Building A Better Future

800 school students from 60 schools all over A&B Diocese gathered at Worth Abbey Church for the annual Good Shepherd Celebration

 $T^{\text{EMPERATURES WERE FORECAST TO EXCEED 30 DEGREES CELSIUS and this year there were two extra attendees - St John Ambulance volunteers in green uniforms - who kept a watchful eye on proceedings, water bottles at the ready.}$

The Abbey Church was filled and, on the stroke of 11:30am, placard-bearing children erupted from the dark sides of the church and processed towards the sanctuary, lit by blinding white light from the high lantern windows of the vaulted dome. The slogans reminded us to 'FORGIVE THOSE WHO HURT YOU, SEE GOD IN EVERYONE, LOOK AFTER THE ABANDONED, PRAY FOR FULL COMMUNION, PROTECT AND CARE and HELP OTHERS BEFORE YOURSELF'.

This little drama set the mood beautifully, and was followed by a welcome from the Director of Education, Marie Ryan. After this, the children paraded their school banners into the church, a varied and colourful spectacle, accompanied by the singing of 'The Kingdom of Heaven (the Beatitudes)' with music from Chatsmore School.

The Gospel reading, by Deacon Andrew Bayes, was from St Matthew (6:1-6, 16-18) and asks that we give to the needy, but not in a showy way, drawing attention to ourselves. St Peter's East Grinstead then led us in a reflection of the Gospel by performing themes of loss, suffering, caring, prayer, joy and union, moving in and out of the columns of bright light.

In his homily the Bishop spoke of the importance of caring and sharing with those less fortunate. A highlight of the celebration was each school's procession to the sanctuary with its individual 'brick', a shoe-box-sized container, decorated on one side with one of the six new beatitudes proposed by Pope Francis (see accompanying photos). The bricks symbolically represented the building of foundations of our Common Home. Appropriately, the day's theme was 'Seeking to build a better world.'


The service ended with what has become a happy tradition: the A&B Diocese schools' presentation of a cheque to Mission Together – the Pope's official children's charity for overseas mission – to help in its varied educational, medical and welfare projects.

The cheque for £8,645.93 was presented by pupils from Cardinal Newman School and accepted by Fr Tony Chantry and Sheila Issac from Mission Together.

Then, like the cork popping from a bottle, it was all over, and a great surge of school students burst out into the hot and blinding sunlight. Picnics were produced and there was a rush for the shady spots, under the trees, in the shadows of the school buildings, even under the hedges. It had been a memorable, a spectacular day – with lots to talk about.

New SVP Shop for A&B



T WAS THE HOTTEST DAY OF THE YEAR SO FAR when Bishop Richard arrived to bless and Lofficially declare open the new SVP community shop at 127 Portland Road, Hove.

A small group of patrons and staff were waiting, sipping cold drinks and fanning themselves amid the clothes racks, books and bric a brac. 'The SVP does extraordinary work' the Bishop said, explaining that he had learned quite a lot about its work over the years, adding that 'much is done quietly - as people say, it's the Church's best kept secret'.

Mary, a long-time customer of SVP shops, was checking the range of stock and the pricing as she browsed the dresses 'They are very well priced, so many charity shops now have inflated their prices,' she commented.

The Society of St Vincent de Paul (SVP) has more than 40 similar shops in England & Wales. They are described as community shops - not charity shops. Their purpose is not just to raise money for charity. They are deliberately situated in less affluent areas and serve local communities, selling affordable goods to disadvantaged individuals and families, offering a listening ear and, where appropriate, arranging for SVP members to visit those most in need. They also provide a visible presence of Christian concern, offer volunteering and employment opportunities and reduce wastage of materials.

As St Peter's Catholic Church is nearby, the Bishop joked with Fr Jerry that he could direct people very easily at the end of Mass: 'turn left, go 100 yards, passing Costa Coffee, stop before you get to Sainsbury's.



Carpet of Flowers at Arundel

THE FEAST OF CORPUS CHRISTI is celebrated at Arundel Cathedral with its world-famous ■ Carpet of Flowers. This year it was prepared from 12-14 June ready for the celebration of the Feast on 15 June. The highlight is the full length of the aisle decorated with flowers in a design unique to each year. This year the theme of the carpet was the centenary of the death of the Cathedral's founder; Henry, XV Duke of Norfolk, 1847-1917, pictured at the age of 21 when he commissioned Arundel Cathedral.

Catholic, he commissioned what is now Arundel Cathedral to celebrate his coming of age. Later to commemorate his marriage to Lady Flora Hastings he had St John's Cathedral in Norwich built. Amongst other projects, to further the education of young people, he co-founded St Edmund's College, Cambridge.

The Cathedral Dean, Canon Tim Madeley said 'It is a great privilege this year to celebrate the life of this extraordinary man who in all manner of ways has influenced the life of people in Sussex and beyond for many generations. Going around the displays gives the visitor ample opportunity to explore more deeply the life of Duke Henry and to admire the incredi-



ble skill of those who put together the floral creations.

Part of the completed carpet is pictured above and below and to the right pictures of the ladies and gentlemen of Arundel preparing the carpet. Shortly after the picture of Jim Myerscough sitting on the floor was taken, Jim suffered a dislocated hip and was transported to hospital where it was treated.

On the following day, the Feast Day, Jim was back in the cathedral for the Mass. It was concluded by the procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the Castle and we returned to the Cathedral for Benediction.

Grandparents Meet and Consider their role as Shepherds

RANDPARENTS FROM THROUGHOUT THE DIOCESE, some 140 of them representing Over 400 grandchildren, enjoyed a day's pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady of Consolation of West Grinstead. The activities included Mass, talks, a rosary procession in the gardens and a picnic in the grounds, enjoying the summer sunshine (below is the group from Effingham and Fetcham enjoying a leisurely lunch).

A key talk was given by Lisa de Quay (pictured right), the Chair of the trustees of Crown of Thorns, a registered charity best known for its work in promoting the Holy Rosary as a means of achieving peace and personal comfort for suffering people.

Lisa began by speaking of her own involvement with sheep from her childhood introduction to 'Mary had a little lamb' to keeping a variety of different breeds of sheep for more than 30 years. Jesus, she reminded her

audience, spoke of his listeners as sheep - the most commonly mentioned animal in the Bible. From discussing the qualities of sheep, Lisa moved on to shepherds, reminding us that it was shepherds who were the first people to set eyes on the child Jesus - and the saints and seers who were shepherds included the Fatima visionaries (see page 7).

From considering the biblical teaching about sheep, shepherds and sheepdogs, Lisa then drew out her lessons for grandparents.


Sheepdogs are like priests, helping the Good Shepherd care for the sheep. She reminded her audience that Bishop Richard is calling for more good young sheepdogs for the sheep of Arundel & Brighton. 

JUST A THOUGHT

A special way of supporting priests

THAVE JUST RETURNED from my an-Inual clergy retreat – my 38th year. Every year after the Feast of Pentecost six priests, including myself, go to a West Country retreat house for a time of prayer, reflection and rest. The six priests come from Arundel and Brighton diocese (three) and three from Southwark archdiocese.

The principles of our group are founded on 'Jesus Caritas' a spirituality based on Blessed Charles de Foucauld. The life of a secular priest is an unusual life and does not have the structure of the life of a religious priest such as a monk or a friar. In busy lives and often living alone, the secular priest in his vocation needs the support of men in the same situation and who understand the calling.

As well as our annual retreat, my group meets once a month for prayer before the Blessed Sacrament, Divine Office, review of life, socialising and fun. The review of life consists of sharing our joys and sorrows in our ministry. We do a lot of listening to brother priests weighed down by negative situations in our parishes, offering support and sometimes experienced advice. We like to think that we keep each other buoyant in

I believe that as the number of priests declines in this country it is essential that time is given for this priestly support.

New Director Takes Charge at St Cuthman's

Jon Harman talks to A&B News' Peter Burholt about his background and his journey to becoming Director at St Cuthman's. Also, he gives his early thoughts about his vision for the future of the retreat, once referred to as being one of the jewels in the Diocesan crown.

Who are you and where did you come from?

BORN IN 1969, I originally came from Bedfordshire. My family moved to Norwich in the early 1970's with my father's work at Barclays Bank. I have three brothers and a sister. We are a strong Catholic family and I quickly got involved with cathedral life as an altar server. In the early 1980s we moved to Guildford, where the unforgettable Canon Cox had built the new church and community centre. What an amazing man!

What about education?

I was very fortunate to be sent to the Notre Dame High School in Norwich, which gave me a good Catholic education. Well, I guess one would say that my further education has happened in fits and starts. I educated myself via the Open University in Charity Finance and Management, and then through the University of Chichester, studying the management of health and social care services. I have also completed modules in contract, employment and company law at the University of Portsmouth.

Are you married and do you have children?

The answer to both is 'yes'. I met Niki at a parish youth group in Guildford and we were married at the Church of St Joseph in 1990. We have been blessed with three children – Jessica (20), Toby (18) and Millie (15).

How does your work career qualify you as Director of St Cuthman's? That's a good question, as my working life started with the Inland Revenue! However, I quickly realised that I wanted to give something back to society and, as such, I applied to join Ravenscourt Trust in West Sussex. There I started as an administrator and ended up as director in charge. Not only did we look after people with drug and alcohol problems, we were also very involved in supporting the families – who are often ignored and have little support in very difficult situations. Sadly, government cut backs have reduced local authority funding and the Centre has had to close.

What inspired you to train as a Permanent Deacon?

Normally, this type of question needs a bit of thought – but Jon's response was quick and precise.

This takes me right back to my involvement with Norwich Cathedral as a server. In the late 1970's Deacon Ray, one of the first deacons in England, gave me great inspiration in the way he carried out his role – very pastoral and very understanding and gentle. I have always had a feeling about getting more involved in church life, but I kept gently pushing this feeling aside. However, Deacon Ray's life model never left me - but I was distracted with work and a growing family.

You asked if there was a 'Road to Damascus' moment in my life? No, not really. I was in DABCEC one day and a leaflet on discerning the Diaconate caught my eye – and the rest is history! After two years of application and discernment, I decided to apply to commit myself to formation, both in prayer and in education.

Bishop Richard and the Diocesan team have been a great support and. God willing, I will be ordained next year. This is a wonderful time to become a deacon in the Diocese in this period of its development and I'm looking forward to the challenge with enthusiasm and, of course, a little

How did you come to apply for the position as Director of St Cuthman's? Was there a long drawn out process, as candidates were interviewed and assessed?

A wry smile crept across Jon's face as he imagined that situation.

I had, for some time, wanted to be at St Cuthman's. I heard that the Director, Mary Jane, was leaving so I made a completely speculative application. I was interviewed by Bishop Richard, Mgr Tony Barry and Frances Lindsay-Hills, a long-term Anglican member of the St Cuthman's Management Committee. At this interview I put forward my vision for the future of St Cuthman's and, as you see, I was successful. I started on 10 May for an interim period of six months.

This is a wonderful position, which enables me to combine all my experience and education. I was delighted to find that I inherited a wonderful team from Mary Jane and they are all committed to the ethos and future direction of St Cuthman's. Bishop Richard has given a strong steer on formation for the Diocese and the role of St Cuthman's.



What do you see as your mission at St Cuthman's?

Such a small sentence, but what a big question. On a practical aspect, I see a priority for governance – prioritising guest safety and guest comfort in both the buildings and in furnishings, and in the chapel which will need replacing in the fullness of time. In addition, the broken bridge over the lake needs replacing; it is an iconic part of the grounds and offers a popular location for reflection. We need an affordable and creative solution for the bridge. I would like to see more volunteers helping in all areas, for example the upkeep of the grounds; maybe we could involve agricultural colleges.

Turning to pastoral and spiritual matters, St Cuthman's has a very simple mission statement; 'The Diocesan Centre for Formation in Prayer'. My mandate is to spread the word on what we can offer, to involve more laity in the life of St Cuthman's and in education. I need to go out and meet people, to become known in deaneries and with Diocesan priests. I want to see more parish involvement and for people to come forward with their ideas. Everyone should feel free to call me with the simplest of questions

If you were to look back in 10 years' time, how would you measure

This unexpected question to the newly appointed Director took a few moments to answer.

I would wish that we are seen as a place where people can feel at peace – both physically and spiritually. I like our guests to feel spoilt, that we are taking time to offer a kind welcome - to those of our Faith, to others who have a different belief and to non-believers alike. A place where people are loved and can be healed.

If I had a magic wand, what would I wish for? That's an interesting question! I would like to see St Cuthman's developed so that we could attract a wider range of guests, who may not be able to pay the current charges; to have enough capacity to gather all the Diocesan clergy in a new chapel; to be an attraction to the young, for festivals and for camping. Finally, it would be wonderful if we could welcome everyone who carries out a role in the Diocese and offer them formation, prayer and encourage-

St Cuthman's has a new leader in a period of change and evaluation. We have in Jon a wonderful combination of his past experience of caring for those in need and his deep understanding of formation and prayer. Make it your endeavour to experience St Cuthman's and to meet up with Jon. We wish him every success in his mission.

airport ministry and our sincere thanks and best wishes go to Fr Alec Fraser (Southwark Diocese), a nonagenarian who was much loved by the Sunday Parishioners. They treasured his homilies and one young Gatwick employee used to go home every week and write down what he had heard so that he could read it again during the week. Fr Alec's mind is still very young and alive so we guess that he will continue with his reading and enjoying his new-found talent for poetry writing. The climax of the celebration was the recognition of a special family - Maggie and Bill Elias and their daughter Alexandra.

Words fail to express our gratitude to the Elias family for all they have given to the Chaplaincy, not least for providing sacristy duties for over 36 years. We know that Bill and Maggie were worshipping here and undertaking sacristy work in preparation for the Sunday Mass in the early 1980s. Typically, they arrived 30 minutes before the Mass so that everything would be ready for the priest to celebrate the Eucharist for the congregation - passengers and workers at the airport.

Maggie and Bill have been connected with the airline industry for almost 50 years and now their daughter Alexandra follows in their footsteps. In all those years it is remarkable that they have never missed their Chaplaincy duties, unobtrusively keeping the Chaplaincy going and supporting so many clergy and laity who have passed through. We pray that God will bless them and reward them for all their generous service to the Church.



Fatima Comes to Arundel for Two Days



RUNDEL CATHEDRAL was full on Saturday morning, 1 July, as three children, dressed as the Avisionaries, walked slowly down the aisle, (see above) followed by the National Pilgrim Virgin Statue of Our Lady of Fatima (below) and the relics of the newly-canonised child saints, Jacinta and Francisco Marto (above right).



Arundel Cathedral was the 13th of 30 venues throughout England & Wales cathedrals, abbeys and major churches to be visited by the statue and relics during this centennial year of the Apparitions of Fatima.

A full programme of events was provided, including opportunities for prayer and veneration of the relics; prayer intention cards that, after completion, would be taken to the shrine in Fatima; opportunities for enrolment and investiture of the Brown Scapular; displays (schoolchildren's work pictured right) and a bookstall.

Bishop Richard presided at a packed Mass on the Sunday to witness the departure of the statue and relics to Southampton on the next leg of the national tour; he spoke of the simplicity of heart of the three visionaries, contrasting it with the complexity, excess baggage and clutter that dominate our own lives. The way to peace is to recover the simplicity of heart and mind that opens us to the message of the Gospel - peace through Jesus, born of Marv.





I attended a particularly lovely rosary service, complete with music, singing and processing in the Cathedral - it's held most days.
