There will be two main speakers, the first, not yet finalised, will be theological and the second, more orientated towards the socio-political implications of current policy; will be Ruth Grove-White, policy director, Migrants Rights Network.

There will be a panel discussion with them and the leaders of the five workshops all chosen for their expertise in different areas: David Price from SMYAAG and Greg Challis from CDAS will lead a workshop on campaigning; Dave Smith (Boaz Trust) and someone from ASSIST will lead one on destitution, Gina Clayton will lead one on Legal Issues including issues around legal aid and judicial review, and we are actively seeking a workshop leader for Housing and another for Health.

The Conference is for Refugees and Asylum Seekers as well as for those who work on their behalf.

Grant Helps Kick Start Aid Mission

A drive to fund an recognition of its African aid mis-Dersion by byshire's Mount St Mary's College has got off to a good start with news of a £1,500 grant. The British Council has chosen the Spinkhill school to develop international links with Zambia as part of a new school twinning project, Connecting Classrooms, to boost global education. The group of 15 pupils from Mount St Mary's College has been discussing the trip for some time but the grant has helped get it off the ground. They are now gearing up to travel to Africa next January to carry out a range of charity work in a small Zambian village. The group plan to carry out work in a local school and work on projects within the community to help improve sustainability. Connecting Classrooms is a UK government and British Council education initiative and Mount St Mary's has been selected in

commitment to teaching students about global issues.

The school has launched its fundraising programme for the next year, which will include cake sales, a sponsored walk and litter pick and a clothing collection for recycling. There will also be a science project and a fundraising Dinner and Auction at the school in March.

Fr Simon Ellis, chaplain at



Mount St Mary's College, said, 'The trip to Zambia is an amazing opportunity for pupils to learn about global issues and develop new skills whilst also making a real difference to a community in another part of the world.

Secretary of State for International Development, Justine Greening, said, "I am very pleased that Mount St Mary's College is taking on this excellent opportunity to

link with schools in other parts of our world. Connecting Classrooms will enable pupils to learn about the world around them. about the facts of poverty that face children their own ages in developing countries, and how education can help eradicate

"We would not be able to continue to offer a service to the homeless and vulnerable without the aid of our dedicated volunteers," said Kevin Bradley, Director of St Wilfrid's Centre, recently.

Glen Stevens, parishioner at St Joseph's Dinnington, regularly gives up his time to tutor clients in the Skills Workshop, which is a great example of the work done by volunteers. Glen is also a retired wrought iron worker and recently completed and installed a new set of perimeter railings at the Centre on Queens Road, Sheffield. Completed and erected with the help of clients who attend the day centre and other volunteers, the perimeter surrounding now gives the place a real 'touch of class'.

St Wilfrid's boasts a workforce of more than 100 volunteers who bring their different skills and talents to various facets of the Centre. These could include working in the kitchen or café, teaching in the educational classes or in the pottery or skills workshop.

As arranged they came along and were given a guided tour by Director, Kevin Bradley. Lloyd, who had not seen St Wilf's in action before, expressed amazement and delight at the extent of the Centre's facilities as well as the friendly and peaceful atmosphere of the place. Lloyd commented, "I was bowled over by the amount of work that goes on at St Wilfrid's and how caring the staff and volunteers are towards the clients." St Wilfrid's is delighted to have been chosen as one of the Lord Mayor's two named charities this year.

Sheffield North Deanery supports CAFOD Connect2 **El Salvador**

▼ ince the late 1970s, CAFOD has been working to help the people of El Salvador build a better future. In the 1980s and early 1990s, El Salvador was torn apart by a civil war sparked by inequality. Most Salvadorans lived in extreme poverty while the wealthy elite stockpiled money and controlled the economy. At that time, 40% of the land was owned by just 13 families. The injustice, violence and inequality remain today, as does the threat of natural disasters; El Salvador is highly vulnerable to earthquakes and hurricanes.

As part of its work in El Salvador, CAFOD has established a particular link with a community in Puentecitos, a rural village in the west of the country. This is part of CAFOD's Connect2 programme which links parishes in England and Wales with communities in Bangladesh, Cambodia, Ethiopia and El Salvador. Parishes support their chosen community by praying, raising money and sending news from the parish through photographs, cards and messages of solidarity. In return, the community send regular updates, sharing their hopes and dreams as well as the struggles they face as they try to build a better future for their families.

At a recent meeting of the Sheffield North Deanery Justice and Peace Group it was agreed that the parishes in the deanery would support Connect2 El Salvador. This support will help improve community life through a focus on supporting small businesses and using organic farming methods. Most people in Puentecitos earn a living from farming. When the harvests fail, there's little to fall back on. CAFOD's partner in Puentecitos, Jesuit Development Services, is helping the people develop their farming skills. One particularly important project is showing the farmers how to protect their own diverse range of seeds, enabling them to grow fruit, vegetables and medicines at a reasonable price.

The deanery will also support the women's cooperative in Puentecitos. Thanks to funding to set up their own business and a gift of chickens from the CAFOD World Gifts programme, the community not only has eggs for food and to sell, but the women have also set up a bakery and a cafe where the eggs from the chickens are also in

great demand. One of the other key concerns of the community is to ensure that the children are able to go to school. Until recently, Puentecitos was completely cut off during the rainy season, which can last for 6 months, and the children had to climb trees to get across the river to reach their school. At the end of last year, however, the village celebrated the completion of a new bridge over the river, built by the community with the help of Jesuit Development Services (pictured below).

The bridge was officially blessed and opened by our own Bishop John during a pilgrimage he led to El Salvador for the Romero Trust. During the ceremony, he described CAFOD as the bridge between poor communities across the world and the people of England and Wales. With the support of Sheffield North Deanery, those bridges look set to be strengthened.

Women's World Day of Prayer, Friday, 7 March

Women's World Day of Prayer is an international, inter-church organisation which enables the voices of women from all parts of the world to be heard: their hopes, concerns and prayers.

The preparation for the day is extensive. An international committee works from New York and each participating country has its own national committee. Regional conferences meet to consider the service and then local groups make their plans. Finally, at a church near you on 7 March, women and men will gather to celebrate using a programme of worship offered this year by women in Egypt.

The theme of the service is 'Streams in the Desert' asking people to reflect on the Christian role of being a 'stream in the desert' for those who experience spiritual 'drought'. The service from Egypt has universal appeal.

One of the oldest civilisations in the world, Egypt has long been home to Coptic Christians. Since the upris-ing in 2011 there has been conflict between religious groupings. Political change affects individual lives and it is hoped people will pray with the women of Egypt for peace.

A great wave of prayer is envisaged, rising with the sun over the island of Samoa and sweeping across Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas, coming to rest in American Samoa some 36 hours later. By then Women's World Day of Prayer services will have been celebrated in over 170 countries.

ST MARIE'S CONCERT SERIES



On Friday 7 March, the First Friday in Lent, the Choirs of St Anne's Cathedral, Leeds are coming to Sheffield to the beautiful Cathedral of St Marie's to provide an evening of sacred music for Lent.

The programme centres on the work of the Estonian Composer of sacred music, Arvo Part.

It includes great pieces of music, such as The Beatitudes, Cantate Domino (Sing to the Lord) and Berliner Messe, music which follows a standard Mass setting and includes the Kyrie, Gloria, Credo, Sanctus and Agnus Dei. There will also be a presentation of the Italian composer, Allegri's Miserere, a piece which translates as "have mercy on me, O God" and is a setting of Psalm 51 composed during the reign of Pope Urban V111 for use in the Sistine Chapel.

Leeds Cathedral has one of the greatest music departments among Catholic Cathedrals in the UK.

There are five Cathedral Choirs, which make up a total of 110 members: junior boys, junior girls, senior girls, senior boys and adults.
