

'We, together, are Christ's Family'



THE ANNUAL CHRISM MASS was held at Arundel Cathedral on 28 March when the church was filled with several hundred people, including most of the diocesan clergy.

The Chrism Mass is the once-a-year occasion when the Bishop blesses three oils: the Oil of Catechumens to annoint the baptised; the Oil of the Sick for healing and Chrism Oil, which gives its name to the ceremony.

The use of Chrism Oil, an olive oil

base with balsam resin perfume, goes back thousands of years, while the blessing of the oils ceremony was first documented in the fourth century.

At the conclusion of the Mass, the three oils are decanted into smaller individual vessels and then distributed to each of the 85 parishes in the diocese for use throughout the coming year.

In his homily - included on page 9 of this edition - Bishop Richard spoke of the Church being 'fully present here in our Cathedral today'. He prayed that priests and people, strengthened by the Sacraments and by constant prayer, may together as Christ's family be evermore effective in the Mission of Christ, which we are all called to share. Clement distributed fair trade labelled bananas, stickers and pamphlets to visitors, primarily lecturers and students.

He also took the opportunity to talk to them about fair trade practices that guarantee fair trade prices for the growers in poor and developing countries, making sure that they undergo no exploitation and that the whole production is sustainable.

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Houses for Sri Lanka

KARLA EZRAEELIAN is a retired nurse who was born and brought up in Sri Lanka. She came to the UK on holiday in 1972 and loved it so much she stayed. Then, like several of her family, she joined the medical profession, started a family and settled in Hove.

However, on Boxing Day in December 2004 the Indian Ocean tsunami struck, causing massive damage to the coastal areas of 14 countries; in Sri Lanka alone, it was reported that more than 30,000 died and an estimated 500,000 were made homeless

Soon after, in January 2005, Karla returned to Sri Lanka, laden with medical supplies and other necessities, to render whatever assistance she

She was horrified by the devastation, with buildings flattened, starving and homeless people wandering about, others sheltering in the ruins of their former homes (see example below). One woman she tried to help was in despair, her husband and children had perished, her home was gone and she felt she had nothing left to live for. Karla was so moved that, there and then, she promised to build a new house for her



On returning home she took stock. She was not a millionaire - but she did have an indomitable spirit and two allotments where she grew vegeta-

With permissions from Fr Ray Blake (St Mary Magdalene, Brighton) and Fr Carl Davies (Sacred Heart, Hove), Karla set up a stand outside their churches and sold vegetables after Mass. She also cooked curry and held Curry Evenings in the parish halls. There was also the occasional dona-





The Church in Sri Lanka rallied round, helping by overseeing the use of funds and construction. The first house cost £5,000 (see below) and Karla went back for its handover

But now there was another challenge. Dozens of homeless people gathered round her, pleading for help. Again, moved by their situation, Karla promised to build up to ten houses for homeless families, regardless of whether the supplicants were Moslem or Sinhalese, religious or not.

Now, 13 years later, Karla tells me that eight houses have been built and she is busy collecting funds for the ninth. The cost of each house has risen to £7,000 but she is still selling vegetables and hosting curry evenings to meet her commit-

However, time is now critical. In 2005, after the tsunami, Karla set up a project (Eastern Sri Lanka Survivors' Appeal) and has a committee of worthies to offer advice and help manage the funds, and there are criteria to help prioritise applicants (with an emphasis on widowed women and children). Most funds are still raised through Karla's vegetable and flower sales and curry evenings. Sadly, while Karla's spirit and determination to help is as strong as ever, her own health is now compromised.

Queenie Hopcroft was delighted to collect £302 for the work of the Missionaries of Charity (St Mother Teresa's Sisters) in Calcutta. The money has already been delivered to Calcutta by some of our parishioners.



The Shoreham Gospels

HURCHES TOGETHER in Shoreham and district instigated a community project which has taken six months to produce.



More than 128 people of all ages produced 728 hand-written pages of the gospels with decoration and illustrations. The work is Shoreham's answer to the Lindisfarne Gospels, an illuminated manuscript produced

by monks in about 700AD.

Jeannette Simpson of St Nicholas' Anglican Church who with her husband John co-ordinated the project said 'the copying was done by more than 128 people in many different ways, singly, in groups, or as families with parents and children working together. Some people copied one or two verses, some whole pages and others took on complete chapters.'

Jill Austin of Kingston Buci said 'it was a really good way of getting to know the Bible

Many pages are illustrated with illuminated capitals echoing the work of medieval monks. The Wyvern Bindery in London turned a pile of 728 sheets into a beautifully bound volume with gilded titles and page edges.

The intention is that the Shoreham Gospels should be a book to be treasured but not gathering dust as a museum piece. It will circulate between organisations who will each hold it for a period for their own use.

The Shoreham Gospels were dedicated by the Right Reverend Richard Jackson in October at St Mary de Haura Church in Shoreham.

Emma Oakley from St Peter's – Our Lady Queen of Peace, Adur Valley, was proud to carry the bible into the church for the dedication.

SPRING is a time for hope and renewal. For the Diocese, that means a growing focus on Bishop Richard's *Vision for Mission* that he first shared with us last year.

Subsequent months have seen the deaneries engage in discussions and reflections on what we, priests laity and religious together, must do to ensure a healthy and missionary Church in the Diocese as we begin the exciting but challenging journey towards the year 2030.

Bishop Richard said we should begin from deep prayer centred on the Eucharist and follow these principles: Abandonment to the providence of God, learning from the Gospels and from Church teaching, while preparing ourselves to undertake the new evangelisation.

In my own parish, we are beginning with a modest step on our way to 'Divine Renovation', to use Fr James Mallon's term.

In the coming months we will be launching the Alpha course for the first time, initially for our own congregation, later for interested enquirers. I will report back on how we get on.




150th Anniversary Mass Tuesday 19June 2018




Weybridge Deanery celebrates RE morning


Homily for the Chrism Mass, Wednesday 28 March 2018

In OUR FIRST READING TODAY, we heard proclaimed the words of Isaiah and in the Gospel, Jesus makes it very clear that Isaiah's prophesy is being fulfilled in Him. This ministry of liberty, light and freedom is for all time. There will never be a moment in the history of humanity when the self-giving love of the Saviour, freeing us from sin and calling us to his Kingdom as his co-heirs through Baptism, will not be the summit of human experience and life. There would be those who would reject this view – all the more reason, then, for us to hold firm in proclaiming the wonder of the Life that Christ has given us.

This ministry, this mission, to which Isaiah referred in prophecy and which Jesus announced in Himself, continues in the Church. The Church is fully present here in our Cathedral today – the Church through which Christ manifests his presence in a most wonderful way in the Sacraments.

The ministerial Priesthood – so central to the Chrism Mass that is 'among the principal manifestations of the fullness of the Bishop's Priesthood and is a sign of the close bond of the Priests with him' – is 'a means by which Christ unceasingly builds up and leads his Church.' In the service of the ordained, Christ is present to us as Head, Shepherd and Teacher. The priest acts, not in his own name, but *in persona Christi* – in the person of Christ. The priest is ordained to serve and in his service, sometimes faltering, always weak, he reflects the ultimate service of Jesus Himself, the Suffering Servant whose Passion, Death and Resurrection we celebrate in the coming days.

The priest is anointed with the Oil of Chrism, soon to be consecrated at this Mass, and we rejoice that - God willing – two new priests will be ordained for our Diocese this year: Tristan Cranfield and Jack Lusted. Please pray for them, for those in seminary and for all those discerning their vocation to Priesthood, especially those offering themselves for formation this



year. Please join me in continuing, persistent prayer for vocations to the Priesthood: not occasionally, but every day.

The oils to be blessed and consecrated today will be used in the Sacraments to be celebrated in the year ahead. Our priests bring the Lord's presence and healing love in the Sacrament of the Sick; the Oil of Catechumens marks the one to be baptised, be they child or adult, as they prepare to be welcomed into the love of the Blessed Trinity. Anointing with Chrism seals not only the ordained, but also those to be confirmed in the Holy Spirit, strengthened for the pilgrim journey and called to be Christ's witnesses to their brothers and sisters.

We might rightly ask ourselves where we would be without the Sacraments, most especially the Eucharist when, through the ministry of the Priest, Christ is truly present amongst his people under the appearances of bread and wine.

It is Jesus who is 'The Alpha and Omega', the beginning and end and all that we do and – more importantly – all that we are.

Accompanied by the service of our priests, for whom this is such a special day, and together with them strengthened by the Sacraments and by constant prayer, may we together as Christ's family in this Diocese, be ever-more effective in the Mission of Christ in which we are, each in our different ways, called to share.




Palm Sunday was a respite from the snow and storms, with a delightfully mild day. We gathered in the car park to process into the church, waving palms and singing Hosannas.






