Spurred on by such inspirational aids as David Attenborough's TV programme 'Blue Planet,' our group produced several bags to sell at the parish hog roast on 1 July. They all sold, and commissions were taken for more. It endorsed our new slogan 'The Earth Matters To Me,'an initiative to help reduce the use of plastic.

#### A Knight in Jail for Catholic Fraternal Service Organisation Head

OUPREME KNIGHT of the Knights of St Columba, Brother Bertie Grogan, visited HM Prison Ford near Arundel recently, to deliver 200 prayer books for inmates' use. Mass celebrated by Fr Stanislaw Mycek of Bognor Parish was followed by everyone meeting together for a light lunch and an opportunity for socialising in the chapel's common room.

The visit followed a request for Catholic books and material from the Prison Chaplain Valentine Ambé.

The Supreme Knight was joined by Trevor Stauss PGK of Arundel & Brighton Province. Trevor had previously responded to the request from KSC Head Office to collect Catholic books, rosaries etc for the use of prisoners. His fellow parishioners at Our Lady of England, Storrington, provided a great response to his request. Inmates, who are generally in the last two years of their sentence,



were very pleased by the visits and with the wealth of material provided. Plans are in hand for local KSC Councils to purchase annual subscriptions for copies of the monthly publication Magnificat, for prisoners' daily use.

#### What! - Yet Another Ride for Charity, Les? WELL DONE!

HAVING SAID TO A&B NEWS at the end of his last bike ride that he would never, never get on the saddle again, Les Whittaker - parishioner of Our Lady & St Peter's Church, East Grinstead - has been at it again! This time he completed a bike ride of almost 400 miles in July, raising money to support the pro-life work of the Good Counsel Network. Les cycled from the East Grinstead memorial to Unborn Children to Walsingham and back. He undertook to pray 150 rosaries on his pilgrimage and also carried 50 rosaries to Walsingham, which he donated to the shrine to be used by the prison visiting team.

This journey took him three and a half days to get to his destination, walking the last six miles from Fakenham to allow more time to complete the rosaries. Arriving at Sunday lunchtime at the Catholic Shrine, a Syro-Malabar pilgrimage was in full swing.



The ride coincided with the 70th anniversary of the cross-carrying pilgrimage to Walsingham, which Les particularly wanted to remember.

'I wanted to mark this anniversary, especially as one of the crosses had been carried from my parish church' he recalled.

Les camped en-route and at nearby Wells during his three-day stay at Walsingham. He was away from home for 10 days, meeting all costs relating to the trip himself in order to maximise the money raised for the pro-life cause. He hopes to raise \$5,000



### St Cuthman's - The Final Chapter

NOT MANY READERS would know Alison Day (pictured below). However, at the final Celebration Mass at St Cuthman's, Alison represented St Julian's Community – the community which bequeathed the retreat and estate to the Diocese back in 1999. 'Yes, for me this is a sad day. But we do need to thank God for all the good that this place has achieved, for a very wide range of people and over many years. However, I hope St Cuthman's will continue in its mission, albeit under different ownership', reflected Alison.

The evening sun shone brightly on Monday 2 July, with over 100 people gathered to join in a Mass celebrated by Bishop Richard and a number of Diocesan priests. In his homily, he praised the



management team for the work and dedication that had gone into making this a truly special place for many thousands of pilgrims and visitors over the past 19

Bishop Richard went on to say 'The Trustees' decision not to continue with St Cuthman's has been a painful one and one which has involved a great deal of prayer and deliberation. Although this will be the last time we meet here, I am convinced that this will not be the end of the mission which started at St Cuthman's. We are on a journey with the Diocese and many people involved here will go on to be part of that

journey. I am convinced of that.'

Sitting under the marquee for Mass lent some significance to the occasion. We were in God's garden, proclaiming our faith. The marquee sides were up to allow the breeze to cool the congregation.

Towards the end of Mass, one of the two altar candles blew out. But the other one stayed alight. Perhaps this was a sign that Bishop Richard's conviction was right. Did the candle which blew out signify the end of an era? Or did the one which shone brightly reveal a sign that the work of St Cuthman's would carry on, in some fashion, in the future of the Diocese?

The Diocese was blessed to have been guardian of this place for so many years.

## The Alpha Course - a New Beginning

OME FELLOW PARISHIONERS were a little concerned for my spiritual welfare, now that I had agreed to help run the first Alpha Course at Sacred Heart in Hove...'You might end up a happy-clappy...Alpha is a Protestant course isn't it?

The idea for the course came from a group of parishioners who attended last year's charismatic Celebrate Conference in Brighton and, led by an energised Art Gallagher, felt inspired by the Holy Spirit to share the joy of church through a mission in their own parish of Sacred

Recently-arrived parish priest Canon Colin Wolczak was very supportive, the only mild concern being that the newlyformed mission team was drawn largely from the 9.30am Sunday Mass. In an effort to balance representation on the team, I was invited to join to represent the Saturday Vigil Mass.

#### The Alpha Course

This I was happy to do. I knew a bit about the Alpha Course; it was founded in 1977 at Holy Trinity Brompton Anglican Church in London but was developed into its present form in 1990 reaching out to the unchurched - by an Anglican priest called Nicky Gumbel, who belongs to the evangelical and charismatic traditions.

Phenomenally successful in recruiting new members, the Alpha course has been run in over 100 countries worldwide with well over one million Britons having attended. Although developed from the evangelical part of Christianity, the course is now tailored for a variety of denominations, including Lutheran, Methodist, Eastern Orthodox and Roman Catholic.

I had read Fr James Mallon's book on Divine Renovation, where he praises the contribution of Alpha Courses as a key tool in helping him enable the transformation of his parish. Over 2,000 people have been on his Alpha Courses, twothirds of them church-going Catholics, and 50% of attendees have had a lifechanging experience, with lukewarm Catholics awakened in the faith.

#### Organising Alpha

At Sacred Heart, a decision was made to offer the course to existing parishioners, to build a nucleus of stimulated members to help the team's move on to the next stage of its mission.

The Alpha Course took place over nine weeks, on a Thursday evening from 7-9pm in the Parish Room. There were around 50 participants (including 35 parishioner attendees and 15 parishioner 'trainers') so we set up seven round tables, each holding seven people; five attendees from the parish, an experienced 'host' and a 'helper'.

The evening then followed a typical Alpha Course routine, starting with drinks and chat, a hot meal, and then we settled down to watch a video each evening, followed by around 45 minutes of discussion.

#### The Alpha Videos

The videos were excellent, highly professional, beautifully filmed, and featuring the highly telegenic Nicky Gumbel and two equally photogenic, active and enthusiastic young presenters - who were filmed in the UK, Asia and the Americas.

More importantly, the videos (with subtitles for the hard of hearing) asked fundamental questions about the basis of belief, the reasons to believe, the Holy Spirit, the place of Church, while simultaneously offering a variety of compelling testimonies. Fr Raniero Cantalamessa, long-time Preacher to the Papal Household, made several appearances and there were cameo contributions from Cardinal Christoph Schonborn...and Pope Francis; almost a digital Imprimatur.

Our discussions were rich, open and engaging. Two thirds of the way through we had a retreat day, a Saturday at a local school, when we watched four videos, talked, ate, listened to John Watts and companion play and sing various worship songs...and we prayed together for the blessing and healing of the Holy Spirit.

It is a measure of the success of the Course that we ended it with almost the same number of participants who started it - and the final evening concluded with spontaneous applause.

The Celebrate Conference

Just two days later the charismatic Brighton Celebrate Conference was due to take place and Art made sure everyone knew it. He asked me to attend, assuring me I would enjoy it.

Well, the Alpha Course was clearly an excellent tool for evangelisation but weren't Charismatics ...a little ...well, different? I was ready to be happy but, being almost tone-deaf, was not sure I was cut out for clapping, certainly not rhythmic clapping. But by now, I had confidence in Art's judgement, so I bought a ticket for the weekend, not without some misgivings.

#### Syro-Malabar Rites in Merstham, Surrey

THE SYRO-MALABAR Catholic Mission of St. Clare became established at St. Teresa's Church, Merstham, in the Parish of The Nativity of the Lord. A Solemn Mass for a joint feast of seven saints - Our Lady, St Joseph, St Thomas the Apostle, St Mother Theresa of Calcutta, St Alphonsa, St Kuriakose Elias, and St Euphrasia - was celebrated on Saturday 7 July. The latter three saints are from Kerala, India, and lived in the 19th and 20th century.

Mar Joseph Srampickal, Bishop of the Syro-Malabar Eparchy of Great Britain was the main celebrant, with co-celebrants Fr Binoy (priest in charge of St Claire Mission) and Fr Fanzwa. The occasion was also blessed with the presence of Fr Tony Bridson and Deacon Tim Murrrill from the Parish of the Nativity of the Lord, Redhill. Holy Mass was followed by litany, procession and celebration afterwards with food and a cultural programme.

In the homily, Bishop Mar Joseph reminded the congregation to deepen their faith and to trust in God. He urged them not to imitate saints but to seek inspira-

tion from their lives and to find one's own unique calling that God has designed for them and to seek God's plan about the individual. He also reminded the people the importance of Holy Mass and sacraments in Christian life to deepen faith and intimacy with God where 'deep calls unto deep'.

The Holy Qurbana (Sacrifice) Liturgy on the day included various prayers, psalms, hymns, songs and rituals that are very much an integral part of the orien-

tal tradition of the Syro-Malabar church.

Following the Mass there was an outdoor procession (left), during which the litany of all saints and Our Lady was sung. It was a feast to the eyes with the vibrant umbrellas, flags and people and children clad in traditional costume. It truly was a celebration of the Indian culture.

This occasion of feast celebration by the community was an

illustration of the heritage of the Syro-Malabar Catholic Church, which is 'Christian in faith, Oriental in worship, Indian in culture'.

## Using Technology as a Tool in Ministry

WHAT GOES THROUGH YOUR MIND when you see someone tapping away on their phone or tablet during Mass? Do you feel indifferent, angry, upset or even horror? Do you suddenly panic that perhaps you have left your phone on and it will ring in the middle of Liturgy? These are genuine feelings that some Church-goers have experienced at one time or another, but it's time to challenge our perception about the use of devices in Church. We need to think about how we can embrace advances in technology and use it to our advantage to enhance our Mass experience and Ministry in Church. This is particularly essential for those who rely on technology due to disability or special needs.

Bastian is a 10 year old boy with Phelan-McDermid Syndrome – a rare chromosomal abnormality that affects every aspect of his life. He has mobility difficulties and sometimes requires use of a wheelchair. He has severe learning and behaviour difficulties. He is also completely non-verbal. Sitting through Mass is one of the hardest challenges for him and in turn proves to be a constant challenge for his parents. He uses a very clever app on his tablet to communicate with others. This method of 'speaking' is called Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC). It's

a term used to describe various methods of communication that can 'add-on' to speech or replace speech and are used to get around problems with ordinary speech. In Bastian's case he uses it alongside Makaton sign language and Picture Exchange Card System (PECS).

For example, Bastian could use the app to join in with 'singing' Hymns, 'saying' Amen and of course he also needs to use the app to ask for his basic needs to be met such as using the bathroom or wanting a drink. He can also use his tablet to follow the Mass using simple picture cards in a story that explains what is happening next. This helps Bastian feel in control and gives some reassurance to him when he finds it difficult to understand what is going on around him.

There are some incredible apps now available to enhance faith and prayer time. Fully comprehensive apps feature all the popular versions of The Bible including King James Version and New International Version, available in 40+ languages, and are customisable and many are free to use. The Verse of the Day is particularly useful. Also www.life.church/tools is the Bible App for Kids. This app uses kid-friendly navigation, touch activated animations and engaging, interactive content that brings the Bible to life. It's a game-style




app which is appealing to children. They can 'unlock' activities and earn 'rewards'. A very useful book

available electronically from Amazon, also for Kindles, is

the Celebrating Sunday For Catholic Families series by Kerstin Keber Smith. This is published each year and is the perfect resource for those looking to enrich their family's life of faith. The book is designed to guide even the busiest families to more fully integrate the Sunday Gospel into their everyday lives. It includes a small weekly guide drawing on the Gospel for each Sunday and Holyday for the coming year. It suggests a brief reflection for the parent on an excerpt from the Gospel to spark his or her thinking about the Scripture that will lead to conversation with the family on the way to and from Mass.

There are dozens of other apps which will guide you through the Order Of Mass, allow you to take notes during Mass and even to translate Mass into another language - which is particularly useful if you attend Mass whilst on holiday abroad. You will also find apps of the Missal, the Rosary and Stations of the Cross. It's not just people with hearing difficulties or sight diffi-



culties who might like to follow the Mass on their devices, technology enables all members of the congregation to enhance their discipleship experience at Church.

Technology has the power to bring people together. Whether you're the Priest, Minister or a member of the congregation, let's make the Church more tech-savvy and connect with even more people. So next time you see a fellow member of the congregation using their phone or tablet during Mass, remember they might be accessing the Mass in a different way but are no less engaged.

#### Fr Tristan Cranfield Ordained at Arundel (cont.)

OTHER GUESTS included Michael Whale and family (brother of the late Provost Whale, whose chalice was presented to Fr Tristan during the service), and Mrs Anne-Marie Brown, who made Fr Tristan's chasuble for the occasion.

Bishop Richard was also joined by over 60 priests who welcomed Tristan as a brother priest.

Father Tristan, as he can now be called, was born in Shoreham-by-Sea and raised in and around Arundel. He attended St Philip Howard's Catholic Primary School in Arundel, before moving to St Philip Howard Catholic School in Barnham.

His parents, Michael and Lorraine, still live in the Arundel area, where they have been heavily involved in the life of the Cathedral in many different aspects. They are

now retired, but remain familiar faces in the town.

Tristan was baptised as a baby by the then parish priest, Canon Anthony Whale (RIP), in Arundel Cathedral. He became an altar server at Mass in the Cathedral, and at the age of ten joined the then newly founded children's section of the choir, where he learnt to sing, to play the organ and indeed to pray. His involvement in the liturgical life of the Cathedral undoubtedly played a big part in nourishing his faith in the

Lord.

After completing his school studies, he deepened his passion for languages, reading Arabic and French at St John's College, Oxford. The call to the priesthood remained persistent in Tris-

tan's life, shaped by his experiences of the Church around the world, by his time in London and by regular participation in the Arundel & Brighton diocesan pilgrimage to Lourdes. A final awakening to this call came at the Grotto in Lourdes which encouraged him to approach the diocese about priesthood.

Following the usual selection process, he was sent by Bishop Kieran Conry to the Venerable English College in Rome. There his philosophical and theological studies (at both the Angelicum and Gregorian universities respectively) culminated in a Licence (Masters equivalent degree) in the teachings of St Thomas Aquinas. He was ordained to the diaconate by Bishop Terrence Drainey in July 2017 in

Rome. In his homily, Bishop Richard reminded Fr Tristan that the priesthood is a gift, it is the ability to share in Christ's own priesthood, and it is given for one purpose – to serve Christ and His people. He added 'Tristan, to be the person God wants you to be, you must be a priest. This will give you a completeness.'

Fr Tristan now begins the next stage of his life as priest in a parish saying Mass, visiting the sick, working with young people, celebrating funerals and baptisms, visiting local schools and much more. Fr Tristan said: 'I do not feel worthy to have been ordained a priest, but I know that the Lord Jesus will be with me always in His love, to carry out His work in the Church.'

He continued, 'The ordination Mass was deeply moving for me, a moment of great joy, and I'm excited to begin my ministry, looking forward to serving the people of Arundel & Brighton for the rest of my life.'



## **PASTORAL LETTER**

#### for the Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, 15th July 2018

 $\mathbf{D}_{ ext{CHRIST},}^{ ext{EAR BROTHERS AND SISTERS IN}}$ 

Today's Readings provide us with wonderful insights into the mystery of God's purpose for us. I invite you, both today and in the months ahead, to join me in reflecting on the mystery of the Father's love as we look to the future of our Diocese.

The Second Reading, the 'hymn of praise' from the beginning of St. Paul's letter to the Ephesians, sums up for us the wonder of our very existence. We are brought together in Christ, through whom we are forgiven of our sins and in whom we find freedom. All that we are is for the greater glory of God. There is a real excitement in St. Paul's words as he celebrates the fact that we believe and accept the message of Salvation and, in the Holy Spirit who dwells within us, find the freedom that comes from Christ.

This is a joy so deep that it can be difficult to put into words. As the "message of Christ finds a home in us" we are enabled to find life in its truest sense – a life built on Christ and lived entirely in Him. This life transforms us, our homes, our parishes and our places of work. It is "life to the full" – the destiny that Jesus tells us is ours and is the reason for His saving work.

This way of being is so wonderful – how could any of us turn away from it or reject its possibilities? How could any of us wish not to share that life with others? All of us must share in this Mission of bringing others to know Christ and the life He gives.

St. Paul's sense of joy is to be lived out with purpose. We see this purpose as Jesus sends out the twelve. They travel light. There is a real sense of movement in the words of today's Gospel and we are caught up in the journey. We too, as individuals, as families, as parishes, as Diocese, are sent out by the Lord Himself to do a work so vital for our world that we dare not shrink



from it.

Yet, like Amos in today's first reading, we may well not feel ready. God's choice of Amos was a surprise to him and to the people, for he was not from a family of prophets. God called him to a new task in new places. Amos could not refuse and God provides the words that he would say.

So it is with us. The call of Jesus in His Gospel is for every one of us. His Real Presence in the Eucharist calls us to Him, to receive His Life, to adore Him and to share His life with others. We "come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled Himself to share in our humanity." The Sacraments and our lives of prayer enable us to become more and more like Him. The relationship is real. It is lived.

Just as Jesus spent time with His disciples, teaching them and forming them, so He calls us to be taught and formed by Him. In this way, we become His people. Then, with real purpose we become effective witnesses.

In recent months, in parishes and deaneries, we have been considering the future life of the Diocese and this Mission to which we are called. In the Autumn, the Pastoral Plan for the Diocese will be presented in each Deanery. This is an important moment in the life of us all. Pray for our Diocese, that this work may be truly blessed.

I ask you today to reflect on the Scriptures that we have heard proclaimed for us. The sense of joy and wonder; the way in which God works in us, despite our frailties; the sense of real purpose in the lives of the disciples. Pray that this message will find a home in each one of us and in the whole family of our Diocese, that we truly be the people the Lord calls us to be: His disciples, His friends, His witnesses.

## Pontifical Vespers on a Peerless Summer Evening

N A PEERLESS SUMMER EVENING Bishop Richard Moth welcomed nearly 100 people to a special celebration of pontifical vespers. The Lord Lieutenant of West Sussex, Mrs Susan Pyper, was in attendance with Her Grace, the Duchess of Norfolk, who read the first lesson. The Cathedral choir, led by Elizabeth Stratford, was in glorious form adding an extra sense of spirituality to the occasion. With the sun streaming in through the West window little wonder that the congregation was clearly moved by the solemnity and beauty of the Service.

The Bishop took as his theme for his homily the Lord's two great commandments: to love God above all others, and to love your neighbour as yourself.

The second was dependent on the first. If God was given that primacy all other things would follow. It was the feast day of St Henry, Emperor of Bavaria in the 11th century, and the Bishop took the opportunity to explore some of the tensions that exist between

the provision of beautiful settings for worship and the value of direct giving to those in need. Henry was distinguished by his commitment to the Church, building churches throughout the land, arguing that nothing was more important than the worship of God.

The Bishop acknowledged that, while this is an ethical dilemma for every generation, the history of the church has many lessons for today. Through worship Christ will be seen in the otherwhether our neighbour, refugees, the poor, or the vulnerable.

Organised by the Friends of the Cathedral\*, and by kind permission of their Patron his Grace the Duke of Norfolk, the service was followed by a champagne reception in the Collector Earl's Garden, where in the warm late summer sunshine guests were able to mingle and wander round if they wished. Notwithstanding the dry weather the gardens were resplendent and for those wishing to learn more there was a guided tour. The provision of canapes, and a gentle

jazz trio made for a truly memorable evening.

However before doing so we were fed again, not with bread and fish, but burgers and hot dogs for which, unlike the gospel crowds, we had to queue. The scouts ran the BBQ generating a cloud of unholy smoke; others brought a variety of food to share. Unlike the folks from Galilee there was musical entertainment and Zuma, plus lots of fun for the children in the form of games, bouncy castle, face painting, simple crafts.

Any leftovers, together with rubbish, went not into baskets, but black sacks and the number was not counted!
