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## Justice & Peace Assembly 2014 Israel – Palestine: Any hope for Justice & Peace

WHAT WAS PRIMARILY a day of learning, focused on the many sad and difficult challenges facing those seeking justice and peace in the Holy Land. Ways of how we, as Christians, should respond were identified, including by prayer. The day opened with a time of worship led by Fr Kevin Dring, Priest Adviser to the Diocesan J&P Commission and concluded with a 'Muslim, Jewish, Christian Prayer for Peace' read by Canon Anthony Ball.

The Assembly was held at DABCEC in Crawley on 17 May and attended by 102 people. The timing of the event was pertinent given another round of peace talks had just broken down in April and the Holy Father was visiting Bethlehem and the region a week after our gathering.

The scene for the day was perfectly set by Canon Anthony who offered an historical, non-biased, context to the situation which proved invaluable in understanding today's issues better. Canon Anthony is a former

diplomat in the Middle East and now the Anglican Rector of Worth. He is also a Trustee of Embrace the Middle East who had an exhibition stand.

Mary Lucas, CAFOD's Programme Manager for the Middle East and Sri Lanka, followed with examples of how CAFOD work with their partners in the region and shared stories highlighting the plight of Palestinians, particularly in rural areas.

Bishop Kieran opened the afternoon session with a video message that included a request to parishes to observe an hour of adoration for the Christians in Palestine to coincide with the Pope's visit.

The final speaker was Michaela Whitton who gave a 'powerful and thought provoking' presentation about the 3 months she spent in the Holy Land this year. Michaela was a Human Rights Observer for the Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme in Palestine and Israel (EAPPI), and they also held an exhibition stand.

Many of the attendees commented on how impressed they were by the quality of the three speakers.

The Friends of the Holy Land exhibited their work showcasing how they engaged with communities from the 'bottom up'. Pax Christi and the World Development were also well represented and the Diocesan Fairtrade stand boasted of a 'very good day for sales'!



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

#### The work of Port Chaplain Roger Stone Sea Sunday 13 July



WHEN APOSTLESHIP OF THE SEA port chaplain Roger Stone and his team of ship visitors visited an arrested ship in Shoreham-on-Sea last year, little did they know that it would be detained for thirteen months.

This month is Sea Sunday when the Church asks us to support Apostleship of the Sea and pray for seafarers, who bring us most of the goods we buy in our shops.

'I learned that the ship had been arrested pretty quickly because when a ship is in port for more than a few days it's a clear signal something is wrong. Our volunteer ship visitors routinely visit ships and this was one of the many they have visited', said Roger, a permanent deacon.

The arrest of the Independent only ended in February this year, something Roger had not anticipated. 'Initially it was not envisaged that the ship would be arrested for long because the International Transport Federation said the ship owner was hoping to refinance.

When he realised that the promised refinancing was going nowhere he contacted the media and put the Master in touch with a maritime lawyer and he acted to protect their interests and ultimately secured payment of all unpaid salaries of crew on board.

'It appeared, all crew who had gone home without their wages being paid. On application of the Admiralty Marshal, the court ordered the sale of the vessel and unpaid salaries were paid out of the sale proceeds. This took longer than it might have done until a creditor with a prior claim lowered their claim'.

Initially there were several crew on board but the company paid for all but two to travel home, leaving only Mikhail, the master, and Igor, an able seaman, on board.

'Whenever we visited, their spirits lifted but both suffered mental fatigue, angst, and we were seriously concerned that they were becoming depressed. They had nothing to do all day, just keep the ship ticking over at the bare minimum. At one stage one of them went to hospital and I alerted the Maritime and Coastguard Agency to the depression issue.'

He added that the worst aspects of the arrest were the isolation, desperation, loneliness and no money going home to pay for their families' basic needs.

'When a company hits financial problems the first casualty is normally the crew's salaries, which are not paid. But crews tend to tolerate this because the prospect of some money some time is better than no money.'

'Igor had a wife and two young boys to clothe, feed, and educate. He was seriously concerned. His wife was borrowing money wherever she could, just making the debt worse. Apostleship of the Sea gave him an ex gratia payment of \$2,000. That made a huge difference to his family at home'.

During the ship's arrest, volunteer ship visitors took the master and Igor to local churches for Sunday Mass, the Shoreham Airshow and local museums.

'The most important thing we did was to maintain regular visits to the crew. This showed them that we really cared about them. We gave them Easter gifts and Christmas gifts and food and drink. We tried to help them to maintain their human dignity throughout the long, sorry process.'

Members of the justice and peace group at St Mary of the Angels in Worthing wrote to the minister responsible for shipping and demanded answers and action. They also raised funds to give the crew on board something generous at Christmas time.

John Green, Apostleship of the Sea development director, said, 'We come across a lot of abandoned crews, but this is exceptional in the duration. When a firm is in trouble, the crew's wages are pretty much the first things to go. ### Honorary Fellowship for Fr Vlad



WHAT IS OUR CALLING? How do we know? Fr Vladimir Nikiforov, born in Russia, made a priest in Czechoslovakia in 1981, immediately organised a clandestine Catholic parish in Moscow, arrested by the KGB and imprisoned as a suspected enemy of The Soviet State, and now priest in our parish of St Paul's in Haywards Heath was, on 22 May installed as an Honorary Fellow at The Royal Holloway College, University of London.

Fr Vlad was given this honour after 10 years of devoted service as Roman Catholic Chaplain to the students of this top 15 UK university. Fr Vlad and his wife Tamara came to the university at a time when organised religion in the UK amongst students was in severe decline. Yet he was the unanimous choice for the position by the students on the interview panel. The students made a wise decision. Fr Vlad brought to the role an openness that is rare and a generous sense of humour. He scheduled speakers of all faiths and openly welcomed and listened to those without a belief in God to

discuss, debate, and come together. He brought together students that were social activists but had fallen away from the Church with those that were active in the Church but were not active participants in social movements and demonstrations. He participated in debates denouncing fundamentalism across both secular and faith communities. Most of all, he listened, he cared, and he loved. And the students adored and respected him.

Before he left Royal Holloway, the students awarded him The Apple for the Teacher Award. This award recognises excellence in teaching as well as providing students with a chance to commend and thank staff whom they feel have had a positive effect on them. He is the only Chaplain in the 135 year history of the College to have been given this honour by the students. He and his wife Tamara consider their time at the College to be amongst the best in their lives. Based on the long and loud applause at his induction ceremony, the College feels the same.

In addition to being a priest in St Paul's Parish, Fr Vlad is now a member of the Chaplaincy Team at St Paul's Catholic College in Burgess Hill where he engages the students in Masses designed to appeal to their age group, with small groups in the chapel and in whole school Masses which are enlivened with drums and dance and song. He and Tamara have followed their calling, and our parish and school are blessed to have them enriching the lives of those around them.


### **Celebrations** go on

## The Ray Mooney Story

A&B News Special Correspondent Peter Burholt talks to the recently retired Diocesan Youth Advisor on his life and affection for Lourdes

Ray Mooney is a tall, quiet man. An ex-policeman, born in Limerick on 29 November 1952, he has devoted much of his post-retirement life to the youth of the diocese. Sadly, Ray was widowed after 16 years of marriage to Sue in 1989. This became a turning point in his life.

#### Are you a 'cradle' Catholic?

Oh, yes. What else would you expect, as I had a true Irish up-bringing! We moved to England after 4½ years and I spent my time being educated in a number of towns in the South. Working life started when I became a cadet in the Sussex police force in September 1969 at the age of 16 - quite a revelation! After 27 years service with the Sussex Police, I had to retire due to a back injury on 13 August 1996.

As expected from an ex-police officer, all the details were very accurate.

#### What about family?

I have a son Gavin and daughter Siobhan, both married. My family are very important to me, but the apple of my eye is my granddaughter Mia!

#### So, how did your affection for Lourdes start?

My first experience of Lourdes was at the age of 9 on a school trip, and, to be honest, I just did not get it! I was too young to appreciate the full meaning of pilgrimage. However, what I do remember are the processions, the grotto and the Panorama hotel.

#### The untimely death of your wife, Sue, must have been a difficult period in your life?

We were not living together when I had the devastating news that she had terminal cancer and had only a short time to live. Something else came out of the blue. My next door neighbour, Hazel, got in contact with Lady Sarah Clutton - who was running the Lourdes Pilgrimage at the time - to say that there was a deserving cause for help in making a trip to the shrine. Lady Sarah agreed. This was ten weeks before the pilgrimage and Sue spent most of this period in Cuckfield Hospital. Of course I remember that time well and for those weeks I prayed the rosary constantly. I used to walk the hospital car park - up and down, up and down. You may be surprised to know that I found myself praying, not for a cure, but that God would grant Sue the opportunity to live long enough to get to Lourdes.

We got to Lourdes and we were all treated like royalty. One day in the hotel Sue and I were coming down in the lift. As we entered the foyer Sue's two helpers, Chris and Phil, were waiting with a mobile stretcher bed made up for her comfort. One of the boys called 'Madame, your chariot awaits!' Miracles happened that week. At the final Mass Sue was lying on her stretcher. I was on one side of her and one of the pilgrimage doctors was seated on the other side. He had a very serious look on his face, but said nothing. Sue, without much energy, was lying down unable to sit up unaided. At the time of communion Fr Seamus Hester asked if Sue would receive the Host to which I replied 'Yes'. The then Bishop Cormac turned from the Altar and motioned toward Sue. All those around, in complete silence, stepped back to create a pathway for the Bishop to give her Communion. We supported Sue to enable her to sit up to receive Christ. We then gently laid her back down. Communion to other pilgrims then continued.

As the final Hymn began Sue, completely unaided, sat up and joined in the hymn accompanied by an energetic bout of handclapping!

On the journey home I quizzed the doctor about that moment at Mass and, in particular, his worried facial expression. 'I was convinced that Sue was about to pass away' he reflected.

#### ....and then what?

On our return, Sue and I spent a week at home before she moved to St Catherine's Hospice in Crawley. She was terminally ill. Sue peacefully passed away six days later.

The next year I went to Lourdes with Gavin and Siobhan for a return pilgrimage to give thanks to God, Our Lady and the diocese for all the love and generosity expressed the previous year. I have been back every year since then. My children have also been back many times as helpers and group leaders. Yes, it was a turning point, not only in my life, but in Gavin's and Siobhan's too.

How did your family deal with this trauma? I hated telling my children that their mum was going to die soon, but it had to be done. They each reacted differently and to this day the impact still has its effects on us all in different ways.

#### So, how did you get more involved with the youth movement?

In 1991 I returned to Lourdes as a Hotel Group Leader and then followed this up by being a coordinator for the Family Group Hotels. For some years I led adult hotel groups. Gradually I just got more and more emerged in the spirit of the place.

Over the years from around 1999 to 2003 with a few experienced pilgrims we looked at the eleven to fourteen years age group and realised there was no real structure in place for them on the diocesan pilgrimage. These young people were in Lourdes with their families. Everything was done informally and often 'just happened'. However, they were given time and space to do their own thing.

#### Was this the start of the Redshirts?

Yes, in the sense it was a forerunner to what became the Redshirts. From these, more informal experiences, Adam Simon, diocesan Hospitalite President, and I were keen to have a youth ministry section of the pilgrimage. We needed to hang the concept on something, so our first idea was to call the group the Yellow Shirts. The colour yellow was synonymous with the sunflowers we would see from the train as we journeyed through France to Lour-

Having made known that we wished to use yellow we had a polite, but firm, message from the Diocese of Liverpool - who often shared our time in Lourdes. They asked us not to clash with their very obvious presence of yellow shirts. So we also couldn't be white (female helpers uniform) nor blue (male helpers uniform) Hence, in 2004 the Redshirts were born! In the first year we had 23 in our group. Again the young people were with their families and spread across a few hotels.

We took a structured approach, which covered prayer time and what we call 'ice cream' time. Initially, not all the kids would turn up and sometimes it was difficult for the group to bond due to inconsistent numbers. The potential was there but we had to re-model the formula. It was decided for 2005 to narrow the age group to fourteen to sixteen years and to travel separately.

The Redshirts came under the Diocesan Youth Office and so, as Diocesan Youth Officer, it fitted in well with my work. However, I must admit the idea took two years for the youth pilgrimage to settle in.

#### So, what came next?

There is the desire to grow awareness of the work the Redshirts carries out, to grow its credibility and for the young people to use the benefits this movement brings. Now I am working for the Lourdes Pilgrimage Trust, continuing my role as Redshirt Coordinator. An important element of my role is to take the project to a point of handover. In other words to ensure the structure, purpose and vision is sustainable for the future. Our slogan is 'Faith, Fun and Friendship; Once A Redshirt, always a Redshirt'so this is what I want to pass on. We want to get involved in bigger projects.

On 6 and 7 September we will celebrate ten years of the movement and we are inviting back everyone who has been a Redshirt, Redshirt Leader, Redshirt Chaplain and all those people who have supported us on the ten year journey. A CD, recorded at Surrey University Studios, has just been released of songs from the past ten years. Profits will go towards supporting young people's spiritual development. Another idea is to publish a book of poetry by young people about being young and Christian in today's world.

#### What makes you sad?

Up to this point Ray had delivered all his response with 'policeman' like accuracy and without hesitation. However, it took him a while to think about his answer, as clearly it was not one he is normally asked.

I think sometimes people struggle with the concept of youth ministry. It is arguably the most challenging ministry. Age range, safeguarding, added responsibility that comes with working in this ministry, the temptations and alternative attractions in wider society and such like. My sadness would be around the fact that, although much is happening in this ministry, I firmly believe that more could happen if more resources were available.

#### What makes you happy?

This can be summed up quite simply by a message I had from a parent, whose troubled daughter had become a Redshirt. On her return from Lourdes he said 'The pilgrimage changed my daughter; my daughter changed our family. Thank you so much, we will never forget'

The Redshirt movement is a success, and has become so by God's grace. I am confident that it can continue to be so. Hand on heart, a huge 'thank you' goes to everyone who has been involved along the way - Redshirts, Leaders, Chaplains, and Supporters. You have allowed me to spend time with my two great loves; young people and Lourdes!

#### Anything else?

Spending time with my family and the occasional glass of vin rouge. Oh yes, when Brighton beat the Palace! How would you like to be remembered?

I hope I have a few years left in me! I also hope that people will remember a body of ministry work over the last 22 years (four plus as a parish youth worker). Work that included general and specific support of parishes and schools across the diocese; supporting youth leaders and youth groups; six



World Youth Days (Paris, Rome, Toronto, Cologne, Sydney and Madrid); many, many Youth-Gathers, and, of course, the Redshirts. I hope people will see how positive an impact all these actions have on the participants and the communities within which they live and work.

I would hope that I may have made a little difference in peoples' lives. Perhaps someone who, at some point, has been on the same path. This is not about me, but by God's grace, I have been privileged to play this small part in the life of the youth of the diocese. I have to give a very big 'thank you' to the young people, youth leaders and school staff for allowing me to be involved in the wider youth ministry of the diocese and beyond.

#### Finally, is there another unspoken wish you have?

Quick as a flash - and with a rare smile - came the answer. I hope to get invited to the Redshirts' 25th anniversary. And to have a joint 16th/75th birthday party with Mia. Who will go home first!

## Celebrating 50 Years with the Diocese of Chulucanas

TOWARDS THE END OF MAY a group of 6 of us headed out to Peru to celebrate the 50th Aniversario (Bodas de Oro) of our twinned Diocese of Chulucanas. The group consisted of those of us who have worked in Chulucanas during the 32 years of our 'inter-diocesan friendship', Mgr Benny O'Shea, Fr Ian Byrnes, Fr Kevin Dring, as well as Bishop Kieran and Mgrs John Hull & Tony Barry. Together we linked up with Fr Hugh Dutton who is still in Peru, having arrived right at the beginning with Fr Jeremy Lear (RIP), who died so sadly and suddenly in a car accident in Peru in 1984.

What a joy to be together, representing our Diocese, and sharing in the immense joy of Chulucanas as they gave thanks to God for 50 challenging but highly fruitful and blessed years. The Diocese was started in 1964, one year before our own 'birth' as A & B, and guided through the first 36 years by Bishop John McNabb who, even though now well into his eighties, was able to come down from Chicago and share in the celebrations as the guest of honour. We were given great hospitality by the current Bishop, Dan Turley-Murphy, and became part of a great crowd: delegations from all the 20 parishes (priests, religious orders, families and individuals young and old, schools etc); the Papal Nuncio and many Bishops and representatives from other parts of Peru; local civic dignitaries and many people from the wider community.

The three days of official celebrations, which consisted of very joyful Masses with great participation (lots of clapping and singing), street processions, speeches and presentations, civic reception with national anthem and raising of flags in the square, and of course, the inevitable nightly music, dancing and fireworks (Peruvian style!). What struck us all was the warmth of hospitality given to us; the participation of the whole spectrum of the diocese as one great 'family' in celebration; the sense of hope and mission looking forward into the next 50 years; and the very real gratitude to God for so much to be celebrating at this important milestone. The Pastoral Plan that has guided Chulucanas through 50 years of growth has at its heart a very simple but challenging and wholesome aim (in line with the vision of Pope Francis): to create a Church AS COMMUNITY (FAMILY) of dialogue and participation where everybody is working together as missionaries and disciples in helping to build God's Kingdom of justice and truth. Their mission ... our mission.

After Chulucanas we all headed up to the mountain parish of Frias where all of us at different times have worked. Again we received a great welcome from the people. It was a wonderful time - for those of us re-connecting with old friendships, and for all of us with Bishop Kieran having an experience that can help us to focus on what we can and should be celebrating next year, as we in A & B reach our very own 50th Anniversary. Que VIVA Chulucanas! Que VIVA Arundel & Brighton!






#### St Philip's School in Uckfield celebrate feast day

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

Click on the day of the week and then the time and you can pray with the worshippers somewhere in the world. If you do not have a computer, just find a young person aged 10 - 15 (relative or friend) to bring you a laptop and set it up for you to watch from bed or where ever you are able.

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


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
