THE INTERFAITH CONTACT GROUP of Brighton **L** & Hove held its annual interfaith service in St Peter's Church, Hove.

DABCEC was opened in summer 1979. The building was formerly the old St Francis School and for the first time it brought together under one roof the Schools Commission, the recently formed Adult Education team and the Religious Education Service.

St John's Seminary – Wonersh

THERE ARE THREE seminaries in England - St John's Seminary, Wonersh is one of them (the other two being Allen Hall in London, and Oscott in Birmingham). There are also three Seminaries overseas - the Venerable English College and the Pontifical Beda College, both in Rome, and the Royal English College in Valladolid, Spain which now offers a pre-Seminary year.

Wonersh has been forming priests for service in the Church (including Bishop Richard) since 1891. It is just three miles from Guildford, Surrey and was originally in the Southwark Diocese, but now finds itself in this Diocese of Arundel & Brighton (A&B).

Currently we have 30 or so seminarians from the following Dioceses: A&B, Clifton, East Anglia, Liverpool, Portsmouth and Southwark.

My Role as Vice-Rector

I trained for the priesthood at Wonersh myself (overlapping with Bishop Richard), and I was ordained a Southwark priest in 1981. After 36 years mainly in parish ministry, and with a number of other jobs in the Southwark Diocese and beyond under my belt, Archbishop Peter asked me to become the Vice-Rector in September 2017. My role is described in the Ratio of 2016 (which I shall refer to later) The Vice-Rector must be suitable for the work of formation. He is called to assist the Rector, with due discretion, in the service of formation, and to substitute for him in the case of absence. In general, the Vice-Rector 'must demonstrate strong pedagogical abilities, a joyous love of his service and a spirit of collaboration'. Looking back over my first year in the post – shall we say that I am growing into the job! It is a huge privilege to be part of the team of formators, who help those who feel called to the priesthood to discern whether or not this is God's will for them.

The Rector and Team

Canon Brian Coyle (Southwark) is the Rector and the 'Father of the House' at Wonersh. He leads the team of formators; in addition to myself, they are: Fr Kevin Dring (A&B), Fr Michael Fountaine (Clifton), Dr Pia Matthews (a wife and mother from Wallington, Surrey), and Canon Luke Smith (Southwark). Currently, we are awaiting the appointment of one more formator.

In addition to the formation staff, some 30 or so others – priests and lay men and women – come in to lecture, for spiritual direction or for human formation work. They are not all in at the same time!

It is great to have so many people involved in the life of the Seminary and we are truly grateful for their professionalism, their dedication and their commitment.

Formation, not Training

Our youngest seminarian is in his early 20s, and our oldest is in his late 60s!





We don't talk about *training* for the priesthood any more (as I did earlier). Rather, we talk about *formation*. During initial formation, seminarians are very much introduced to the requirement for on-going formation after ordination – emphasising that formation for the priesthood is never complete – it is a lifelong process.

In 1992, Pope St John Paul II wrote an Apostolic Exhortation on the Formation of Priests – *Pastores Dabo Vobis* – which focused on four essential areas of priestly formation: human, intellectual, spiritual and pastoral. These areas are developed during the Seminary course – the average length of time being six years – which includes a pastoral year in a parish in the seminarian's home diocese in Year 4.

Seminaries do not do whatever they want as far as the six year formation course is concerned; rather, all Seminaries are closely directed by the Congregation for the Clergy in Rome, which has the responsibility of determining the overall formation requirements in Seminaries throughout the world.

naries throughout the world. Universal and Local 'Ratios'

In 2016, the Congregation published the *Ratio Fundamentalis Institutionis Sacerdotalis (The Fundamentals of Priestly Formation)* with the more userfriendly title - **The Gift of the Priestly Vo***cation.*

This universal Ratio will lead to the Bishops in each country throughout the world preparing a local Ratio for their specific territory and culture - which then has to be approved by the Congregation for the Clergy in Rome.

Priestly formation is taken very seriously, as the Church has a duty to prepare its priests as best it can – and the People of God have a right to the best prepared priests possible (and priests who will then continue to be formed after ordination).

Is formation for the priesthood taken more seriously these days than it was before? This is a difficult question to answer. Suffice to say that there is much more professionalism evident in today's society – along with more accountability – and the Church cannot operate in a vacuum.

Character For example – particularly in the light of priestly scandals that sadly continue to rock the Church and society these days - we need to ascertain the integrity of character of those applying for the Seminary, so psychological and other assessment is undertaken to determine the mental and the emotional health of a potential seminarian.

During the six years at Wonersh, human formation work is undertaken in order to deal with unresolved issues and 'excess baggage', and seminarians will have personal targets to achieve.

The Ratio speaks of the importance of the seminarian knowing himself, and letting himself be known - relating to his formators with sincerity and transparency. It refers to a seminarian working humbly and ceaselessly on himself in order to be open to the truths of life and the demands of ministry. Intellect

Intellectually, the Ratio provides a descriptive list of materials that must be included in philosophical, theological and related studies. Being an Affiliated Institution of St Mary's University, Twickenham, it is possible to gain a Bachelor of Theology (BTh) degree. So university regulations have to be followed at Wonersh and various internal and external checks are in place to en-



sure that this happens. The professionalism and the accountability that today's society demands are addressed as normally and as naturally as possible - but those coming to Wonersh these days are used to these demands, as it is all part of the world that they have come from and,

of course, to which they will return. Life Here is 'Quite Normal'

However, Wonersh is not isolated from the world by any means. In the main, we follow university terms - and we have university holidays! On one level, life at Wonersh could be described as similar to university life, and a good number of our seminarians would look exactly like today's average student.

Life at Wonersh is 'quite normal' really and visitors are pleasantly surprised. We have a gym, we have a bar, we have a day off. Seminarians can visit friends and family, who are also warmly welcomed at Wonersh. But we are not simply a university Hall of Residence. Wonersh is much more than that, and much more is expected of the seminarian.

Chapel, Prayer - and Music

Central to the life of the Seminary is the Chapel - loved by so many over the years. Any seminarian sitting in our Chapel will have been both challenged and supported by the inscription over the old High Altar from John 15:16 Non vos me elegistis, sed ego elegi vos ... You did not choose me, no I chose you.

Daily prayer and meditation is central to the life of the seminarian. Each seminarian has a Spiritual Director and the House Spiritual Director has overall responsibility for the spiritual life of the Seminary. Needless-to-say, we have daily Mass and Devotions and over the years the seminarians are prepared to be presiders and preachers at Mass and other liturgical celebrations.

During their time at Wonersh they are exposed to a broad range of music to prepare them adequately for parish life. Parish Life and Service:

the Focus of all Formation

In addition to the Pastoral Year spent in a parish in Year 4, seminarians are in-volved in a great variety of weekly pastoral work throughout their years at Wonersh, and sometimes during the holidays too. This work is monitored and assessed

It is on Parish life, and on the service of the People of God, that all formation

at Wonersh is focused. The seminarian is formed to acknowledge and to respect the priesthood of *all* the Baptised, while being aware of the distinct character of the ordained priesthood ... and the gift of the priestly vocation with its call to service

I will let the *Ratio* have the final word, as I ask for your prayers for Wonersh and issue a warm invitation for Parishes to visit us by arrangement.

The priest is, therefore, called to form himself so that his heart and his life are conformed to the Lord Jesus, in this way becoming a sign of the love God has for each person. By being intimately united to Christ, he will be able: to preach the Gospel and become an instrument of the mercy of God; to guide and give correction; to intercede and care for the spiritual life of the faithful entrusted to him; to listen and welcome, while also responding to the demands and the deep questions of our time.



..... Seminarian Room Refurbishment Appeal

 $R^{\rm ECENTLY,\,letters}$ from the Seminary were sent to all parishes in the dioceses where the majority of Wonersh seminarians come from - Arundel & Brighton, Clifton, Portsmouth and Southwark - asking for financial help to redecorate and refurbish all the seminarian rooms, which had received little or no attention for some 40 years.

Many of the rooms had threadbare carpets and curtains close to disintegration. Some beds and other furniture had begun their life in the Junior Seminary at Mark Cross, Sussex - which closed in 1970!

The response from the parishes has been amazingly generous with donations coming from Parish funds, special collections, individuals, organisations and charities.

So far, £237,000 (including Gift Aid) has been raised. This means that a little more seminarian bedroom furniture has been able to be bought than was originally intended - and of much better quality. There is a target now of £300,000 in order to do the best possible for our seminarians and future priests.

Every donation has been acknowledged where possible, and to those who sent donations anonymously - heartfelt thanks and an assurance of the Seminary's pravers.

As well as the generosity of so many in support of our seminarians, what has been so touching are some of the letters received with the donations, which show the great interest that so many people have in Wonersh and the great love that so many have for the Seminary - either directly or indirectly

One donation, for example, was sent in memory of the donor's father, who had been at Wonersh in 1909 aged 14 years. (Wonersh was also a Junior Seminary at that time.) The donor's father had obviously left the Seminary at some stage, but in 1909 he had sent a postcard from Wonersh Village to his mother in Ireland. The donor had enclosed a copy of his father's postcard - which he still treasured!

'Hidden work, but very significant work'

Bishop Richard commenced his homily at the Mass for Parish Volunteer Representatives with these words and continued: 'Without these roles we could not do the Mission the Lord has given us so it is right to celebrate today.'

Introduction

A VOLUNTEER IS DEFINED as a person who freely gives time for another person or for a good cause. Well, the 240 volunteers who came to Arundel Cathedral and the Cathedral Centre on Saturday 3 November certainly fitted into this group. This unique gathering from throughout the diocese encompassed volunteers whose skills ranged from Finance to Health & Safety, Safeguarding and Gift Aid. Most of whom possibly did not know what they were getting themselves into at the time of offering, or maybe it was a parish priest who gave the nudge! However, all would agree, it was to spread the Word and for the glory of God.

In the past the four disciplines held their annual meetings in separate places and at separate times of the year. This year the diocese had the bright idea to bring everyone together, albeit with their own meetings, but to attend Mass celebrated by Bishop Richard and to share in a simple lunch.

The A&B News covered this unique coming together in Arundel with correspondents at each of the forums (or is it fora?). Also covered was the award presented to Sue Rickard, the past Gift Aid Co-ordinator.

Where Would We Be Without

Finance Committees?

WHAT MAY COME as a surprise to readers of the A&B News is that a parish has to have two things in order to function. You guessed the first - a priest. The second requirement – a Finance Committee! Why? Training in the seminary does not cover a lot to do with money and buildings, so here are the volunteers who support our priests and act as an important sounding board for decisions on spending money and maintaining premises.

At the Finance Forum, 75 committee delegates listened to a presentation by Sarah Kilmartin, Chief Operating Officer, and Dave Newman, Diocesan Financial Controller. Financial reviews included the actual results for 2017, the year-end planning for 2018, and the budget and forecast levy for 2019. Sarah presented an overview of audit feedback from haysmacintyre. Much praise was given to the hard working financial teams for the reduction of errors - from 37 in 2012 to 27 in 2017.

One practical issue was raised - getting cash from the parish to the bank by volunteers, most of whom are over 65 years of age. As the Public Injury Insurance only covers volunteers up to the age of 65, a question was raised on the entitlement of these older couriers in the event of accidental incidents. The Finance team are investigating the availability of top-up insurance.

Other matters were raised, especially with reference to the deficit in central funds in 2017. Under-funding for retired priests is an issue and a fundraising project is planned to rectify this situation. The Principle Levy will stay at 35% for next year and a windfall levy of 35% will be introduced for land sales.

To keep Chairs of Finance busy next month, year-end paper returns and declaration forms will be sent out during the first week of December and all agency collection ('pink sheet') returns should be received at Bishop's house by 17 December 2018.

Coming up in the future, a new cloud-based accounting system called ACCOUNTSIQ - already in use at Bishop's House will be rolled out to parishes early in 2019. Each parish will have its own stand-alone database with a consolidation module taking care of year-end reporting to Bishop's House. Don't worry, members of Finance Committees - training will be carried out in small groups throughout the Diocese early next year. To close the forum, Sarah was joined by the Bishop and three of the Diocesan Trustees for a question and answer session. This continues the tradition that the annual forum is a two-way discussion where members of the parish finance community can share ideas and queries with the Diocesan team.

In conclusion to the successful forum, Sarah announced that there will be a repeat of this event at 10am on Saturday 2 November 2019 in Arundel. So, no excuses delegates, the Dio-

Ad Limina statement.

The training to be provided by Deaneries in 2019 was explained by Rosemary. In future each Deanery will have their annual refresher course in the same month each year and details will be accessible on the Diocesan website together with links to other information and resources. It was stressed that the current DBS versions of forms on the CSAS or the Diocesan websites should be used and that paper based forms are still required.

Philip provided a list of the General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) introduced in May 2018 that PSRs must now follow and concluded by advising that the Update Day in 2019 would be on Saturday 2 November at the same venue.

Health & Safety in the Diocese

HEALTH AND SAFETY – a subject which normally brings a few sighs and dropping of the eyelids - had its annual airing in Arundel as part of the Diocesan Meeting Quartet. Sarah Kilmartin, Chief Operating Officer, opened the meeting by introducing herself and her role in the Diocese. While we may want to ignore this important subject, it is quite clear from Sarah that we cannot survive without it.

Delegates were reminded of the target of 30 April 2019 for completion of all the Very High and High assignments; all corresponding Tasks should be well in hand by then.

Nicky Worley, the Diocesan Health & Safety consultant who provides support on the Parish Safety Toolbox - a well-respected management tool - then took over and explained new plans to support parishes in the instruction of Third Party Contractors. A preferred supplier database is being developed through collaboration with the Deaneries and will be available through Safety Toolbox in 2019.

Nicky advised that the Diocese has the responsibilities of a landlord in relation to each priest living in our presbyteries; thus we must comply with the minimum standards regarding the safety of utilities, monitoring of asbestos and provision of smoke and carbon dioxide alarms. Online tasks were explained further and delegates were introduced to Sue Forrest, based at Bishop's House, who is now also available to assist and to give advice on buildings. It was noted that it is now possible to provide access for additional users to particular sections of a Parish Safety Toolbox.

The new online tool, Event Manager, is now available to assist organisers. Nicky stressed that it is not to be used for Night Shelters, as they already have their comprehensive tools. The requirement for Fire Plans and what should be included was described in detail and the meeting concluded with the Accident Reporting Procedure.

Many questions were asked throughout and at the end by an obviously involved and attentive audience, and all were answered comprehensively by the presenters.

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Diocesan Gift Aid Rebates Reach £1.3m

T HAS BEEN PERHAPS the busiest year ever on the adminis-trative front for Gift Aid in the Diocese. Major changes to the team at Bishop's House, plus a new computer system, plus new data protection regulations, plus an updated banking system have all happened while the ordinary business of claiming tax refunds still carried on. It was good to know, therefore, that total tax reclaims received in 2017/18 were £1.3 million, a significant sum of money which underlines the importance of Gift Aid to parishes and schools.

Sue Rickard had decided to retire at Easter, so Sarah Kilmartin introduced the new Gift Aid Co-ordinator, Patricia Wrightson, who is settling in well into her new role replacing the much-missed Sue - see article on page 5. The Gift Aid office has also lost Lara Smith, who left to have a baby girl so congratulations and best wishes. However, it's suspected that Lara will not be getting as much rest as Sue! Patricia took the delegates through an overview of the impact of all the changes before handing over to the Audit Team. The three Gift Aid Auditors, David Goodge, Ian Dallas and Dan Meehan, have provided much appreciated ongoing support to Organisers across the Diocese over the years. They had prepared very useful update presentations for the day. All three have worked hard to update the computer system to a new web-based platform and then introduce it to Organisers. In addition, there have been major changes to data protection regulations to be incorporated into our procedures. All of this meant a complete rewrite of the Gift Aid Manual to take these changes into account, simplifying and reducing the size of the manual at the same time. Dan explained the highlights of all these changes and their impact on Organisers. Ian gave a walkthrough of some of the new approaches to uploading records (Gift Aid declarations and standing order forms) to the web-based system, which will ultimately lead to a paperless system.

Surprised Sue Accepts Award From Bishop Richard

SUE RICKARD WAS QUIETLY sitting in the front row of Arundel Cathedral listening to the conclusion of Mass, which was being celebrated by Bishop Richard.

However, on arrival at the Cathedral she had been surprised at being asked to sit in such a prominent position, her preferred seat being in the back row. Now all was revealed, with Bishop Richard coming forward to present Sue with the St Philip Howard medal for her sterling services to the Diocese.

Let Bishop Richard take up the story.

'Sue Rickard joined the Diocese in March 1998 and served a full 20 years as Gift Aid Co-ordinator in Hove before retiring at Easter this year. She knew every single Gift Aid organiser in the Diocese personally and established a strong network and community of volunteers, including a highly effective team of auditors.

'Sue led the way in computerising Gift Aid, adopting the Giftwise system and embedding this as the norm across the Diocese. As a very early adopter of this approach, she was much sought after at the national Gift Aid conference.

'She served on the steering group for many years, offering guidance and support to opposite numbers in other dioceses as they sought to emulate the success of Arundel and Brighton in implementing a computerised system and reclaiming over a £1 million in Gift Aid each year.

'Sue is much missed in Hove and even more so amongst the wider Gift Aid community, many of whom are here today and will be delighted to catch up with her over lunch.'

How did Sue feel about all this attention?

'I was totally overwhelmed – I thought this had been dealt with when I left at Easter! Nevertheless, I must say I was very happy indeed to receive this award. Out of the corner of my eye I saw Sarah (Kilmartin) coming down the side aisle with a large bunch of flowers. She came over and gave them to me – even the c colours matched my jacket!' concluded a very content Sue.

SVP Appeal for Sudan

John Wild writes 'A&B Conferences and Parishes have raised over £66k in the last five years (over £35k in the last two years) for the Sudan Appeal and we would very much like to exceed those annual totals this year.'

BOTH SUDAN AND SOUTH SUDAN (since its formation in 2011) have suffered histories of conflict that have left behind trails of destruction and millions of displaced people in urgent need of assistance.

The SVP in England & Wales currently supports 151 twinned Conferences in Sudan and 30 in South Sudan (mainly around Juba). This has helped us to build close links with members and to support their work for the poor and needy in local communities.

Since 1997, the Society has also helped to fund some larger programmes of work in both countries including:

• Baby feeding and pre-school meals in the camps for internally displaced people;

• Medical centres staffed by volunteers and providing vital medicines and life-saving treatment;

• Clean water supplies for local communities using an SVP tanker that is in urgent need of replacement;

• Vocational training enabling both men and women to learn a trade such as tailoring, carpentry, mechanics, first aid and IT;

• "Be in Hope" home for street children near Juba.

The National Twinnage Committee oversees the twinnage arrangements and programmes of work on behalf of the SVP. Ian Mawdsley, the Country Manager, visited Sudan in 2017 with Helen O'Shea, the National President, to review the work and there is a full

(www.twinnage.org.uk). Dr. Betram Kuol, SVP Programme Manager in South Sudan, recently visited the UK and offered his wholehearted gratitude for support provided through the Vincentian family in England & Wales.

The spot where she saw Our Lady is now, of course, the shrine at Lourdes where 70 miracle healings have been recognised by the Catholic Church. Today, we take around 1,000 disabled children to Lourdes, every Easter, on life-changing pilgrimage holidays. Bernadette continues to inspire not only us, but around five million Catholics who visit Lourdes each year.

CLIMATE CHAOS

TEN YEARS AGO, the UK became the first country to pass a Climate Change Act which committed us, by 2050, to reduce greenhouse gas emissions (mainly carbon dioxide and methane) by 80% of 1990 levels. However, in October 2018 the IPCC report stated that we had to go further. We have just 12 years to prevent global warming reaching a level that would be catastrophic and irreversible.

This is important to CAFOD as it is the poorest people in the developing countries who are already being affected by climate change and who will be hit worst. These are the people we work with and are the ones who have done least to cause global warming. These countries have the least resources to cope with the impact and the progress that has been made is being put at risk.

CAFOD is calling on the UK Government to take the lead and commit to net zero emissions before 2050. We will be launching a new campaign on this issue in spring 2019. Meanwhile, we can play our part by switching to renewable energy, and being careful not to waste energy, by eating less meat and by consuming less. Fr Chris Dobson recounted the amazing story of his own grandfathers; one recovered as a casualty in a prison hospital, while the other survived a torpedo attack on a mail boat on which he and his new wife were honeymooners. 500 of 800 passengers perished in the Irish Sea.

St Paul's Hunger Fund Success

ST PAUL'S PARISH, Haywards Heath, runs a Hunger Fund Campaign, supporting five projects in the Third World which try to reduce poverty and with whom we have personal contacts. Through revenue raised by a 100 Club, we are able to send assistance, providing a well for a maternity hospital in Africa, feeding orphans in Lesotho and street children in Chimbote, Peru.

Our most recent project has been to establish an apiary in Bungoma, Kenya, through our contact, Vincent Musiko, a highly qualified bee specialist with a wide knowledge of sustainable agriculture.

Beekeeping is an ideal environmentally sustainable activity, providing pollen for bees from fruit trees which are also a food source for farmers. Vincent reports that since 2016 our hives have produced 124kgs of honey. Sold at roughly \$8 per kg, this generates about \$992 as income for poor local Kenyan farmers.

To raise funds St Paul's holds sales after Mass of Sussex honey and bread donated from the Cyrnel Bak-



ery in Forest Row. Our latest sale provided beekeeping suits and smokers to pacify the bees. But we are hoping to purchase a centrifuge machine, which will leave the Kenyan honeycombs intact when the honey is extracted, rather than forcing the bees to spend valuable time re-building the combs.
