The diocese looks forward to Festival 50

ON THE FEAST OF ST PETER AND ST PAUL around 600 people from across the diocese came to St Wilfrid's School in Crawley for the 2014 Diocesan Festival. There were many opportunities for informal gathering, for example, over lunch - (see picture below).

Apart from looking forward to the Golden Festival next year, there were opportunities to hear speakers and attend a considerable number of workshops related to the Vatican 11 Constitution 'Verbum Dei' (Word of the Lord).

Peter Burholt reports on a few of them:

With all the hubbub on the ground floor, it was easy to miss what was on offer on the level above. What a miss it would have been to all those festival goers who did not venture up the stairs or took the lift to the first floor.

Twelve workshops – some interactive and some with serious study groups – were available for a wide range of visitors and, dare one say it, the clergy alike. For the serious there was Sr Diane from Lewisham and Sr Maureen Roberts with 'My Soul is Thirsting for the Lord'. Ways of praying and a dramatization of the story of 'Woman at the well' asking 'Who are you?' Videos and a time to contemplate and share. 'We were surprised how many shared their inner-most thoughts with us' said Sr Maureen.

Have you heard of an interactive prayer room? If not, a visit to David Beresford's workshop would have given the visitor a chance to use balloons, post-it notes, building blocks and many other interactive articles to come and see how the Lord will meet you as you pray interactively. It was really 'seeing is believing', no matter what age you were.

As a diocese, we are placing more focus on the important role grandparents play with their grandchildren, in developing the faith of the young ones in their care. Christine Evans and her daughter Claire Hudson presented practical ways for keeping religion in their lives, with a simple array of 'props', many of which were geared to a moment in the garden or at the kitchen table. 'Exploring the Gospel with Grandchildren' was popular with both guiders and the guided.

Well, what a day and how to end our review of the workshops? How about 'The Vision of St John of Christ in Revelation' 'What is that all about?' you might say. Then have a word with Constantina Wood, iconographer in residence at St Paul's Church, Aylesbury. She encouraged the young and old – and many more in between – to indulge in their creative art skills by building up, panel by panel, the icon of Christ. 'I never know what comes out at the end of these sessions as everyone does their own thing' The stunning four metre collage was hanging for all to see, (see picture right) as the happy and spiritually fulfilled supporters left for home. 'I really did not know what the outcome would be' reflected a satisfied Constantina.

The day concluded with an impressive concelebrated outdoor Mass, for which the rain just held off.

Come volunteer for Festival 2015



Everyone seemed so happy and impressed as they were leaving the Festival on Sunday and I was so pleased that the volunteers got a round of applause as you gathered for the photo. I think your cheerful dedication inspired others for 5 July next year. It's looking good so a huge thanks to everyone.

IN A SHORT PRESENTATION to all who had gathered for the Festival, Bishop Kieran outlined his call for the diocese to mark its Jubilee next year. As well as highlighting some key moments and individuals from the past fifty years, he reflected on the changes that had come about, noting the falling number of priests then, surprisingly, the rise in the number of churches and the apparent decline in the number of regular Mass-goers. Against this mixed picture, he pointed out the great array of organisations and groups now active in the diocese, all of which tells a story of a changing church facing great challenges but with real life and vitality.

Turning to the future he challenged the diocese to seize the opportunity of the Jubilee to prepare for the coming fifty years, to deepen our faith and our sense of identity, to reach out to those on the margins and to develop the good work being done to support the individuals and causes who need us.

This brought him to reflect on a key moment in the life of A&B: FESTIVAL 50 at the Amex in Brighton on 5 July 2015. Having shown how suited the venue is as a conference centre and exhibition space (provided we 'Keep off the grass!') he announced some of the key speakers including Archbishop Rowan Williams and the Bishop of our twin diocese in Peru and gave a taste of the many exhibitions, stalls and activities.

He finished by inviting the whole Diocese to attend FESTIVAL 50. He noted that he was asking parishes to have a Vigil and early morning Sunday Mass for those who cannot attend – and to invite everyone else to join him for Mass at 3pm that Sunday.

His last words were to thank and encourage all those who might volunteer for FESTIVAL 50, and for the work of the diocese in future. Using the example of the Scouts he spoke of the incredible things committed volunteers can achieve and he asked A&B to do the same.

Papal Nuncio, Archbishop Mennini on Two Day Diocesan Visit

THE POPE'S REPRESENTATIVE in Great Britain, Archbishop Antonio Mennini spent two days in the Diocese of Arundel & Brighton, participating in the life of the diocese from 18-19 June. Accompanied by Bishop Kieran he visited several different parts of the diocese and meeting with both clergy and laity in his two days.

He began his visit by attending the annual Good Shepherd Service for all the Catholic schools of the diocese at Worth Abbey where he took part in a Liturgy of the Word which incorporated a beautiful reflection on the Gospel of the Blind Man in action and dance from St Joseph's Primary School, Epsom. At the end of the service he was presented alongside Mgr Canon James Cronin of Missio with a cheque for over £12,000 to support the work of Missio with young children in Zambia.

The Nuncio then spent the afternoon with the clergy of the diocese and seminarians at St John's Seminary, Wonersh near Guildford. The annual meeting of the St John's Association at which the Archbishop was to speak happily accommodated the additional opportunity for all priests and deacons of the diocese to meet with him.

After a speech reflecting on priesthood he answered questions offering a real insight into his own vocational journey to priesthood, and his work and the role of a Nuncio as someone concerned to build bridges between people of good will. The day ended with a festive Mass of St John and meal in celebration at the end of which he was thanked for his visit and in turn warmly thanked Bishop Kieran and the seminary for the welcome he had received. In particular he invited the Rector, Mgr Jeremy Garrett and the seminarians to come and visit him at the Nunciature in Wimbledon.

The Nuncio stayed with Bishop Kieran Conry overnight before meeting with some of the religious of the diocese at the Dominican Missionary Sisters' Generalate in Gossops Green, Crawley then moving on to meet diocesan staff in the Christian Education Centre in Crawley.

He ended the day at Arundel Cathedral for the beautiful Carpet of Flowers and Corpus Christi Festival where, with Bishop Kieran, he led the Blessed Sacrament procession through the town to Arundel Castle grounds for Benediction. He ended the day with celebratory meal with those involved and at the end thanked Bishop Kieran for a wonderful two days and left impressed by what he had seen and the many people he had met.

A Diocesan spokesman said 'I think all who met the Archbishop were impressed by his warmth, kindness and openness. I believe he left with a very positive impression of the diocese and our Bishop, and we were left with an equally positive impression of our Papal Nuncio'

Good Shepherd Celebration

ON WEDNESDAY 18 JUNE schools across the diocese gathered for their annual Good Shepherd Celebration at Worth Abbey. The theme of this year's celebration was 'Light of the World'.

Pupils from St John the Baptist Primary School in Brighton opened the Liturgy with a jubilant gathering dance to the music 'Gather, gather, gather in the light of his flame', before the Bishop processed in, followed by pupils from each school proudly carrying their school banners.

The readings were beautifully presented by Deacon David Turner and pupils from St Mary's Primary School in Crowborough, and the psalm, which was written especially for the occasion, was performed magnificently by pupils from St Joseph's in Haywards Heath.

Following the Gospel reading, pupils from St Joseph's in Epsom presented a striking liturgical dance to lead pupils in their reflection on the Gospel. St Peter's Secondary School in Guildford ably led the music and Cranmore Preparatory School provided an outstanding team of ushers.

At the end of the Liturgy a cheque for over £12,000 (collected by schools across the diocese), was presented to Mgr Canon James Cronin, National Director for Missio (Mission Together), the charity that encourages 'children to help children' around the world.

Finally, representatives from each school were invited forward to receive a small lantern from Bishop Kieran in return for their pledge to be a beacon of light and faith in their school community.

After the celebration schools enjoyed a picnic, bathed in glorious sunshine in the beautiful grounds of Worth Abbey.

JUST A THOUGHT

The need to renew

IF WE ARE OLD ENOUGH to remember Simon and Garfunkel we may know that although they harmonised musically, they did not do so personally – hence their sad songs about parting.

It is not clear that Peter and Paul (whose feast we celebrate today) had a good relationship - the Council of Jerusalem was prompted by Paul, because the conversion of Gentiles had led to tension as to what extent they should adopt Jewish rules.

This tension between tradition and the need to renew has not been just in the earlier Church or over the last 50 years, but over the whole 2000 years of Christianity. We can't get stuck in tradition. The Church has to respond as things change in the world. Hence, for instance the Church's involvement in food banks, credit unions and various forms of counselling.

We are not baptised into A & B (or any other diocese) but to Jesus Christ. He asks each of us 'Who do you say that I am?' 'What do you want from me?'

And to us all he says
'Go out and proclaim my name'

HCPT Easter Pilgrimage 'We are the House of God'

BISHOP KIERAN marked his first year as President of HCPT by celebrating the Trust Mass in Lourdes during the Easter Pilgrimage. This year's pilgrimage was attended by over 4000 pilgrims including the children with various needs, their helpers, chaplains, doctors and nurses and auxiliary groups from Catholic schools and colleges. Every year a geographical region of HCPT is responsible for preparing and leading the liturgy and worship for the pilgrimage. Easter 2014 was the turn of the 'Metropolitan Deep South' region which is made up of groups from Bexhill on Sea, Brighton, Crawley, Farnborough, Alton, Southampton and Portsmouth.

The theme for pilgrimage is 'We are God's House' was chosen because Met Deep South is, in some sense, the 'home' of HCPT. Dr Michael Strode was working at Chailey Heritage School, in Sussex, when he took the first group of children to Lourdes in 1956. Michael Strode, (now a Cistercian brother at the Caldey Island community) and a colleague, with help from the parish of St Paul's in Haywards Heath, raised the money to take four disabled children from the Heritage to Lourdes for a week. The children did not stay in the hospitals in Lourdes, as other disabled visitors would; they stayed in the hotels - quite unheard of at the time. The following year another group of children wanted to go, and so began HCPT.

The theme 'We are the House of God' was also chosen because Sacred Scripture uses the image of a 'house' to teach about the kingdom of God, and Christian discipleship. Luke 6 'Everyone who comes to me and hears my words and puts them into practice, ... are like a man building a house, who dug down deep and laid the foundation on rock.' The theme was reflected by many aspects of the Liturgy of the Mass especially the beautiful gospel drama of Luke's parable acted out by children and helpers from the region and proclaimed by Deacon David Turner. Many people from the family groups and schools of our region put in a lot of preparation for the Easter pilgrimage liturgies culminating in the Trust Mass. The music was directed by Kirsty McIlharghey and was led by musicians from the region and singers from St Richards School Bexhill, Alton Convent School and Salesian College in Farnborough.

HCPT has grown to over 230 groups (known now as family groups) who all travel to Lourdes for a week each Easter. Each family group consists of approximately 6-8 children/young people, typically aged 8 to 18. Each child/young person usually has two volunteer helpers, who fundraise for their own and the children's fare. Each group has a Leader, at least one qualified nurse, and usually a chaplain too. Many of the children and young people who travel with HCPT are wheelchair users; many have learning disabilities and difficulties; many are brothers and sisters of children or young people with disabilities who may have travelled with the trust in previous years. The family groups are now from many countries including the UK, Ireland, America, Croatia, Romania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Slovakia, Poland, Belgium, Italy, Spain, and the West Indies.

To mark this year's pilgrimage Met Deep South have a new regional banner, with the theme 'We are God's House', which we will have for many years to come and is now in the chapel at Hosanna House, Bartres where the HCPT 'summer pilgrimages' will be staying.

A remarkable trip to Lourdes!

DURING THE EASTER WEEK, students from the Lower Sixth at St George's College in Weybridge took part in a week long HCPT pilgrimage for young children and adults to Lourdes in France (pictured). The following are reflections by four of those who went to Lourdes during Easter Week.

'A few weeks before we left, we spent a Sunday afternoon with the four guests who were coming with us. For the first part, we stayed in school and played draughts or just had chat with them. Then, we walked into Addlestone to have a coffee. This was very useful, because we did similar things in Lourdes and it showed us the type of care our guests would need, but also it was good to get to know what they were like as individuals. Getting to know them was a wonderful experience because they all had great personalities.'

'At the start of our trip, all of our guests were excited about flying to Lourdes, and on take-off they all cheered. During the trip we visited Gavarnie, a town in the Pyrenees. We walked through the town and took our guests shopping for souvenirs and presents for their families. When we were done we stopped off in a meadow and celebrated Mass, which combined with the good weather and breath-taking view of the snow-topped mountains, made it one of the more special Masses of the trip. After the Mass we played games with our guests, and then finished our day stopping for ice cream at a nearby café. The day as a whole was great fun for both the helpers and the guests, and seeing the incredible landscape made it one of the most enjoyable days of the trip.'

'One of the best moments of the trip was the Torchlight Procession on the Tuesday night. We took part in a procession along with all of the other HCPT groups, holding candles and walking through the domain. It was a wonderful experience as everyone had come together, to create an oddly peaceful atmosphere, despite the huge number of people there. It really made us feel as though we were truly part of something, and the sight of thousands of candles was amazing.'

'It was hard being a carer during throughout the trip as being a carer in Lourdes requires you to do all of the things you do for yourself that you take for granted - brushing your teeth, showering, or eating, but for someone else. After doing this for a couple of days you get used to it and it becomes habit to help someone to eat their dinner. It was an excellent and worthwhile trip, which we really enjoyed. We strongly encourage anyone to go if they get the chance as it is a very memorable and life-changing experience.'

The Sixteen perform at Worth Abbey

WORTH ABBEY hosted a truly memorable sell-out concert on 15 June when the world famous choir, The Sixteen, performed in the unique Abbey Church in aid of the monastic community's charity - Outreach Peru. An audience of nearly 800 sat transfixed by the ensemble's performance of glorious polyphony with 'The Voice of the Turtle Dove', a stunning programme of music by English Tudor composers John Sheppard, Richard Davy and William Munday. This is The Sixteen's 14th Choral Pilgrimage and a spectacular showcase of the golden age of Renaissance music proving that compositions nearly 500 years old can truly delight a 21st century audience. The ensemble has a devoted following of supporters, some of whom travelled from Lincoln and Nottinghamshire for the Sunday evening performance, and the choir clearly delighted many newcomers to their music with their unique style of polyphonic singing.

Harry Christophers CBE is known internationally as the founder and conductor of The Sixteen as well as a regular guest conductor for many of the major symphony orchestras and opera companies worldwide. The Sixteen's Associate Conductor, Eamonn Dougan, presided over the Worth Abbey performance and delivered a beautifully balanced programme, combining emotional depth with awe-inspiring harmonies.


As with previous Choral Pilgrimages, The Sixteen principally perform in prestigious cathedrals and concert halls where the acoustics match the grandeur of the setting. Worth Abbey was no less impressive a venue as the unique architecture was specifically designed to lift and carry music and voices around the circular church. The Sixteen were so impressed with the warmth of the audience reception and the venue that they have asked to come back again and we look forward to welcoming the choir back to Worth Abbey in the future. 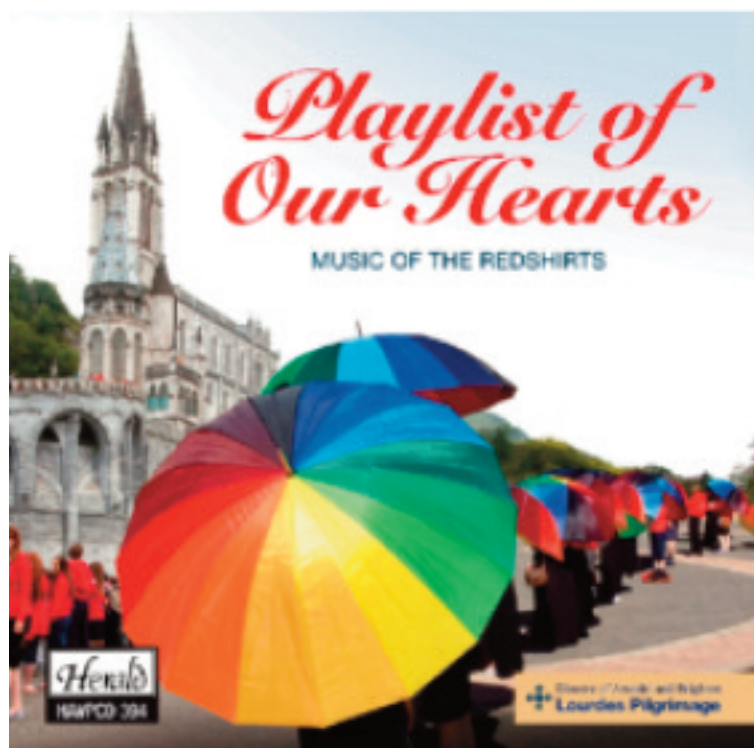

MONIKA POREBNA celebrated her becoming a British Citizen with Merstham Union of Catholic Mothers (UCM) at the June Meeting, with cake complete with Union Flag, applause, and displaying her certificate to fellow members (pictured). Monika, originally from Lublin in Poland, came to Merstham in 2006, working in a local care home. She quickly became a well known member of the community and joined the UCM. Next she got a job at East Surrey Hospital, and after studying hard passed her exams to become a state registered nurse in 2011. She is also an Extraordinary Minister of the Eucharist. Now she has completed the big steps and become a British Citizen.

To qualify an applicant has to have lived in the UK for five years, demonstrate they are of good character and speak English (or Welsh or Scottish Gaelic) and there is the 'Life in the UK Test' otherwise known as The British Citizen Test, which takes place at a local centre. Monika found she needed to know a lot about history, particularly some great Victorians. She had a question about Isambard Kingdom Brunel with a picture of the Clifton Suspension Bridge. A pass is necessary before one can even apply. Finally there comes the ceremony, which took place at the Council Offices at Kingston. There the group of new citizens made a pledge of allegiance and sang the National Anthem.

Monika said 'Feeling British did not occur in a flash at that particular moment but it has been gradually growing ever since'.

The Beginning Experience

IF YOU ARE HAPPILY MARRIED, you are blessed. You have been touched by God who brought you together. The Church will recognise that later this year when Bishop Kieran offers a special annual Mass for those celebrating certain wedding anniversaries.

But what if your happy marriage has ended? What if you are now separated, divorced or widowed and you are single once again? Your grief may well be as great as your happiness once was. You may be experiencing feelings of anger, guilt or sadness. And, while the Church celebrates those happy wedding anniversaries, you may feel abandoned, unrecognised and even unwelcome within the faith community.

If you are in this position, there is a ministry within the Church for you. It's called the Beginning Experience and it does what it says in the name. For, as your old life as a marriage partner may have ended, it offers the experience of a new beginning. This is a new beginning where you can come to terms with your single-again state and can face the future with more confidence in yourself and with hope and trust in God.

Beginning Experience started in America in 1974 when it was recognised a special ministry was needed for people whose marriages had ended. It came to England in 1984 and so this year is its 30th anniversary here.

In Arundel and Brighton, Beginning Experience has the full support of Bishop Kieran. It consists of a local team of men and women who are themselves all separated, divorced or widowed. Twice a year they run a residential weekend at the Emmaus Centre in West Wickham, Kent.

The weekend contains a carefully-structured programme which encourages the participants to acknowledge their grief and to recognise that their feelings are normal and shared by others. They may then choose to close the door gently on the past and so begin to face the future more positively.

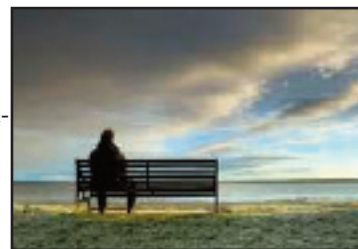
This is not an instant cure. There is no instant cure for the sense of loss which can overcome and overpower us. But it is a beginning. And, after the weekend, regular follow-up meetings are held and open to all participants to attend.

You may be interested in comments received after the most recent weekend earlier this year. They included 'Thank you for providing me with the opportunity to take stock of how my life can move forward', 'This has been a fantastic weekend - it has moved a great block within me' and 'The weekend was absolutely what I needed'.

So if you are separated, divorced or widowed and have read this right to the end, then maybe you are being invited to consider attending a Beginning Experience weekend at Emmaus. The next one will be from 3 to 5 October 2014.

Catenians celebrate 300 meetings in 55 years

THE RECENT 300TH MEETING of the Association's 18th Province, was of particular importance as it reviewed among other matters the many changes and challenges that are being faced by members, not only as Catenians, given the internal developments being championed by the Association's Grand Council, but more importantly, as faithful adherents of the Catholic Church itself as it struggles for relevance and commitment in the 21st Century.

In a challenging address to the 30 members of the Council and its guests Brother Peter Woodford, Grand Vice-President stressed the need to embrace the new demands of being a faithful Catholic and of turning the Association into an inclusive body. He wished the Province every success for its next 300 meetings (about 25 years' worth by his reckoning), but he expected it would be another who would be offering a toast to success in 2039!

An earlier meeting had spent some time on the current calls faced to pursue a reforming agenda to bring the Association to a new generation of Catholic men and, perhaps in time, women and faithful Christians who are not Catholics??? This, some current members could well see as anathema.

A number of developments in the Sussex area were considered - the expansion of Catenianism in Brighton, the development of new Circles in the region and the general enhancement of membership Province wide.

Council also spent some time reviewing a diocesan request of this Province to support its 2015 Diocesan Golden Jubilee. This was embraced with enthusiasm by the Council who will be seeking any and all ways to provide assistance.
