Dialogue and Unity at DABCEC

Christian unity was of particular interest to the late Cardinal Cormac Murphy-O'Connor and it is therefore appropriate that it is being discussed at this particular time, following his recent death.

ON 23 SEPTEMBER 2017 the Dialogue and Unity Commission for the Diocese welcomed over 60 people from 31 parishes in nine deaneries to DABCEC to 'Explore how the Holy Spirit is opening up new ways to work for Unity'.

The day began with a welcome from Catherine Martindale, Dialogue and Unity Adviser for the Diocese. Catherine offered a particular welcome to the Anglican, Methodist and United Reformed Church members who had been invited along by Catholics from their area, and who shared fully in the day with us.

What followed was a day of information, reflection and prayer. We heard from Helen and Andrew from the Association of Interchurch Families about the support offered. Kate and Tim Watson from Chemin Neuf (*pictured*) provided us with an analysis of the current ecumenical climate and models of engagement, Tim pointing us to Unity by conversion and recommending documents to read. Kate carefully guided us through Ignatian discernment prayer around Mark 10:46-52 *What do you want me to do for you.*

Anne and Bethany from Focolare Movement offered us their community's Art of Loving. These were very simple yet deep reflections on how love can be lived out practically. They provided us with a film about the work the community does to further unity by bringing people from different churches together, which they do nationally and internationally. Veronica, another Focolare member, shared a song she had written about breaking down walls of division which was greeted with enthusiastic applause. We arrived in Canterbury in time to gather at 11am in the Crypt of the Cathedral as we had been given special permission to celebrate Mass there for Our Lady's Birthday. After St Thomas a Becket was murdered in the Cathedral in 1170 his body was buried in the floor of the crypt until it was moved in 1220 to the shrine behind the high altar of Trinity Chapel above.

It was a moving experience to be there together for Mass realising that we were doing what so many people had done before the Reformation and few Catholics had done since. After lunch in the town there was a tour of the Cathedral led by well informed guides, during which we saw the place where St Thomas had been killed by the four knights of Henry II. 


Garden Party raises £5,000

The Forgotten King?

Shirley Andrews from St. Joseph's, Guildford, has contacted A & B News in response to a piece in our September edition on the Bar Convent in York, the oldest living convent in England, which is now a Living Heritage Centre. She writes:

 $T^{\rm HANK\ YOU\ for\ your\ piece\ and\ photograph\ of\ the\ Bar\ Convent\ in\ York.\ On\ several\ visits\ to\ York\ I\ have\ searched\ for\ it\ without\ success.\ I\ had\ no\ address\ and\ everyone\ I\ asked\ had\ not\ heard\ of\ it!$

The original Bar Convent School was founded by King James II and his wife Princess Maria Beatrice of Modena, England's only Italian Queen. It is truly an act of God that the Convent has survived, considering the fate of James II and his queen. Both had to flee for their lives when William

of Orange invaded England in 1688 with an army of 18,000 men!

James II is a King whom no-one chooses to remember. In the Houses of Parliament there is a wide corridor, the walls of which are decorated with images of England's Kings from William I to the present day – except that James II is not there. Nor is there any memorial to him in Westminster Abbey.

Now, why is this so? There can only be one answer; he became a Catholic and remained so. Not only that, but he tried to give to all his subjects the opportunity to worship as they wished, without fear of recrimination. Sadly, it was not to be.

Wheels of Wonder in Ghana

ANY MEMBERS will be familiar with the Catenian Association and many know that each local President nominates a charity for their year in office. Eamonn Delaney had no doubt as to which good cause would benefit as his President's Charity for Woking Circle 2016/17. Eamonn's connection to The Missionaries of Africa (who are also known as 'The White Fathers') and in particular Br Trevor Robinson - who is based in Tamale, Ghana, West Africa - goes back nearly 50 years. But it is a project that began 25 years ago which won Eamonn's support - The Wheelchair Project, Tamale, Ghana.

As Br Trevor explains: 'I first met Eamonn and his wife Zita shortly after my arrival in Ghana in 1968. I went to Accra from Wa with Ray Leggett who is a friend of Eamonn's from the same home town, Bray in Ireland. Eamonn was working in Accra at the time and Ray introduced us, with us visiting Eamonn and Zita more often on subsequent trips to Accra. While Eamonn's career saw him leave and move around the world, I stayed in Ghana but we've kept in touch ever since.'

In 1992 Br Trevor began the Wheelchair Project, when, along with Fr Dermot Sheehan M/Afr, he realised that there was an urgent need to provide mobility and dignity to the many disabled people in the area who were either on crutches or literally crawling in the dust.

Having recently opened a new workshop to provide a service to the local church and to train young men in metal work and welding, this new workshop was ideal for making wheelchair tricycles. Over the years, this work has become the chief occupation of the workshop. It now has

four skilled welders/metal workers who came as young men and were trained in the workshop.

The tricycles (one is pictured) are made from galvanized pipes that are cut and bent into shape and then welded together to form the chassis. Sheet metal is used for the floor and side panels and all the rest is put together with new bicycle parts, some coming from Nigeria. They are usually made in batches of thirty which take two to three months to complete and, since the project began in 1992, the total now stands at 1,640 tricycles.




At one time most of the users were polio victims but nowadays there are road accident victims with leg injuries or people with diabetes who are amputees and even people with back injuries sustained falling from fruit trees. 'About three years ago, Zita and I went to Tamale and spent a few nights with Trevor and the local community at the Provincial House. During that time we saw at first hand the workshop and wheelchair tricycles that were being prepared. It made a lasting impression and so when I became President of the Woking Circle, I knew we could make a real difference to people who really needed our help', said Eamonn.

In August 2017 the Woking Catenians presented Fr Michael Heap of the White Fathers with a cheque for $\pounds 6,375$ – enough for 30 wheelchairs. Fr Michael - who collected the cheque on Trevor's behalf - passed on his thanks: 'Imagine if you can, the difference it makes to a person's life when they are suddenly free to move about independently and with dignity after many years of being confined to the house or compound. This project is a real life changer and the generosity of Woking Circle will not only benefit the individuals, but their families and the wider community – thank you!'

Observance of Holy Days of Obligation The Bishops' Conference of England and Wales has decreed that the calendar for the Dioceses of England and Wales is to be modified as follows: the Solemnity of the Epiphany is to be observed on 6 January except when it falls on a Saturday or Monday (when it will be observed on the Sunday) and the Solemnity of the Ascension will be observed on Thursday, 6th week of Easter Time. (Since the Bishops' Conference decree of 2006, these solemnities have always transferred to Sunday.) The observance of the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) is maintained as decreed in 2006, that is, transferred to Sunday.



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JUST A THOUGHT

'REMEMBRANCE' IS A THEME which rises up in various ways this month. Two minutes' silence and the Pomp and Circumstance of 'Remembrance Sunday' recall the horrors of the First World War. For hundreds of years children have learned to complete the rhyme: 'Remember, remember the Fifth of November ... ('for gunpowder, treason and plot,' lest you forget). And, since at least the time of Charlemagne, 'All Saints Day' has been celebrated on 1 November in the Western Church.

All of these commemorations, secular or sacred, look back to past deaths, but the atmosphere of each is very different. The emotions surrounding 'Remembrance Sunday' are inevitably mixed. Is it possible to talk about 'The Glorious Dead' when recalling the horrors of Passchendaele, 100 years ago this year? As Wilfred Owen bitingly implied, there's nothing Dulce et Decorum ('sweet and proper') about trench warfare or 'drowning' in a gas-attack. Yet his theme, of 'the pity of war', calls to mind bravery and sacrifice, as well as the mulish obstinacy of generals and politicians. 'Bonfire Night' mixes national narrative, elemental spectacle and the strange, ambiguous status of Catholicism in these islands in the five centuries since the Reformation. Only All Saints invites true equanimity and peace - gratitude for the witness of the heroes and heroines of faith and an awareness of our own belonging in the Communion of Saints. The Feast proclaims that past violence is quenched and past wounds are healed, through Christ's victory over Death. Thus a space is opened for embracing our own mortality and entrusting our loved ones to the Lord; among whom we number this year our own former Bishop, Cormac, a gentle guide and kind leader in our faith. May he rest in peace.

THERE ARE MANY WONDERFUL CHARITIES that exist to help THERE ARE MANY WONDERFOL CHARTIES use control of the second secon ety. Members do not need to take formal religious vows, wear a habit, give all their possessions to charity, swear allegiance to their President, shave their heads or do anything that will set them aside from other people.

(However, like Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, school teachers and some other roles, SVP members who visit the needy are required to gain a Safeguarding certificate.)

SVP members believe that their work does not 'spring from ourselves alone' as a SVP prayer puts it. Rather, it springs from members' relationship with God and the teachings and sacrifices of His Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ.

Every SVP member is a part of the Body of Christ who also accepts the calling of St Vincent de Paul and Blessed Frederic Ozanam, to seek and find those who need help; serve them cheerfully; respect the dignity of the individual; be non-judgemental; seek justice and 'be generous with our time and our possessions.'

Fr Paul Roche, SVP Spiritual Adviser, regards the Vincentian Charism as a specific type of gift from God, given for loving God and serving Him in the poor.

This is achieved, as Conference members, individually and collectively, working in community to serve those in need while simultaneously developing their relationship with God and their fellow members, supporting and encouraging each other in a spiritual and practical way.

The Conference prayers, the spiritual reading - and the personal prayer members offer before going to serve someone in need - are the building blocks that help SVP mem-

bers to grow. Below is a quote from Cathy, pictured here, who is a member of St Ann's Conference, Banstead. She joined the SVP in 2003 and is also President of Epsom SVP District Council:

Spirituality is an important part of our Conference and Council life... The spiritual aspect does affect the work that we do. We work to the utmost of our ability to help and reach out to those in need...We work for the glory of God, not our own.





Donal, pictured here, a member of Crawley Parish Conference who joined the SVP eight years ago, said:

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Annual A&B SVP Festival Meeting

The first speaker was Claz Gomez, SVP National Youth Coordinator, who spoke on the different SVP apostolates for the four youth groups: Mini Vinies (for ages 7-11); Youth SVP (ages 11-14); B-Attitude (14-18 years) and SVP 1833, for those over 18.

John Wild, A&B Central Council Twinnage Officer then described the various ways that the SVP supports overseas conferences, enabling them to help those in need in their own countries. The SVP in England and Wales supports conferences in India, Romania, Guyana, Grenada, Sudan and South Sudan.

The last speaker, Fr Paul Roche, SVP National Spiritual Adviser, spoke of the Vincentian charism and of his own experience in working with those in need, including street children and addicts in Ukraine. The Festival ended with Mass in the Friary Church.

The Building Blocks of the SVP: Parish Conferences

'Officers'

BECAUSE THERE ARE various adminis-tration tasks to be done, some members volunteer to be 'Officers' for a period of five years. Typically, the members elect a President (who leads the Conference and chairs meetings). The President will then appoint a Vice President (who deputises for the President in her/his absence); a Secretary (who keeps minutes of meetings and other records); and a Treasurer (who controls the Conference's bank account, keeps the financial books and makes returns).

These officer roles are essential for the proper functioning of a Conference and the members who serve in these roles do a hugely valuable service in addition to their normal volunteering work.

Councils

MOST CONFERENCES are based in Catholic parishes and meet in Church premises; almost half of the Catholic parishes in England & Wales have a SVP Conference. There are about 1,000 Conferences in England and Wales, 38 of them in A&B Diocese. Several parish Conferences are supported by a District Council (like parishes are organised into a Deanery) and the District Councils in A&B are supported by one Central Council (like a diocesan body).

PHILIP SCHWENK, President of the A&B Central Council, explains the structure: **'Conference members** work together, in prayer and action, in an organised and democratic way.

The Conference is also part of a well-structured organisation, and each Conference President is a voting member of the SVP District Council, which meets every quarter, and of which there are six in A&B. In turn, the DC Presidents come together quarterly, in a Diocesan Council, (or as we say The Central Council), which is responsible for the overall development of the Society, within the Diocese. Thus, good communication is maintained throughout the SVP in each Diocese, through to the National Council of England & Wales.'

Perhaps that natural desire for confidentiality gives rise to questions about what the SVP members really get up to...do they employ strange handshakes, wear funny hats, have an open bar, or even practise their own version of Morris

A Council Officer

SO, CATHY, now that you have risen to the dizzy heights of SVP District Council President, have you stopped running around, helping people?

No, I don't stop. With all the members, I still carry on with the visits, bring Holy Communion to the housebound and provide transport to Sunday Mass and times of Adora-

Sacrament. As a Conference, we are currently collecting good

quality men's clothes for the detainees at the Gatwick centres and I accompany an SVP member to deliver them to the Gatwick Detainee Welfare office in Crawley.

We hold an annual Afternoon Tea for the older parishioners who attend the Mass with Anointing of the Sick. We go to nursing homes to share the message of Christmas by singing carols with the residents. I also go to schools to set up Mini Vinnie groups - I talk to the children about the lives of our founder Blessed Frederic Ozanam and St Vincent de Paul not forgetting the works of Rosalie Rendu and Louise de Marillac. I endeavour to help the Mini Vinnies to keep up with their charity work by staying in touch with their teachers. We have given financial help to the refugees in St Leonard's Parish. Like all Conferences, we are twinned with parishes in India and we support the education of school children and students there. We also support the Sudan Appeal and the Disaster Fund.

The reality is both more boring and more admirable.

The meetings – usually held weekly or fortnightly – are an opportunity for members to discuss who needs help, what can be done, who will do it, what additional help/resources are needed and also to report about ongoing support to existing beneficiaries.

Ways the SVP Helps

HOME AND HOSPITAL VISITS to the lonely, isolated, sick, disabled and elderly, as well as:

- * Care and nursing home visits
- * Shopping, cooking, gardening, teaching computer use, and other tasks such as changing light bulbs
- * Referral to other agencies in cases such as debt, addictions or disability (but only with the prior approval of the beneficiary, unless in cases of emergency, safeguarding, abuse, risk etc)
- * Help with form-filling, letter writing, representation to authorities
- * Supporting the families of prisoners, the unemployed, offenders and ex-offenders
- * Praying with/reading to people
- * Caravan breaks/holidays for low income families
- * Food bank referral, soup runs, communal meals for elderly



Tourist turns humanitarian worker

SEVEN YEARS after visiting Syria as a tourist, Alan Tomlinson, a parishioner of St Dunstan's parish in Woking, returned to Syria in a very different capacity, as the Emergency Programme Manager for CAFOD's Syria response. He travelled to the coastal city of Latakia, a government stronghold, to visit nearby projects supporting displaced Syrians.

Syria is a very cosmopolitan society, a mix of religions and cultures; Islamic, Christian, regional and Mediterranean. Visiting Syria you see that diversity, but, with the news, you just see war and fighting, so you can be tripped up into thinking that's what Syria is like – but the people are incredibly hospitable.

Whilst on the surface the situation in Latakia seemed ostensibly - ordinary, Alan described how quickly he started to see the poverty and the great need for humanitarian assistance. The project Alan visited is run by our local church partner and supported by CAFOD, assisting 2000 displaced families with rental support, health care services and essential items, including food.

'I visited four families on house visits and it was shocking to see the conditions they lived in. One

can respond. Our group conducted its own



Winter is the hardest time of year for those without homes. Countless individuals will be exposed to the freezing cold this Winter, and will desperately need practical and emotional support during these months. This event provided a glimpse of what life is like for rough sleepers and raised some much needed money for Off The Fence to help rebuild their lives and get them off the streets.

Previously, young people in the parish had collected items for Off The Fence's annual Antifreeze campaign. In the past two years we have had winter collections of clothes and toiletries in our

family was living in the cellar of a block of flats, which was not really fit for human habitation. It was very gloomy and the family talked about the number of cockroaches and rats that bothered

them at night. There were two young girls, around nine and ten, studying for exams, who were complaining of constant headaches from studying in such darkness.'

To date, the UN estimates that the conflict has killed over 310,000 people and 14.9 million are in need of urgent humanitarian aid. CAFOD has been working with local church partners in Syria since 2012, ensuring that people affected by the crisis have food, relief supplies and safe places to stay. CAFOD is also supporting Syrian refugees in Lebanon, Jordan, Iraq and Turkey.

However desperate the situation is at present, Alan has hope for Syria's future: 'I definitely hope to return as a tourist, but it's likely I will return there with my job first. Hopefully the conflict will end as soon as possible and give the Syrian people a chance to rebuild their lives, livelihoods and homes.'

OBITUARY Dr Priscilla Noble-Mathews

DRISCILLA died in hospital on Saturday 2 September after a stroke in her garden. Priscilla, 90, was well-known as a doctor on call to trauma and medical emergencies, work she continued until she was 87. She was a deeply committed member of the Roman Catholic Church in Midhurst and across the Diocese.



Priscilla qualified as a lawyer and practised as a barrister, but changed course and trained as a doctor, one of the first at Southampton university medical school, graduating in 1976. She worked as a GP in Sussex, only retiring from locum work in 2015, aged 88. She made annual pilgrimages to Lourdes, for many years attending as a doctor for sick pilgrims.

In March this year she received a Bene Merenti Award from the Pope presented by Fr Peter Newsam in Midhurst. Tribute from Fr Peter Newsam:-

She was a person of deep spirituality, who gave herself tirelessly to the work of the church, both in her parish and in the diocese. She supported other Catholic doctors and was a 'wise friend' to successive parish priests, and a counsellor and adviser to numerous parishioners. She made the care and visiting of sick parishioners a special concern. Tribute from Fr Edward Doyle:-

Priscilla was one of life's real givers. She once gave me a paper on the theology of resuscitation which underlined her unusual blend of spiri-PNtual and ecumenical faith and leading-edge medical experience.



Tower House Community Centre Opens



THE HAPPIEST PERSON at the opening of Tower House, Centre for older people, was Peter Cropp, President of Brighton SVP District Council (*pictured below, talking with Helen O'Shea*).

Five years ago he conceived the idea for such a centre and since then has, along with his wife Jo, worked tirelessly to turn his vision into reality. There were about 70 people at the opening, including a strong contingent of SVP leadership from the London headquarters, including National President Adrian Abel, President-elect Helen O'Shea, former National President Jim O'Connor, and CEO Elizabeth Palmer, who - in the very best tradition of the SVP - showed concern for the rumbling stomachs of her guests and busied herself cooking snacks.



A&B Central Council President Philip Schwenk attended, as did a representative of Brighton & Hove City Council. Helen O'Shea made the opening speech, paying tribute to the work of the local SVP members. She said that the centre planned to serve up to 100 isolated elderly persons, providing lunches and bespoke activities, and future plans include a community café, a library and a range of advice and holistic support services, all under the roof of Tower House.

Tower House was built in 1902 as the home of a former jeweller to King Edward VII. Described by Wikipedia as 'Brighton's finest example of a

grand Edwardian house', in 1988 it was converted into flats with a daycare centre on the ground floor.

It is this daycare centre that the SVP has leased from Brighton & Hove City Council; a number of very large, sunny, interconnected rooms.
