Our Diocese Mourns Fr Brian Davies

The funeral of Fr Brian Davies was held on 26 August at St Michael and All Angels, Wombwell, where Monsignor John Ryan spoke of the man with whom he had worked for a number of years.

Brian Davies was not your stereotypical priest. He was not one for the Gamarelli well-cut suit, with the diamond cufflinks and high clerical collar. In fact he didn't look much like what you expect a priest to look like. With his close-cropped hair and stocky build you might have expected to see Doc Martins on his feet and a bulldog

tattoo peeping through his shirt. He would not thank you for a gin and tonic; he did not spend his Mondays at the golf club; and his Black Country accent, which despite years in exile he never lost, was always a surprise to hear in these parts. In short he was not what most people, even in South Yorkshire, expect their priests to be like. But if he didn't look or sound the part, he most certainly lived it. He would do anything for people; and there was no distinction between folk. If you had a genuine need Brian would try and do something to help. He was a man from the

working class who never lost his identity; a man of the ordinary people.

Brian was born and brought up in Bloxwich, in the Black Country, north of Birmingham. He didn't follow an expected path to the priesthood. Brian had a happy upbringing, with hard working parents and sister, but not a religious one. He left school at sixteen and began a series of jobs, beginning as a painter and decorator, working for neighbours. His parents attended the local Catholic Church in Bloxwich and Brian began to join them. He embraced the Catholic faith.

He thought about the priesthood. He considered a life as a religious. He had a series of jobs, as a machine operator, making "Keep Left" signs, as manager of Rumbelows, and all the while he helped in his local parish.

Eventually he took the step, applied to the Archbishop of Birmingham and was sent to Campion House, Osterley. He then went on to Oscott, the major seminary in Birmingham and was ordained in his parish Church of St Peter in Bloxwich on June 29th, the Feast of Sts Peter and Paul in 1982. His first appointment was very happy with a

kindly parish priest, Fr O'Shea. Then in 1985 came a letter from the Archbishop, Maurice Couve de Murville, informing Brian of a new appointment – to St Marie's Cathedral, Sheffield.

He had to look in his atlas to find out where Sheffield was. When he arrived in Sheffield Brian got on well with his fellow priests and the people of Sheffield. Eventually Brian decided that his future was in South Yorkshire and he was incardinated into the Diocese of Hallam.

Brian moved from St Marie's to the Manor, Sheffield, St Theresa's

parish, first as assistant to Fr Pat O'Connor and then he took over the parish. Brian was a man for the Manor. They were his sort of people. Then he came to Wombwell, where he also settled well. Gradually his sphere of influence extended,

and took in the parishes of Goldthorpe and Hoyland and he forged them into the single parochial entity of Corpus Christi. Brian willingly took on each task. Brian was committed to his parishioners. He cooked for the parish and also

worked very hard for the needy. Brian's holidays were always with parishioners to Lourdes or to Spain. How appropriate that his final journey was to Lourdes where he celebrated Mass a fortnight before he died. May he rest in peace.

Rev Philip Roderick, Diocese of Sheffield Bishop's Advisor in Spirituality and Chaplain to Whirlow Spirituality Centre, commented, "For practical reasons as the Spirituality Centre goes through a period of transition, some of the remaining events for 2014 have been moved to other locations. The work of the Spirituality Centre is very much alive and kicking and we hope you will continue to support us at our new venues as we take time to reflect and discern what the programme for 2015 will look like. The main house site has been sold and will be redeveloped in the coming months, subject to planning permission being granted.

Ltd, the charity which owned and ran Whirlow Grange and whose aims include facilitating Christian education. Between them the partnership owns the Chapel, the Spirituality Centre and the ground immediately around it, including the car park. MARRIAGE 5

The next instalment of the Articles on Marriage presented by Charles and Jane Perryman considers Marriage as a Covenant

In the previous articles we have written, we have described some of the ways that married couples deepen their love for and their commitment to their spouse. We have talked of how couples should be respectful and make requests of their partner not demands; of how we need to value each other; and for the need to listen to one another and to forgive one another. The Fathers of the Second Vatican Council back in 1965 described marriage as, "The intimate partnership of married life and love (that) has been established by the Creator and qualified by His laws, ... is rooted in the conjugal covenant of irrevocable personal consent". The key word in this description is "covenant". Marriage is a covenant type of relationship. What does that mean to us in terms of our everyday lives together?


In the Old Testament, when God made the Covenant with the Israelites on Sinai it was a relationship, an alliance, an agreement which, for the Israelites, encompassed the whole of their lives. The positive aspect of the covenant relationship embodied in the love of man and woman is expressed very powerfully in the Song of Songs where the desire for unity and intimacy is described in a series of vivid love poems. Throughout biblical history, God remained faithful to this covenant in the face of repeated backsliding by the Israelites. The history of the Old Testament is that of God sending Prophet after Prophet to remind the Israelites of the covenant and to call them back to the true worship of their God. This is seen most vividly in the life of the prophet Hosea. That is the negative side. In the end the Israelites tried to fulfil their covenant obligations through keeping to the letter of the Law.

It was this legalism that Jesus challenged time after time. In the new covenant based on Christ's self-sacrificing love the example of marriage is used by St Paul to illustrate the intimate love between Christ and His Church. When we see married couples being faithful to each other throughout their lives; when we see them deepening their intimacy through listening to

each other, forgiving each other when hurts arise, bringing new life into the world and trying consistently to co-operate with Christ living with them, then we get a glimpse of what the love of Christ for His Church is like. To take one of these characteristics, what do we mean by being faithful to one another throughout our lives? This is not just about not having an extra-marital sexual relationship. We are called to be faithful by nurturing our marriages continually so that our intimacy grows day by day. There are lots of pressures on married couples that tend to pull them apart. Faithfulness entails ensuring that our marriage relationship comes first in our order of priorities. It means being loyal to one another – not criticising our spouse in front of others. It means that when we recognise that our relationship is drifting we take action to bring it back to centre-stage. Above all it means not indulging in activities in order to get recognition or satisfaction when they are in short supply in our own relationships.

If you can get past the often obscure ecclesiastical language, the teaching documents of the church provide great insight into the beauty of marriage. What they don't do, is to tell us how we go about living up to the great ideals that they set before us. The work of some social psychologists over the last 25 years or so have helped to develop a clear explanation of how and why some relationships thrive and some don't and what we can do about it. It is our opinion that these ideas are entirely consistent with an understanding of marriage as a covenant.

We have been asked to lead what we are calling a "conversation" about marriage at the Mother of God Parish Hall, Abbeydale Road, Sheffield S7 1DX at 7.30 pm on 15 October (please see page 2 for details). What we hope to do is to develop a few of the ideas we have written about in order to stimulate some discussion in small groups about how these ideas play out in our lives. We hope that many of you reading this will come along and join in the conversation.

Simplicity at the Heart of Church Growth

The results of a national Catholic evangelisation project give a unique insight into what is attracting people to the Catholic Faith.

Beauty and art, using Catholic signs and symbols; use of everyday language and offering opportunities for a one-to-one with someone of faith, are just some of the simple and effective means and methods of evangelisation that have been identified through the work of the 'Crossing the Threshold' project. An initiative of the Bishops' Conference Department for Evangelisation and Catechesis, chaired by Bishop Kieran Conry, the project was set up to explore ways that ministry and outreach to non churchgoing Catholics could be developed.

Bishop Conry explained,

"We know from our work that many people would like to reconnect with their Catholic practice, but sometimes they perceive that even trivial obstacles prevent them from taking this step. A recurrent concern among Mass going Catholics is how to reach out to them - family members and friends - who seem distant from the life of the Church and faith. This project tries to positively identify simple and practical ways that we can help, and it has received a significant amount of interest."

The Bishops' Conference Home Mission Desk has been working with diocesan and parish teams to explore what kind of outreach activities appeal to those who have little or no contact with parish life. Five teams engaged in a breadth of activities.

All the participating parishes reported that Mass attendance had increased. All the teams saw people return to the practice of their faith; it helped to create a culture of evangelisation in the parish and parishioners' confidence to evangelise increased.

The 'Crossing the Threshold' project has also included: the creation of a national core group for this area of ministry; the organisation of a diocesan leaders' day; a national resource tour covering six locations; the offering of new materials about the Sacrament of Reconciliation; the creation of new multi-media resources. The full complement of materials is gradually being published online at: www.cbcew.org.uk/home-mission.

Peace is humanity, respect, open dialogue



I Shall Not Hate narrates Izzeldin Abueish's experience of growing up in the Gaza strip, from his childhood in the Jabalia Refugee Camp until the fateful day in 2009 when three of his beloved daughters and a niece were blown up by Israeli fire on his home.

"This catastrophe of the deaths of my daughters and niece has strengthened my thinking, deepened my belief about how to bridge the divide. I understand down to my bones that violence is futile. It is a waste of time, lives, and resources, and has been proven only to beget more violence. It does not work. It just perpetuates a vicious cycle. There's only one way to bridge the divide, to live together, to realise the goals of two peoples: we have to find the light to guide us to our goal. I'm not talking about the light of religious faith here, but light as a symbol of truth. The light that allows you to see, to clear away the fog – to find wisdom. To find the light of truth, you have to talk to, listen to, and respect each other. Instead of wasting energy on hatred, use it to open your eyes and see what's really going on. Surely, if we can see the truth, we can live side by side."

"I believe in coexistence, not endless cycles of revenge and retribution."

- 1 Peace is humanity; peace is respect; peace is open dialogue. Peace is not the absence of anything because that just puts it in a negative light. Let's be positive about what peace is – rather than what it is not.
- 2 The absence of war does not mean there is peace. Is a person who is ill at peace? Is a person filled with confusion and doubt (and fear) at peace? Do all countries that do not engage in outright war live in peace?
- 3 Hate is blindness and leads to irrational thinking and behaviour. It is a chronic, severe and destructive sickness.
- 4 Hatred may be reversible if we allow it.
- 5 Anger is not the same as hate.
- 6 Anger can be productive. Feel the anger, acknowledge it, but let it be accompanied by change. Let it propel you toward necessary action for the betterment of yourself and others.
- 7 We do not merely accept what is happening around us. We all have the potential to be agents of change.
- 8 I have every faith in women and their potential. Women, by their very nature, bring people together. It is time for women to take the lead. We need to give them every opportunity to be educated and have the chance to act on what they know is best for all humanity.
- 9 When your core values align with your heart, they become non-negotiable. If this is your guide, you can make decisions with the utmost integrity.
- 10 If you always base your judgements on truth, you will earn respect and trust.
- 11 To be seen by others as trustworthy, is one of the greatest gifts you can receive.
- 12 Judging people based on another's assessment of them does not leave you open enough to consider other possibilities.
- 13 By exploiting other's weakness, you are missing the opportunity to see the great contributions they are capable of making.
- 14 Our children's dreams can continue to be manifested through the success of others when we put the opportunities in place for them.
- 15 Trust children's opinions. They are the most likely to speak the truth and far less likely to have a personal agenda.
- 16 Good ideas become great ones when shared with others.
- 17 It is not enough to sow the seeds of wisdom; we are called to action if we are to reap a bountiful harvest.
- 18 Whatever you do, if it is done with a sincere heart and for the betterment of others, things are more likely to fall into place (and) happen as you envision it.


