


THE SUN SHONE from a clear blue sky and strong gusts of wind nudged open the west door as Arundel Cathedral filled with



Holly Returns to the Rite of Election - with Nina

TOLLY, FROM KNAPHILL PARISH, Hwas at the Rite of Election for the second year running, but in a different capacity. Last year she had been a catechumen; now she came as sponsor to Nina, her brother's partner of 12 years.

Religion had not featured at all in her early life and it was only on meeting future husband Gee that Holly came into contact with the Catholic Church. In recent years, with their three children attending Catholic schools, Holly found herself increasingly drawn to the wider family of the Church and was baptised last Easter.

Now she was sponsoring Nina, who was not unfamiliar with the Catholic Church as her mother was a Catholic, but Nina herself had never been baptised. It had been left for her to decide when older whether she wished to belong to any particular church or religion. Becoming a parent herself 14 months ago was the catalyst to exploring further where she felt she really belonged.

The occasion was the ceremony of the Rite of Election, a key stage of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) when the 42 Catechumens. those to be baptised, and the 58 Candidates, those who are already baptised, publicly declare their intention to become full members of the Church, watched by their godparents, sponsors, catechists, priests, deacons and families

The choir was seated in the North Transept, by the shrine to St Philip Howard (see page 8). Augmented by harp, flute and double bass, it was in fine voice, and, under the energetic direction of Anne Ward, was kept busy with a full programme of hymns, responses and acclamations. In his homily Bishop Richard referred to the day's Scripture readings, which included the Apostle Paul's testimony that '... because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.' (Romans 10:9) He thanked the catechumens and candidates, telling them that they were numbered among thousands in England & Wales this month who will also

be participating in the Rite of Election in every cathedral. Thanking them for listening to the prompting of the Holy Spirit and allowing us to journey with them, Bishop Richard reminded them that they would be the Lord's witnesses in today's world and, together, we will strive to center our lives on The Word Who is Life.

The catechumens then formed a semi-circle in front of the Bishop, were affirmed as worthy by their godparents, were individually greeted by the Bishop, and then signed their names in the Book of the Elect. Similarly, the candidates were affirmed by their sponsors and the assembly, before final prayers and intercessions were offered for the elect and the candidates. Following the Solemn Blessing, dozens of elect and candidates with their godparents and sponsors, their family and relatives, took up Bishop Richard's offer and queued for a photograph with him in front of the altar. The queue stretched from the altar to near the west door, the entire length of the cathedral. Perhaps not surprisingly, people were reluctant to accept that the impressive and moving ceremony had drawn to a close.

Memories of Catholic Schooling Influence Joanna



BORN IN MALAYSIA, Joanna trav-elled to England at an early age and was enrolled in a Catholic primary school that was to make a profound impression on her.

Her parents were not Catholic but valued a good education and Joanna soon felt comfortable in school. She appreciated the stress on moral values and discipline - and she found that the prayers before and after classes 'felt natural.'

Beginning work, Joanna gravitated to the hectic business world of the City of London but, after some years, realised that she wanted a career where she could help people - and has now switched careers and become a medical doctor.

When the children came along, it felt natural to think about them formally joining the Catholic faith.

There was even a 'nudge' from an unexpected quarter. When Pope Benedict visited London in 2010, he picked out some children from the crowd and asked them to come up. So it was that Joanna's eldest daughter received a very special papal blessing.

Attending Ewell Parish, Joanna's journey of faith is taking her firmly into the Catholic Church and, as Bishop Richard said in his homily, we celebrate your joining us and thank you for listening to the prompting of the Holy Spirit.

ISHOP RICHARD recently visited **D**the Parish of Our Lady Queen of Peace, Adur Valley including St Peter's in Shoreham, Christ the King in Steyning and The Towers Convent in Upper Beeding; he met many of the teams and groups as well as housebound parishioners. The biggest surprise was for Peter Ransom at St Peter's, who at the age of 76 has reluctantly stepped down from his commitment to our parish with regard to maintenance.

Peter has looked after the maintenance of both St Peter's and Christ the King for over 49 years. When he and his wife Christine first came to Shoreham, Fr McHale persuaded him to help as clerk of the works for the new church, even though at that time he was not even a Catholic but came along to support Christine. Peter was trained as a joiner and later became a Director with Wenban Smith, 'retiring' in 2003. He was also a Governor at St Peter's School for some years.

Servers Old and New




UILDFORD PARISH cel-Uebrated St Stephen's Day Mass by enrolling seven new altar servers from across the parish (see picture above).

Interview with Sarah Kilmartin, Diocesan Chief Operating Officer

It was just over three years ago that the A&B News had its first interview with Sarah Kilmartin, the newly appointed Financial Secretary. Much has happened since then, including a job title change to Chief Operating Officer. We wanted to know whether her original expectations were met, what have been the challenges, her involvement in the Pastoral Plan, and what about family life? Peter Burholt takes up the story.

When we last met, you said that you had wanted to wait for the right job to come along – one where you could make a difference in a not-for-profit environment. What has been the reality?

Yes, that has always been my focus and, in fact, I made my previous move into education in order to gain charity experience. After three years I am still convinced I am in the perfect job for me. Being a committed Catholic is essential to the role and I don't think it would be wise for anyone to attempt this role without such a calling.

I love working in the Diocese and I appreciate all the things that do not happen in corporate life; one I can think of is starting a meeting with a prayer. It does make a difference in bringing everyone together and focusing the mind.

Both you and husband James (Dr James Kilmartin, Principal of Cardinal Newman School) have, on anyone's scale, demanding jobs. How does the balance of your work and family life pan out?

I'm very lucky that I don't have a big commute to get to work as I only live two miles away from the office in Hove. Even when I work late I am only five minutes away from home by car (a Nissan Leaf known as the milkfloat). We have two teenagers at Cardinal Newman, next door to Bishop's House in Hove, and working so close to them is lovely as I can easily give them lifts in the morning. James and I always try to take a day off at the weekend and embrace the Sabbath as a chance to be around the family as well as go to Mass.

What does your job entail and why the recent change in title?

Back in 2017 Bishop Richard commissioned a full-ranging review of the Diocese – in simple terms, was it fit for purpose and ready to meet the challenges of the future? Along with other aspects, my role and that of my department came under this review.

One of the conclusions of the independent consultants, Kinharvie Institute, was that the reporting lines were not clear enough. The idea of appointing a Chief Operating Officer is that there is a senior lay official taking responsibility for supporting the overall organisation in terms of staffing, finance, buildings

and legal and regulatory compliance.

What happens at Bishop's House? (pictured below)

Since I started, the scope of the services has grown to respond to the requirements of the Diocese. As an example, we have a small dedicated Human Resources function to cover the needs of the 300 employees. We have teams working on Finance, Gift Aid, Buildings, HR and Health and Safety, as well as the other Hove departments looking after Safeguarding in the Diocese, and the Chancery and Tribunal offices. The staff in Bishop's House work closely with clergy, staff and volunteers in parishes.

Do you think the parishes know enough about your role and that of Bishop's House?

We are in constant contact with parishes for one reason or another and are trying to improve our communications so it is clearer to everyone where we are and what we do. We are launching new Finance webpages shortly, and these include a new look for PAM, the Parish Administration Manual that we all rely on as the first point of call for diocesan policies and guidance.

When you took up your post, the Pastoral Plan was merely an aspiration. Since then you have seen its development and supported it in presentations to clergy and to each of the deaneries. How is your day to day work informed by faith?

Seeing the Pastoral Plan unfold has been inspirational. *The key message I* have taken from it is the need to be awake and engaged as a lay person and not feel that the work of the church belongs to the clergy. In the plan the Bishop emphasises the need for us all to develop in prayer and spirituality in order to be effective. That resonates with me as it is clear to me that our work and projects in the Diocese arise from a wish to serve God to the best of our ability and this is not possible without prayer. The Pastoral Plan prayer for all the people of the Diocese is frequently used to begin meetings as it sums up our shared purpose and commitment.

The process of reflecting together through the Bishop's consultation has led to a Pastoral Plan that recognises the needs of the Diocese. This led in particular to the special focus on Formation in the Plan presentations, and this was well received. When we spoke at the meetings about money it was clear that people recognise the crucial importance of generosity in weekly giving to our parishes, and the need to consider increasing standing orders from time to time. Some parishioners can afford to expand their generosity and give an extra pound a week, but we firmly agreed upon the fact that this is not possible for everyone and no one should feel pressurised.

We also agreed that diligent control of costs is necessary, and there was an emphasis on the importance of developing our work with volunteers where possible rather than expanding the paid workforce. We spoke a lot about our increasing costs for the support of retired priests, and the need to fundraise to support the retired, who generally wish to live singly and independently. Overall, the financial discussions were realistic and sober, with a recognition that this is a challenging area where constant vigilance is needed.

Several of the deaneries mentioned that they would be keen to try out cashless offertory giving, so I am intending to pilot a scheme on this later this year. A small tap and pay device can be handed round with the plate, allowing people to give by card. We are also rolling out the new cloud-based accounting system to parishes - so have a lot on our plate. We are busy but highly motivated!

The 90 minutes were soon up, but it was reassuring to know that one of the people playing a pivotal part in delivering the Pastoral Plan has a clear understanding of what is required for the future. And, most of all, she has faith as her bedrock.

Catholic Artists Exhibition

THE REGIONAL GROUP of the Society of Catholic Artists (SCAR) is based largely in Brighton, Hove and Shoreham. This group, which was formed in 1976, will be contributing to the Brighton and Hove Arts Council's Spring Art exhibition at the Friends Meeting House at Ship Street, Brighton. Dates are from 10 to 13 April with midweek opening times at 10 - 5pm and on Saturday from 10 - 4pm. Admission is free.

The exhibition theme, 'Heaven and Earth are full of Your Glory', follows the group's aim of expressing the Gospel and Christian subjects in art. Members of SCAR will steward on Thursday 11 April. While everyone is welcome, we especially invite artists and craftspeople to join the group, including clergy and religious. Our late Fr David Weston was a founder member as well as being chaplain to the group. His church, St George's Hove, contains works by SCAR members commissioned by Fr Weston.

They bring together Catholic artists and interested laymen in spiritual fellowship and collaboration, encouraging a high standard in church art. They are prepared to execute any decorative or sacred work and participate in national exhibitions and conferences. There is a bi-monthly meeting and a varied programme of events, discussion and support.

Cardinal Newman to be declared a Saint


POPE FRANCIS cleared the way for the canonisation of the much-loved educationalist Cardinal John Henry Newman on Tuesday 20 February.

The Pope received Cardinal Angelo Becciu, the Prefect of the Vatican Congregation for the Causes of Saints, and authorised him to promulgate two decrees on miracles for sainthood, a decree on martyrdom and five on heroic virtues.

Cardinal Vincent Nichols, President of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales has warmly welcomed the



news that Cardinal Newman will be declared a saint. Cardinal Nichols said: 'This is wonderful news which will be greeted with thanks to God by people across the world. Newman's exploration of faith, depth of personal courage, intellectual clarity and cultural sensitivity make him a deeply admired follower of Christ. He brings together so many of the best of Catholic traditions shared well beyond the Catholic Church. His canonisation wIll be welcomed especially in the Church of England and the wider Anglican Communion. For me the truly remarkable nature of this moment is that this is an English parish priest being declared a saint.' *Story: Catholic Comunications Network*

Parish Family Groups: the Last Eighteen Months

JUST 18 SHORT MONTHS AGO, I joined the Formation Team at The St Philip Howard Centre. How much has changed since then!

First, we weren't the Formation Team, we were the Pastoral Team; and I didn't work at the St Philip Howard Centre, I worked at DABCEC! Aside from these Diocesan changes, there have been points of personal growth for me.

Why I Applied

I applied for the fixed term contract because I had felt called to work for the church, giving more of my life to God's service.

I had quite a lot of experience in youth ministry at Parish and Diocesan level (Confirmation, World Youth Day, Lourdes Redshirts) as well as working with engaged couples to help prepare them for marriage; I had also undertaken qualifications in theology to improve my chances of getting a job in the Church.

Early Uncertainty

When the opportunity arose to apply for the post, I was unsure; the groups didn't seem like something I would get involved in if they were launched in my Parish, but I saw it as an opportunity to get experience 'in the field'.

The reason I wasn't sure about the groups was because they are purely social. There is no bible study or theological discussion, no fixed prayer or times of worship; which is what I thought the Church needed. Instead, they are designed to help build community within the Parish, in order to make them places of love and welcome.

In all honesty, I did not realise how important this element of Parish life was until I saw it in action.

Launching Groups

In the last 18 months, I have launched groups in four parishes. I have seen parishes move from a place where people know each other's faces to where they know names, they know things about each other, they have laughed together, maybe cried together.

They are becoming a Parish Family. A family that gathers to worship. It is beautiful.

And it is so simple. We simply invite people to join, assign them to groups, and give them ideas and inspiration about ways they can get to know each other. Then it's up to them.

I have been blessed to work with some wonderful Parish Coordinators and Group leaders who have truly inspired me and I owe them huge thanks for empowering me to believe in a project that

can make such a noticeable difference to Parish life.

From this simple model, groups have shared food together, walked together, played games, sung Christmas Carols and done crafts together.

They have arranged to celebrate house Masses together and have shared the burden of loss by attending blessing of the graves together (followed by a social so that those who are bereaved do not have to go straight home to an empty house).

Teenage boys want to host barbecues so that they can invite their friends to meet their church family!

God's Presence in Encounters

This project has helped me to understand that God is present in the smallest of encounters. We do not need to be deeply profound to know His grace, we just need to make time for each other and to love one another.

This creates a foundation where deeper things can grow. 'Just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me' (Matt 25:40).

So now my time is up. The contract has come to an end and I must leave. But I feel as though I leave a wonderful legacy in the very capable hands of those who I have worked with at Parish level. They have been fantastic and it genuinely would not have worked without them. So, I pray that God will bless them as they continue their good work.



ON WEDNESDAY 6 February, the Diocesan Formation Team headed up to Birmingham for the Divine Renovation Conference. As well as being an excellent team building exercise, allowing the Formation Team to spend quality time together in order to work more effectively on developing and moving forward with the Pastoral Plan, it gave us an opportunity to reflect on alternative ways to help build the Kingdom of God.

Divine Renovation was originally a book written by Fr James Mallon, a Canadian priest who decided to write about his experiences of running a Parish. It was so successful that he and his team now mentor other parishes around the world; they have produced a guide book and other resources to help Parish Teams move their parishes 'from maintenance to mission'.

I would like, if I may, to share some of my experience of the conference with you here.

I arrived at the venue with some trepidation early on Thursday morning. We had a long day ahead of us (the programme for day one was from 8am to 9pm) and we were starting with networking – eek! (This is not my favourite thing to do, especially so early in the morning. I needed at least two more cups of tea!). However, there were several clergy and parishioners there from across the Diocese, so it was good to catch up with some old acquaintances.



The very first question we were asked in the introduction session was 'From or for?' We were asked to think about why we had decided to attend - was it because we want things from people or for them? Do we want to recruit volunteers in our churches so that we can get things **from** them or do we want to help them encounter Jesus so that He can do things **for** them? This question really set the tone, because these two days were not going to be about getting a few tips to encourage people to sign up for ministry. We were about to learn how to radically transform Parish Communities through the power of the Holy Spirit, to enable people to know and love Jesus Christ!

From this point we were taken on a wonderful journey, through inspiring talks and seminars, amazingly beautiful worship music, thoughtful and inspiring homilies, time to share with each other our thoughts on what we were learning, but most importantly, through prayer.

Thursday evening was dedicated to opening our hearts so that we might be filled with the Holy Spirit. It was not only uplifting but also life changing. Since that evening, not only do I find myself no longer struggling to pray and feeling guilty when I don't, I yearn to pray; I look forward to it; I cannot wait to be united once again with God in this intimate conversation with Him.

My one desire is to help as many people as possible know and love the Holy Trinity as I do. The peace and joy that this love brings is indescribable. Fortunately, the Divine Renovation material gives us tools to be able to do just that. It helps us become a missionary church in a society that craves meaning and comfort. And no, I am not employed by Divine Renovation, I do not have shares in it, I have no affiliation with it whatsoever!

But I do know truth when I hear it.



The truth is that our beautiful Church is in danger; the pews are getting emptier and more and more parishes are having to be combined. There is no one to blame for this; we used to live in a culture that supported the model of a church-going family, and now we don't.

So, what shall we do? Carry on as we are and wonder why no one comes to ioin us? Or reach out and tell everyone about this wonderful gift of faith? Because if we do the latter, maybe one day we will be building churches for the expanding communities, not closing them down. But we are all responsible; every baptised member of the community has a calling from God to act. And don't forget to support your priest; let him know that you want to help him bring the Good News to the world. But most importantly, pray. Ask God to fill you with His Holy Spirit so that you are strengthened and inspired to do His work.

May God bless us all as we work to build His Kingdom.

St Philip Howard - a Saint For Our Time



held at Arundel Cathedral, is truly a saint for our time. From a dissolute and privileged youth, estranged from his wife, he turned into a faithful husband and father and a devout Catholic prepared to sacrifice all for his faith. PHILIP HOWARD was a worldly man, a successful courtier, educated at Cambridge University and the thirteenth Earl of Arundel. Although married, he was estranged from his wife Anne because of his activities at Elizabeth I's court.

Conversion

It was on hearing the Jesuit priest Edmund Campion debate with several Anglicans at the Tower of London in August 1581 that he converted to Catholicism. He was also greatly influenced in this by his wife Anne who had already converted and they were reconciled. Elizabethan authorities knew of his conversion and were watching him.

A Time of Religious Turbulence

By 1585, it was a crime to aid a Catholic priest and an act of treason for an English Catholic priest to be in the country. Howard had a Catholic chaplain in his house in London and at his castle at Arundel. At court and in the surrounding countryside rumours abounded of Catholic plots against the Queen. In this tense environment Howard decided to seek religious liberty abroad, but was betrayed by a servant and apprehended at sea, brought back a prisoner and lodged in the Tower of London. He was never to see his wife and family again.

Suffering for His Faith

A year later, after countless interrogations, he was examined before the Star Chamber, found guilty of treason, fined £10,000 (a huge sum at that time) and committed to prison at the Queen's pleasure. In 1588, with the defeat of the Spanish Armada, another wave of anti-Catholicism swept the country and he was tried again, before the King's Bench, and charged falsely with praying for a Spanish victory. Beset with lies and betrayed by former friends, Philip was unable to defend himself and was found guilty. He was sentenced to a traitor's death - to be hanged, drawn and quartered.

Spiritual Maturity

There began his long term of imprisonment, never knowing from day to day which would be his last. This was his time of spiritual development. Each day he spent several hours in prayer and meditation; he was noted for his patience in suffering and courtesy to unkind keepers.One day Howard scratched onto a wall of his cell these words: *Quanto plus afflictiones pro Christo in hoc saeculo, tanto plus gloriae cum Christo in futuro.* ('The more affliction [we endure] for Christ in this world, the more glory [we shall obtain] with Christ in the next.')

Canine friendship

He was kept constantly in fear of execution, although comforted by the companionship of a dog, which served as a go-between by which Howard and other prisoners, most notably the priest Robert Southwell, could send messages to each other. Although these two men never met, Howard's dog helped them to deepen their friendship and exchange encouragement in each other's plight. Philip Howard loved his pet, who is remembered along with him in a statue at Arundel Cathedral.

Faithful to the End

As he lay dying Howard petitioned the Queen to allow him to see his wife and children, including his son who had been born after his imprisonment. The Queen responded that 'If he will but once attend the Protestant Service, he shall not only see his wife and children, but be restored to his honors and estates with every mark of my royal favor'. To this, Howard is supposed to have replied: 'Tell Her Majesty if my religion be the cause for which I suffer, sorry I am that I have but one life to lose.'

Martyrdom and Sainthood

In the end, weakened by malnutrition and possibly poisoned, he died peacefully at about midday on Sunday 19 October 1595. He was 38 years old and had spent almost the last eleven years of his life a prisoner in the Tower of London. He was immediately considered a martyr for his faith.

Philip Howard, Edmund Campion, and Robert Southwell were all canonized together in 1970 by Pope Paul VI among the Forty Martyrs of England and Wales.

Caroline Balko, the school Chaplain, writes: 'For nearly 20 years now we have been committed to supporting Action in Africa, a charity that began in St Michael's in Ashtead. In particular, we have developed a close link with Pubinda School in Nuciency Tangania

Ruhinda School in Nyaishozi, Tanzania. 'Our project had humble beginnings when we funded the provision of a



porridge breakfast for every child when they arrived at school, often having walked for several hours.

'Equipping the Science Department followed. We then embarked on our biggest challenge. Action in Africa were aware that the girls at Ruhinda were particularly vulnerable on their journeys to and from school. St Andrew's funded the dormitories for the girls so they could stay at the school and then the fitting of solar lighting so they could study in the evenings.

'The following year the toilet and shower blocks were completed. Fr Vitalis visited the school from Tanzania and attended the Deanery concert at St Andrew's School where participants included the Deanery Primary Schools and was an evening of song and celebration. 'All staff at St Andrew's have been fully involved with the projects and this year the Head of PE, Jane Dunckley, will be running in the London Marathon.'

Jane says: 'Running the London Marathon has been a lifelong goal of mine and I am delighted to run it for such an amazing cause.'

Being a Good Samaritan - the Crisis Fund of the Catholic Children's Society



THE CRISIS FUND of the Catholic Children's Society provides immediate financial support for families facing a crisis in their lives.

The Diocese of Arundel and Brighton has been supporting the 'Crisis Fund' since November 2017 when Bishop Richard requested that the Crib Offerings in the Diocese were dedicated to supporting the fund. Every single penny raised for the Arundel and Brighton Crisis fund is used exclusively in the Arundel and Brighton Diocese. Headteachers and Parish Priests can apply to the crisis fund, on behalf of a family, for a one-off grant that is usually responded to within 24 hours. It is for members of the school or parish community, who find themselves in severe financial hardship. This support can make a huge difference to families in desperate situations when they have nowhere else to turn.

How the Society helps

Three examples illustrate the work of the Society.

A seven year old girl who was sleeping huddled in blankets with her younger sister on the floor because the family were destitute. The Society helped the family buy bunk beds, mattresses and bedding ensuring these two young children now have a comfortable and warm place to sleep.

Two teenage girls lost their mother in a traffic accident. The school reported that the siblings were 'finding coping with both grief and organising their mother's funeral with no money unbearable.' As they were both in full time education they didn't qualify for any statutory assistance. The Crisis Fund enabled these siblings to hold a basic funeral and bury their mother with dignity.

A mother and her three young children fled domestic violence and needed help getting a deposit to rent a new flat. Our Crisis Fund provided the family with the immediate one-off support they needed to have a safe place to call home.

Wintershall Passion Play



• SEEING IS BELIEVING' - a maxim which it could be said Wintershall has taken as its very own in its telling of the story of Christ in ways which, once seen, are never forgotten. A 'local' charity based in the Diocese just outside of Guildford, Wintershall stages three open air productions annually on the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus (the Nativity, the Passion of Jesus, the Life of Christ).


Set up by Peter Hutley in 1989, the first production involved a handful of family and friends performing and watching a homespun Nativity in a working cow-shed/barn on the family property. Today, Wintershall's epic plays involve hundreds of volunteer actors and are seen by thousands of people. Performances are held at Trafalgar Square, in Guildford High Street and in the beautiful Wintershall grounds and barn.

Bible vignettes are also performed in schools as part of assemblies and to support RE provision. Peter's daughter, Charlotte de Klee, produces the plays nowadays but Peter and his wife Ann still keep a keen eye on proceedings; the Bible Society also works closely with Wintershall.

Supported by the Mayor of London, two free performances of The Passion of Jesus are staged in Trafalgar Square on Good Friday each year (19 April this year) as well as in Guildford High Street the following day. Cardinal Vincent Nichols has attended the last few performances as has the Bishop of London. Live-streaming is another way in which the Passion story has more recently been transmitted to a wider audience.

To see The Passion of Jesus staged in the very heart of London in these times is very moving. Last year 20,000 people watched one hundred 'players' or volunteer actors, not to mention the donkey, bring their electric and very realistic portrayal of the Easter story to this iconic landmark. The Wintershall website does give a 'health warning' on The Passion, especially with regard to young children: it's not for the faint hearted, as the crucifixion scene can be harrowing. The 'Good News' of the resurrection, however, more than compensates for any lingering upset.

Wintershall is almost completely run by volunteers and they are always looking for extra hands. Most of the actors and production crew are volunteers. In addition, volunteers give out leaflets, take names and addresses, work in the pop-up shop, help the general public and hold donation buckets. Volunteers are welcome to contribute what they can in terms of their time and will get any training that is needed. A 'one off' offer of help on the days of performances is as welcome as any other. Wintershall players (actors) have to be able to commit to specific rehearsal times over a set period but no previous experience is necessary. All are very welcome.

TAXING TERMS (explained)

GRACE is God's gift to us, enabling us to live with Him eternally.

It is 'favour, the free and undeserved help that God gives us to respond to his call to be children of God, adoptive sons, partakers of the divine nature and of eternal life' (CCC1996).

There are two main kinds of grace: sanctifying and actual.

Actual Grace is transient. It gets the will and intellect moving so we can seek out and keep sanctifying grace. An example of actual grace would be the sense that you ought to perform a charitable act, or enlightenment about an issue received during a moment of prayer e.g. the feeling you should go to the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Actual Grace comes to us when we need its help in doing or avoiding an action and it remains with us only while we are doing or avoiding the action. A priest friend, asked to summarise his thoughts about Grace, said we should be mindful that Grace is communicated to us especially - but not exclusively - through the Sacraments and this is one of the many reasons why the Sacraments are so important. Asked for a one-line explanation of Grace, he responded: 'Grace is God's life in us'

FR CHARLES JEFFRIES R I P

A Reflection by Chris Bleasdale, former Chairman of the St Cuthman's Management Committee



T IS WITH GREAT SADNESS that I have just heard of the death of Fr Charles. Others will be better placed than me in paying tribute to his many years of service to the priesthood and the A&B Diocese. My few thoughts today cover the period of some 15 years that I was chairman of the Management Committee of the Diocesan Retreat Centre, St Cuthman's, at Coolham.

Fr Charles was our Chaplain and had many qualities in ministering to the pilgrims on retreat and to others that came to St Cuthman's for the peace and tranquillity of the beautiful place and the closeness they found to God. Only those receiving his private spiritual direction would fully appreciate his gifts of understanding and spiritual assistance that helped people to lead better and more spiritual lives.

Whilst he gave me, the Committee

and the Director much support, he never hesitated to put us right if he disagreed with any policy or practical application.

My lasting recollection will be of seeing him seated in the lounge, hold-

ing court with a twinkle in his eyes while having afternoon tea with the guests of the day and relating stories of his many lifelong adventures including some of his cruise holidays.

Each year we celebrated the feast day of St Cuthman on 8 February and at the Mass Fr Charles would preach on the life of our local Sussex Saint, always managing to give new spiritual insight into St Cuthman's life. His homilies were based on the real life story of Cuthman making a cart to wheel his mother across the Sussex Downs following the death of his father and how he listened to God finally telling him to stop and build a church, which he did at Steyning. Many will know this story from the play 'Boy with a Cart' by Christopher Fry.

The Diocese, his former parishioners and all connected with St Cuthman's, including the many and varied guests of the Centre, will think themselves privileged to have known Fr Charles as a friend and Pastor. May he rest in peace!

A Letter from HMP Coldingley

Dear Readers

I have been asked if I would like to write a short article about what it is like to practise, grow in, or even find our faith in prison. It is a pleasure to be able to write for you.

Firstly I never thought I would ever end up in prison but, having ended up here, I have seen and experienced just how easy it is to actually end up incarcerated. There have been, and continue to be, some very tough times.

Though I had faith to an extent before coming to prison, having grown up in a fairly religious family and regularly going to church in my younger years - and even serving as an altar boy - I grew sceptical of how and why so much wrong-doing could be done to myself and others if God was everpresent. Through coming to prison I have been able to re-kindle that flame and grow in faith. The time has been used to help me see, and establish, a better relationship with Jesus and deal with situations in prison safely in the knowledge

that He is by my side and my witness to all.

Though I wouldn't wish anybody to be in prison - it can be, and often is, a truly nasty place - I have to thank God for all the lessons I have learnt, the time I have had, the people I have met and being able to go to chapel each week and participate in Mass and receive the Blessed Sacrament.

I have learnt so much about myself and others and have overcome difficulties, enabling me to do and be better with God's help.

I'm thankful to all the volunteers who come into the prison each week and all the chaplaincy staff who assist us in many ways, but especially in finding, maintaining and growing in faith.

The one thing we have plenty of in prison is time, and it is the most precious and immeasurable element of all. How we choose to spend it can make a huge difference in our lives and all that is to come.


