Good Shepherd Celebrations at Worth Abbey



SCHOOLS from across the Diocese of Arundel and Brighton attended the annual Good Shepherd Liturgy on Wednesday 19 June, in celebration of the good works we do in our Catholic schools for Missio 'children helping children.'

This year, we were responding to Pope Francis' call for us all to think of others before ourselves and carry out our duty in fulfilling the wishes of Jesus to feed all who are hungry.

The theme for our celebration was 'we are bread for the world'.
Pope Francis wrote:

'Poverty in the world is a scandal. In a world where there is so much wealth, so many resources to feed everyone, it is unfathomable that there are so many hungry children, so many children without an education, so many poor persons.

We all have to think about how we can become a little poorer, in order to help the poor; all of us have to do this.'

During the Lenten season, all our schools were asked to assist those in need by supporting Missio through prayer and collections.

The Good Shepherd Liturgy is a cele-

bration of all our schools responding to the needs of others on the request of God himself.

Schools were welcomed by St Joseph's Specialist Trust, who signed a welcoming song for all our schools to join in with.





SUMMERTIME means activity and enthusiasm, as we realise the plans of winter during the warm sunny days. This edition records particularly the involvement of A&B youth in a variety of activities.

Diocesan primary pupils met at Worth Abbey and demonstrated in a practical way that they care for other children who do not have enough to eat by collecting £10,203 for the Missio children's charity.

In London, A&B youth were well represented in the largest-ever environmental lobby of Parliament, reminding us that the Holy Father has called for profound interior conversion, to renew our relationships with God, one another, and the created world.

Meanwhile, senior schools were enjoying the natural world, on pilgrimage in the Arundel estate, through thick woods, past rolling pastures and up gentle hills, pausing occasionally for prayers and reflection.

Elsewhere, the work of SVP volunteers was recognised and blessed, women throughout Europe met to consider issues, including Laudato si and the role of women and as usual we report on volunteers and clergy who continue to serve and impress.

JUST A THOUGHT

FEW, I hope not irreverent, thoughts Aon the Gospel readings for August. The highlight is, of course, the Feast of the Assumption of Our Blessed Lady into Heaven; but this wonderful happening is recorded in a very low key and matter of fact way! None of the drama and excitement which attends the Ascension of Our Blessed Lord recorded a few weeks ago. We have to go back to just before the birth of Jesus to record Mary's great prayer 'The Magnificat'.

Then there is the feeding of the five thousand. Since my early childhood I have always seen this incident as a sort of glorious picnic on the beach. I've often wondered what became of the twelve baskets of leftovers. How wonderful if we could find some miraculous way to feed today's millions of starving

It is easy to identify with the human failings of St Peter. In stormy seas, when Jesus comes walking on the water and tells Peter to walk on the sea to Him, Peter starts out but soon loses faith and starts to sink. Jesus takes his hand saying 'Oh ye of little faith'. Later, Peter has another opportunity to profess his faith in Jesus and this time his answer leads to Jesus saying 'Thou art Peter and upon this rock I will build my Church'... which has led to 2,000 years of clarifications of dogma, addressing heresies, encyclicals, etc. and, this year, Pope Francis enabled reconsideration of the final words of The Lord's Prayer.


Celebrations in St Leonards...

Lady Mary Augusta Fox was the wife of Henry Fox, 4th Baron Holland, who was a nephew of Charles James Fox, a Whig MP. The couple, who lived much of the time in Italy, converted to Catholicism and had a chapel built in their Surrey property of St Ann's Hill.

We were allowed access to the chapel (pictured left) in order to celebrate Mass and, in the two hours prior to this, the public were given permission to visit it.

Lady Holland is buried in the chapel as her will stated that she was not to be placed underground.

On the day there were 19 of us, inside and out of the chapel, who took part in the Mass.

We were blessed with good weather and could take advantage of the gardens as well as appreciate the beauty of this tiny place of worship.

New Stained Glass Window at St Peter's in Hove



INSTIGATED BY THE UNION OF CATHOLIC MOTHERS, the parishioners of St Peter's Church in Hove decided that its recent Centenary should be commemorated by the installation of new stained-glass in the west window.

After some initial hesitation a special fund was established without detriment to our usual fund-raising for our regular chosen charities. Most of the necessary money was raised and fundraising for the relatively small residue continues.

Following the parishioners' agreement, Deborah Forsdyke produced a series of designs for the parishioners to choose from.

They did. It was the portrayal of Peter and Andrew in their boat on the



Tiberian Sea surrounded by an unseen shoal of fish – the shoal that the Risen Lord instructed them to catch by casting their nets into the deep on the other side.

David Worland of Silver Stained Glass subsequently made and installed the window and on Saturday 1 June the window was slowly unveiled in a celebratory Mass with Fr Alexander Lucie-Smith (PP) joined on this occasion by his predecessor, Fr Jerry O'Brien, and with a packed congregation including many representatives of neighbouring Anglican and Methodist Churches and the Brighton and Hove Inter-Faith Contact Group.

As the unveiling began the very strong evening sunshine poured through the window and provoked gasps of admiration from the congregation. Reaction was almost uniformly positive - 'lovely', 'superb', 'really amazing' – with just one recorded cautionary 'but it won't increase numbers though will it?'

In his address, Fr Jerry asked us look at the window regularly and remember that the apostles cast out into the deep one last time - in spite of their weariness and discouragement - simply because Jesus asked them to. This was a lesson for us all: may we act with the faith they showed.






This year's theme was 'Be a Saint'. The day began with a pilgrimage walk through the beautiful and calming Arundel Castle grounds.

Tower House Activity

Tower House is now in its second year and runs a memory café, activity groups, and provides lunches to its guests, mostly people with cognitive decline, and their carers.

SVP volunteer Peter Cropp and his wife Jo have many years of voluntary experience between them and were influential in the establishment of the cen-

Peter says: 'I have been an SVP



member for almost 60 years, and I visit people in their homes, offering friendship and support. With so many people we visited needing companionship and being stuck in their houses, too frail to go out, we thought why not establish a Centre where people can come together and talk and make friends with each other.

A Special Place

Doreen, an older lady with memory decline, and her daughter and carer Karen, have recently started coming to Tower House to enjoy the activities. Doreen says: 'I love talking to other people, and I enjoy sharing interests with them.' This is really what Tower House is about, and what makes it such a special place.

A former professional designer with a creative streak, Doreen tells me: 'I enjoyed the painting group' hosted by Tower House.

SVP Projects Assistant Sarah King works at Tower House and, together with other SVP staff members, hosted a banquet in celebration of their volunteers.

Memories & Reminiscences

During the meal, Frances, one of the volunteers at Tower House said: 'Because I'm older too, it's nice to be able to relate to many of the memories our guests chat about. Brighton used to have a dance hall where I would often spend an evening. It's lovely to reminisce with our guests about their similar experiences and allow them to relive happy memories that haven't faded.

Elizabeth (pictured left) is another volunteer at Tower House. She says that she is less busy than she used to be and enjoys volunteering every fortnight because it gives her time some structure.

Elizabeth says: 'I really look forward to coming here and meeting the guests. It's so meaningful. Many of the guests may have memory problems, they forget our names, but you can tell by the way they smile that they recognise us.'

Community Shop

As well as the volunteers at Tower House, the SVP also depends on volunteers for the St Vincent's Community Shop on Lewes Road.

Katrine is a volunteer at the Community Shop and says: 'I had to give up my healthcare job because of my own health problems. I really wanted to volunteer in a shop, and St Vincent's appealed. Not only had I learnt about St Vincent de Paul, Patron Saint of the poor, at school in France, but I also felt the St Vincent's shop was most ethical

because it was more affordable, and because the staff were very inclusive and welcoming.

Caroline also volunteers at St Vincent's Community shop and says: 'By volunteering I feel part of the community. I'm 67 and retired, so it allows me to keep my skills and alertness up to scratch. I love chatting to the customers and it's very rewarding.

The result was spectacular, a beautiful garden has been restored, providing a place of tranquillity and beauty for all to



Andante Conference 2019

Sharing a European Perspective with Women in the Church



S THE DIOCESAN LINK report-A STHE DIOCESTAL AND THE MINE THE NECESTAL AND THE NECEST diocese I would like to share some news of the work of Catholic women around Europe and at home.

European News

I attended Andante conference 'Women in the Church Make the Difference', in Romania from April 24 to 29. The European Alliance of Catholic Women's Organisations (Andante) was founded in 2006 and for the past several years has been co-chaired by Mary McHugh from England.

This was my second attendance. In 2018 I attended as an observer. This year I attended as an executive member of the NBCW and was able to put forward and vote on three future topics NBCW would like Andante to work on for the next three years.

The topics chosen on behalf of the board (in no particular order) were: Trafficking of women and violence against women; Developing women to achieve their full potential in society and in church; and Laudato Si and the role of women - implementation of Laudato Si, particularly how it affects women and the family.

The different perspectives of those attending from across Europe were reflected in the four keynote talks.

We had a talk on the historical roles played by women in the formation and development of the church, up to and including Vatican 2.

Prof. Tina Beattie from Roehampton spoke on The Future Church - a home to hope for, looking at what is 'home' and referring to Laudato Si and the need for new forms of language to include women.



From Rome, Zuzanna Flisowska, the General Manger of Voices of Faith spoke of strategies for promoting women's inclusion through leadership in the worldwide church.

There was an ecumenical perspective from a pastor from the Reformed Church of Romania with interesting initiatives such as psalm singing in a mother and baby group.

A number of workshops were given on spirituality, dance, writing blessings etc. I gave a workshop in my role as a Catholic Voice on How to defend the faith without raising your voice (see above). But my highlight was to discover that the Carmelite monastery in Snagov where we stayed had its church decorated with icons by the Slovenian Jesuit Marko Rupnik, and to have a tour of these. I've loved his work since seeing his icon for the Year of Mercy.

I was invited to a workshop on a new course from Together for the Common Good, devised by Jenny Sinclair, building on the work of her late father Anglican Bishop David Shepherd and Derek Worlock Bishop of Liverpool.

Saint of the Month St John Vianney - 'Curé d'Ars' **Patron Saint of Parish Priests**

JEAN-BAPTISTE-MARIE Vianney was born into a farming family in Dardilly, France (near Lyons) in 1786. Growing up in the anti-clerical Terror phase of the French revolution, he saw **priests as heroes** – they worked in secret or faced execution. At the age of 20, after the Catholic Church had been re-established in France. Jean went to study at a 'presbytery school' as he did not have the level of education required for admittance to a seminary He struggled to learn Latin but was eventually ordained a priest in 1815 after the Vicar General had been persuaded that his great piety made up for his lack of academic qualifications.

In 1818 Jean was appointed parish priest (Curé) of Ars sur Formans, a post he held until his death 41 years later. Ars at that time was a village of about 320 inhabitants where attending Sunday Mass was not a common feature of village life but where he soon made an impact. The new Curé was tireless in ministering to his parish and was said to have remarkable powers of healing and clairvoyance. Time

and again people who met him, even hardened sceptics, said that when he looked into their eyes, he could see right into their hearts and knew exactly what was troubling them before they even spoke.

Word soon spread, particularly the Curé's reputation as a Confessor, and people travelled from far afield to meet him, queuing for hours to make their Confession.

It reached the point where Fr Vianney was spending 12 hours a day in the **confessional**, even longer in summer, and the railway station in Lyons had to open a separate booking office for people travelling to Ars as there would be 300-400 visitors a day.

John Vianney died in 1859 aged 73 and was canonized in 1925. In 2009, Pope Benedict XVI, commemorating the 150th anniversary of St. John Vianney's death, declared the Year for Priests. The Pope wrote a Letter to Clergy, encouraging all priests to look to the Curé of Ars as an example of dedication to one's priestly calling.

TAXING TERMS (EXPLAINED)

Quoting from the First Letter of Paul to Timothy (1 Tim 2:4), the Catechism (CCC74) states 'God desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.

The Gospel was handed on in two ways: through written Sacred Scripture under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit; and through the living transmission of the apostles, their preaching, their examples and the institutions they created what we call Tradition - also through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit.

Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition have the same divine source, and the Church is entrusted with the transmission and interpretation of that Revela-

The bishops, as successors to the apostles, inherited their teaching authority and the Magisterium of the **Church** is the teaching office of the Church, composed of a pope, the bishops or the bishops in union with the pope.

Teaching happens in two ways: Solemn (or Extraordinary) magisterium - used rarely, mainly for formal and dogmatic definitions by coun-

cils or Popes teaching ex cathedra. Examples include the Creed, teachings

on the Sacraments, Papal encyclicals on The Immaculate Conception' (1849) and 'Defining the Dogma of the Assumption'

The magisterium gives an authentic interpretation of the Word of God, whether in Sacred Scripture or in Sacred Tradition. Importantly, it is not superior to the Word of God but is its servant (CCC85-86).

Ordinary (and universal) magisterium – This is the universal

practice of the Church concerning definitive teaching on faith or morals, communicated by the Pope or the bishops with the Pope.

Examples include papal encyclicals not written in 'ex cathedra' form, various pronouncements such as the illicitness of euthanasia, prostitution, contraception, the reservation of priestly ordination to men etc.

The teachings of both the solemn and the ordinary magisterium are to be firmly accepted and held when they are either truths taught as divinely revealed (dogma) or definitively proposed statements on

matters closely connected with revealed truth.

For the magisterium's ordinary teaching on faith or morals, the faithful 'are to adhere to it with religious assent...which, though distinct from the assent of faith, is nonetheless an extension of it.' (CCC 892). This is also referred to as 'a religious assent of mind and will' by Lumen Gentium (LG25).

Blessed John Henry Newman to be Canonised

ON THIRTEENTH OCTOBER 2019, DV, Cardinal Newman will be raised to the Altars.

He will be the first English person who has lived since the 17th century to be officially recognised as a saint by the Catholic Church.

We will report on the proceedings in a

later edition and on how the news was received by the two schools in our diocese that are named after him:

- Cardinal Newman Secondary School, Hove, and

- Cardinal Newman Primary School, Hersham.

Fr Leon Writes...



R LEON PEREIRA OP is chaplain to the English-speaking pilgrims in Medjugorje.

Brought up in Singapore, Fr Leon first went on pilgrimage to Medjugorje in 1991 as a 20 year old, and experienced what he believed to be an encounter with the Blessed Virgin.

After five years training to be a medical doctor in England, he decided to become a Dominican Priest and, after several more years in England, found himself back in Medjugorje - testifying

supernatural experience. In this and subsequent editions of A&B News we will share Fr Leon's responses to some of the objections about Medjugorje.

Why Should I Follow as Yet Unapproved Messages?

This is the question that troubles most Catholics. It is one thing to follow an approved private revelation, but what if it has not yet been approved?

Remember a **private revelation** can only tell us what to do for our own time, to direct our actions. Part of the process of discerning whether an apparition is authentic or not involves assessing the fruits of the phenomenon, assessing how people respond to this message and what this response does. So engaging in a yet unapproved message is part of discerning its authenticity.

There is necessarily a delay between the beginning of an apparition and its eventual approval (or condemnation). Time is

needed to discern, as well as the experience of the Faithful and their response to the apparition.

The apparitions at **Lourdes** happened in 1858, but the local bishop approved of the phenomena in 1862. If people had waited for Lourdes to be approved before going to the grotto of Massabielle, they would not have been part of the reason for the local bishop's approval. He acknowledged that the apparitions

'are supernatural and divine, and that by consequence, what [Bernadette] saw was the Most Blessed Virgin. Our convictions are based on the testimony of [Bernadette], but above all on the things that have happened, things which can be nothing other than divine intervention... such as the conversion of sinners, ...miraculous cures, and... the enormous crowds of the faithful who come spontaneously to the Grotto. who have not ceased to come ever since the first Appearances and whose purpose is to ask for blessings or to give thanks for those already received.

The apparitions at **Fátima** began in 1917, but the local bishop approved of the phenomena in 1930. If people had waited for Fátima to be approved before going to the Cova da Iria, then 70,000 people would not have witnessed the miracle of the sun. The bishop declared the children's visions 'as worthy of belief' and permitted devotion to Our Lady of Fátima. His reasons for this approval include the vast number of witnesses to the solar miracle, conversions, healings, and 'multitudes in their thousands... coming from the four corners of the land... [who] make their way en masse to Fátima.

At Lourdes and Fátima, the presence and experience of pilgrims even before approval had been granted was part of the reason for the subsequent approval! Therefore, the response of the Faithful is one of the reasons given for the eventual approval of an apparition, to see if the fruit it bears is truly of the Holy Spirit.
