"Go forth. The Mass is ended."



Saturday, 10 November, 9.30am-4pm at St Mary's Catholic Primary School, Pack Horse Lane, Sheffield, S35 3HY

Following on from World Mental Health Day on 10 October, the theme of this year's annual safeguarding event is mental health. The day will focus on raising awareness of mental health conditions, the stigma and discrimination surrounding mental illness, the support available and the recovery mind set process.

The guest speakers for the day are:

- Simon Francis from the charity MIND Sheffield. A former senior policy adviser for Government work on mental health and employment strategies, Simon has published widely on mental health and inclusion and has led on several national strategies. He has been training independently for 10 years, training over 10,000 people.
- Baroness Sheila Hollins, Emeritus Professor of Psychiatry of Disability at St George's Hospital Medical School, University of London and a Consultant Psychiatrist. Baroness Hollins is a past President of the Royal College of Psychiatrists and the British **Medical Association.**

Baroness Hollins currently sits in the House of Lords and is founding Editor, Author and Executive Chair of Books Beyond Words. Whether supporting somebody with a learning disability or communication difficulty, Beyond Words provides books and training to empower and support people who find pictures easier to understand than words.

Baroness Hollins is also a family carer for her son who has a learning disability.

Laura Rendell: working for Hallam Caring Services, Laura is a qualified counsellor and psychotherapist and a trainer in Mindfulness workshops. Mindfulness is the basic human ability to be fully present, aware of your thoughts, feelings and surrounding environments and being compassionate with yourself.

Mindfulness practice is about observation without criticism; and the ability to disengage from incapacitating worry and detrimental or self-defeating negative thinking.

Laura will end the day with a short workshop on Mindfulness followed by a closing speech from Bishop Ralph.

The day will be open to Clergy, Safeguarding Representatives and all Volunteers/Parishioners.

## Fr Tom Durkin RIP

Fr Thomas Michael Durkin was born on 13 May, 1943. He studied for the priesthood at the Beda College in Rome. He was ordained to the priesthood at St Mary's, Halifax, in 1974.

Fr Durkin was a curate at Holy Rood, Barnsley and Mother of God, Sheffield. During this time, he was also the Director of Vocations.


In March, 1984, he was appointed as Parish Priest at Our Lady of the Assumption, Stainforth.

He also served as Parish Priest in Hoyland, Rotherham and Darton.

In June, 2017, Fr Durkin retired. His death occurred on 8 September, 2018.

On Thursday, 20 September, his body was received into the Church of St Mary's, Halifax, where he had been ordained, and his Requiem Mass was celebrated there at noon the following day.

May he rest in peace.




### St Charles Borromeo Parish Celebrate 150 years

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## MISSION HUB ~ The History

Work will begin this November renovating and transforming the now derelict 1863 Victorian school building at St Vincent's, Solly Street, Sheffield, into an exciting new mis-

sion for the Diocese of Hallam.

The Mission Hub will seek out the 'dechurched' and 'un-churched' from the current generation of young adults. The de-churched are those who have lost sight of Christ, even though they may have been introduced to him in our families and schools, but for whatever reason are forgetting about him now.

The un-churched are the vast majority to whom the name of Jesus means little or nothing. We will reach out to 18-35 year olds, including students, young adults and young families

Thanks to the generosity of the parish of St Vincent's by the time we launch this mission in September, 2019 we will have renovated premises at the heart of Sheffield's new student development area. We hope that the Mission Hub will serve as a lifeboat in this new, vibrant part of Sheffield and will seek out a lost generation of young adults and students who

live in our midst. It will be a place of welcome and hospitality in which all young adults can feel that they belong.

The entrance to the Hub is therefore a Café, serving delicious coffee, music and offering a great vibe. It is a flexible space that seats 40 but can be opened up to seat up to 100 for 'open mic' evenings of relaxing with friends from all Christian denominations and none. The café is a place of welcome, unity, evangelisation and fun.

Beyond the café are two flexible break-out spaces leading to the student chaplaincy, complete with a kitchen, where our students can meet, eat, study and relax.

The Mission Hub is also a space for deep prayer and encounter with the Lord. Once you move beyond the ground floor spaces designed for welcome and hospitality, you will walk up the stairs and discover a small oratory for quiet prayer. It is our deep desire that Jesus will soon be adored and consoled in the Blessed Sacrament around the clock, day and night in this room. The heart and soul of the entire building is the large 'upper room' chapel that seats about 220 people for Mass, with impressive lighting, audio and media. This space is flexible, enabling other forms of praise and worship outside of Mass.

For the Hub to be a true Mission it is not sufficient to be a place of refuge, welcome and prayer. We must seek to intentionally raise up a new generation of missionary disciples and leaders to serve in our diocese and beyond. To assist in this we are studying and learning the techniques and methods of some of our Christian brothers and sisters from other denominations who are already achieving this with great success. We are also forming a team of volunteers both locally and nationally, made up of young adults who have discovered this mission and want to be part of it. The site on Solly Street, including the old school building which will become the new Mission Hub, has great historical significance for the people of St Vincent's parish – many of whom were baptised or married in the church and attended the school before it closed in the

In fact, the parish's association with the site dates back to 1851 when a plot of land was purchased there for £700 to provide a Catholic school-chapel for the area. The building was completed in July, 1853 and

put under the charge of the Vincentians.

The Sheffield Blitz in 1940 resulted in the destruction of the original 1853 chapel, although the newer part of the church from 1911 escaped serious damage. However, after the war the whole area was badly damaged and the church lost much of its congregation. In 1996 it closed as a place of worship, and the Vincentian Fathers then left Sheffield altogether in April, 1997.

A new parish church for St Vincent's was opened in Crookes in 2001, but the parish continued to own the land on Solly Street and operated a commercial car park there. However, by 2015, both the church and the old school building were in a very derelict state and the costs of maintaining the site were soaring.

The situation came to a head when the Council insisted that considerable sums of money needed to be spent on re-roofing the old school building. The parish could simply have sold the whole site, but decided instead to retain the old school building and sell the rest of the site, using the money raised to renovate the old school building for use by the parish.



This was agreed, but the parish still had a problem – how could we feasibly run a community centre with very limited resources? We put together a proposal for how it might work, but it was going to be a massive challenge ... until in stepped Fr Lee Marshall with his plans for a Mission Hub for young people and families! Providence really was playing a hand.

Fr Lee presented his vision to the St Vincent's parish finance committee and we were all excited to see what he had in mind. Finally, after many meetings and prayers, the rest of the site was sold for student accomoda-



-tion and the parish agreed to use a portion of the funds raised to help fund the transformation of the old school building into a state-of-the-art Mission Hub, to be run by the chaplaincy but still owned by the parish.

And so from next year, 23 years after the closure of the original St Vincent's Church, Mass will once again be celebrated regularly on Solly Street – not in the old church but in the beautifully refurbished old school building.

As a parish we are delighted to have played our part in this new and exciting development, which we feel sure is an answer to our prayers. The future of the Catholic presence on Solly Street is bright. Dominic Baster


Members of the parish family were invited to bring food representative of their country for all to share. Over seventy parishioners attended.

# 'All for God, for the Poor and for our Congregation!'

On Saturday, 25 August, Sr Anna Yeo and Sr Mary Gonçalves of the Daughters of Divine Charity made their First Profession at The Annunciation Church in Chesterfield.

On this very special Saturday morning the congregation, including family and friends of Sr Anna and Sr Mary, raised their voices for the opening hymn: *Be Thou My Vision*. The Liturgy of the Word, was followed by the Rite of the First Profession as both sisters were called by their name and stepped forward to state their desires. Parish Priest, Fr Adrian Tomlinson gave the homily, then Sr Anna and Sr Mary knelt before the Provincial Superior to read the Formula of Profession and receive the symbols of their consecration to God and the Congregation:

A ring, the sign of fidelity to Christ The veil, the sign of a bride of Christ

The emblem, the sign of the Congregation of the Daughters

of Divine Charity

The Constitutions of the Congregation, that they may express

in their vocation

A Garland of flowers, a sign of the crown of glory

The rest of the sisters sang *Magnificat* while the newly professed sisters changed the white veils of the novitiate for black veils – after wearing the white veils for two years during their novitiate. Prayers of the faithful were offered, followed by the Offertory Hymn: *Take my hands*. Then the Liturgy of the Eucharist took place. The hymn, *Jesus Christ, You are my life*, was sung to conclude the Mass.

A reception was held with celebration cakes in the Annunciation Parish Centre afterwards. Sr Anna and Sr Mary have become much loved faces in the parish community in Chesterfield over the past 2 years, and many

came to share the celebration and congratulate them as they begin the next stage of their religious vocation in Norfolk.

The Daughters of Divine Charity ("FDC", from the Latin, *Filiae Divinae Caritatis*) also celebrate their 150th anniversary this year. Founded by Mother Franciska Lechner in Vienna on 21 November, 1868, the order is now blessed with over a thousand sisters presently making God's love visible in the world. They have sisters in ten provinces in more than twenty countries.

In England, the Sisters of the Sacred Heart Province have been serving God for one hundred and four years. Their main apostolate has been in education. At present, there is a school in Swaffham, a nursery in Chesterfield and a small care home in Hunstanton. In the parishes where their convents are situated, many of the sisters are Eucharistic ministers. They visit the sick, elderly and prepare children for Holy Communion and Confirmation. They also organise retreats in schools and universities. Their motto is 'All for God, for the Poor and for our Congregation!'

"Over the years," said Novice Mistress, Sr Linda Pergegaj, "we have been blessed with new vocations. From today, we will have four junior sisters, one novice and two new candidates. Through the intercession of our Foundress, Our Blessed Drina Martyrs and all our deceased sisters, we pray through God's merciful providence for more new vocations. 


### Writer's Cramp?

After completing his sixth book about St Marie's cathedral, Deacon Bill Burleigh is taking a rest from writing.

The complete set of books comprises the big Guide Book full of great photos by parishioner, Bob Rae, a book about the seven rare medieval alabaster panels displayed at St Marie's, a book of devotional reflections based on the many ways in which Our Lady is portrayed in the cathedral's stone and stained glass and the three history books about Catholicism in Sheffield and in the parish of St Marie from 1549 until 1980.

Bill's history books have been featured recently in The Universe, Yorkshire Post and Sheffield's Star newspaper. "The story of the injustices towards Catholics in and around Sheffield following the Reformation right up to Victorian times has been a discovery for many people," said Deacon Bill. "The struggles of poor Catholics in Victorian times, the contributions of key Catholics to the well-being of the growing city of Sheffield, the stories of the 67 parishioners who fell in World War One and the amazing story of the saving of the stained glass during World War Two are told in Parts Two and Three. The history draws to a close with the background to the formation of the Diocese of Hallam that was finally achieved in 1980.

### History of the St Vincent de Paul Society in England and Wales

As the 19th century progressed the St Vincent de Paul Society grew and developed its capacity to offer support to those in need in an increasingly broad range of ways. This next 'chapter' sets out examples of how the SVP worked to promote the spiritual, social and moral standards of those in need.

Providing safe homes for young people working away from home

In many early SVP reports we read the work "patronage". This is sometimes described as "patronage of delinquent, orphan and working youths in need of moral, social and financial tutelage".

The Patronage Committee stated as one of its aims: "to shield the children of the poor from corruption when they first go to work, and to instil spiritual values by means of advice and help".

When children needed to work away from home this Patronage Committee found suitable homes for them. Visits were arranged to these youths from among SVP brothers specially appointed by Conference Presidents. Each boy was placed under the individual supervision of a particular brother.

Patronage 'Guilds' were established, through which monthly Communion was assured. It must be remembered that such Guilds were originally created for boys of "essentially good character". They were sometimes called "schoolroom" or "intern" patronages. If boys were of "doubtful character", it was arranged for them to receive frequent and "friendly" visits!


In another Manchester report covering these years, we read a very sad description of SVP funding a "Home for Friendless Young Men" and a Refuge for Destitute Workmen".

"St Vincent's Home for Destitute Boys" was founded in Hammersmith in 1859. In 1873, this became one of the very first Catholic Rescue Society homes.

A notable example of employment and education for boys

Another striking title from these early days is the "Catholic Shoe Black Brigade". Once again, a look at the conditions of child-employment will help us to understand its purpose. In 1847 an Act had limited the work of children in coal-mines by stating that any children between the ages of 9 and 18 could do no more than 9 hours work per day. This regulation was generally disregarded and never really became practice for a further 30 years.

The Catholic Shoe Black Brigade was founded by SVP Conferences in London during the early 1850s. First of all, it ensured employment to about 50 children. It also safeguarded against the loss of their faith. The scheme was approved by the London police, who allocated 50 separate pitches to boys between 9 and 13.

According to the SVP annual report, these children were the "poorest of the poor, many from parents who were a harmful influence or who had rejected them since birth".

A schoolroom was organised for these boys, where they learned the 3-Rs and received religious instruction, leading to First Confession and First Holy Commu-

Concern to provide employment

One of Frédéric Ozanam's first works was to secure employment for orphans in the printing works owned by the founder President, Emmanuel Bailly, editor of the Tribune Catholique. This approach to providing employment was replicated in England by the sponsorship of orphans.

An Orphan Patronage Committee was established as a special work for the English SVP in 1850. At first, this looked after 50 orphans who had mostly been taken from places officially called "asylums", run by religious orders with either partial or full SVP support. Some orphans were taken from Poor Law Guardians. Brothers paid four shillings (20p) per week for each orphan but received an allowance equivalent to 71/2p from the Poor Law Guardians for each orphan taken away from Union Work-

**Providing Catholic literature** 

Frédéric Ozanam had helped to organise lending libraries in both Paris and Lyon. The one in Lyon admitted both workmen and soldiers, many of whom had previously confronted each other during riots, on opposite sides of the barof the Catholic Truth Society begun later in the century. The purpose of the 'Clifton Tracts' was to tell the truth about Catholic beliefs and practices, and also about the history of the Church.

Concern for the bereaved

Funeral attendance is still one of the SVP's regular works, but its origins lay in more than simply praying for souls and comforting the bereaved. Before 1880. the date of the Burial Amendment Act, cemeteries were owned almost entirely by the Church of England. No Catholic priest was allowed to officiate. When a Catholic died, the burial service was recited at the deceased's home, often by SVP brothers. The coffin was then taken to the cemetery, where the Anglican service was read.

From Jarrow in the North-East came a report of 1882, "Brothers make it a practice to attend funerals of the poor, and they have been able to suppress drunkenness at wakes by reciting the Rosary".

**Temperance** At about the time of the Jarrow report, we learn of brothers in nearby Felling "helping the clergy of the mission in pro-

moting temperance"!

Helping with food and warmth A report from Hull in 1876 said that during that year brothers distributed among the poor of their parish 132 stones of potatoes, 45 stones of flour, 81/2 stones of oatmeal, 80 pounds of sugar, 53 pounds of meat, 22 pounds of bread and various amounts of butter. tea, milk, rice, boots, clothing and carts of coal. 40 cart-loads of coke were delivered during 1878.

ricades. Such an admirable expression of Christian charity, witnessed in the library, was further helped when facilities were extended to include a Workers' leisure centre, to which soldiers were also admitted.

Following this example, the SVP in Bristol founded a lending library in 1849. Five hundred volumes were collected and there were 54 subscribers to the library

The SVP also helped to found The Universe, when Cardinal Wiseman asked Brothers to produce a cheap newspaper accessible to the poor "through which the truth could be told about war being waged against the Church in Italy by Victor Emmanuel, Cavour and Garibaldi". In 1860, the "penny" Universe went on sale, with Brother Archibald Dunn as editor. Its foreign correspondent was George Wigley, the former member of Frédéric Ozanam's Conference in Paris, who had done so much in bringing the Society to England. The Universe received much co-operation from the French 'Univers Religieux' and its editor, Louis Veuillot. It was this French 'Univers' for which Ozanam had often

At about the same time the 'Clifton Tracts' were being published by Brothers in Bristol. These were the first such printed pamphlets since the Reformation. They can be seen as a forerunner Setting up a Bank

In 1872, the Sheffield SVP Conference opened a new branch of the Yorkshire Penny Bank. The modern equivalent is, perhaps, helping to set up a Credit Union.

Concern for marriage and family life

In Birmingham numerous cases were noted of brothers helping to legalise common-law "marriages". This was one of the early works which Ozanam and other founder-members had undertaken in Paris during the 1830s and, taking their lead from Birmingham, was taken enthusiastically by conferences around the country.

This article has given a flavour of the diverse and important work of the SVP as it developed to fulfil its mission in the socio-political context of the 19th cen-

tury. Next month the fifth and final instalment will trace the SVP through the 20th century and up to the present day, looking at it in its current form and considering its future.

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
# Welcome to the Children's Liturgy Section



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

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
