TWO NEW 'SERVANTS' FOR A&B

PAUL BILTON AND TRISTAN CRANFIELD from A&B Diocese were ordained Deacons in July, Paul in St Paul's Church, Haywards Heath, and Tristan in the Villa Palazzola, just outside Rome.

Paul is a Permanent Deacon serving in Haywards Heath Parish, while Tristan is at the Venerable English College in Rome, preparing for his ordination to the Priesthood.

The word 'Deacon' means 'servant.' In this case the deacon serves the Church, particularly by assisting the bishop and priest, and also 'promoting and sustaining the apostolic activities of the laity' (*Pope St John Paul II*).

There is a triple focus: proclaiming, preaching and teaching the Word; assisting at the Altar in the Liturgy, and the care of the poor and needy.

The role of Deacon is an ancient one, going back to apostolic times, and the permanent diaconate flourished up to the fifth century but then declined in the Western Church, surviving only as an intermediate stage for candidates preparing for priesthood.

Restored by the Second Vatican Council, the permanent diaconate has since flourished and there are currently 50 Permanent Deacons in A&B Diocese.

 $T^{\rm RISTAN'S\ ORDINATION\ was\ held\ in\ a\ small\ church\ dedicated\ to\ Our\ Lady\ of\ the\ Snows\ at\ Villa\ Palazzola,\ the\ summer\ residence\ of\ the\ Venerable\ English\ College.}$

He reflects that 'thankfully, having made a good retreat and having had plenty of time over the last few months to reflect on the particular nature of the diaconate meant that, on the day, my brothers and I were able to concentrate well on the meaning of what was going on in the various parts of the Ordination Rite...it was all the more meaningful and powerful in opening our eyes to God's presence in the rite, and in the Mass, because we were well prepared to take part in it.'

Mass was followed by lunch in the Villa garden with a few members of the family and friends, including several priests from A&B Diocese (*pictured below with Bishop Terence Drainey*).

Tristan will spend his final academic year in Rome, finishing studies in preparation for final Ordination to the Priesthood in 2018.

He adds ' Please pray for me, and for my brother seminarians from A&B during this time, and for more vocations to the priesthood.'

The Shrine was added to the Church shortly after the death of benefactress Mrs Montgomery, who included in her bequest a small square painting of St Anthony of Padua. This was later to be identified as a true portrait of St Anthony, the original still exists in Italy. The painting was placed over the altar in the chapel dedicated to St Anthony.

Pope Pius X declared the Shrine in Crawley was to be the world centre of the Guild of St Anthony, founded by a member of the Franciscan Community, Fr Elzear. Many people in the Parish continue to be supported by the fund of St Anthony's Bread, through the Guild.

Recently, we celebrated St Anthony's Feast Day with evening Mass followed by a procession of the Saint's Relic and the opportunity to renew his Guild.







TURNING CONCERN INTO ACTION

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul (SVP)

FRÉDÉRIC, A 20 YEAR OLD STUDENT, was losing the argument - which was becoming increasingly heated. He was desperate to show that the Catholic Church he belonged to was the one that Jesus Christ himself had founded, the very body of Christ. He had already written articles on the subject but his powers of persuasion were not up to the task this evening.

They scoffed at him, joking about his intensity, until one of them leaned forward and dealt the killer blow: 'So what is your church doing now? I mean, doing for the poor, for they are everywhere, even dying on the streets. Show us your works and we'll believe you.'

He had no works to show.

The First Visits

In 1833, transforming his circle of close friends from a debating society into what they called a 'Conference of Charity'. Frédéric determined to give practical help to those in poverty. There is lovely story that one of their first charitable visits was to carry kindling to a poor family living on the top floor of a tenement, so that the family could cook a hot meal. They put down the firewood outside the door, knocked on it – and then ran for their lives, tumbling down the stairs.

They were comfortably-off students, not used to dealing with poor, needy people. On the other hand, Sister Rosalie Rendu was very used to dealing with such people.

Enter Sr Rosalie Rendu

It is difficult to imagine that the sensitive and nervous Rosalie Rendu – who was frightened of spiders, corpses and cemeteries – would ever make a social worker, far less become Beatified, the Mother Teresa of nineteenth century Paris.

But, with enormous perseverance she set up a hospital for abandoned children, a free school for poor children, a church club for aimless youths. She helped bury the victims of cholera, visited the sick in their hovels - even dodged bullets during the frequent riots and revolutions in order to get to those who needed her help. Although many of the richer citizens provided funds that she was able to distribute, it was the sympathy, counsel and encouragement that flowed directly from her loving heart that were invaluable.

She took Frédéric Ozanam and his young friends under her wings, teaching them how to operate in the slums, giving them a respectability and status that flowed from her own hard-earned reputation.

Even today, 161 years after her death, Bl Rosalie Rendu is remembered by the citizens of Paris, rich and poor, who decorate her grave with fresh flowers (picture below).

Followers of St Vincent de Paul

In the early days of their Conference of Charity, in late April 1833, one of Frédéric's friends suggested that they place their society under the patronage of St Vincent de Paul, whose reputation for practical charity, including visiting the poor, sick and imprisoned, was such a great model for the work they now planned to do.

On meeting St Rosalie, they may well have been confirmed in their choice because she was a Daughter of Charity, which is a Society of Apostolic Life for women, formed by Saints Vincent de Paul and Louise de Marrilac, almost two hundred years earlier. Its charism is service to the poor (and the Daughters are known familiarly in France as 'Grey Sisters').

Building the Society of St Vincent de Paul

As Frédéric Ozaman and his early followers built up the Conferences of Charity, dedicated to helping the poor of Paris, they realised that two principles were vital; they had to serve the poor face-to-face, else they would become merely donors; and they had to attend to their own spiritual development, for if their love for the poor sprang from Christ, who first loved them, they also had to grow in their relationship to Christ, not just to His creatures. Today, each SVP Conference emphasises personal service and spiritual development.

The Society began to spread rapidly, with the first Conferences established in England in 1844, just 11 years after the first ever Conference in Paris.

Frédéric Ozanam died on 8 September 1853, a renowned historical and literary critic, scholar, lawyer, journalist – and founder of the Society of St Vincent de Paul, which, at his death, was represented in 29 countries and had 900 Conferences in France alone.

He was Beatified by Pope St John Paul II at the World Youth Days in Paris in 1997. *Today,* the SVP operates in 140 countries worldwide with an estimated 62,000 Conferences and more than 800,000 members, including 10,000 in England and Wales.

The members are motivated by their Christian faith and the Catholic spirituality of their founder and patron saint to find and offer help to anyone in need, 'to help them in a spirit of justice and tackle poverty where we can'.

ST VINCENT DE PAUL

Priest, Spiritual Advisor, Religious Mentor, Charity Worker ...and Slave

BORN IN 1531 into a family of peasant farmers in South West France, Vincent was very intelligent and his father sold the family's oxen in order to pay for his son's education. Later, Vincent tutored others to help pay for his studies and was ordained a priest at the early age of nineteen.

Vincent's objective was to have a successful career in the church and earn enough to support his family. However, it appeared he had been ordained prematurely (the minimum age was 24) so he returned to his studies.

At age 24, Vincent was captured by Barbary pirates while on a voyage from Marseilles and spent two years as a slave. One of his owners, a former priest turned Moslem, was persuaded to return to the faith and they both escaped back to France.

More studies followed and his star began to rise; in his early 30s he became chaplain and tutor to the Gondi family (famous Florentine bankers and merchants) and, age 62, he was appointed Spiritual Advisor to Queen Anne, Regent of France.

However, much more significant than his status and connections was his own transformation. The self-interested cleric had become an impassioned defender and helper of the poor. In his mid-30s he organised the wealthy women of Paris to provide relief for poor people, he founded hospitals and was especially solicitous to victims of war and galley slaves, who suffered horribly.

In addition to co-founding the Daughters of Charity, he also founded the Congregation of the Mission, a society of apostolic life of priests and brothers that specialised in improving religious life in small villages and towns. He became renowned as a writer, preacher, trainer and spiritual director.



He was canonised in 1737 and his Feast Day is 27 September.

Many institutions today are happy to be a part of the Vincentian Family, taking their inspiration from him: these include the SVP; Daughters of Charity; Congregation of the Mission; The Ladies of Charity; The Sisters of Charity Federation; The Association of the Miraculous Medal; The Vincentian Marian Youth and hundreds of related groups founded by followers of St Vincent.

In the next two editions we plan to look at the work of the SVP in A&B Diocese. In our October issue we will focus on the 'Special Works' of the SVP, such as soup runs, food banks and furniture schemes. In November, we hope to look closer at several of the building blocks of the Society, the Parish Conferences.

Elizabeth's 30 Years of Cake-baking Raises £35,000 for Charity

WOKING RESIDENT, ELIZABETH WALLACE, is celebrating over three decades of baking cakes for charity every month, raising an estimated £35,000.

Elizabeth's baking odyssey began back in 1986. Her mother had died two years previously and the terrible Ethiopian famine of 1984 was still fresh in her mind. One of Elizabeth's friends suggested that she did something to help both her recover from the loss of her mother, and those in need overseas. 'I can cook and I like to bake, so that's how it all began!'



Elizabeth set up a cake stall after mass once a month, at the parish of Our Lady of Christ, Kingfield, which she and her husband of 45 years, Kevin, were members of. As well as selling cakes contributed by parishioners, they held sponge competitions and Elizabeth stayed motivated by the enthusiasm of other parishioners.

Elizabeth said: 'The Bake Off hadn't even started then. Mary Berry eat your heart out! One of the reasons I kept going was that it made other people join in, and there have been some amazing examples of generosity. There was one lady who died a couple of years ago who donated £20 every month!'

When they moved to St. Dunstan's, Woking, Elizabeth kept on baking; her commitment to standing in solidarity with those in the developing world has

'You don't stop,' Elizabeth said. 'The world is still in need and we can't just be reactive to big crises, we have to take the initiative too. And you can't just walk away, because you feel you're betraying the people you're supporting. These aren't just people on pieces of paper, these are people who you're praying for.'

After almost thirty years as the organiser of the CAFOD cake stall, Mary handed over the running to two other St

Dunstan's parishioners, Ruth Whiddett and Lin Mason, in 2014. Elizabeth described the choice to stand down as a hard decision to make, but one which felt right. Inspired by her American mother's recipes, Elizabeth still bakes delights such as cookies every month for the stall, adding to the mounds of freshly baked bread, homegrown fruit and delicious homemade cakes.

'The girls took over and run the stall with their children and it's going really well. It's gone from strength to strength and they make wonderful cupcakes! It's very popular and we regularly run out of what we're selling!'

Elizabeth has now been baking cakes every month for CAFOD for 31 years. Since its inception in 1986 it has raised an estimated £35,000 – a phenomenal sum.

Elizabeth is modest about the amount that she and the others who helped at the stall have made. 'We're just normal people and that's our strength,' she said.

The money raised by Elizabeth and all those involved in the stall helps those living in extreme poverty to reach their full potential, regardless of religion or culture, by equipping them with the skills and opportunities to live with dignity, support their families and give something back to their

CAFOD representative in Woking, Martin Brown, said: 'Elizabeth's dedication to CAFOD is inspirational. Her commitment to helping those in need is remarkable, especially as it is so much more than skin deep – she truly cares about the people she is helping as individuals, not just statistics. We are so thankful to her and all those who have been involved in the cake stall over the years, including the new organisers Ruth, Lin and Agata.'

T DUNSTAN'S CATHOLIC CHURCH was privileged to be able to be the host venue for Refugee Week in Woking this year. The main event – the official launch - was held in the very hot, still evening of Tuesday 20 June when local people of different backgrounds, faiths and nationalities came into the church to watch and listen to a variety of talks, talented performances and recitals.

Organised by Woking Borough Council in conjunction with Woking People of Faith (a local group that brings together different faith communities), the event was opened by the Mayor, Councillor Graham Cundy. This was followed by song from Afghanistan, Indian dance, Syrian and African drumming, a recital of odes and poems as well as extracts from a play about the Ockenden Venture, an initiative to help refugees that started in Woking.



There was much else besides, including singing from Woking High School choir and a presentation by Aidan Cantwell, A&B's Justice & Peace Coordinator, who spoke about what was being done to help refugees across Surrey and Sussex. Woking Borough Councillor Zafar Iqbal, a leading figure in the local Muslim community, closed the evening with thanks.

As it was still Ramadan, after sunset everyone joined with our Muslim communities in an extensive buffet meal prepared and served by the team from a local Indian restaurant and the Function room, narthex and garden (which was getting cool by then) was filled with the chatter of many different people enjoying sitting and eating together.

Throughout the week there was a display of artwork by local school children and adults, depicting their view of refugees. The pictures were hung on Heras fencing which somehow added to the sense of separation and confinement

that must be experienced by many refugees in transit camps.

Other varied events took place during the week at the church - a great opportunity to open up and welcome in the wider community to St Dunstan's modern and versatile church premises.

BREAKTHROUGH 2017 – SERVING THOSE WHO WORK WITH YOUNG PEOPLE Update by Jack Regan - Diocesan Adviser for Youth Ministry

I'VE BEEN WORKING for the diocese for almost three years now and, while a lot has happened in that time, I started to think earlier this year that we weren't doing enough to directly feed those who work with young people in our parishes. Not to mention, crucially, those who don't yet, but want to.

With that in mind, we came up with something called Breakthrough. It all started with a day at DABCEC on Saturday 8 July, which we called Breakthrough 2017. Almost fifty people came for the day; great number, given that it's a very busy weekend in the Catholic calendar. They came from all corners of the diocese. Some Confirmation catechists, some youth group leaders, and some just interested in getting started.

The Keynote speaker for the day was Michael Marchand. Michael is from Texas and is a well-known youth ministry speaker, both in the US and around the world. He stopped off in England on his way to Uganda where he spends some time each year helping to develop youth ministry over there.

I also spoke during the day, as did David Wills, the Adviser for Evangelisation and Catechesis, and Aseel Gilbert, who is responsible for Children, Youth and Families at Guildford Parish.

The day focused on how we can best evangelise young people; from those who are engaged in parish life to those who live within our parishes but never walk through the doors of our churches.

Michael helped us to remember that we are called to reach out to all of them.

We were delighted with the feedback from the day. The (anonymous) evaluations gave us a good sense of how people found the input: 'I think that the Catholic church in this diocese (and country) needs to do a lot more to ensure others can have a relationship with the Lord - but Breakthrough comes across as a good initial response to this need'. It was also variously described as an eye-opener, informative, enlightening, and fantastic, with people adding that they are looking forward to the process continuing.

And continue it will... Breakthrough 2018 will be on Saturday 12 May, and what's more, there will be smaller, localised breakthrough groups set up later this year to connect people with other catechists and youth leaders in their local areas.

Remembering AoS All Year Round

Captain J P Morgan (ret'd) of Newhaven Parish, who served for 27 years in the Merchant Navy, reminds us that the Apostleship of the Sea (AoS) deserves our support all year round.

NINETY PERCENT OF WORLD TRADE is transported by sea and seafaring is the second most dangerous profession in the world. Sixty percent of the crews are Catholic and many are from the Philippines, India and Poland, countries where wages are low.

The crews are away from home for nine to twelve months at a stretch. Conditions are harsh, bullying is quite common, boredom, loneliness, anxiety and health problems arise. Occasionally they experience pirate attacks.

Around the world, nearly 1.2 million seafarers work on board 50,000 merchant ships.

The Apostleship of the Sea (AoS) provides support, both spiritually and physically, for the wellbeing of all seafarers.

The Apostleship of the Sea is known to most seafarers as Stella Maris, Our Lady of the Sea, who gives protection and guidance to Seafarers. This service is provided in many of our major and minor ports. Ships are only in port for a few hours and port chaplains can arrange contact with their families back home, or SIM cards for mobile phones. Sometimes a Mass can be arranged on board, often helping crews to get to Mass locally, or praying with them in difficult times.

From both Newhaven and Peacehaven we have sent large numbers of rosaries, prayer cards, prayer books and woolly hats to Deacon Roger Stone the AoS Chaplain based in Southampton, all gratefully received.

We are delighted to report that Les has arrived safely, after several adventues. It was hot and sunny in France and Les took time out to visit the great cathedrals in Rouen, Chartres and Tours. He pitched his tent at Tours and woke in the morning to find that the couple in the next tent had been the victim of thieves - who cut open the sides of their tent as they slept and stole a bag with passports and valuables!

It continued hot in Spain and after a night in Pamplona, where they were preparing for the running of the bulls, and where (of course) Les visited the cathedral and attended a Rosary service, it was off again, basically on the Camino route.

The weather turned cold and wet as the route rose, and Les had to push his bike up the steep mountainous climbs.

Then it was down the other side, crossing the border into Portugal at Tui and rejoicing in the flatter coastal plain. He went through Combrai, the old capital of Portugal and its main university city - where Sr Lucia, one of the Fatima visionaries, spent over 50 years as a nun in the Carmelite Convent.

Finally, Les reached Fatima Sanctuary, where he was greeted by represenatives of the World Apostolate of Fatima (pictured above) - and where a comfortable bed was waiting for him.

The Bar Convent in York Asks Catholic Groups to Visit and 'Discover Our Secrets'

THE BAR CONVENT IN YORK, the oldest living convent in England, is launching a new drive to attract Catholic groups to pay it a visit

The house was founded in 1686 as a Catholic school for girls and has withstood angry mobs, persecution and even Luftwaffe bombs. It is still home to members of the Congregation of Jesus, founded by radical Yorkshire-woman Mary Ward in the seventeenth century.

The Grade 1 Listed Georgian house hides in plain sight close to York's historic Bar Walls, where the heads of martyred priests were once displayed on spikes.

The convent has housed a guest house, museum, café and conference rooms since the school closed in 1985, but two years ago it relaunched as a Living Heritage Centre in 2015. The museum was replaced with a brand new interactive exhibition and the whole site was given a much needed boost.

'We've had a real upsurge in visitors since

we re-opened,' said Audience Development and Education Manager Jerry Ibbotson, 'But what we really want is to welcome more Catholic Groups. They appreciate the history of the Bar Convent and have a real connection



to the place.

One of the convent's constant struggles is that it was built to remain a secret, at a time when the faith was illegal. It even has a secret chapel, with a domed ceiling hidden beneath a grey tiled roof. That said, around ten thousand members of the public have been through the doors of the Exhibition since the relaunch and many more regularly use the café and secret garden behind the convent's walls.

But Jerry Ibbotson has issued a plea for members of church groups.

'We need their support, basically. We do have groups who come on pilgrimages to York and stay in our Guest House. Others come for a day trip and visit the Exhibition. But as a charity we need as many people as possible to come and learn about the convent's incredible history.

That's where church groups of all kinds come in. By visiting us, they'll help ensure the Bar Convent continues to thrive for years to come.'

Walking 500 Miles for the SVP

In our May 2017 issue (page 11) we reported on 73 year old grandfather Jim Monaghan's plan to walk to Santiage de Compostela to raise funds for the work of the SVP. We are delighted to report that he has completed the walk and Jim reports below:

N 26 APRIL I DEPARTED Stansted for Biarritz, then, next day, onto St Jean Pied de Port, the start point for my 500 mile walk to Santiago de Compostela to raise funds for SVP. I was prepared physically, mentally and spiritually for this pilgrimage and had no fears.

Snow in the Pyrenees was beautiful as was driving wind, rain and later temperatures in high twenties.

I completed Camino in 31 days arriving into Santiago on Sunday 28 May in time for 12 o'clock Mass.

Why walk the Camino? If you can walk, you can do the Camino! Everywhere is within walking distance if you have the time. The walking paths are well marked, no map is required! Plan and go. But why??

I was attracted to James the Apostle since reading the Bible. In eight chapters he covers pride, greed, lust, worldliness, discrimination and slander, all in a punchy way - my kind of man. He pilgrim-



aged to the Iberian Peninsula to spread the word of Jesus and, on returning to Judea, he was martyred in AD44 according to Acts 12. His remains were later transported by followers to today's Galicia and are buried under Santiago's Cathedral - so I was attracted there by the first cousin of Jesus!! Simple! Apart from Religiosity there is freedom of open road, escape from century 21, the creeds and nationalities met en route, great bonds and friendships made.

And I did it on behalf of SVP's much needed funds.






