

cohesion is to run a monthly tea party in the Parish Hall at St Mary's where those attending can "come and chat with old friends and make some new ones".


Diamond Jubilee of a Popular Parish Priest

n Saturday, 19 July, 1958, as a young man of 25, Walter Anthony Burke was ordained to the priesthood at St Stephen's Church in Skipton. To recognise the Diamond Jubilee of this event, the Mass of "Our Lady, Mother of the Church" was concelebrated in the same church on Saturday, 21 July this year, and was attended by Fr Burke's family, close friends and local parishioners.

Parish priest of St Stephen's, Mgr Andrew Summersgill, was the chief celebrant, assisted by Mgr Desmond Sexton, Fr Andrew Brown, Fr David Peters, Fr Alec Barras and of course Fr Burke, who was invited to say a few words at the end of Mass. In characteristic style, he recalled the 'glory days' of Ushaw Seminary and bemoaned the current shortage of priests, while acknowledging the sacrifices made by his parents, and many others, to send their sons to train for the priesthood. He also paid tribute to the influence of Mgr Tindall and his encouragement along the journey to ordination.

A jolly and informal buffet reception was held in the Easter Room in St Stephen's presbytery, where conversation and wine flowed in equal measure.

Fr Burke's priestly journey began in the Leeds diocese, with curacies in Yeadon and Bradford. After a year in London, he returned north and served in Doncaster before beparish coming priest in Rotherham (during which time the diocese of Hallam was formed), High Green, Chesterfield and finally Hathersage and Bamford, from where he retired. He continues to enjoy a happy life



ing, as he always has done, his devotion to the Rosary and the daily celebration of the Sacrifice of the Mass.

Summer Concert at The Annunciation, Chesterfield

On Saturday, 7 July the Rose Choir and orchestra, featuring soprano soloists Jo Howland and Emily Morris, performed a spectacular programme of classical music at the Annunciation Church in Chesterfield and raised £185 for Mary's Meals. Fr Roy Panell gave a warm welcome speech before handing over the baton to conductor Jonathan Francis, from Chesterfield Studios. The orchestra was lead by Emily Sharratt.

The concert opened with Gloria: Antonio Vivaldi's most famous choral piece – presenting the traditional Gloria from the Latin Mass in twelve varied cantata-like sections. This was followed by Hayden's Waltz – a stunning instrumental piece, written by Jonathan Francis as a gift to his eightmonth old son. The first half concluded with Evening Prayer, by Engelbert Humperdink (1854-1921) and O Sanctissima, written by Robert Prizeman and arranged by Jonathan Francis.

The orchestra opened the second half of the concert with Canon in D by Johann Pachabel (arr J Francis), followed by the Rose Choir's uplifting rendition of As Torrents in Summer, by Edward Elgar and W A Mozart's Laudate Dominum – one of the most lyrical soprano solos the composer ever wrote. After a beautiful performance of Badiniere, from J S Bach's Orchestral Suite No 2 in B Minor, the concert concluded with Song of Songs, a captivating sequence by British composer Patrick Hawes.

Lourdes 2018 as told by Alex Prior, **Director of the Diocesan Pilgrimage**

More than 400 pilgrims from around the Diocese took part in the 2018 Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes from 1 to 6 July. This included 115 young people from the 7 Diocesan High Schools, accompanied by over 30 staff and youth leaders, together with 70 volunteer helpers (Doc-tors, Nurses and Male and Female Helpers) and the Assisted Pilgrims who

are at the heart of the pilgrimage. The Pilgrimage was led by Bishop Ralph, and Bishop Emeritus John Rawsthorne joined the pilgrimage too, to-gether with 10 priests from around the Diocese.

Two charter flights took pilgrims di-rectly to Lourdes on Sunday, 1 July,

where pilgrims joined the Youth who had travelled out on 3 coaches.

On Sunday evening we celebrated our Opening Mass with Blessing of the Helpers. On Monday morning we cele-brated the Grotto Mass with the Diocese of Galway. Our Penitential Service was also on Monday and then in the evening we took part in the Torchlight Procession.

Our Mass with Anointing of the Sick was celebrated on Tuesday morning, and then Holy Hour was held on Tuesday evening. Pilgrims attended the International Mass on Wednesday and we took part in the Blessed Sacrament Procession on Wednesday afternoon. In the

evening we enjoyed a social evening hosted by Hallam Youth.

The young people of the Hallam Diocese play a major part in the Diocesan Pilgrimage. Some of the Liturgies were live streamed into our Diocesan schools. This year Hallam Youth stayed an extra night and so on Thursday we were able to use the full day. On Thursday morning we focused on Water and its significance in Lourdes, and a reminder of our own Baptism. During that Mass Bishop Ralph washed the feet of 12 pilgrims – each representing a different role within the Pilgrimage. We prayed Stations of the Cross on Thursday afternoon and then joined together on Thursday evening for our Closing Liturgy, which was very powerful and included a short video showing some of the memories of the week.

During that Liturgy we were invited to make a gesture with Lourdes water. The Youth/Helper made the Sign of the Cross on the palms of the hands of the Assisted Pilgrim they had accompanied during the week – and then the Assisted Pilgrim did the same to the Youth/Helper.

On Friday morning we celebrated our final Mass together at 9am, leaving time for us all to say our farewells before lunch and the journey home.





History of the St Vincent de Paul Society in England and Wales - Chapter 3

Founded in this country in 1844, the or betterment. SVP was very quickly into its stride in trying to provide practical assistance to those in need. We saw in the 'chapter' how the SVP helped combat the massive health and hygiene problems faced by the poor. This next instalment looks at how the SVP promoted the Catholic faith through supporting church attendance and education.

Concern for the instruction in the faith of Catholic children

Catholics were very much in a minority, and therefore were easy prey to religious prejudice. They found themselves in much less of a minority after the great Irish influx, which began principally in the year 1847. By 1851, the population of England and Wales was 18million, of which 1million were Catholics.



St Marie's Church, Sheffield

St Marie's (originally St Mary's) in Norfolk Row, Sheffield was opened in 1850 and attracted newly emancipated (1829) Catholics in their thousands, including the Irish poor immigrants from The Crofts. Their treatment by today's values was unbelievable. Their obvious poverty and shabby condition generated open hostility and resentment from their fellow Catholics from the more prosperous parts of the parish who came to worship. A form of segregation was introduced to keep people separate. This societal attitude from the time is indicative of the way the poor were perceived and treated. It permeated across all forms of life where those less fortunate were denied any form of advancement, improvement

For us today an obvious factor for success in life is education but this was something that, for virtually all of the poor, was unavailable. It is no surprise then that when we look back at the treatment of Catholics, we can now understand why much of the earliest SVP work was concerned with Catholic education.

There were no Government grants for any school buildings - Catholic or non-Catholic - before 1833. Until then, only voluntary organisations provided school places.

In 1851, there were still 3.5million children, of all religions, not attending school. Education, not yet compulsory, had to be privately financed. The concern shown by the SVP in efforts to educate the poor was following in the footsteps of St Vincent de Paul himself, who had always stressed this as one of the two major works of his priests and the Daughters of Charity.

SVP brothers went into some schools to instruct children in their religion, but, most often, they tried to ensure that Catholic children were placed in a position where they could be taught by others. This did not simply mean actually putting children into schools. It was normally more a case of giving gifts of clothes to children who would otherwise have been unfit even to leave the house. One Sunderland SVP report stated that $\pounds 17 - a$ huge sum at the time – had

been collected to provide clothing for around 70 children to enable them to attend school.

In some instances, the SVP founded schools. In Bristol, they opened an evening school. Numerous cases are recorded of catechism lessons being given.

In 1866, Cardinal Manning said that Catholic schools in London could accommodate only about half of the Catholic poor in that City. In 1874, an evening school in Camberwell, supported by the SVP, paid for the services of a certificated master, who received a weekly salary. In 1879, the SVP opened an evening school in Sheffield, where over a thousand attendances were recorded for the 3



nights per week it was in use during 10 months of its first year.

SVP Conferences continued to help with provision of clothes and the payment of school fees (these would not be abolished until 1892).

A report for 1881, from Manchester, shows that brothers paid school fees for one third of all pupils in the area. If they had not done so, Catholic children would have attended a local "free" school or "Board" school, with no access to a Catholic education.

North Shields brothers taught in Sunday schools. They also helped with religious instruction for:

- Catholic boys on the Training Ship 'Wellesley'
- Care for young prisoners •
 - Helping adults to attend Mass – and providing clothes for this purpose.

Many brothers used to accompany Catholic inmates of workhouses to Mass. If they had not done so, Catholics would have been unable to attend. Even so, despite such offers by accompanying brothers, permission seems to have been refused more often than it was granted.

In the late 1860s there was more religious freedom. Cardinal Manning succeeded in obtaining legislation to allow Catholic children in workhouses to be brought up as Catholics. Separate places of worship were also provided for Catholics, who were allowed more free access to their own clergy.




Clothes also were provided to combat some of the issues faced by poor Catholics who missed Mass. There were numerous examples of parish priests saying a very early Sunday Mass specifically for people who refused to appear out-of-doors later on a Sunday because they had no "proper" clothes.

Because of the attitude typically exhibited by the well-to-do parishioners of St Marie's and churches up and down the country, many poor folk felt too embarrassed to attend church with their (so-called) betters! This is among the reasons why one SVP work was the setting-up of "wardrobes" to supply clothing to the needy. In the following 'chapter' we will look at how the SVP broadened its range of support and services to those in need and one might be forgiven for thinking it could be a template for the welfare state! MORE PEOPLE SHARE THE JOURNEY



On a glorious sunny Sunday, 1 July, an intrepid group of eighteen people from St Joseph's, Moorends, St Nicholas, Thorne and our sister parish of Our Lady of the Assumption, Stainforth, set off to walk the three miles (there and back again), to St Nicholas in Thorne.

Walking helps talking and we shared many stories along the way. Following the excellent instructions in the CAFOD booklet, we heard and reflected on the stories of five people, all refugees for different reasons - war, persecution, poverty and natural disasters.

A very poignant link with war was the remembrance by one of our young men. His friend, a young soldier called Lee Davidson, had been killed in Afghanistan. So many refugees flee that war torn region but the terrible impact of war is felt by families here, too.

Quite a cavalcade of us moved along the route; with one family spurring us all on with a daughter pushing her father in a wheelchair, her mother pushing the little granddaughter in the buggy and the rest of us trying to keep up.

The cheerful welcome from the vicar, Rev David Green, as we reached St Nicholas church hall was much appreciated, as were the drinks and refreshments provided for us. This gen-

erous cooperation was the hallmark of the day.

Our new parish priest, Fr Santosh caused great amusement to passers-by as he marched along under the shade of his colourful umbrella.

On the return journey we recalled the witness of Lilian, from Stainforth, who had recently been to the Greek island of Lesvos, to oversee delivery of much needed sleeping bags and clothing, all collected in her parish. Huge numbers of refugees, crossing from Turkey, have landed on the shores of Lesvos - tired, hungry, desperate and afraid. Many, as we know, did not make it, but lost their lives at sea. Lilian helped prepare food, huge vats of vegetable stew, and distribute this to the families, who had no facilities for cooking. Her experience involved shock at the conditions in the camp, deep admiration for the volunteers who were trying to help and immense wonder at the gratitude and appreciation from the refugees themselves, and the resilience of the children, especially, who sought to help their elderly relatives.

Back in Thorne we signed the cards to send to our Prime Minister, to urge her to find a just, global solution, along with the UN and other world leaders, to the migrant and refugee crisis.

On this second walk around the world - the first target of 24,900 miles was reached on 20 June - we added fifty five miles!

One lady summed up our walk by remarking that it had been a genuinely spiritual experience. All being well, it is hoped to organise other walks to increase the total. Look out for announcements!


Icon Writing Group St Paul's, Cantley

In the creation of a religious icon, the drawing technique is like that of calligraphy. The word "*grapho*" in Greek means "to write". A creator of an icon is known as an *iconographer*: someone who *writes* rather than paints the icon. The art of writing an icon requires a special style that is not a naturalistic representation of life. It is visual theology - or the Holy Scripture in pictures. Icons are not art in the general sense but a process of prayer.

For the past nine years, a group of parishioners from St Paul's RC Church in Cantley, Doncaster have been meeting regularly to write religious icons. The group was first established after David, Trish and Deacon Bill had attended an icon-writing course at Turvey Abbey in Bedfordshire, led by Benedictine Nun, Sister Esther (who happens to be the current President of the British Association of Iconographers).

David, Trish and Bill maintained their interest in writing icons after returning home from the course. They continued to work together and were joined by Angela, who had attended a later course led by Sister Esther at Turvey.

Pope Benedict had proclaimed June 2008 to June 2009 to be the Ju-



The group worked hard, writing the icon from scratch. This involves meticulously preparing the board with several layers of gesso, a traditional mix of rabbit-skin glue binder, chalk and white pigment, then hand-mixing the traditional, fast-drying, permanent painting medium known as egg tempera, which consists of coloured organic pigments mixed with egg yolk, which acts as a water-soluble, glutinous binder medium. The icon of St Paul now hangs in the entrance porch of the St Paul's Church.

The group of icon writers continued to meet to create new icons. As time went on, other parishioners began expressing an interest in joining the group. Trish offered to support regular meetings at



her home, to help the newcomers and encourage the established group members to share some of their experience and expertise.

George, Lisa, Annette, Gill, Bernie and Jamie joined the group. Getting to grips with the processes and working in a completely new medium was difficult for the new members but, with the help of the Holy Spirit, the first icons were completed.

After the new members had completed the first icon of their own choice, it was agreed that all members of the group would concentrate on each writing an icon of Archangel Michael, so that they could work through all the various stages together and learn from the process.

The group members have since gone on to create other icons of their own choice. When icons were completed, they were brought to the church to be blessed by Fr Bernard. The blessing of the icons was undertaken most recently immediately after Mass on the Patronal feast of Saints Peter and Paul. The icon-writing group continues to meet weekly on Thursday mornings at Trish's

The icon-writing group continues to meet weekly on Thursday mornings at Trish's home. They continue to learn and to support each other in their work, and the meetings serve both a social and a devotional purpose for them all. Some of the original members are not able to attend regularly because of other calls on their time but they remain supportive and in touch. 
