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Rejoicing in the Commitment of our Priests



People, deacons, religious, priests and bishop - a community of Mission

RUNDEL CATHEDRAL WAS FILLED for the annual Chrism Mass, Aheld this year on 12 April.

In an ancient rite, Bishop Richard blessed special oils to be used in baptism, confirmation of young people and adults, anointing of the sick and of the priest at ordination. He also accepted the renewal of promises made at ordination by the more than 90 priests who were present at the Mass, together with 35 deacons and a number of servers.

During his homily the Bishop spoke of how the Diocese must be a place of welcome - 'especially for those who, for whatever reason, have become



a little detached from the community of faith' and also a serving church. In a society that is so often driven by a secularist agenda, and at the present time when so many are experiencing uncertainty, he said that the message of the Gospel - calling people into unity as children of the Father - offers the only real answer.

Bishop Richard invited everyone in the Cathedral and throughout the Diocese to pray for our priests as we rejoice in their commitment and also to pray for vocations to the priesthood. Then, on Sunday 7 May, prayers were said for vocations throughout the Diocese.

On page 4 we have an article on vocations in

the Diocese and an appeal from Bishop Richard to be open to the call to be a priest - 'for the call to men to be preachers of the Word and ministers of the Sacraments is vital to the life of the Church, for our parishes and the Mission of our Diocesan Family."

The Saints' Relics are Coming to Arundel Cathedral



THE NATIONAL PILGRIM VIRGIN STATUE I of Our Lady of Fatima and the Relics of Blessed Jacinta and Francisco will be travelling around the country, visiting various cathedrals, abbeys and churches this year, 2017, the centenary year of the apparitions at Fatima. They will be at Arundel Cathedral on 1st and 2nd July this year, in 33 days' time.

However...by the time the relics reach Arundel, Jacinta and Francisco will no longer be referred to as 'Blessed' - they will carry the title 'Saint.' It was announced in April that the Holy Father will declare the sainthood of Blessed Jacinta Marto and Blessed Francisco Marto during his visit to Fatima on 12-13 May this year.

On canonisation they will become the youngest children (apart from martyrs) ever to be recognised as saints by the church. A year after the apparitions the children succumbed to the influenza epidemic

and died, Francisco at the age of 10, Jacinta aged nine.

The declaration of sainthood is only made at the end of a long and extraordinarily detailed and rigorous examination of the life, character, beliefs and actions of the deceased - as well as the veracity of miracles attributed to their intervention.

Francisco has been described as someone who loved games, was kindly and uncomplaining, and played a reed pipe to which his sister Jacinta would sing and dance. He was a little mischievous but loved nature, was kind and gentle, a peacemaker, but also courageous.

Jacinta was energetic, charming, loved to dance, had many friends and seemed to have a special affinity and love for animals. A little wilful at times, she also had a great love for Jesus and was moved to tears on first hearing the story of His Passion at the age of five.

What is clear is that, following the apparitions in 1917, the lives of Francisco and Jacinta changed in a profound way. Francisco played truant from school so he could

spend time praying to Jesus (the 'hidden Jesus' as he referred to the Blessed Sacrament) and to Mary, seeking to console them. His strongest desire was to go to Heaven - and he did, shortly after receiving his first Holy Communion.

Jacinta was particularly affected by the vision of hell that the children received; she became quiet and withdrawn - but determined to rescue sinners from hell. She practised voluntary mortifications such as giving up lunch and refusing to quench her thirst with water. Forewarned by the Blessed Mother that she would suffer for the love of God and reparation for sinners, Jacinta spent much of the remainder of her short life in pain, suffering bronchial pneumonia, an abscess on the lung, sores, and then tuberculosis. Wasted to a virtual skeleton, without the presence at her bedside of her beloved parents, sibling or cousin, she even offered up her loneliness as a final offering for sinners

Two very young - but very special - Saints.



Good Friday with Horsham Churches Together

HORSHAM'S CARFAX WAS PACKED with around 1,000 people joining together to mark Good Friday with a service at the Bandstand arranged by Horsham Churches Together. Before the service, Horsham Churches Together's Walk of Witness started from two locations: St John's Catholic Church and Brighton Road Baptist Church, with over 300 Christians walking along West Street and East Street, converging at the Bandstand.

An innovation for this year was the distribution of hot cross buns along with serviettes ex-

plaining why there is a cross on a hot cross bun: 'Traditionally eaten on Good Friday, when Jesus Christ was put to death, the bun's cross reminds us of what Jesus did for all mankind - even you!" and "Just a story or the most significant event in all history?' which was a question echoed in the readings and the address by the Revd Peter McIntosh, Interim Moderator of the Horsham United Reformed



Church. Prior to the service, the general public was encouraged to place prayers for Horsham on chalk boards in front of the Bandstand - and these were prayed during the service.

Horsham Churches Together brought the hugely popular 'Messy Church' to The Forum to create 'Messy Easter' as part of Horsham's Piazza Italia family entertainment day. More than 400 children and their families enjoyed making bracelets with crosses, Easter plates explaining the true meaning of Easter, Venetian masks, decorating cakes and 'rolling the stone away' using marbles and paint!

The Activity Tent was decorated with posters of Italian paintings telling the Easter story



along with Bible verses. Children were delighted to take away their very own Bible Society booklets called 'The Easter Poem' or 'The Easter Story'. Leaflets of prayers in Italian and English were given out, along with Messy Easter leaflets giving details of future 'Messy Church' events taking place in churches and schools in and around Horsham - find out more at www.messychurch.org.uk.


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JUST A THOUGHT

Placing Our Cross Between Pentecost And Trinity

The General Election falls neatly between Pentecost and the Feast of the Holy Trinity this year. That's entirely appropriate because the Spirit is (as the beautiful chant, Veni Sancte Spiritus, reminds us) the One who bends what has become rigid, warms cold hearts and corrects distortions. The Trinity, on the other hand, is the perfect vision of community - a community in which the gifts of each are freely given and freely received in a flow of life and love which is at once energetic, gracious, creative and harmonious.

Between these two feasts we must make our cross. And that cross should be what the cross should always be, the focus of our prayer. It symbolises all the brokenness of our society, and all the hope which the Gospel brings as



C UNDAY 7 MAY IS SET ASIDE for World Day of Prayer for Vocations D to Priesthood and Religious Life and, in recognition of this day, Bishop Richard issued a Pastoral Letter (see page 9) together with a special prayer for vocations, included below his Letter. Here, we reflect on the life of the priests of our Diocese and how each of us has a role and an opportunity to live the Gospel message.

For the majority of readers, contact with a priest takes place in the parish. This leads to a tendency for people to live in a parish 'bubble' perhaps being quite insular to matters concerning the wider Diocese. Do we have a tendency to think 'Father will always be there for Mass on Sunday, he'll be there to help solve my problems?'

The reality today is that most people will have been affected by a change in Mass times - indeed, some will be living in parishes where one priest serves communities in a number of churches. However, the good news is that all of us can join in the celebration of Mass on a Sunday. While changing circumstances mean that there will be some 'rationalisation' and changes to Mass times and structures, we are greatly blessed in this country to have a high ratio of priests to people. In some parts of the world, a parish might be the size of our Diocese with the Mass only celebrated in some places very rarely.

Our Priestly Team: the numbers

If you were in a social gathering answering questions on the Diocese at a quiz night how many of us could answer some very basic questions? How many priests do we have; how many are retired or sick; how many men are in formation for priesthood?

The Diocese is greatly blessed to be served by 131 diocesan priests, of whom 92 are serving in parishes (10 serving outside the Diocese and 29 being retired). It is important to recognise that many of those serving in parishes carry out more than one role in the life of the Diocese; multi-tasking is a way of life. Further, the generosity of those who continue to work in parishes beyond the retirement age of 75 is a great blessing; only fourteen of our priests are under 50 years of age.

In past years, the Diocese has been blessed by priests coming from Ireland and, in more recent times, we have also seen a number of former Anglican clergy ordained.

Currently, we are blessed to have six students in formation for the Priesthood. One of them is due to be ordained to the Priesthood this year and we will report on the ordination in our July edition. The Selection Conference for the 2017/18 Academic Year has taken place and Bishop Richard has met those who have put in applications. In addition, the "St. John Vianney Group" for those considering a vocation to the Priesthood meets regularly - and the numbers attending these meetings are encouraging.

Priests dedicated to supporting Priesthood Candidates

Bishop Richard has appointed Fr. Con Foley, Parish Priest of Weybridge, as Vocations Director. He is assisted by four Vocations Promoters: Fr. Aaron Spinelli, Fr. John Inglis, Fr. Simon Hall and Fr. David King. Fr. Aaron has commented on the positive effect of having such a group of priests in the Diocese. Bishop Richard has in addition asked a number of

priests to be available to offer spiritual direction to those who are considering a vocation to the Priesthood.

Not Just Priests - we are ALL Called to Live the Gospel Message

Bishop Richard has spoken often about the Mission of the Diocese. Priests are intrinsic to that Mission, for the Eucharist is the centre of the Church's life and the Priest is called to be minister of Word and Sacrament. It is only when we are rooted in the Eucharist and formed by the preaching of the Word that the whole Church can be effective in Mission. The Priest is not ordained to be a 'service-provider'. Rather, his role as minister of Word and Sacrament enables all whom he serves to take up the Mission to which they have been called. Looked at in these terms, it becomes possible for the whole parish community to evangelise, to live the Gospel message.

Being a member of a parish community, even if you are a Deacon, is not so much about 'helping Father' but about taking a rightful place in the Mission of the Church, served by a priest who is able to fulfil the role for which he is ordained.

Are YOU Called to be a Priest?

Bishop Richard talks of the importance of prayer in developing priestly vocations. This is critical and the Lord will use our prayers in ways that will be beyond our understanding.

Echoing Pope Francis, he comments that being open to the possibility of a priestly vocation involves both good will and a certain risk, for the decision to reflect further on Priestly Vocation and to offer oneself for Formation and Ordination is a step into life-long commitment and service. He ends his Pastoral Letter with the assurance that 'You are needed and valued by the whole of our Diocesan Family and can be assured of the prayers and support of all.'

Vocations to the Priesthood come from within our families, from our parishes, from amongst our altar servers, schools, universities, youth groups, Red Shirts and Pilgrimage experiences - of which our Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes is a very special moment. While those whom God calls to priesthood must ask themselves the question "Is God calling me?", perhaps we might ask the question of others: "Is God calling you to Priesthood? Have you ever thought of being a priest?" Sometimes, the call to be a priest comes in the midst of a busy work life – an insistent 'tug at the sleeve', a question that just has to be answered.

Be open to the possibility of Priesthood. Do not close the door on it for the call to men to be preachers of the Word and ministers of the Sacraments is vital for the life of the Church, for our parishes and the Mission of our Diocesan Family.

well. Before that cross we must discern.

The Spirit who, at Pentecost, rattled the doors and windows, testing the foundations, is also the Spirit who drew forth life and light from the waters of Chaos on the first day of Creation. One and the same Spirit is the outspoken Spirit of Prophecy and the Paraclete, quiet Comforter of the afflicted. Which facet of the Spirit is most needed now in our nation's life?

We were made for communion, not isolation. That's what the Feast of the Trinity celebrates. This is the divine image and likeness we bear.

So the question is: How can our vote best serve the Common Good and create a pathway of hope and healing in our divided world? 'Let anyone who can hear listen to what the Spirit says to the Churches' (Rev 2.7).

A 'Stations Crawl' In Thames Ditton

THE LOCAL CHURCHES TOGETHER group in Thames Ditton wanted to encourage visits to each other's churches this Lent. Someone came up with the idea of each of the churches creating 'prayer-stations' to illustrate the traditional Way of the Cross, so that, by visiting all six churches, pilgrims could pray all 14 - a sort of 'Stations of the Cross Crawl'! As an added (not very Lenten!) incentive, tea and cake were offered in each church on the Tuesday of Holy Week.

Our Lady of Lourdes parish was entrusted with Stations 3-5. An old wooden cross leaning against the altar above a 'scene of crime' body outline with a series of words about 'Fallen-ness' (moral wrong, physical accidents, persecution and depression) radiating outwards illustrated *Jesus Falls For The First Time*. The old baptistery (pictured) with its metal bars was turned into a Roman 'Condemned Cell', on the assumption that if Jesus were being executed today, *Jesus Meets His Mother* would be played out in such circumstances. Visitors were invited to 'come and sit where Mary sat' before an icon of the Holy Family and all her memories of her child.

Finally, St Paul's Primary School, next door to the Church, collected children's reflections on the fifth station and invited people to tie a label to a cross indicating how they could help someone else, as *Simon* of Cyrene Carries Jesus' Cross.

New Superior for St George's Retreat



A T EVENING MASS on 24 April Bisop Richard welcomed Sr Monica as the new Superior of the Augustinian Sisters at St George's Retreat, Ditchling Common,Burgess Hill. The Augustinian Order was founded in 1842 in Bruges, Belgium by Reverend Canon Peter John Maes who devoted his life

to the care of the mentally ill. The Sisters of St. Augustine order was re-formed in 1866 when it established its first home, St. George's Retreat in Burgess Hill, Sussex, principally to care for the mentally and physically ill. The Sisters have continued to care for those that need it ever since.

Semana Santa - Holy Week in Spain THIS YEAR, instead of following Holy Week in the solemnity of our home parish of Epsom, we

THIS YEAR, instead of following Holy Week in the solemnity of our home parish of Epsom, we were invited to stay with family in their Malaga apartment, to see how the Spanish did it! From Palm Sunday till Easter Sunday, the narrow streets of the Old Town throng with crowds watching processions, sometimes eight or nine a day, starting and finishing at different destinations, during the day and night, all over the town.

The tradition goes back over 500 years, when Brotherhoods in the town, representing many trades and professions (similar to Guilds in the City of London) have designed floats which are carried around the town by members of the brotherhood, followed by penitents carrying candles, whose heads are covered, apart from their eyes and whose headgear points to Heaven, a symbol of asking for forgiveness from sin. Some are even barefoot, which is indeed a penance when these processions last up to seven hours! Following some of the processions are people dressed as priests, acolytes, servers, with clouds of incense rising from thuribles. Strangely, priests don't seem to take these roles; all are taken by lay people. Musical bands always bring up the rear.

Each larger than life sized float represents an aspect of the last days of Christ's life and all are different. On Palm Sunday a statue of Christ on a donkey is followed by children with palms. On other days, numerous representations of the grieving Virgin Mary wearing opulent capes in white, black or blue brocade or, in one instance, a cape made of real flowers, stretch behind the statue and lighted candles and fresh flowers precede the statue. As Holy Week progresses, we see statues of Christ being tortured, standing in judgement before Pilate, seeing Barrabas released, carrying His cross, being crucified, entombed and rising on the third day.

On Maundy Thursday at 5pm we were on a balcony overlooking an extra narrow street. To our right the Puerta Nueva (the home of the float) opened and about 300 men manoeuvred a float of the Last Supper into the street! Yes, Jesus at the head of the table with 12 apostles seated at the table, to start their 8 hour procession through Malaga - ending at 1am on Good Friday.

On Good Friday at 10.30pm the church door opens. Out is carried a float of the weeping Virgin Mary all in black, carried on the shoulders of people all in black, followed by penitents and silent drummers all in black, watched by about 200 people all in silence. Mary is in mourning, the world has momentarily stopped. When the float is turned to leave the square, the drummers start their dirge of drumming. This scene really captured for me the despair of Christ's death.

Easter Sunday Mass for us was in the Cathedral - an elderly priest as celebrant, with a strong speak-

Sr Mary Colette Celebrates her Diamond Jubilee

FR STEPHEN HARDAKER and the parishioners of St Mary Magdalene's in Bexhill concluded morning Mass on Friday 21 April with heartfelt congratulations to Sr Colette of the Rosminian Sisters (Sisters of Providence) on the occasion of her Diamond Jubilee, marking 60 years in Religious Life, the date also being her 78th birthday. Sr Colette was presented with a congratulatory letter from Bishop Richard and also a beautifully framed personal citation from Pope Francis, along with a warm round of applause from Fr Stephen (parish priest), Fr Rajesh (assistant priest) and the congregation.

Joan Elizabeth Davison (Sr Colette to be) was born on 21 April 1939 in Cardiff. At the age of 11 she went to Grammar School where she first encountered the Rosminian Sisters who were to have a profound impact for her future life. At age 17 she entered the Rosminian Convent in Loughborough where she took her Novitiate as Sr Mary Colette. Three years later she went to teacher training college and in 1971 was sent to Tanzania to teach African children. Not only does she speak a range of languages from Welsh to Italian, but also Swahili which was essential for her time in Tanzania.

After a few years in Tanzania serving God and His People, Sr Colette had to return to England due to ill health and then spent the following 27 years at the Rosminian Convent in Ely Place, London, teaching in local schools and helping, supporting and feeding the homeless. On leaving Ely Place she moved to Wisbech in Cambridgeshire for her final three years of teaching before retiring in 2004 and coming to the Rosminian Convent in Bexhill-on-Sea. Since coming to Bexhill, Sr Colette has tirelessly served the Catholic community here and at 78 still takes part in many community and social activities within the parish and the diocese.

Finally, Sr Colette made it clear that she did not wish to publicise her Diamond Jubilee widely within the parish, but we did manage to persuade her to join a few friends for a private lunch at the Cooden Beach Hotel, where she was presented with a bouquet of flowers and a special celebration cake, which was enjoyed by all! The parish wishes to now record its appreciation for all the kind work Sr Colette does, especially in visiting the elderly and to mark this amazing milestone in her service to God by simply saying 'thank you Sr Colette.'



The Joy of Marriage – get involved!

T THIS TIME OF YEAR we may go to church on a Sunday and find an array of beautiful flowers or a smattering of confetti in the carpark. These clues help us to realise that a couple has celebrated the wonderful sacrament of marriage. The sadness with this is that we very rarely know them or feel that we are truly participating in this important step on their journey.

CELEBRATING MARRIAGE

The Pope's recent document *Amoris Laetitia* encourages us to refresh the way we celebrate marriage and our support of couples. *The complexity of today's society and the challenges faced by the family require a greater effort on the part of the whole Christian community in preparing those who are about to be married.* AL206


Our Diocesan guidelines have been rewritten in light of this and reflect some of the important changes. We encourage couples to take more seriously the opportunities offered to them in this time of preparation, to see it as a journey of discernment, a time when they can truly reflect on their understanding of the sacrament, its lifelong nature alongside the practicalities of the actual day. Feedback from couples who have participated in this type of preparation is always positive and most appreciate the fact that they are encouraged to step away from the frills and trimmings and asked to reflect on the love they have for each other and the commitment they are about to make.

The journey begins when we ask them to make contact with the parish **a year** before their wedding day. This is to enable them to have adequate time to reflect on all aspects of marriage. It is a profound spiritual experience to contemplate our loved ones with the eyes of God and to see Christ in them. This demands a freedom and openness which enable us to appreciate their dignity. We can be fully present to others only by giving fully of ourselves and forgetting all else. Our loved ones merit our complete attention. Jesus is our model in this. AL32

SUPPORTING COUPLES

In order to support them in this journey we are beginning to develop a network of support couples, couples from within each parish who will welcome them and walk alongside them for the year, sharing their own joys and worries and helping them become more integrated into parish life. The engaged couple are asked to also attend some structured preparation such as a deanery or parish training programme and possibly a course led by Marriage Care. Pope Francis calls for: *specific programmes of marriage preparation aimed at giving couples a genuine experience of participation in ecclesial life and a complete introduction to various aspects of family life.* AL206

The Pope encourages us to continue to support couples, those he calls 'courageous' enough to enter marriage after their wedding day. He says we should be offering welcome, closeness, accompaniment, discernment, and integration into the Body of the Church. It is of great importance that those in the Church work to save marriages. For couples, he gave three words, 'words of gold in married life,' to aid in building up a marriage: 'can I?' (in regards to asking their spouse's opinion), 'thank you,' and 'forgive me'. He encouraged married couples to quickly make peace with each other when ar-



guments arise, and to remember his three phrases, which are crucial for marital growth. '*Georgia 5 October 2016* GETTING INVOLVED

In his closing paragraph Pope Francis states 'no family drops down from heaven perfectly formed; families need constantly to grow and mature in the ability to love'. In light of this we would like to invite families to become more involved in the process of preparing other couples for marriage. Many different opportunities exist for you to get involved, all of which offer excellent training before you begin. You could offer your time to walk with couples during their preparatory year, befriending them and welcoming them into your community. People have asked 'what can I offer?' but reflecting on the Pope's words in Georgia offers us all an ability to share ourselves. You could become more involved and train as part of your parish/deanery marriage team or you could offer to train to be part of Marriage Care who offer excellent relationship preparation before marriage. All training is thorough and will provide you with the skills and resources you need to support couples at this stage of their journey. Each deanery has different requirements about the level of commitment required - but nothing is onerous. All of these actions would greatly benefit those preparing or in the early stages of marriage and are rewarding in their ministry.

Fundraising and collections for Mary's Meals and a local Food Bank

S TUDENTS AT CARDINAL NEWMAN SCHOOL have been holding a number of events to raise money for Charity during the Lent period. The have succeeded in raising over £8,000 for some very worthwhile charities including Mary's Meals and the Hangleton & West Blatchington Food Bank.

Each class had to think of fundraising ideas and put together the activities themselves. Events included cake sales, Mr Hart's Magic Show, a mini fete, a bazaar, sponsored hula hoop and skipping, a sponsored walk, a sponsored read and a number of Staff v Student events including a bleep test, netball and dodge ball.

Mary's Meals will receive £7,000 which means that, combined with the £3,800 raised at Advent, the school has raised enough to feed every child in their linked school in Malawi for a whole year. The charity reaches over 1.2 million impoverished children with a nutritious meal in a place of education every day that they attend school. By providing food in a place of education, Mary's Meals attracts hungry children into the classroom where they can learn, thrive and work towards a positive future.

The Hangleton & West Blatchington Food Bank will receive £1,300 as well as food donations. The aim of the foodbank is to provide food to individuals and families living in the local area who find themselves in crisis or urgent situations. They believe that everyone should have the right to food to feed themselves and their families and help dozens of local families every week.

Dr James Kilmartin, Headteacher, said: 'These charities have become a very important focus for the whole school community. It has been great to see that by acting together we can make a difference. This has been spectacularly demonstrated by the students of Cardinal Newman

Catholic School this Lent and shows the 'caritas' spirit of the school. It has been a real team effort with all staff, students and parents getting involved.'

Magnus MacFarlane-Barrow, Mary's Meals founder and CEO said: 'Today, around the world, 57 million children miss school because of poverty. Instead of sitting in a classroom getting an education, they are working in fields,



begging on street corners, or scavenging among the garbage to survive.

Our vision is that every child should be able to receive one good meal every day in a place of education. Working together with people who share our ideals, we believe that our vision can be achieved in this world of plenty, where there is enough food for everyone.'

Colm Lennon, Chairman of the Hangleton & West Blatchington Food Bank (*pictured above, receiving the cheque from Dr Kilmartin*) said: 'We have a fantastic relationship with Cardinal Newman, who provide us with food collections and financial assistance through the dedication of their staff and students. Without the support of Cardinal Newman and other schools and organisations we would be unable to continue to support local families. We have also been invited to talk to the pupils about the work we do and bring awareness of the poverty that exists in our local community.'

Richard Bishop of Arundel & Brighton **PASTORAL LETTER** for the 4th Sunday of Easter

7th May 2017

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On 5th January this year, Pope Francis said, in an address to the Bishops of Italy:

"The doors [of vocation] are opened through prayer, through good will, through risk," he said. "Jesus told us that the first way to have vocations is prayer, but not all are convinced of this... Pray with the heart, with your life, with everything."[1]

Today, Good Shepherd Sunday, the Church throughout the world is called to reflect on the theme of Vocations to Priesthood and the three themes given to us by the Holy Father – prayer, good will, risk – provide an ideal path for our reflection.

As we look to the future of our Diocese and the ways in which the Mission given to us by Christ will be continued, the Eucharist will always be the centre of our lives. The encounter that we have with the person of Jesus, the Word who is Life, is the pinnacle of our worship and the source of our activity in His Name. While the Diocese is blessed with many wonderful priests, I call on each and every person in this Diocese to join with me in prayer for vocations – for we need priests. Pope Francis' insistent words – "pray with the heart, with your life, with everything" – must find a home in us in every aspect of our lives, and our prayer for vocations to the priesthood is no exception.

To assist us in this work, a new Vocations Prayer Card has been produced and is available in every parish today and will be available in our schools. I ask you to join with me in praying this prayer each and every day.

The praying of the Rosary is a part of many people's lives of prayer. I invite parishes to form groups of people who will commit to praying the Rosary for Vocations to Priesthood.

The practice of Eucharistic Adoration is an aspect of parish life in many parts of the Diocese. Times of Adoration provide excellent opportunities for prayer for Priestly Vocations and I ask every parish to hold a Holy Hour each month for this intention. Materials to assist in this are available on the National Vo-

cations Website.

The Holy Father speaks of good will and risk. For the one whom God calls to Priesthood, both of these are necessary. Good will leads to an openness of mind and heart that enable us to listen to the stirrings of the Holy Spirit. The call to Priesthood, more often than not, comes in quiet ways: the example of a priest; the example of parents and family members as they persevere in Faith; a thought about service to the Church; a renewed experience of God's presence when on retreat or at a day of prayer and celebration; a reawakening of awareness of the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist. These are some examples, but good will is a prerequisite if we are to open our minds and hearts to the voice of the Holy Spirit.

There is also the element of risk – for the decision to reflect further on Priestly Vocation and to offer oneself for Formation and Ordination is a step into life-long commitment and service; of "following Christ the Head and Shepherd, not seeking any gain, but moved only by zeal for souls."[2]

To those of you who sense these stirrings of the Holy Spirit, calling you to service of Christ and his Church, I say this: be open to the call, pray, take the risk. Be a part of the Mission of this Diocese as a Priest. You are needed and valued by the whole of our Diocesan Family and can be assured of the prayers and support of all.

My own Call to the Priesthood

FR CHRIS DOBSON celebrated our Mass on Mothering Sunday and the brilliant Blue Sash choir led our singing.



AT OUR PARISHES of The Assumption of our Lady in Englefield Green and St John of Rochester, we carry on the tradition of Easter basket blessing. It has been our tradition to have our food blessed on Holy Saturday and this is exactly what Fr Hugh Flower did this Easter Weekend. After the fasting of Lent and from Maundy Thursday onwards, the foods of Easter have a special place. WITH THE PASCAL TRIDUUM being celebrated at the town churches of Redhill and Reigate, parishioners living in Merstham were able to make a significant contribution to the village's annual Ecumenical Witness of the Crucifixion. They joined people from the Baptist Church and the Anglican Gatton Team Ministry, walking at noon to the new Co-op Store close to St Teresa's Church.

With the Cross held high, hymns were sung, accompanied by a guitarist from the Baptist Church. Easter eggs and bible readings were handed to passing shoppers.

The Offertory collections during the Easter Masses raised the sum of $\pounds 2,810.40$ which will be shared equally between the work of the Sisters of Mercy hospital at Mutomo, Kenya and the school managed by the Infant Jesus Sisters in Nigeria.

The parish has received a communication from Mutomo which, in common with much of East Africa, is suffering crop failure as a result of severe drought. The sisters have informed us that famine in the surrounding area has resulted in people queuing every day to beg for food. Funds provided as a result of collections held at Masses in the parish have, however, helped to keep the hospital running despite enormous difficulties and the sisters have expressed appreciation of our continued support.



THE CHRISM MASS - PREPARATION OF THE HOLY OILS







B LESSING OF OILS is very ancient with documented evidence of this liturgy from the fourth century, but it is certainly of earlier origin. Olive oil is used as the basis for the three holy oils, and is mixed with balsam, an aromatic resin, for consecration of the Holy Chrism. At the Chrism Mass the Bishop blesses the Oil of Catechumens and the Oil of the Sick as well as mixing the oil and balsam for the Oil of Chrism. He then breathes over the vessel containing the Oil of Chrism, to invoke the Holy Spirit and, as he the says the consecration prayer, the concelebrants extend their right hands towards the chrism, signifying their unity with him. At the end of the ceremony the three vessels containing the oils, each in its distinctive coloured cape, are processed out. The holy oils will then be

decanted into sets of three small vases for distribution to each parish for its use over the following 12 months.







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
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
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
