

During the recent celebrations in 'Unity' week 19th – 25th January, it brought to mind one soul who prayed and offered many Masses 'for the Unity of the churches in England'. Her name is Charlotte Pearson Boyd (1837-1906).

On 8th October 2013 I visited the somewhat neglected grave of Miss Boyd at St Mary's Catholic Cemetery at Kensal Green in London. As most of you may know, in the late 19th century Charlotte Boyd bought and renovated the Slipper Chapel at Walsingham, donated it to the Catholic Church, and became a Catholic herself.

Hers is a fabulous and saintly story of a life dedicated to rebuilding the church in England. Sadly, she did not live to see the Slipper Chapel become England's National Shrine of Our Lady in 1934. What is not so well known is that while she was rebuilding Monasteries and Abbeys, Ms Boyd also housed and educated orphans in London for some forty years. There are several written accounts of her life available to read up, and I'll not begin any of that within this limited space. What I would like to draw attention to, is the fact that Charlotte Boyd's mortal remains lie in Kensal Green cemetery. Walsingham pilgrims will recall that Benedictine Oblate Iron Cross, outside of the Slipper Chapel, near the entrance. It was brought from her London grave in 1983, but her body still lies in her 1906 grave at St Mary's cemetery. It would be wonderful if the mortal remains could be brought to rest at her beloved Slipper Chapel in Walsingham.

# **Book Reviews**

A big 'thank you' to our readers who share their thoughts with you on the following books:

Eileen Sandy, Birmingham Branch Minutes Secretary, writes about POPE FRANCIS, UNTYING THE KNOTS Author: Paul Vallely

The first introduction I had to 'Untying the Knots' was at the Birmingham Branch AGM last year. Father Carrick, our CWL chaplain, gave us a brief outline of how Pope Francis had been sent to Germany in the 1980s. There he had entered the Church of Saint Peter Am Perlach in Augsburg, and seen an eighteenth century painting of Our Lady called 'Mary, Untier of Knots'. In it Our Lady was doing just that: untying knots in a piece of white ribbon. He was very moved by this picture and bought an image of it before returning to Argentina.

And so when I was presented with this book as a Christmas present, I was eager to read it. It was impossible to put down. It is well written and details the life of Pope Francis through his childhood until the present day. It tells of the influence of his Italian grandmother on his upbringing; his life as the Jesuit Superior in Argentina during the 'Dirty War' of the 1970s, and goes on to detail the change in him after he was sent away from Argentina in the 1980s. The book brings us right up to the present day, with the reaction to his being created Pope Small wonder that Pope Francis is called 'A Pope of Surprises'

#### Lorna Mullett, President Lancaster Branch: Band of Angels: The Forgotten World of Early Christian Women Author: Professor Kate Cooper

In this very readable book Kate Cooper tells the story of the early beginnings of Christianity from the woman's point of view. The women she studies came from all walks of life - peasants, businesswomen, empresses - and she shows how they played an invaluable if often forgotten part in the development of our faith. Of great interest is her demonstration of how St Paul tapped into the domestic (and business) circles of the women with whom he came into contact - Chloe, Lydia, Phoebe, Junia, Prisca and many others - to establish and further the growth of the nascent Christian churches. Her catchment is wide - the women of Galilee, the female martyrs, the desert mothers, the empresses, and finally 'The Queen of Heaven'. For the most part the women of the ancient world live out their lives anonymously so there is a problem of evidence but using what little evidence that is available Professor Cooper paints a vivid and convincing picture of these women whose lives were changed by their new-found faith and who, in turn, helped to change the world around them and created an enduring legacy A book well worth the reading.

#### Helen Gannon, Birmingham Branch Vice-President reviews SISTERS OF THE EAST END Author: Helen Batten

A delightful story based on the lives of the Sisters of the Anglican community of St John the Divine.

Based in the East End it follows the progress of Sister Catherine Mary and her friends who share both the spiritual highs and lows within the community from a rewarding nursing career as a midwife in the East End to setting up and running a school of midwifery in Malawi.

This review is written by Fr Philip Griffin, PP at Small Heath, Birmingham Pope John, Author: Meriol Trevor

The canonisation of Pope John XXIII has led to interest in this biography, written in the years immediately after his death. It is an affectionate tribute to a great Pope, and a lasting memorial to its author. Pope John enjoyed a short pontificate, but was responsible for initiating a period of change in the Catholic Church which continues today. At the time of his election in 1958, he was described as a transitional Pope. It was assumed that he would be a quiet caretaker of the papal throne until Montini was appointed Cardinal, and was available as 'palpable' at the next consistory. However, Pope John was indeed a man of transition, who emerged from semi obscurity to bring the Catholic Church into the modern world. Meriol Trevor presents John as a man who trusted in God; charismatic, a man of simplicity, humour, and shrewd wisdom. He wished only to draw people to God. As Pope he was pastor and shepherd, seeing his role as one of service to the Church and the world. Pius XII, Trevor argues, ruled the church; John XXIII served it. He reached out to God's people with a message of peace, renewal and reconciliation. The calling of the council was just one part of this vision.

The fascination with John lies largely in the obscurity of his life before his election as Pope. Trevor writes warmly and perceptively about his home life, his formation, and his early years as priest, assessing his contact with the various lay movements in the Church at the time, and his response to them. His experiences in Bulgaria, Greece and Turkey gave him a unique breadth of experience which deeply influenced his later calls for Christian reconciliation and unity. Meriol's description of Pope John's last days is a moving and poignant reflection on a man who was loved by Catholics and non-Catholics alike. Pope John was an historian and had a vision of the inevitability of chance and development. History taught Pope John, and teaches us, that nothing is unalterable. Pope John's profound faith in God, his love for the Church and for all humanity, combined with this historian perspective, led him to change the course of the Catholic Church irreversibly. Good Pope John was a shepherd who called the Church to embrace humanity and the modern world, to incite the children of God to encounter Christ alive today in the Church.

# Joan Cheetham, Leeds Branch Secretary comments on The 'Teacher' Series Author: Jack Sheffield


This is a set of seven books with another in progress which may be read independently of each other but you will find the main character appearing throughout the series. Jack Sheffield, a former headteacher of two primary schools in North Yorkshire, writes with great humour about day to day life in a small Yorkshire village including the ups and downs of family life as seen through the eyes and ears of local shopkeepers. Many a time the thought crosses the mind, 'out of the mouths of babes and sucklings!' The Assembly starts on 22nd October when you will be met at Lisbon for onward transfer to your hotel. The full package will cost approximately £1250 for double occupancy (single occupancy will carry a surcharge). The price includes Assembly registration fees, accommodation in a first class/4 star hotel for 6 nights, all hotel taxes, breakfast, lunch and dinner daily, sightseeing and all entrance fees (as per itinerary with professional local guides) and arrival and departure transfers for set times throughout the day from/to Lisbon Airport. This does not include airfares. There will be optional extension tours to Fatima, Santarem, Lisbon, Santiago de Compostela, Salamanca but at additional cost. The bookings must be made by 1st May with a deposit and final payments due no later than 25th July. Final documentation will be distributed within 4 weeks of departure provided the full payment has been received by George's International Tours. 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#### **Devon Branch, Okehampton Section**

Okehampton Section is situated in the foothills of Dartmoor Devon in a parish that spans approximately 400 square miles. St Boniface in Okehampton and Holy Family in Chagford are very small and served by one priest. It is not unusual for parishioners to have a round trip of 26 miles or more to attend Mass. St Boniface has a parish hall where our coffee morning was held.

The hall is small. It is the width of a garage and the length of two, but despite its small size and the fact that our congregation is also small, we decided that we would make the CWL National Coffee Morning 2014 a memorable event. What could we do to achieve this? Our coffee mornings, held twice a month, are not well attended - no more than ten regular attendees.

Then the idea came. Competitions. Nothing like this had been done before and it would really make the day different. To involve the whole parish I thought that i) a simple competition for children would be to decorate a paper cup using whatever material they wanted; ii) for the men to bake a Victoria sponge; iii) for everyone, a Prayer For Our Parish.

After first seeking permission from our Parish Priest, Fr Darline, a committed CWL supporter, then putting the ideas to Section at our next meeting, we were off. Enthusiasm was catching and as I had already prepared the congregation via the weekly parish bulletin that the day was going to be something special I spent the weekend before the Annual Officers Meeting at Swanwick in Derbyshire speaking after each Mass in our parish explaining the work of CWL nationally and internationally and giving information of the cake sale, raffle and competitions. This meant I attended 6pm Mass on Saturday evening in Okehampton, 26 miles. On Sunday the 9am Mass in Chagford followed by the 11am Mass in Okehampton 56 miles making a total of 82 miles from my little hamlet. In such a rural parish where the cost of petrol is so high one might question the value of this. However, we all know the importance of the "personal touch" so yes it was worth it. Also, attending the three Masses was wonderful food for the soul. Next job was to find suitable judges for the competitions and write out the schedules for the entry forms. A retired primary school teacher agreed to judge the children's competition. A domestic science teacher would judge the men's and Fr Darline agreed to judge the prayer. What about prizes? Well, Swanwick solved that problem. What could be better than a CWL mug, a very worthy trophy. Along with this we had to organise all our material for the exhibition to show the wonderful work of the League. This, plus arranging tables to house the competition entries, cake sale and raffle! Would there be room for parishioners in our very small hall? Would there be any entries for the competitions? Again yes, except sadly there were no entries from the children. As already stated, we are small and only have a handful of children. We had four entries from the men and four entries for the prayer. To many this might seem a failure but for us

At the end of the day with 55 servings of tea, coffee and squash served we know we will not win the Section prize for the highest number of servings. However, for such a diminutive parish the turnout was great. The atmosphere and enthusiasm shown by

everyone in the hall together with the teamwork from the ladies in our Section meant we really did fulfil the brief put out by the National Executive. Our exhibition showed that CWL does wonderful work nationally and throughout the world. Plus, it has a voice that is listened to in high places and best of all an organisation of which we are proud to be members. The cake sale, raffle and competitions successfully brought a wonderful sense of togetherness within the parish with attendance from both churches and a real possibility that we will get some new members. Was it worth all the effort? You bet it was

I see my role as a little bit like the great British Bake off. Sharing a signature dish, then offering you a technical challenge and then finishing off with a showstopper. So let's start by calling this the Great CWL take off

## So here is the plan - or should I say recipe?

Signature dish - Something we have done before. This time it is our friends at the Medaille Trust. Sadly, they are still in business and still well worth our continuing support. Please look at their website. www.medaille.co.uk. Most importantly, be vigilant. Feel free to check with your local Police force and council to see what priority combating trafficking has and what is happening to those they rescue. Look out for the Modern Slavery Bill which is in Committee stage at the moment. You can read about it on www.parliament.uk

Technical Challenge is Healthwatch. This is where I give you some basics and hopefully you will gather the rest of the information from the internet or locally. Healthwatch is the body that works alongside the Health commissioning groups. They are there to advise the commissioning group and to flag up any issues and concerns that its members may have regarding the services offered in their area. If any of your Sections have concerns about their health service locally, then they need to be in touch with this group. There is a lot to be concerned about, especially care of the elderly and the mental health provision. Please look at www.healthwatch.co.uk and there you can find the Healthwatch group working in your

Show stopper - That's the one that the Bakers want to be remembered for. Big ask then. So my show stopper for you is Loneliness. What I would like to do, is to explore with you the whole issue of loneliness, because it is a Health issue and it certainly affects family life.

My day job is offering admin support to the Age UK Suffolk befriending co-ordinator in Lowestoft, where I live. This service places a volunteer with an elderly person who is now living alone in their own home and for a variety of reasons is isolated and yes, you guessed, Lonely. All that my lovely volunteers do, is go in for one hour a week for a chat and a cuppa. No social or Health care involved. Wow, have I seen the difference it makes!

Loneliness isolates, it brings on stress and related medical conditions. It changes personalities from assertive to passive; from happy to sad. Loneliness embraces you like a Python's coils. Getting tighter and tighter till ??? Just imagine if it was you not seeing anyone but rushed carers or officialdom from day to day. No one to relax with; no one to share with.

If you are housebound, you may be getting a visit from a Priest or a Eucharistic minister who will bring Holy Communion. The Permanent Deacon, in my Parish tells me that he would love to stay longer as he knows some of these lovely folk are lonely but..... So we are looking at providing a Parish based befriending service, Lots to think about and plan including safeguarding. We will also include all age groups because, sadly, loneliness affects all

ages and backgrounds – let's not forget mums at home with small children and on a tight budget; folk from other countries, here for all sorts of reasons, but a long way from home and community; the newly retired or made redundant suddenly facing a whole new way of life and set of rules; carers looking after relatives and being expected to cope. People apart but wanting to be, a part.

I am sure you could add to my list of vulnerable people or groups and I hope that your thought process will start you identifying with these groups and think and more importantly, pray about what you can do in your Section and what your Section can offer your Parish, to help loosen those Python coils constricting the most vulnerable members of our parish communities.

I hope to use the CWL News, our Facebook and Twitter pages and Website as my major means of communication and email for things that need to be brought to your attention straight away. I believe that it is time to raise awareness again of issues that are, or will be, affecting your life and the lives of those around you; be it the family or the bigger picture, your parish family.

So, as they say on Bake off. Ready, steady. Make; make something happen that will turn the lives of so many lonely people into something special and rewarding.

# Refugee Team From Jane Dawson for the Relief and Refugee Team

The Relief and Refugee Team thank members for their generosity once again. Over £10,000 was raised by Sections and Branches last year and £16,550 was awarded to asylum seekers and refugees. The first quarter of 2014 saw £3,650 being awarded to families and individuals.

A big thankyou must go to the Catholic Clothing Guilds of Bristol, Brentwood and Southwark. Many children now have school uniform, thanks to their members. Also to individual members who have supported asylum seekers by offering clothing and bedding. Olton Section and Hall Green Small Section in Birmingham Branch have answered our plea for help in abundance members recently donated bedding, towels and clothing for a young woman in great need and for her expected child a cot, bedding and a pram. The Sections also donated clothing for another lady who had worn the same clothing all year for 6 years. We greatly appreciate their charity.

The majority of our applicants' country of origin is The Congo (65 individuals and families last year). Refugees from this war torn country have topped the list of applicants for the past four years. But recently we have seen 25 applicants from Eritrea, 18 from Nigeria and 17 from the Ivory Coast with 16 having come from Iran. Many of those seeking asylum suffer from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and require intensive treatment.

A Christmas card, sent by the Jesuit Refugee Service, written by Justina from Ghana shows how much your support is appreciated.

"Dear Friends, thank you for your

kindness and support. May God Bless you and reward you in a thousand folds, as you have put a smile on the faces of the less privileged and the needy in society, by your interest and your contributions. I have received so much support from the Jesuit Refugee Service, physically, spiritually and emotionally. May God Bless you and replenish you. Thank you. Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. On behalf of staff, volunteers and refugees, Justina from Ghana"

# Women's World Day of

### Prayer

I would first of all like to say that the Women's World Day of Prayer, Streams in the Desert prepared by the women of Egypt and which we hosted in our Church this year was very well attended as always by the women of different faiths in Great Dunmow. I was volunteered to be Isis, the Ancient Egyptian goddess - no comments

On 6th March, International Women's Day, I attended a seminar at the invitation of The National Council of Women in Portcullis House, Westminster under the heading 'Women in the Commonwealth Today'. The speaker was Ms.Esther Eghobamien (Interim Director and Head of Gender, Social Transformation Programmes Division Commonwealth Secretariat) - a long title but a good speaker. She stated that given a third of all women in the world are members of the Commonwealth it is important we understand some of the challenges and opportunities (or lack of them) women face whether a developed, emerging, or least developing country. Of course this ties in with WUCWO having 5 million members in 66 countries, incorporating 100 Catholic Women's Organizations.

# photo caption Esther Eghobamien Esther started her presentation mentioning the fact that Commonwealth countries have made great progress in empowering women. Yet millions of women and girls still lack access to education, healthcare, justice and economic opportunities. Sustainable development can only be achieved if gender equality and women's rights are secured. We have a long way to go, so we must urgently tap into

the capabilities and intelligence of women in getting there.

Why Women Matter was food for thought during the day and by the end we were reminded that the participation of women is indispensable because of their social, economic and political roles. Women have contributed significantly in peace

processes, preventative diplomacy, capacity

building initiatives, post-conflict reconstruction and peace-building.

Some Commonwealth Milestones also

provided food for thought: the world's first woman Prime Minister came from Sri Lanka in the 1960s, the Africa region ranks high in the number of women in governance and the UK has the highest representation of women in decision-making in the European region.

The majority of gender-based victims of violence are women, girls and children. This manifests itself in physical, psychological,

economic and sexual abuse. Harmful traditional practices include widowhood rites, widow inheritance, widow cleansing, female genital cutting, forced marriage and honour killings and these are particularly widespread in sub-Saharan Africa and Asia. It was so good to hear that many Commonwealth countries have enacted laws and established institutional frameworks to address all violence against women and children.

Esther also spoke of the barriers to women's economic empowerment and the addressing of these barriers to scaling-up women's enterprises. Quote for the day perhaps? "Women need to be Verbs not Nouns" (NCW member)

On 29th March I attended A Day of Information, Reflection and Discussion for Catholic Women on Modern Slavery and Human Trafficking to be led by Sister Patricia Mulhall. Please look out for my report in the next issue on Why is the sale of people a growing business? What are the causes? Who are the victims? Who profits?

Italian Consolata Sister Eugenia Bonetti, a driving force in the fight against trafficking and prostitution, and someone instantly recognisable by CWL members who attended the WUCWO European Conference in Verona, was among the recipients of the European Citizens Prize 2013. This is an award to recognize exceptional achievements of those who facilitate cross-border cooperation. For the past two decades Sr.Eugenia has been the frontline of the Catholic Church's efforts in Italy to combat this trade in human beings and to break the chain of this modern day slavery.

Hungry for change campaign continues until 1st May 2014 Keep encouraging action calling for power to be shared between rich and poor so that everyone has enough to eat. Find resources on http://www.cafod.org.uk/Campaign/Getclued-up/Food

CAFOD has expressed its disappointment after the House of Lords agreed to pass the controversial lobbying bill that will now become law. The government has passed the bill without making many of the changes that hundreds of charities, think tanks and other affected organisations were calling out for. Now that the bill has been passed into law, the new regulations will only capture a fraction of the lobbying industry. That means it is unlikely to contain any significant information about the true scale of lobbying activities. CAFOD's Director of Advocacy, Neil Thorns, said: "CAFOD is extremely disappointed that the government has decided to rush through this inherently flawed bill. Despite huge pressure from the Commission for Civil Society, which includes over a hundred NGOs, in conjunction with CAFOD supporters and other Catholic agencies, the government has created a situation that puts democratic participation at risk."

CAFOD Campaign on Climate Change and Sustainable Energy for all will launch next September 2014 and is a three year campaign. It will be crucial to campaign on

this important issue in the run up to the General Election in May 2015. We will be working closely with the Climate Coalition formally known as the Stop Climate Chaos.

Some pre-launch campaign events will be held: 28th June in Preston, 10th July in London and 12th July in Birmingham. More information from Maria Elena marana@cafod.org.uk

The next climate change big mobilisation will be held immediately after the next General Election sometime in June 2015.

Brazilian environmental activist wins human rights award, and vows to continue her fight for justice. Laísa Sampaio, an environmental activist supported by CAFOD, has been awarded the Human Rights Dorothy Stang award. It is the highest award given by the Brazilian government to those who work tirelessly in defence of justice and human rights. Laísa is a high-profile critic of illegal logging and charcoal burning in her home state of Pará, one of the most violent regions in Brazil. Her sister Maria and brother-in-law José Cláudio were killed in 2011 for campaigning against illegal logging in the Amazon.

CAFOD FAST DAY – Dig Deep: Join us on 14th March

Philippines Appeal: The typhoon that hit the Philippines on 8th November 2013 was one of the most powerful ever to make landfall. It tore apart the lives of more than 14 million people and left at least five million homeless. 

# THE RISE AND RISE OF TEIGNMOUTH SECTION

Dawlish in Devon has been in international headlines with the scene of that dramatic stretch of railway left suspended and unsupported in mid-air after the recent storms.

On 28th February there was another noteworthy event in this pleasant seaside town; the Teignmouth Section of the CWL held their AGM. The Church Hall at St Agatha's was almost full, most of the 40 members attended from Dawlish, Shaldon and Teignmouth with 11 apologies. This represents a remarkable increase in membership from just nineteen two years ago. How do they do it? The members themselves put it down to having two meetings on the same day; older members usually attend in the afternoon and those with work and other commitments (yes there are a good number of young members), come in the evening. The organisation behind this is very slick; prayers are said at each meeting, but minutes are read in full only in the afternoon, with a summary in the evening and access to the full version being to hand. Guest speakers are invited to attend both meetings and have been happy to cooperate. All this is down to the inspirational work of the enthusiastic committee who at the AGM were all re-elected with the exception of the vice chairman who has had to stand down for family reasons. Apart from the reports and elections the main business of the AGM was to change the name of the Section to All Saints Parish (South Devon) Section reflecting that membership is drawn from the three congregations of St Agatha's, Dawlish, St Ignatius, Shaldon and Our Lady and St Patrick, Teignmouth.

But the most inspiring moment of the evening surely was the enthusiastic welcome given to a new recruitment poster in the style of a rap. Dawlish achieved widespread fame for a devastating breakdown in communication when the railway link was severed but this new poster sets a new standard in CWL promotion, getting over in dramatic but realistic terms what the League is all about, and may well inspire a widespread increase in membership just as has been seen in this part of Devon.

Oh, dear lady, or ladies, who make that criticism, don't waste another minute of time, or fraction of energy in critical speech, but come and do something with us!
Come and visit the Catholic Wounded Soldiers, come and make Clothing for the Wounded, come and help our Belgian Mothers to cut out clothes for their babies, come and help us collect Pennies for our Red Cross Hospitals at the Front, come and help us in the many works we are engaged in; and if you only will, we assure you that you will have no time or energy left to criticise our loss of time or lack of energy!

Do you remember Teresa Baldwinson's parachute jump? Here is an update. Teresa writes '... The original idea was to get a village especially for Alzheimer's patients similar to those in Amsterdam and Switzerland where all their needs are specifically addressed. My sponsored jump was to raise both money and awareness of the project. For the money it worked well, raising almost £800 - not bad for a one-off action. For awareness it did less well. To create a village it would need its infrastructure. Unless money were growing on trees, that entails being close to other dwellings and, even so, the cost would still be in millions not hundreds. But I firmly believe, with our mother Mary caring for any work we do for her other children, if God wishes it we will get there somehow. I wrote, first of all, to Mr Shawcross, the Chairman of the Charity Commissioners, explaining the idea and that, research into the disease being both very costly and, in my estimation, of immense importance, I had no wish to take anything from the Alzheimer's Society itself. Therefore I wanted to set up, at first, a small charity, hopefully becoming a registered one. He courteously gave me the name of someone there to help me. I also contacted a gentleman offering a quarter of a million pounds to anyone coming up with a viable idea for a new garden city, asking if it could be applied to a group of people. Again, it could and I was given a contact. The devil, however, may not want this done. My e-mail was hacked, getting through my password and wiping out my work. Patience is not my strongest virtue and it did take an interminable time to get half-way to going again. The idea, though, of a new town almost attached to the village, however, is very appealing. All the people working in the village must be skilled carers for such patients. They need a life of their own, too, if they are to be of good help to their charges. Furthermore, relatives may wish to visit so nearby B&Bs and a campers' park would be helpful. The town, too, if done well can be commercially viable. The village, on the other hand, must be funded by a charity as I have yet to meet a full-time carer able to salt away enough money to pay for their relative's keep in such a place.

I am not asking, here, for your donations although, if you want to, feel free to do so. More than that I need the backing of your prayers. If we have enough people, in odd moments, thinking the prayer Mary taught, through Catherine Labore, and which, lest you forget it, is on the Miraculous Medal she had her engrave, we have her promise that, if it is God's will, it will be hers too. That prayer takes only seconds; the old definition of prayer, "The raising of the mind and the heart to God", takes even less time. When waiting for buses, trains, friends or family members who don't seem able to tell the time accurately, don't get cross just mentally pray for that village, please. And thank you for reading this.

In 1953 Mrs Edna Swan (mother of Sir Conrad Swan, KCVO, Ph.D., FSA) had just returned to England from some 4 years work in the refugee camps of West Germany and Austria. It was in that year that she was elected to be the National President of the Catholic Women's League of England and Wales.

Back from the Indian Army Sir Conrad was up at Cambridge University reading and writing his Ph.D. thesis on "The Introduction

of the Elizabethan Settlement of Religion into the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, with particular reference to Roman Catholics, 1558-1603". A request came from CWL HQ that he should suggest a new Badge for the League. The badge up to then included the Dove of the Holy Spirit along with the helping hands of friendship and achievement, and the wings of speed in getting things done.

getting things done. However, Sir Conrad felt that the current interpretation and presentation of these excellent ideas invited serious consideration. At least, to Sir Conrad, it seemed that the badge was a monument to middle age spread: it was sound, solid, somewhat curvaceous and corpulent hardly a reflection of, let alone an inspiration to ladies doing such estimable work. He designed in order to incorporate the symbolic elements of the original badge and give a radically new and fresh interpretation. The original elements were made to form the very outline of the design and emphasize the inspiration and work of the league - placing the well-known declamatory initials, CWL as the central, cohesive element. Some years later Sir Conrad Swan was invited to become a member of the Royal Household in the department known as the College of Arms and progressed to being its head as Garter Principal King of Arms.

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

# Hospital Visiting

further information from Aylesbury Section, Northampton Branch

Following on from a suggestion made at the National AGM at Scarborough our Chairman Mrs Marion Payne had a meeting with our Section Chaplain Father John Beirne regarding setting up a scheme to help relatives of long term patients in hospital by meeting them for a cup of coffee and a chat and Marion and her husband David would also offer emergency overnight accommodation at a minimal cost. Our local hospital is Stoke Mandeville and we intended covering the whole hospital but felt that the Spinal Unit would benefit most, as patients and their families come from all over the world for this excellent facility. Father John approved and a meeting was arranged with the Stoke Mandeville Hospital Chaplain who thought it a reasonable idea but asked for bullet points to be sent for the approval of the NHS Trust. We sent the following:

Subject - Relatives Support

- 1. To offer a friendly face and a listening ear to relatives of patients with long term illness/disability who find themselves a long way from home.
- To advertise this service, we propose to place posters and/or leaflets around the hospital with a possible mention in the hospital magazine.
- 3. It will be organised and run by the Catholic Women's League in Aylesbury.
- 4. Non-denominational.
- 5. Contact number available from the advert.
- 6. Meeting relatives away from hospital premises.
- 7. CRB check a requirement?
- 8. Emergency accommodation available. This service could be recommended via the Chaplaincy or other appropriate department to ensure it is not abused. A small fee would be arranged to cover costs.
- 9. Supported by our Section Chaplain.

We have just heard from the Hospital Chaplain and it seems we would not be allowed to advertise in the hospital and they seemed to think we would not be able to obtain a CRB check. They also said they would like us to attend a two year Bereavement Course. Our Chairman brought this up at our Section AGM yesterday and the members agreed with her that this was not a viable proposition. Our Section Chaplain has agreed to meet and it is possible we will advertise on our Deanery Website.

BBC interest in the Wayside Crucifix at Ripon

It would seem that the site of the CWL's memorial at Ripon was of real interest to BBC Glasgow Gaelic when, as part of a series of three half hour TV programmes about the contrasting fortunes of two soldiers of the First World War, were being researched. One was Private John MacDonald who was stationed at the Ripon Army Training Camp, in Yorkshire, in June and July, 1916 and was killed at Arras, in April, 1917, and the other, Captain John Livingstone Stewart, who, though wounded in the War, survived to lead a successful and fulfilling life.

Councillor Derrick Slater, of Fountains Parish Council, informed them that the memorial near Studley Roger, to the soldiers who were at the Ripon camp during the Great War, is in the care of the Catholic Women's League and the Leeds Diocesan Branch and so our permission was given for them to film a short sequence with their contributor, Emeritus Professor Donald E. Meek a native of Tiree, "which is the most westerly island of the Inner Hebrides. He is one of the outstanding Gaelic scholars of his and indeed any generation. During his glittering career at Glasgow, Aberdeen, and Edinburgh Universities, he has written many outstanding books in the field of Gaelic and Highland history – seen from the inside."


Those members at the AGM in Scarborough last October will recall the wonderful presentation made by Bernie Townsend, Chair of the Services Committee, giving details of the" Mother Hut" erected just outside Ripon in North Yorkshire. The Northern and Southern Command depots were built for the volunteers and draftees for basic training as well as for medical rehabilitation after treatment in the Army Hospital which was situated half a mile away in what is now known as Hospital Wood. The Wayside Crucifix was erected on its granite plinth in 1921, even as the hut was being dismantled. The service of blessing and dedication was led possibly by the Catholic Bishop of Leeds at that time Joseph Robert Cowgill.

Every year on the Thursday before 1st July members of CWL's Northern Branches, together with representatives from the Executive and clergy, hold a short memorial service at the site, followed by Mass in St. Wilfrid's Catholic Church in Ripon, to remember the fallen dead of both World Wars. This year it will be held on 26th June and Bishop Richard Moth, Roman Catholic Bishop in Ordinary to the Forces, will be the celebrant and we will also welcome our National President, Mrs Elizabeth Upsher.

From 16th - 21st June Leeds Branch will mount an exhibition illustrating the history of the CWL memorial, in the glass fronted foyer of the Anglican Church, St. Peter's which fronts onto the pedestrianized shopping area in the heart of Harrogate. The local paper, the Harrogate Advertiser is also seeking anyone who has a story to tell of the Great War to contact them, and since they also publish and print the Ripon Gazette, it is probable that many readers who have never heard of the Crucifix or know its story will be able to appreciate this singular local history and the memories of the 57, 000 men who died on the first day of the Battle of the Somme-1st July 1916. R.I.P.
