the upkeep and functioning of their parish, but



what about funds that may be in excess sometimes far in excess - of what is actually needed to meet those costs? There must be hundreds of thousands of pounds sitting in parish accounts doing nothing (parish accounts don't earn interest) - is that what people give their money for? Rather might they prefer to see a portion of it being invested in something as essential to the future of the Diocese as the training of its priests through a donation to the PTF or the sponsorship of a student? Even if excess Diocese's central fund, therefore still being retained by the parish, they would at least then be earning interest at no cost to the parish and which could be donated to the PTF - after all, every little helps.

This, then, brings us back to our earlier theme: "If you build it, they will come" or, rather, "If you pray for it, it will happen".

Prayer for vocations (to religious life and diaconate as well as to priesthood) is essential to the future of the Church in this country. We can't *not* pray for vocations just because we can't currently afford them! We need to try our best *to* afford them while we continue praying for vocations and that those whom God may be calling might be open to that call.

Father Peter Murray, Marist Father, died on Friday 21st February after an illness lasting a few years during which time he lived in the Marist Community in Hull.


