Ordination of Fr Roy Waters *the Awesome Privilege of Becoming a Priest*

RUNDEL CATHEDRAL WAS FILLED on a warm Friday evening as Bishop Richard ordained Deacon Roy Waters (pictured below) to the priesthood. Family, friends and well-wishers were joined by around 50 priests and 35 deacons in a solemn and moving ceremony of ordination.

Deacon Roy's two sons, Rod and Tim, their wives and his grandchildren watched as he was presented to Bishop Richard, was examined, knelt in obedience and then prostrated himself while the beautiful Litany of the Saints was sung by the assembly.

There was special warmth as the priests, one by one, laid their hands on Deacon Roy's head, invoking the presence of the Holy Spirit. Then, following the Prayer of Consecration, Fr Roy was invested with his stole and chasuble, was anointed, and exchanged the kiss of peace with each of his brother priests while the choir sang the first line of Psalm 117 'Praise the Lord, all you peoples.'

Then, for the first time, Fr Roy concelebrated Mass as the setting sun warmed the honey-coloured stone of the cathedral and the interior was lit by shafts of bright light from the high windows.

It was a long journey for Fr Roy. Sussex born and reared, brought up an Anglican, he enjoyed an extensive career in telecommunications while being active in the local community, particularly with the Samaritans charity. He was received into the Church in 1994 and was ordained to the Permanent Diaconate in 2002. Following the sudden death of his wife Hilary, Roy re-considered his future and returned to St John's Seminary in Wonersh to train for the priesthood.

After the Ordination and Mass, Fr Roy was escorted back into the Cathedral to the loud applause of the waiting congregation. A long queue formed as family, friends, clergy, religious and parishioners lined up to receive a blessing from the popular newly-minted priest.

It was a momentous day and the last words belong to Fr Roy: 'To become a priest is an awesome privilege but a role I look forward to living for the rest of my days, leaning heavily on the Lord Jesus.'

Sent to Coventry (Cathedral - and enjoying it!)

WERE BLESSED with lovely weather for our day pilgrimage to Coverture Content of the pilgrimage to Coventry Cathedral. Stopping off on the way at Bicester for a sandwich lunch, we arrived at the Cathedral for our guided tour at 1.30pm.

Coventry has had three cathedrals: only a few ruins remain of the first; the second was St Michael's, a 14th-century Gothic building that remains a ruined shell after its bombing during WWII; the third is the new St Michael's Cathedral, built around the destruction of the former.

Celebrated as the UK's favourite 20th Century building, Coventry Cathedral is known all over the world as an icon of peace, and a truly stunning venue. We started our tour in the old ruins. The Cathedral was bombed in 1940 and the New Cathedral was opened in 1962, rising up next to the ruins in stark contrast. The theme of peace and reconciliation resonates around the buildings old and new, there is a real sense of refuge and calm as you wander around taking in the architecture and design.

We were privileged to celebrate Mass in the Chapel of Unity, one of the side chapels in the Cathedral. Time was given for personal reflection and sightseeing and we ended



our afternoon by staying and participating in Choral evensong, sung by the girl choristers. Almost everyone agreed that we needed to visit again at some point as there was so much to see and do in the limited time we had available. Coventry Cathedral is definitely somewhere we would recommend visiting.

To Africa, from Worth Abbey, A New Bishop

 $\mathbf{F}^{\text{ORMER WORTH SCHOOL STUDENT}}$, the Right Rev John MacWilliam, 68, was ordained Bishop of Laghouat in Algeria last month, in a service held at Worth Abbey. His diocese – as many of the national newspapers pointed out – is ten times the size of Britain.

Bishop MacWilliam spent 18 years in the army before making his religious vows in 1991 and a year later was ordained a priestof the Missionaries of Africa (White Fathers), again at Worth Abbey.

Laghouat is, by size, one of the largest dioceses in the world and has a population of four million people, the vast majority of whom are Muslims, speaking Arabic and French. It is estimated that there are only several hundred Catholics in the Diocese, spread across the region, mainly missionary priests or sisters, or expatriates working in the oil industry.

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JUST A THOUGHT Which was best?

Which was best? ARECENT 75TH ANNIVERSARY of a First Holy Communion set off a reflection of how things have changed in that time both in the Church and in life in general.

We were prepared for the Sacrament in our class in school and sat together on the day. Essentially parents were not involved. Except for such things as buying - or more likely making, the girls' dresses. In the war years, when clothing like everything else was rationed, this might have meant remaking some other piece of clothing, even mother's wedding dress.

In church, Mass was said 'up the wall', the priest addressing God on our behalf with his back to us and any responses were said by a server (boys and men only). Bells were rung to tell us about the important parts of the Mass and everything was in Latin. Children were expected to be very quiet and so usually smaller children were not brought to Mass, parents attending different Masses. Things were pretty different beyond the Church too. In 1942 many fathers were away in the forces, some of them not to return. A posting abroad might mean several years away, with little photographically reduced letters as the only means of communication. Food was rationed and women, many of whom worked to replace the men who had gone to the front, did miracles with what they had. But which was better? Are the stresses any less today than they were in those years? Was the world better? Was the Church better?

In Port with Apostleship of the Sea

As Catholics, we take the sacraments and our local parish for granted. But if you are a Catholic seafarer, you can go for months without any contact with the life of the Church. This is where Apostleship of the Sea (AoS) comes in. Greg Watts a freelance journalist working closely with AoS, in his words and pictures, reviews the work of this agency with A&B Special Correspondent Peter Burholt.

A oS IS UNIQUE in being the only Catholic Agency serving the maritime industry. This month, 9 July is Sea Sunday, when the Church asks us to pray for seafarers and support the work of AoS, whose chaplains and ship visitors provide practical and pastoral help in ports around the coast of Britain.

The world of the seafarer is a hidden one, and it is one that might appear to have little bearing on our lives. Most of us are far more familiar with airports than seaports. Yet around 90% of the goods imported into the UK arrive by sea. This includes everything from bananas and computers to coffee and cookers.

Life at sea is tough. Seafarers work long hours for little pay and see very little of their families back home. In some cases, they can be at sea for weeks - or even months. Because the seafarers make long voyages it is very difficult for them to get off the ships. AoS then goes onto the ships to welcome them and see if they can help with support.

Meeting Spiritual Needs

One of the tasks of Rev Roger Stone (pictured here and on the right), AoS port chaplain to Southampton and a number of ports on the south coast, is to try and meet the spiritual needs of the Catholic seafarers he encounters. An example of this was when, earlier this year, the Polish captain of a tanker ship said he was keen to go to Mass and also receive the Sacrament of Recon-

ciliation. 'Mass was being celebrated in a church five minutes' drive from the terminal, but I drove him into Southampton so he could attend a mass in

Polish and celebrate the Sacrament of Reconcilia-

tion in his native tongue,' said Roger.

'He was really relieved to be able to go. On the way back to the ship he commented that we did all this just for one person. It was quite clear to me that the Holy Spirit led me to that ship, to him, and required me to help him to receive just what he needed.'

Roger makes seafarers aware of the Stella Maris application, which they can download onto their mobile phones or other devices. This gives them access to daily readings, reflections and much more throughout their time on board. He also shares the Gospel of the day on his Facebook page. He is impressed by the faith of many of the seafarers he meets. He saw an example of this during Lent this year. 'On some car ships I visited, the Indian crews from Kerala and Tamil Nadu refrained from meat and fish for the whole of Lent. They only ate vegetables and rice. This was a real sacrifice for them because their work is physically demanding at the best of times and going without does cause them some difficulty.'

Offering Practical Help: The MV Independent Story

As a port chaplain, Roger is also there to offer practical help to seafarers when they have problems. A good example of this was in 2013 when the MV Independent was arrested in Shoreham because of an unpaid fuel bill. When he heard the news, Roger visited the crew to see if there was anything he could do. The arrest of the Independent lasted for 13 months, something he had not anticipated.

'Initially it was not envisaged that the ship would be arrested for long because the International Transport Federation said the ship owner was hoping to re-finance. Far more ships are detained than arrested. Ship arrests are not that common, but when they occur it's a serious matter. Sometimes the company re-finances and the person who lodged the complaint is paid and the ship is released from arrest.'

Roger and his team of volunteer ship visitors visited the Independent many times during its time in Shoreham. When he realised that the promised re-financing was going nowhere he contacted the media to raise awareness of the plight of the crew and to try to bring about a conclusion to the situation.



'I put the master in touch with a maritime lawyer whom I had met in connection with a previous arrest and he acted to protect their interests and ultimately secured payment of all unpaid salaries of the crew on board. It appeared that all the crew who had gone home were without their wages being paid. On application of the Admiralty Marshal, the court ordered the sale of the vessel and unpaid salaries were paid out of the sale proceeds. This took longer than it might have done because a creditor with a prior claim, the port authority, took time to lower its claim.'

The Effect on the Stranded Crew

So how did the mood of the crew change as the months rolled on? 'Initially there were several crew on board, but the company paid for all but two to travel home. Mikhail, the master, and Igor, an able seaman, were left on board. Whenever we visited, their spirits lifted, but both suffered mental fatigue, angst, and we were seriously concerned that they were becoming depressed. They had nothing to do all day, just keep the ship ticking over at the bare minimum.'

Roger added that the worst aspects of the arrest were the isolation, desperation, loneliness and no money going home to pay for their families' basic needs. When a company hits financial problems the first casualty is normally the crew's salaries, which are not paid. But crews tend to tolerate this because the prospect of some money some time is better than no money at all.

'Igor had a wife and two young boys to clothe, feed, and educate. He was seriously concerned. His wife was borrowing money wherever she could, just making the debt worse. AoS gave him an ex gratia payment of \$2,000. That made a huge difference to his family at home.'

Helping to Maintain Human Dignity

During the ship's arrest, ship visitors took the master and Igor to local churches for Sunday Mass, to the Shoreham Airshow and local museums. The justice and peace group at St Mary of the Angels in Worthing wrote to the Government minister responsible for shipping and demanded answers and action.

'The most important thing AoS did was to maintain regular visits to the crew' said Roger. 'This showed them that we really cared about them. We gave them Easter gifts and Christmas gifts and food and drink. We tried to help them to maintain their human dignity throughout the long, sorry process.'

refurbishment and which can now be found on display in a glass-fronted oak cabinet. An invitation was offered by Olive, a resident, to look around her flat. This was graciously accepted and appreciated. It had a wonderful, homely feel and was nice decorated, as well as boasting an 11th century upright, original wooden column at one end of the accommodation. Tea/coffee and biscuits followed up the visit before the group dispersed. This certainly is a remarkable place, which was once the only one of its kind left in Europe. Now, however, it is unique as it is thought to be the only one in the world in the administration of its role and purpose. Visits can only be made via appointment. On a cloudy but dry morning about 60 people joined parish priest Fr Peter Newsam to celebrate Mass once again in the place where Bl Margaret

would have prayed, a very special feeling. We were happy that this celebration was repeated after a gap of two years, and thanked the manager of the Cowdray Ruins for her help in making our visit possible.

20 Years of Perpetual Eucharistic Adoration

TANN'S PARISH IN BANSTEAD, Surrey celebrated 20 Years of perpetual Eucharistic Adoration on 29 April 2017. In 1997, as the then parish priest Canon Tom Treherne, first encouraged the parish to commence Eucharistic Adoration, asking it to pray for the building up of faith in the parish as well as to pray for vocations, so it continues until today. Perpetual Eucharistic Adoration began on the chosen feast day of St Catherine of Siena 29 April 1997 with an Inauguration Mass. St Catherine was known as the Saint of the Eucharist, for her devotion to the Blessed Sacrament, living only on the Eucharist for the last seven years of her life.

On 29 April 2017, Fr. Giandomenico Ziliotto celebrated a Mass of Thanksgiving to mark the 20 years of Adoration when a letter was also read out from Bishop Richard. This was followed by a celebration with a special cake, sandwiches, tea, coffee in the hall to mark the occasion as well.

In his letter, Bishop Richard congratulated the parish saying he was certain 'this continuing devotion to prayer before the Blessed Sacrament will have brought many blessings to those who give their time in adoration, to the parish community, to the diocese and indeed, to the wider world. Many people came during the annual 40 Hours Adoration to adore Our Lord, which this year took place from the 16 to 18 May. It drew to a close with Benediction. For those of us there it was an awe-inspiring experience. It truly felt that heaven was in our Sanctuary. Our thanks to Fr Miceal and our faithful adorers for this continuing Adoration which not only benefits our Parish but the world around us! The Sanctuary is pictured at the end of the 40 hours.

The Retrouvaille programme Saved Our Marriage

TWELVE YEARS AGO the walls finally crumbled in a marriage that for many years left myself and my wife Frances feeling unloved, unheard, alone and unwanted. The final devastating blow came when I admitted to my wife that I had been unfaithful to her years before. Following my disclosure I fell into a depression which lasted for almost four years.

It was hard to imagine that our lives could get any worse than was, but it did. For 17 years I carried the secret of my infidelity. It was an extremely painful time for Frances and our daughters and at one point I seriously contemplated suicide.

We were in the darkest coldest of places, and hardly spoke a word to each other. We tried counselling, we read self-help books, we saw a psychologist. Things improved a little but we spent our time walking on eggshells. There was no intimacy or depth in our conversation or in our lives - physically or emotionally. We became convinced that for us separation was the only option. It was at this point our prayers were answered. I saw an article for an organisation called Retrouvaille. The advert read: Does Your Marriage Bring You Joy? We both knew the answer. I showed Frances the advert and following a phone call to a Retrouvaille representative we registered and two weeks later we attended the weekend programme. The programme consisted of one full weekend beginning on Friday evening and finishing on Sunday evening, followed by four, one day, post-programme days. Presentations were delivered by three couples and a priest. The focus of the weekend sessions was on teaching couples new means of communication. Attendees are taught effective ways to listen and how to share their pain with their spouse respectfully. Back in February 2007 we couldn't believe the effect the Retrouvaille programme would have on us. During that weekend we began to rediscover the love for each other that for so many years was lost. Today we are happier than we ever thought possible. Our relationship goes from strength to strength. If you're reading this article and you're a couple in pain, please don't give up, help is out there! Frances and I are now the co-ordinators for Retrouvaille England and Wales. We, along with thousands of other couples are proof that the Retrouvaille programme works. Our next weekend programme takes place in the Focolare Centre, Welwyn Garden City from 15 to 17 September. The Big Church Day Out - Not to be Missed



EVERY SUNDAY IN THIS DIOCESE, there are probably (and this is a total guess...) around 300 Masses celebrated. All around Sussex and Surrey, people gather in their communities to fulfil Jesus' command to 'do this in memory of me'.

On Sunday 28 May, I was at one of those Masses, but it wasn't my usual Mass. Indeed, there wasn't much about this Mass that was 'usual'. The celebrants were a Monk from Worth Abbey, a priest from another part of the country, and a Franciscan Friar of the Renewal. The location was a 'big top'



tent, and the music ministry was provided by two of the biggest names in Christian music: Matt Maher and Audrey Assad - two people who normally play to stadiums as part of world tours.

As for the congregation, there were about 800 of them. Some sat on the ground, others on hay bales! Most, though not all, had been camping nearby the night before.

The Mass in question was part of Big Church Day Out. An annual event held right here in our own Diocese - at Wiston House, near Storrington - and one of the biggest Christian events in the world. Each year, more and more Catholics are coming to BCDO, and the organisers go to great lengths to make us feel welcome.

A lot of those at Mass came from other parts of the country, but there were also large groups there from Crawley, Guildford, Brighton, Weybridge, Burgess Hill, Chichester, and several other places.

Big Church Day Out has been running for nearly a decade now, and regularly attracts in excess of 25,000 people over

Most of the action happened on the main stage and the 'illuminate stage', but for those looking for something a little more sedate, there was also the tea tent, complete with ice cream stalls, tea and comfy chairs!
