IT IS IMPORTANT TO CONFRONT FAITH AND SOLUTIONS' so one participant reflected of the The Churches Together in Surrey Forum held in March. And so the whole day did just that. The Forum met at St Dunstan's church in Woking and was attended by almost 80 people from different denominations from across Surrey and beyond.

A brilliant array of speakers looked at the changing face of Surrey and how Christians could respond.

The scene for the day was set by Revd Professor Andrew Bradsock, Secretary for Church and Society at the United Reformed Church.

He pointed out that for many it is a matter of surprise and concern that churches speak out on public issues. He asks 'do they think that being 'Churches' means we lock ourselves away to sing hymns and say prayers with no concern about what's happening outside our gates?' At root he says there is a failure on the part of many in the media and elsewhere – whether wilful or otherwise – to recognise that the Christian gospel is about showing, yes God's love for all who are in need, but also God's deep concern for justice, for an end to those factors which keep people from enjoying life in all its fullness.

There followed talks by Chris How on the working of Credit Unions. Some people found this particularly useful. One person described the talk by Revd Kevin O'Brien, Rector of St John the Evangelist Church of England, Burgess Hill as 'inspiring'. He spoke about the community Food Bank in Burgess Hill. Many other participants were also inspired by him and said that they had learned a lot. Robert, of yoursanctuary.org.uk, then spoke about the topical subject of domestic violence, which for some listeners was a new experience. Jane Seals spoke about Christians Against Poverty, which again was a new field of exploration for many. One particularly impressive comment was 'It is great that the churches are working together.

The day had opened with a time of worship and the participants were welcomed by Bishop Kieran and concluded with an open session with Rt Rev Jonathan Clark, Bishop of Croydon and Professor Bradstock.

An Easter message from Bishop Kieran

 Γ IRST OF ALL I WANT to wish you all a Happy Easter, all fifty days of it, taking us up to Pentecost and the completion of the Easter mysteries with the sending of the Holy Spirit.

And I want to repeat something I said in my pastoral letter of the Second Sunday of Easter at the end of April, about those who have been 'received into the Church' recently. For many this has been the end of a long journey that in some cases has taken not only years but tens of years. When I met some of the candidates (as they were then) at the Rite of Election at the beginning of Lent, they spoke of their joy and enthusiasm at finally arriving at their goal, even though they knew this was not the end of a journey, but the beginning of a new one.

For a number of them, however, that journey will not go very far forward, and by this time next year they will have stopped coming to church. Why this will be we will probably never know, because we will have no opportunity to ask them

But it does face the rest of us with a challenge. Why will they become so disillusioned with the Church? What is wrong with us they we don't offer what they are looking for? Indeed why do so many of our 'cradle Catholics' also drift away from the Church?

We need to ensure that our parish communities do what they implicitly claim, that they do indeed preach the gospel, that

they reach out to the poor, the lame, the blind and the sick, that they echo the words of Jesus, quoting Isaiah: 'He sent me to bring the good news to the poor, to proclaim liberty to captives, and to the blind new sight, to set the downtrodden free.'

Look around for the downtrodden, the poor, those held captive in so many ways. If we are not doing this then this is not the Church people hoped they were joining. If we are smugly simply looking after ourselves, then we do not deserve to attract new members. Let's actually provide what we promise.

Peace - the Way of St Francis

Each summer the Diocese of Arundel and Brighton organises an ecumenical walk to a place, shrine or area exploring a particular theme or aspect of our faith and Christian heritage. What we rediscover, year after year, is the amazing personal and community value of going on a pilgrimage as our medieval forebears did, where the journey, walking, laughing, sharing, praying, singing, etc. is as important as the destination. We

stop at a pub for lunch and sleep on the floors of church, school or community halls. We try to walk on footpaths not roads.

Our 2014 Pilgrimage takes us from Liverpool to Carlisle through the Lake District. Our theme reflects the centenary of the outbreak of the first world war, and the new Pope's choice L NORM of Francis for his name; what can St Francis of Assisi teach us JOIN about Peace? Each day we worship together as a Christian community, journeying together and growing together in

Christ-centred friendships. We stop to pray in the churches we pass, many of which are of architectural and historical interest, and all of which bring us into contact with the communities we are passing through. **SAT 9**TH -

Memories of St Maur's Convent School, Weybridge DOZEN PRIESTS from around the diocese, led by parish

DOZEN PRIESTS from around the diocese, led by parish priest Fr Con Foley, concelebrated Mass at Christ the Prince of Peace, Weybridge, in remembrance and thanksgiving for the work of the Sisters of the Infant Jesus. The Sisters first came to Weybridge in 1898 and founded St Maur's Convent School. During the Mass there were presentations by Fr Jude McHugo CJ from the Josephite community at nearby St George's College and Sr Kitty Ellard, Provincial Leader of the Infant Jesus community in England/Ireland. Together, with great wit and personal knowledge, they outlined the history of the Sisters' time in Weybridge from 1898 to 2012, and the enormous contribution they made to education and parish life. At the end of Mass, Canon Tom Treherne (until recently parish priest at Weybridge) blessed a memorial plaque (pictured), beautifully carved by a parishioner, Barry Hansford.

In a social gathering afterwards, priests, sisters, past pupils & staff, and parishioners from all over Arundel & Brighton exchanged happy memories and gave thanks for the wonderful years of devoted service by the Sisters. Fittingly, the event took place on 7 March, the anniversary of the beatification of Blessed Nicolas Barré, founder of the Infant Jesus Congregation.

The plaque reads: The parishioners of Christ the Prince of Peace and former staff and pupils of St Maur's Convent School offer their heartfelt thanks to the Sisters of the Infant Jesus for their dedicated service to the parish and the school from 1898 – 2012. 'God guides you along the way that leads to Him' Blessed Nicolas Barré


THIS MONTH BRINGS TOGETHER several different elements in the life of the

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JUST A THOUGHT

ALLELUIA IS OUR SONG

ON A PILGRIMAGE to Turkey from my parish we discovered a wonderful wall painting in a small church. It shows Christ standing over the broken gates of the underworld. He is full of life and dynamism. His strong hands are pulling Adam and Eve out of the prison of their graves. There is a sense of power and light as he dispels darkness and

On the feet of Jesus are still the marks of the nails. In a way he stands before us as a 'Marked Man'. He stands before us strong and risen and yet with the marks of suffering on his hands, his feet and his side. However, these marks are no longer negative marks of suffering, anxiety or death. They are marks of glory, because by his resurrection they have been healed and transformed. They are the marks of the triumph of God's power over death and suffering.

Easter is about newness. The risen Jesus announces a new spring of hope and indestructible life. The Easter liturgy proclaims 'By his wounds we are healed'. For this reason we are joyful. That is why we can make the words of Blessed Pope John Paul II (soon to be canonised) real in our lives because by our calling and baptism 'We are an Easter People and Alleluia is our song'.

PASTORAL LETTER of BISHOP KIERAN CONRY

To be read at all Masses on the weekend of 26/27 April 2014

Dear Brothers and Sisters of Arundel & Brighton,

TF YOU LIVE ANYWHERE NEAR CHICHESTER, (or even if Lyou don't), I would recommend that you visit the Pallant Picture Gallery there before 15 June. That's the final date of an exhibition of paintings done by Stanley Spencer. The paintings have been temporarily removed from the chapel they were originally painted for while the chapel is being refurbished.

The paintings all represent scenes from Spencer's experiences during the First World War. Spencer was not fit enough to fight in the trenches and so enrolled in the Royal Army Medical Corps; the pictures reflect his experiences in a hospital near Bristol and also on the front in Macedonia. He saw fighting first-hand and its results in the hospital, but his pictures are remarkably peaceful and radiate hope. Many of them are explicitly religious, and depict quite mundane and ordinary activities; titles include 'Scrubbing floors', 'Filling tea-urns' and 'Bedmaking'. In the last of these, one of the hospital orderlies is stretching a sheet out, and the obvious reference is to the outstretched arms of Christ on the cross.

In these paintings, Spencer expresses hope in the midst of war and that hope is in the resurrection, even where death is violent and cruel, and the result of humanity's own foolishness and aggression. That same hope in the resurrection is explicit in another of his paintings in Tate Britain in London. It is called 'The Resurrection at Cookham'. Cookham was his home village, and the painting shows his friends and neighbours waking from their sleep of death in the graveyard by the church, under the eyes of God and the saints, and recognising not just one another, but their new situation. They then make their way down to the River Thames and board a pleasure boat to sail off to a place of eternal peace.

But the paintings in Chichester suggest something more than just hope. They suggest that redemption, the experience of resurrection – new life – is to be found in ordinary and mundane things. Things like making the bed and washing the floor. It is in ordinary, daily experiences like this we recognise the new life that Christ has given us. The orderlies in the paintings are serving soldiers who have suffered both physically and mentally, and it is a wonderfully Christ-like gesture to ensure that the urns are ready for tea or that bread is buttered.

In today's gospel, we have the well-known – too well-known – story of poor 'doubting Thomas' and how he missed Jesus' first appearance to the other disciples. On that occasion, John's gospel tells how the disciples were 'filled with joy' when Jesus appeared in their midst. Thomas does not have that same experience; instead he has the rather embarrassing experience of having to prove it for himself in a very physical and even unpleasant way, as Jesus invites him to put his hand into the wound in his side. So again the resurrection experience comes down to something very basic and ordinary. It is not a blinding flash of recognition that the disciples on the road to Emmaus had when Jesus broke the bread at table. It is looking at holes in a man's hands.

It is a sad and challenging fact that a number of those who have been received into full communion with the Catholic Church last week may not be with us next year. Often it's just because the experience of Church is something of an anti-climax; it promised to be exciting, but it's not. Sometimes it's because they haven't felt particularly welcomed, and this is the challenge to all of us. But it



may also be a mirror of our own experience of Easter, that it is all something of an anti-climax. We have five weeks of Lent to prepare, and then suddenly it's all over and we feel just the same as before.

Spencer didn't paint heroic acts of courage when he painted war. Nor did he try to portray its full horrors. Instead he painted men who had suffered, and others who were looking after them. I must say I found the exhibition an incredibly uplifting experience, and one that gave me a great deal to reflect on. It speaks quietly of the resurrection as an experience of today, even the day when very little seems to be happening, or – worse – when things seem to be going from bad to worse. The triumph of Christ over suffering and death is perhaps even more relevant and important in the latter case. But it's real every day and in small and great ways. It's there in today's first reading from the Acts of the Apostles, too: 'they shared their food gladly and generously.' A small gesture, but one that points to an overpowering reality.

So I wish you a quiet and peaceful Eastertide, a time when you can find the Risen Lord in the small things of life, in the tiny gesture of kindness and in the minor disappointments that crowd our lives. When God appeared to the prophet Elijah, it was not in the mighty wind, the earthquake or the fire; it was in the gentle breeze. Find God in the small things, in making tea or beds.

I hope that you can get to see Spencer's paintings. As I say, the exhibition finishes on 15 June, and it's half-price on Tuesdays. I may even see you there myself.



A Day of Recollection for Ministers

THE DAY, prepared by Deacon John Truman, assisted by his wife Tessa, was held in St George's hall on Saturday 15 March for the Ministers of Holy Communion and the Ministers of the Word from St George's in Polegate and St Wilfrid's in Hailsham. The day began at 10am with Mass in the church; the readings were taken from Trinity Sunday. Peter Robinson played the organ and all were in good voice as we joined together for the hymns.

After Mass we adjourned to the hall for tea, coffee and biscuits before settling down to the business of the day. A candle was lit during the reading of these words, I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but have light everlasting. The theme running through the readings that followed showed how God our Father calls us all to share in the Ministry of the Church according to our gifts.(1 Peter 2:9; Ezekiel 2: 1-7; Ezekiel 3: 8-9). We also read passages in the Bible assuring us of God's promise that the Holy Spirit would be with us in our ministry, even giving us the words we needed to proclaim the Gospel. Several of us had brought Bibles of different translations and it was interesting to hear how, though recounting the same scripture, the manner in which other words were used to project the same message.

We then adjourned for a picnic lunch together with tea and coffee provided by St George's community, for which we were most grateful.

In the afternoon session firstly, we each read through two documents written by Pope Francis: Christ Himself Comforts Us in Anointing of the Sick; and Pope Francis' Ash Wednesday Message. Individually we reflected on the words of our Holy Father in both papers; the Sacrament of the Sick should be used not only for those who are dying but also for the sick and brings them great comfort when the priest takes the place of Christ, using his hands to anoint those who are sick.

Pope Francis reminds us that Lent is a time for prayer, fasting and abstinence. Intense prayer should lead us to think of the sufferings of others throughout the world; fasting should not be just an exercise but a means of sharing with others. Through abstinence we learn to be free of what we do not need and of our sharing our possessions with those who are in need.

For a shared exercise we made two groups, St George's and St Wilfrid's. Each team had two similar notice boards, one each for Herbs from the Bible and the second for Wise Sayings from Pope Francis. Each group subdivided and so with two teams each we were tasked with: searching for 25 pictures of herbs (several copies of each) laid out on a table and also coloured card, glue and scissors and to prepare a display for our own church; and a similar exercise using quotations from Pope Francis and adding our own comments below.

What a wise and down to earth man Pope Francis is, truly aware of the plight of millions around the earth and of our need for humility and love in action for all.

The afternoon concluded with the Stations of the Cross in the church using an edition where Mary was describing the scene and her feelings at each Station but always finishing with the words 'but I knew it had to be'.

We are most grateful to Deacon John and Tessa for preparing such a beneficial day; to St George's community for their hospitality and to Peter Robinson for being our organist.

Rainbows Day **Healing the Hurt - Restoring the Hope**



TN RESPONSE to a number of schools want-Ling to become part of the Rainbows initiative, which was launched in the diocese approximately 15 years ago, the Diocesan Schools Service arranged a Day of Training on Thursday 3 April. Over 40 school staff representing their schools took part in the day which was a great effort at the end of a busy term.

Rainbows is a Bereavement Support Programme which assists young people to come to terms with a loss they have experienced, be it through death, divorce, absence or relocation. The aim is to help young people in expressing and understanding their feelings, to feel acceptance for what has happened and to feel a sense

of belonging and love. Through this process it enables them to begin to heal and look forward to a brighter future. This is accomplished through peer support groups with fully trained adult facilitators to guide them as they begin to share their experiences.

Many schools in the diocese already successfully use the Rainbows programmes and the Schools Service is keen that eventually all the schools in the diocese become Rainbows sites to give all the children in our schools the opportunity to benefit from this experience if the need

Requiem Mass for Fr Kevin Gaskin in Wadhurst

 $F^{\rm AMILY,\,PARISHIONERS\,AND\,FRIENDS}$ gathered together on Friday 21 March to offer Requiem Mass for our retired parish priest Fr Kevin Gaskin who died on Ash Wednesday after 13 years of priestly ministry to us in Wadhurst. He was taken ill with cancer almost as soon as he retired; 18 months ago.

The ceremony was a prayerful and poignant tribute to his life and human-ness. An especially moving moment was the sound of his fellow priests singing the Salve Regina after the Requiem as his coffin left the church. The Papal flag, designed by the school children (but not yet recognised by the Vatican!) flew at half mast on Fr Kevin's flagpole. As well as the symbols of his priesthood which were placed on the coffin, a wheelbarrow and trowel reminded us of his love and pride in his garden, the plastic duck a reminder of his up close and personal relationship with the ducks in his pond, but most of all the toy steam train nestling in the flowers (pictured) on his coffin reminded us of his great enthusiasm for the Bluebell line and steam trains.



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
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
lives and enjoying a real English experience. Students usually want one to one tuition, full board accommodation, some outings and activities locally and lots of conversation at meal times and when not studying.

ONE SUNDAY afternoon Tom came across Evelyn weeping in church. Concerned he went to see her. She wouldn't tell him why she was crying but agreed to him contacting the SVP. Two SVP members went to see her and asked what they could do to



help. Evelyn replied: 'I have a place to stay, food to eat and clothes to wear. What else do I need?'

It turned out that Evelyn needed more. She needed to talk about what had happened to her. It was hard listening to her. Evelyn had had the same sort of Catholic upbringing as my own daughters, but her country erupted into terrible violence. She witnessed her mother being shot. With a promise of a decent job she was lured to England and was held against her will in a house near London. Eventually the police rescued her and took her to a safe house. She was due to attend a clinic for test results for diseases she might have contracted during her captivity. She said that she would like one of us to go with her and then said: I wish I had a copy of the Novena Prayer to St Jude.

At the clinic, I gave Evelyn an envelope containing a copy of the prayer and a card from all the SVP members. She clutched the unopened envelope to her as though it contained a great treasure. Her social worker insisted at opening the envelope as part of her job. Tears rolled down Evelyn's face as she handed the envelope to her. The social worker checked it, then returned it gently to Evelyn with an apology. She was kind, just doing her job. Evelyn regarded me as the friend she insisted that accompanied her to get the test results.

Evelyn has now moved on but she benefited from the friendship when she really needed it. The mission of the SVP is 'seek and find', Tom found Evelyn for us and we are very grateful to him. We do need the help of more Toms who are concerned and contact the SVP.
