At the same time the Holy Father has appointed Archbishop Peter Smith as the Apostolic Administrator of the vacant See of Arundel and Brighton, until such time as a new Bishop takes possession of the Diocese. A message from the Most Reverend Peter Smith, Archbishop of Southwark and our Metropolitan My Dear brothers and Sisters. The announcement last weekend that Bishop Kieran had offered his resignation to the Holy Father came as a great shock and was very distressing. Working with him in the Bishops' Conference and more recently as a Bishop of the Province of Southwark, I am well aware of all his dedicated work in the Diocese and nationally as Chairman of the Department of Evangelisation and Catechesis. My heart goes out to you at this difficult time, and I just wanted to write and let you know that I have offered Mass for you and all those hurt or distressed by Bishop Kieran's actions. I will be keeping you and all those involved in my prayers in the coming weeks and months as you continue your preparations to celebrate the Golden Jubilee of the Diocese next year. The words of Pope Francis in his letter to the Church, 'Evangelii Gaudium'struck me as particularly appropriate at this difficult time: 'I invite all Christians everywhere, at this very moment, to a renewed personal encounter with Jesus Christ, or at least an openness to letting him encounter them; I ask you to do this unfailingly each day'. May I gently suggest that in the coming weeks and months, you consider having a regular period of adoration before the Blessed Sacrament in your parish churches, which would be a very fitting response to that invitation, and an excellent preparation for the Golden Jubilee of the Diocese. Cardinal Cormac Murphy-O'Connor, who was your Bishop for 24 years has asked me to send on to you a letter, which I am attaching to this message. With and assurance of my prayers and good wishes, +Peter, Archbishop and Metropolitan 1 October 2014 A message from +Cormac Cardinal Murphy-O'Connor Archbishop Emeritus of Westminster My dear People of the Diocese of Arundel & Brighton, I just want you to know that my thoughts and prayers are with you at this time. The resignation of Bishop Kieran and the events accompanying it have been a great shock and sadness to us all. As it happens, I know Bishop Kieran had intended a letter about the Church to be read out to you today. In it he says, 'The Church is what joins us to Christ and builds and supports that relationship. It is also what binds us to one another. It is where we find healing and forgiveness. It is where we find support and encouragement.' We all need that healing and forgiveness as Bishop Kieran does at this time. We are all dependent upon one another for prayer, support and encouragement in times of trouble and failure. I know that you will pray for Bishop Kieran as he seeks God's guidance for the time ahead, and for all those who have been hurt by these events. The Diocese of Arundel and Brighton is a great diocese and will continue to flourish

and develop with the renewal that has already begun in preparation for the Golden Jubilee.

BARROW HILLS SCHOOL in Witley was delighted to welcome Fr Fabrice Tapsoba, from Burkina Faso, to celebrate their start of term Mass on Friday 12 September. His celebration of their first Mass was a wonderful reminder of the important link they have with St Benoît School in Burkina Faso. Barrow Hills has been linked in friendship with St Benoît School sinc 2005 and has raised many thousands of pounds for the school. Getting visas to travel to the UK from Burk ina Faso is extremely diffi-



have their most ambitious project yet. Their target is to raise £20,000 to fund the building and fitting out of a dormitory for female students at the school. Currently, the girls walk up to 15 miles each way to attend school and they are very vulnerable. Being able to stay in the dormitory will ensure the girls' safety and will also mean they will be able to continue their studies at night as solar lighting will be fitted.

GDWG was set up by the Diocesan Justice & Peace Group in 1995 to offer friendship and support to asylum seekers and other migrants held in detention at Gatwick Airport. There are two centres at Gatwick holding 464 people, many of whom are vulnerable, away from family, homeland, familiar culture, religion and language, and imprisoned in a system they do not understand. They feel isolated and may suffer post-traumatic stress disorder because of experiences in their homeland.

There was a great deal of interest and enthusiasm for our Fairtrade Stall which enjoyed a good day for sales. The Redshirts from the A&B Lourdes Pilgrimage were well represented; they also had a large display that included CDs for sale. Other activities on the day were provided by CAFOD and GDWG and a Bible studies stall included a 'speed bible verse finding competition'.

Patrick Reeve, from the A&B Diocesan Walking Pilgrimage, very enthusiastically organised the route and marshalling of a challenging walk through woodland, racing stables and farmland. At the end of proceedings many of the wearied youngsters described the walk as excellent!

The St Barnabas Society and it's new director

Fr Richard Biggerstaff talks to the A&B News about his new challenge

MOVING FROM HORSHAM to Oxford may not be such a big deal for a priest who has not been able to call his residence 'home' since he left in 1988. What is different is that Fr Richard moved from being a parish priest in Horsham, although still of the diocese, to become Director of The St Barnabas Society. As Peter Burholt explores his life story, it becomes absolutely clear why he was chosen as Director.

My Early Years

My story is typical of these last twenty years in the history of our Society and the Catholic Church in England and

Wales. I was born and brought up in Orpington, Kent. My grandparents moved there in 1936 and shortly after the birth of my mother, my grandmother died. When my parents married they moved into the family house, a house my mother had never left. Sadly, my mother died in 2009 - however my father still lives there.

My brother and I went to our mother's infants' school, where we enjoyed the rigour of Miss Reins, our mother's childhood teacher. We sang badly in the church choir!

We were both baptised in the church choir! We were both baptised in the same font as our mother in the CofE church of St Paulinus. My father was unbaptised and neither of my parents attended church services, although we all rallied round for the vicarage fete!

Religion Comes Into My Life

At about the age of thirteen I started to get interested in the Catholic faith. Catholic neighbours had given me a book called 'Life in Christ'. Black and white, it certainly wasn't bland; it had me captivated and, in a strange way, I wanted to believe every word. The text was broken up by questions

in what I later discovered was the classic catechetical style - pictures, religious old masters, poorly reproduced but quite beautiful - were its aesthetic feature. This was the beginning in me of a sense of religious doctrine and religious art.

We had little of either in St Paulinus, but we did have two windows of Peter and Paul. I can remember them now. I was keen to see other churches and so I got on my bike and explored. Every church I found was open and every experience different.

The first Catholic priest I got to know was Fr Philip Matthias. As parish priest of St Joseph's in St Mary Cray, Fr Matthias was an inspiration. He was both kind and gracious and loved church music. He still lives in Vauxhall and I last saw him in April at a performance of the Matthew Passion in Westminster. We talked again about how, all these years on, we are now brother priests.

My travels also took me to other Anglican churches of different traditions and I eventually settled at St Francis, Petts Wood. I started serving and visiting Walsingham. I made great friends and found a spiritual home.

I suspect my parents were a little relieved that I hadn't thought it necessary to become a Catholic! From that time I took a sense of a call to ordination seriously. I wanted to be ordained, I saw my life going in that direction and there was really nothing else I would do. My non-churchy friends were very accepting!

Education at Kings College and Beyond

After A levels I secured a place at King's College London to read theol-

ogy. I was fortunate enough to be appointed pastoral assistant to the Anglican chaplaincy in Nice and I managed to get through the rigours of Anglican selection for ministry. My good friend Ruth told me Mirfield was the only theological college I should consider and in due course I began there in September 1988. I loved Mirfleld - the college, the community, the liturgy and the life.

My appointment, after ordination, was to Brighton where I learnt such a great deal from Canon Brandie, my training incumbent. I have fond memories of that parish.

Catholicism Makes an Entry into My life

Sharpened by the events of modern Anglican life, I had a growing sense of a call to the Catholic Church. It is strange to think how a liberating development for some can be a negation of tradition for others. I became a Catholic three years after my Anglican ordination as deacon - I felt called to be a Catholic, 'called home', to use a familiar phrase and to describe a familiar experience. Suffice it to say, this call to the full communion of the Catholic Church is

what we are about. The Society exists to support those who hear this call and who have to cope with its consequences.

Leaving the Diocese with My Eternal Thanks

I have just taken Holy Communion to Betty. Each morning she watches EWTN and delights in the stories of converts to the Catholic faith. As we talk I think of those stories, which have touched my own life.

I thank God for the gift of faith and the grace of ordination as a Catholic priest. I

thank Him for the parishes in which I have served, not least Horsham which I have left after only three years to take up this appointment. I thank God for the many extraordinary people who have supported me, forgiven my frailties and treasured the sacraments and the communion of the Church.

But I thank Almighty God most of all for my parents. Bill was baptised a Catholic in 1994 and Jan was received at the same Easter Vigil. My brother, who had married a Catholic called Loretta with whom he has a wonderful family of four boys, became a Catholic this last year. My aunt, Anne, is a Catholic too, received into the Church in Great Missenden in 1995.

We are indeed fortunate as a family to have found this gift of faith and shared it a little.

A New Life and a New Challenge

I am greatly looking forward to the challenges of this exciting post and the development of the Society for the service of the Church in England & Wales and beyond. The Society has a rich history and the personal stories of so many who seek the full communion of the Catholic Church is so enriching to the life of the Church. I am grateful for the confidence of the trustees and I entrust myself and the Society to the intercession of Barnabas, that son of encouragement so committed to the Lord, for the important work ahead.

I hope I will have the opportunity to reflect with you on this call in the years ahead.

What's The St Barnabas Society All about?

IF YOU WERE faced with the question at a Catholic quiz night 'What is The St Barnabas Society?' hand on heart, how many readers of the A&B News could truthfully answer the question? Now, here is the answer.

'In co-operation with the Catholic bishops, it provides support and assistance to those former clergy and religious of other denominations and their dependants, who have come into full communion with the Roman Catholic Church, until such time as they have been integrated into the Catholic community and have re-established themselves.'



Is this help confined only to men? No, not at all. While the majority are male and from the Anglican religion, the Society has help a number of woman who made the transfer, such as the Sisters of the Blessed Virgin Mary (previously from the Church of the Oxford Oratory). This decision by the sisters in 2013 was made even more difficult, as not all transferred and some life-long friendships were left behind. Additionally, the Society supports former clergywomen and women ministers. **Why St Barnabas?**

Born in Cyprus as a Cypriot Jew, but becoming an early

A Personal Story from Robin Farrow

ROBIN CONVERTED to Catholicism following fourteen years of minsistry as a clergyman in the Church of England. He had a house provided, a good salary and pension, a respected position in a loving community and lifetime job security.

At the time of his conversion, Robin's wife Caroline was pregnant with their third child. They responded to God's call for him to come home to the Catholic Church in faith. Doing so left them homeless and without the means to support their growing family.

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REUBEN RIDES TO SUPPORT UGANDAN CHILDREN.

REUBEN SELBY, aged 17, is one of our long term servers at Christ the King, Steyning (Our Lady Queen of Peace, Adur Valley Parish) and has just completed a mammoth cycle ride from the Czech Republic back to the UK in order to raise funds for the secondary education of young people in Uganda.

Reuben was inspired to undertake this challenge after hearing about it from his girl-friend, Nicole Allan, also 17, and her friends who had completed the ride 2 years previously.

Around 40 cyclists took part, most completing the whole journey with some joining at different points. The journey took them through back roads of the Czech Republic, Germany, Belgium, France and Eng-

land. By the second day the group had 4 punctures, 6 crashes and 4 broken bikes! Thankfully everyone stayed safe except for a few bumps and scrapes. Reuben said that there were many memorable moments on the trip but the friendships they made were unforgettable.

Most of the cyclists were from the Petworth area being friends, family and ex fellow pupils from Christ's Hospital, of Rob Gauntlett and James Atkinson who tragically died whilst climbing in the Alps. - In 2006 Rob became the youngest Briton to reach the summit of Mount Everest.-Then some years later they lost two more great friends. Jack Hutton-Potts and Vaughan Holme to whom One Mile Closer meant so much. In their memory One Mile Closer seeks to provide opportunities, education and enjoyment to youngsters at Nalango Secondary School in Uganda under the Rob Gauntlett Memorial Fund and at Christ's Hospital under the James Atkinson bequest.

The event was organised by Richard Lebon, the main leader along with Rob's father David Gauntlett, the oldest on the ride and Tim, Rob's brother also took part.

Serving the communities of our Diocese How to share the Joy of the Gospel

FR KIERON O'BRIEN and Deacon Stephen Sharpe joined around 70 Catholic evangelists from England and Wales at a meeting with Pope Francis in September to receive practical wisdom about how to share effectively the Catholic Faith at the International Meeting on the Pastoral Project of Evangelii Gaudium in the Vatican.

Pope Francis' call to Evangelization and Mission has transformed the way we live as Church in the city. Deacon Stephen says 'The Church cannot continue to live as we have for the past 50 years, we need to respond to the signs of the times, we need to better understand the radical call to authentic Christian life in contemporary culture'. The parish of St Joseph with St Francis, Brighton has started a year of prayer and reflection as they discern in practical and spiritual terms what Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation 'Evangelii Gaudium' means to the parish.

Pope Francis, said of his Apostolic Exhortation:...'it is about the main mission of the Church, that of evangelising! There are moments when mission becomes urgent and our response to it needs to be revived... How many people are tired and exhausted? How can we share with them the love of God?'

He added: 'There are many possibilities for us to recognise God's presence in today's world... All those engaged in pastoral care are called to read the signs of the times... Jesus spent the whole day looking for workers in the vineyard. Those in pastoral work go out and look for those in need, in search of the Lord.'

Pope Francis ended: '...patience and perseverance. We don't have a magic wand but we do have the Lord who accompanies us and never abandons us. Bearing witness is the beginning of evangelisation and is what touches the heart and transforms it.'

The Pope was addressing around 2,000 delegates from across the world which included representatives from English and Welsh Dioceses. Bishop Mark O'Toole, Plymouth, Bishop Robert Byrne, Birmingham, and Bishop Seamus Cunningham, Hexham and Newcastle, were present.

World War 1: - Poems and reflections

OVER A HUNDRED people, including parishioners, members of other churches and people from the local community came along to an afternoon of poetry readings and reflection at the Sacred Heart church in Caterham on Sunday 3 August to commemorate the outbreak of war in 1914. The church was filled with stunning floral displays of poppies, created by Evelyn Kelly and her team. To a background of music, poems from and about the war were read every quarter of



an hour, while people were invited to light a candle or share their memories, thoughts or prayers on one of the cards of remembrance.

For several people it marked their first return to a Catholic Church for many years, while those from other faiths and no-faith backgrounds also came together with members of the Sacred Heart parish, united by a wish to remember and acknowledge the sacrifice made on behalf of the generation we have become. With teas and a marvellous selection of cakes on hand, there was also the opportunity for people to chat and exchange stories and reflections, making it very much a community event as well as a testament to the fact that we do indeed remember them.

The Sacred Heart has a special connection with the Irish Guards who would march along with their chaplain to the church each Sunday morning to attend Mass; in 1919 the Battalion presented a Union flag which was given to the church and is still there on display.

- We Shall Remember Them

GROUP OF PARISHIONERS from the Parish of the Nativity of the Lord together with parishioners from English Martyrs, Horley who are members of the Reigate Catenian Circle and their wives visited the Somme to pay their respects to the fallen of the First World War.

Respect was paid at the grave of Rifleman V J Strudwick, to be found in the Essex Farm Cemetary, Boesinghe. He was a Dorking resident who was one of the youngest men killed in the war – only 15 at his death. It was also here that the poem 'In Flanders Fields' was written by Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae on the 3 May 1915.

Brothers Mark Allanson, Tom Cahalane, Kevin Redstone and Terry Damer laid a wreath of remembrance on behalf of the Catenian Association (Reigate Circle) at the Menin Gate memorial during the Last Post Ceremony (pictured). The Menin Gate memorial has the names of 54,000 soldiers who

died in the Ypres area prior to August 1917 and have no known grave.

Respects were also paid at the Tyne Cot Cemetery (Ypres), Vimy Ridge (near Arras), The Thiepval Memorial (the Somme), and the Newfoundland Memorial at Beaumont Hamel. The group was ably led by Gerry O'Dwyer of Horley parish who has researched the First World War over many years and was a unique source of information, enabling many of us to research fallen members of our families.

and World War 2: - Fr Cyril - Hero - Remembered

THE HEROISM of St. Maximillian Kolbe is well known and rightly honoured. Not so well known is the heroism of Fr Cyril P Scarborough, (died 24 May 1985) parish priest of The Sacred Heart, Caterham, from 1955 to 1979. In the 1930s he had served as a curate in Caterham. Fr Cyril volunteered as an army chaplain and in 1940 was on the beaches at Dunkirk. He was offered a place in one of the evacuation boats but refused, giving up his place to a married man. He spent the rest of the war in various prisoner of war camps, ending up in the notorious Colditz where he witnessed the arrival of the allied troops who captured the castle. Pat (Patrick) Read who wrote The Colditz Story, upon which the film was based, attended Fr Cyril's funeral. He was an exceptional character and it was fortunate for the parishioners of

Caterham and Whyteleafe that his sacrifice did not end in martyrdom. He is buried in the cemetery on Caterham Hill, surrounded by many of this parishioners. Our picture was taken during Fr Cyril's time at Caterham.

- The Forgotten Mothers

T IS MANY YEARS ago since the wartime evacuation of children. I now find myself remembering the many mothers of that March morning in 1941. When the train pulled out of my home town, Worthing station, and us children waved goodbye to our mothers, I call those mothers *The Forgotten Mothers*

Brighton Deanery Catechists' Meeting

OVER TWENTY CATECHISTS from the Brighton Deanery met at the Sacred Heart Church in Hove on 6 September for a morning of prayer, instruction and reflection, led by David Wills, A&B's Adult Formation Adviser.

Key to the session was Pope Francis' challenge to us to 'be' catechists, not simply to 'work as' catechists.

Catechesis should be much more than teaching, imparting knowledge. We are asked to lead people to Christ by our words and our lives, by giving joyful witness. We can do this by being close to Jesus and by going out of our comfort zone to encounter others - even by going to the margins where we are challenged and uncomfortable.

We considered the five stages people typically go through in the process of full commitment to Jesus, took a hectic one-hour journey through an abbreviated Kerygma Bible Retreat course, and ended with a fascinating presentation on coaching parents to be the providers of their children's religious education.

Unspoken - but at the back of our minds - was the inspiring example of Pope Francis himself, a joyful and humble catechist who reaches out in love to prisoners, migrants, the ill, the poor and the wretched at society's margins.

We are all called to be catechists. A wise person once said: 'faith is caught, rather than taught'. Does our faith infect others?

Because I compare the mothers of that day with my own mother, who with a family of seven children, on that morning walked away from Worthing station, to return to their empty houses, in which only so recently they had enjoyed a whole family life.

I think I speak for the majority of the children of that morning, when I point out that the school teachers well prepared us to be evacuated. We were told 'we were going to a farming community town', with plenty of farm produce to eat, farm animals to see, surrounded with beautiful country side, and our mothers put on a brave face to encourage us to go.

In our family my father put his age up to join the army in the Great War (known now as WW1), then just before WW2 was declared like so many other patriotic old soldiers he joined the Territorial Army, so he was among the first to be called up again. I am the fifth child of a family of seven children, and it was not long before my three eldest sisters were away from home in the services; then during the Battle of Britain our mother like many of the other mothers, took in evacuated children from London, until the German invasion across the English Channel was eminent. Then us four remaining children left mother that March morning for her to walk back to an empty house. I wish to highlight the anguish those *Mothers* must have suffered that day. I take my hat off to them, and may their God bless them, for there has never to my knowledge been any recognition of the pain and their part of the war, that they all must have experienced that March morning.

That is why I call them 'The Forgotten Mothers.'

'I AM FRANCIS.' The priest introducing himself so simply was Mgr Twum-Barimah, a priest of the Catholic Diocese of Koforidua in the Eastern part of Ghana. He spent from 20 August to 30 September with us celebrating Mass in all our three churches, thanks to volunteers who ferried him around. The trail of co-incidences which let him to the parish began some years ago with a chance meeting in Dublin. Then he became good friends with John and Jane who lived in Wapping, so his first visit to England was to an area very different from leafy Surrey. They have since moved here so Fr Francis has been able to visit us too. He obvious enjoyed his stay - he writes, 'I've enjoyed the company and hospitality of the priests in the presbytery, the warmth of parishioners and the sense of humour of both the priests and parishioners. Liturgical life in the parish is impressive: Mass attendance, devotional groups, vibrancy of the youth and particularly the daily hour of adoration before Mass at St Joseph. Also the individual dedicated parishioners who voluntarily have taken up roles in the parish assisting the priests, for example, those who keep the sacristy. The weather during the period of my stay has been very lovely. I'm told it has been exceptional this year. I took advantage of the fine weather to visit places like Arundel (Cathedral), Windsor and Littlehampton. Profound gratitude to all especially Frs Chris Spain and Aaron Spinelli, and Deacon Tim Murrell and all who have assisted me'.

A further example of his modesty that when being asked about himself he did not reveal he is Vicar General of his Diocese! On 28 it was St Joseph's Redhill who provided the BBQ lunch.
