
#### Sensory Walk

Outside there was a beautiful Sensory Walk where we could reflect on Scripture by using our senses. It was really powerful to focus on each sense through the use of stones, water, fabrics, shells, sticks and lavender.

#### Four Workshops

There were also four workshops for people to choose which workshops they wanted to attend.

One of the four was led by our *Diocesan* Hand in Hand group where they explored Scripture through thoughtful drama and *movement*. Many people enjoyed this reflective and active opportunity to reflect on Scripture.



The Catholic Bible School provided an opportunity to explore a Sensory Prayer Room where we could reflect and pray using our different senses and record our prayers and thoughts in a variety of creative and

explorative ways. Our Diocesan Deaf Community provided an opportunity to learn some basic BSL (British Sign Language) through learning to sign some of the Mass responses and the Our Father.

The fourth workshop focused on *Lectio Divina* where there was the opportunity to reflect on the Readings that would be proclaimed in the Mass. (continued on Page 5)

# **Marriage:** The Impact of Love

UR ANNUAL CELEBRATION OF MARRIAGE was held at Redhill on 6 October and the couples present between them celebrated over 2,407 years of marriage. We welcomed over 50 couples for whom this particular year was important, whether that was 70. 17 or 3 years of marriage.

Reflecting on the first reading from Tobit, Bishop Richard reminded us that by being at this celebration we were echoing Tobit's desire to give his thanksgiving to God. Our married lives are transformed by God's grace as we move from those initial feelings of desire for the other, to a desire to give ourselves for the benefit of the other. This lack of selfishness is one of the important marks of Christian marriage.

The Bishop reminded us that even through the ups and downs of life, Christ is always with us, within our marriage. He commented that we were only present today because we had been open to the

fact that, despite the 'bumpy' bits, the love of Christ has been central to our married life.

He concluded by drawing our attention to the fact that we have lived this vocation and have been a witness to others; that through us they have seen something of the love of God: 'You are *His instruments,* never forget that. You might never know how your love for each other has impacted upon other people'. (cont. Page 4)

# **Impressive Epsom** Interviews

ATENIANS FROM EPSOM CIRCLE this summer sup-Jported their local Catholic Secondary School, St Andrew's, Leatherhead, with two initiatives aimed at giving students vital experience of being in interview situations. All Year 10 pupils (14/15 years of age) were interviewed for a job of their choice, having submitted a letter of application and a CV. Eight Epsom Catenians, along with a number of parents, conducted the short interviews accompanied by a teacher. This was followed by feedback to the students.

Later in the summer term, six Epsom Catenians were involved when all Year 12 students (16/17 years of age) gave individual five-minute presentations followed by a question and answer session and individual feedback.

This was the first time that these initiatives have taken place with Headteacher Alan Mitchell and Staff members Keith Warbis, Hannah McLaughlin and Adam Brooks very efficiently and thoroughly organising the two events.

Feedback from both the school and Catenians was very positive. 'Our students had a great experience. Hopefully we can grow this partnership and make sure that all future St Andrew's students get the same learning opportunity,' said Alan Mitchell, the Headteacher.

Epsom Catenian, solicitor Alvin David said: 'It was a pleasure interviewing the students. They were very impressive and the quality of their responses was very good.'

Teddy Totman from Epsom Circle commented that the students did not shy away from difficult topics. 'All presentations were well researched and argued and delivered with confidence. Two, in particular, on difficult subjects euthanasia and using live animals for testing - were very balanced considerations of the issues. The student who presented on elocution exhibited particular confidence and used imaginative props," he said.

# **Cyclists Conquer the Camino**

WO CATENIANS have together cycled over 1000 miles from Le Puy en Velay in France to Santiago de Compostela in Northern Spain, known as the way of St James, or the Camino trail, to raise funds for the Nomntu Project, a charity providing aid to people in the Eastern Cape, Africa's poorest region.

Brother Chris Devereux from Guildford Circle and Brother Gordon Clifford from Epsom Circle (pictured right) covered an average 60 miles a day - the equivalent of a London to Brighton ride daily.

They left Le Puy on 15 May and arrived in Santiago on 31 May. Their ride was entirely unsupported and self-funded. Each of them carried over 25kg of luggage on their bike. Gordon did the ride to mark his retirement from the Metropolitan Police while for Chris, at 71, this was the second time he has done the ride having last done it 16 years ago. Amazingly, this time he shaved five days off his time.

Having completed the Camino de Santiago. Chris and Gordon went to Mass in the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela, where they were joined by Gordon's wife, Elaine.

The high point - literally - was the Cross of Iron in Spain, marking the summit on the Spanish side of the Camino, at about 1,500m. In total they climbed the equivalent of Everest with over 8,800m of climbing on the bikes.

Speaking about his experience, Gordon said: 'I found the experience life-changing. We met fantastic people and saw some amazing things, not least an eagle trying to catch a small deer on the Mesita plain about 50 metres from where we were cycling, and attending the pilgrim prayers in the 12th Century chapel at Rabanelles, which was a very spiritual experi-



ence. They say the Camino looks after you and I really felt this was the case.

Chris echoed these thoughts: 'A wonderful yet challenging experience, I am so grateful that I have been able to ride the Camino Trail to Santiago again.'

While they were away, Gordon's home Circle in Epsom were also busy raising funds for Nomntu, which is Epsom President David Walsh's chosen charity this year. Chris and his wife, Jane, run the Nomntu Project which provides educational, social and practical support to those suffering from poverty, abuse, and HIV/AIDS in small communities in the Eastern Cape.

### **SVP Works with Asylum Seekers**

 $S^{\rm VP\ ACTIVITIES\ over\ the\ last\ year\ include\ significant\ developments\ on\ the\ 'City\ of\ Sanctuary'\ pro$ ject and an increase in the number of families on the Svrian Vulnerable Families Resettlement scheme.

An increased demand for emergency food has also been seen along with the extension of the 'Buddy' scheme to those families on the government's Syrian Vulnerable Families Resettlement Scheme.

Trafficking is on the increase, especially amongst young women from Albania entering the system within the last two years.

Although lower total numbers of asylum seekers are now entering the UK, there is an accumulation of applicants who have received negative decisions and, as a result, have been in the country for a number of years without a positive outcome.

Providing food and emergency aid and trying to help them back into the asylum process is taking up an increasing amount of SVP time.



Destitution amongst failed asylum seekers is now a major problem and is due largely to an accumulation of failed applicants who have been left lingering outside

the system and with no recourse to public funds. Understandably, the vast majority are opting not to take voluntary repatriation. Not only has this resulted in high levels of destitution, those still in the National Asylum Support Service system frequently suffer from chronic mental health problems.

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# **Skydive Fundraising Target Smashed**

DIFFICULT DECISIONS come all that sweeter when hopes are exceeded. That was very much so for Bishop Richard's and Lucy Barnes' charity skydive for the Diocesan Lourdes Pilgrim-

To date, the event has raised £9,500 –a figure over six times higher than first thought.



When the fund raising campaign started last June, a modest target was set to raise sufficient funds to send one disabled person and a carer to Lourdes who might, otherwise, not have experienced the unique power of that place.

Now the skydive has been successfully completed, it is wonderful to be able to announce that this aspiration has been well and truly exceeded - current funds raised would indicate that the Pilgrimage can now send twelve people; six pilgrims with disabilities and their carers. Lucy has the final word: 'The discom-

fort is a distant memory - replaced by a huge feeling of support!' As the A&B News goes to press, dona-tions are still coming in.

ON SUNDAY 16 SEPTEMBER 2018, we held an open day at St Mary's church. Our church is open to all, every day, until late afternoon and we have welcomers at every weekend Mass. So you might well ask, why do we need to hold an open day?

The Need for a Welcome We might think that our church is welcoming to all but perhaps think about how vou would feel walking into a Jehovah's Witness Kingdom Hall or a local mosque without an invitation or someone to show you around?

I would certainly be slightly apprehensive and a bit worried that I might disturb someone praying or do something 'wrong' Even going to another catholic church for the first time isn't always a welcoming experience.

There are lots of people who walk past our church and may have questions about Catholicism or be interested in coming in but perhaps have never felt brave enough to do so. Going to Mass for the first time can be a confusing experience if you don't know what is going on.

We have held such open days a couple of times before in the past five years and had about half a dozen people turning up each time, ranging from people living across the road from the church, who were delighted to meet their neighbour (Fr Kevin Griffin), to parents of Reception Class children at our neighbouring St Mary's Primary School, to a United Reform Minister.

Promoting the Open Day This year, we printed A1 posters which we displayed outside the church (see above, right), put listings in the local newspaper, free neighbourhood magazines and the school newsletter. Flyers were handed out after Mass inviting parishioners to bring a friend and two

cluding a Catholic family who had moved to the area a couple of years ago but had never come in before, an Anglican priest, an evangelical Christian family and a couple of parishioners bringing friends.

The numbers were not great but those who came enjoyed their guided tours. We showed them around the church, giving some history of the building and an explanation of how it links to our beliefs. Genuflecting in front of the tabernacle and blessing oneself with holy water created much interest and discussion, while seeing inside a confessional for the first time was fascinating for many. The hospitality of cakes and tea was appreciated and allowed for longer chats.

As a result of the open day, the local population can see that the church is open and welcoming and we have since had one request for infant baptism and an adult enquirer showing interest in our faith. We would highly recommend that other parishes should consider trying it.

# **Annual Diocesan Grandparents' Formation Day**

A&B GRANDPARENTS FORMATION DAY took place in Horsham on 4 October. It was a wonderful meeting of grandparents from around the diocese who were looking forward to exploring ways in which they might 'pass on the faith' to their grandchildren.

The day began with Mass with Bishop Richard at St John the Evangelist church in the centre of Horsham town. We then all gathered in the Parish hall for coffee and biscuits before the talks began.

We were blessed to be addressed by Bishop Richard whose talk was inspirational and reassuring. He spoke wisely about the struggles we face in being a committed Christian and reminded us that Christ didn't say it was going to be easy.

He focused particularly on the tendency some people have to blame themselves for a failure to transmit their faith, and reminded us that all God wants is for us to do our best. He encouraged us to reflect on our own decision to choose to follow Jesus and encouraged us to allow our grandchildren to make their own choice.

He commented on the end of St John's gospel where Jesus allows those who don't want to follow Him to leave yet he still holds them in His love. As grandparents, continuing to love and show an example is often all we can do, however we may never know the impact that prayer and witness will have. Continuing to follow Jesus is the greatest example we can give.

Christine Evans, who leads the Grandparents Groups in the diocese with her husband Mike, then gave a wonderful reflection on the reality of being a Catholic grandparent today. With amusing anecdotes, she demonstrated how children pick up

on the smallest of things and can learn so much from our actions alone. She also spoke powerfully about the amazing unconditional love a child has for their grandparents and how we must trust in God, reminding us to 'Let Go, Let God'.

Following our picnic lunch, Lucy Hall, Education Officer from Wintershall, gave an inspiring talk about the resources you can use to engage children in talking about faith and their relationship with God. She demonstrated the actions that a toddler could use to sign 'Please, Thank you and Sorry', the Pope's favourite three words for the family, and showed us a variety of ways we could support young children in Mass, including making 'busy bags'.

Lucy talked about the impact of biblical drama on children and encouraged us to bring our families to The Nativity play at Wintershall this December instead of taking them to the Panto. 'If we want our grandchildren to love Jesus like we do, they need to know the story.'

Jack Regan, head of Youth in the diocese, then spoke about the role of those in the community with greater life experience and suggested some ways in which we could welcome younger people in our community, the main one being to not be afraid to talk to them!

Katherine Bergin, Marriage and Family Life Adviser in A&B, finished our formation day by reflecting on the wonderful position we are in as grandparents. She spoke about how a child's unconditional love for us is just like God's love for each of us, and encouraged us not to miss out on seeing God in both our own grandchildren and those young families in our parishes.

**Consecrated Virgin takes Vows in Eastbourne**

It is a ceremony rarely seen and is one of the most ancient rites of the Early Church, involving the consecration of the whole of life, the consecration of virginity, to the person of Jesus Christ.

heart to the Lord's call to fulfil her vocation as a Consecrated Virgin. The life she has been called to is not easy - it is quite difficult to live a con-

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
the preparations making the day possible and very special for Sr Mary Rose.




plicity of life that is a model and an example to us all and those

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
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

# **Guildford Parish - Project Francis**

ST PIUS X church in the parish of Guildford held a fundraising dinner on Saturday 20 October. It was provided by Catherine Hughes and her team to support Project Francis – our parish project aimed at finding a home in Guildford for a vulnerable Syrian refugee family. In response to the Government's pledge to find homes for 20,000 vulnerable Syrian refugee families, over 50 families have already been re-settled in the Woking and Guildford area.

The total funds raised, including Gift Aid, amounted to £2,864. Diane Peters, Refugee Adviser to the Anglican Diocese of Guildford, gave an inspiring account to the gathering of over 60 supporters of the work undertaken by the Diocese in collaboration with the local borough councils, who provide indispensable financial and services support for the resettlement programmes. Karen Nethercott also spoke of her experiences in teaching English to refugees – wide-ranging support by volunteers is a crucial part of the re-settlement activity.

Through Project Francis, our parish is looking to establish one or more homes for vulnerable Syrian refugee families in the Guildford area and intends to work closely with the experienced teams in the Anglican Diocese of Guildford to achieve that goal. Story: Michael Combes



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
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




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
