WORLD DAY OF PRAYER (A women-led, global, ecumenical movement) DAY OF Friday, 6 March This year's theme:

Rise, take up your mat and walk



Women, men and children of all ages are called to 'Rise, take your mat and walk' to join this day of prayer. Women of Zimbabwe have prepared this year's service and they encourage us all to reflect on the difficulties and unrest that have plagued their country over many years. They share the challenges they have met and the hopes they have for the future. They encourage us to 'Rise, take your mat and walk' with them as they continue their often turbulent journey towards full reconciliation.

World Day of Prayer is an international inter-church organisation which enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. The preparation for the day is vast. An international committee is based in New York and there are national committees in each participating country. Regional conferences meet to consider the service and then local groups make their plans. Finally, at a church near you on Friday, 6 March, people will gather to celebrate the service prepared by the women of Zimbabwe.

The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 170 countries. It begins in Samoa and prayer in native languages travels throughout the world – through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas - before finishing in American Samoa more than 36 hours later.

Zimbabwe and Zambia Food Crisis Appeal

The CAFOD Hope Valley Group has gushes from taps in homes and garworked hard over the past 20 years raising funds for a whole variety of causes and appeals. As one of its members explains:

"We're a small group, based in the parishes of St Michael, Hathersage and Our Lady of Sorrows, Bamford.

"Here in the Hope Valley, we don't often have much in the way of catastrophe - the occasional small flood, the odd snowstorm, traffic congestion, a hosepipe ban now and again...

"But we have never experienced real drought and vegetable carnage in our neat gardens. Supermarkets and the milkman deliver, clean water

dens. We eat well, drink moderately and make merry. Our children are well-schooled and our elderly in careful hands.

"So what is it about the food crisis in Zimbabwe and Zambia that has touched our hearts? The Hope Valley community, it must be said, is hardly diverse but that matters not one bit when we read of failed harvests and drought; of the aftermath of Cyclone Idal, of climate change and economic turmoil; of millions of people in need of food and clean water; of families forced to survive on wild fruits and leaves.

"Think of having to walk from



Sheffield to Hathersage, not for pleasure but for as much water as you could carry home.

"In the scheme of things the £1,000 our group has sent to CAFOD is very little. What really matters is that we give a damn, thinking beyond ourselves, caring about our brothers and sisters in Christ. Just like our Hope Valley community, the people of Zimbabwe and Zambia are our people too.

BLESSED WILLIAM RICHARDSON

As parishes throughout the Diocese pray for vocations to the priesthood and religious life by imploring the help of Our Lady and four holy men, at the suggestion of one of our readers, we now begin a series of short articles looking at the life of each of these men and their connection with our geographical area. This month we focus on Blessed William Richardson.

William's father came into this area from Lancashire to find work, and settled in Waleswood, at what is now known as the far side of Rother Valley Park and long-time residents knew as the hamlet of Bedgreave (William's birthplace). As the medieval mill still stands in the same place, it is perhaps safe to say that his father's employment was that of a miller and that William himself received some elementary education at the hands of a parish curate.

We know from the Entry Book in the English College in Spain that William was a convert to the Catholic faith and was received into the Church by one of the clergy at Wiesloch, Germany, where at that time he was working. He was called to the priesthood, attended the English College in Spain, studying Phi-losophy and Theology, and was ordained priest there in 1594 and then returned to England.

Most of William's life was spent working in London, often with the legal profession in the Inns of Court. He visited prisons as an ordinary visitor, to take Mass to Catholics imprisoned for their faith, and he was sentenced to death



after being betrayed by a priest catcher. His execution took place on Tyburn Gallows, by the barbaric act of being hung, drawn and quartered on 17 February, 1603. We have no knowledge of his last resting place.

William's death was in the reign of Elizabeth 1 and he was the last priest to be murdered at that time. Elizabeth 1 died one week later. It is said that he accepted his death with such constancy and faith, while praying for the Queen, that his executioners were deeply impressed.

It is essential that the Diocese complies with the General Data Protection Regulations in connection with photographs to be published in the Hallam News, on the Diocesan Website or in the Diocesan Yearbook.

The Data Protection Regulations require written consent to be given whenever an image (photo or video) is published in which a person is identified or is likely to be identified. The reason that this consent is necessary is that the photo constitutes the individual's personal data which is then published and which the Diocese has a responsibility to treat in accordance with the Regulations. Photos of small groups, for example of a family group celebrating with their parents a blessing for an anniversary, the Consent Form is to be signed by each person in the group, where it is possible that all the members of the group are either identified or could be identified.

Guidance in relation to Large Groups/Crowds

Where the photo is of a large group and does not focus on an individual, for example a large group attending the Padley Pilgrimage or walking in a procession, the Data Protection Regulations do not apply. There is no need to provide privacy informa-tion to all individuals in the photo. If the focus was on an identified individual in the large group, they would need to give consent for the use of the photo for publication.

The St Wilfrid's Centre annual frid's Centre run a wide range of Sleep Out is returning for its third year on Friday, 13 March, but this year the venue will be Bramall Lane, home of Sheffield United football club, scene of many match day successes in this incredible Premier League season.

Friends and long-time supporters of the Centre, Sheffield United Football Club will be hosting the 3rd annual St Wilfrid's Sleep Out in their John Street stand, with a planned evening of entertainment, a light supper and perhaps the odd Blades legend or two calling in to support participants. Sheffield United Chief Executive, Stephen Bettis and other club Vice Presidents will take part in the Sleep Out, so participants will be able to tuck into bacon sandwiches alongside them, after a little light yoga to stretch out weary limbs.

As in previous years, our Sleep Out aims to raise awareness of the work of St Wilfrid's Centre in supporting vulnerable adults and rough sleepers in Sheffield, along with giving participants a small taste of the daily challenges and discomfort which people who sleep rough may face on a daily basis. Everyone at the Centre hopes to raise £25,000 in sponsorship with the Sleep Out, to enhance the invaluable work of the welfare team who support clients by ensuring their referral to essential services and getting them involved in a wide variety of life enhancing skills and activities, with the aim of getting them back on their feet and participating in society once again. The experienced team at St Wil-

activities for clients, ranging from literacy courses to pottery classes, cooking and drama to outdoor activities such as maintaining an allotment, a walking group and a photography club. The Centre is well stocked with a snooker table, pool table, table tennis, board games and TV, all of which give clients the chance to take part and interact with others, building self-confidence and ensuring clients feel accepted and valued.

Sponsorship raised at the Sleep Out event will support clients such as 'B', who became homeless as his marriage had broken down. B started to attend St Wilfrid's Centre for a shower, something to eat and somewhere safe to be during the day. The welfare team managed to help him into temporary accommodation, which then led to him gaining his own tenancy. B continues to access the Centre for social activities and a good meal.

Louise Finnigan, St Wilfrid's Interim Director, said, "This event will help raise much needed money to pay for the salary of one of our welfare workers, who provides one to one support to people who live on the streets or live in temporary accommodation. The need for our services is greater today than it has ever been and by taking part in the Sleep Out you are helping support the needs of some of Sheffield's most vulnerable adults." It is aimed at all those who wish to develop their skills in the service of the Church and the world, recognising the co-responsibility of the laity in the mission of the Church today.

As we move into the new decade the SVP continues to uphold the fundamental principle of its founder, Frederic Ozanam, to 'love your neighbour' by being an active Christian and to pursue its mission to seek out and help those in need; providing great works of charity in the community. The work of the SVP in 2019 has been varied, interesting, rewarding and beneficial to so many people across Hallam. A snapshot of what has been happening is detailed below.

The core work of SVP members is visiting those who are lonely, isolated, housebound, unwell or just in need of some company; and this is not exclusive to our older citizens either! SVP members in all Hallam conferences have been giving up their time to visit people in their community to bring them company, friendship, support and so much more. Visits have taken place at home, in residential centres and hospitals.

Visits usually involve meeting with individuals but members of one conference have taken their musical instruments into their local care home and ended up leading a group sing-along! When visiting, SVP members can expect to get involved in a range of activities. It is not unusual to end up going shopping, or carrying out minor repairs, but these only happen if the visiting SVP member is comfortable and capable of performing such duties. Additionally, SVP conferences have offered financial support where appropriate to help pay for groceries, household items, furniture and even transport if the beneficiary requires this sort of help.

lished conferences have also continued their support for communities abroad through the SVP Twinnage scheme, sending both financial support and practical aid in the form of resources and material

This work will continue as this decade, indeed this century, progresses.
