THE DIOCESE OF HALLAM WELCOMES BISHOP RALPH HESKETT

On Thursday, 10 July Bishop Ralph Heskett CSsR was installed as the third Bishop of Hallam.

Below is the Installation Order of Service which welcomed our Bishop and asked for God's Blessings on him in his new role.

THE RITE OF INSTALLATION

Introit : Ut et discipuli perseverantes in oratione cum Maria Matre Iesu, (The disciples devoted themselves with one accord to prayer with Mary, the Mother of Jesus).

The Metropolitan Archbishop, Malcolm McMahon, together with the Vicar-General and the College of Consultors process to the back of the Cathedral. The Archbishop presents Bishop Ralph to the Vicar-General, Mgr Kilgannon at the entrance of the Cathedral. Bishop Ralph venerates the diocesan cross and sprinkles himself and the assembly with Holy Water.

Solemn Entrance
The College of Consultors lead Bishop Ralph to the Blessed Sacrament Chapel preceded by the cross and the book of the Gospels carried by the Dean of the Cathedral. Here, Bishop Ralph pauses briefly for a moment of silent prayer.

During the procession, the following psalm is sung: Taste and see the goodness of the Lord.

Bishop Ralph proceeds to vest for Mass and the Bishop's pro-cession leaves the Blessed Sacrament Chapel. Processional Hymn: All people

that on earth do dwell

After the entrance procession and reverencing of the altar the Metropolitan Archbishop

stands before the cathedra. Archbishop McMahon: We gather here in this Cathedral Church under the patronage of Mary Mother of God, to celebrate the mystery of Christ's love for us, and to welcome into the Diocese our new teacher and shepherd, Ralph Heskett as the third Bishop of the Diocese of Hallam. I extend a warm welcome to the priests, religious and God's faithful people of the Diocese of Hallam, our brothers and sisters of other Christian communities and other faiths and our civic guests.

As Metropolitan Province of Liverpool it is my responsibility to require that the Apostolic Letter of Authority from the Holy See be read. Mgr Kirkwood, the Chancellor of the Diocese, goes to the ambo. Before reading the Apostolic letter the Chancellor shows the mandate to the priests of the College of Consultors, then reads the Apostolic Letter, at the end of which he invites the congregation to signify their assent.

After the reading and the acclamation, the Chancellor shows the mandate to the people, then returns the Apostolic Letter to Bishop Ralph and the Archbishop invites him to take his place at the cathedra.

Bishop Ralph: In the name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

All respond: Amen.

Bishop Ralph: Peace be with

All Respond: And with your

spirit.
The Dean of the Cathedral presents Bishop Ralph with the book of the Gospels saying: Bishop Ralph, receive this Book

of the Gospels, preach the Word of God to the Church of the Diocese of Hallam, teaching always with resolute zeal and loving

patience. Bishop John Rawsthorne, Emeritus Bishop of Hallam, presents the Diocesan Crozier to Bishop Ralph saying:

Guided by the power of the Holy Spirit and the will of the Holy Father, Pope Francis, you have assumed the pastoral responsibility of the Church of the Diocese of Hallam. With confidence and trust I hand you this crozier, the sign of the shepherd's office and ministry. May the Lord sustain you in this office entrusted to you for the service of the people of God in this Diocese.

Bishop Ralph: With faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, and with the love of God in my heart, I accept the pastoral care of the people of God in the Diocese of Hallam. I promise to serve faithfully the Church in this Diocese, preach the Gospel and celebrate the Eucharist.

Bishop Ralph is then formally greeted by the Dean of the Cathedral Church followed by some diocesan clergy and selected members of the faithful. The Bishop greets other representatives of civic and religious authorities.

The Gloria is sung. Bishop Ralph: Let us pray.

O God, Father of mercies, whose only begotten Son, as he hung upon the Cross, chose the Blessed Virgin Mary, his Mother, to be our Mother also, grant we pray, that with her loving help your Church may be more fruitful day by day and, exulting in the holiness of her children, may draw to her embrace all the families of peoples. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. All: Amen

World War 1 - Diocesan Remembrance

The Hallam Justice and Peace Commission ask us to mark the centenary of the First World War and remember all those who lost their lives in the conflict. The Bishops of England and Wales encourage the Catholic community to participate in local civic or ecumenical celebrations. The Bishops will celebrate Requiem Masses in their Cathedrals on or near the six key dates which have been identified as part of the anniversary celebrations:

4 August 2014 Centenary of entry of the British Empire to the War

25 April 2015 Gallipoli campaign

31 May/1 June 2016 Battle of Jutland commemorating the war at sea

1 July 2016 Battle of the Somme

31 July 2017 Start of the 3rd Battle of Ypres (Passchendaele)

11 November 2018 Armistice Day

Catholic parishes are asked to mark these important anniversaries on the nearest Sunday by offering Mass for all those who died and to pray in the intercessions for those currently serving in the armed forces, and for peace.

The Justice and Peace Commission are developing a four year plan. In the first two years there will be a concentration on Deanery activities, engaging Deaneries in ownership of prayers for peace, recalling their fallen and signing a book of remembrance. Some parishes are already looking at some of these ideas. It is hoped to have a liturgical event in all Deaneries in the autumn of 2015

Farewell Pastoral Letter from Emeritus Bishop John

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ Bishop Ralph Heskett, until recently the Bishop of Gibraltar is now the Bishop of Hallam. I have welcomed him warmly on all our behalf.

He is somebody that I have known for many years, since the days when we were both in Liverpool. He has wide experience as a Parish Priest both in Liverpool and in London. He is a Redemptorist Priest and has run Parish Missions all over the country, including in some of our own parishes here in the Diocese of Hallam. I know that when you get to know him you will take him to your hearts. In September he will celebrate a Mass in each of the Deaneries.

With Bishop Ralph's permission, I write to offer my thanks and say my farewells. I will be moving back to the Archdiocese of Liverpool to be involved in local parish pastoral work. But I have enjoyed seventeen wonderfully happy years here in the Diocese of Hallam. It has been a joy and privilege to work with the priests, religious and laity of this Diocese during a period which at times has been difficult because of the declining number of priests and occasionally for other reasons as well. Thank you for your patience, understanding and support during those difficult periods but thank you being the wonderful people you are during the whole period. I was genuinely able to say in the Press Release which went out announcing Bishop Ralph's appointment that during my seventeen years the relationship with priests and people has been warm and truly collaborative.

I have spoken personally with the priests and religious of the Diocese on other occasions, but I do need to signal before everybody the debt I owe to them, for their patience, on occasion for their forgiveness, for their positive collaboration and for their friendship.

On the wider front, I have been very

blessed with the friendship of so many other leaders of the Christian Churches in these parts and in more recent years also with the friendship of leaders and others from the other religions. They have been great and very positive partnerships, deeply rooted in our faiths.

It is always dangerous to name names, but I do need to name two people, perhaps representing the clergy and the laity in a very special way. I owe them both a very great debt of gratitude. Mrs Sheila Parden became Bishop's Secretary very shortly after I arrived. She had been Administrator of the Marriage Tribunal in the Pastoral Centre and has become the voice of Bishop's House on the telephone to the myriad people who ring. She has done a wonderful job of organising a disorganised Bishop through those seventeen years with patience and great tact! I treasure the moment of truth when I heard a youngster from the InReality Team telling her parents, "The Bishop is the boss, but if you want to get something done, talk to Sheila Parden".

And the second person of course, is Mgr Kilgannon, the Vicar General. He had been Vicar General with Bishop Moverley and very generously agreed to continue working with me. I doubt that he thought that that would last for seventeen years but I do not know what I would have done without his wise counsel, encouragement and support. To him also I am deeply indebted.

Bishops come and go, but the Church, local and universal, goes on. And I will continue to pray for God's blessing on the new Bishop and the people of this Diocese, which is now of course the Diocese to which I belong wherever I may be.

He undertook a number of overseas visits not just to witness livelihood projects in action but to view the work undertaken in humanitarian disaster areas as well.


On top of these demanding duties he never waivered in supporting the Hal-

The National Council and Annual General Meeting of the Union of Catholic Mothers took place at the Hayes Conference Centre, Swanwick from 19-21 May. Mrs Delia Fox, as Diocesan President, led the group from the Hallam Diocese.

In a tight agenda there were reports from the National Committee and the National Officers and included voting for the next National President, who will take office in May, 2015. The result of the voting saw Mrs Val Ward of the

Shrewsbury Diocese elected as President.

Hallam Ascent Group Learn about the Ordinariate

Hallam Ascent recently invited Father Ian Grieves from Darlington to talk about his personal journey from Anglican priest to joining the Ordinariate Of Our Lady Of Walsingham. Below is an account of his presentation.

Ian Grieves was born in Trimdon and he was very involved in parish life. His grandfather was a Roman Catholic, and he feels that he has returned to his

birthright.

After leaving school, he went to Durham University for four years, where he studied music and took a teaching qualificachurch environment, so when he went to see the bishop, he was advised to go away and test his vocation for 3 years. He taught RE and was a Housemaster in a Prep School in Sussex where they asked him to do the music as well. The Bishop then sent him to a selection conference for four days, at the end of which they sent him to a Seamen's Mission in Swansea for a year. He passed the next selection conference and was sent to study at the Theological College in Chichester for two years. In 1984 he was ordained deacon and sent to St Mark's in Darlington for three years followed by three years in Gateshead where the Metro Centre was being built. He was then appointed to his first parish in Darlington. His second parish was St James in Darlington – a very poor parish which needed considerable work on the church and hall. Over the years this was done at great expense but they also had to contend with a high Diocesan levy.

They had prided themselves on a daily Mass and when Pope Benedict nounced the formation of the Ordinariate, the Church Council urged him to apply as they him 'this was made for us'. They held an Open Day for the whole parish. It was a total leap of faith as they would leave the Anglican church with nothing - no church and no income. They took a lot of time preparing for the change, including setting up a trust to manage gift aid and other donations to enable them to continue. Bishop Justin Welby came and preached at the last Mass before they moved to St Anne's, Darlington. Afterwards, St

Osmund's at Gainford became vacant and they moved there. They have a Parish Mass at 9.30 and a Solemn Mass at 11.30 with parish social events once a month on a Friday. They take their music very seriously. Mass often features music by composers such Haydn, Mozart and Palestrina, with Anthems during Holy Communion and an Organ Voluntary to process out to after the Dismissal.



75th Anniversary

This year the Union of Catholic Mothers from St Catherine's parish, Sheffield celebrates its 75th anniversary. As part of the celebrations of this special event Past President, Winifred Robinson looks back over the last seventy five years of its history

Prior to the formation of the Union of Catholic Mothers in the parish, the ladies of the parish were very much involved in parish life. On Monday afternoons they organised sewing meetings in the upper room of the Catholic Young Men's Society Club in Montfort Street. They ran an annual Sale of Work in the old parish hall in Andover Street. At Christmas they provided and served refreshments for the school children of the Infants School. Each Whit Monday afternoon they provided and served refreshments to all of the children in the school. On the First Holy Communion day they served breakfast to the First Com-

It was shortly after the foundation of the Union of Catholic Mothers in 1939 that war broke out, and this completely disrupted parish life. Many husbands went to serve in the armed forces. Many of the young men and women of the parish did likewise, whilst others went into war work. Later on in the war older women, wives and mothers, also took on war work. Because of the blackout and the threat of air raids, it was very difficult to hold meetings.

Several of the older members of the newly formed UCM undertook voluntary work each week in the services' canteen which was on the north end of No 1 platform of the Sheffield Midland railway station. This canteen, which was open 24 hours per day, served beverages and refreshments to the many thousands of service personnel who passed through the station, going on leave, returning from leave, or in transit. Again, members of the parish UCM did similar voluntary work in the Catholic Women's League services' canteen which was in Wilkinson Street.

It was not until after the end of the 1939-45 war that the parish UCM was able to get back into its stride. From then on the UCM undertook and ran most of the parish activities. Each year they ran an Easter bonnet parade and dance, Summer Garden Party and a Christmas Fayre. They cleaned the church. Each week in conjunction with the Children of Mary they ran a whist drive. They manned the church repository, and whenever the priests of the deanery met, it was the UCM who provided and served the refreshments. When the new church hall was built in 1963 it was the UCM who bought all the crockery and cutlery. They ran a regular Saturday night dance, and made and fixed the curtains for the windows. In 1968 the Duke of Norfolk's estates offered to the parish the freehold of the land on which the hall was built. Unfortunately, parish funds were stretched. The parish had recently built a new school and could not find the £400 necessary to buy the freehold. The parish UCM stepped in and bought it. When the hall was sold in 2007 the value of the land had increased in value to over £100,000 which made an extensive contribution to the reduction of the debt which the parish was then facing through the refurbishment and redecoration of the church.

The work of the Members of the UCM continues. They are still involved with the weekly tote which was started in 1972. One of their most recent activities was the buying and the fitting of the lace curtains to the windows of the presbytery.

Fund Raising for St Luke's, Sheffield

Following the death in March of a longstanding parishioner and member of St Theresa's Choir, Sheffield, a charity evening was organised in the Parish Hall in aid of St Luke's Hospice, Sheffield.

The evening included live music with the Cadillacs, a raffle with lots of donated prizes and everyone brought food and drink to share. The event was well supported and raised the grand total of £310.

The organisers want to say a huge thank you to everyone who came along and supported such a worthwhile cause.

Catholic Certificate in Religious Studies - is it for me?

Adult Education tutor Greg Ryan thinks there is something in it for everyone

You may have seen the article in last month's "Hallam News" about the Catholic Certificate in Religious Studies (CCRS) - starting in September at the Pastoral Centre. The Diocese has run this national course for a number of years, and participants have praised it not just for developing knowledge (and for school teachers, gaining a qualification for professional development), but for enriching the depth of their faith.

Doing the CCRS allows people to continue this journey of faith at any point in their life. In fact one of the particular strengths of the course here in Hallam is the sharing of experience and wisdom across the generations. However, as the Catholic Bishops of England and Wales said in "The Priority of Adult Formation" (1999), "many adults feel that their own formation effec-

tively ended as children". This rings true with some of the conversations I've had with participants, but I would like to reassure anyone thinking about starting the CCRS that it is designed to be as inclusive and accessible as possible.

There is no requirement for a background in Religious Studies at any level, or indeed for any formal qualifications, so long as the assignments can be submitted in readable English. The most common worry is having to do written assignments - perhaps for the first time since school days. To help, we have friendly, experienced tutors who will provide support and guidance, as well as study resources such as reading lists, notes and exercises. The Pastoral Centre has a well-stocked adult education library with the key texts you'll need. Once you are over



the psychological barrier of writing 1500 words (3-4 pages), you may find the biggest challenge is compressing your ideas into that word limit!

You also have the option of just taking the course without qualifying for the national certificate, which means that you do not have to do the assignments. On the other hand, for anyone who wants to study the subject more deeply, tutors are happy to recommend further reading and discuss topics and assignments in more depth.

Like many of the tutors, I've been fortunate to experience both sides of adult formation in Hallam. In 1999, when the Bishops of England and Wales were writing "The Priority of Adult Formation", I was finishing my MA in theology at the Pastoral Centre. More recently I've been teaching on the CCRS and have seen the powerful "buzz" in the room when participants get a new insight into scripture, faith or life. But it's not just the input from the teaching that is important - it's what the people on the course bring into the discussions and reflections. I certainly never stop learning from the questions, stories and insights that are generously shared in exploring the faith together. Hopefully that will be the experience of everyone who signs up to start the course in September. You can register for the CCRS and find



InReality Team Working Around the Diocese

Over the past few months InReality has been very busy working with many young people from this Diocese in both schools and parishes. We began Lent by spending several days at McCauley Catholic High School in Doncaster. During these days we lead each class through an Ash Wednesday liturgy, where we shared with the young people what Ash Wednesday and Lent is all about.

We also spent three days at Mount St Mary's looking at Pope Francis' recent Exhortation, Evangelii Gaudium, "The Joy of the Gospel", with elements and figures (year 7 and 8). We focused on where we can find joy in our lives and how we can share that joy with others. We created videos of how we can share this joy and each year group prepared a final liturgy to celebrate the day they had spent together. We ended our time at The Mount with an assembly looking back at the highlights of the time we shared on our retreat. Over the Lenten season we visited six primary schools; St Mary's, Herringthorpe, St Thomas More, Sheffield, St Joseph's, Dinnington, St Joseph's, Retford, St Joseph's, Handsworth and Our Lady and St Joseph's, Wath. In each school we lead a retreat day with one of the classes, think-



together with a whole school assembly where we thought about how we can be the best that we can be during Lent. We had great fun in each school and on each day the young people created their own Stations of the Cross after reflecting on what each station means to them. The Stations of the Cross that were created by each school were amazing and beautiful and were shared with



the rest of the school, in the liturgy at the end of the day. Each was so different and so incredibly prayerful and reflective. The day was brought together by each young person taking part in a final liturgy that they created as a class and then shared with the rest of the school community.

We have also had the privilege to work alongside several confirmation groups and their wonderful catechists.

Over the past few months we have spent time working in two parishes, Immaculate Conception in Herringthorpe and St Mary's, High Green. Getting to share in their journey towards Confirmation has been a real privilege.

We have also been visited by two Confirmation groups at the house in Denaby Main, the first being the Confirmation group from St Marie's, Sheffield and the second from St Joseph's, Wath. Each day was filled with lots of prayer, laughter and joy. We spent time getting to know more about each other and we completed a series of challenges based on the Gifts of the Holy Spirit. After lunch time was spent journeying round different prayer stations, reflecting in particular on what it means to be a disciple and what it means to be Confirmed.

We had an amazing journey towards Easter and we would like to thank all the young people, school staff and catechists we have met and had the joy of working alongside over the past few months.

MORE DEVELOPMENTS AT ST JOHN FISHER

The Sheffield Star recently reported on more building work carried out at the rapidly developing Catholic School in Hackenthorpe. "Youngsters at a Sheffield primary school will no longer have to carry their lunch down the corridor – after it secured cash for a new kitchen. Currently, pupils at St John Fisher Catholic Academy, in Hackenthorpe, have to walk with their food from the kitchen to their eating area. However, plans have now been drawn up for a new facility as part of the dining room – and work is expected to be complete by September.

The refurbishment will also help meet demand for more school dinners, as all under-sevens will be able to have a free lunch from the next academic year. Delia Evans, deputy headteacher at the Spring Water Avenue school, said, "The pupils are excited about the new kitchen. We have had some misses with food as they come around the cor-

ner, so it will be a lot easier." St John Fisher has its meals brought in from another school and the new kitchen will continue with that arrangement, so does not require ovens. The £104,000 from the Education Funding Agency will be used to create a larger, more modern kitchen for serving the meals.

From September, all infant school pupils in the country will be able to have free lunches, with the aim of giving children a healthy start in life. Mrs Evans said about 90 children in Reception, Year One and Year Two at St John Fisher would be entitled to the free meals. She said, "The new kitchen will mainly

The inspection team were truly blown away by the school's innovative approach to teaching and the children's thirst for learning. Pauline Pitman, the lead inspector, confirmed in her report that teaching is outstanding, "because it is innovative, imaginative and inspires pupils to learn." She went on to say that, "Expectations are very high and inspiring learning experiences support pupils to progress to a higher level."

Andrew Truby has been headmaster at the school since September 2009, when was appointed as one of the youngest heads in the country at the age of 28. From the outset, Andrew was determined to take the school on a journey towards becoming outstanding. Now that this day has arrived, Andrew commented, "We are all absolutely delighted with the outstanding judgement because we have worked relentlessly for this for many years. The school has a real family feeling about it and an incredibly powerful Catholic ethos which can be felt as soon as you walk through our doors. I am probably the luckiest head in the world because my staff are truly talented from the welcoming and highly efficient office staff, the dinner staff who provide excellent activities for the pupils, the cleaners and building officer who maintain the school to the highest standard to the teachers and support staff who make learning irresistible, I have a truly outstanding team behind me." The school appointed Liam Colclough, a talented young deputy head at the start of the academic year who has certainly made quite an impression at the school already. The inspection team noticed his 'strong leadership' and the 'outstanding practice' he shares with other staff.

Liam is pleased to be part of the St Thomas' family and adds, "We are blessed to have such a wonderful team of staff who live and breathe this school while pushing themselves to the limits to help all children achieve. It is a privilege to work in such a thriving learning community which is underpinned by our talented, reflective and inspirational children. The journey really has only just begun for our school." Reflecting on the journey, Andrew added that, "The journey towards outstanding has not been without significant challenges and huge personal sacrifices from the team. As a school, we do not do things in order to please Ofsted; everything that we do is because we believe that it will have a major impact on our children's learning." Staff at the school feel privileged to work with such amazing children. The inspection team were so impressed by the children's outstanding behaviour and commented that, "Pupils are proud of their school and of their work. They arrive at school with a smile and even the youngest children have developed a real sense of ownership in their community and in their ability as learners." Members of staff at the school are highly ambitious for every single child in their care in terms of releasing their academic potential as well as developing each child spiritually, morally, socially and culturally. It is heartening that the inspection team recognised this about the school.

What is next for this outstanding school?

The school has made it clear that it is not going to be defined by the outstanding Ofsted judgement and will certainly not be putting banners outside but will continue to be defined by its core values around teaching, learning, emotional intelligence and family. The school hopes to extend its age range to include nursery provision within the next few years and has exciting plans to further develop the grounds to promote adventurous play and risk taking. Outstanding is not the end of the road but the beginning of the next stage of the journey. The team at St Thomas of Canterbury now aim to create a world-class school as a centre of excellence to share this with other schools for the benefit of children everywhere.


