

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Schools on Pilgrimage


ON A BEAUTIFUL SUNNY DAY, Catholic secondary schools from across the Diocese of Arundel and Brighton excitedly gathered at the meeting point by Arundel Castle Museum, eagerly awaiting their pilgrimage walk through Arundel Park to the Mother Church of the diocese, Arundel Cathedral.


Bishop Richard and members of the Education Service team were there to register and welcome everyone. Once all the schools had arrived and were gathered together, pilgrims were formally welcomed and received a blessing in preparation for their journey.

Bishop Richard led the pilgrims - at quite a pace - through the beautiful grounds of Arundel Park, stopping every now and then to appreciate the stunning countryside scenery around them and encounter the many animals on route.

A very energised congregation of staff and students arrived at Arundel Cathedral for a celebration of Mass with the theme '*follow me, feed my sheep*' and were welcomed by beautiful singing from the choir of St Wilfrid's Catholic Secondary School, Crawley. Other diocesan secondary schools provided servers, welcomers and eloquent readers.

Amongst the pilgrims in the Cathedral striking and poignant art work was being exhibited in the form of see-through images of those who had fought for peace and lost their lives during the First World War.

Students Raise over £12,000



S TUDENTS AT CARDINAL NEWMAN Catholic School in Hove have been holding a number of events to raise money for charity and have succeeded in raising over £12,000. The charities include Mary's Meals, the Hangleton & West Blatchington Food Bank and Project Antifreeze.

During Lent, each class had to think of fundraising ideas and put together the activities themselves. Events included cake sales, sponsored walks, staff v student dodgeball, a penalty shootout, netball and football. The activities raised a staggering £5,500 plus 30 bags of food.

Recipients

Mary's Meals will receive £3,605 which means that, combined with the £5,227 raised at Advent, the school has raised enough to feed 635 children every day for a whole year in their linked school in Malawi. The charity reaches over 1.2 million impoverished children with a nutritious meal in a place of education every day that they attend school. By providing food in a place of education, Mary's Meals attracts hungry children into the classroom where they can learn, thrive and work towards a positive future.

The Hangleton & West Blatchington Food Bank will receive $\pounds 1,581$ on top of the $\pounds 545$ raised at Advent and hundreds of food bag donations. The aim of the foodbank is to provide food to individuals and families living in the local area who find themselves in crisis or urgent situations and it helps dozens of local families every week.

Project Antifreeze will receive £320 on top of the £780 already raised towards supporting the homeless in Brighton and Hove. Their outreach teams are on the streets in the evenings seeking to meet the basic needs of those who are homeless and sleeping rough. They also operate a drop-in centre four days a week providing specific care, including help with housing, benefits and addiction issues.

Dr James Kilmartin, Headteacher, said: 'These charities have become a very important focus for the whole school community. It has been great to see that by acting together we can make a difference. This has been spectacularly demonstrated by the students of Cardinal Newman Catholic School and shows the '*caritas*' spirit of the school. It has been a real team effort with all staff, students and parents getting involved.' Helping Those in Need

Magnus MacFarlane-Barrow, Mary's Meals founder and CEO, said: 'Today, around the world, 57 million children miss school because of poverty. Instead of sitting in a classroom getting an education, they are working in fields, begging on street corners, or scavenging among the garbage to survive. Our vision is that every child should be able to receive one good meal every day in a place of education. Working together with people who share our ideals, we believe that our vision can be achieved in this world of plenty, where there is enough food for everyone.'

Colm Lennon, Chairman of the Hangleton & West Blatchington Food Bank, said: 'We have a fantastic relationship with Cardinal Newman School who provide us with food collections and financial assistance through the dedication of their staff and students. Without their support and that of other schools and organisations, we would be unable to continue to support local families. We have also been invited to talk to the pupils about the work we do and bring awareness of the poverty that exists in our local community.'



Paul Young, CEO of Off The Fence Trust which runs Project Antifreeze, said: 'Cardinal Newman have been a fantastic source of support to Off The Fence over the years, always looking for new and original ways to get behind our work. This year is no exception and it's inspiring to see so many young people getting involved with fundraising initiatives and thinking about the needs of others, specifically the homeless community whom we serve! A big thank you to the students and staff who have helped to raise this amazing figure for our Anti-freeze work.'

Improvement Allies

PAVILION AND DOWNS Teaching School Alliance is thrilled to welcome Cardinal Newman Catholic School, Hove, to the alliance.

There are now six schools from across Brighton and Hove and West Sussex in the partnership: Cardinal Newman join Blatchington Mill, Steyning Grammar, Varndean, Dorothy Stringer and Hove Park schools, who were awarded Teaching School status in 2016 by the DfE and the National College for Teaching and Leadership.

The driving force behind the teaching school alliance is a network of headteachers aiming to raise standards for all young people across Brighton and Hove and West Sussex. In recognition of the fact that as people we never stop learning, the alliance places an emphasis on partnership and collaboration, working with teachers at all stages in their careers to recognise and develop their skills. Pavilion and Downs, in collaboration with Durrington High Research School, has already successfully secured significant funding to address school improvement issues in the region.

Nationally, Teaching School Alliances lead on Initial Teacher Training, Continuing Professional Development and School to School support to raise standards. With a team of Specialist Leaders of Education, the Pavilion and Downs Teaching School Alliance offers a pathway for professional dialogue and sustainable impact. Working strategically and collaboratively with schools across Brighton and Hove and West Sussex, Pavilion and Downs offers school to school support with research and development, network meetings for those new to teaching and professional development opportunities for teachers at all levels.

Headteacher at Cardinal Newman Catholic School, Dr James Kilmartin (*pictured right*) said:

'We are delighted to join the Pavilion and Downs Teaching School Alliance. Working together, we will be able to improve the education (and the lives) of children in our schools in Brighton, Hove and West Sussex.'

Turning Concern into Action

Marie Campbell and Peter Sowinski of the SVP conference in St John the Evangelist Parish, Horsham, tell us about the success of their heart-warming (and stomach-warming?) 'Soup for Sudan' initiative.



LIKE ALL SVP GROUPS we seek to help those in need; the essence of our work is person-to-person contact and spending time with people is our greatest gift.

We also fundraise for the SVP Sudan appeal through our 'Soup for Sudan' lunches organised weekly during Advent and Lent which we began on Ash Wednesday 2016, not knowing how popular the lunches would be and whether we would be able to manage.

The response of our parish community has been very positive, warm and generous. Thirty to forty guests attend each week and thanks to our talented and hardworking members (15 busy people!) we have a menu of four or five different homemade soups and a buffet of bread, cheese and fruit, followed by tea or coffee with biscuits.

The lunches are occasionally boosted by the help of the enthusiastic and dedicated Mini-Vinnies from our Primary Schools, St John's and St Robert Southwell. The children, accompanied by their teachers, serve the soup, chat to our guests and even sing a few songs and read poems.

The age range of our guests ranges from the parish toddlers' group to the grandparents' group with many others in between dropping in while shopping or on their lunch break. A lovely benefit, which we did not anticipate when we started the lunches, is to fill the hall with people chatting, smiling and enjoying catching up with friends and making new acquaintances. The lunches are now a firm part of the parish social calendar.

The funds we raise are vital for those in desperate need in Sudan and South Sudan where the SVP support medical, water distribution and baby feeding programmes. In response to the famine reported in South Sudan, members are looking after the immediate needs of 13,000 internally displaced people in 2 camps.

One School Feeds Another



CHILDREN at a school in Liberia are being fed every day they attend school thanks to the efforts of Worth School students. Pupils at Worth, near Crawley, were joined by parents and staff in raising almost £12,000 to sponsor a Porridge Day, where boarding students ate porridge for breakfast and the 'breakfast saving' on what they would normally eat was donated to Mary's Meals. Girls in the school raised £450 by selling Valentine's Day roses, while collections

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Mary's Meals programme at the Farsee Korma Public School in Liberia (*pictured above*) for the next two years.

Mary's Meals is a charity dedicated to providing some of the world's most underprivileged children one meal every day they attend school. The charity works in 15 countries across Africa, Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean and is currently feeding 1,257,278 children around the world thanks to sponsors like Worth School. In September 2016, Headmaster Mr Stuart McPherson set the Worth community a challenge to raise £5,000 to sponsor a Mary's Meals feeding programme for a full school year. The response was phenomenal and by the end of the school year £11,959 had been raised.

This was achieved through a number of charitable initiatives including supporting World at the Christmas Carol Service and the Annual Speech Day boosted the total.

With the amount raised, Worth wanted to commit to an initial two year sponsorship of a school and chose the Farsee Korma Public School in Cape Mount in the north west of Liberia, an area that borders with Sierra Leone. It has a total of 351 pupils who will all now receive a meal every day they attend school.

Principal teacher H Boima Dakawah said:'Mary's Meals feeding programme increases enrolment and makes the students come to school on time.'


Worth School is continuing to raise money for Mary's Meals, with the possibility of sponsoring the feeding programme at Farsee Korma Public School for a third year.

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JUST A THOUGHT

TULY IS THE TIME TO REFLECT BACK J on the past academic year - have we made the best of the opportunities offered? Have we taken the time to share our achievements? Are we looking forward to preparing for a new experience next term? Going back to school in September seems so far away. The only cloud on the horizon is waiting for exam results in August!

Families are excitedly looking for the chance to spend some time together. As we attend family gatherings, picnics and parties with friends, may we be blessed with the chance to make memories with them, remembering to thank God for giving us the warm sun and the beauty of this wonderful

Lord, I am Not Worthy...

A S A PARISH PRIEST one thing which forms a significant part of my ministry is asking people to do things. This is not merely incidental to the role of a parish priest, in fact it is a key element in the task of leadership. Identifying skills and talents, enabling people to make use of them. This, of course, includes inviting people to become Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. And almost invariably the initial answer is 'Father I don't feel worthy'.

I don't get that for any other ministry. No-one says they feel unworthy to count the money, write the bidding prayers or even read the Scriptures or be a catechist. They may feel unprepared or that they lack the relevant skills, but they don't say they are unworthy.

My usual response is to say that none of us are worthy. And how could we be? How could anyone be worthy to bear and distribute, or indeed receive, the very Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God? Yet we do so not because we are worthy to do so, but because we are called. I am called because of my call to the ministerial priesthood. I am not worthy of that either! In the rite of ordination, the bishop asks the rector if the candidate is worthy to be ordained. One bishop remarked that he thought the answer ought to be 'of course he isn't'.

Distributing Holy Communion Equally, when the priest asks someone to assist with the distribution of Holy Communion that is a call. Not on the level of the life-defining vocations such as marriage or ordination. but a call none the less. The disciples were not 'worthy' when the Lord called them. St Paul certainly wasn't! Worthiness does not come into it. At the heart of the call is the Lord's desire to

come to his people. Indeed all vocations within the church are at their heart a call to help people to encounter Jesus Christ, but of course this is at its most obvious in the ministry of bringing the Blessed Sacrament to people. And looked at that way we can see that worthiness is not so much something we need in order to be called, but something which is given in our calling. The Lord deems us worthy, and that is enough.



Of course a more fundamental but related question is our worthiness to receive the Eucharist in the first place. And we know that we are not worthy, indeed we say so every time we go to Mass. But Jesus comes to us precisely because we are not worthy. He come to heal us, to free us from sin, to give us new life. He comes to us that he might live in us and we in him. In a sense, if we were worthy of the Eucharist we would not need it! As Pope Francis has said on a number of occasions, 'The Eucharist.... is not a prize for the perfect but a powerful medicine and nourishment for the weak' (EG 47).

St Paul and Discerning the Body

But what does St Paul mean when he criticises those who 'eat the bread or drink the cup of the Lord unworthily' (I Cor 11:27)? Do we not all do this? Paul clarifies this a few verses later - he means those who eat and drink 'without discerning the body'. Again we may ask 'what does he mean – is this about the Real

Presence?'. Certainly we need to recognise who it is we are receiving. But for Paul the 'body' is clearly the Church, and he is being critical of those who are receiving the Eucharist while at the same time behaving poorly towards other members of the Church with whom they are sharing that Eucharist. There is an essential link between the Eucharist and the Church - indeed the second Vatican Council described the Eucharist as the source and summit of the life of the Church (Cf. LG 11, SC 10).

The Sign of Peace and St Augustine

In the Mass we recognise we fall down on this in many ways. We acknowledge our sins at the beginning, not just to God but to one another. In the Confiteor we say 'I confess to Almighty God and to you my brothers and sisters'. The sign of peace is a reminder that we come as brothers and sisters to the Lord, and we need to be one with one another if we are to be truly one with the Lord. St Augustine reminds us, referring to St Paul



"You are the body of Christ, member for member." [1 Cor. 12.27] If you, therefore, are Christ's body and members, it is your own mystery that is placed on the Lord's table! It is your own mystery that you are receiving! You are saying 'Amen' to what you are: your response is a personal signature, affirming your faith. When you hear 'The body of Christ', you reply 'Amen.' Be a member of Christ's body, then, so that your

'Amen' may ring true! (Sermon 272)". So it is good to say 'I am not worthy'. But that should not stop us from receiving the Eucharist (unless we are aware of grave sin in our life - then we should go to confession first, precisely to mend that rift between the Church and ourselves that grave sin creates). Similarly, it should not stop us from responding to the call to act as ministers of the Eucharist. Rather it should spur us on to take advantage of the 'medicine' that it may heal our wounds and enable us to draw ever closer to Christ by becoming ever more fully a member of his Body, the Church.

Arundel Friends meet Chichester Friends

GROUP OF FRIENDS from our Cathe-Adral in Arundel visited their counterparts in Chichester a few months ago. On that occasion they were warmly welcomed by Bishop Martin who talked about the role of cathedrals generally in the spiritual life of the church and the special unique features of the Cathedral in Chichester.

In April the Arundel friends were glad to reciprocate. Mgr John Hull, as Provost of the Diocesan Chapter, led the welcomes and in a short but fascinating talk, highlighted the similarities and the differences between the ways in which Catholic cathedrals and Anglican cathedrals worked - how Bishops were chosen, how the Diocese was conceived as a Particular Church and how it was governed, and how, unlike the position in the Church of England, the Cathedral was very much the parish church of the Bishop.

Celebrating Corpus Christi for Over 140 Years



FOR MORE THAN 140 YEARS the people of the town of Arundel have celebrated the Feast of Corpus Christi (the Body of Christ). Traditionally, a carpet of flowers is laid in the central aisle of Arundel Cathedral, open for public viewing for two days and then, after Mass on the second day, the Blessed Sacrament is taken in procession from the Cathedral to the courtyard of Arundel Castle, home to the Duke and Dutchess of Norfolk. Following prayer and Benediction, the grand procession returns to the Cathedral.

Carpet of Flowers

Each year the carpet of flowers is prepared to a different design and the 2018 design was on the theme of 'Adoremus: the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage and Congress' that takes place in Liverpool from 7-9 September this year.

The weather forecast for 31 May, the day of the procession, was for lightening and torrential downpours all afternoon; indeed the skies were leaden and the air was muggy.

A decision was made to proceed and, after Mass presided over by Bishop Richard, the 2018 procession took place.

Procession

It was led by KSC stewards, altar servers, the choir and clergy and young girls strewing petals before the monstrance containing the Blessed Sacrament, borne by Bishop Richard wearing a humeral veil, walking under a processional canopy held aloft by four bearers, accompanied by two candle holders and two deacons.

Knight and Dames of various orders followed, including members of The Order of St Gregory, The Order of St Sylvester, The Order of the Holy Sepulchre and the Order of Malta. Finally, two or three hundred members of the congrgation brought up the rear.

Loudpeakers placed along the route of the entire procession enabled prayers to be relayed and hymns to be sung jointly with the cathedral congregation.

The procession went down London Road and High Street, watched by a small crowd, then entered the grounds of Arundel Castle through the impressive gateway.

Winding its way past ancient trees and green swathes, the procession then passed though a narrow stone entrance into the wide expanse of the castle courtyard, overlooked by the 11th century keep on its hill.


Following prayers and Benediction at an altar at the foot of the hill, the procession then reformed and retraced its steps, returning to the Cathedral, accompanied by prayers and hymns.

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

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POPE FRANCIS ARRIVES IN DUBLIN for the World Meeting of Families 2018 on 25 August.

This is an exciting international event that many families from across the Diocese will be attending. A group of 50 will be attending as the official Arundel and Brighton Group, so we will be spending time getting to know each other over the course of the event. This group is made up of families of all ages who are looking forward to the experience and hope to bring back some of what they learn to their parishes.

The World Meeting will begin on 21 August with an opening ceremony, followed by a three day conference that will engage every one of all ages. A fun filled youth stream will run alongside a fully packed children's programme, while the adults have the opportunity to attend workshops and lectures.

The Wellspring community in Brighton are doing some trailblazing work with young adults and students; programmes like Youth Alpha are transforming parish ministry; diocesan programmes like the Redshirts and the ENCOUNTER programme are going from strength to strength, and the start of theASCENT programme in this autumn looks set to add an exciting dimension and to offer something to those young people wanting to take their faith a stage deeper.

This September, the INSPIRE process will continue with local groups. In fact, the new plan is for there to be three meetings a year: one diocesan meeting in the early part of the summer, one set of local meetings facilitated by me; and one set of local meetings which people arrange and sort between themselves.

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

Sea Sunday - 8 July Work of the Apostleship of the Sea

THIS MONTH the Church celebrates Sea Sunday on the 8 July when we are asked to support Apostleship of the Sea's work with seafarers. Greg Watts meets two of its ship visitors on the south coast to find out about their work. Ship Visitor Irene Chapman

'I knew very little about the maritime world and wasn't aware of the conditions in which seafarers operate. I was also unaware of how many goods imported to the UK come by ship,' says Irene Chapman. Irene is one of Apostleship of the Sea's (AoS) volunteer ship visitors, working alongside Rev Roger Stone BEM, a permanent deacon in the Diocese of Arundel and Brighton, who is chaplain to the ports on the Sussex and Hampshire coast.

Irene became a ship visitor eight years ago after hearing a talk in her parish on Sea Sunday about how AoS provides pastoral care and practical help to seafarers. Having worked in commercial management and higher education, Irene knew nothing about the maritime world and that so many of the goods we rely on - cars, fridges, computers, fuel - come to Britain by sea. 'One of my first impressions when I began visiting ships was how very hard the crew work and how incredibly cheerful they remain,' Irene recalls. She was surprised by the size of some of the ships and how dangerous being a seafarer is. Few of us would fancy being on board a ship being tossed about in the middle of the ocean in a ferocious storm hundreds or thousands of miles from land.

Missing Moments

Irene mostly visits car transporters, general cargo carriers, and gas tankers docked at Fawley. Seafarers can be at sea for months, Irene has learned, which means they have little contact with their families and miss out on important moments such as births, their children's first day at school, and Christmas. 'One sentence from a seafarer which has remained with me was, "*I* *have no memories.*" He was referring to the fact that he had missed his children's birth, their growing up, their parties and their graduation ceremony. Because he was working at sea, he could not be there to share any of these." (*Irene is pictured below presenting Fairtrade Easter Eggs to seafarers*).

Ship Visitor Mary Thakrar Another ship visitor working on the Sussex and Hampshire coast is Mary Thakrar. Much of her time is spent visiting ships in Southampton. Unlike Irene, she already knew a lot about the tough life of seafarers, having once lived on a cargo ship.

When she became a ship visitor, she was struck by how the maritime industry had changed since her time at sea. 'In those days, most of the seafarers I met were English and their pay and conditions were decent. That's not the case nowadays,' she says. Many of the seafarers she meets are from parts of the world such as the Philippines and Goa. The reason they go to sea and undertake one of the most dangerous jobs in the world is to support their families back home.

How AoS Can Help Because many ships are only in port for a few ours seafarers have little time to have a

hours, seafarers have little time to have a change of scenery or buy essential supplies. This is where AoS often helps, providing mobile phone top-up cards, warm clothing in the winter, arranging transport to local shops and even for a priest to visit a ship to celebrate Mass on board.

'I have met older seafarers who have spent years at sea to give their children better lives by funding higher education for them,' says Mary. 'Many also work to fund medical treatment for their family. We often take these for granted, but in many countries you have to pay for them.'

Much of Pat's life as a scientist had been spent in hospital laboratories. Helping people was her passion; with the SVP and St Catherine's Hospice where she became a bereavement counsellor, and both Keith and Pat were 'at work' on Christmas Day with Crisis at Christmas.

Obituaries by their nature concentrate on the life of the person in the wider community. For her family the memories are of a happy home, fun, food and holiday. Pat's final pilgrimage




Pilgrimage to Italy
