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'My Father is Glorified When You Bear Much Fruit'

MORE THAN 70 PEOPLE GATHERED at DABCEC on Saturday March 1 to celebrate their study of theology, catechesis and Religious Education. The celebration was organised by the Adult Formation Commission to show how much the diocese values those who undertake such study, and to provide a forum to discuss how the diocese can support and encourage those who feel the call to further study.

Attendees were welcomed with coffee and biscuits and there was much animated chatter as old friends caught up with each other. A short liturgy opened the formal part of the day. A Bible, the Catechism of the Catholic Church, Divine Office and a biblical commentary were carried to the altar as symbols of our studies.

We then gathered in small groups and shared the ways in which our studies had 'borne fruit.' Dr Kate Williamson, then presented an overview of Adult Formation in the diocese since the 1980's, noting the much greater involvement of the laity, and expressing gratitude to Brighton University for their support in setting up the CCRS and Diploma courses in Religious Education which Kate delivered and taught over a 16 years period, and which for six years was developed into a degree course in Christian theology.

Participants were then encouraged to offer their own reflections in discussion with Bishop Kieran. In his own thoughts and reflections in particular he emphasised the centrality of Baptism - both in giving us the responsibility to be missionaries for God and making sense of what the Church teaches. The teachings of the Church are there to help us and those we work with to live out our Baptism rather than a set of rules where 'don'ts; loom large.

The celebration closed with Mass followed by a shared lunch.

It was very inspiring to see so many people from across the diocese who had committed themselves to a course, or courses, of religious study. Many thanks to Sue Petritz and David Wills for organising the day, and to Bishop Kieran for joining us.

Special thanks to Kate Williamson for playing such a pivotal role in developing religious study within the diocese over many years. This day demonstrated very clearly the real difference the various R. E. courses offered have made to the lives of many Arundel & Brighton Catholics.

A personal reflection from Harry Robertson, Sacred Heart parish, Hove

The invitation was brief...'Calling all who have studied theology, catechesis or RE at Certificate, Diploma or Degree level...join Bishop Kieran, Dr Kate Williamson and your fellow students/graduates...in prayer, conversation and celebration.'

About 75 of us assembled in Crawley on 1 March, wondering what we had let ourselves in for. Then Dr Kate Williamson took the floor. She spoke of the need to share our heritage, the historical understanding and development of the faith. Focusing on adult formation, she mentioned the renaissance provided by Vatican II, the yeoman spadework of the Bishops' Commission of England & Wales, and the fruit of initiatives like RENEW, launched in A&B diocese a few years back.

This success has bred a new generation of catechists – with a higher proportion of men than heretofore - who contribute much to parish life. However, the parish community model can be limiting and inward-looking. Also, the impetus may be faltering and it is time for new beginnings, for another springtime in the diocese.

Kate's prescription was to establish 'ring-fenced' spaces in which people can reflect on their faith, together with a structure to pass on the knowledge and understanding of that faith. This structure should use forms of communications that persuade rather than instruct, that rely on informed consent rather than obedience, and that lead to an infectious joy in living and sharing Christ's message - rather than merely undertaking a half-hearted duty.

The audience then discussed the proposal and reported back to Dr. Kate and Bishop Kieran on their conclusions. There were a number of interesting ideas but, the two key themes that struck

me were open discussion of the faith, and a less jargon filled language for debate

and sharing. The meeting potentially foreshadows some exciting times if we are bold enough to meet the challenge. The faith, grounded in truth and tradition, has no fear of debate. As Jesus said (John 8:32) ...know the truth, and the truth will make you free.' Roll on the springtime of adult formation.

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


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'in the footsteps of St Augustine'



A Quick Journey Through the Bible (A participants reflection)

 $T^{\rm HE}$ COURSE is informative and valuable and it is specifically aimed at those new to Bible Study, who perhaps like me, have never felt capable of actually understanding a lot of their Bible and therefore have never tried to.

It is wonderfully designed concentrating on fourteen of the narrative books of the Bible and the twelve major time periods of salvation history. I discovered all the major people, places, events and themes of the Bible and also studied the six covenants God made with humanity, leading to the establishment of the Catholic Church.

The Student Workbook and Bible Timeline Chart, which you take away with you, proves an invaluable tool to the novice, as you begin to study your bible on your own, it is, if you like, a fool's guide to help you as the story develops, enabling you to know what to look for and who to concentrate on. The Timeline specifically is really useful before Mass providing reference to which period of history the readings are from and their reference.

For me, this course was the best seven hours I have spent in a long time, and I would strongly recommend it as I now have the tools to begin a 90 Day Bible Study programme at home.

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

Another chance to prepare for the Diocesan Jubilee

Last Autumn, the Diocese began the second season of Jubilee preparations with a look at the Word of God. The guiding document for this reflection was the Constitution on Divine Revelation (Dei Verbum). The sessions were based on the six chapters of this document and subheadings that are found within these chapters.



What follows is a brief summary in which some really significant statements from the document are reprinted *(numbered as in the document)* together with comments from the presenters. It is hoped that even if you were not able to participate in a group, this article will give you a flavour. It might also inspire you to make some further enquiries, maybe even joining a group for the third season.

Purpose of Revelation

2. In His goodness and wisdom God chose to reveal Himself and to make known to us the hidden purpose of His will by which through Christ, the Word made flesh, man might in the Holy Spirit have access to the Father and come to share in the divine nature.

Fr Graffy: Revelation is God beginning a conversation with us calling us to communion, and that revelation takes place through the deeds of God in history and also through the words God has spoken.

Christ's place in Revelation

4. To see Jesus is to see His Father (John 14:9). For this reason Jesus perfected revelation by fulfilling it through his whole work of making Himself present and manifesting Himself: through His words and deeds, His signs and wonders, but especially through His death and glorious resurrection from the dead and final sending of the Spirit of truth.

Michelle Moran; Central to God's revelation is Jesus Christ, in him the entire revelation of God is summed up, that's what the document tells us. So in a sense God has no other word to speak, he has spoken definitively and for all time in Jesus; the word who is life.

Tradition

7. ...But in order to keep the Gospel forever whole and alive within the Church, the Apostles left bishops as their successors, 'handing over' to them 'the authority to teach in their own place.'

Bishop Kieran: Tradition, as our speakers will make clear, is the way something is handed on and in this case the 'something' is God's self revelation. Tradition was in fact instrumental in the formulation of the body of Scripture as we have it. Because, at the very beginning the Church had to decide what was authentic and what wasn't; what should be included in the Bible and what should not.

8. This tradition which comes from the Apostles develops in the Church with the help of the Holy Spirit.

Scripture & Tradition

9. Hence there exists a close connection and communication between sacred tradition and Sacred Scripture. For both of them, flowing from the same divine wellspring, in a certain way merge into a unity and tend toward the same end.

Inspiration

11. ...both the Old and New Testaments in their entirety, with all their parts, are sacred and canonical because written under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, they have God as their author and have been handed on as such to the Church herself.

Bishop Kieran:...the human writers themselves had to reflect profoundly and at length on what they thought was the truth they were expressing. It is the word of God but expressed in a way that respects the freedom and the skills of the human author.

Interpretation

12. To search out the intention of the sacred writers, attention should be given, among other things, to 'literary forms.' For truth is set forth and expressed differently in texts which are variously historical, prophetic, poetic, or of other forms of discourse.

Michelle Moran: Those who have been entrusted with a teaching office in the Church, the role of the Magisterium, are guided by the Lord. With the help of the Holy Spirit, the Magisterium listens to the word of God devotedly, guards it with dedication, and expounds it faithfully...to really understand how everything fits together we need to reflect upon the sacred scriptures, read and reflected upon in the light of the tradition of the

Old Testament

14. In carefully planning and preparing the salvation of the whole human race the God of infinite love, by a special dispensation, chose for Himself a people to whom He would entrust His promises.

Bishop Kieran: We must also remember too that the Old Testament texts were the Scriptures that Jesus himself was familiar with, and prayed with and referred to, and, through it, in the fullness of his humanity, came to understand his relationship with the Father and his mission to the world.

New Testament

18. It is common knowledge that among all the Scriptures, even those of the New Testament, the Gospels have a special pre-eminence,
19...The sacred authors wrote the four Gospels, selecting some things from the many which had been handed on by word of mouth or in writing, reducing some of them to a synthesis, explaining some things in view of the situation of their churches and preserving the form of proclamation but always in such fashion that they told us the honest truth about Jesus.
Bishop Kieran: *It was those Christian communities that produced the particular versions of the gospels that we now have, as they became aware of the need to write down the stories because the Church was growing and original eyewitnesses were dying.*

Other New Testament writings

20. Besides the four Gospels, the canon of the New Testament also contains the epistles of St Paul and other apostolic writings, composed under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, by which, according to the wise plan of God, those matters which concern Christ the Lord are confirmed, His true teaching is more and more fully stated, the saving power of the divine work of Christ is preached, the story is told of the beginnings of the Church and its marvellous growth, and its glorious fulfilment is foretold. Fr Graffy: *The epistles of Paul particularly show us how faith in Christ develops and how it has an impact on the various aspects of the lives of the early communities with which St Paul was involved.*

Scripture in worship

21. The Church has always venerated the divine Scriptures just as she venerates the body of the Lord...

Bishop Kieran: Scripture and liturgy go hand in hand. Many parts of Scripture indicate an original liturgical setting.

Fr Graffy: Dei Verbum speaks about the 'table of the word' alongside the table of the Eucharist, (the table of the sacrament). Perhaps the most precious thing which is stated there by Pope Benedict, with the bishops of the world, is to refer to the word of God as sacrament. It is beyond the seven sacraments but it is a real presence of God through the word which is proclaimed. So we are invited to treasure the word just as we treasure the Eucharist.

Scripture in daily life

The [Council] also earnestly and especially urges all the Christian faithful... to learn by frequent reading of the divine Scriptures the 'excellent knowledge of Jesus Christ' (Phil. 3:8). "For ignorance of the Scriptures is ignorance of Christ."

Jo Gilbert ...,part of my life involves Lectio Divina which is the prayerful reading of Scripture and that kind of reading is not reading for information, it is reading the Scripture much more for transformation, reading for salvation. It's a reading which allows the word of God to be alive and active and to penetrate and permeate my life to bring about change.

Christina's Food Waste Charity Box

WHEN CHRISTINA DAVENPORT realised she was wasting food unnecessarily she decided to do two things. A parishioner of St Mary of the Angels in Worthing and member of the Justice and Peace Group, Christina set up a Food Waste Charity Box. For every item of unused food she throws away, Christina puts 50 pence into a jar (pictured). The money collected goes to a charity such as CAFOD. While the charity will benefit initially, the ultimate idea of the project is to discourage the waste of food.

Pope Francis said that to 'throw away food is like stealing from the table of the poor and hungry'. In the UK household food waste statistics are utterly staggering: 7.2 million tonnes of food and drink are thrown out annually costing each family almost £700 a year. Individual product figures are even more mind blowing: 220,000 loaves of bread, 1.6 million bananas, 5,500 chickens, 5.1 million potatoes, 660,000 eggs, 1.2 million sausages and 1.3 million yoghurts are discarded every year in the UK, costing £10 billion (source: The Independent).



Lent is a good opportunity to stop the waste and Christina has invited everyone to join her in the challenge. Set up your own food waste charity box and see if your loose change will help change your behaviour.

Adult Formation at St Anne's in Chertsey

S T ANNE'S has been alive in promoting adult formation throughout the year. On 23 November 38 readers and ministers of Holy Communion from St Anne's Parish attended a study day held in the Savio Centre. After Mass and Exposition Fr Francis Preston SDB, a former parish priest, gave a talk on Divine Revelation. After lunch Fr Francis' second talk continued with the same theme and ended with thoughts on how Divine Revelation and the Eucharist are linked.


The parish uses the Alpha course as the initial phase of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. Our 26th Alpha course finished on 5 December. The number of people attending this time varied between 12 and 17. To date, 31 people who attended one of our Alpha courses have been baptised or received into full communion with the Church in the parish. In addition to introducing people to the Church, the Alpha course has proved to be a powerful means of parish evangelisation, renewing the faith of many existing parishioners. Recognition should be given to James and Elizabeth Wilkinson who have pioneered the Alpha programme in the parish and have built an excellent team who are all committed to sharing their faith with the enquirers.

In the context of adult formation the parish now has a brand new website due in particular to the enthusiasm and expertise of Claire Struthers. Wonersh, spoke of his recent experience in the materially very poor parish of San Benito, where the effects of industrial pollution and lack of basic amenities, such as clean running water have a dramatic effect on everyday life. Appreciating the generous hospitality he received, he did however have qualms when the water used to cleanse dishes was passed through a sieve and then boiled to make tea.

We explored the area in photos and a video and learned how many women in San Benito have to bring up their children on their own. Husbands are absent for varying reasons; they might be doing seasonal work far away, some are in prison and others are unable to cope with the responsibility of parenthood. Mothers must work to feed and clothe their children, but this is often at the cost of their children's safety and well-being.

The parish of the Nativity of the Lord aims to provide funds to equip and maintain a nursery and homework club; an invaluable service to the community which will give the children of San Benito the chance to learn and develop in a safe environment.

There was a challenging quiz, interrupted by servings of papas papas (papas means potatoes in Quetcha), spicy chicken and quinoia salad. There was a raffle and the chance to purchase FairTrade Peruvian crafts. The proceeds, £850, are being sent off as soon as possible.



OBITUARIES MGR CANON GEOFFREY SCOTT

FR JEFF was born in Leeds, Yorkshire on 17 January 1945. He put his conversion down to a visit to Notre Dame in Paris. Fr Ken McCarthy who was parish priest of Langley Green instructed and received him as a Catholic and said that bound up with this was a calling to priesthood.

Ordination to priesthood was on 31 May 1979, this was followed by studies in Canon Law, Ottawa where he gained the LCL and MCL. These he put to good use in

GIFT AID – HAVEN'T WE DONE WELL

SELF-CONGRATUALTION is always a tricky route to follow in life, but when Her Majesty – in the form of her tax-collecting officers at the Inland Revenue – says 'well done', maybe we can do that pat on the back without embarrassment or fear of criticism from onlookers. So, if you see your Gift Aid organiser perform this contortion, it is for a very good reason.



Our diocese is one of the leaders in England and Wales for the advancement of on-line Gift Aid. In a new initia-

tive, it is now possible to not only claim on a monthly basis for Gift Aid rebates but to also use the services of Internet banking. While this may not seem a great advance to the majority of A&B NEWS readers, making the transfer of donations from bank statements to the GiftWise database is, according to Sue Rickard - our Diocesan Gif Aid Coordinator 'a breeze!

While most readers of the A&B NEWS will find this an excellent moment to get up and make a cup of tea, the GiftWise initiative will give great pleasure to parish priests and school governors, as tax rebates will be received on a regular basis, rather than wait possibly 15 months under the old manual system.

The day starts with a GiftWise seminar at noon, at which the Diocesan team will give hands-on demonstrations of how this user-friendly system works. The AGM itself will start at 2.30 pm in the College's main hall, followed by Mass at 4pm celebrated by Bishop Kieran with the assistance of Fr Rick McGrath from Burgess Hill. A 'thank-you' supper will end the day for all the hard working organisers. Let's face it - the subject of Gift Aid will never set the world alight, but look a bit closer

at the statistics. Gift Aid was claimed on £4.6m of your donations, which resulted in £1.1m being repaid from the Treasury. Still not impressed? Come along to the AGM and listen for yourselves.

PASTORAL LETTER OF BISHOP KIERAN

Read at all masses on the weeknd of 1/2 March 2014, 8th Sunday of the Year

Dear brothers and sisters of Arundel & Brighton,

 $S_{\rm feeling\ well,\ but\ are\ not\ survey}^{\rm OMETIMES\ when\ you\ go\ to\ the\ doctor\ you\ just\ know\ that\ you're\ not\ feeling\ well,\ but\ are\ not\ survey}^{\rm ou\ co\ the\ survey}$ he or she can then get you to identify more precisely what the problem is. What sort of 'disease' is it - in other words, what is making you feel uneasy, what is taking away your normal feeling of ease? It's the same with counselling. A skilled counsellor will get you to identify your feelings; you're feeling bad, but is it anger, fear or regret? All these things can make us unhappy, but often it's difficult to pin the feeling down precisely without some help. And that help is enabling us to put a name either on the feeling of being unwell, or feeling bad and unhappy within ourselves.

This Lent, the Bishops' Conference of England & Wales is publishing material to help people either re-connect with the

Sacrament of Reconciliation, or get to know it for the first time. The sacrament has been referred to traditionally as 'confession', but the Church has recognised that there is more to the celebration than simply the act of confessing sins. It is a rebuilding of our relationship with God and with one another.

Over the last few decades, most churches have seen a steep decline in the numbers of people taking advantage of this sacrament, and the reasons are not always clear. One of the reasons may be a

different attitude to sin. In the past there seemed to be great emphasis on sin as something that you 'did', or even thought of doing; many people confused sin with temptation and even now there is still confusion about what constitutes sin. Many adults, for instance, will confess anger as a sin, but anger is an emotional response we can't do anything about, and the Church has always taught that sin must be the deliberate and conscious carrying out of something we know to be wrong.

There may also have been a growing sense that the traditional 'penance' such as three 'Hail Marys' can't really put right something that I know to be seriously wrong, or make up for the hurt I might have caused somebody.

Sin is harmful because it does damage. It damages ourselves, it damages others, it damages the community and it damages our relationship with God. The sacrament of reconciliation helps to start repairing that damage. It helps to start, but the actual re-building of those relationships will perhaps take a long time.

While many churches have witnessed a decline in the number of adult 'confessions' there is some evidence of a growth in the numbers of young people celebrating the sacrament, especially in Rome, and probably because of the influence of Pope Francis. He has said some very helpful

things, inviting people to take a fresh look at the notion of reconciliation. While he says that confessing our sins is not to be equated with psy-

chotherapy or counselling, he does refer to the counselling principle of putting a name on our problems and difficulties. He says that children don't talk in general or vague terms, in the way that adults sometime confess to being 'uncharitable' or 'selfish'. They say precisely what they have done wrong, and recognise it for what it is. And he says that it is important to have this conversation with a priest; it has to be real. To those who say 'I can confess to God,' Pope Francis says that it's not like sending God an email; it is personal encounter. It has to be eye-to-eye contact, he says. And while it is a very private and confidential meeting with a priest, the priest represents the community of the Church, and it is the community, as well as the individual that is being healed.

The Pope uses the word 'shame' when he talks about our response to our own wrong-doing. This seems to be different from 'guilt'. Guilt is something that most of us carry around all the time, guilt for the things we have done and said and guilt for the things we have left un-done and unsaid. But shame is possibly less easy to carry around, and must be washed away. And when shame starts to close a door, Pope Francis says, confessing our shame can open that door again, the door of our relationship with others and the door of our relationship with God.

And finally, he reminds us that this is not all about ourselves, it is about God and his mercy and love for us. Celebrating the sacrament of reconciliation is giving praise to God for his goodness and unconditional acceptance of us. This is the God who became like me to save me from my sin, and one of the most immediate and real ways to experience this salvation is in the sacrament.

You don't have to remember any formula of words, or how many times you have done something wrong. The priest will help you. The Pope reminds us that the priest himself, bishops and even the Pope himself need to celebrate this sacrament. So if you haven't 'been to confession' for some time and want to discover it again, this Lent might be a good time to do it. There are even a couple of smart-phone 'apps' that you can look at; one is called simply 'Confession', I think, and the other is 'Mea culpa'. They don't allow you to confess over the phone – the Pope says it has to be person-to-person - but they might help if you have that technology.

So I hope that Lent is a fruitful season for you, that you experience change not only in the weather and the lengthening of the days, but also in the light in your heart and the warmth of your inner self, and come to Easter with a real sense of re-discovered joy in the Lord.

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




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
