Precious Things Always Need to be Guarded and Protected

In the time between Christmas and New Year the Church celebrates the Feast of the Holy Family. Read here Bishop Ralph's Pastoral Letter for the Feast of the Holy Family. Bishop Ralph explores the messages behind the readings for this feast day.

Messages, which are useful to carry with us in our family life throughout the year.


Dear Brothers and Sisters in Jesus Christ This time in between Christmas and the New Year is a precious time to be spent with family and friends, but especially family, both immediate and extended. While we celebrate the life of our own families and the bonds of love and affection that bind us together, the Church invites us to look to and celebrate the life of the newly formed family of Nazareth and see it as a model



for our own.

The three readings chosen for today's feast each speak to us of a different aspect of the family that we find in the life of the Holy Family of Nazareth and to which we aspire in our own family. The readings, as one commentator suggests, speak of the significance within the family of the devotion of the father (and indirectly the mother), the devotion of children to parents and the debt of mutual love.

In today's gospel we are reminded that the uniqueness of the Holy Family of Nazareth did not shield them from some of the struggles and dangers that are part of the human condition. In particular, Matthew's story which is not found anywhere else in the gospels, tells us that when Jesus was still a toddler, he and his parents, Mary and Joseph, had to flee from Nazareth to Egypt fearing for his safety. We cannot imagine what it must have been like for them to suddenly find themselves having to leave their home and flee to another country not knowing, when, if ever, it would be possible for them to return home in safety. The decision to flee, Matthew tells us, was at the instruction of an angel in a dream. The instructions are all about the child and his wellbeing and safety which are entrusted to Joseph. The angel doesn't hold back and could



not be more direct:

"Get up, take the child and his mother with you, and escape into Egypt and stay there until I tell you....."

We are not privy to any advice Joseph may, or may not, have been given on how he might support his family in a land he did not know. He just has to trust the angel's message. Later in the story only when it was considered safe for the family to return home and the child's safety was assured, Joseph is given further instructions:

"Get up, take the child and his mother with you and go back to the land of Israel, for those who wanted to kill the child are dead."

The second reflection offered in the readings is that children owe their parents a debt of gratitude. This is beautifully and concretely stated in the first reading by its writer, Ben Sirach. There we are reminded that honour, respect, sympathy and kindness should be the attitudes of children towards their parents. The language of Sirach puts flesh, if you like, on the commandment of love and a reminder that the family is where love



The Data Protection Regulations require written consent to be given whenever an image (photo or video) is published in which a person is identified or is likely to be identified. Guidance in relation to Large Groups/Crowds Where the photo is of a large group and does not focus on an individual, for example a large group attending the Padley Pilgrimage or walking in a procession, the Data Protection Regulations do not apply. There is no need to provide privacy informa-tion to all individuals in the photo. If the focus was on an identified individual in the large group, they would need to give consent for the use of the photo for publication.





COME AND SEE ~ CATHEDRAL CHURCH OF ST MARIE



The disciples once said to Jesus, "Where do you live?" He replied, "Come and see!" No more is recorded about what they found as the message of the gospel is about *who* they found: a simple invitation leading to a lifechanging experience.

Visiting the Cathedral Church of St Marie is not quite in the same league but it is guaranteed to provide some surprises (writes Gerry Burke, one of the volunteer guides). The story of the Cathedral places it at the heart of Catholicism in England. It was opened as a parish church in 1850, the middle of the century which saw the gradual emergence of the Catholic Church into public life and then its phenomenal growth due to population expansion and substantial immigration. This is reflected in the building:

the capturing of a link with the ancient faith in its neo-Gothic design and the precious alabaster images dating from pre-Reformation times:

the stained-glass windows with stories to tell about the history of salvation and the history of our diocese;

the number of times the place has ٠ been taken apart inside and put back together again, proving it's not a museum but a place for people and their life of faith.

And where else in the country can you find (it is said) nearly two hundred images of angels? Or the body of a priest once trundled through the streets in dead of night?

All this, and much more, is revealed during the organised tours which are easily booked through the Cathedral office. Since the refurbishment and re-opening of the Cathedral in 2012 there has been a great interest by various groups in visiting St Marie's. Most of these have been from other Christian churches or secular organisations rather than Catholic parishes or societies.

The volunteer guides would really like to be able to welcome more people from the parishes of the diocese. They are keen to encourage all sorts of groups, for example:

- A complete parish coach trip
- A parish UCM or similar parish society An ecumenical group from several local churches

A small group of friends (maybe on a shopping or sightseeing trip)

Other local societies to which a parishioner might belong

Combinations of all the above! The guides are happy to welcome any number from two to twenty (or even a few more).



On 29 March, 2020 the Rededication of England will present the personal gift of the faith of the people of England to the Mother of God and seek her prayers, loving




care and protection for our country. The Rededication is a simple but powerful commitment to seek the will of God in our lives.



The season of Lent is like the time of 40 days Jesus spent in the desert. He spent this time alone, fasting and in prayer. During his time there, Jesus was tempted to choose a different way to God's way but he resisted this.

Have a look around your church and see what changes may have occurred. You might see the altar cloths and hangings have changed to purple and there are no flowers around. Later in Lent some pictures or statues might have been covered up. In your school, your RE table might be purple too.

During Lent Christians prepare themselves for the great festival of Easter. It is a time to stop, think and try to do better in the future. Christians remember Jesus' total self-giving by either choosing to give up something during Lent or choosing to do something extra.

For this activity, you will need the shape of a leaf. On one side get your child to write or draw something that they want to be sorry for.


When they have finished, turn the leaf over. By saying sorry to God, we turn over a new leaf!



I wonder how you can make a difference in the world?

Quiet Zone: During Lent, we can think about the time that Jesus spent in the desert by being quiet and alone. Here is a simple activity that you can do at home.
 Create a special space for your child/children, where they can each be quiet for a while. Let them be quiet for a short time, but don't be over ambitious! Five minutes is a long time to sit quietly. Let them have some quiet music and a picture to look at or a story to think about to focus their thoughts. Suggest they listen to their own thoughts and ideas. This can help them to become aware of their own "internal" voice.
 This activity can be repeated many times throughout the Lenten season.
