DINNINGTON COMMUNITY GARDEN

St Joseph's, Dinnington recently opened their Community Garden. The idea for a garden followed the Centenary of the Parish being established. The creation of a new church car park had left the garden area neglected so a number of grants were obtained from various local communities and

the work began.





The Community Garden has many features including disabled access, a remembrance bench to commemorate the miners of Dinnington, a statue to remember all unborn children, a garden bench with the names of all the priests who have served the parish of St Joseph's, an arbour seating area and a newly planted garden area. These different aspects of the Garden



serve to reflect the whole community. CTJM firm gave their labour free for the landscaping. The local council donated £2,000 for the granite bench and the bouncy castle on the opening day.





Dobbies Garden Centre donated the flowers and shrubs and the parishioners helped to plant all the flowers. Tesco donated £1,000 towards landscaping, which provided a new wider path around the side of the church, and also a donation of food towards the open day.



Sir Kevin Barron opened the new garden, at a celebration afternoon, and a total of £560 was raised. This enabled the parish to donate £140 to each of three charities, Bluebell Wood Children's Hospice, Rotherham Hospice and Lost Cord Dementia Charity.

The parishioners of St Joseph's hope to continue developments and to include an outside defibrillator for use by the village.


Six years later he became the Parish Priest at Christ the King ,Rossington. He served the community of Christ the King for twenty seven years.

He was also Episcopal Vicar for Education and the Chairman of the Schools' Commission.

Fr McNamee retired on

1 August, 2015. He died on 26 October, 2018.

Private WRJ Wolstenholme marries Elizabeth Theresa Metcalf in 1918

As the Hallam News goes to press, the whole country is commemorating the end of World War One. Peter Wolstenholme, a parishioner of St Joseph's in Handsworth, looks back on the life and service of his father, Private WRJ Wol-

William Reginald Joseph Wolstenholme of St Vincent's Parish, Sheffield, enlisted in the King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry (KOYLI) on 31 January, 1916 and was posted to Pontefract. He was then posted to the Somme on 2 February, 1916 as 27184 Private Wolstenholme, KOYLI 9th Battalion, D company, starting over two years active service on the Somme.

He said conditions on the Somme were horrendous, often waist deep in liquid mud having to bury the dead in the walls of the trench due to heavy German gunfire. They would advance, take German positions then under counter attack fall back, many times finding themselves back in their original trenches.

Occasionally two privates were ordered to "Go over the top" at night, one with Mills bombs (hand grenades), the other with a rifle. They crossed No Man's Land, one lobbed grenades into the German trenches, the other covering with his rifle. One

night Private Wolstenholme had Mills bombs in one pouch and his steel glasses case in the other pouch. His companion said he had a premonition and asked Private Wolstenholme to swap the pouch contents over. He did and, as he stepped over the lip of the trench, his chest pouch was hit by a German sniper bullet that embedded in his glasses case, saving his

On 18 September, 1918, Private Wolstenholme was recommended for Gallantry in the field during a German counter attack.

Private Wolstenholme returned to England and mar-Elizabeth Theresa Metcalf (our Mom) at St Vincent of Pauls, White Croft, Sheffield on 28 October, 1918. Sunday, 28 October, 2018 was the centenary of their wedding.

before moving to the new Manor Estate, where they at-tended Mass in an old army hut on The Manor Fields. St Theresa's School opened in 1929. Mass was celebrated in the school hall until St Theresa's Church was opened in 1938.

William Wolstenholme was a member of the SVP. Also each Saturday he collected a large bundle of Catholic papers from the Repository on Norfolk Row, to be sold at the back of church after each Mass. He was awarded the Benemerenti medal for services to the church in 1958.



Following Demob in 1919 he was employed by Sheffield Education Committee as a Child Attendance Officer, better known in Sheffield as "School Bobbies". When the Manor Estate was built he covered all schools there including St Theresa's.

He attended St Theresa's until his death on 25 January, 1979. I, Peter Wolstenholme, am the sixth of their seven

St Wilfrid's Place - a new residential support service

After a long period of research and fundraising, St Wilfrid's Place was opened in 2017, with twenty self-contained flats providing supported living for vulnerable adults for up to two years. All twenty units have now been allocated, and two tenants have already made the transition to living independently.

Mark Wheen, from Great Places Housing Group, has been leading the staff team since the launch. He commented, "It has been a real privilege to work with our tenants over the last twelve months, helping them to develop their confidence and skills and to prepare for independent living." Over the last 28 years, St Wilfrid's Day Centre has helped thousands of people, providing a safe space for vulnerable adults in Sheffield to come and participate in a range of social activities, building confidence and learning new skills.



For many of those visiting the Centre, homelessness was either an imminent threat or a daily reality and, although the day centre provided crucial support, the trustees at St Wilfrid's felt that more could be done.

A Client's Story

Julie (not her real name) was abused as a child, and the impact of the abuse was increased when her family did not believe her account of what had happened. Julie subsequently developed mental health issues, particularly depression, which made it harder for her to socialise with others.

Attending St Wilfrid's has enabled Julie to gain confidence in making friendships. She now participates fully in the centre's activities and trips, where she feels safe and she "can cope much better with everything".

History of the Society of St Vincent de Paul in England and Wales - Part 5

As a new century dawned the Society of St Vincent de Paul continued with its mission to actively seek out those in need and offer practical assistance and support in whatever way it could. The Society had shown from its inception its ability to respond to demands and needs of the time and this was to continue throughout the next century.

THE SVP IN THE EARLY **20TH CENTURY** Concern for Youth

Whilst the 20th century had many tumultuous events, the SVP maintained a focus on supporting those younger members of society who were in danger of falling away from or losing their faith. This was demonstrated in work involving youth clubs, scouts, religious instruction and Mass attendance. The year 1918 itself is described as one of very great significance for the SVP in its 'spiritual and corporal care of youth'. A report records 382 Conferences of which 68 were operating youth and men's clubs, 27 instructing in Sunday Schools and Catechism Classes, 19 running boy-scout troops, 12 boys brigades and 2 cadet corps.


In Preston, one brother registered attendances at Mass of 30 boys and also taught in Sunday School; ten brothers managed a guild of 250 men and 360 boys, including 3 children partially maintained in orphanages.

In Hebburn, St Aloysius's Conference numbered 26 brothers. During 1918, they completed 1,249 visits to working boys in their own home, so as to ensure attendance at monthly Communion. There was a guild of 150 boys and a boys' brigade of 50. The inmates of Monkton "Imbecile Home" were taken to Mass each Sunday.

The editor of *The Universe*, Brother Archibald Dunn, wrote about such young boys being of an age which was the most critical period of life: "When a boy leaves the protection of

home and school and is exposed to the demoralising influence of other boys of his own age who have no religion and no moral training

The attention paid by the SVP to the education and spiritual development of youth was especially appreciated by a Belgian bishop, who thanked Brothers for having looked after 350 of his refugees stranded here during the First World War. A "continued Catholic education had been ensured and six of the boys were then studying for the

priesthood".

Unemployment increases poverty but recruitment flourishes to meet the need

Although it might seem that the 1914-18 War was the most worrying time at the beginning of the 20th Century, unemployment was a much more prolonged problem and gave much work to the SVP. The period between 1914 and 1918 was, in fact, the only period during the first 30 years of the century when employment could be guaranteed, because most men were fighting at the front in France.

Archbishop Bourne of Westminster said that, of all the associations he knew, the SVP was the one best adapted to deal with the needs of the poor during the years of widespread unemployment.

Despite the devastating loss of brothers during the First War, the increased help needed for the unemployed nevertheless helped to stimulate recruitment to unprecedented levels:

"In 1905, the number of Conferences had just passed the 200-mark and we had just fewer than 3,000 brothers. During the worst years of unemployment, leading up to 1925/6, and despite a loss of one-fifth during the War, SVP members actually more than doubled so that, by 1925, membership was

MODERN TIMES

Following the Second World War, our society has witnessed huge changes in terms of social reform with the development of the Welfare State, the birth of the NHS, educational reform and a political commitment to look after people "from the cradle to the grave". The responsibilities assumed by the State towards the poor have increased dramatically and whilst the principle is laudable and it has been a successful approach for many people over the last 60 years, there are still those who need help. The SVP has continued to develop to respond to help those in need as society has modernised and changed and has undergone significant changes in the way it operates, constantly evolving to ensure it stays true to its mission, values and history.

With so much social support being offered by the state, the work of the SVP has now moved towards more focused, community based activities through the efforts of the parish conferences, which in modern times are the beating heart of the society. Today's volunteers work together as a team actively seeking out those in need in their community and addressing the perennial issues of poverty, loneliness and illness, as well as supporting people with and in their

Equality a long time coming

Throughout this history reference is made to 'brothers' with no mention of female involvement. The SVP was founded in the mid-19th century at a time when females' status and rights in society were seen as secondary to men and it was unthinkable for women to be involved in the work 'only men could

Until 1963 women were organised separately throughout the world as the 'Women's Society of St Vincent de Paul', with headquarters in Bologna, Italy. It was founded in 1856 to render charitable aid to the afflicted in matters which men could not handle, such as the care of widows, orphan girls and mothers with small families. After a trial period the women's Society was amalgamated with the men's Society in

1967 and now admits both men and women with equal responsibility. Membership is approximately 50/50 male-female. Today, the SVP's current National President is Helen O'Shea, appointed this year.

A challenge for the Society today The early history of the SVP shows how radical the work of the St Vincent de Paul Society was in those days. Our work has changed very much today, and one reason for this is a change in the Lay Apostolate. Earlier times saw the SVP as the dominant and, in some respects, the only Lay Or-

ganisation in the Church. Nowadays there are many more, doing a variety of different works, which is an encouraging develop-

The challenges are, however, as great as at any time in the past 174 years. Have we lost the radical approach to need? Are there lessons for us in the energy and ingenuity expended by our predecessors for the welfare and faith of young people? Are we still as keen to encourage lapsed Catholics to return to the practice of the faith? Is there still a need for us to distribute Catholic literature? Are we doing enough for the unemployed?

The answer is that it is up to every one of us to do the best we can. Given a generosity of spirit, the Society will respond to need as it has always done, with a renewed vigour, with the help of Blessed Frédéric and with the Holy Spirit teaching us that our work never springs from ourselves alone.

Carmel Care Kitchen Bon Appetit!





Church Action on Poverty Meeting on Universal Credit

The roll out of Universal Credit and its potential impact on people facing poverty in Sheffield will be the focus of an open meeting organised by Sheffield Church Action on Poverty.

Fears have been rising that hundreds of Sheffielders could be pushed over the breadline, leaving city food banks struggling to meet demand, following the introduction of the new Government benefit system that replaces six existing benefits for people without work or on low pay, with a single monthly payment.

Against that background, the local branch of the national ecumenical Christian social justice charity, committed to tackling poverty in the UK, has invited Liz Cook, the new chief executive of Citizens Advice Sheffield, to speak about Universal Credit and other issues facing her organisation.

The meeting will take place at the Sheffield Jesus Centre, 93 Broomspring Lane, S10, at 7pm on Tuesday, 4 December.

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
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The Pax Christi Peace Icon in Hallam

On Saturday, 27 October Hallam Justice and Peace Commission hosted the Icon dedicated to Pax Christi International in recognition of Pax Christi's work for peace and reconciliation in the Middle East.

This sacred painting was made in the Monastery of St John in the Desert, near

On Saturday, 27 October Hallam Justice Jerusalem, and gifted to Pax Christi Inand Peace Commission hosted the Icon ternational in 1999.

The Icon represents Christ as the source of reconciliation, liberation and peace.

It is a most powerful resource and arrived in Hallam having been a part of the parallel programme at the recent Eucharistic Congress in Liverpool.





The Pax Christi Icon

The day began with a brief introduction highlighting the importance of icons in both the Eastern Christian and Orthodox traditions.

During the morning we spent time reflecting on the images on the icon and listening to the stories of those depicted, focusing on the need for forgiveness and reconciliation within all human relationships, recognising that it is only through the pursuit of truth and justice that healing and peace-making becomes possible. The use of simple repetitive chants contributed greatly to the contemplative atmosphere.

The stories we heard were indeed challenging including: those martyred for their beliefs, others killed for refusing to take up arms, saintly men and women who offered their lives to prayer and good works, those on the margins who heard and then proclaimed the message of Jesus, brothers who were reconciled and those who were people of great faith.

The lunch time proved useful for networking between those involved with justice and peace activities in parishes and deaneries.

The afternoon began by praying together the prayer from the icon of peace cards. We were then invited to gather in small groups, using stories from the icon as a stimulus to reflect on how, as people of faith, we can see possibilities for peace making and reconciliation - in ourselves, in our Church, in our society and in our world.





Each group was asked to identify and note a sign of hope. These were displayed (pictured below) at a short liturgy and blessing which brought the meaningful, yet challenging, day to a close.



Prayer and Reflection Around Famous Works of Art
